Reservoir on land adjacent to Manning Grove, Carringtons Road, Great Bromley

The appeal against Essex County Council's refusal to grant planning permission for the reservoir at Manning Grove is to be considered by the Planning Inspectorate at a public hearing in Chelmsford on Tuesday 19th February. The hearing will take place in the Picture Room at Shire Hall, Tindall Square, Chelmsford commencing at 10am.

The appellants and Essex County Council have made written representations to the Inspector and a large number of parishioners from Great and Little Bromley and from Ardleigh have also written. The details of the submissions by the appellants and Essex County Council are available on the Parish Council website at <u>http://www.gbpc.org.uk/</u>.

The County Council's submission is very comprehensive and provides robust support for their decision to refuse planning permission. Nonetheless, parishioners can support the refusal by attending the hearing. Parking can be hard to find and expensive so a coach from Talisman Coaches has been arranged at a concessional rate. Our thanks to them.

KITCHEN CORNER

When I was in Wiltshire recently I was talking to my daughter-in-law's helper and we exchanged ideas about country food and our farming background. One of her favourite memories was of the apple crumble cake which her grandmother used to make. So I decided to try one as she had described and it was delicious! Really quick and easy too.

Apple Crumble Cake

For the sponge base: 2oz SR flour 2oz butter 2oz caster sugar 1 egg Filling: 1 very large Bramley apple, peeled, cored and sliced Topping: 6oz flour

3oz butter 2oz sugar

I used a 16cm spring form loose bottom cake tin. Grease well, make up the



sponge base in the usual way and spread over the base of the tin. Cover this with the thinly sliced apple, then top with the crumble mix and sprinkle with a little demerara sugar, if liked.

Bake at 180°C for 30-40 minutes till nicely golden brown. Let it cool a little before releasing the sides and serve with custard or cream.

When cold and set you can serve it as cake.

Makes 4 large portions.

CRIME IN LITTLE BROMLEY

Whilst the number of crimes in the parish of Little Bromley is still small, perhaps one or two per month on average, parishioners should be aware that there has been an increase in crime in the village over the last few months. This increase is reflected elsewhere in Tendring.

Most of the crimes involve theft of property

from private houses but there has been one serious assault on a parishioner whilst working in the parish. In times of economic hardship it is usual to see an increase in crime and in particular theft from property and "muggings".

Crimes can be committed at any time of the day and not just in the "early hours" or while people are at work; at



least one crime in Shop Road, Little Bromley, occurred early evening around 5.30 – 6.00pm. We are a small community and it's important that we all remain vigilant at all times and try and protect our neighbours as well as ourselves from becoming the victims of crime.

To report an incident, you can contact the police by dialling 101; in an emergency dial 999.

(Note an **emergency** situation is where there is a crime or serious incident in progress, a serious risk of injury or a serious risk of damage to property). If you are interested in improving the security of your property, then contact the police and ask to speak to the local crime prevention officer. Insurance companies often give free advice on how to improve security, particularly on their websites. Simple things will help to deter criminals such as leaving lights and a radio "on" when you leave the house and ensure all windows and doors are locked.

Little Bromley Parish Council will be discussing with the local police to understand what can be done to stop crime in the parish and what advice is available to parishioners.



If you live in the parish of Little Bromley and you have suffered the misery of having your house or garden flooded in recent years, then the Parish Council would like to hear from you!

The Parish Council is aware that some houses and gardens in the parish are affected by flooding but is not sure exactly which ones they are or how often they have been flooded.

The Parish Council wishes to collect data that will help it have meaningful dialogue with Essex County Council (who is responsible for drainage in the parish) and landowners to improve the situation in the village. All data collected will be kept confidential.

FLOODING IN LITTLE BROMLEY

We are grateful to those landowners who have recently cleared some ditches in the parish and this has improved the flow of water and so reduced the risk of flooding in some parts of the parish, but there maybe more we can do.

We are aware that some people may not wish to divulge sensitive data about their property, so we are asking people to answer as many of the questions below as they are prepared to (or able to) but hope that the minimum data provided will be, the road they live in and details of the flooding.

Researching the Past

My hobby is a mix of great fun and frustration. For the past few years I have been trying to carry out my researches on all things Great and Little Bromley from as far away as I could get - New Zealand! This has meant, on my almost annual summer visits back to England, a frantic chase around to meet with people to hear their story or see their photos. Enforced cancellations at times resulted in disappointment and a long wait for another chance to meet. It has been frustrating wanting to look something up in a book or document located in the wrong country. This is all about to change as I am moving back to these shores, looking forward to being 'on the ground' later in the year and able to move my research up a notch. Last year I shared with you my disappointment when John Appleby revealed he had disposed of this post card collection, thought to have been dispersed forever. It turns out that John had not done so. After his death, his son Roger sorted the belongings of his Great Horkesley home and found what looks like almost the whole collection together with other artifacts from our Bromlevs. Roger and his brothers very kindly gave me first refusal on these and I have purchased them for safe keeping.

This means the long awaited Little Bromley postcards book can at last be progressed! It is a shame that John didn't write down his insights into each of them; the wording becomes a job for me. I will be trying to track down further photos and information to go with all the images, so some of you can expect a call... I would also greatly welcome contact from anyone who has old cards which I may not have seen and that they can let me copy.

Online research

The online tools available for family and village history are getting better all the time. The 1911 Census has been available for a year now, being the first that was recorded in the house-holders' own handwriting (rather than being written by the census taker). I have been poking around in it, and smile at the addresses listed: "Next to Post Office", "Near New House" to make the detective work somewhat interesting. There are several houses listed in "Great Heath" - do we presume they had a fire, to make it Burnt Heath? That's something to look into unless someone already knows the answer

It is frustrating to think that we need to wait 8 more years until the 1921 census is publicly released, and there will be a very long wait after that for the next – the 1931 census was entirely destroyed by an accidental fire during the war, and a 1941 census couldn't of course occur.

Two for the price of one this month (or a BOGOF). In December we celebrated as a group by enjoying a Christmas meal at one of the local pubs in the village. After a very enjoyable meal we were treated to a very interesting talk from Lesley, a relative of one of our members. Leslev is a trained psychiatric nurse and is now working for the army in Colchester helping and counselling soldiers who have returned from active service. This is a very challenging job but Lesley is very committed and enjoys her work very much. None of us was really aware what this entailed and were very surprised at what might trigger a soldier to drop to the ground when he might hear a loud bang (for example a car back firing can trigger untold memories). Instead of sending Christmas cards to each other we collected the money and donated it to 'Help the Heroes' via Lesley.

January saw a very different talk from Chris & Christine of "Hedgehog Haven" who are both retired police officers from the "Met". They started the charity in 2007 and are very donation reliant. They explained that any hedgehog that was found wandering in daylight needed help and this was where they came in. They are based in Frinton but also have a lady in Colchester and they all work together.

Any injured or sick hedgehog is wintered at their centre until April and then released back into the wild in a safe environment, always a male and female together in the hope they will reproduce. Their natural habitat is hedgerows, but their main

problem is that they will eat anything, including slug pellets which will kill. One amazing fact is that hedgehogs can climb so when they fall their spines act as a cushion and protect them (they have 5,000 spines). It is very rare for them to have fleas, but if there is the odd one they only live on a hedgehog as they are not transferable; if fleas manage to lay eggs on an open wound they will lay eggs which turn to maggots and need urgent treatment. They can also have tics which need treatment.

The main threat to hedgehogs are humans and the motor car, the only natural predator is the badger no others exist. Also black bin bags can be a nuisance as hedgehogs think they are a warm place to sleep and also to find food, so when putting bags out please make sure the tops are tied and hedgehog unable to gain entry, otherwise they will go to sleep and the find themselves thrown on the rubbish cart. The costs per year are very high eg Feed, £2,000-£2,200, Medication £2.000. Cleaning Materials £300-£400 pa. Hedgehog Haven has a very sympathetic vet for consultation, but they do need to charge for medication so all donations are gratefully received at all times.

This was a very enlightening talk and extremely interesting, at the end Chris read a poem about the Hedgehog from one of Pam Ayers books - brilliant !!

A PLEA

This is a plea to all cat owners in Little Bromley. There appear to be a number of non-neutered cats in the village which regularly produce litters in and around many of our gardens. Currently, I am feeding four one-year-olds who live in my patch, and came across a tiny, feral kitten only yesterday.

The cat rescue establishments are full to overflowing and are unable to take any more strays.

Catching ferals is tricky and not without risk as they are frightened and extremely fierce! Assuming they are caught, they then need to be neutered and have to be returned to the wild since no homes can be found. It goes without saying that they do not do well in this situation, especially as the weather worsens. Obviously, if allowed to roam unchecked, they will produce endless litters of their own. I no longer work so have to meet the cost of feeding my garden ferals from my pension; the alternative is seeing them starve, or have them euthanized. In other words, those of us who care for our own pets are forced to take responsibility for the lack of care by others.

Please, if you know your cat is not neutered and you are not a dedicated breeder, have them sorted as soon as possible (they breed all year round!). Help with the cost is available if you claim benefits; or the Cats Protection (cp@cats.org.uk) run an assisted neutering scheme where vouchers can be obtained for free neutering of a feral. Alternatively, please contact Colchester Cat Rescue for more information.

TAILS FROM PRIMROSE FARM

Happy New Year from Primrose Farm. Well, it has rained and rained and rained, the water table is as high as it has ever been. The wildlife pond level that was very low last year is just a foot below ground level. We had several areas of flooding which is only now seeping down into the water table.

The kestrel is always seen hunting at the moment and sat perched on the edge of the barn just watching, waiting eagerly to pounce. There is barn owl activity again in and out of the barn owl boxes on the edge of Longcover Wood.

The pigs are enjoying the mild weather and are happy in the mud, although getting around the farm is difficult.

Looking at other farm shops in the area we are arranging to have Tony's fresh fish stall come on a regular basis with local caught fish. Tony fishes out of St Osyth and his wife Kerry sells at local farmers' markets.

I thought I would share a recipe that I found in the Ladies in Pigs recipe book. Ladies in Pigs are an organisation that was set up by pig farmers' wives to support the pig industry to support British Pork.

Saucy Apricot Pork

1lb (450g) British Pork tenderloin or pork steaks. 1tbsp flour

Pepper 2 tbsp (30ml) oil, 1 medium onion, chopped 40z (100g) streaky bacon chopped 2tbsp (30ml) brandy optional 411g can of apricots in fruit juice, chopped or pureed ¼ pt (150ml) double cream or crème fraiche

Chopped parsley.

1 Slice pork cutting diagonally across the grain.Season flour with pepper and lightly coat the pork with it.

2 Heat oil in a large frying pan and soften onion and bacon for about 3 minutes.3 Add pork and cook for approx. 5

minutes. Remove from the pan and keep warm, covered with foil in dish

4 To make sauce : add brandy and stir juices to reduce slightly. Add apricots and reduce liquid by half until slightly syrupy. Add cream or cream fraiche and heat through.

5 Add sauce to pork dish and serve garnished with parsley.

6 Serving suggestion : serve with rice or pasta.

THE DOCTORS' SURGERY NEWS

Gt Bentley Surgery

Well, everyone here survived Christmas and we are all now looking forward to longer daylight hours. I have to admit that walking the dogs is no fun during the week at the moment – always in the dark, not to mention the ever-present mud. The dogs don't seem to mind, but for me lighter mornings and evenings can't come soon enough.

Apologies to anyone who found getting their prescriptions around Christmas time a bit slow. For some reason it was frantically busy, and whilst we are now getting used to the new computer system, it still slowed us down. Maybe we will get better at it when we have a bit more experience of it.

On the subject of prescriptions, please may I remind everyone that we don't take prescription requests over the telephone. This is for two very good reasons, both of them basically to do with patient safety.

Firstly, when we did deal with things over the 'phone we used to get far too many wrong items issued. This was very wasteful, as once medication has left a pharmacy it can't be recycled if it is returned unwanted; it has to be destroyed. It was also potentially unsafe if patients didn't spot that they had received the wrong medication, as well as being very frustrating for the victims of errors who could end up without a supply of their regular medication for a day or two whilst things were put right.

Secondly, we simply can't cope with the number of calls involved. We do prescriptions for some 16,000 items per month these days and you can probably imagine the time that would be taken up dealing with telephone requests for even a small proportion of that number. We would be overwhelmed and sick people, perhaps needing rapid attention, would have problems getting through on the 'phone.

We do offer a number of other ways of putting in prescription requests, so please do use them.

- By e-mail to <u>holliesprescriptions@nhs.net</u>
- By fax to 01206 252496
- By post or delivery to the surgery
- Via the "Patient Access" system, which you can sign up for at the surgery then log into through the <u>www.patient.co.uk</u> website. (You can also make appointments via that site.)
- If you live in Little Clacton, there is a collection box in the Post Office on The Street.

If you are on the Repeat Dispensing scheme, you can get your next month's supply of medication simply by letting your pharmacy know when you want it – there is no need to contact the surgery unless a new batch of prescriptions is required or we have asked you to come for review.

We are nearly at the end of the flu jab season now and this year have given a record number. If you qualify for one, it's not too late to have it done as there is a bit of stock still available. Please ring to book an appointment soon though, because once the spare jabs have gone, that will be it for this winter.

The other vaccination which is well worth considering if you are aged 65 or over, or if you qualify for a free flu jab, is against pneumonia. We are about to start writing to people who really should have the jab, offering the chance to come in for one. Don't forget that pneumonia doesn't only strike during winter, and it can be a killer. For most people the jab is a "one off", no booster being required, which is always good news. If you know that you are entitled to the vaccination there is no need to wait for your invitation. Either ring and request an appointment, or ask about it next time you are in the surgery.

Finally for this month, if you have been rying to make 2013 the year in which you stop smoking but are finding it hard going, don't forget that we can help. We have a specially trained Smoking Cessation Adviser who works at the surgery each week, and she can organise access to the many really effective aids that there now are to help you quit. For many people, these can come free. Do give us a call if this is to be your year for kicking the habit. We can help you be healthier and wealthier – as well as stopping you smelling like an old ash-tray.

Ardleigh Surgery

This has obviously placed pressure on the surgery and the availability of appointments with the other partners and affecting continuity of care. We apologise that patients may have had problems in particular booking ahead to see the doctor of their choice. We had to run with a much higher level of 'same day' appointments. Fortunately we found some GP Locums to cover some of Dr Bettle's surgery sessions.

The disruption in the surgery had been compounded by the practice migrating to a new clinical computer system but with the support of the staff we have made good progress in implementing the new system. It is a much improved system in particular enabling clinicians to have a much more comprehensive view of the patient medical history on the screen. However, owing to the way it is designed, some areas such as appointment booking and dispensing are taking staff longer to do.

We are sorry to advise that Practice Nurse Jo Gordon left on the 4 January to take up a new job with the MOD in the Garrison. Jo has enjoyed working at the surgery but has left for family reasons.

We have decided not to replace her. Nurse Practitioner Joy Harrison, will be working extra hours assisted by Health Care Assistant Jan Burgess who can undertake a wide range of 'practice nursing tasks'. Jan is in her final year in her studies with the Open University to qualify as a Practitioner in Primary Care.

We are planning to recruit a new Phlebotomist to take blood samples, thereby, allowing Jan Burgess more time to extend her role in the practice.

Moves taken to encourage safer parking

NH5 North Essex MOVES are being taken to improve the safety of people parking at and visiting health

facilities in Colchester and Harwich.

From January 7, parking fines will be issued to people parking inappropriately in the car parks at the Colchester Primary Care Centre in Turner Road, Colchester and the Fryatt Hospital and Mayflower Medical Centre, Harwich. Inappropriate parking includes parking in a disabled bay without a blue badge, on a double yellow line, on hatched lines or on the grass.

Jane Mower, Estates Operations Manager for NHS North Essex, said: "We have experienced problems at both sites with inappropriate parking causing a risk to pedestrians which have resulted in several near misses. At Fryatt Hospital we have received a letter from Harwich Town Council requesting something to be done due to cars obscuring the pedestrian crossing. "As a result we are instigating fines. These will be £10 if paid within 10 days, increasing to £25 after 10 days. The security teams at both sites will be managing the parking to ensure a safe environment for our patients, visitors and staff."

Public invited to attend NHS board meeting DIABETES care and the reorganisation of the local cancer network are just two of the subjects to be discussed at the board meeting of North East Essex Clinical Commissioning Group (NEECCG) on Tuesday (January 15).

The meeting will be held in the Colchester Primary Care Centre in Turner Road, Colchester starting at 2pm and members of the public are welcome to attend. There is a 15minute session at the start of the meeting when the public can ask questions of the board.

The clinical commissioning group is preparing to take over the running of the local NHS from the primary care trust in April and NEECCG Chairman, Dr Gary Sweeney, is keen for the public to play a greater role in the new organisation.

Times gradually changed and in 1966 (street lighting reached Ardleigh!) we were the first Parish in the Diocese to welcome the Roman Catholic congregation to worship in the Parish Church. Over the years, there was a gradual reduction in the number of services. In 1962, I would never have believed that I

would get a Sunday 'lie-in' let alone the occasional Sunday 'off-duty' as is the case now.

I have been extremely fortunate in having happy working relationships with all Vicars appointed, starting with Francis Butcher followed by Charles Goulding, Reg Doncaster, Trevor Diaper, Nicolas Spicer and, more recently, Robert Farrell. All have been extremely encouraging to me in my role as organist, and have always been supportive of the musical events I have

THE RECTORY, GREAT BROMLEY

Dear Friends,

Our Christmas celebrations now seem a long way behind us and we are about to turn our minds to Lent and Easter. Nevertheless before we move on, the Christmas and Epiphany season reaches its natural climax on February 2nd – the feast of Candlemas. On this day Mary and Joseph are doing merely what is required of them, the ritual presentation of their firstborn male child. Jesus. to God. and the sacrifice that accompanies it. The law of God, given by Moses to the Jews, ordained that a woman, after childbirth, should continue for a certain time in a state which that law calls unclean: during which she was not to appear in public, nor presume to touch anything consecrated to God. The term was of forty days upon the birth of a son, and the time was double for a daughter; on the expiration of which, the mother was to bring to the door of the tabernacle, or temple, a lamb of a year old, and a young pigeon or turtle-dove. A young pigeon or turtle-dove, by way of sin offering, was required of all, whether rich or poor. but nothing more than two pigeons or two turtle-doves was required from the poor. one for a burnt offering and the other for a sin offering.

Since Our Lord was conceived by the Holy Spirit and his blessed Mother remained a spotless virgin in reality she was under no obligation to the law. She was however within the letter of the law, in the eyes of the world, who were as yet strangers to this miraculous birth.

On this occasion old Simeon is guided to a meeting with them, and taking Jesus in his arms is moved to say, "My eyes have seen your salvation". This is important for us all because it means that from now on we know what salvation looks like. It takes on the face and body of a human being – Jesus.

For us this is an affirmation and a proclamation that God has come to live

among us in human form, to live as we live, to experience life with us in all its wonder and sorrow, and lead us to a new appreciation of what it means to be truly human.

All this has a direct impact and relevance to living our lives in our world today. What it means is becoming more and more of a challenge. It leads us to ask questions of ourselves. Does being human mean that we have to go to war to settle our differences? Does it mean we cannot solve our problems, only make more of them? Does it mean that fear, injustice and cruelty are products of our humanity regardless of what we do?

When we say "yes" to Jesus it has to mean we are saying no to the things that enslave us. Then we have to start living like it.

Living like it means several things. First of all it means a refusal, which is being ready to say no to the things our world tells us we have to put up with.

It also demands from us our best efforts. Each one of us has an opportunity to reoffer our lives to God as well as the task of discerning what God asks us to do with that life.

There are several things we can do in celebration of this feast of Candlemas and in the year ahead. First of all there is a need for all Christians to live a prayer centred life attempting to discern in that the things God wants us to do with the gifts and talents we have been given.

Secondly in prayer we develop our relationship with Our Lord.

Thirdly as we grow deeper in our relationship with Our Lord we begin to share his concern for others and for justice in our world where there is so much to do to build up his Kingdom on earth as it is in heaven. With love from Fr.Robert ST. GEORGE THE MARTYR, GREAT BROMLEY
