BIG BANGS!

Newcomers to the area ask what the big bangs are that can be heard at times when the wind is right. Being a Garrison town, Colchester has seen its share of explosions and gunfire on the ranges along the River Colne. The bigger bangs these days tend to carry all the way from the Shoeburyness ranges on the Thames estuary, which is a major MOD weapons testing site and also used to dispose of old ordnance.

My friend Ivan Arthey told me about explosions from the other direction, Bramble Island on the coast near Great Oakley. He remembers one day, the 7th November 1950, when he was a teenager at work on a building job in Thorrington. There was a huge bang and the building shook, and his boss told him he reckoned it was from Bramble Island, some 12 miles away. The papers the next day revealed that an explosion occurred in a mixing house of the explosives factory at Bramble Island, resulting in 'the death of three men, a fourth missing, and 25 others injured'.

Another friend, Beryl Tite, was in the sugar beet fields that day with her mother. Young Beryl shook the earth off and then her mother topped and tailed them into a heap for collection. The women in the fields were knocked off their feet by the explosion, but they soon jumped up and went running up the road to the factory, where many of them had their menfolk working. The factory was a very large employer in the area, and they ran a works bus from Harwich in those days.

That incident was the last big one, but Beryl says there were smaller

accidents and deaths since then, one of them being on 3rd July, 1956. The different parts of the works were separated by distance and the factory buildings were sunk into the grounds with earth banks around, so that the whole lot would not go up when there was an incident. (How tragic that they didn't think about such things in Beirut.) A web search reveals: 'Explosion of Nitro-Glycerine occurred in the Final Washing House of the Factory of the Explosives and Chemical Products Limited, at Bramble Island on the 11th March, 1913.'

'Dr. Wilson Baldwin was the assistant works manager in November 1942, when there was an explosion that killed two people. After the blast, Dr. Baldwin fought heroically to limit the damage to the premises. He climbed up to a smouldering roof above an 1,800lb vat of gelignite and doused the flames, thereby preventing more carnage. For his bravery, Baldwin was awarded the Edward Medal (EM): a decoration which was translated to the George Cross in 1971 when the EM was phased out.'

Public records also note 'Explosives and Detonators missing at transfer (1974).'

Today, Bramble Island is home to EPC-UK Ltd, and still involved with chemicals and explosives, which means this section of the very pretty area surrounding Hamford Water is closed to the public.

IN THE GARDEN WITH ANDY & JUDY

As we contemplate October, the days shorten and evenings lengthen. Many will start to get the 'winter blues' but there is still plenty to do in the garden and we can all enjoy the deep rich autumnal colours and the low weaker sunshine which enriches our surroundings at this time of year. Each season has its wonders and we should seek them whenever we can. However small or large your garden might be, the routines of weeding, hoeing and mowing continue (yes, I know I am repeating myself), with a greater emphasis now on pruning and generally tidying up the garden.

October is the time to prepare for planting bare root fruit trees and roses in November. Bare root plants are generally cheaper than the pot grown varieties that you can purchase earlier in the year and local garden centres, such as Deans, and specialists nurseries such as Ken Muir (fruit trees) and Cants (roses) will have good stocks to choose from as well as lots of good advice to go with them. Think about what you want now. Setting the positions for the new plants and digging the bed over now means digging the planting holes will be less onerous when the plants arrive and you won't have to 'heel them in' to a temporary position.

Planting holes need to accommodate the expected spread of the roots on the plants and be deep enough to plant at the same depth as previously grown by the supplier. All good nurseries will include detailed planting instructions.

Unless you have very good soil the holes should be backfilled with a 50/50 mix of the original soil and some proprietary compost. If you have very

poor soil do not be tempted to plant in total proprietary compost. It could form a sump, waterlogging the roots and potentially drowning them. Other than pond or bog/marginal plants they need water and oxygen at the roots to thrive. Remember to break up the bottom of the planting holes to allow roots to move out of the planting holes. The incorporation of fertiliser in the planting holes should be left until the actual planting as you can then ensure it does not come into contact with the roots.

If you are planting a rose in soil that has had roses growing in it in the last 6 years the soil needs changing to a depth of 37cm or more and replacing with topsoil that has not grown roses. If it is not possible to replace the soil you can try using a 'Jeyes' fluid drench. The removed soil is good to grow any other plants but not roses. The use of a Mycorrhizal fungi product to encourage root growth is beneficial for all planting.

Whilst much of your plant debris from the autumn tidying can safely be composted there is some that should either be burnt or taken to the local waste disposal site. Generally composting material needs to be free of weed seeds, perennial weeds and anything that may start growing again that you do not want. It should also be disease and pest free. Personally, I always exclude potato and onion material and rose prunings because of the thickness of stems and the risk of harbouring blackspot fungus.

We hope you continue to enjoy your gardening, and suspect we may be in for a fair bit more sunshine to sustain us over the coming months.

The Parish Council has submitted its consultation regarding the 2021 Corbeau Seats Car Rally. We have highlighted several comments made by residents regarding safety concerns. We have also invited the organiser to attend a Parish Council meeting prior to the rally taking place to ensure he has accepted our views.

Motorcyclists are causing a speed problem on some Wednesday evenings on some of our roads. The Parish Council agreed to write to Inspector Lily Benbow, District Commander, requesting police attention to try to slow down the motorcyclists.

A resident has contacted the Parish Council requesting consideration be given for a pavement to be constructed along Frating Road to its junction with Harwich Road. We have agreed to support and forward the request onto

Essex County Council via our County Councillor. The Parish Council agreed the road noise from the A120 is affecting parts of the village. We agreed to contact Sir Bernard Jenkin and Cllr Carlo Guglielmi to request a noise survey be carried out.

We were informed County Broadband have reached full capacity for our area on its existing wireless system and cannot accept any further applications until its fibre broadband is operational. There have been a couple of fly tipping instances reported, TDC have been informed and requested to deal with the problem.

Covid-19 is still with us and we should all be aware of social distancing otherwise we could all be back in another lockdown. Please look out for your neighbours, especially if they are elderly.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Spotted a suspicious email?

What is phishing and how does it work?

You wouldn't let a thief enter your home, but what if the thief was masquerading as someone familiar, such as a postman, and tricked you into opening the door? Phishing works in a similar way - criminals use legitimate looking messages and websites to trick people into opening the doors to their personal data, giving up logins, passwords or even payment details. That information can then be used to commit fraud and cyber crime.

How big is the problem?

Phishing attacks are a common security challenge that both individuals and businesses across the UK face on a regular basis. The National Cyber Security Centre's Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS) received over 1.7M reports from the public between April and August 2020, with the most commonly faked brands being TV Licensing, HMRC and GOV.UK.

How can you protect yourself from phishing scams?

Many phishing scams started with a message out of the blue. Whether it's an email asking you to "verify" account information, or a text message claiming to be from your bank, the goal of a phishing attack is usually the same – to trick you into revealing personal and financial information. Criminals are experts at impersonation and they're constantly getting better at creating fake emails and texts that look like the real thing.

Here's some simple advice you can follow when it comes to dealing with phishing scams:

1. Your bank, or any other official organisation, won't ask you to share personal information over email or text.

If you need to check that it's a genuine message, call them directly. Don't use the contact details in the email, but visit the official website instead.

- 2. If you have received an email which you're not quite sure about, forward it to the Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS): report@phishing.gov.uk.
- 3. Received a text message you're not quite sure about? Maybe it's asking you to "verify" personal or financial details, such as a banking password? You can report suspicious text messages by forwarding them to 7726.
- 4. If you've lost money or provided personal information as a result of a phishing email, notify your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud: www.actionfraud.police.uk
- 5. For more simple tips on how to protect yourself online, visit: www.actionfraud.police.uk/cybercrime

RURAL CRIME PREVENTION



HARE COURSING - WHAT SHOULD YOU DO?

CALL THE POLICE:

Inform them of your suspicions. Give an accurate location use What3Words* for describing location as the police officers attending may not be familiar with your land.

GET VEHICLE DETAILS:

Note the make, model and colour of all vehicles involved. If you can take index numbers without approaching them, do so.

DESCRIPTIONS:

How many persons in a vehicle, how many dogs - note any distinctive features of those involved. If you can safely photograph them, do so.

NOTE THEIR ACTIONS:

What are they doing that shows they are coursing? For example, are the dogs running and turning together?

DAMAGE:

Inform of any damage such as damage to access gate, damage to crops.

GIVE A STATEMENT TO THE POLICE:

Be prepared to support a prosecution by cooperating with the police investigation, and keep any notes.




















THE DEDHAM EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION

The Council held the September meeting via Zoom again as the new rule of six still prevents holding the Council meeting in public.

The Village sign has been repainted and we are expecting it to be delivered in the next few days. The new post and metal shoe are ready and hopefully everything will be fitted and replaced in the near future.

The Council has had a request from a resident to explore the possibility of reopening the redundant footpaths around the Village. The Council has decided to seek the views of residents to see if this is something they would like to pursue. Please email the Council with your comments and views on this.

A reminder that we are still looking for a new footpath warden. If this is something you would like to help us with, then again please email us.

The Council has had the quotes in for the possibility of positioning a Defibrillator in the car park in Shop Road but, with the work required, this has proved to be more expensive than anticipated. As such, we will explore other location options.

The next meeting of the Council will be on the 19th November at 7.30pm. At the moment it is a planned Zoom meeting but if the situation changes before then we will post details on the website.

LETTER - BROADBAND

We have had a couple of weeks of disruption in Meadow Close where County Broadband (CB) have been installing fibre cables for broadband. A few months ago some men started marking out the site for huge telegraph poles... which would have very much dominated the bungalows in the Close when all other services run underground. I am very glad that I immediately raised the issue with our Broadband champions, Neil Skinner & Martin Frostick, and they made suitable enquiries and pleas. In due course Neil reported, "There is a minimum height for wires crossing the road and as the properties are all bungalows, the wires have to come from a higher location which is why the poles would be so tall. After you pointed out that all existing services are underground they stopped work immediately. Subsequent investigations have revealed that the BT (Openreach) cabling was laid

underground and simply concreted over, without using the usual ducting. So CB took the decision to lay their own ducting to minimise the impact on the environment, much to their credit." So the CB contractors have been digging up our worn-out pavements There have been a couple of issues raised by neighbours, which I believe CB have addressed to everybody's satisfaction, but I have to say in my experience the workers here have been very polite, cheerful, helpful and efficient, and doing a good job. They always seemed very happy to move or make a way when someone needed to have access. Like many in the village, I am looking forward to being connected. My only gripe is that it would have been so nice for Essex Highways to take the opportunity to resurface the other half of these crumbling pavements at the same time!
