## IN THE GARDEN WITH ANDY & JUDY

The late June and early July weather has alternated between extremes of rain and unusually strong sunshine. Keeping the greenhouses to an appropriate temperature has been problematic but all the vegetables and flowers have been growing well, although supplementary watering has been needed. The farming community are similarly affected as evidenced by the amount of irrigation being carried out locally.

I have been exhibiting at horticultural shows for the last 50 years and describe myself as an exhibitor who does a bit of gardening whilst Judy tries to ensure the garden is kept relatively tidy as well as being the one who exhibits the vegetables. Over the years I have exhibited carnations, chrysanthemums, dahlias, gladioli, sweet peas and a few general flowers. This year, as we expected, all the local shows have been cancelled, but that has not stopped us from growing as much as ever and we remain optimistic for next year.

Shows are held in the spring, summer and autumn. If I have blooms, I will enter the spring shows but do not purchase the comparatively expensive bulbs that are needed for serious competition. This is partly influenced by the fact that the timing of bulbs is so dependant on the weather and there is a very limited amount you can do to control timing. Another influence is that locally there are only 2 weekends for local spring shows.

Chrysanthemums and dahlias are more able to be influenced and there are usually 4 or more weekends over which shows are held through August and September, making it more likely that some of the blooms will be able to be shown. Dahlia timing can be influenced by whether you retain and flower the central bud or one of its wing buds, or whether you take the top of the stem out entirely and flower on a lower shoot. If you are trying to get showable flowers over several weekends, you need to flower a variety of different sized buds to ensure a reasonable number of blooms from which to select each weekend.

When selecting vegetables for exhibition many, such as peas, beans, tomatoes and cucumbers are visible and can be selected on the plant. If anything needs to be matched for size, be it length or girth, it is possible to pick some a few days early and keep in the fridge waiting for others to reach the required size. Root crops such as carrots, parsnips and potatoes cause more of a problem. You only know what they are like after they have been harvested, whether slugs and other pests have been at work, or even careless harvesting has caused damage. A large harvest can be required for each show.

With exhibition produce size isn't everything. The Royal Horticultural Society and all the specialist societies issue judging rules and advice to exhibitors. More points are usually allocated for condition and uniformity than size. Competition can be intense.

I hope that some of you reading this and who have tried their hand at growing this year, will be encouraged to enter the local shows next year, which will be much needed to keep them alive, and even if you don't enter the show, try visiting for an interesting and educational afternoon out with the children or grandchildren. There is usually some good tea and cake on offer too!

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## **GREAT BROMLEY VILLAGE HALL**

As part of the gradual lifting of COVID 19 restrictions by HM Government, permission was given for village and community halls in England to open with effect from 4th July, subject to some limitations on use. Following a deep clean of the premises and the implementation of the findings of a COVID 19 risk assessment, our village hall opened again on 6th July for certain permitted activities. At the time of writing, the majority of activities routinely undertaken by hirers in the hall are still prohibited by law and it is clear that for several other users there is no desire to return to a normal routine until early autumn.

The hall is now available for hire but with several restrictions in place. To enable the social distancing guidelines to be met, the Main Hall and kitchen only are available for hire until further notice and all seating will be on plastic chairs. A one-way circuit is operational in the building, with entry via the front (main) entrance only. Hirers are advised to monitor carefully future HM Government announcements regarding restrictions which are to be lifted, or conversely measures which may be reimposed in this area due to a resurgence of the virus. Advice on which user activities are currently allowed may be obtained from Jackie Lear (07543974751) or from me.

Given that small meetings can now take place, it is timely to hold the delayed 2020 Village Hall AGM which will take place on Tuesday 15th September commencing at 7pm in the Main Hall. All parishioners are welcome to attend the AGM which reports on the past year and looks forward to the next. This is your opportunity to provide feedback in person on the facilities in our village hall and the way it is organised and managed.

The AGM is also your opportunity to volunteer to assist with the management of the village hall, either as an elected trustee, co-opted trustee or as a 'friend' of the hall. There are currently vacancies on the management committee (the trustees) and my colleagues and I would really welcome 'new blood' onto the committee to help with the strategic and day-to-day running of the hall. No particular skills are required, however a desire to help our fine community facility to flourish and willingness to get stuck in and take on a non-onerous management responsibility would make the role more meaningful and much more enjoyable. We have fun as trustees and are proud to be responsible for the village hall and its lovely grounds. If you are interested in joining us on the committee please contact me for further information. The deadline for nominations is 10th September.

Although several forthcoming events in the hall have been cancelled due to the ongoing restrictions, two which remain firmly in the calendar are: Mr Bead's annual visit to the hall with his vast selection of jewellery-making materials on Sun 20th September; and an Antiques Fair organised by Nigel Dyson on Sunday 27th September. Both of these events will be advertised locally nearer the time.

The Parish Council was able to have a face to face meeting on 8th July. Under the Local Government Association advice there was a paragraph which stated if a local council had an identified need to hold a physical meeting, they could consider holding a meeting. I decided there was an identified need the Hamilton Lodge development was on the agenda. This development is one of the largest developments in the village for a long time and it was felt by some councillors, in view of the local interest, a number of residents may attend the meeting which could have resulted in a problem with social distancing in the Village Hall. The meeting was moved to the Grain Barn at Park Farm, information was placed on social media and noticeboards advising residents of the change of venue. The barn was sufficiently large enough to have social distancing and

There were five residents present at the meeting. Representatives from the development company were also in attendance and provided a briefing and answered councillors' and residents' questions. The representative stated the open space and village green would be gifted to the village at the completion of the development together with funding to maintain it.

there was a flow of fresh air.

Members felt the entrance and exit to the site was a problem. It was agreed that I would make contact with our County Councillor to arrange a site meeting along with ECC Highways, the developer and myself to discuss our suggestions and available options. We all felt a reduction in the speed limit to 30mph and possibly a mini roundabout

would assist. Our concerns were not just the entrance but the close proximity of the Village Hall entrances.

We also agreed representation be made to TDC Housing department to reduce the amount of houses proposed for the site as TDC required more affordable houses. The developers agreed with the Parish Council over this course of action.

It was suggested by the Council that the new development opposite the Court House should be named "Little Paddocks". The developers and TDC have accepted our suggestion and a consultation is underway.

Several local residents have called on me and taken some recycling boxes. I do still have a few left which are available to residents, free of charge.

It appears the lockdown measures are being eased. Hopefully our village cricket team will be back in action soon, and our two public houses will be able to reopen.

It appears the Corbeau Seats car rally in parts of our village may well take place again next year. We intend to ask one of the organisers to attend a Parish Council meeting.

Our two village handymen have continued their excellent work and are keeping the village in very good condition. The flower tubs this year are looking verv colourful.

Budgens are stopping their shopping collection service on 31st July. David Hardy and family are also stopping their service as there is no longer any call for it.

It was amazing how Florence Nightingale looked like Queen Victoria when she got older. I am looking to have another BBQ at the beginning of August if the weather holds, I will keep you informed.

I keep forgetting to thank those of you who gave us plants of flowers and vegetables. They are all growing and our residents veg patch looks great, but the weeds are still winning. I'm sorry but we only have limited time that we can devote to gardening. Normally one or two of my volunteers would have been out weeding and helping with all that is needed to keep everything going. Once we are fully open and we can get our volunteers back in the home, I can see me organising a big clear and weed party, many hands make light work and all that, but 10 people weeding for 2 hours against one person for 2 hours a week - you gardeners don't need to work that out with the lovely sunny days and the rain in the evening.

When we open to volunteers again I will let you know.

I talk about volunteering a lot and I can't say how important they are to our home and how everyone feels what a great job they do. We have all missed them walking around the home, we also have a dog who visits and everyone has missed him, I think some have missed Benson (the dog) more than their family, he is a

small cross breed poodle/jack russell who just waits until someone is able to lift him onto a lap for a cuddle. He has been coming in since he was a puppy and never once jumped up onto a lap, but he has made a mess of a couple of foam dice that we use in a game we play.

Volunteering is one of the great things in life, all the Parish councillors are volunteers, as are a lot of other organizations who rely on their support to help run all types of things, scouts, brownies, D o E awards, we all benefit from people who give their time freely without complaining. While I get paid by Leonard Cheshire, I have volunteered in my home village. ## HAMILTON LODGE UPDATE

As agreed at our last Parish Council meeting, along with ECC Cllr Guglielmi I met representatives from Hamilton Lodge, together with an ECC Highways officer, Chris Stoneham, at the entrance to Hamilton Lodge during July.

There was a very informative discussion regarding the entrance and the number of properties.

I explained the Parish Council would prefer a better/safer entrance to the site. Chris Stoneham was very receptive to the idea of a small roundabout being located near to the entrance and a traffic management plan would also include an entrance to the village hall. The village hall car park could be laid with tarmac and generally made much better. Full details to be supplied for discussion at a future Parish Council meeting.

Regarding the number of properties, the developers are receptive to reducing the number. This would entail a discussion with TDC planners and housing department. I made it very clear the number of houses needs to be reduced. Cllr Guglielmi suggested arranging a meeting with Cllr Paul Honeywood, TDC Portfolio Holder for Housing.

I would like to thank Cllr Gugliemi for his help and assistance in arranging this meeting and the discussion that took place regarding both items.

## OBITUARY - ANN FAIRLEY 12th March 1935 - 22nd May 2020

Ann Fairley (nee Seldon) was born at Home Farm, Little Gaddesden, near Berkhamsted in Hertfordshire. Her father was a Chartered Surveyor and Land Agent who managed 2,000 acres for Sir William Cooper. As Berkhamsted was close to Luton and Watford, which were subject to German bombing during the war, Ann and her brother Richard were moved to stay with their Aunt near Liskeard in Cornwall for safety. It was there that Ann developed her love for animals and learnt the fundamentals of milking and pig keeping. When the danger of bombing had receded, the family returned to Berkhamsted.

When the Cooper estate was sold her father worked for Strutt and Parker and subsequently for the Ministry of Agriculture. The family moved to the Old Rectory at Faulkbourne near Witham and in 1948 to Collingwood Road in Witham. Ann attended St



Ann's School in Chelmsford and thereafter St Phillips Priory. These were Catholic schools, chosen for their quality, although Ann was a devout Anglican all her life.

Ann found employment at Lloyds Bank in Witham and became involved in the Witham Young Farmers' Club. The Club kept pigs for fattening behind Freebourne Farm in Witham High Street and there was a rota for members of the club to take turns to feed them. Ann arriving at the bank having just given eight pigs their breakfast caused quite some amusement.

In those days many of the Essex Young Farmers Clubs held dances and it was at a Scottish Dance at Grange Farm, Coggeshall that Ann met Henry, who farmed there. He already had two dancing companions, one for ballroom and one for Scottish, but it was Ann he fell for. They were engaged in May 1958 and married in the November at St Nicholas, Witham, where Ann had sung for years in the choir. They had so much in common and her love of animals and farming helped them to 61 years of happy marriage.

They had three young children, Margaret, Elizabeth and Andrew, when they moved to Park Farm, Great Bromley in 1966. They remembered arriving in the village to a warm welcome, with a visit from neighbouring farmer Dick Hayward who soon roped Henry into the Parish Council to save Hare Green Playing Field, and Reverend James Ransom, who wanted to be sure they would send their children to St George's C of E primary school, which they did.

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Mrs Joan Landon had heard that Ann had been a Guide Commissioner in Witham and lost no time in getting her involved with the Girl Guides here. Another visitor was Mrs Lorna Brown who soon had Ann on the Meals-on-Wheels rota. Henry would help load the metal container, with hot charcoals in the base, into the car and she would drive around delivering meals with her children, until each was old enough to start school.

In 1967 there was tragedy when she lost a fourth child at full term. It took a long time to get over this sadness, greatly helped by the peace and solitude she found at Saint Mary's Church in Little Bromley.

When Ann was 17, her father had died from a heart condition, which meant the bereaved family could not pay the mortgage, moved into a council house, and knew hard times. (They didn't have a phone so Ann could only arrange dates with Henry from the bank.) That was one reason she was always quick to help others who needed a hand. This ranged from simple acts of kindness, to giving lifts and helping serve tea at the Friendship Club, to being a trustee on the Poorlands Charity for over 30 years. A sitting free tenant at the farm would cycle to The Bricklayers in Little Bentley on a Saturday, and Ann worried so much about him getting home over the main Harwich Road, at his great age, that she insisted on driving him there and fetching him again at closing time.

Church was a very significant part of her life. She had Henry attending more than he ever had before and steered her children on that path where she could. Ann was on the Parochial Church Council for many years and, with Henry, organised the distribution of the Bromley Messenger magazine for three decades. She was a long-serving church warden at both Great and Little Bromley and then a founder member and treasurer of the Friends of Little Bromley Church. When the Parish was interregnum, the priest came from Colchester and Ann gladly gave him breakfast between the morning services. He said he would like to go outside to smoke his pipe, but Ann loved the smell of pipe tobacco and insisted he should stay indoors.

She loved the farming life, and adored all the animals on the farm, and got involved as necessary, including castrating piglets. She always had a Jack Russell dog and kept geese as pets. One time a dance friend told her about a peacock that had turned up in Colchester where its calls annoyed some townfolk who wanted it culled. It was enticed into a garage with digestive biscuits and Ann drove home with a peacock as her passenger! The bird enjoyed several happy years at the farm until a fox took it.

Ann had a great many interests and activities and joined the Great Bromley WI in the 1980s. She loved flower arranging and, before she was married, she had won prizes for this at the Essex Show, and later made countless arrangements from her own garden to decorate the churches. One of her proudest achievements, following several years as Secretary, was to become President of the Colchester Caledonian Society where she was delighted to donate the surplus funds to charity each year. The one thing she would not do was politics. Whenever

Henry came home from a frustrating Council meeting, and asked for "more than a double" of Scotch, she would chuckle and say, "And you wonder why I don't wish to get involved?"

Ann always looked for the good in people and would never dwell on the bad. That does not mean she didn't get irritated with people at times. One winter she clambered over a grassy bank to avoid a snowed in path, to deliver a hot meal to a person who then moaned, "I was supposed to have my lunch at 12 sharp." Henry heard all about that when she got home!



Everything Ann did was with good humour and enthusiasm. A farmer's wife through and through, she was involved in all aspects of village life and was a loving and supportive mother to her children and a doting grandmother.

In recent times Ann suffered painful feet and legs that curtailed such an active life, and she prayed for an end from the onset of her dementia. Her prayers were answered with a quick release to meet her maker.

The family intend to hold a memorial service for Ann when such gatherings are permitted.

**Vacancy -** Our Vicar, Revd Canon Simon Heron, has at last been allowed to leave for his new post at Cheltenham, and we wish him well.

There is now a 'Vacancy' and the PCCs of the Benefice of Lawford, The Bromleys, and Little Bentley had a zoom meeting with the Bishop and Archdeacon on July 2nd. We were already aware that the Diocese of Chelmsford was in financial difficulty even before coronavirus struck. We were not surprised to hear that the Lawford post will not be filled, but we were told that the second Harwich post will not be filled either. This means a reduction from 6 to 4 stipendiary posts in the Harwich Deanery. We don't know yet how the parishes will be re-grouped. The churchwardens of our three parishes are meeting regularly to plan for the vacancy over the next few months and for the future.

**Revd Canon Stephen Carter -** Canon Stephen recently retired to Lawford and has kindly offered to help with services in the benefice. We gave him a distanced but very warm St George's welcome at the Parish Eucharist on July 26th.
