We would like to start off by wishing everyone a belated Happy New Year!

We start 2022 with some positive news in that the defibrillator is up and running and located on the outside of The Haywain. Instructions on how to use this item, if it's needed, are in the cabinet with the defibrillator. Thanks to Rob and his team for their support with this.

The 30 mph along Bentley Road is still under discussion. The Chairman met with our County Councillor and a representative from Highways to see if this can be reconsidered. Suggestions were made which will be discussed at the forthcoming Council meeting. A planning application has been submitted for a Battery Farm next to the Ardleigh Road substation on an agricultural field of almost 1 hectare in size. The planning application is on Tendring's site for comment (ref 21/02070/FUL) and this will also be discussed at the next Council meeting.

The Parish Council are discussing the setting up of a Conservation Fund which will help conservation projects around the Village.

The next meeting of the Council will be held on the 17th March, at 7.30pm at The Haywain.



# **GT BENTLEY DOCTORS' SURGERY**

#### PATIENT INFORMATION REGARDING VITAMIN D SUPPLEMENT

Vitamin D is made in the skin by the action of sunlight and this is the main source of Vitamin D for most people. It is essential for healthy teeth, bones and muscles. Trials are under way assessing the role of low Vitamin D levels in Coronavirus infections.

Public Health England advises that in spring and summer, the majority of the population will get enough Vitamin D through sunlight on the skin and by eating a healthy, balanced diet. During autumn and winter, everyone will need to rely on dietary sources of Vitamin D. Since it is difficult for people to meet the 10 microgram recommendation from consuming foods naturally containing or fortified with Vitamin D, people should consider taking a daily supplement containing 10 micrograms of Vitamin D in autumn and winter. This is available to be purchased cheaply from pharmacies and health shops.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a belated Happy New Year and please keep safe and well in 2022.

On behalf of the Parish Council I have received a number of "Thank You's" by telephone and email from residents following the delivery of a Festive Tea provided by the Parish Council to our more senior citizens and vulnerable residents. The parish Council will hope to do the same again this year.

In all 74 Festive Afternoon Teas were delivered to residents by our Parish Councillors and helpers. The teas were magnificent; a wonderful selection of sandwiches, cakes and scones with a jar of jam and clotted cream, provided by Vicky of Patisserie4U. Vicky lives in Great Bromley and is a wonderful supporter of the village, thank you Vicky.

Our new "Cost Cutter" shop is open and seems to be well used, the owner is pleased with the support he has received. He is hoping to have a cash machine installed in the near future. He is also in ongoing discussions with the Post Office and hoping to have a Post office counter within the shop.

A survey has been carried out regarding Hare Green recreation ground. It should be remembered that Hare Green Recreation Ground is an asset for the whole village not just the immediate area. Once the results have been collated the suggestions put forward will be discussed by Parish Councillors and published in this magazine. All residents in the village were able to take part in the survey online or via the Messenger.

Our budget has been reviewed and it is proposed there will not be any increase 7

in the Parish Precept.

I have entered into correspondence with the Local Highways Panel about lowering the speed limit on Harwich Road, readers may recall the then Portfolio Holder for ECC Highways, Kevin Bentley agreeing that Harwich Road speed limit should be reduced from 40 mph to 30 mph. The scheme appears to have stagnated somewhat. I have written to the chairman of the Local Highways Panel requesting an update. Our County Councillor, Carlo Guglielmi is also exploring another angle.

At our meeting in January, Daniel Rapson, MD of DRD Consultants, the Hamilton Lodge Development Company, gave a presentation to all present. Mr Rapson stated that following outline planning permission he was required to carry out many planning conditions. These included various surveys and protection for roosting bats, dormice, newts, birds etc. along with an arboricultural plan. All of these conditions have been met. The various surveys and reports run into several hundred pages. Mr Rapson had the survey results with him and invited anybody to look at them, there were no takers The cost of these surveys was well over £100,000. Once the TDC planning officer was in agreement and accepted the various reports landscaping could begin with the layout of the pond and village green. It was envisaged building would start late summer of 2022. A further open day was proposed to be held in the village hall for those interested. He would attend a further Parish Council Meeting in April to provide a further update.

#### ...Cont'd

A resident asked about affordable housing, Mr Rapson informed them TDC required 30% of houses to be affordable. In relation to affordable houses, of those built at Robinson Close, there were not enough takers from the village for these available houses. TDC released them to people living outside the village. You have to be registered with TDC Housing Department to be considered.

The Parish Council has agreed to hold events to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee from Thursday 2nd June. We are intending to light a Beacon in Church Meadow and considering having a BBQ that evening. A Thanksgiving Service in St Georges Church at 10.30am is scheduled for Sunday 5th June. The service will be led by Rev Canon Stephen Carter and the sermon by Ann Easter, one of the Queen's Chaplains. Following the service there will be a Hog Roast on Church Meadow, with a bar and a children's entertainer and a marquee will be provided. Further details later.

I was fortunate to be invited to Marion Britton's farewell event at the Village Hall. Marion was the caretaker whilst I was Village Hall Chairman. I would like to thank Marion for all her hard work not only whilst I was chairman, but over all the years she looked after the village hall. Thank you Marion.

## BETTY IRIS (NÉE) BLOYCE 20 Apr 1929 - 24 Jul 2020 & Charles William (Bill) Hurrell 10 Nov 1921 - 5 Mar 2020

Bill was born in 1921 and Betty was born in 1929. They married in 1950 and last year would have been their 70<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary.

They both came from humble beginnings - Dad was one of six children in a 2up, 2-down in Harwich Road, Colchester and Mum was one of 11 surviving siblings living in a council house in Frating. Life was hard and, because of this, they were both very determined to do better in life.

Dad joined the RAF as an engineer which opened up a whole new world for him. He loved the camaraderie of that life and we heard many tales of this time. He was based in Canada repairing the planes and, as several of them crashed on the test flight, the officers asked for volunteers to go up with the pilots on the flights. Dad was keen to volunteer, partly because they were offering double pay for anyone prepared to do this. As far as Dad was concerned, any extra money meant he could afford more cigarettes and whisky!

Mum went into service when she was 14, which probably explains why she was paranoid about housework! Luckily she worked for a lovely family in Frating who took her under their wings and, when Dad appeared, helped them to a better start in life. When Mum met Dad, who was always a "bit of a lad", one of the conditions of courting her was that he wasn't to carry on smoking 60 cigarettes and drinking several glasses of whisky a day. He managed to cut out the cigarettes but he always liked his whisky (in moderation, of course).



Thankfully, it all paid off and, having managed to buy a cottage in Chapel Lane, Great Bromley when they married, they eventually managed to but a plot of land in Furze Lane where, with some help from friends, built the bungalow Mum had always dreamed of. Mum insisted she had a big kitchen, and it was here that she was in her element cooking meals for family and friends. Dad raved about her cooking and although they loved to eat out, nothing was ever as good as "Bet's cooking".

Hard work was as important as ever. Dad would work all day as a plumber for Colchester Council and then go out in the evening working for friends and neighbours. Mum worked on the land - as she told us many times, they had to pay for those Sapele doors in the bungalow somehow! But we know how important it was to her that their two daughters didn't have to struggle in life as she had. Dad took early retirement from the Council and is probably one of the few people who was paid a works pension for more years than he worked.

Together they then found other things to fill their time. They started working at the Kings Arms in Frating. Both were in their element, with Mum cooking and Dad Front of House... he did like to talk! This led to several years of pub life, either working on a day-to-day basis or living in as relief managers. Gardening was one of their great passions, Dad with his vegetables and Mum with her flowers. Fortunately, this is something they continued to share up until the last couple of years of their lives.

Dad, for as long as we can remember, supported the Royal National Lifeboat institution. Kay and I are so proud that they are honouring his kindness and his name will be on their new lifeboat at Great Yarmouth and Gorleston lifeboat station, due to be completed in the second half of 2022.

But family and home were everything to them. They helped us bringing up the grandchildren, Liza, Gemma and Jack, loving every moment they spent with them. In their latter years, they liked nothing more than seeing the greatgrandchildren, Harley, Willow and Grace and we know how much they would have loved little Isla, born the year they both passed away.

## COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH

## IN THE GARDEN WITH ANDY & JUDY

We trust all gardeners were able to do as much or as little as they wanted or needed to do over the recent Christmas and New year break. If things were left undone try and be philosophical about it. Whereas keen exhibitors might need to be exact about sowing, transplanting or planting dates for the majority, tasks can be carried out in a fairly wide timescale and still achieve a good result.

For vegetables it is advisable to carry out crop rotation. This is an established system to help maintain soil health by reducing a build up of pests and diseases that are sometimes specific to one group of crops. It is also true that each group depletes different nutrients so it also helps to ensure that one particular type of plant food is not exhausted by growing crops with the same demands. It is simply planting crop families in a different part of the plot every year. There are many books and internet articles that cover it in far greater depth than is possible in this article and the detail can vary but here is a typical example using 3 rotating areas over a 3 year cycle and retaining 1 permanent plot.

times and we want to get second crops where we can.

We will often use lettuce, leaf salads and courgettes to fill empty spaces. We also follow early potatoes in the same year with leeks to make use of the cleared ground. Growing potatoes will involve opening up the soil to plant the tubers, earthing up and digging to harvest the crop. This means the area is well worked and ideal for root crops the following year. Also, as any manure incorporated for the potatoes will have been absorbed by the soil a year later and will not cause the carrots to fork.

Providing you ensure that you do not grow the same vegetable crop in the same ground several years in succession it will help to prevent the build-up of pests and disease. This is likely to become even more important in future whether or not you are organic growers as the availability of pesticides, insecticides and fungicides to amateur growers diminishes. This is one of the 3 P's that Monty Don is urging growers to avoid. (i.e., Pesticides, Plastics and Peat).

We use this as our guide but we break the rules somewhere most years as we don't always grow the same amount of each group and we don't want to leave fallow areas of soil for long periods. Also, different crops harvest at different Finally, don't forget that any remaining hedge trimming should be completed in February to avoid disturbing nesting birds and possibly contravening the Wildlife and Countryside legislation.

## ANDY PIRIE - EULOGY

The Bobby said he wanted to check the lorry was roadworthy. I cannot possibly repeat the language he used when he realised it was me under the helmet.

He later met and married Gill and had <sup>h</sup> three sons, James, Matthew and Andrew; <sub>19</sub>

he was very proud of what they have achieved in life and very proud of his daughters-in-law, Naomi and Katie. I know he also thought the world of his three grandchildren, Harry, Daisy and Harriet.

Sadly, the marriage did not last, and they divorced.

Andy then entered a very difficult time in his life. When our Mum died, he moved into the family house Brook House and later when the farm was sold moved into the nearby bungalow courtesy of sister Margaret. During that time, he was supported by his sister Mary and when she passed away, I know it hit him very hard.

Sadly, his health suffered, and he went down hill quite quickly. He eventually went into hospital in Colchester and Clacton and eventually into a care home in Colchester where he passed away on November 3<sup>rd</sup>.

I would like to thank you all for coming today; Andy would have been pleased.

I would like to thank a few people who helped Andy over the last few years of his life, Jane and Nigel from Brook House who got his shopping in for him and Nigel who kept his TV going; Andy would have been lost without it.

To his nephew John who did jobs for him, including mending his mobile phone when he dropped it. Andy and mobile phones were not natural bedfellows; if you texted him, you got a one-word reply "okay" and if he texted you, it was two words; "ring me".

Also, to Bert Fairley who visited him and would bring a bag of spuds with him!

To Fred and Jenny who also kept an eye on things.

Andy had a difficult life, but he is now at peace, Sleep well mate.

## MORE ABOUT THE HISTORY OF "THE MESSENGER"

As someone interested in stories of days gone by, there is nothing more satisfying than when someone phones up to tell you that you are wrong. Why? Because that means they have read what you have written, and what's more, they are going to tell you something that perhaps you didn't know. Often, it is not that you have got something wrong, but rather that you can't fit everything in for space reasons, or are reporting someone else's version of events that might be from a different viewpoint.

This was the case last month, when Henry Fairley phoned to tell me about the origins of The Bromley Messenger magazine. I had mentioned about Rev. Paul Davis's part, which was only gleaned from his own words in the Parish magazine 35 years ago.

The more complete story was that the Rector and his wife Meriel continued to produce a monthly Church magazine when they arrived at The Bromleys in 1985. Henry and Ann Fairley at Park Farm were involved in delivering this parish newsletter to the subscribers, who paid a small amount to cover printing costs. Henry was also Chairman of Great Bromley Parish council at the time, which produced a quarterly newsletter for Great Bromley residents.

There was a desire to widen the scope to one, more complete, news magazine going to everybody in both villages, but it was appreciated that a paid magazine would not be a success in reaching everyone. Rev Davis was mulling this idea over with the Fairleys over a cup of tea, when Andrew came in from the farm for his break; being a cold day, he sat on the Aga to warm himself up. As they were wondering how to finance the project, Andrew piped up, "Why don't you do what the Young Farmers do? We get sponsorship from local firms and that pays for the printing." The GBPC discussed all this at an EGM on 11<sup>th</sup> March 1986 and agreed to support it, and another councillor, Len Christodoulides, agreed to be treasurer to raise sponsorship and collect the monies. Distributor coordinator was Mrs Grainger-Brown and Mrs Hardy was stapler and helper!

Reading the early magazines (now online at <u>www.greatbromley.org.uk</u>) the idea was for one sponsored advert page to cover the cost each month. A sponsor wasn't always easy to find, so some months went unfilled, and others were sponsored by a combination of organisations and individuals in the village who appreciated the magazine and donated smaller sums. After 8 years or so classified ads began to appear along with smaller business card adverts, mixed in with whole page adverts, heading towards what we have today.

I had my own little part to play in the history of the magazine. First by creating the village websites and to start publishing the magazine online in 2003. Second, by which time I was living in a New Zealand village and took on the writing and editing of the monthly magazine there, I started contributing history items to The Messenger. The editor Leonie Henderson remarked she was feeling under pressure of getting material in time for most month's deadlines, and not looking forward to the work in December 2011. I said, "The run up to Christmas is no time to be sitting

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compiling a magazine. I am heading for the beach myself, so I skip the January issue, and combine December and January's events." Leonie gratefully took that on board, and that is why we have 11 issues rather than 12 since 2012. Thirdly, I suggested that new editor Lizzie dropped the volume and issue numbers, as they have often been wrong, being just something else for the editor to have to remember, and never of any benefit as the date on the cover gives the whole story! Leonie, by the way, did a marvellous stint as editor, producing a great magazine for many years, from May 1993 right up to March 2020 – thanks again Leonie for all that amazing hard work, and also for handing over the reigns into such very good hands.

## **RECTOR'S MESSAGE**

#### "Long to Reign over us"

I believe the Parish Council has plans to mark the Jubilee of Her Majesty the Queen, in some appropriate way, early in June. We will look forward to hearing more of these plans in due course. At St George's we will also be commemorating the 70<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Queen's Accession to the throne on Sunday February 6<sup>th</sup>. It was on this day, in 1952, with the death of the King, that her long reign began. The Book of Common Prayer provides for a special service on the anniversary of the Queen's Accession. We will be observing this at the 10.30am Parish Eucharist on that day.

In her 70 years on the throne, it is remarkable how visible and accessible the Queen has been, not only in the United Kingdom, but throughout the Commonwealth. It is often said that the Queen exercises "soft power". Every one of her Prime Ministers has spoken of the value they have placed on their regular meetings with her, and of her wisdom and long experience. She is hugely respected by the governments of the Commonwealth, an institution to which she has been personally committed throughout her reign. No one can doubt her deep sense of vocation to service. which derives from her Christian faith.

The Queen has been a huge force for good in our world. In the early months of the pandemic, it was the Queen, rather than any politician, who was able to speak to the nation to give hope and encouragement.

Many of us will have our own memories of seeing the Queen on one of her many visits to the towns and cities of Britain. One of the highlights of my ministry in Maldon, was to meet the Queen when she came to the town, and I was invited to say grace at the Civic lunch in the town hall. Her visit brought such joy and excitement to the town, which has been replicated wherever she has gone.

The Queen, as a constitutional monarch, stands as a symbol of stability, service, decency and the rule of law, in a fragile and uncertain world. Her sense of duty and service stand in sharp contrast to some world leaders who seem to be driven more by the urge to build their own wealth and power, often at the expense of their people.

We thank God that Elizabeth our Queen has, in the words of the national anthem, been "long to reign over us". We shall look forward to joining in the celebrations with the village, later in the year.
