At its last meeting on 4th March, the Village Hall Management Committee noted that the Hamilton Lodge site had recently reopened and the developer had recommenced work, as well as submitting to Essex County Council the final planning application for the roadside infrastructure works. The Committee understood that this application would include the retention of both village hall car park entrances and that the work would be undertaken in late spring 2025. The village hall car park improvement project remained on hold until the final design of the roadside infrastructure works was known and the current problems with local drainage had been resolved.

The overall income from private and commercial bookings of rooms at the hall had remained steady in recent months, boosted by the monthly 'Warm Hub' initiative organised by Annie Sands which had proved popular with Parishioners. The Advocacy Advice sessions provided monthly by Annie Sands in the village hall had also been well received. These sessions had led to £92k being paid out in additional benefits to entitled claimants and other achievements such as the provision of help with completing Power of Attorney forms. Based on the feedback from the first 6 months of this service, the Management Committee agreed that the Advocacy Advice service should

continue to hold sessions in the village hall free of charge for a further 6 months.

The attention of the Management Committee is now turning towards the Village Hall AGM which this year will be held on Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> May commencing at 7.00pm in the Millennium Lounge. All parishioners are welcome to attend the AGM which reports on the past year and looks forward to the next. This is your opportunity to provide feedback in person on the facilities in our village hall and the way it is organised and managed.

The AGM is also your opportunity to volunteer to assist with the management of the village hall. There are currently 3 vacancies on the Management Committee and my colleagues and I would really welcome 'new blood' onto the committee to help with the running of the hall. No particular skills are required, however a desire to help our fine community facility to flourish and willingness to get stuck in and take on a non-onerous responsibility would make the role more meaningful and much more enjoyable. If you are interested in joining us on the committee please contact me for further information.

### **Easter Opening Hours**

The normal Surgery opening times are from 8.00 am to 6.30 pm Monday to Friday. Over the Easter bank holiday, the Surgery will be closed on Friday, 18 April 2025 and Monday, 21 April 2024. If patients require urgent medical care over the Easter weekend, then they should contact NHS 111 for assistance.

If you are on regular medication, please remember to order this in good time so you don't run out over the Easter weekend. We do require three working days (excluding Saturday and Sunday) to process all prescriptions.

### **Doctors Appointments**

In order for us to try and offer as many GP appointments as possible, we are only able to allocate 10 minutes for each slot. To help our doctors run as close to their appointment times as possible, in future they will only be able to deal with one problem in this appointment. If you require more than one problem to be dealt with, you will be asked to make another request via AskmyGP for an appointment.

## Time Change on the Prescription Enquiry Line

The times when patients are able to phone the prescription clerk to ask a question about a prescription has changed. Patients are able to ring between 9.00am and 12 noon and then between 2.00pm and 3.00pm Monday to Friday. If you go into the hold queue because the prescription clerk is on another call but you do not wish to hold, then please leave a message with your name and contact number and she will call you back.

## Fitting of contraception implants and coils

Now that Sue Webb, our Nurse Practitioner has retired, if patients require an implant or coil fitted for contraception, then they should contact the Essex Sexual Health Service on tel. 0300 003 1212. If a patient requires a coil be fitted for non-contraceptive purposes, then they should make a request for this via AskmyGP, as the Surgery will need to make a referral for the patient.

## Appointments for RSV, Shingles and Pneumonia Vaccinations

The Practice continue to send out invites for the above three vaccinations to patients that are eligible for these. If you receive an invitation for any of the above then you can either book this by clicking on the attached link on the message, or by contacting a member of the reception team on tel. 01206 250691.

### TREVOR GLADWIN 15 MAY 1951 - 19 JANUARY 2025

Trevor was born in Little Bromley to a farming family. He told fondly of growing up in a farm cottage with tin baths in front of the fire - although being the youngest in the family he'd usually be the last to use the bath water! He spent school holidays sat atop a heavy horse as his grandad James and father Ted worked the farm. The old farmhands were convinced that these fancy new tractors and motorcars would never catch on because a good horse would always be more useful. Those early years weren't without misadventure - a fall from a Suffolk Punch is a long way for a child, and on one occasional a broken harness propelled a heavy brass fitting into Trevor's nose, an injury he'd later attribute his terrible snoring to.



His mother Betty was one of 14 Walne children who lived in New House Farm, nearly opposite to the Gladwin residence. His Uncle Reg Gladwin repaired clocks and watches amongst other things in the village, and young Trevor would sit on a stool in the workshop to learn all manner of tinkering.

Trevor and family were regular churchgoers, his father being the church warden and for a while Little Bromley church choir consisted of Trevor, his brother Chris, his father and uncle.

As a teenager Trevor spent much of his time bicycling on lanes and farm tracks along the river, often with a fishing rod or airgun strapped to the bike frame, sometimes stopping for a friendly chat with the local policeman who never gave the child cycling around with a gun a second thought - it was a different time. On a good day he'd return home with something fresh for tea. The back door frame of their farm cottage was peppered with holes where his father would nail up eels to skin them, victims of Trevor's handmade spear.

At school he was an early recipient of the Duke of Edinburgh's award, having hand built a canoe to explore Suffolk backwaters. He enjoyed woodworking and loved competing in weight lifting – he admitted his secret weapon was only having to lift the weights half the distance of taller competitors!

When Trevor could afford his first motorcycle, his mother was right to be concerned as anyone who'd travelled with him through Bromley to Manningtree could attest, as every other bend in the road he'd point to a hedge and recall the story of how he'd ended up crashing his motorbike through it. Journeying with him further afield you'd notice him navigate primarily by the location of pubs, despite the majority of them having closed decades ago. In his twenties he enjoyed the friendly competition of pub teams, be it darts, cricket or football. Known for his tendency to always keep his eye on the ball, this once led to an amazing disappearing act when, running at full pelt looking into the air, he went head first into the ditch at the pitch boundary.

His bachelor lifestyle ended when he walked into the Tailors Arms in Great Bromley (now the Snooty Fox) and met Susan, the lovely barmaid. When she stepped down from behind the bar they found she was half a foot taller than him. They enjoyed six years courtship followed by 32 years of marriage.

Trevor left his job at the shipyards and joined BT as a telecoms engineer – which was ironic, as he didn't even have a home phone until he



was in his late 20s! initially working as a technician on phone lines, he remembered the moment he decided to seek a desk job, when in the bad winter of 1987 he was repairing connections shattered by ice and found he could reach the top of the telegraph pole just by climbing a snowdrift.

When the couple moved to Elmstead, Trevor decided to treat Sue to an exotic new pet. When searching pet shops for something small and fluffy, he noticed a little parrot. The shop keeper assured him they were low effort and lived 3 to 4 years ... it seems Trevor must have misheard, as for the next 34 years the family would be terrorised by a cockatiel! A spate of regular skiing holidays ended with Trevor's last trip down a mountain being on a medical sled. His story varied somewhat, different versions had him hitting a tree root or trunk, a signpost, a gondola pylon or small cliff ... Sue's version confirmed it looked like all of them in rapid succession and she was very impressed by the splits he managed in midair.

Sue had a number of health challenges over the years, and was told she was unlikely to have children, but she ignored that and the couple had a son, Adam. Trevor's style of parenting was to explain something carefully once and then let Adam get on with it. With both Trevor and Sue having grown up with dogs, Trevor decided Adam needed a puppy who could also act as a working gundog. Trevor got the pick of a litter and decided the confident and energetic pup who first approached him would be a perfect fit - the springer spaniel was named Dexter and Trevor spent the next 9 years training him... in hindsight no one was sure if Dexter was aware of this training. It never failed to amaze countryside folk how Trevor and Dexter could do the work of 5 men, mainly because the single-minded spaniel was hellbent on hunting at 20 miles an hour through brambles, across ditches and wetlands, yet somehow Trevor always managed to keep up with his headstrong hound.

Trevor had a challenging time in later life, losing his mother just before Sue had a cerebral aneurysm and for the next two years he strived to support his wife back to health. It was during this period that his own serious health problems

emerged, and one awful day just after Trevor was released from hospital. Sue suffered another serious brain injury and passed away weeks later. For a time he handled the situation stoically - stepping up when he never expected to be a single father to Adam who was about to sit 'A' levels - but he admitted he was heartbroken, and decades of planning a relaxed retirement travelling with Sue would never happen, and for a time he struggled to find purpose. Yet while he struggled to look after himself at times, whenever someone needed Trevor, he would be there.



In recent years Trevor had become a local contact for some of the less mobile pensioners around the

village, and being known as someone to call if an animal was in need. He'd drop everything to rescue a cold hedgehog, or to wrestle an injured goose into the back of his car, to rush them off to a vet or wildlife sanctuary for help. He was determined to do something useful every day, and last year in particular he took every opportunity to return to old endeavours: fishing, shooting and exploring his favourite old backwaters in a new Canadian canoe. He passed away peacefully at home.

**Did you know?** Great Bromley has two Automated External Defibrillators. You can access these at:

- The Courthouse, Harwich Road, CO7 7JG or
- The Cross Inn, Ardleigh Road, CO7 7TL

Also at the Cross Inn is a Bleed Kit. The kit, provided by Great Bromley Parish Council, contains specialist equipment to help stem extreme blood loss before ambulance crews arrive.

Bleed control kits, also known as emergency trauma packs, are similar to first aid kits but include trauma dressings, gauze, chest seals and tourniquets to help stop serious bleeding. They can help victims of violent crime, those involved in road traffic accidents or workplace accidents, and could be particularly useful in rural areas where ambulance response times may be slower.

**Essex** Highways

Essex Highways carry out regular inspections of roads and pavements, but issues may come up between these inspections. These could be potholes or other road surface issues, damaged street lights, street signs, overgrown trees, or issues with public rights of way.


'This is my Theatre' will be performing 'Pride and Prejudice' on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> September at 7pm in the churchyard.

### **APRIL'S SOFT WHISPERS**

As Winter's cold dreary months end, April brings the promise of spring and all its wonders - a time of renewal, growth, and beauty. Nature bursts back into life.

Most UK birds start building nests between March & June. And, they have specific requirements when selecting a suitable site:

- Protection from predators & elements. Cavities, dense vegetation, crevices provide shelter.
- Concealment Many rely on camouflage to hide their nest & only visit the nest when necessary.
- Accessibility Able to come & go during nest building & to feed chicks during rearing.
- Comfort The right size space for the species.
- Security Sturdy, stable supporting structure & attachment point
- Close to reliable food/water sources.

Birds weigh up all these factors, apart from perhaps pigeons! Once the female has chosen a nest site, intricate & complex nest building skills are tested, influenced by instinct & learning. They collect materials like twigs, grasses, moss & sometimes hazardous manmade materials like strands of plastic. Many people put out dryer lint with good intentions believing the soft fluffy material will make an ideal lining for birds' nests. However, dryer lint is infused with harmful residues from detergents/soaps/ fabric softeners making it highly toxic to baby birds. Also pet hair treated with anti-flea/tick/ lice remedies (waterproof by design) may also be harmful.

With great skill, using just beak & feet, birds weave & interlock materials into the nest structure. The nest is then

anchored firmly to its support with entwining, mud or saliva. Running repairs are made while in use. Some birds re-use nests for second broods or in following years. Many repair & refurbish old nests rather than build new. Their nest building ability gets better with age & experience.

## UK birds construct an incredible variety of nest shapes & styles adapted to their needs:

Cup – Simple open cup nests, lined nests provide insulation, - blackbirds/thrushes

Domed – Nest with roof covering entrance - sparrows

Saucer – Wide shallow nests - waders/plovers.

Platform - Bulky treetop nests - crows

Scrape – Shallow lined depression in ground -lapwings/oystercatchers/skylarks.

Cave or crevice – rock doves/stock doves.

Borrowed nests, re-using other species old nests - owls & ducks

Birds begin laying & incubating their eggs on nest completion. Songbirds like robins, blackbirds, finches, tits, often attempt to raise 2 broods. In April there may also be fledglings around. These early nesters include blackbirds, thrushes, robins, & wrens. Their young look quite similar - little fluffy balls of brown feathers with beautifully speckled chests & light pale-coloured legs. Frequently, if conditions are right, the male bird continues feeding the growing fledglings & will also feed the female who's sitting on their next clutch of eggs.

door to be replaced without realising there was a nest of newly hatched featherless robin babies in the ivy beside it. Obviously, the disturbance & noise would've caused the nest to be abandoned & the babies perish! Only discovering this, on the actual morning the fitters were due to arrive, I rang the local Brightlingsea company & much to my relief they were most understanding. The fitter, already well on his way with the door, arrived, had a cup of tea then continued to his next job. Happily, I was able to send them a video of the robins feeding the babies. Amusingly the parents were actually using my trail camera, as a launching pad to return to the nest. The babies were successfully raised & the door replaced after they'd fledged. A happy

ending! So please check before having any work done in the garden or house exterior. The 'Bird Nesting Season' is officially from February - August (Natural England) & any tree or hedge cutting/ site clearance should be done outside these months.

Building and maintaining safe nesting spaces for garden birds is a really positive step towards supporting local wildlife. Start small by identifying the bird species already visiting your garden & find out their specific nesting requirements. Even modest efforts can have a significant impact, with patience & attention to detail, you'll soon find your garden chirping with grateful visitors.

### **RECTOR'S LETTER**

#### Dear Friends

Amidst the advancing signs of new life emerging in Spring, Christians look forward to Easter and the promise of new and eternal life offered by Jesus, his passion, death and resurrection. As you enjoy the warmer days and a hot cross bun or piece of traditional Simnel cake, both popular Easter traditions, I challenge you to ponder afresh the gift that is at the heart of the Easter story.

As a young teenager, I could not understand the term 'Passion of Christ'. Passion or Holy week runs from Palm Sunday through to Easter Sunday itself. The word passion in this sense comes from a Latin word, *patior* meaning to suffer or endure. That is not what a teenager usually understands passion to be!

From the Gospel accounts of Jesus' life, we know there was nothing good or peaceful about the events leading up to Jesus' crucifixion. In this last week after his triumphant entry into Jerusalem we remember on Palm Sunday, he was troubled by the swindling money changers at the temple and let down by his close friends, the disciples, who could not stay awake with him. Later he was betrayed by one of them to the authorities and disowned by yet another. He was put on trial, found guilty on false accusations and executed by crucifixion between two common criminals. Christ's passion was suffering and enduring pain in a very real sense. (Read Mark chapters 11 to 15).

Yet his death was not the end. On Easter morning we celebrate Christ's resurrection. Fulfilling Old Testament prophecy, on the third day after his death, the women who followed Jesus as part of the group of his disciples, went to his tomb intending to complete

the burial rituals. Instead, they found the tomb stone rolled away and the body gone: he was not dead but alive and many instances are recorded in the Gospels of people meeting with the resurrected Jesus, eating and drinking with him. This first Easter Sunday is described in Mark chapter 16.

The hope of Easter for Christians is that our troubles and fears are defeated by Jesus' resurrection. As somebody once said, 'Jesus resurrection is not the reversal of a defeat, but the triumph of a victory'. One of our greatest fears may be death, but through Jesus and the Easter story we are offered eternal life. This is not earned or gained through any merits of ourselves. It is a free gift offered through belief and faith in Jesus as the Way, the Truth and the Life (John 14 v 6).

This Easter I pray you may all know some of the joys of spring, of hot cross buns and simnel cake. But that you may also know the peace and security of eternal life offered through Jesus and the Easter story. Come and join us at one of our Easter services where we will celebrate this wonderful gift – you would be most welcome!
