JUNE IS CERVICAL SCREENING AWARENESS MONTH

Cervical screening is one of the best ways to protect yourself from cervical cancer. Cervical screening (a smear test) checks the health of your cervix. It's not a test for cancer, it's a test to help prevent cancer. All women and people with a cervix aged <u>25 to 64</u> <u>should be invited by letter.</u> People aged 25 to 49 receive invitations every 3 years. People aged 50 to 64 receive invitations every 5 years.

How cervical screening helps prevent cancer - During the screening appointment, a small sample of cells will be taken from your cervix. The sample is checked for certain types of human papillomavirus (HPV) that can cause changes to the cells of your cervix. These are called "high risk" types of HPV. If these types of HPV are not found, you do not need any further tests. If these types of HPV are found, the sample is then checked for any changes in the cells of your cervix. These can then be treated before they get a chance to turn into cervical cancer. If abnormal cells are not treated. they may turn into cervical cancer. The nurse will be able to tell you at your appointment when you can expect your results letter.

How to book a Cervical Smear Test You'll be sent an invitation letter in the post when it's time to book your cervical screening appointment. Once you have received this letter, all you need to do is contact the Surgery on telephone number 01206 250691 and book an appointment with one of our Practice Nurses.

Prescription Requests

We have over 6,500 patients on repeat medication which normally require regular monthly prescriptions. Our Prescription Clerks are trained to deal with medication requests and can also help patients who may have an enquiry about their medication.

In order to ensure we are able to turn all requests around within three working days, our Prescription Clerks are not able to speak to patients at reception face-to-face, so please do not come into reception and ask to speak to someone about medication.

Our Prescription Clerks can be contacted between 9am - 3pm Monday to Friday by telephoning the main Surgery number 01206 250691 or 01206 257557 and choosing Option 2 for prescriptions. If you go into the hold queue, to avoid waiting for the Prescription Clerk to answer, you can press 1 and leave your name and number for them to ring you back. If you contact the Prescription Clerk before 3pm then you will get a call back on the same day. If it is after 3pm then you will be called back on the next working day.

All requests for medication need to be made in writing allowing at least three working days, as we do not have the capacity to take medication requests over the telephone.


You can request your medication by emailing the Prescription Clerk on: <u>holliesprescriptions@nhs.net</u>, by dropping in a written request into the prescription box next to the front door, or via your on-line account. Once you have put in your request and allowed three working days for us to process this, then you can collect this from your nominated pharmacy. Please do not ring the Prescription Clerk to check if your prescription has been issued as you will need to contact the Pharmacy about this.

Your help with managing prescription requests is much appreciated.

Surgery Training Afternoon Along with all other surgeries in the area we will be shut from 12 noon on Wednesday, 28 June 2023 for staff training. If patients require urgent care on this afternoon, then this is available by contacting 111 for assistance.

We are pleased to say that £1500 raised from the run will be given to local


charity N.E.S.T. (North East Essex Support Team). This charity supports families around Tendring / Clacton / Harwich.

The Parish Council held an Extraordinary Meeting on Thursday April 20th to discuss the Five Estuaries Stage 2 Consultation and gather feedback from the village. A large number of residents attended and following a short presentation which summarised the Five Estuaries plans we discussed the potential impact. A show of hands indicated that all residents present were against the development, and we received tremendous feedback on concerns. These have been included in the Parish Council response to the Stage 2 Consultation which can be found at https://www.littlebromley.org.uk/notice/ five-estuaries-feedback. Many residents also said that they would respond directly to Five Estuaries and we hope to be able to provide you with an approximate count of the number of responses sent in the next Messenger.

The North Falls Statutory Consultation starts on the 16th May 2023 and closes at 23.59 on the 14th July 2023. For the Onshore Infrastructure which will particularly affect Little Bromley they will be consulting on 3 options -

Option 1: Onshore electrical connection at a National Grid connection point within Tendring, Essex, with a project alone onshore cable route and onshore substation infrastructure;

Option 2: Onshore electrical connection at a National Grid connection point within Tendring, Essex, sharing all or part of an onshore cable route with separate onshore export cables with another project (such as Five Estuaries) where practicable, or

Option 3: Offshore electrical connection supplied by a third-party electricity network provider. Such a connection will potentially be identified through the OTNR process. We will advise when we have further information on the Consultation on the village Noticeboard, Facebook and the Parish Council website. The Parish Council will take a similar approach to that we adopted for Five Estuaries please look out for further information.

Following the May 2023 Local Elections your Parish Council are looking for additional Parish Councillors. There will be a formal notice following our next meeting on May 18th 2023. We will advertise in the usual way (Noticeboard, Facebook and Website).

Our War Memorial is looking very neat and tidy thanks to Gemma and the Nasta Family for doing the tidying up in May. We received donations from Eric Benneson and Paul Stow, and we bought some lovely plants to brighten it up. I am sure you will agree, it's looking very smart. Paul has also offered to donate some time to paint the concrete posts and repaint the chains. A big thank you to everyone who has been involved so far.



CONSULTATION LAUNCHED ON NORTH FALLS OFFSHORE WIND FARM

Third phase of consultation for project sited 20 kilometres off the East Anglia coast in the southern North Sea

Southern North Sea offshore wind farm, North Falls, has launched the statutory consultation on its proposals today (Tuesday 16 May, 2023).

North Falls is a proposed extension to the existing 504-megawatt Greater Gabbard Offshore Wind Farm, and comprises an offshore array area totaling 150km² sited around 20 kilometres off the East Anglia coast and an onshore grid connection location in Tendring, Essex. Underground cables would carry power from landfall near Frinton-on-Sea around 24 kilometres to a new onshore substation.

In this third round of consultation, the project team seeks comments from communities and the wider public on its project proposals, and specifically on its preliminary environmental information report (PEIR).

This report sets out the initial findings from the thorough environmental impact assessment carried out by the project over the past three years. This work included onshore and offshore surveys, desk-based research and stakeholder consultation to identify potential environmental and community impacts from the project, and how those impacts could be dealt with.

North Falls Project Director, Andy Paine said that the consultation is a key chance for those with an interest in the project to review the current proposals and provide comments, particularly on any elements where their local knowledge may provide invaluable.

"The proposals presented are not the final application, but rather this is an opportunity for the local community and others to influence the details of the application before it is submitted to the Planning Inspectorate."

Following its previous two consultation in October 2021 and October 2022, this current consultation presents updated project proposals, particularly around its three options for transmission infrastructure, and offers a number of ways for people to feed in their views. There will be an online consultation portal and two webinars plus the chance to meet the team at five Essex events in early June being held in Great Bromley, Tendring, Frinton-on-Sea, Thorpe-le-Soken and Ardleigh.

For those in coastal regions potentially impacted by views of the wind farm, North Falls has also created a 3D interactive computer model with views from 17 different coastal locations for people to be able to see how it could look.

The consultation will run **until Friday 14 July 2023**. All the reports, maps and details related to the consultation, including the dates and venues of the in-person events, are now available on the project's consultation portal: https://stat.northfallsoffshore.com/ which can also be accessed via the website: www.northfallsoffshore.com.

North Falls Offshore Wind Farm is being developed by a 50/50 joint venture company owned equally by SSE Renewables and RWE.

IN THE GARDEN WITH ANDY & JUDY

Generally, you can be more relaxed about overnight temperatures but still check the weather forecasts to ensure that something unexpected is not likely in terms of frost or very heavy rain.

It is probable that greenhouses and cold frames can be left open at night saving the chore of opening every morning and closing every night.

This will be a busy month in terms of harvesting. As well as saladings and new potatoes possibly broad beans and early peas you may have strawberries and early blackcurrants.

Continue with succession sowing and plant out hardened off plants. Ensure that where possible and practical you mulch around plants to retain moisture. Depending on how much rainwater storage you have you will need to decide what plants should receive priority in the event of low rainfall and a possible hosepipe ban. The usual advice is to water a reasonable amount at any one time as small 'flash overs' of water result in close to the surface roots that are vulnerable in strong sunshine. It is suggested that if you have a slug problem morning watering is to be preferred as damp soil overnight gives the slugs easier access to the plants.

By mid-June you should check on the shallots and garlic and if they are a reasonable size, and if not still growing, you should consider helping them to ripen. If you crack the roots by raising them slightly with a fork it will prepare them to dry out naturally. Next month you can then harvest them, clean them off and dry them out ready for storage.

If you are following the 'no mow May' routine you will need to decide whether to continue this for a further period. Whenever you decide to resume mowing it is best if you gradually reduce the height rather than trying to achieve it in one cut. Whatever you decide you will have to accept the grass looking very yellow before it greens up again.

Monty Don recently wrote that the effects of climate change are making him reconsider whether his style of labour-intensive gardening based on the back-up of greenhouses, coldframes and sheds in which to protect tender plants is both outmoded and inappropriate. His suggestion is that by growing less of the tender plants that need winter protection such as bananas, cannas, some salvias and dahlias, a lot of labour can be saved. Obviously, you can take a chance and leave some of them insitu with protection, but a severe frost, extended cold weather and heavy rainfall could prove very damaging.

Most spring bulbs have now finished flowering and it is beneficial to remove seed heads and allow the foliage to die back naturally combined with applying a general fertiliser. This will enable the bulbs to store energy for next years flowers. If any clumps appear congested lift them with a fork, divide the clumps and replant them. It is easier to do this now rather than lifting them, drying them off and replanting them in the autumn. Planting them in the green will look untidy for a while but it saves work and storage space.

Consider giving hardier house plants an outside break once all risk of frost has passed ensuring they are protected from wind and very strong sunshine.

Do not forget to sow winter greens that will need to be grown through the summer and autumn for harvesting next winter and spring.



RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends,

Cucumber sandwiches, coronation chicken, Union flags and even a dash of Pimms – the perfect recipe for a nation-wide bash, as we celebrated amongst family, friends and neighbours the coronation of King Charles III. I don't know if you're anything like me and you keep slipping back to a 'God save the Queen' when the national anthem comes on (even more awkward when leading prayers in church!), but these things do happen when one era concludes and new one begins.

I hope that, however you were able to celebrate it, you did so safely and happily. Times of transition are marked by a certain nostalgia for the past and what has come to an end, joy at the prospect of something new and hopefulness for what lies ahead. This can all be hard to maintain with the backdrop of increasing hostilities between nations, pressing problems on our shores and significant uncertainty about the future economically, politically and even spiritually.

It is at such times that I find great comfort from this short verse from the New Testament: "King Jesus is the same yesterday and today and for ever" (Hebrews 13:8). It is a reminder that, even though monarchs, like the seasons, come and go, there is something that remains fixed, firm and reliable amidst it all: a King whose way is love, who is full of both grace and truth. Elsewhere He is described as the "King of Kings" (Revelation 17:10). another reminder that all political rulers are, ultimately, accountable to Him which can be a wonderful relief in uncertain times, in times of transition.

May you know something of the security that comes from His rule and reign at this time.
