IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE

I can't believe it's November already! The weather this autumn has been lovely on the whole, sunny days and cool nights. Many of my flowers are still looking lovely, and I really can't believe that we are starting to think of Christmas. My puppy is now seven months old, an unruly teenager, and he makes gardening very challenging. He dearly wants to be closely involved in everything, which is fine, if rather irritating, but we have had to draw a line when it comes to chainsaws! My husband has been sorting out the woodpile for the winter, and Ben is just a bit too helpful and had to be banished indoors! However, when it comes to pruning, Ben is only too pleased to preempt the chipper by chewing any stick left on the ground.

I have been busy refurnishing the hedgehog houses with hay after giving them a clean, and placing them in a quiet wild area of the garden. We do have resident hogs as was confirmed when we found one outside the backdoor a couple of weeks ago.

We had a minor disaster last week with an apple tree actually falling over! It had so much fruit, it was clearly unstable, but after picking some and pruning some branches back, we propped it back up again, and so far it seems to be fine.

The vegetable garden needs clearing now of all the summer and autumn crops as soon as there has been a frost. Old leaves and stems harbour all manner of slugs and snails, in addition, several of my pumpkin plants have mildew, so need to be burnt. I have had a good crop of pumpkins, and they are now "curing" in the shed. Still in the vegetable garden for the winter are the leeks, celery, chard, swedes and parsnips, with cabbage and kale recovering after a particularly savage slug attack.

Many of the flowering plants have seed pods on them, and on a dry day, it is worth collecting some of these seeds to be grown next year. They should be stored in paper and not plastic. Old envelopes are very useful for this, but do remember to label them. I am particularly bad at this, and in the spring often have several envelopes containing unknown seeds. It is quite good fun, however, sowing them and seeing what grows.

At this time of year it is worth checking climbing plants to ensure they are well supported before winter. Trees that need stakes will need to have the ties checked as they may be too tight (or may have fallen off). Fibrous rooted perennials can be divided now. Don't forget the plant sale next May; if anyone has plants surplus to requirements, pot them up for us please!

Greenhouses need cleaning to maximise the light, and need ventilating on sunny days. Watering should be reduced to a minimum, and dead vegetation removed.

Tulips can be planted now in pots or in the ground. Ponds need clearing and netting to prevent them filling with fallen leaves.

Another change to the evening was that our planned speaker was not able to be with us so at very short notice Shaun Day, of the Mayflower project in Harwich, stepped in to the breach very ably to enthral us with how the project had come about. A visit by the Endeavour to Harwich inspired the thought of "How about we replicate this?" by building a replica of the Mayflower to celebrate 400 years since the first one sailed from Harwich in 1620. Every one locally thought this to be an extremely mad idea except for the few who thought it would be a good idea. from little acorns large oak trees grow as the saving goes. Hence now, some years down the line, the building of the Mayflower has begun. It is estimated that the total build could be in excess of £2.5 million pounds.


To date some 547 young learners have gone through the system as apprentices, also through the Princes Trust young offenders have also been helped to rebuild their lives, to the extent that one young offender produced a film to advertise the project which has been taken on board to the end with the result that he is now employed in the film industry in London as they were very impressed with the finished project.

The project has taken over the old railway station which has now become the centre of the build, plus there is a visitor centre.

The steering group are spreading their net far and wide to America and, because of the descendants from the pilgrims who travelled on the original Mayflower, donations to the project are beginning to come from the other side of the pond.

Richard Branson has pledged his support for the project and of course this is providing a lot of kudos to the cause.

It is going to take 200 tonnes of English oak to re



It should also be noted that the captain of the original Mayflower, Christopher Jones, was from Harwich hence the first hospital was also named after him.

They would welcome your support and visit to see what is going on and if you have any free time they would welcome volunteers to show people around. A worthwhile cause to support and also to help the regeneration of the local area.

THE DOCTORS' SURGERY NEWS

Great Bentley Surgery



Flu season is well under way at the time of writing (12th October) and we've already vaccinated just over 1,350

patients in just 10 days! This is 38% of all those eligible and half way towards the Department of Health's target of 75%. I'm hoping that we'll have met this target by the time you read this, but just in case we haven't and you are eligible but not had your jab yet, please call to book your appointment!

Many patients also need their vaccine against pneumonia. This is a one off vaccine, so if you are eligible but have had this in the past, you are covered for life. Those who are eligible are the over 65s or who are aged between 2 and 65 with a long term health condition. If you think you may be eligible, please call us to find out.

There more annual vaccinations due than ever at this time of the year and as well as the above, we also vaccinate certain age groups against shingles. Patients who are aged 70 on 1st September 2015 or who are aged 78 on 1st September 2015 are eligible. If you are aged between 71 and 77 on 1st September 2015 (inclusive), you are NOT eligible and will have to wait to the year which you will become eligible I'm afraid. This is the way the NHS powers that be have decided to roll out this vaccination to the population and we have to therefore abide by these rules.

Finally the **Patient Participation Group** (**PPG**) is meeting for its **Annual General Meeting** on 19th November 2014 at 6.30pm in Great Bentley Village Hall. It's important that we have as many patients and members represented as possible, so if you can make it please make a note in your diary, that would be great! **Super Foods** are starting to appear more and more in the media. They are also starting to become easily available at most supermarkets. Below are a few that have excellent qualities that can easily be added into your weekly shopping with some advice on why they may be good to eat.

Eggs - Free range organic eggs are an excellent protein option. They contain amino acids and are also low in calories.

VILLAGE HALL TRUSTEES



The village hall trustees held a routine meeting on

22nd September at which it was decided to press ahead with a major refurbishment project at the hall, although the scope of the work would be dependent on a grant being awarded from the Essex County Council Community Initiatives Fund. The project, to be undertaken by local contractors in 2016, comprises the following six sub-projects: completion of the repair and redecoration of the hall exterior; partial redecoration of the hall



interior including the Millennium Lounge. both entrance lobbies. the rear corridor and parts of the main hall and committee room: sanding and sealing of the main hall floor: sanding and sealing of the small hall floor: renovation of the stage and replacement of all curtaining; and provision of replacement furniture

including tables and upholstered seats. The total cost of the work would be £18,000 of which it was proposed the village hall should contribute about £3,700. Our grant bid will be considered by the awards panel in November and we should know whether we have been successful by the end of the year.

CHARLES PIRIE 1940-2015

Charlie was born in September 1940 and for the first few years of his life we slept underground in the Anderson Shelter. There were 6 of us in the Shelter: Dad, Mum, Me (Bill), Charlie, Jean and later Andy. Because it was cramped, baby Andy slept in a drawer from a chest of drawers. For years our grandchildren were convinced that the drawer was pushed shut at night, but that wasn't the case!

After the war we all attended the primary school in Bromley and at the age of 11 we three boys went on to Elmbridge boarding school in Cranleigh, Surrey. Charlie was Chairman of the School's Young Farmers Club, and was selected to go to Olympia in London to take part in a Chicken Plucking and Trussing competition where he came in the top 3.

On leaving school he started work on the family farm which he did for all his working life. In addition to the farm he ran the village shop/Post Office and latterly became Postman. It was always my ambition to see him riding his bike delivering letters but he cheated and did it by car!

When Charlie married Barbara they went to London for their honeymoon where they appeared on Sunday night at the Palladium and won a great big telly. Charlie became a father to Kevin and they remained very close. Then Ian and Julie were born but sadly the marriage did not last. I recall in 1987 getting a phone call from Charlie asking would I write a letter to the High Commissioner in the Philippines. I asked "Why? Have you been stopped for speeding?" he said "No, I am getting married and he wants proof that I really exist!" A short time later he came back to England having married Gee. I recall him saying "I can't believe I've been so lucky!" They had 2 children, Cap and Jimmy, resulting in 5 children and 7 grandchildren and a great grandson. He was extremely proud of all of them.



Charlie certainly had his moments in life! Like the time he was with Derek trying to catch eels in the brook. They were not very successful and in the end Charlie was more concerned that his fags had fallen out of his pocket and were floating down the stream. He would have gone after them but he had his best suit on and wellies. On another occasion he was out shooting rabbits; Julie was driving the Landover and Charlie was in the back. He was telling Julie to go faster and when he spotted a fox shouted at her to quickly go right. She did as she was told and Charlie fell out the back!

Charlie took an active part in Village life. He particularly looked forward to the pantomime where he usually seemed to play the back end of an animal. He fondly recalled the time when he and Gerry (Nick) Nicholls played the two policemen. He also loved the spin off from the pantomime where a group would go round and entertain at Old People's homes. Charles was a supporter of the Cheshire Home and would regularly go to cook a Sunday Roast Dinner for the patients, leaving the cooking at times to help someone out and then returning to finish off the meal.

As a Parish and District Councillor he received an invitation to the Queen's garden party at Buckingham Palace. The format is to eat your cucumber sandwiches and then stand in line while members of the Royal Family walk down the line and you may get spoken to. Charlie was different - he took a plateful of food to sit by the lake and watch the Flamingos. While sitting there he was approached by a gentlemen who asked for his autograph. Charlie replied "Well yes - but who do you think I am?" The man replied "Paul Daniels!" – as if by magic the man disappeared!

On retirement from the farm they moved to Bradfield. The last few years have not been kind to Charlie regarding his health. While he was in hospital he would not respond to Dad and only his family nickname Fossil would make him open his eyes. Charlie was very much his own man and he could be very stubborn and it was that stubbornness that kept him going during his illness. He is now at peace so sleep well Bro.

New single Patient Transport Service for people in Colchester and Tendring

North East Essex Clinical Commissioning Group

The NHS North East Essex Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) has today announced that the East of England Ambulance Service NHS Trust has been awarded one of the region's largest Non-Emergency Patient Transport Services (NEPTS) contracts. Commissioned in partnership with Colchester Hospital University Foundation Trust (CHUFT), the new service sees 18 transport contracts integrated into a single service. The new five-year contract ensures that transport for patients will be improved by involving patients in the design of the service. The new service, which will run 365 days a year and 24 hours a day, will offer transport to eligible patients for planned and routine journeys to and from any hospital or clinic in the country. The NEPTS service will also provide transport tailored for particular patient groups, such as renal (kidney dialysis) or critical care patients. It also integrates the Healthcare Travel Cost Scheme making it easier for patients to use. CCG staff interviewed patients who use current services and then used their views to inform a multi-expert panel who evaluated the bids received by providers.
