The offshore windfarm developers. Five Estuaries and North Falls, whose planned developments would affect our parish with underground cabling and large connection substations, are moving into the next phases of their projects. The Five Estuaries Stage 2 Consultation was planned to open on the 14th March and will last for just over 8 weeks, closing on the 12th May. Five Estuaries state the following - " Our Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) is the first main, detailed output of the Environmental Impact Assessment process and will be the focus of this consultation. It sets out the potential environmental impacts of the project, both negative and positive, based on our initial assessments. The PEIR also proposes mitigation measures to prevent or minimise any negative impacts identified. " Please look out for public drop in events, virtual webinars and online material so you can respond and have your views heard. North Falls plan to run their Statutory Consultation in late spring/ early summer and we will let you know when the dates are released.


National Grid are also continuing with their East Anglia Green consultations and planning. Their plans include pylons and a large substation (23 Hectares). Following the enormous negative response to their initial proposal and the support of our local MP's it has been announced that the Electricity System Operator (ESO) will be conducting an independent review into East Anglia electricity transmission. This will look at alternative options, consideration of offshore routes, benefits and costs and will benchmark the proposals against other projects in the UK.

At a recent event organised by the Essex Suffolk Norfolk Pylons Group our MP, Sir Bernard Jenkin, said that East Anglia MP's and government has taken notice 4

of public concern and feedback around National Grid East Anglia Green. And this pressure has been the key driver in our local MP's getting the ESO review. Thanks to everyone who has been involved to date - it has really had an effect. And can we please ask that you continue to respond to all the consultations from Five Estuaries, North Falls, National Grid and now also from the ESO review. Your Parish Council has responded to all consultations to date and we will continue to do so. We discuss the ongoing impact of each of these projects on Little Bromley at each Parish Council meeting. When we have any updates we will post them on the Parish Council pages of the Little Bromley website at littlebromley.org.uk.

ARDLEIGH SURGERY

Appointments Like the rest of the country, appointment demand is at an all time high and continues to escalate. As with many surgeries we continue to have strain on appointments due to high demand and staff illness. At one time had 4 clinicians off, we apologise for any inconvenience caused and please be patient with us as doctors and nurses can become unwell just as patients can. The Partners have been working many additional sessions as well as our regular locum having additional sessions. We have created more appointments by taking the calls directly from reception as they come in. By doing so we have been able to create an extra day's working of appointments a week. We also added in some telephone appointments for our GP assistant to call you to discuss blood results. These appointments will appear on your NHS App even though you have not booked any appointment. If this happens do not worry, we will try and call you and if we do not get hold of you, we will send you a text. Despite this disruption we have still been providing a considerable number of appointments.

Lastly, please do cancel appointments if you are unable to attend. On Monday 13th March, 6 appointments were not attended.

Surgery news Our Receptionist Nikki Read will retire at the end of April, we thank her for her service . One dispensing staff member left, and we are now advertising to recruit another member. On a plus note we have recruited an Advance Nurse Practitioner who will start at the beginning of May 2023.

Compulsory Surgery Training Days The next compulsory Northeast Essex Surgery training afternoon will be on the 26th of April 2023. The Surgery will be closed from 12.30hrs and dispensary from 12.00hrs. Other dates are : 18th May 2023 28th June 2023 25th July 2023 From the Partners From the 1st of April 2023, HRT will be available for £18.70 for a year's prescription. 8% of our population are on HRT and as the cost is now vastly reduced more patients will now be able to afford this drug. We will strive to provide stock for everyone, but we may have to limit it to 1-2 months supply at a time due to national stock issues. Our dispensary team continue to work extremely hard, please be kind and patient with them. With Easter holidays looming and the 4-day Bank holiday coming up, we are likely to be busy. We would ask you to put your prescriptions in early and allow a 7-day turn around during this time.

Did you know that

GP services are not an emergency service ? If you or a loved one is seriously unwell, please call 999 or go to A&E. If you call a GP surgery or 111 your case is triaged. An urgent band of call back is within 2 hours, "soon" band of call back is within 6 hours and routine call backs are within 12-24 hours. When you call and speak with our reception staff and you tell them that you have chest pains, they will advise you to go to A&E or to call 999. If you do opt to wait for the GP call back it may be at least 2 hours.

THE STORY OF KNIT AND KNATTER

In February 2010 Great Bromley WI formed a new group called Knit and Knatter. The inspiration was that of a very dear member Mary Hart.

Mary had thought it would be a good idea to make craft and knitted items to sell on the WI stall at the village Christmas Fayre in the December of 2010.

So knitted, crocheted, jewellery, glass cases, mittens, gloves, 'Dr Who' scarves, toilet roll holders and much, much more was crafted and made, much laughter and fun along the way as we met monthly on the second Wednesday in Mary's Conservatory at Pondfields, Parsons Hill.

The group was so successful that Mary suggested that we knit to help others and our first project was to support the Premature Baby Unit at Colchester Hospital. Many beautiful cardigans, blankets and hats were dispatched to Karen (now a member here), the Sister in charge of the unit.

Many other charities have also benefitted from the hard work of the ladies from the Knit and Knatter group. In 2012 blankets to Ukraine, delivered and despatched over the years through 'Felsted Aid' and 'UK Aid'. Interestingly when this project was mentioned in the Messenger a very kind lady from Frinton began to support



our mission and over forty / fifty blankets were collected over the years from the Triangle in Frinton.

- A.C.W.W. has also been one of our Charities. This supported children in other countries including Botswana and Lesotho.
- Poppies Supporting the 'Royal British Legion 'with our donations.
- Trauma Teddies, hats and jumpers for 'Light into Europe' deliveries all going to Mark Platt in Frinton. Trauma Teddies going to the Women's Refuge in Harwich.

Our most recent and current charity is called 'Christian Hope International'.

Blankets, jumpers, hats and mittens are delivered to Christine Stimpson in Alresford who organises our donations to be taken to Harold Hill where returning Flower lorries take our donations to Romania.

Sadly, Mary died suddenly several years ago but her wonderful legacy lives on. Knit and Knatter continues to grow each month, ideas and new outlets for are creations are always explored and encouraged.

Now in 2023, the venue has changed and we meet every month at Seven Rivers Cheshire Home, where we always welcome the residents who enjoy our company and are encouraged to join in with us. We provide wool and needles if necessary. Creating special moments for them where friendships can blossom, with homemade cake and sausage rolls, with a cup of tea.

All are welcome every second Wednesday of the month 2pm-4pm.

MAKE A CHANGE BECOME A COUNCILLOR

Are you passionate about your community? Do you want to help make a long-lasting change? Do you have innovative ideas for the council? Do you have concerns about a specific issue and want to do something about it? If this is you, then we need you. We need people from all backgrounds and experiences who reflect their community to put themselves forward for election. Make a change and become a councillor.

"Your Parish Council is the local authority closest to the Electorate."

Each councillor has their own reasons for running but the role offers the chance to make a huge difference to the quality of life for people in your local area.

Being an effective councillor requires both commitment and hard work. Councillors have to balance the needs and interests of residents and the council.

A Parish Council is a separate legal, corporate entity. First created by the Local Government Act of 1894 in most rural areas, the current consolidated legislation is that of 1972.

A Parish Council also provides services for the local people. These will range from recreation grounds and play areas, a cemetery and may be crematorium to allotments, bath-houses and nature reserves. What you provide is down to your Council. There is a list of the activities that a Parish Council has the power to provide. Like any statutory body it can only do the things for which the law or any governing document gives a power.

The Parish Council has one particular asset that is extremely valuable — it has the ability to set a Precept (sum of money), which is collected from all residents through the Council Tax system. With the right to levy a form of taxation come some duties. In particular a duty to behave in an ethical manner according to a Code of Conduct (declaring interests and leaving the room when likely to be prejudiced) and a duty to have the annual accounts subjected to audit.

Training is available and support will be found from colleagues and the Clerk to the Council.

All Councillors retire after a four year term, but can stand again as many times as they wish; casual vacancies may well arise in the intervening period. It is a useful way of seeing if you like being a local Councillor to take a seat for a short period before the next full elections.

So if you want to do more for your community, if you want to spend your time productively, and if you can think, listen and act locally — Become a Parish Councillor.

Parish Council elections are in May and you may be interested in what the Council does.

We comment on planning matters and all councillors are encouraged to carry out site visits so they are aware of the location and nature of the application. We have been involved with the Hamilton Lodge development and are endeavouring to get the best deal for our community. We are hopeful the current developers will provide a building for a village pre school. We have also been involved with the Robinson Close development and have very strongly opposed any further properties.

We are responsible for Church Meadow, which is not a designated car park, it was given to the Parish by a local farming family many years ago for community use. Maintenance and grass cutting are the responsibility of your Parish Council.

We maintain the Footpath Map notice board in Church Meadow and dog waste bins throughout the parish, we are currently waiting for a replacement dog waste bin

We maintain the War Memorial, a contractor has been requested to attend to the broken kerb stones around the Memorial, as large vehicles quite often drive over the kerb at this junction.

We are constantly in contact with Essex Highways regarding highway matters, including the disappearing white lines at the Court House junction and the speed reduction along Harwich Road. We chase them regarding pavement repairs and the safety barrier at Pound Corner. Anybody that has had dealings with ECC Highways will appreciate how difficult it is to get them to carry out requests. We have a Speedwatch operating within the Parish which is organised by a member of our Council, if you would like to join please contact our Clerk.

We are fighting fiercely to obtain permission and funding for a footpath along Harwich Road.

We are also part of the "20 is plenty scheme" which a national organisation is attempting to get Councils throughout then country to adopt, especially near schools. We have also been in contact with Affinity Water regarding damage caused to our hedge along Hare Green recreation field.

We have recently installed some additional play equipment at Hare Green which is for the use and enjoyment for the whole village. The Parish Council arranges to carry out annual litter picks- Residents are welcome to help. Details will be circulated in The Messenger.

TUBBY AND JEAN AUSTIN

There was much sadness at the passing of Jean Austin in June 2022, followed by Tubby just six months later. Although the couple had lived in Ardleigh most of their married lives, they always kept close to their Great Bromley roots.

Geoffrey Clare Austin was born on 6th September 1928, the fifth of six children, brothers Ernest (known as Bunny), Frank and George and sisters Mary and Nancy. When he was a boy he picked up a nickname that stuck for life. As he told it: "I was born in those cottages up Hall Road, just before you get to Bush Farm, and further up the road there was a family called Barrells. Geoffrey Barrell was my play mate when we were 6 or 7 years old. One day when we were mucking about I cheeked him. I called him Butty Barrell (as in a water butt) and he turned round and called me Tubby, and the name stuck from that day on."

Tubby and his siblings went to primary school at Great Bromley and on to Great Bentley School. All the family were involved with village life, especially sport. At one time, all four brothers were playing cricket together for Bromley. Tubby played for the village football and badminton teams as well as cricket, all of which seemed to have their headquarters at the Spread Eagle pub, where he and his brother George also won darts trophies. Tubby started work at Badley Hall Farm and remembered being on his tractor the day the wooden wartime pylons were demolished in the field next to him.

Jean Maureen Norfolk was born on 27th May 1938 at Church Cottage. On 1st June 1957 she married Tubby, with some eyebrows raised at the ten-year age difference, but 64 years of marriage showed it was a perfect match. They set up home in Hill Cottages near the village hall, but after a few years Tubby changed careers and they went to live in Manningtree with Jean's parents Bun and Cissie, Bun being a foreman at Parsons & Son the builders. Tubby secured a job with Parsons and then he and Jean purchased and renovated the bungalow in Ardleigh that was to become their home.

They maintained close connections with Bromley, Tubby with his sport, and his many years playing the fool in the Pantomime and the Bromley Buskers. Although never "front of stage" herself, Jean was always there in close support, making teas and raising funds for all these organisations. Her contribution over the years was immense - nobody could sell raffle tickets like Jean! They were usually to be seen supporting Village Hall sales and other events right to the end.

When Tubby retired after nearly 40 years association with the cricket club, he took up the sport of bowls, joining the club at Brantham where he made many new friends and was immensely proud to be elected club president and later to have life membership bestowed upon him.

There are so many fond memories of the couple. Tubby always greeted you as if you were the most important acquaintance of the day. Grabbing your hand, giving you a hug or a wave, he always had time for you, so pleased if you stopped for a chat, so happy to pass the time of day. Jean was equally well loved, a wonderful person who gave everything and expected nothing in return and was genuinely interested in how you were and what you were up to.



Tubby had some health issues in recent years and it was a surprise to all that he was predeceased by Jean. He moved to Blackbrook House in Dedham, as he could not cope on his own. He was very happy there, he loved the staff and they all loved him and made his last

months without Jean as happy as they could be.

IN THE GARDEN WITH ANDY & JUDY

Despite the recent low temperatures, daylight is increasing and many of us will be keen to make a start. With recent weather patterns expected to continue, there have been several articles in gardening magazines about future proofing our gardens against climate change. The RHS journal, The Garden, makes five points to assist.

- Improve your soil by incorporating organic matter to aid water retention;
- Create shade by planting fruit trees bushes and hedges of nut and berries to create a micro climate. It is suggested these leafy plants cast a light shade helping to cool the plot during the heat of the day. It is suggested that lettuce, brassicas and broad beans grow well in light shade, whereas tomatoes and courgettes prefer warm sun;
- Save water by installing multiple water butts. Make better use of the water you apply by prioritising it. Peas, beans and sweetcorn in flower are a priority as are potatoes when producing tubers and large leafy crops. Carrots and perennial vegetables (unless recently planted) are the most drought tolerant. If an excess of water is your problem, plant on mounds or raised beds. The February rainfall was only 8% for the average for Essex and it is reported we had a deficit of 3 months of rainfall. At the time of writing though, it does appear that we are making up for some of that in March:
- Try to prevent diseases such as powdery mildew that is common in dry weather on courgettes and marrows. Watering and mulching can help as can spacing crops to aid air movement coupled with removing diseased material promptly;

• Stagger crops, sow little and often, and plant leafy vegetables and salad crops to enable harvesting before and after but not during the heat of midsummer. Try using bolt resistant cultivars that are available which are less affected by the heat.

As an update on our conversion to the 'no dig' method of gardening mentioned last month, I can tell you that in February we obtained mushroom compost to top the flower and vegetable beds with wood chip for the paths. We were a bit late doing so, as it should be done in the autumn because the compost can be quite strong initially. The beds also need time for the fungal, bacterial and worm activity to happen. However, with the recent cold weather and amount of rain in March, planting will be very late this year abating some of the potential problem. To further compensate, we will also carefully draw back the compost to plant the broad beans and peas to ensure the rootballs of the plants do not have contact with the compost in case there is any chance of burning. The same will apply to young lettuce, beetroot and brassica seedlings. We may also use a traditional compost planting mix in the holes where we feel the plants may are particularly vulnerable. In addition we are unlikely to sow seeds directly into the beds this year other than carrots which have their own enviromesh covered raised bed to avoid carrot fly. Hopefully we will have taken enough steps to ensure healthy and abundant crops. By mid-April we should have all potatoes planted and be sowing sweetcorn, beans, cucumbers, and courgettes under glass or you could try this in the open ground, with added protection from fleece or cloches. In any event, the weed suppression from composting has so far has been excellent, which is definitely a bonus.

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends,

I love a good comeback story – you know the sort: where someone is 'down and out', given no hope of success in their field of sport or career or romance – then, all of a sudden, they experience a meteoric rise and succeed in an incredible way. One example in recent history was Leicester City, who started the 2015-16 Premier League season 5,000/1 to win the title. But we all know how it finished up for them: victory, fame, jubilation and celebration.

Comeback stories also justify those who were loyal to the ones who were down and out, written off and given no hope of success. The long-term Leicester City fans would have felt all their loyalty, their hopes, their wardrobe of football shirts were not in vain – they did, ultimately, have a Club that was the best of them all.

And just as that is true in sport or in a career or romantic endeavours, so it is also true in matters of faith. Because before we celebrate the extraordinary historical event of Jesus' resurrection from the dead, we must face up to the seeming despair of so-called 'Good' Friday. Jesus, the one person in the history of humanity who always did what His God and Father asked of Him (even

when it cost Him greatly), was put to death for charges that had no substance to them. His followers would have been downcast and desperate in the aftermath... Unless, of course, they had remembered these words which He had spoken to them before His crucifixion:

"...unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds." John 12:24

Jesus spoke these words (and many like them) to His disciples so that when all seemed lost, they would not give up hope. In our world today it might seem like all reason to hope is fast disappearing - wars rage, economic prospects are tight, relationships keep breaking down - but the lesson from Jesus' resurrection is that just at the point where things look completely irretrievable God acts to bring extraordinary good out of great evil. And the resurrection of Jesus from the dead is not the first time He has done this nor was it the last. Come and join the celebration of Christians of the greatest comeback story humanity has ever seen, the death and resurrection of Jesus, this month in your local parish.
