Update on Hare Green:

As Fred was on a well deserved holiday right now, it falls to me as Vice Chair to write the GBPC report for the Messenger. With that in mind, I thought I'd take the opportunity to update folks on the Hare Green improvement project.

By way of background and reminder, you may remember that GBPC conducted a user requirements survey in the Autumn of last year. This took the opportunity to gauge user's perspective on the current state of Hare Green playing fields and signpost where further improvement might be best centred. Whilst the response rate wasn't large, we did seem to attract a reasonably diverse set of responses which provided excellent insight into how concept designs might be developed and Hare Green further improved. The themes that emerged from the survey were:

- There is a shared desire to obtain more benefit from the space, whilst preserving and enhancing the green space and encouraging more use by wildlife.
- The park needs to cater for all age groups in the community, although satisfaction levels were reasonable, there is an acknowledgement for improvement needed across the age ranges.
- Features to enable and facilitate more uses that may bring the community together.

Since the point of survey has been conducted, the following actions have been taken:

• A review of the grounds

maintenance routine for Hare Green; this has resulted in more regular cuts thereby enabling a better playing surface for ball games etc

- Purchase of bat boxes which await fitting as insurance arrangements are clarified
- Plans for maintenance of the existing goal posts
- A 'green survey' to confirm opportunity and limitations in pursuing further 'green' opportunities at Hare Green
- Invitation to specialist suppliers to tender proposals and quotes for additional play equipment to further enhance the children's play experience which Hare Green already provides

Right now, we have received some proposals and quotes from specialist suppliers. I have been consulting with the Hare Green sub-committee (who are Parishioners and local users) to ensure the optimal solution whilst achieving value for money. The current work in progress is to 'benchmark' those proposals with other suppliers; this will lead to supplier selection and instruction of works. I am anticipating those instructions to made by GBPC in September and the works to be completed by Spring 2023.

I'll look to provide another update once works have been instructed.

IN THE GARDEN WITH ANDY & JUDY

For all gardeners August should be a month of plentiful harvest but it is also a busy time both for work to be done and planning for the year ahead. As beds become empty think about what you wish to grow for next year following some form of crop rotation. A typical one is year 1 potatoes and tomatoes, followed by year 2 by root vegetables including leeks and onions followed in year 3 by peas and beans and in year 4 by brassicas.

Given how high food prices are becoming, it is worth trying to maximise vour output from the plot. As we dig out our main crop potatoes, we immediately plant some of the area with leeks from their nursery bed and there is still time to plant catch crops of saladings which are generally considered to be outside the rotation. You can also try a crop of green manure, grown through the winter and dug in during spring, it keeps down weeds and feeds the soil. If you have not yet planted winter greens it can be still done enabling the plants to become established in case we do have a colder autumn/winter than has become the norm in recent years.

Onions will be ripening this month and some of the foliage will be dying back. Initially you can assist the drying by using a fork to slightly raise the plants and snap the roots, allowing them to dry out for a while before harvesting them. If you decide to lift them early and air dry them before storing under cover please ensure they are not left in strong sunlight. We made this mistake a few years ago and damaged (baked) a lot of reasonable sized onions. Shallots can be treated similarly.

August is a good time to create new strawberry beds using rooted runners

from the existing strawberry beds providing they appear healthy. If in doubt buy in new plants. Although some strawberry beds will remain productive for many years, they will eventually need replacing. As it is advisable to pick very little fruit off a new bed it is better to plant the new bed before the old bed is exhausted. Running the two beds for a year or two is a reasonable way of ensuring continuity of supply.

August is the time to prune wisteria and many other summer flowering shrubs, such as lavender, once they have finished flowering. Wisteria pruning not only helps to keep the size of the plant under control, but done correctly, will improve the flowering for next year. The RHS website has a simple guide to wisteria pruning. Summer pruning of apple and pear trees training as restricted forms (cordons, espaliers and fans and pyramids) should be undertaken to allow sunlight to ripen the fruit and ensure good cropping for next year.

Ponds and water features are likely to require some maintenance, as well as keeping the water topped up to combat evaporation losses.

As show time approaches, a reminder of some dates: Ardleigh show on Saturday 20th August at the village hall (2-4:30pm), Lawford show on Saturday 3rd September at the Ogilvie Hall (2-5pm) and Great Bentley show also on 3rd September which is not only a horticultural show in a marquee but includes other attractions on the village green. Why not try entering a class or two just for fun and of course children have their own special classes. Schedules are available from show secretaries.

National Grid and Offshore Windfarms (Five Estuaries and North Falls) continue with their proposals and investigations into large infrastructure work in and around Little Bromley and surrounding villages. The Parish Council has sent its objections to National Grid plans, and we understand that objections have also been raised by Tendring District Council, Essex County Council and our local MP Sir Bernard Jenkin (who is working with other local MP's on a co-ordinated response and request for an alternative approach). Other councils across the pylon route that National Grid are planning have also sent in objections. The National Grid initial public consultation is now closed and current future timescales are for a Statutory Consultation in Spring 2023, Development Consent Order (DCO) application in December 2024, DCO examination and decision in 2025-2026. start of Construction in 2027, and fully operational in 2031. We will continue to work closely with all interested parties as this progresses.

Five Estuaries has also now published their initial consultation including a map of how their onshore work could affect Little Bromley. This shows possible cable routes and three potential sites for their substation location - one site will be selected. Each of the sites is in Little Bromley and are of significant size. Five Estuaries has offered to organise a local meeting in addition to their Consultation Exhibition to explain their proposal. The Parish Council will request that this takes place and we will advise when dates are known. The map can be seen on the Little Bromley Community Facebook Page and on the council website littlebromley.org. We have until 12th August to provide feedback to Five Estuaries on their initial consultation and any comments you can pass to the Parish Council or directly to Five Estuaries would be great.

North Falls has yet to start its initial consultation and we expect this to be in the next weeks. The North Falls project is also likely to entail significant onshore work in Little Bromley.

A reminder that the Parish Council has created a Conservation Fund which can be used for projects in the Parish. Funds are modest at the moment but if you have any ideas on ways this can be used to improve the village please contact the Parish Council.

The next meeting of the Council will be at 7.30pm at the Haywain on Thursday 15th September 2022.

WILLIAM IV POLICE TRUNCHEON

I was glad to be contacted by some visitors from South Essex with connections to the village. Octogenarian Kenneth Nutley has in his possession a marvellous decorated wooden police truncheon, bearing the words

WR IV

Great Bromley Essex

Ken does not know what the connection is to his family, or perhaps to his wife Joan Johnson's family.

WR IV was the royal cypher for William (Rex) IV who was on the throne between 1830–1837, succeeding George IV and being succeeded by Victoria. So we have a rough date. Unfortunately the records in the Essex Police Museum for the Constables in Great Bromley only start from 1851. However, in a newspaper article of 1833 there is a William Norman mentioned as constable. Perhaps, however, this item had been a retirement present for the previous incumbent? Or belonged to a later one? Who knows.

Here is the newspaper article, out of interest:

22 Feb 1833 Chelmsford Chronicle

On Tuesday last, the Adjourned Session for the County of Essex commenced at the Shire Hall. The several cases were disposed of as follows before The Hon. J. J. Strutt.

John Borritt Smith, 44, carter, was indicted for receiving three bushels of oats, the property of Thomas Hudson, at Great Bromley, knowing them to have been stolen. Prosecutor stated that James Clarke had been in his employ and had access to his oats to feed his horses: having missed some oats, he had a communication with Clark, after which he proceeded to the prisoner's house, and found a sack of oats in the kitchen; they were mixed with garlick and brank, and corresponded with those in his granary.

Clark, the accomplice, deposed that on the 13th Feb he carried 2½ bushels of bis master's oats to prisoner's house, for which he received 1s. Smith asked him to get the oats for him two days before. Wm. Norman, constable of Great Bromley, stated that upon hearing of the robbery, be suspected Clark: he proved searching prisoner's house, and finding the oats.

Guilty!

The Chairman commented on the serious nature of the offence, and remarked that there was nothing to contradict Clark's statement that he had stolen the oats at the prisoner's request.

The prisoner had been twice before convicted, and it was the duty of the Court to prevent him from any longer enticing farmers' servants - at any rate for some

years to come. He was then sentenced to 14 years transportation.

* * *

The second local connection that Ken mentioned was that his family homes had been named Portlands, and one of them had been in Great Bromley, probably around the 1920s. I was able to show him Portlands on Harwich Road, but other than knowing that George Cockle was the orcharder there in the 1970s, I have no knowledge of earlier inhabitants.

The third fairly local connection was that one of the family was believed to be a "Clacton mayor". One of my very knowledgeable and helpful history contacts told me, "Clacton has never had a mayor. Pre 1974, it was an Urban District Council, and as such, had a Chairman of the Council who carried out duties, special public/private functions etc. Post 1974, it became part of Tendring District Council. Some places then had a town council in addition, and hence elected a mayor, mainly to carry out a ceremonial role, but Clacton had no town council status, just the individual ward councillors, thus no mayor for Clacton, now, or in the past."

I passed on a list of those Chairmen, and am waiting for the family to come back to me with more idea of the possible family names involved, once they have sorted the boxes in the attic! (How I know that feeling.)

But if anyone can shed any light at all on any of these three matters, I would be very pleased to hear from you, as always.

SURGERY NEWS We are very pleased to welcome Kerry Noonan, Advanced Nurse Practitioner to our Surgery Team. In addition to all her normal Nurse Practitioner duties, Kerry who is an experienced Nurse Prescriber will be assisting the doctors with daily triage, home visits and seeing patients for minor illness conditions.

SURGERY TELEPHONE SYSTEM We

have recently had an upgrade on our telephone system and have received some feedback from our patients saying that they are having problems either getting through to, or leaving messages for our Prescription Clerk.

The number to call for the Prescription Clerk hasn't changed and if you have a prescription query then you can ring through on the direct line number which is 01206 257557. When you phone this number you will receive the normal greeting message. If you continue listening to the message you will then need to press 2 for prescriptions.

Our prescription line is manned between 9.00 am and 3.00 pm Monday to Friday. If you ring during these times and the prescription clerk is busy, then you will go into a queuing system. If you would rather leave a message than continue to hold for her, you can press 1 at any point which will then allow you to leave a message. If you call out of the above hours, then you will receive a message saying the prescription office is closed. If you continue to listen to the whole

message, you will be given the option to press 1 and leave a message.

I hope this information helps patients who are trying to contact our prescription line.

Please remember that this line is only for patients who have a prescription enquiry, as we are not able to take requests for prescriptions over the telephone.

COVID BOOSTERS We will not be holding any Covid booster clinics at the Surgery during August. If you are due to have your booster and need to book an appointment, you can find details on the Great Bentley Surgery website or telephone 119.

At the time of writing this Newsletter we have not had confirmation as to whether patients will be offered a Covid booster in the autumn. If this does go ahead then we will contact patients about booking this.

MRS MARALYN BAMBRIDGE AWARDED AN MBE

Mrs Maralyn Bambridge of Brantham was awarded an MBE in the recent Queen's Honours List. Maralyn founded the charity ENGALYX and she has almost single handily raised over £150,000 for the support of Rwandan widows and particularly infants since then. Over 100 million children and adults were murdered in 100 days in the 1994 Rwandan Genocide; the Nazi's murdered a similar number of Jews in WW2!

It was a personal contact with a news reporter, who had been sent to a refugee camp following the 1994 Genocide, which motivated her to investigate the terrible plight of children and orphans in Rwanda.

The charity was formed in 1998 with early support from Manningtree High School pupils who proposed the Charity's name.

To date Engalynx has:

• Trained street boys in welding and unskilled girls in tailoring and others in hairdressing in Kigali.

• Supplied school uniforms, books and other items to schools in Gisenyi.

• Designed, built and equipped a Maternity Unit in Mwulire.

• Trained 30 young women in tailoring and set up a co-operative for them to work in Munyiginya.

ENGALYX has now initiated a feeding project for vulnerable infants at Bihembe Nursery School in the Nyakayiro Sector of the Rwamagana and is currently feeding 186 children.

LOOKING BACK WITH LEONIE

How lovely it was to see one if A.H.C.'s wonderful poems published again in last month's Messenger. Seeing it again triggered memories as I met and chatted to him on various occasions when he walked up to post through my letterbox his handwritten poems full of humour and insight into human thoughts, feelings and behaviour. They always made me chuckle. I think he left his bike by the road so that he could quietly walk down the drive and with no fuss pass on his pieces. He was a very private person who was determined to remain anonymous.

Indeed when I took over the editorship of the magazine in the early 1990s, with my brand new state of the art Amstrad computer with a very noisy daisy wheel printer, I received everything by hand through the letter box at all times during the day and sometimes well into the night as well as by post. Sometimes typed but usually handwritten in varying degrees of legibility, all material had to be re-typed, laid out, proofread and finally posted to Hot-Line Printers in Coggeshall. As computer technology improved with programmes becoming more and more sophisticated I began to lay out the copy as I wanted to see it displayed. Initially I left space for pictures which were glued on to the pages after printing the finished compilation and guite often hand drew pictures, particularly puzzles etc, for the Children's Page. When copied and pasted together off it went by post to the printers with the occasional panic when it didn't get there in time. Deadlines were deadlines!

Emails were introduced, publishing programmes were invented and then pdf files came along. It took a few months of trial and error together with posted copies (just in case) to get the magazine successfully sent across to the printers via the Internet. RECTOR'S LETTER - FORTY YEARS ON

In July, I commemorated the 40th anniversary of my ordination as a priest. I have never been a great one for celebrating anniversaries (as my wife will confirm!); but I have found myself reflecting a great deal on my ministry over the last forty years. There have been huge changes in the Church and in society during this time. Some changes I have welcomed and others I regret. But I would echo the words of John Betjeman, as I thank God for "The Church of England of my birth, The kindest church to me on earth."

I value the Church of England, because it has never seen itself as a church just for the paid-up members. As the national church it has always endeavoured to serve all those in the community who turn to it. One of the greatest privileges of ministry has been sharing the joys and sorrows of people's lives, particularly through baptisms, weddings and funerals. Over the last two years since I retired, I have been grateful that the churchwardens have allowed me to continue to exercise a ministry here in the Bromleys.

been a steady decline in clergy numbers. Forty years ago, most parishes still had a resident priest living among them. I was appointed to Maldon as incumbent of one parish and ended up looking after three! At the time of writing, representatives of this parish, along with those from other parishes, are preparing to interview two "Rural Missioners". The two priests appointed will be responsible for ministering to nine rural parishes in our corner of Essex.

I am sure we will all support and welcome those who will be appointed to serve among us. They will certainly face many challenges as they strive to minister across nine very different communities. As the Church responds to a rapidly changing society, we may have to embrace changes and new ways of thinking. But the Church of England's vision of itself has not changed. Its parish churches stand as symbols of God's love for everyone in the community. And the Church's vocation is still to welcome all those who turn to it in times of joy and in times of sorrow.
