ERIC KEEBLE 1932 - 2024

Eric, the son of Florence and Cyril, grew up with his sisters, Rose and Eleanor, in a world defined by hard work, resilience, and a love of the outdoors. Life at Brook Farm in Great Bentley, where his father was a tenant farmer, was shaped by the rhythm of the land. The war cast a shadow over many lives, but the Keeble family were spared the worst, being essential workers with access to fresh produce and meat. Eric recalled how the Italian prisoners of war who worked there gave him chocolate, and of hearing his father shouting for everyone to lay down as they witnessed the downing of a German plane.

At just four years old Eric suffered a serious accident at Horsley Cross when he was hit by a car, damaging his foot, and his 18 months in hospital left a deep impression on him. He stood up to bullies as he wore leg irons at primary school and earned a reputation for being cheeky and mischievous. It was as a child that his love for music began - he mastered the mouth organ and learned to play the organ at the local church.

School was never his favourite place, so he was pleased to leave aged 13, when his true education began on the land as his parents took the lease of Bush Farm. Eric's hands were never idle, whether in his early days as a saddle-maker's apprentice, or as an agricultural contractor building his own business, his ingenuity and drive were boundless. He was a natural problem solver who could mend almost anything, often with a creative 'bodge job' that stood the test of time.

It was at Burnt Heath Methodist Church that Eric met Pauline, who admired his ambition, the business he was building,



and his car! They married in 1957, and moved into Hall Cottage, near Bush Farm, beginning a partnership that would span decades. Eric was convinced that her insistence on washing his old hat on a regular basis led to his losing his thick curly hair, which until then had been preserved by tractor grease.

Pauline enjoyed being the wife of a businessman but when Eric's parents retired, he decided to take on the farm instead, so the young family with three daughters, Marie, Louise and Vanessa, moved into the farmhouse. Whilst Pauline kept a tidy home, the girls ran free-range with dad, and he cherished every moment spent with them. From riding on their own little seat on the tractor, to rabbiting and lamping trips in the Land Rover, every moment was an adventure.

His girls were Eric's greatest joy and he involved them in every aspect of farm life. Eric's warmth extended far beyond his family to include the girls' friends and, in time, their boyfriends. Initially wary of his towering frame, they soon realised he was a gentle giant – a name they lovingly gave him. He became like a



second father to many, always ready to fix their motorbikes. Whenever the girls asked their dad his opinion, he would say, "Whatever you girls want." If they were happy, he was happy. His one stipulation, born from his

aversion to busy social occasions, was that if they ever married, they should all do it on the same day! Visitors to the farm were always welcomed with a story over tea and cake baked by Pauline - perhaps one of her caraway seed buns that the girls knew as mice turd buns!

Eventually the time came to leave Bush Farm, so 20 years ago they moved to Dovetails in Mary Lane South, but Eric still carried on helping people with gardening and odd jobs. When Pauline suffered a stroke, Eric devoted himself to her care with unwavering love and dedication until her passing. Eric's presence was a steady and comforting anchor to all his family, and he



has left them and so many friends with many very happy memories.

These juniors are between 12 and 13 years of age and I am sure that they would appreciate all the support that we can offer them.

ST GEORGE'S CHURCH NEWS

Our next parish lunch will be after the Eucharist on 2nd February from 12.30pm, at the Haywain, Lt Bromley. There is a sign-up list in church, or contact one of the churchwardens to let them know you are going to attend.

St George's spent £331 on Christmas purchases of food for the Manningtree Foodbank, thanks to your kind donations. In 2024 income from donations was £1,263; expenditure on food was £892, leaving a balance of £371 to start 2025.

Jenny led our annual Christmas singalong with the Cheshire Home residents, followed by tea and mince pies. A good time was had by all!

The school and parents filled the church and we heard lovely singing directed by Mrs Keitch, the Headteacher, and Mr Johnston, who teaches Years 5 and 6. Thank you to Revd John Saxon, who is now a school governor, for leading the service.



At their routine meeting in November, the Management Committee was pleased to hear that hall bookings had continued to increase slightly and that an additional yoga class was now held on a Tuesday evening and a 'warm hub' community event held each Friday. The Committee noted that the village hall historical records had now been digitised and important original documents, including past minute books, would be deposited shortly in the Essex Records Office for safe keeping.

The Committee also noted that the Hamilton Lodge developers had submitted to Essex County Council a revised roadside works and infrastructure plan which showed both existing village hall vehicular entrances remaining open. These roadside works are due to be undertaken by the developer in late spring this year. Once the final design for these works is known, detailed planning for the village hall car park improvement project will commence. Other improvements planned for the hall in 2025 include further internal and external redecoration and installation of a replacement heating oil tank and plinth.

Electricity costs at the village hall have nearly doubled in recent months following the end of the previous long term supply arrangement. A competitive new supply contract has been negotiated but, to ensure that the income and expenditure for the charity remains in balance, the Committee agreed that the hire charges for the facilities at the hall should increase by an average of 5% with effect from 1st April 2025 for all new bookings. This is

the first price increase in 2 years but, despite this increase, local research shows that the hall remains highly competitive as a convenient, flexible and affordable venue in the area with the additional benefits of a working stage, good acoustics, hearing loop and WIFI coverage.

Subject to confirmation that no formal planning permission from Tendring District Council was required, the Committee agreed to requests from Great Bromley and District Cricket Club regarding the positioning of a 20' storage container adjacent to the cricket pavilion and also the erection of a permanent cricket scoreboard adjacent to the path between the village hall and the pavilion. Discussions continue between the two organisations regarding ways to improve the drainage of the cricket field, particularly in the vicinity of the pavilion.

The Management Committee looks forward to welcoming you at the village hall in 2025 whether it be for a family party, activity class, meeting or musical event. As the hall is fully licensed, there is scope to undertake a wide range of activities in the accommodation - all at competitive hire rates. Did you know? Great Bromley has two Automated External Defibrillators. You can access these at:

- The Courthouse, Harwich Road, CO7 7JG or
- The Cross Inn, Ardleigh Road, CO7 7TL

Also at the Cross Inn is a Bleed Kit. The kit, provided by Great Bromley Parish Council, contains specialist equipment to help stem extreme blood loss before ambulance crews arrive.

Bleed control kits, also known as emergency trauma packs, are similar to first aid kits but include trauma dressings, gauze, chest seals and tourniquets to help stop serious bleeding. They can help victims of violent crime, those involved in road traffic accidents or workplace accidents, and could be particularly useful in rural areas where ambulance response times may be slower.

Essex Highways carry out regular inspections of roads and pavements, but issues may come up between these inspections. These could be potholes or other road surface issues, damaged street lights, street signs, overgrown trees, or issues with public rights of way.

ARDLEIGH SURGERY

Happy New Year to all our patients!

By the time you read this, we will have been using the Anima Health communication platform for about 3 weeks. We understand that there may be some initial challenges as we all adapt to this new system. Please bear with us as we learn and refine our processes.

As of January 9th, 1300 patients have already registered with Anima. We encourage all of our approximately 8000 patients to register as well. You can access Anima through the surgery's website or directly through the Anima website. You will need a different email address for each non-dependent adult.

Key Features of Anima:

Medical Requests: Submit requests between 8:00am and 3:30pm.

During periods of high demand, we may temporarily pause accepting new requests to ensure patient safety. If your concern is non-urgent, please try submitting your request again the following morning at 8:00am.

The clinical triage team will review your request and contact you via text, phone, or schedule a face-to-face appointment.

Following assessment, you may be offered appropriate management options, such as prescriptions, blood tests, or referrals.

Administrative Requests: Submit requests between 8:00am and 3:30pm.

Examples include requesting test results, travel advice, updating personal information, and requesting copies of medical records.

We aim to respond to administrative requests within 3 working days.

Benefits of Anima:

Improved Efficiency: Anima helps us gather patient information more efficiently, allowing us to prioritize appointments based on clinical urgency rather than a first-come, first-served basis

Enhanced Convenience: Tech-savvy patients are finding Anima to be a highly convenient and user-friendly platform.

Accessibility for All: If you are unable to use the technology, you can still contact the surgery by phone, and our team will assist you with submitting your request. Your clinical problem will be triaged by a clinician and not a computer. If you don't have a smart phone there will be two laptops in reception that you can use to submit your queries.

We are committed to making this transition as smooth as possible for all our patients.

The Prescription line is still open and prescriptions can be request as before.

The phone lines remain open from 0800hrs to 1830hrs as usual.

Other news

The surgery will be closed on 25th February from 1200hrs to 1830hrs for North Essex Wide GP and staff training.

WINTER SUPPORT

Warm Hub every Friday at Great Bromley Village Hall 2-4.30pm

The warm hub is proving a great success, with more people and families attending every week. It is very welcoming, with endless free refreshments and crafts for children.

We have given out 50 free draught excluders, benefit advice and savings

on utilities. The Bill Clinic attends every Friday and saved one person £1,400 a year with their electricity.

Christmas warm hub, saw Santa and Mrs Claus attend, children had a lovely time and the feedback from families was amazing.

Migration of Universal Credit

There is a 'hard stop' on 5th April 2025 after which tax credits will essentially no longer exist. Tax credit claimants with sensory impairments are now being contacted and have an additional 2 weeks to move to UC. However, the 3 months and 1 day window to move over to UC starts on 4th January 2025.

About 80,000 Income-related ESA claimants have received migration notices so far. By February 2025 its expected that 63,000 will be moved each month.

Issues identified so far include:

 Support Group claimants being invited to Work Focused Interviews and other work-related requirements, developing CV's and work search Support Group claimants being asked once more for fit notes.

DWP have said they are addressing these issues, if you do

experience any difficulties please contact an adviser. That way your claim

can be checked.



Discretionary Housing Payment (DHP)

DHP's are administered by local borough and district councils. Applicants must be in receipt of either Housing Benefit or the Universal Credit Housing Element. DHP's can be used for rent shortfall, moving costs, rent arrears and private rent deposits.

DHP applications are available online. However, if you unable to make an application, you can

contact Tendring District Council and arrange a phone appointment to make an application.

People can have more than one DHP in a year. However, most awards are granted for either 13 weeks or 26 weeks. 'Extensions' of these periods can be granted on application.

DHP applications do not carry the right of appeal, but you can request a review of a decision.

Advice sessions provided by Disability Advice and Welfare Network are held the first Wednesday of every month. 10-12pm at The Great Bromley Cross Pub and 2-4pm at Great Bromley Village Hall.



HELP KEEP GREAT BROMLEY TIDY

Last November, Great Bromley Parish Council organised a litter pick and, with the help of several volunteers, over thirty bags of rubbish were collected throughout the village. Unfortunately, within a short period of time the litter started to appear again along the roadside. Most of the litter strewn along our verges is the result of being thrown out of passing vehicles, making it extremely difficult to remedy.

Litter is a national problem with over two million pieces dropped every day at a cost of over a billion pounds to the taxpayer annually (Keep Britain Tidy). Not only is litter unsightly but also causes a hazard to wildlife, attracting vermin and disease. The Parish Council is always looking at ways to

combat the litter problem in the village and one trouble spot has been the bench opposite Selectacars. People sitting on the bench enjoying their snacks unfortunately tended to just throw their food wrappers, cans and bottles on the ground or over into

the neighbouring field. A litter bin has now been introduced and thankfully is being well used. Great Bromley Parish Council is grateful to **Costcutters** for kindly donating the funds to purchase the bin.

Unfortunately, litter bins can cause other issues, if full people will leave their rubbish beside the bin rather than taking it home with them. This happens

frequently by the litter bins in the village, especially in Church Meadow. Unfortunately, the bin quickly fills up with people using the bottle bank depositing bags and containers that the bottles have been brought in. This is perfectly acceptable however it has been noticed that recently, the bin is being filled up with household rubbish, which is not what it should be used for. The bin is emptied once a week, however there is often rubbish hanging out of the bin or dumped behind it.

The bottle bank is an asset to the village and is well used by residents, it also brings in substantial revenue of around £1500 per annum to the Parish. Unfortunately the bottle bank is seen by some as a dumping area for items that

do not fit into the containers (panes of glass. ceramic pots etc). Just recently a broken pane of glass was left leaning against one of the containers. When the containers were emptied the pane of glass was shattered and left strewn on the ground.

This left shards of broken glass on the ground causing a potential hazard to anyone using the bottle bank.

The Parish Council is grateful to all those who help to keep the village litter free and welcome any suggestions on how the situation could be improved.
