KITCHEN CORNER

Apple Pie

Try using filo pastry for fruit pie which is crisp and light and makes a change. Use a deep dish such as a soufflé one. Melt butter in a small pan and brush the dish. Then lay out each sheet of filo and brush over with butter before using to line the dish. Lay the sheets so they overlap the edges working round to cover evenly. Fill the dish with prepared apples or pears sprinkling with sugar as you go. Then add any spices or other flavouring to taste before folding in all the overlapping ends of the pastry. Give a final brushing with the butter and bake in a fairly hot oven till



cooked through. Protect with foil if it gets too brown on top. It is good hot or cold with custard or cream.

At our August meeting we had a somewhat heavy agenda with numerous different items for discussion. I hope by now you have seen the poppies and the flagpole by the war memorial, to mark the centenary of World War One - all Councillors agreed it really does look fantastic and is a most fitting tribute to this most important occasion. The Chairman of the Parish Council has written a separate piece elsewhere in the Messenger giving thanks to those members of the village and beyond who donated both their time and resources free of charge in support of the project.

At the meeting a further discussion was held regarding the possibility of play equipment being installed in Church Meadow. Villagers may be aware that there is a fund available at TDC which developers are obliged to contribute to when building. This fund currently stands in excess of £19,000 and must be spent within a set period of time before it expires and is then returned to the developers. It is also correct to say that there are some restrictions in terms of how the funds can be spent. Feedback on the proposals has thus far been mixed - but the Parish Council wish to hear opinions from everybody hence the flyer enclosed with this month's Messenger. Do you feel that the play equipment should not be installed at Church Meadow? Or perhaps is this something that your family or your extended family members could take advantage of? Even if your position is neutral, the Parish Council would like to hear from you.

Two further pieces of good news - the Parish Council have received formal notification that the bus service in Great Bromley shall remain unaffected following the recent consultation. In addition, the **mobile library** (which was previously under threat) will be attending the village as follows:

November 5th, 9th, December 2nd, 16th, January 14th, 28th Church Meadow, -10.55-11.30 Hamilton Lodge -11.35-11.50

Chase Road West - 12.00-12.25

I also have a copy of when the mobile library will be attending the surrounding villages, if you would like a copy, do contact me.

There has been mention of TDC having banned the use of Chinese lanterns on areas of their land. Great Bromley Parish Council have voted to follow suit and with immediate effect the use of Chinese lanterns are banned on all Parish Council Land - for the avoidance of any doubt this is Church Meadow, Hare Green Recreation Ground, the Village Hall and the surrounding land most commonly used by the Cricket Club.

By the time you read this you may have noticed that some of the public footpaths have been cleared around the village. The footpath warden has set up a working party in order to do this and matters such as damaged finger posts have been reported to Highways.

I also brought to the Parish Council's attention the sudden appearance of blue graffiti on road signs in the village. There appears to be no other explanation for this apart from vandalism - so this will be reported to the Police along with Highways for remedial action.

I have received notification from ECC with regards a number of forthcoming road closures in the village. This information has been added to the Parish website and space permitting, this will be added to the noticeboards. (See page 8)

Lastly we have been contacted by the Laterlife Challenge seeking entries from the over 60s - further details on page 8.

LITTLE BROMLEY CONNECTIONS

On Saturday 2nd August there was a fine gathering to commemorate the start of the First World War at the Little Bromley War Memorial, a congenial occasion no doubt covered elsewhere in this magazine. We had some very welcome visitors, Audrey and David Sharman, from Thorndon in Suffolk.

Audrey is the niece of William James Forsdyke who is on our memorial. She brought a picture of her Uncle Willie, whose story we shall cover 3 years hence, and a fascinating collection of old postcards which she has kindly lent us for reproduction.

Audrey & David's visit generated great interest. It is lovely that, although Audrey was born and bred in Suffolk, she maintains the connection to the Essex village where her father Charles was born (at Jennings Farm). We hope to welcome them back again soon, perhaps at the Harvest Festival. Leonie and I find it most gratifying that their attendance was due to their being regular readers of the *Messenger* magazine online and the events calendar on **LittleBromley.org.uk**.

At the Little Bromley Folk Day last week the variable weather thwarted a visit from an Australian visitor, Trevar Chilver, whose great-great-grandfather Philip Henry Chilver was baptised at Little Bromley in the 1830s, before departing with his brother William to Australia in 1854 to look for gold. The Chilver family also feel a strong affinity for Little Bromley despite the great distance and time that has passed. (More about them another time.)

With the recent turn up of further postcards there may at last be sufficient material to make a start on **The Little Bromley Postcard Book**, a project that John Appleby had planned but sadly never started. IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE IN SEPTEMBER



Autumn, according to Keats, is the season of mists, and mellow fruitfulness. As I am writing in 26 degrees C and bright sun it seems very unlikely that this will

be the case in three weeks' time, but I suspect that is a triumph of optimism over experience! Already the days are getting shorter and the lights are being turned on earlier in the evening as we slide towards the equinox. This all sounds depressing, but the autumn is a very "fat" season, when gardeners can reap the benefits of all their hard work.

My apple, pear and damson trees are loaded with fruit, and should provide a bumper harvest. I suspect everyone who has these trees is in a similar situation, and we will all have apples and pears coming out of our ears! I need to organise safe storage for the apples: the last two years, mice have enthusiastically chomped their way through a large proportion of my apples stored in the shed. My husband has a cunning plan to do with small panes of glass and bricks to prevent the mice climbing up the leas of the storage racks. However, as mice appear to be very clever (as anyone who has read "Hitch-Hiker's Guide to the Galaxy" will know), I suspect they are already devising cunning plans involving ropes and catapults!

The recent prolonged dry weather has made some of the garden vegetable crops quite poor- the runner beans have been fairly sparse, and the carrots have more or less disappeared. The cabbage white butterflies have wormed their way under the netting and have, as usual decimated the brassicas. It has been too hot to sow lettuce, and the chard and spinach has bolted, but, on the upside, the tomatoes, chillies, indoor cucumbers and aubergines are magnificent. Flowers have had an unusual year too. Many normal border flowers have found the going tough, but the roses have been spectacular, and with deadheading, many other previously fairly short lived border plants have just kept going. I do seem to be spending a huge amount of time watering tubs though, but it is worth it as they too have been spectacular, uncrushed by the rain.

Obviously, jobs in September concentrate on harvesting. Blackberries are very prolific this year, and very sweet (I picked my first ones yesterday), and make wonderful puddings and jams, but it always amazes me, that when I go picking, how few others are doing the same. I can't remember when I last saw a child picking blackberries.

Other jobs for the garden include the usual deadheading and cutting back. Lawns can do with some attention, and spiking, feeding and top dressing may help rejuvenate a tired and neglected lawn. Hedges need to be clipped before the middle of the month if not already done. Daffodils and other spring bulbs can be planted, but it is better to leave planting tulips for a couple of months to prevent the development of "Tulip fire". Tender plants probably need to be moved under cover, the nights may start to get chilly. Enjoy your bounty!

Influenza vaccinations

It is influenza clinic time again !

The Department of Health recommends patients should have vaccination against influenza if they are aged over 65 or any patient irrespective of age if they are at particular risk if they have one of the following medical conditions; heart disease, diabetes, respiratory disease including asthma, renal disease or who are immunocompromised and pregnant women.

All children aged between two and four are also invited to be vaccinated to lower the transmission of influenza in the community from children. (Born between 2 September 2009 and 1 September 2012)

The good news is that we are able give the children an oral vaccine and not an injection and those children under 17 with an at risk medical condition will also be offered the oral vaccine. Please contact the surgery to make an appointment with a practice nurse after the 1 October if you have children that are eligible,

Flu clinics will be held on Tuesday or Friday afternoons weekly at Ardleigh Surgery starting on the 3 October and ending on the 7 November. Clinics will also be held at the Dedham Branch Surgery.

Please telephone the surgery to book into one of those clinics. We encourage patients to attend these clinics rather than use valuable normal appointment slots unless you are attending the doctor or nurse for some other reason.

Additional GP

As patients are aware from reports in the media, general practice is under increasing pressure as a result of decrease in funding by the DoH and increasing workload caused by an aging population and generally patients having higher expectations. There are significant increases in long term medical conditions such as diabetes and dementia. The share of total NHS funding spent on general practice has fallen from 11% to 8% since 2008 despite over 90% of all contacts with the NHS are with general practice. The average number of times patients attend their GP has also increased from 3 to 6 times in the last decade. There is. therefore, a recruitment and retention 'crisis' within general practice with a shortage of doctors applying for GP vacancies which is affecting access to primary care.

In response to this situation and to improve patient access for appointments, I am pleased to inform patients that the practice has decided to employ Dr Rob Lenart from the 3 September for two and a half days per week – Wednesday afternoon to Friday. Dr Lenart has been employed as a regular locum covering Dr Owens' surgery session on a Wednesday morning. Dr Owens has resigned as the GP Training Programme Director in Colchester and will resume her Wednesday morning surgery. The cost of employing Dr Lenart will be met by the practice and not directly by the NHS.

GP Trainees

Two new GP Trainees started with the practice in August. Dr Ajula Gunasekera and Dr Aman Bhatia (female) both have previous training experience in general practice.

However if you DO have access to the internet I would encourage you to try 'Patient Access' to order your prescriptions. Registering also allows you to book appointments online and see some of your medical records. There is even an app that allows you to do all this from your smartphone!

I'm very confident that using either or both of these will reduce the time taken for your prescription to be at your pharmacy significantly and if you use both, will remove the potential for human error too. I realise not everyone will be happy to order prescriptions online, but <u>everyone</u> can benefit from using EPS. Why not try it out? You've nothing to lose and it's all 100% free! Tick one or both boxes below and return the form below to the surgery to do just that.

TAILS FROM PRIMROSE FARM

Well, harvest is well and truly on its way. How quick the combines went, baling and stacking in the soaring heat. Our straw for the pigs has been carted and all lined up ready for the bedding for the huts. The farmers markets at Primrose farm on the second Saturday have had a variety of stalls each time. The organisation of the open day is getting busy with negotiations with chefs to provide demonstrations and the ever popular 'make a sausage'. A promise of large agricultural machinery looks like a really good day.

Out on the farm the heat is affecting the trees with the leaves already turning early. The rotation of the land happens at this time of year after the cutting of the fallow to allow the huts and pigs to move to new ground.

We have a resident Tawny Owl who flies low around the trees and then, when spotted, sits on a branch just watching and staring. The buzzards seem to be circling a great deal but instead of being high on the thermals seem to be flying much lower.

Tawny Owl - Strix Aluco

This is the most common owl in Britain -



also known as the brown owl. This is the owl you hear hooting at night in the trees and is most likely the one you will see passing in front of you when driving in your car. The hooting you hear at night is a call, which determines

each bird's territory. They are so territorial that sometimes they will even fight with and kill other intruding owls.

Females are again bigger than males. Colours are very similar although tawny owls come in a varied range of colours from almost grey through to almost white. The most common colour to be seen is a mottled brown.

Tawny owls, like barn owls, prey upon mice and voles but also garden birds up to the size of black birds and thrush.

Eyesight is what this owl mainly uses at

night to spot its quarry. Its large eyes take in lots of light for good night vision.

The shop is remaining busy with the BBQ meats proving a great success; we have lots of new marinades and sauces that we are spicing up pork, chicken and lamb with.

Fruity Pork Kebabs

Makes 6 kebabs Cooking time About 15 minutes 225g (8oz) Lean pork leg or loin steaks, cut into small cubes 12 Rashers unsmoked sweet cured streaky bacon 1 Peach or nectarine, stone removed and cut into 6 wedges 1 Banana, peeled and cut into 6 chunks Chilli BBQ Sauce15mlsp (1tbsp) Oil 1 Onion, peeled and roughly chopped 1 Apple, peeled, cored and chopped 1 Red chilli, deseeded and chopped 3x15mlsp (3tbsp) Tomato ketchup 15mlsp (1tbsp) Brown sauce

300ml /½pt Pineapple juice

Take each piece of fruit and wrap a bacon rasher around it. Then, using metal skewers, thread each of the pieces of fruit plus 2 cubes of meat onto each skewer. Brush with oil.

Meanwhile, heat the BBQ. Make sure the coals are hot and 'grey' before you start cooking.

Alternatively, if it starts to rain, pre-heat the grill! Cook for about 15 minutes until browned and meat cooked through. If the outside of the meat starts to catch, cover with foil and adjust the grid height to move away from the heat to slow down the cooking.

Make Chilli BBQ Sauce: Heat oil in a small pan. Add the onion, apple and chilli and cook until softened. Add the remaining ingredients, bring to the boil and simmer for about 10 minutes to reduce slightly. Serve kebabs with the BBQ sauce and lots of fruity coleslaw.

CHILDREN'S CORNER - CHOOSING 'IT'

Rhymes to choose who will be "it" at the start of a game.

One player flips a coin into the air. While it is in the air another player calls out "heads" or "tails". If the coin lands with the picture of the monarch face up that is "heads". If it lands with the opposite side facing up it is "tails". This works well for 2 players - for a larger group break off into groups of two and the winners face off against each other. Variation: Sometimes players will do "best 2 out of 3" ... or "best 4 out of 5". If you don't have a coin you can use any small flat object such as a button, washer or bottle cap. Just be sure to agree beforehand which side is heads and which side will be tails.

Rock, Paper, Scissors

Players make two fists and hit them on top of each other twice ... then the third time they make a symbol with their hand. The three symbols you can make are Rock, Paper and Scissors.

Rock - Hand is kept in a fist. Paper - Hand is flattened out. Scissors - Hand is held with two fingers out. The winner is determined as follows: Rock - beats Scissors Paper - beats (covers) Rock Scissors - beats Paper If players choose the same item it is a draw.

Sky Blue (Quick and easy!) One, two, sky blue, all out except you.

"It" rhymes

These rhymes are used for larger groups. Children stand in a circle and each put a fist into the centre. One person starts on each syllable using their fist to tap the top of each child's fist. The last one they hit either is "it" or is removed from the circle depending on the rhyme.

Engine, Engine

Engine, engine, number nine going down the county line. If the train falls off the track,

do you want your money back?

(Person whose fist is tapped on the syllable "back" chooses either yes or no - then that word is spelled out, one letter per fist) If yes: Y - E - S spells yes and you shall have your money back.

If no: N - O spells no and you don't get your money back.

One Potato, Two Potato

One potato, two potato, three potato, four. Five potato, six potato, seven potato, more. Player who had their fist tapped on "more" would remove themselves from the circle and the rhyme would begin again - the player who was left from the group would be it.

Eenie, meenie, minie moe

Eenie, meenie, minie, moe Catch a tiger by the toe, If he hollers, let him go, Eenie meenie, minie, moe.

(The one being touched on the last 'mo' is out. Continue until the last one is in who is 'it'!)

Ick - a, Bick - a

Ick-a Bick-a soda crack-a Ick-a, Bick-a boo, Ick-a, Bick-a soda crack-a Out goes you.

Inka Binka Bottle of Ink

Inka Binka bottle of ink, the cork fell out and you stink, not because you're dirty, not because you're clean, but because you kissed a (boy or girl) behind a magazine ... and you are now it.

Bubble Gum, Bubble Gum

Bubble gum, bubble gum in a dish, How many pieces do you wish? (The player whose fist is tapped on the syllable "wish" picks a number and then the tapping of fists continues the amount of that number.) Then ...

My mother told me to pick the very best one and you are not it.

CHURCH JOTTINGS

To wear or not to wear a hat! This was the dilemma which came to me during the wee small hours!

My husband and I had been invited to St Paul's Cathedral to represent Tendring District Council for the Ordination and Consecration of the Rev Roger Morris to be the Bishop of Colchester I needn't have worried because most did not wear hats, only a few, (and, of course, Justin the Archbishop of Canterbury). It was a most memorable and very interesting day from the time we caught the 8.20am train from Manningtree to the return journey from Liverpool Street at 3.30pm

Fred and I had to be in our seats at St Paul's Cathedral (south aisle under the dome) by 10.45am. I had quite forgotten how magnificent and vast the Cathedral is. We all sat in a round, family, friends, Bishops, Clergy and invited guests.

As the great procession began, indicating the beginnings of the Eucharist Service, we instantly recognised Archdeacon Annette, the Dean and Bishop Stephen of Chelmsford Cathedral, Christopher, who is the retiring Bishop of Colchester, and Jenny Tomlinson who helped with our Trio Project.

"Praise to the Lord the Almighty the King of Creation", was sung as the Archbishop of Canterbury's procession left the West End of the Cathedral. There were three "Bishops Designate", David to be the Bishop of Grimsby, Peter to be the Bishop of Barking and Roger to be Bishop of Colchester. After their presentation the Ordinates were required to make their Declaration of Assent to the Archbishop of Canterbury.

The New Testament Reading was read by the Rev.Hosam Naoum, Dean of St. George's Cathedral in Jerusalem. Then followed the Gospel from St Matthew and the sermon given by the Rev. Canon Alison White Priest in Charge, Riding Mill, Newcastle-Upon-Tyne. moving. Firstly, the soon to become Bishops making their vows and promises to the Archbishop and then to the rest of the congregation turning finally to be encircled by the College of Bishops resplendent in bright red robes.

Each newly ordained Bishop was given a Bible before being anointed and given their episcopal ring. Roger's ring was a gift from his wife Sally and was designed by Diana Porter in her Bristol workshop, made of white gold and with a single amethyst. Roger's pectoral cross was a gift from the Diocese of Worcester and is based on a 7th Century Trumpington Cross.

All communicant members of Christian Churches were then invited to receive communion. We were instructed to sit and follow the directions of the Vergers and Wandsmen. I wondered how long it would take but, such was the very efficient organisation and directions, it seemed in no time at all, before the congregation of 700 had received the sacrament and were being led back to their seats. Fred and I felt we were extremely fortunate when we were led to the queue waiting to receive the communion from Archbishop Justin himself!

During the Sending Out Prayer the newly Ordained Bishops were presented with their pastoral staffs. Roger's staff was a gift from the Diocese of Worcester and is based on the traditional rural wrought iron shepherd's crook.

"Keep watch over the whole flock in which the Holy Spirit has appointed you shepherd. Encourage the faithful, restore the lost, build up the Body of Christ"

The Service and The Blessings over, the procession made its way to the West End; the organ music "Toccata from Symphony No. 5" by Widor was absolutely breathtaking, the whole experience had been awesome and I felt privileged to have been invited to attend this momentous/historic service. It is one of those days that I shall always remember.
