# **GREAT BROMLEY VILLAGE HALL**



The accounts examiner (informal auditor) appointment for the village hall is currently vacant and the village hall trustees are seeking someone who is prepared to fill this essential

volunteer post. It is not a particularly onerous duty; the post holder reviews the finalised End of Year accounts in mid-April to ensure that they accurately reflect the village hall finances and also checks that a satisfactory financial control system is in place at the village hall. There are no ongoing commitments during the rest of the year.

No formal qualifications are required to undertake this role but the incumbent needs to be familiar with basic accounting and book keeping. The village hall accounts are based on the commercial Quickbooks accounting package which also produces the end of year financial summaries.

The village hall has been forced to close again due to the current Covid 19 restrictions and will not re-open until the middle of February at the earliest. Thankfully, grant funding from HM Government has maintained a small income stream for the hall during the Covid 19 closure periods and trustees are hopeful that when the pandemic is over there will be no long term damage to the finances or the viability of our community facility.

# IN THE GARDEN WITH ANDY & JUDY

We can only hope our advice for the garden is better than our prediction for being out of the second lockdown and having a near normal Christmas. We will not make any further predictions about the virus and will stick to gardening. Hopefully you all managed to get some enjoyment over Christmas and are looking forward to better times in 2021.

By now, some of us will possibly both have made and broken some of our New Year resolutions. One of mine was not to try and save money by buying cheap permanent markers. Having done so last year I found that in the autumn when lifting chrysanthemum stools and dahlia tubers that the 'permanent' ink was faded and the name largely unreadable. For most annual crops this is not a great problem but for things you are going to propagate from it is vital not to misidentify, otherwise, you will find out at flowering time that the blooms are not what you intended to grow. Better to use a pencil to mark the labels rather than use cheap pens.

The weather has not been very kind to those of us who have digging to do. The wet surface and cold temperatures are not conducive to working outside. Fortunately, we have had several jobs in the potting shed and greenhouse that have been pleasant to do. For example, some of the Chrysanthemum stools that were boxed up and kept in a cold frame have now been moved into the greenhouse on a thermostatically controlled heat mat to produce cutting material. These should be ready for taking and rooting in late January/early February. These will be for dis-budded varieties (only one bloom per stem). They are rooted in seed trays in a seed

compost with added perlite to aid drainage. The electric propagator is set at 19C and will be shaded with white plastic on sunny days. The spray varieties will be moved into the greenhouse in early February to enable cuttings to be taken in late February/ early March. Sprays flower in a shorter time than disbuds so we delay the rooting to get the flowers in their best condition from mid-august onwards which coincides with the dates of local flower shows.

Apologies to those who have no interest in Chrysanthemums.

It is easy to assume the garden is dormant at this time of year but in truth it is not as the spring bulbs are starting to emerge, worms are active in the soil and the spring flowering plants are moving forward. It is worth reminding all who have hedges that under the Wildlife and Countryside Act it is an offence to disturb nesting birds so get any remaining pruning finished as soon as possible. Although for protected hedges pruning from 1 March to 1 September is banned, do always check before you start in case of any early and late nesters. You can get caught out. If in doubt I suggest you look up the legislation. The RSPB has some clear explanations.

Remember there was always an advantage in growing your own vegetables, as you know what, if any, chemicals have been used. Now additionally, you know who has handled the food before you eat it. So, make use of any inclement weather to obtain any new seeds and plug plants you need. There are still lots of online offers about and don't forget to check if local suppliers can provide what you need to help the local economy.

# REMEMBERING ALAN (1941 - 2020) AND WALTER SEABORN (1907-1996)

Alan Seaborn died on 19<sup>th</sup> May last year, and as he had moved away from the village long ago and Covid-19 meant a limited funeral, I thought I would pay tribute to him here, and his father, with a collection of memories and local knowledge as I have heard it.

I had traced Alan and his wife Ann via the phonebook in 2014 when we met up for a delightful chat. Ann's cousin is Clive Branch, of Branches Shop (Essex Stores) that was in Hare Green, so I was also able to get in touch with Clive in Felixstowe.

I remember Alan's father, Walter Seaborn, as he used to drive the primary school bus from the south of the village. He didn't say a lot but always let us on the bus with a smile. He was known locally as "Wide awake Walter". I think his economy with words lead some to believe he wasn't very sociable.

Seaborn was a well-known name in the villages of Great Bromley and Ardleigh as they owned or tenanted a number of farms such as Fountains, Wick, Red Gate and Windy and served on the Parish Councils.

George Seaborn, son of Firmin Seaborn, went to London as a young man and was a draper's assistant in Marylebone where he met his wife Edith. They came back to Great Bromley to Carringtons Farm where their son Walter was born and then moved to Fountains Farm. Walter went to school at Great Bromley in 1912 and then went to the Technical School before working with his father on the farm. Walter had one sister, Blanche born in 1912, who married Peter Strangeways Morton. Peter came to buy Fountains farm, met Blanche during the viewing, and they got married. He became a great friend of Walter with their mutual interest in photography. Walter's other friends in the village, according to Alan's memory, were Keith Page who went into the RAF, Malcolm Branch who was Clive's older brother, and Frank Marvin, who was motorbike crazy and always wore a red beret instead of a helmet. Those two used to go rabbit shooting with .22 rifles on the Hayward and Pirie farms.

Walter married Alice Emily Jaggard from Ardleigh. There was a lot of friction with his parents over that pairing, so Walter left the farm and went to work in Colchester as an engineer. This was the foundation for him going into the vehicle repair business and setting up the Black Boy garage on the crossroads, now known as Selectacars. He started off with four poles and a tarpaulin sheet to work under, then built the garage and a house to live in. Walter had to borrow money off his father to set everything up, and apparently there was a legal battle at a later date when his father tried to take the business off him! Peter Morton helped reconcile Walter with his father later on.

Walter told a story of how one dark night during the war he heard some noises outside near the garage forecourt, so he got his gun and went out. He pointed his gun at a man and told him to put his hands up or he would shoot. It turned out to be the local copper, who nearly had a heart attack! Walter had to take him inside to give him some brandy, where the policeman agreed it was his own fault for creeping around.

Mrs Bervl Hurst remembers that Walter was very keen on photography, but didn't usually let anyone look at them. (I do possess some of his, as he took colour slides for my parents' wedding in 1955.) Also, he was notoriously slow with paperwork. Geoffrey Hurst took their car in for a gearbox repair, which was all fixed fine, and put money aside to pay for it. The bill never came, so eventually Geoff went to the garage and offered Walter some money and asked if that would cover it. Walter took it and nothing more was ever said, so presumably it was about right!

Alan was born in Great Bromley and went to the primary school where he was friends with Geoffrey Webber, Arthur Cole (the son of the policeman), and Clive Branch. Alan went on to Manningtree School and then the Technical College in Colchester. When he went along with Walter for his interview, they asked what he was interested in. Alan said electronics, but they told him there was no future in that, and suggested he studied chemistry!

His friend Clive had a cousin from Sudbury called Ann. She had been the Carnival Queen the day Clive introduced her to Alan. They got on well and began courting, until one day in Colchester Alan dropped to his knee. They were married in 1960, and initially they lived with his parents. Alan worked as a Lab Technician at the Tech for a few years until Ann spotted a job advert Essex Battalion Home Guard for an Industrial Chemist with a relatively new company call Koch-Light Laboratories that moved out to Haverhill from London. They resettled to Haverhill and Alan stayed with that company, through various changes and takeovers, for all his working life. He

enjoyed his work and in the 1970s went out to Cairo to organise supply of chemicals to research centres and universities out there

Walter sold his garage business in the mid sixties: he asked Alan if he minded, but he had no interest in it. After that point the local connection was gone. Walter and Alice retired to a nice house in Great Bentley, and when they were unable to look after a big place they moved up to Haverhill for their remaining years. It was with great sadness I learned from Alan that his father had decided to have a huge bonfire before moving from Great Bentley and most of his photographs were burnt, to save clutter prior to the move.

On Walter's mother's side, the Jaggards were a large family and well known in the area. not least for their parts in the Burnt Heath & Great Bromley Brass Band. Nathan Jaggard was a coal merchant, based in Station Road, Ardleigh. He and Annie had five children. Alice was the oldest, followed by a boy who died very young. Thomas (1912-1965) played the big drum in the band, Arthur (1920 - 23 August 1944) was an RAF volunteer who was killed in Singapore, and Albert (1917-6 February 1942) was a driver in the Roval Signals who died in Alexandria. (Alan wanted to visit the grave marker when he was working in Egypt, but didn't manage it.)

Another family casualty was Alice's first cousin called Fred who was in the 9<sup>th</sup> Volunteers. At the railway station there was a grain storage place where the Home Guard used to meet. On 28th October 1942 when Fred came off duty, for some reason he walked out of the hatch and fell to his death, aged 42. Finally in the wartime tragedies, the V1

bomb which hit Thatched Cottages, Harwich Road, Ardleigh on 27th September 1944 not only killed the Cheeseman family, but also Wilfred Jaggard, another relation.

Alan died just short of his 60<sup>th</sup> Wedding Anniversary. He and Ann had two sons, Robert and Simon. Ann is getting used to being on her own in these difficult times. Alan and Clive Branch used to phone each other almost every day for a gentle chinwag, and now it is Ann who chats to Clive a couple of times a week instead.

Fans of TV programmes such as "Who Do You Think You Are" will know the value of historic census data to family historians and genealogists, but data from the census impacts our lives every day, often without us even realising it.

Did you know that water companies use census data to anticipate peak water demand? Or that the NHS uses census data to plan a wide range of services such as hospitals and GP surgeries, mobile chiropodists and home support? Everything from schools to care home places are planned using census data to make sure that the needs of all age groups are met.

Every aspect of our lives is impacted by the census, so it is vital that everyone participates to ensure the best possible understanding of the structure and needs of our society.

By taking part, you can make sure that your community is represented and gets its share of public and other funding to ensure the provision of services now and in the future.

The next census official census date is Sunday 21st March 2021, but Census 2021 will be the first time that everyone will be able to complete the census online at any time from the beginning of March 2021.

Help will be available if you need it by phone, email or text. You will also be able to use web-chat or social media, or drop into a Covid-compliant Census Support Centre. Guidance will be available in a range of languages and accessible formats, and the paper option will still be available if needed.

The census is run by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) which operates completely independently of government and of any private sector interests.

All information submitted for the census is stored securely and anonymised. No personal data is ever sold nor is it shared with any other government department.

Information from the census is only released after 100 years when your descendants may be tracing their own family history.

### Covid-19 Vaccinations

The Covid-19 vaccination programme has now commenced and patients are currently being booked to have this at the Fryatt Hospital in Harwich. Patients will only be able to book an appointment for this once they have received an invite which will either be by text message or a telephone call if you do not have a mobile number registered on your record.

Can we please request that patients help us by not contacting the Surgery to ask when they will receive an invite for their vaccination. We can assure you that you will be contacted at the appropriate time.

### Prescription Requests

In order to deal with the high demand of prescription requests we receive every day we ask that patients allow 3 working days (not counting Saturday or Sunday) for us to process their requests. You can make a request for your prescription up to 10 days before you are due to start taking your medication to ensure you do not run out.

Please remember that we do not take prescription requests over the telephone as this is unsafe, so please do not ask as we will be unable to do this. You can request your prescription in writing as follows: by email to <u>holliesprescriptions@nhs.net</u> and you will receive an automatic response confirming receipt of your email, via the Great Bentley Surgery website or by putting a request in the box just inside the main entrance. Once your request has been received at the Surgery then the prescription will be ready for collection at your nominated Pharmacy in 3 working days. Please do not contact the Surgery to check if the prescription has been issued. If you have allowed 3 working days then you will need to check with your nominated Pharmacy that your medication is ready to collect.

For patients requesting their medication is delivered to them at home rather than contacting the Surgery about this you will need to speak to your nominated Pharmacy to see if they are able to do this for you.

### Door Entry Intercom System

We have recently had a door entry intercom system fitted on our main entrance door in order to help us monitor the footfall coming into the Surgery. With this new system can you please be mindful when entering or leaving the Surgery to ensure that you respect the social distancing rules and help to keep everyone safe.

### Surgery Training Afternoon

Along with all other surgeries in the area we will be shut from 12 noon on Wednesday, 25 February 2021 for staff training.
