

Hello to you all, it seems like summer might be around the corner so let's all look forward to a great August.

With summer finally arriving, we should prepare for the influx of visitors that this part of Tendring attracts.

When I, rashly, issued my Chairman's Challenge in the June edition of the Messenger, I had high hopes that the residents of Great Bromley would grasp the nettle and bombard me with all manner of innovative and perhaps even outlandish ways to make our village better for our children, our elderly population and the rest of us who do not fall into one of the other two categories.

Alas, I was mistaken. The only contacts that I received were from residents worried about the impact of speeding motorists on our village.

Well, I believe that all of us who live on a main road that is subject to speeding can do something to raise awareness of the need to keep within the speed limit for that road.

I am sure that the majority of people who exceed the limit do so without intent. They leave the A120, which is subject to the national speed limit, and have to drop down to 30 or 40mph. Which feels like a snails pace.

What I feel we need to do is to reinforce the current speed signs in place.

With this in mind, I have acquired some "30mph Please drive carefully" stick-on signs, designed to be applied to our wheelie bins. These cost, via Amazon, between £1.55 and £2.00 each, depending on how many you order.

If you apply these to your bins and leave them in a place of prominence at the front of your property, drivers cannot fail to realise that in our village, the speed limit is just that, the maximum speed that you should be travelling.

These can be obtained in both 30mph and 40mph, dependent of the road where you live.

NEW APPOINTMENT BOOKING SYSTEM

On the 16 July 2024 we implemented a digital platform at the Surgery called AskmyGP. All urgent and routine appointment requests will now have to be requested via the digital platform. All other requests that would normally have been made in person or via email such as prescription queries, medical certificates etc will also have to come through AskmyGP. Repeat prescriptions can still be ordered via the NHS App or submitted via the Platform.

Patients using the digital platform will need to register for this. It is a very easy process to sign up for AskmyGP and patients can access this by going to our website

www.greatbentleysurgery.nhs.uk. Our reception team will also have leaflets to give to patients visiting the Surgery about how to register on the platform.

For any patients who are unable to use or access digital services, then they can continue to contact a member of our reception team on 01206 250691 during our opening hours, who will submit the request for them via AskmyGP.

For any urgent requests patients will receive a response within 24 hours and for routine requests they will receive a response from the Practice within 1 to 3 working days.

We are aware of the frustrations patients had with our previous appointments system and hope that this helps to expedite their routine requests.

AED Emergency **Did you know?** Great Bromley has two Automated External Defibrillators. You can access these at:

- The Courthouse, Harwich Road, CO7 7JG or
- The Cross Inn, Ardleigh Road, CO7 7TL

Also at the Cross Inn is a Bleed Kit. The kit, provided by Great Bromley Parish Council, contains specialist equipment to help stem extreme blood loss before ambulance crews arrive.

Bleed control kits, also known as emergency trauma packs, are similar to first aid kits but include trauma dressings, gauze, chest seals and tourniquets to help stop serious bleeding. They can help victims of violent crime, those involved in road traffic accidents or workplace accidents, and could be particularly useful in rural areas where ambulance response times may be slower.

Essex Highways carry out regular inspections of roads and pavements, but issues may come up between these inspections. These could be potholes or other road surface issues, damaged street lights, street signs, overgrown trees, or issues with public rights of way.

Marion (23 July 1933 - 12 May 2024) was born in Ardleigh to Walter and Esther Jarrad. She was trained as a nursery nurse but when she contracted TB her work with children had to end. She met Edward Barrett at a village dance when he was home on leave from the RAF; the couple married on 25th June 1955 in Great Bromley. It was at Hiskeys Farm, Little Bromley that Stephen, Sharon and Lynne were born. Like their parents, the children enjoyed a wonderful rural childhood with freedom and space. In 1970 the family were intending to emigrate to Canada. Edward travelled abroad to set things up while Marion, now pregnant with Sarah, stayed behind with the intent of following on when things were sorted. However, things didn't go to plan so Edward and the family, now with four children, relocated to Sussex, Edward and Marion often revisited their friends in The Bromleys until travel became too difficult.

ARDLEIGH DOCTORS' SURGERY

We would like inform our patients that Dr Robert Lenart has given notice of his planned retirement to the partnership. He will not be leaving imminently but we wished to give the population advanced notice.

In anticipation of this, Dr Kelechi Anunum who has been working with us as a long-term locum for over 3 years has joined us as a salaried GP with view to partnership. We are delighted to have him join our team permanently.

From July we welcome two new trainee GPs, Dr Al Jaf will be with us until February 2025 and Dr Edmonds will join us from July 2024.

Information for all our patients

Long referral lists:

Requests for assessment for Autistic spectrum disorders, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder and neurodiverse conditions has rapidly increased beyond what the NHS can cope with. Thirty years ago, a GP may do one referral a year. Today we will do 3 a day. These referrals are for adults as well as children. Please be aware as a result. there is a significant waiting list of many months. If you are thinking of making an appointment to discuss your child's behaviour, please start keeping a record of the troubling behaviours, get the school to do a letter stating their observations.

If you are an adult seeking assessment, do ask your family members to write notes of your behaviours, your employer or work colleagues if appropriate. Do ask yourself what you hope to gain from the diagnosis. Is it to get reasonable adjustment at work? Or is it to help you apply for benefits? Or you may just want to know. Lastly, do book a double appointment if discussing one of these

issues as ten minutes will not be enough for these types of issues.

If the hospital specialist prescribes a medication, the GP may not be able to continue to prescribe the medication until you are stabilised. This is because these medications are potent brain stimulants that are prescribed by specialists. They need monitoring with bloods, examinations, heart tracing at regular intervals for as long as you are on them. Sometimes it is safer for the patients to continue to have them prescribed by the specialist.

Appointment demand:

Demand for appointments continue to outstrip available resources. Ardleigh is not immune to the pressures being felt by primary care across England. We aim to offer a mixture of routine, prebookable and on the day face to face and telephone appointments. Invariably due exponentially increasing demand, often only emergency appointments are available for on the day booking. Callers are required to say if the problem they are calling about is an urgent issue that cannot wait for a routine appointment, this helps us triage and gives the clinicians some capacity for very urgent appointments or visits later in the day. The surgery stretches its capacity every day, please be aware there is a limitation to how many appointments a doctor or nurse can safety complete in a day, so be respectful if the receptionists inform you we have no appointments left. There are other services including 111 and the urgent treatment centre which can be utilized.

A prescription of one item will now cost £9.90 from £9.65. You can save money by getting a prepayment prescription certificate. This costs £32.05 for 3 months and £114.50 for 12 months.



TONY RAMPLING 3RD JUNE 1924 - 25TH APRIL 2024

Anthony Walter Rampling had a lifelong passion for horses and as a lad would make bridles from rope and hop on any available horse, not necessarily with the owner's permission. When WW2 broke out, Tony signed up despite being underage. He joined the 61st Reconnaissance Regiment as a Bren Gunner and arrived at Gold Beach on Day 7 of the D-Day landings. He was later transferred to the 44th Royal Tank Regiment which was one of the first to cross the Rhine into Germany. With the enemy defeated, the Regiment took over a Baron's castle, where Tony spent two months looking after and riding the horses. In August 1945 Tony became acutely unwell with pleurisy, pneumonia, and a collapsed lung. He was hospitalised for 18



months and eventually discharged with a loss of hearing. The memories and horrors of the war would stay with him all his life, and it was only much later that he was able to talk about them. The things he saw and was forced to eat during the war made him a vegetarian, which was most unusual in the 1940s.

Back home in Tendring after the war, Tony started a fruit and vegetable business with brother Ray and his old school friend Geoff Burgoyne. Tony concentrated on the potato side and eventually went on his own as a potato merchant, supplying local growers with seed potatoes and marketing their results locally and in Spitalfields market.

He had a contract to supply schools in the East End of London, an area not as affluent as it is today, and the potatoes supplied there were not always top grade. Tony got away with a few close calls, with several instances when they didn't hang around after delivery! They were about to unload at one school when confronted by two large East End ladies who said, "These ones'd better be better than last week, those were total ****!" They traded as Burgoyne and Rampling but apparently acquired the nickname "Buggers and Rogues".

Tony became a single parent in 1960 and brought up 2-year-old Sallyann alone for several years until they were joined by Susan and her daughter Belinda in 1965. Tony and Sue had got to know each other at the Hunt and were married in Colchester in 1968; the arrival of Claire in 1969 completed their family, made up of "one of his, one of hers and one of theirs." They bought Hillyards Farm in Great Bromley in the early 1970s. This allowed Tony to acquire more horses for his point-to-point racing, hunting, cross-country and show jumping, beating many a younger rider to win cups and ribbons well into his 70s.

Tony had a quick humour and loved a joke. Belinda remembers Susan's dismay on finding her first grey hair and declaring she had pulled it out. Tony, quick as a whip, said "Ooh - I started doing that and look what happened to me!" Mind you, when Tony's hair was thinning, Yogi used to get behind him and rub his bald patch and say "What ho, Kojak!" - he would turn on him with fists up before hurriedly replacing his comb-over!

Around retirement, Tony made many trips back to France and Belgium, with Susan, brother-in-law Colin, and Yogi. He got so much from revisiting the battle and landing sites and paying his respects to old comrades in the vast cemeteries. He enioved researching and connecting with people all over the world through WW2 associations and was interviewed several times for TV and newspapers. He was awarded The Legion of Honour in 2015 at Colchester Town Hall; the highest



honour from the French nation in gratitude for his contribution to their liberation.

One of Tony's many skills was his ability to talk to just about anyone in any situation. In later years Tony acquired a computer which totally changed his life - it was amazing how quickly he learned how to use it. He was always on Facebook chatting with people, commenting on other people's posts - sometimes not too complimentary - sharing pictures and jokes.

Although his body got tired, his sharp mind and wicked sense of humour lasted to the end. It's not easy to almost achieve your 100th Birthday and this is in no small way thanks to Sue, who rode happily alongside Tony for many years and then cared for him at home for so long.

Tony Rampling - a kind, fun, cheeky, loyal and upbeat man with a large



personality for someone who was only 5 foot 2 - will be greatly missed by all who knew him.

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends

I am writing this on the day after the General Election of 4 July. It is the day when the country learned of the choices we made as individual voters at the ballot box. They are individual choices that in themselves may seem rather insignificant in the numbers of votes cast (although the smallest majority I heard of was a margin of just 18 votes after 3 re-counts) yet collectively they have changed markedly the political landscape and direction for the governance of our country for perhaps many years to come.

I am not here to cast judgement on that democratic choice, but to reflect on the choices we are called to make every day in our lives. Some seem rather frivolous – what shall we wear, what shall we eat? Yet we are indeed privileged to have such choice when many around the world have little more than they can carry in one bag.

Other choices, although still small, can have significant consequences. There is much that faces us every day to make a choice with far reaching outcomes, perhaps not for us but for others and in particular for future generations. The Climate Change Catastrophe is the most obvious and pressing example of this. It may be just one more plastic water bottle we use when we don't invest in the purchase and use of a reusable drinking bottle, but just like the votes we cast, the individual choices can collectively make significant changes. In this case it can be for the better or for the worse.

I wonder if we ponder the choices made by the generations that have gone before and the impact they have made on our lives. The Suffragettes is one example as are those of the many men and women who serve in our armed forces. Are we prepared to sacrifice a little comfort in our own lives to make better choices for our future lives together?

The Christian faith calls for choices to be made. In the first instance, we recognise the choice made by Jesus as God's Son to bring mercy and forgiveness to bear for all the bad choices (sins) we make by his death on the cross. 'Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners' (1 Timothey 1:15) Then there is the choice we make daily to follow in his example, being generous with our own mercy and forgiveness and gracious in making good choices for the benefit of others.

The new Parliament we have elected is now in recess – their summer holiday. As we prepare to have a break, perhaps even decide what to do if we haven't booked a holiday yet, let us decide now to make benevolent choices in all aspects of our lives, for the benefit of others and indeed all humankind. Whatever you do or wherever you go, have a refreshing break and may we make good choices every day.
