
This November, join St Helena Hospice for a hot new event, and take on a Firewalk!

## THE VALUE OF VERGES

This is the time of year when everything springs into life, including the miles of roadside verges. The distinctive white flower heads of Cow Parsley are usually prominent on verges, along with many less obvious grasses and flowering plants.

Roadside verges need to be managed to keep road users safe especially on narrow lanes. Currently Essex County Council who are responsible for managing verges usually make two cuts, one in late Spring and again in the Autumn. The current management is to make one mower width cut only, which increases visibility while leaving undisturbed longer vegetation closer to hedges and ditches (some verges do need to be cut back as far as possible to maintain safe visibility).

The roadside verge is a valuable habitat for many different species of wildlife providing a linear habitat for species to move through as well as a

refuge buffer zone alongside hedges and ditches. Flowering plants growing in verges provide nectar and pollen for insects and later in the year seeds and berries for birds to feed off. The majority of plants growing in verges are grasses, but these also are valuable for wildlife as foodplants for butterfly larvae including Gatekeepers and Meadow Browns. Flowering plants including Garlic Mustard, which is a tall early plant with small white flowers provides a foodplant for the Orange Tip butterfly larvae.

On Wednesday 11th May the Parish Council held three meetings. All members were present. The first meeting was the Annual Parish Meeting when the election of officers took place. Chairman Fred Nicholls and Vice Chairman Rob Lord were re-elected. The second meeting was the Parish Assembly and followed by our usual monthly Parish Council meeting. There were five local residents present - thank you all for coming. Apologies were received from our two District Councillors.

Our County Councillor, Carlo Guglielmi outlined Essex County Council budget plans for the forthcoming year. The recent Corbeau Seats Car Rally was discussed at length and it was agreed that representation concerning the rally would be made to TDC and the organisers. The Rally divides opinion amongst residents with support from some and totally against by others. Within the Parish there were at least three separate accidents this year which caused a great deal of anxiety for those on the route.

A resident raised concerns regarding Pallet Plus. They were informed this is an ongoing planning matter that is due to be discussed by TDC Planning Committee in the near future. They also expressed concern regarding vehicles speeding along Frating Road and a lack of footpath to the shop.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee was also discussed. Residents are reminded the festivities will start on Thursday 2nd June, with the lighting of the Beacon in Church Meadow. Alternative parking will be available in Seven Rivers Meadow. A free BBQ provided by the Parish Council will commence from 7.30pm, Black Cactus Choir will provide some

entertainment and a Piper will "pipe" the lighting of the beacon. There will be some chairs available, however if you prefer please bring your own, also please bring your own drinks. Suggest as this is an evening event that you bring torches as well.

A church service will be held on Sunday 5th June at 11.30am where the Rev'd Canon Ann Easter, previously Chaplain to HM Queen Elizabeth, will be assisting. Following the church service a free Hog Roast provided by the Parish Council will be available to all residents, not just be for the congregation but available to all. Great Bromley Cricket Club are providing a bar. Tables and chairs will be provided in the marquee. Entertainment by the Motley Crew. A children's entertainer will be present, as will face painting. Please support this event. If you are planning on attending please let our clerk know via email, clerk@gbpc.org.uk or telephone chairman Fred Nicholls at 01206 230688 which will assist in catering purposes.

Hare Green sub committee has met and discussed the way forward for new equipment and picnic benches. The lead councillors were asked to also look at providing some low-level children activities in Church Meadow.

National Grid's East Anglian Green Energy projects was discussed. The Council was pleased our MP, Sir Bernard Jenkin, was against the project as suggested, the Leader of Essex County Council Kevin Bentley, and TDC leader Neil Stock OBE, are also against the scheme. Public consultation is being held in the area, please look out for venues in the local newspapers.

As more and more people start to travel abroad, I thought it would be helpful to remind patients about some important information.

- Please ensure you download the NHS app in good time, so you have your Covid travel passport available for your travel date. This is normally required along with your passport at the airport when you check in. A paper copy can be requested for anyone who is unable to download the NHS app by telephoning 119.
   Please ensure you allow plenty of time to do this before your holiday as it can take at least two weeks to receive the paper copy.
- For anyone who has changed their

name since receiving their passport, please ensure you get your passport updated prior to your travel date so that the details on your passport match your Covid travel passport.

- If you need to check if your vaccinations are up-to date for travel, a Travel Risk Assessment form can be completed and submitted via the Great Bentley Surgery website. For patients who do not have access to the internet, a paper copy can be collected from reception for completion. Please remember to do this at least one month in advance of your holiday, to ensure you are able to receive any vaccinations in time for your holiday.
- Please remember to order any repeat medication prior to your holiday ensuring you allow at least 3 working days for us to process your request.
- Don't forget to buy your sunscreen!

## In the Garden with Andy & Judy

In June we should no longer have to worry about frost and will be able to plant out tender plants but as we are told to expect the unexpected these days it is worth checking the weather forecast for the next 14 days to make sure an overnight frost is unlikely. June is a busy month, harvesting produce, ours will mainly be new potatoes, broad beans and peas, as well as making new sowings and planting out either your own seedlings or plug plants. If you planted your shallots on the shortest day they should be ready to harvest on the longest day. Use a fork to gently lift the bulbs to break the roots and leave them to dry off in situ before lifting them a few days later. Clean off any soil and store them in a dry sheltered place to allow any remaining green foliage to wither. After that they should be separated and prepared for storage and or immediate use.

Water conservation will be important as you need to try and make any water in the soil last as long as possible. In some cases this will be by mulching. There is a difference of opinion as to whether it is best to water in the morning or evening. We prefer to water the greenhouses and coldframes in the morning on the basis that we do not want them to be too humid overnight and possibly provide ideal conditions for fungal spores. All other areas such as raised beds, pots or open ground plants will wherever possible, be watered in the evening to allow the water to penetrate the soil before the sun warms the soil and causes the water to evaporate.

As ever, with any 'rule' there are always exceptions. One is

chrysanthemum plants in pots. These are always watered in the morning and only if the leaves are looking limp. It is easy to cause root rot in potted chrysanthemums by over watering and this is the reason for trying to be sparing with watering. On a related subject you should never feed a plant that has dry roots. It should be watered first and when turgid, fed. This applies to both granular and liquid feeds. When using slow release fertilisers just try and ensure plants fed in that way do not get too dry.

We have been fortunate to have good harvest from sprouting broccoli, rhubarb, asparagus and swiss chard this spring. Owing to the building works we have missed the sowing dates for winter greens. It will be interesting to see if the later sowing materially affects the quantity of the harvest or only puts it back by a few weeks.

If you have been part of the #No Mow May you will have to decide whether to leave the area 'wild' for a longer period. In many ways, it is similar to leaving the mowing of grassed areas with naturalised bulbs until the foliage has died down thus returning the goodness to the bulbs for next year's growth.

When you do mow the grass, it will at first look very pale and blanched but can recover quite quickly especially if you give a nitrogen based fertiliser (preferably organic) to green it up. The cessation in mowing may be slow to produce a significant increase in wild flowers unless there is natural seeding adjacent. You can always introduce wild flowers to some areas in seed or plug form.

The proposal is to use 23 hectares of land which is in addition to the land that has been allocated for the battery farm. Details of this latest proposal can be found at:

INSPIRING WOMEN

Our May meeting at the village WI was our AGM, but aside from the business of the day, we still managed to have a very interesting talk about a country that is not often mentioned in the news anymore.

Rwanda does not immediately spring to mind as a country to visit repeatedly, but for Maralynn Bambridge, her love affair with Rwanda goes back 20 years.

She became aware of a charity – Engalynx – which was founded to bring practical aid and comfort to widows and orphans in Rwanda. Maralynn had heard so much about the genocide there that she felt that she had to get involved to help somehow.

Rwanda is roughly the size of Wales with a population of about 13 million people. The charity works to supply practical items such as workmen's tools like chisels to give men a trade and a craft. It also works with hospitals to supply medical equipment and protective equipment. It even partners with Care International to distribute goats to the poorest people to give them the opportunity to make a living.

Diabetes is rife in Rwanda as health education is poor. There are many uneducated children in the country with undiagnosed diabetes who are not getting the chances they need to get on in life.

Maralynn works with many projects, supplying sewing machines and overlockers to train tailors, training local boys welding skills so that they can fix and maintain out of date equipment. The Charity even works to build buildings and install solar panels and running water to try and improve the lives of people living in the region. In 2019 a feeding program started to ensure that the children at school had a nourishing breakfast so that they could concentrate and learn more effectively. Maralynn has visited Rwanda each year since 2002 and has no plans to stop her visits just yet. There is so much to do and the people of Rwanda certainly do need our help. She certainly does have a love affair with the people of this country – and they love her too.

Our next meeting will be on Wednesday evening June 1<sup>st</sup>, where we will celebrate the queen's jubilee with a fish and chip supper, and we have a Shanty Group "The Hoolies" coming along to entertain us.

## **GREAT BROMLEY CROSS PUB**

The Great Bromley Cross Pub is a community pub saved from closure in 2016 by more than 150 shareholders and run for the community by volunteers.

Since then, the building has been completely refurbished and several improvements made. We added an extension, which includes a "radar key" accessible disabled toilet, available for use by both our customers and the public alike. We have a coffee morning every Wednesday between 10am and noon, during which we have outreach public library and Post Office facilities. We also host other community activities like the local Friendship Club, music nights, guizzes, darts teams and village litter picks. The premises also have a defibrillator on the outside wall (arranged by the Parish Council) in case of medical emergencies.

Current opening times are Thursday 6:30 to 10:30pm, Friday 5pm to 10:30pm, Saturday 6:30pm to 10:30pm and Sunday Lunchtime Noon to 3pm. On the first Thursday in the Month we have an Open

Mic Music Night and on the third Thursday in the Month we have a Quiz Night.

We'd like to increase our opening times but are dependent on volunteers to manage and run the pub. We're always looking for volunteer help in all sorts of ways, including serving behind the bar and cleaning and maintaining the building (which sadly is beginning to show its age). In May, there will have been a play by My Theatre 'Alice's Adventures in


Wonderland'. I am sure it will be as popular as it normally is.

## ST GEORGE'S CHURCH

#### POLITICS AND THE CHURCH

The Archbishop of Canterbury's sermon on Easter Day caused quite a reaction among politicians and in the press. Though his sermon did address the invasion of Ukraine, and the cost-of living crisis in the United Kingdom, it was his comments on the government's new immigration policy that have generated the greatest discussion. He said in his sermon that the Church cannot be a passive observer of the policy whereby asylum seekers crossing the channel would be sent to Rwanda for "processing".

The Bishop of Chelmsford, the Right Reverend Guli Francis-Dehqani has also raised this subject in the House of Lords. Bishop Guli can speak with some authority on the experience of seeking asylum. Her father, who was an Anglican bishop in Iran, fled with his family to Britain, when the Ayatollah Khomeini came to power during the revolution in 1979.

There are some people who feel very uncomfortable when bishops put their heads above the parapet and become embroiled in political issues. It is often said by some politicians and sections of the press, that the Church should confine itself to "spiritual matters", and by implication therefore should not be engaged in the affairs of the world. When this accusation was levelled against Archbishop Desmond Tutu, in his fight against apartheid, he famously said that he did not know which Bible his critics had been reading.

I happen to agree with what the Archbishop has said about the government's immigration policy, but this is not my main point. It seems to me that in a nation which most people still regard as a "Christian country", the Church not only has a right, but also a duty to question and challenge those in power. The Queen is both head of state, and "Defender of the Faith" and Supreme Governor of the Church of England. The senior bishops sit in the House of Lords. There is a Christian conscience written into our democratic system of government.

Whether or not you agree with the Archbishop's Easter sermon, thank God we have the freedom in this country to speak out for the values that are important to us. Contrast what Archbishop Welby has said with the recent pronouncements of Patriarch Kyrill, head of the Russian Orthodox church. In Kyrill's defence of the invasion of Ukraine, and the atrocities committed there, we see the worst example of a church that has no prophetic role; and functions merely as the mouthpiece of the state.

As we celebrate this month the 70-year reign of our Queen, give thanks for the democratic freedom we enjoy in this land, and for the values of justice and the rule of law that for many centuries have shaped and influenced our traditions and institutions.
