

BERYL DORIS HURST 25 NOVEMBER 1931-12 AUGUST 2025

Beryl was born to Charles and May Keeble at Evelyn Villa, Briar Road, Burnt Heath. She attended Ardleigh School, which involved a daily walk carrying her school bag and gas mask during the war years. Beryl recalled a German parachute land mine dropping in a field by Carringtons Road, which blew in the windows and brought down the ceiling of their house.

After her school days, Beryl worked in the Accounts and Cashiers Office for Joslins in Colchester High Street, which she really enjoyed.

In 1951 Beryl married local lad Geoffrey Hurst and they started married life at "Arethusa", Ardleigh Road, just a stone's throw from where she grew up. Beryl left Joslins in 1953 when Glenda was born; Paul's arrival followed in 1960.

Latterly, Beryl and Geoff cared for both their mothers who had conveniently moved into the cottages either side of them in their twilight years. On the passing

of Geoff's mother, Beryl and Geoff moved next door into "The Sorrells", which meant the three houses of her life were no more than half a mile apart ... and *never* more than a short walk from the Cross Inn, where she enjoyed a tonic topped up with lemonade (and no ice, thank you!)

When the Cross Inn became a community pub, Beryl was very proud to be invited to cut the ribbon at the reopening ceremony. She very much enjoyed being taken by Glenda to the Wednesday Coffee Mornings there.

Throughout her life, Beryl was involved in all things Great Bromley. She was proud of being one of the founder members of the Women's Institute. She served on their committee in various roles over the



years, and was also on the Village Hall committee for 30 years.

Beryl was a member and treasurer at Burnt Heath Methodist Chapel until it was sold. She then became a member and steward at Trinity New Chapel in Elmstead Market, which also sadly closed several years ago. She had strong connections with St George's Church and supported it when she could.

Beryl ran the Friendship club for many years, and she was still thinking of possible speakers for the October meeting while she was in hospital! She was so proud to have been nominated for, and to be awarded a Pride of Tendring award in 2018 for all her work in the village.

Beryl loved her family dearly and was always interested in what her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren were doing, and was affectionately known as Nana B. She so enjoyed their visits and was a great hostess, rustling up a meal out of nothing.

She was blessed with having wonderful neighbours and friends her whole life, and particularly in later years when she was less mobile.

Beryl Hurst was Great Bromley through and through, and with her passing it truly feels like the end of an era.

The Deanery Choir will be singing at **St George's Church, Great Bromley CO7 7TS** at the 11am Communion service. The choir will sing 'Ave Verum' by Saint Saens.

Charles - Camille Saint-Saëns was a French composer, organist, conductor and pianist of the Romantic era. Saint-Saëns was a musical prodigy; he made his concert debut at the age of ten. After studying at the Paris Conservatoire he followed a conventional career as a church organist, first at Saint-Merri, Paris and, from 1858, La Madeleine, the official church of the French Empire. After leaving the post twenty years later, he was a successful freelance pianist and composer, in demand in Europe and the Americas. As a young man, Saint-Saëns was enthusiastic for the most modern music of the day, particularly that of Schumann, Liszt and Wagner, although his own compositions were

generally within a conventional classical tradition. He was a scholar of musical history, and remained committed to the structures worked out by earlier French composers. This brought him into conflict in his later years with composers of the impressionist and expressionist s chools of music; although there were neoclassical elements in his music, foreshadowing works by Stravinsky and Les Six, he was often regarded as a reactionary in the decades around the time of his death.

Dementia Support Event

Tendring Primary Care Network in collaboration with Great Bentley Surgery have arranged a Dementia Support Morning. This event will be held on Tuesday, 14 October 2025 at The Methodist Hall, Forge Lane, Great Bentley from 11.00 am to 1.00 pm. Patients and their family or friends are welcome to come along to this event to find out what support is available for patients living with dementia.

Appointments are now on the system for the flu jabs and invites have been sent out to those who are eligible for this by text message, with a link to book an appointment.

Text Invites for Vaccinations

If you receive an invite by text message to book an appointment for a vaccination at the Surgery, it would be very helpful if you could use the link attached to the message to book this.

It is very quick and easy to do this and means that you will save time by not having to phone the Surgery and hold on to speak to a receptionist. For patients that are not able to book by

using the link, they can of course still contact the Surgery to book this.

Medication Reviews

We now have over 7,000 patients on repeat medication who require at least an annual review of their medication. Although we understand that it would be nice to speak to a doctor for this, we do need to ensure that our GP appointments are used for patients that either need to be seen, or need to speak to a doctor about a medical condition. We have a very qualified prescribing Clinical Pharmacist, Chidera who will be carrying out medication reviews for our patients at Great Bentley Surgery.

Autumn Covid Booster

The autumn Covid booster will not be administered by the Surgery. The criteria this year for the Covid booster is for anyone 75 years of age and older, patients living in a care home, or patients under the age of 75 years who are immuno-suppressed.

Winter Heating & Benefit Support, What You Need to Know

As temperatures drop, here are key updates to help residents stay warm and supported this winter:

• Winter Fuel Payment (2025-26):

If you were born before 22 September 1959, you may be eligible for £100–£300 to help with heating costs. Most payments will be made automatically in November or December, based on your circumstances during the qualifying week (15–21 September).

· Warm Home Discount:

Households on Pension Credit or low incomes may receive £150 off their energy bill. This is applied directly by your energy supplier.

Cold Weather Payment:
 If temperatures drop to zero or

below for 7 consecutive days, eligible households receiving certain benefits may receive £25 per qualifying week.

• Pension Credit Reminder:

Thousands of eligible pensioners aren't claiming this support. It can unlock additional help, including heating discounts and council tax reductions. Use the Pension Credit calculator to check eligibility.

Also at The Great Bromley Cross Pub is a Bleed Kit. The kit, provided by Great Bromley Parish Council, contains specialist equipment to help stem extreme blood loss before ambulance crews arrive.

Bleed control kits, also known as emergency trauma packs, are similar to first aid kits but include trauma dressings, gauze, chest seals and tourniquets to help stop serious bleeding. They can help victims of violent crime, those involved in road traffic accidents or workplace accidents, and could be particularly useful in rural areas where ambulance response times may be slower.

Essex Highways carry out regular inspections of roads and pavements, but issues may come up between these inspections. These could be potholes or other road surface issues, damaged street lights, street signs, overgrown trees, or issues with public rights of way.

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends

Summer is long gone and we are now well into Autumn and our season of Harvest Festivals. There is little rest for our farmers as preparations for the next harvest are well underway. The variety of crops varies across our farms, but early October is a typical time to be sewing winter barley for a good yield next summer.

This got me thinking that as we are celebrating and giving thanks for our Harvest this year, farmers the other side of the world are carefully attending their emerging seedlings in anticipation of good yields. Around our wonderful world, there is a cycle of life continually happening. Creatures of land, sea and air, plants of every kind are in a constant cycle of birth and growth and death. Yet in whatever place, with whatever crop however sown, it is a miracle of nature that the seeds germinate and grow. Yes we can help, but it is God who sustains things and makes them happen, (see Hebrews chapter 1 verse 3 The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being, sustaining all things by his powerful word.)

I was recently reminded of St Francis of Assisi's song 'The Canticle of the Sun'. St Francis, who loved the natural world, composed this song in 1225 and used a repeated refrain 'Praise be to you' as he poetically described the sun, moon and stars, land, sea and air, animal and plants, and of course us humans. He repeatedly said 'Praise be to you' because through the wonder of

creation we are blessed by God with all sorts of things; beauty, wonder and mystery as well as food, warmth and shelter for example. In a children's poem version of Francis' canticle (written by Reeve Lindbergh called 'The Circle of Days') it finishes with-

For all your gifts of every kind, We offer praise with quiet mind. Be with us Lord and guide our ways

Around the circle of our days

St Francis recognises our mortality in his song, and as well as a season of Thanksgiving for our food, Autumn includes a season of Remembrance.

There will be the usual Remembrance Sunday services (this year on 9 November). As other vears, there will also be "All Souls" Services". These are more personal acts of remembrance in the context of a service to give thanks for loved ones no longer with us. There will be time for quiet reflection and the lighting of a candle if you wish. Whether for a recent bereavement or from further back in time, you would be most welcome to come along. We can join the song of St Francis and give thanks for creation and of course for the love and care shown us by the special people who have helped us on our way.
