GREAT BROMLEY VILLAGE HALL

The village hall remains closed due to the current Covid 19 restrictions and will not re-open until the current guidance from HM Government changes. The hall is being managed and cared for as usual despite the lockdown, albeit with fewer management committee meetings given the lack of usage and fewer discussion issues arising. It is hoped to hold the Annual General Meeting of the village hall as usual in May but if lockdown does not permit this the meeting will be held as soon as possible thereafter.

There are still vacancies on the management committee and if you are interested in joining the team to support our fine community venue into the future you would be most welcome. Please contact me for further details.

There have been no responses to the request in last month's magazine for someone to come forward as the village hall accounts examiner. The accounts have to be examined by a person independent of the management committee to satisfy the requirements of

the trust deed and the Charity
Commission. This informal audit post is
not onerous in a normal year (much
less this financial year when the hall
has been closed for much of the time),
taking someone familiar with simple
accounting/book keeping only a few
hours work in April. No formal
qualifications are required. The
accounts are prepared for examination
by our experienced treasurer utilising
the summaries printed by our
Quickbooks accounting package.

Should you be willing to assist the village hall committee with account examining or would like more information then please contact me by 15th March. A full briefing and as much advice as is required will be given. It would be a shame if the management committee has to pay for an auditor for the first time since the village hall trust was set up; the village hall has traditionally been a community facility run and supported by volunteers in the community.

CHURCH JOTTINGS...GREGORY AND SIMON STONE

Amongst the worshipping congregation of our village church in the mid 1600's were two brothers, Gregory and Simon Stone, and their respective families; the brothers being local farmers. In 1635, they emigrated to the New World. Sailing from Ipswich, in the ship "The Increase", the families landed in Massachusetts some three months later, they settled in Watertown where they carried on their farming activities. They prospered and multiplied and their descendants have spread

throughout the United States. In 1897 a 'Stone Association' was formed, and in 1904 the Association commissioned and installed the 'Stone Family Window' in the north side of St. George's Church.

So - when you next visit St. G's, be sure to search for the Stone Window and read all about the Stone family and their descendants who visit Great Bromley each year. (Covid permitting).

IN THE GARDEN WITH ANDY & JUDY

Now is a good time to reflect on what happened last year in the garden. It is a good idea, especially if your memory is like ours, to jot down your successes and failures as the year goes by.

With many new 'lockdown' gardeners trying their hand for the second year, I thought raised beds or 'square foot' gardening may be of interest. Search on-line for good articles and cheap second-hand copies of books or try our local charity shops when they re-open as they really need your support.

Raised beds can be of any length to suit your space but not wider than 1m so you can cultivate and harvest from a path on both long sides. With clay soil here, we have used raised beds extensively to increase the depth and quality of soil with excellent results. The 'square foot' gardening technique is a way of growing more intensively in a raised bed, ideal for small gardens or just small vegetable areas. It advocates dividing the raised bed, for example a 1m square into 9 squares, and planting something different in every square. It is possible to use most of the bed for most of the year with surprisingly good results but do your homework on the best plant combinations and how to look after them.

Having started the chrysanthemum cuttings in January, we started warming up the dahlia tubers which have been boxed up in sieved potting compost from last year's tomato pots. We box in cat litter trays with drainage holes drilled in the bottom. Cut the old stem down to about 25mm and leave the joint between the old stem and the tubers just above soil level. Take care not to over water whilst the tubers are

still waiting to sprout but do not let them dry out so much that they desiccate. We take cuttings to form new plants every year. The earlier shoots are very often hollow and extremely difficult to root so we cut them off and wait for the next flush which will be smaller, not hollow and easier to root. If you lifted your dahlias last autumn to replant the tubers this year, this is also a reasonable way to start them off, but don't do it too early because you will have to manage them in a frost free environment, until planting out in late May or early June, as the new shoots are more tender than the tubers

As we emerge from a very cold early February into hopefully some warmer March days, many of us will feel like doing something outside. Jobs for March might include pruning autumn fruiting raspberry canes, planting lily bulbs, feeding roses, tidying herbaceous perennials, deadheading winter bedding and pruning wisteria. A variety of seeds can be sown if you have the protection to aid germination and protect the seedlings. You can also plant out new potatoes but remember, the earlier you plant the more likely you are to need some frost protection for the halems. Earthing up as they emerge is usually enough but I recall we had to use fleece extensively for a few days last year. Similarly, you can start to 'force' rhubarb under a bucket or similar this month to provide early tender stalks, but only do this on established plants and until other rhubarb catches up and is ready to harvest. If you take too much the plant is weakened and will take a long time to recover.

LITTER ISSUES

COVID lockdown restricts many aspects of our life for very good reason but one angle that has remained 'open' is the opportunity to take daily exercise. Whether this was a continuum of the norm or a new venture brought on by COVID. I'm sure everybody has noted with disappointment and slight despair, the amount of litter occupying our roadsides, kerbs and hedge-lines. As a rural community, the sad truth is that this is not explained by an odd overflowing public bin or rubbish falling from refuse vehicles but individuals with little moral or green conscience, just throwing cans, snacks and other rubbish from their vehicles. In short, they use our Parish as their waste bin.....

It would be great, and better, if we could prick the conscience of those offenders or take confidence in their prosecution to eliminate that scourge at source but if we only do that, we run the risk of just admiring the problem rather than tackling it. To that end, GBPC wanted to flag to residents four things intended to help:

1. Raise public awareness of the problem; encourage the public to report instances of fly tipping to TDC. The link can be found on their website.

Response is normally pretty prompt

- 2. GBPC will be instructing the Parish maintenance team to perform litter picking in worst affected areas where pavements exist and the operation is safe for them to conduct
- 3. GBPC will be purchasing some litter picking kits; these will be held at distribution points and members of the public can borrow them to litter pick around their own road and property
- 4. GBPC will run organise group litter picks when COVID permits

On point 3, there has been a general movement in this direction with many local groups forming e.g. 'The Wivenhoe Wombles'. By equipping and promoting self-help at Parish level, it avoids any unnecessary bureaucracy, is COVID aware and seeks to mobilise a local response to a wider social problem.

As purchases of litter picking kit are made and distribution points confirmed, GBPC will release more details. Many thanks for your anticipated support in tackling a very real issue. Lots doing a little will really help.

From various conversations with friends it appears the vaccination process is moving forward at a good pace. Hopefully it will not be too long before everybody is vaccinated and we may be able to slowly move to the new normal.

Once the Parish Council is back to 'face to face' meetings we will be able to coopt to fill the vacancy on the council.

The main problem as I write this report seems to centre around the rainfall we are experiencing. Flooding is becoming more and more of a problem, is it the amount of rain? or is it the lack of maintenance to our infrastructure? or perhaps a bit of both. There have been "hot spots" of flooding in the village. It must be remembered the ditches are the responsibility of landowners to maintain them. I have been in contact with ECC Cllr Guglielmi, who is in turn in contact with ECC Highways, to come to Great Bromley and carry out a survey of our flooding areas. Also on some of the less used roads HGV's and farm vehicles sometimes drive over the verges which block the "grips" which will carry water from the roadway into the ditch.

One of the problems faced by landowners is the deplorable fly tipping that clogs up their ditches. The Parish Council has agreed to purchase some littler pickers and bags for litter. If any

resident would like to help keep the village tidy and would like a litter picker and bags please contact the clerk or myself. Our village handymen have been litter picking around the village. In one particular area, Parson Hill, they collected 14 BLACK BAGS of litter, from a ditch, including a carrier bag full of empty cider bottles. I can only hope that a person from outside the village is responsible.

As I mentioned previously the Parish Council is looking for sponsors to support our flower tubs to ensure the village looks its best during the summer.

County Broadband has assured me they will be connecting the village to their system this Spring. I understand they have now made contact with some residents with a view to connecting them to their system. We may all recall when they were trying to persuade us all to sign up with them we would be connected in the Spring, but that was 2020!! Let's all hope the wait is worth it and not another false dawn. We have had to endure a considerable amount of inconvenience caused by the installation of a large number of new poles, verges being dug up, and the mess caused, road diversions and closures.

The Covid-19 vaccination programme is now in full swing and we are working hard to invite our patients for their vaccinations as quickly as possible.

Can we please ask patients to help us by not contacting the Surgery to ask when you will receive your invitation for your vaccination. We are working through the Groups in strict order and can assure you that you will be contacted at the appropriate time.

If you are 65 or older and haven't received an invite to book your Covid-19 vaccination yet, you can arrange an appointment by either ringing 119 or by contacting the Surgery.

Repeat Prescriptions

In order to help our Prescription Clerks can we please ask that patients do not ring to check if a prescription has been issued. Please allow three working days after putting your request into the Surgery and contact your nominated Pharmacy who will be able to confirm if your medication is ready to collect.

Appointments at the Surgery

Due to social distancing as we only have limited room in our waiting area can we please ask that patients only arrive a couple of minutes before their appointment time.

Along with all other surgeries in the area we will be shut from 12 noon on Wednesday, 24 March 2021 for staff training.

COVID-19 vaccine scams

To protect yourself and your family members from fraud and criminals, remember the following points:

- → The vaccine is only available on the NHS and is free to people in priority groups, and the NHS will contact you when it is your turn. You will not be asked to pay for the vaccine.
- → The NHS will never ask you to press a button on your keypad or send a text to confirm you want the vaccine, and never ask for payment or for your bank details.
- → The NHS is not making house calls to deliver or discuss the vaccine.

If you receive a call you believe to be fraudulent, hang up. If you believe you have been the victim of fraud or identity theft you should report this directly to Action Fraud on **0300 123 2040**. Where the victim is vulnerable, and particularly if you are worried that someone has or might come to your house, report it to the Police online or by calling 101.

GREAT BROMLEY'S LATEST ARRIVALS...

This is the fourth year that the owl box has been in place positioned with easy visibility from the farmhouse on Primrose Farm. The past three years have seen the raising of a total of seven barn owl chicks, which have been measured and weighed by the owl expert usually in June and July. We have watched the activity of the parents hunting and feeding their family. But this year, after lots of discussion, we have fitted a camera inside the box. The boys actually fitted and set up a camera in a new box and replaced the existing box, making sure the nesting materials were transferred, to try to ensure the owls were not deterred to return. The box sat empty for only a few days and in the bitter snowy weather a pair of barn owls have been sheltering. We have the camera relaying back to a screen in the kitchen and we are constantly watching their every activity.

They are slightly different in sizing and the female is the larger, rounder with a patterned broad tail. The male is smaller with a more V-shaped back and pointed tail and back. Both are golden brown with grey markings. At the moment the female, who we have called Henrietta, is more active; she hunts more and is always the first out. The male, Henry, is often asleep, especially during the day. Henrietta sometimes doesn't come home in the day, so must be asleep elsewhere. They hunt around the farm, and live on a diet of voles, shrews, and sometimes small mammals. They are known to pair and mate for life

This week Henrietta brought back a vole to the box and they had a small domestic as she didn't share her food. They then seemed to ignore each other for the afternoon sitting both sides of

the box with their backs to each other and then she didn't come back that night!!!. It was one of the bitterly cold nights but she returned the following evening. This photo was taken April 2020 showing the box and this is last year's baby owl about 67 days of age.

These were the three babies from 2019. They were two females and a male and they were between 47 and 54 days of age.

Looking at the records the babies have been born from 14th April to 25th May, the eggs are incubated for about a month so we may have eggs as early as mid-March. We are hoping that with the camera in place we will be able to watch and follow this.

Below is the image we receive from the camera to the screen. I will keep you updated on their progress.
