IN THE GARDEN WITH ANDY & JUDY

Gardening became more popular during the pandemic and we know being outdoors is hugely beneficial to the wellbeing of people of all ages. Whilst for some people gardening during lockdown was only a temporary excursion, whether replanning the garden rather than taking a holiday for example, or trying their hand at flower and vegetable growing, these things helped them through a difficult time. We hope the legacy of their gardening activity will at least be the memory of an interest they dipped into, which they may return to in later life. For others it will be the start of an enduring hobby as long as their interest can be sustained and this is a great opportunity for the community to come together and help people, especially younger people, sustain their new hobbies.

The Ardleigh & District Horticultural Society, which meets at Ardleigh village hall on the second Thursday of the month, are experiencing greater numbers at their lectures this winter which indicates the garden revival is still underway. Why not try going along, the subject is not always gardening or may not seem to be of immediate interest, but you will gain exposure to many experienced gardeners, who are always welcoming to newcomers and go out of their way to help by sharing knowledge and advice. This can be a really good way for you sustain your interest. It is inexpensive and rewarding. There is also the Lawford & District Horticultural Society which meets every third Thursday of the month at the Ogilvie Hall. You will find both these societies have facebook pages where you can find all the information you need and Ardleigh's lectures are also listed on page 21 of the November Messenger.

Also, for children, time spent in the garden with parents, grandparents, friends and other family members is time 5

well spent to encourage a life time interest.

Above all, whether next year your garden will be a place of relaxation, exercise, or food and flower production, it should be a joyful experience. Sustaining a hobby can be as easy as not trying to do too much. Try something new or find a different way to do something that didn't work last year.

There's still time to give last minute hints for Christmas gifts or alternatively use any vouchers you receive at Christmas. Perhaps think about the tools you have. Having the wrong equipment can be demoralising but the right equipment can be incredibly efficient. Is the fork and spade you are using the right size and weight for you? There are many types and sizes of hoe. Our preference is to use a swoe, which we find easier to use then a dutch hoe or draw hoe. We also use a small onion hoe for close up work around plants. It is worth researching the types and uses for all gardening tools online or by talking to other gardeners as this might just make the difference you need for next year.

If not already done, don't forget to clean up the greenhouse, coldframes and polytunnels to remove accumulated rubbish and to remove any pests left from the previous crops. Check any heaters, soilwarming cables, propagators etc so you are ready for next year.

Give a tidy up to perennials but leave some seed heads for wildlife, and if you can, leave a few windfall apples and pears on the ground under hedges, or move them onto a bird table. These will be much appreciated by the birds and other wildlife

GREAT BROMLEY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The ladies of the Great Bromley WI enjoyed a superb talk at their November meeting – and the speaker was one of our own members too. Julie Titley, accompanied by her husband David, came to talk to us about TWAM – Tools with a Mission. This charity started in 1984 in Southend and now encompasses most of the country. Its aim is to get useful tools to five countries in Africa where they have the potential to change someone's life.

The Charity collects tools used in

farming, carpentry, building, mechanics, and sewing machines along with haberdashery items like buttons and zips and knitting needles. It refurbishes the tools and services sewing machines manual hand operated machines can be used in areas without electricity and creates trade kits to be sent out.

repurposing them and distributing them in Africa where they will be given a new lease of life. The receive donations from people who have lost their husband, have entire garages full of tools to sort out, and feel overwhelmed with the massive task ahead.

The Charity will drive to collect tools – and it will send a van round for larger donated items. Even knitting needles and crochet hooks, wool and buttons are welcomed, and will be sorted out into packs to take to Africa and change



Containers leave Felixstowe bound for South Africa where the containers are driven to Uganda, Zimbabwe, and Democratic Republic of Congo where the goods are sold at a low cost to people who apply for tools to work on a project, or to start a business. Sewing machines help local ladies to become seamstresses, make school uniforms and start their own businesses.

TWAMs efforts have so far, saved 250 tonnes of old tools from landfill,

Tools with a Mission is certainly a very worthy charity to support, so it's worth having a look around for those tools that you have been hanging on to for some reason – but find you no longer need them. I'm sure that someone in Africa will be very pleased to receive them.

I uploaded the November Messenger to the village website, and just two days later I had a call from Radio Essex, saying they were very interested in my Smiler Marshall article, and would like me to come on their Essex Quest show the following Sunday. I was delighted to do so.

Essex Quest is a Sunday morning show where presenters Liana Bridges (who is from Harwich) and Barry Lewis follow clues to find 3 different places in Essex. On Sunday 7th the show was running around Tendring, and these are the clues for the four destinations (the first being the starting point, village name only, the others being to a specific point).

Initial Clue: A big shark drove a luxury car

Clue 1: Find a peninsular, where boats can shelter from a waxing moon

Clue 2: James Herriot visited a once town of Kent, lest we forget this roll of honour

Clue 3: A fruit enclosure was pulled by reindeer, where Strictly is recorded

If you have solved clue 2 you would know that I was waiting with Ann at the Great Bromley War Memorial for the Radio Essex Van. Whilst I had been on the TV a few times before, both here and in New Zealand, this was the first time I had appeared on the Radio so I put on my best jacket and tie.

As I waited, a lady parked up in Church Meadow with a mini absolutely crammed full of bottles that she noisily threw in the bottle bank! I worried the location was not going to be ideal for a radio broadcast - but then she was gone and no further issues there.

At about noon we greeted Liana and Barry, the presenters, who were great fun - ever so friendly, jolly and relaxed. They admired our giant poppy, and then got me to tell them about Smiler and his story, and in particular I brought in his connection to the Crossman family who did so much for the village.

I had about six minutes to speak and a couple of minutes into it a friend came out from church, spotted Ann and was going to call out but she shh-ed him just in time, but it still put me off a little. Liana who is a brilliant natural presenter, said, "Oh it's the Vicar wondering why we're here!"

After my bit, the producer told us that a caller had asked to speak to Hugh – but Barry could not find a set of headphones that would work before they had to dash off to the next stop. So, I could relax!

We heard on the radio after the Quest had been completed that the caller spoke to the studio, a chap from Basildon who had helped care for Smiler in his last few years, he wanted to "correct" what I said - in fact just adding more bits that I could not possibly fit in to my slot, being his service in Ireland – and perhaps he stole my thunder! Never mind, it was good to get Great Bromley in the news.

The 1988 programme for Mother Goose stands out as it has super cartoon sketches of all the characters, and even all the adverts are hand-drawn in amusing fashion. Nigel tells me the uncredited artist was Glen Mitchell, who had roles in some of the pantos and was also one of those who worked on the scenery around that time.

BROMLEYS HISTORY IN OLD MAGAZINES

I am always delighted to receive enquires about our villages and the people who lived here. As you will see from the Radio Essex enquiry, it is nice to have it reaffirmed that the readership of the Messenger is far wider than just our two villages; it also reaches many foreign shores thanks to the wonders of the Internet.

Recently I have started to upload the whole magazine archive. I started with the few Church Magazine issues in my possession that were produced by Revd. James Ransom up until his sad death in 1976. Then there is a big gap to June 1985 for the final year of the Church Magazine, produced by Revd. Paul Davis and his wife Meriel. They persuaded the Parish Council to support a village magazine, which was to be named the Bromley Messenger, starting in June 1986.


For the Messenger I have uploaded up to 1991 at present, and hope to complete the gap in issues up to May

2004 over the coming months. These are text only documents, laboriously converted from paper copies, which means the words will be available for searching and is likely to generate more interest, enquiries and historical connections.

I would be very grateful indeed if any other old issues of the Church Magazine could be loaned to me for copying, and I am also on the look-out for old issues of Church News (Harwich Deanery magazine).

CHRISTMAS/NEW YEAR SURGERY OPENING HOURS The normal Surgery opening times are from 8.00 am to 6.30 pm Monday to Friday. Over the Christmas/New Year period the Surgery will be closed on Monday, 27 December 2020, Tuesday, 28 December and Monday, 3 January 2021.

PRESCRIPTIONS Please ensure you order your December prescriptions in time for Christmas. You can order these up to 14 days before they are due to ensure you don't run out over the Christmas period.

UPDATE ON THE COVID-19 BOOSTER/FLU VACCINATIONS We

are continuing to run Clinics for the Covid-19 boosters on a Saturday day morning. This is just a reminder that patients have to wait 6 months from their last (2nd) Covid vaccination before they are able to have their booster vaccination. The only exception to this is for patients who are immunesuppressed. For patients who have a booster vaccination booked as long as we have vaccine availability a flu jab can be given at the same time. We also have appointments on for patients who just need to book a flu jab and this can be organised by phoning a member of the reception team. If we are not able to offer an appointment for the Covid-19 booster at the Surgery when you are due for this due to the high number of patients needing this, you can contact 119 to book an appointment elsewhere or look out for details of a local Walk-in Centre.

Winter is here, and with the increasing pressure on all health services please use the NHS wisely:

Community Pharmacies – Most people are not aware, but your local pharmacy can provide a wide range of help and advice. They offer advice on common problems such as coughs, colds, aches and pains, as well as healthy eating and stopping smoking. They can also help you decide whether you really need to see a doctor.

A&E – Please remember that A&E is for **emergencies only**. Before going to A&E please consider if another service might be more appropriate.

Urgent Treatment Centre, Clacton Hospital – This service is available for help with minor ailments such as rashes and minor skin infections, ear and throat infections and coughs and colds. They are also able to deal with minor injuries such as wounds, sprains, strains, minor dislocations, suspected fractures, removal of foreign bodies, burns, scalds, bites and stings. This is not exhaustive but gives you an idea of what NOT to attend A&E for.

Urgent Treatment Centre, Colchester

– This service can be used for the same things as the Urgent Treatment Centre at Clacton Hospital.

NHS 111 – This service can be used 24 hours a day, 365 days a year and can provide telephone advice out of hours when we are not available. They can also advise you of the best place to go if you do need to see someone face to face.

PRIMROSE FARM BARN OWL UPDATE



In recent months the Owlets have grown so very quickly. Our second brood of the year has been successful with five young owlets reared. They have in succession lost their downy furry coatings making them look like puff balls to beautiful golden-coloured owls.

The parents have constantly posted voles and mice into the owl box after dusk and all throughout the night. These have been eaten whole usually head first and feet and tail last! The owlets hiss, especially when the parents are near and land on the box edge with food.

The local owl expert David, and his wife Zoe, visited the farm the last weekend and they lifted the owlets carefully from the box to catalogue them. This involves weighing them gently using a pillow case, measuring their wing feathers and looking at their feathers and markings. They are then ringed with a lightweight metal ring with an identifiable number allowing them to be traced back to this nesting box. The photograph is the owlets in age order, the largest being 56 days of age and the baby one being 42 days of age. The owlets, when handled and laid gently on their back, go into a comatose state which helps this. In this batch there were three boys and two

girls. This is distinguished by their markings especially around their necks. So our first owlet who had the nickname of Big Dave was actually a boy this time! They all had very rounded and full tummies and appeared well. They were put back into the box and we watched them via the camera as they all settled down and slept for the rest of the day.

The owlets have been practicing flapping their wings and have all migrated to the box entrance and have been having practice flights. The Owl expert did say this was a vulnerable time for them as sometimes they can become prey for foxes if they fly to the ground and can not take off again. The first one out we found on the top of the shed looking a bit lost in the daylight; we put him back safely in the box. The owlets sit on the box shelf very early morning at first light, just watching before returning into the box to sleep during the day.

They are all now flying at night and at the moment all five are returning back to the box but it won't be long until they fly to new pastures, leaving an empty box. The parents may then return and settle in the box, we will wait and see.
