"Has any one else had word of him?" Not this tide.


For what is sunk will hardly swim, Not with this wind blowing, and this tide.

Supporting Church music in the Tendring area

The anthem that they will be singing will be 'A spotless rose' by Herbert Howells, a haunting melody that repeats throughout the anthem.

Herbert Howells was born in Lydney, Gloucester on 17 October 1892. He showed a keen interest in composition early in his life and, at the age of eighteen, became a pupil of Herbert Brewer, Organist of Gloucester Cathedral. In 1912 he was awarded a scholarship to the Royal College of Music and studied under Charles Villiers Stanford, Walter Parratt, Charles Wood and Hubert Parry.

Dec 10th

The Deanery choir will be singing at **St Georges Church, Great Bromley CO7 7HZ** at the 10.30am communion service. The anthem that they will be singing is 'Bethlehem Down' by Peter Warlock.

"Peter Warlock" was in fact the pseudonym under which the multi-talented Philip Heseltine released his compositions to the world. Heseltine was a gifted

writer and music journalist, an editor of early music at a time when it was generally neglected, and a generous encourager of the efforts of other composers. But most importantly of all, he was a spontaneous and original composer (as Peter Warlock), chiefly of a large corpus of over 100 songs, written between the end of the First World War and his death in 1930.

DECEMBER IS BEREAVEMENT AWARENESS MONTH

Symptoms of bereavement, grief, and loss Bereavement, grief, and loss can cause many different symptoms and they affect people in different ways. There's no right or wrong way to feel.

As well as bereavement, there are other types of loss such as the end of a relationship or losing a job or home.

Some of the most common symptoms include:

 shock and numbness – this is usually the first reaction to loss, and people often talk about "being in a daze"

- overwhelming sadness, with lots of crying
- tiredness or exhaustion
- anger towards the person you've lost or the reason for your loss
- guilt for example, guilt about feeling angry, about something you said or did not say, or not being able to stop your loved one dying

These feelings may not be there all the time and powerful feelings may appear unexpectedly. It's not always easy to recognise when bereavement, grief or loss are the reason you're acting or feeling differently.

Things you can try to help with bereavement, grief and loss

Do

- Try talking about your feelings to a friend, family member, health professional or counsellor – you could also contact a support organisation such as Cruse Bereavement Care or call: 0808 808 1677
- If you're struggling to sleep, get sleep tips from Every Mind Matters
- consider peer support, where people use their experiences to help each other. Find out more about peer support on the Mind website
- listen to free mental wellbeing audio guides
- try the 6 ways to feel happier, which are simple lifestyle changes to help you feel more in control and able to cope

Don't

 Do not try to do everything at once – set small targets that you can easily achieve

- Do not focus on the things you cannot change – focus your time and energy into helping yourself feel better
- Try not to tell yourself that you're alone
 most people feel grief after a loss and support is available
- Try not to use alcohol, cigarettes, gambling or drugs to relieve grief – these can all contribute to poor mental health

Hello Great Bromley,

This is the month we remember the brave men and women that made the ultimate sacrifice in defence of our freedoms. Ali, a longstanding member of the admin team of over 20 years' service to Seven Rivers, had the honour of laying the wreath on our behalf. Ali's leaving us this month and will be sorely missed by all; we wish her every success in her new endeavours.

The service on Remembrance Sunday at St Georges got me thinking, how to express just how much they sacrificed for us all. After some soul searching, I thought it best to allow the words of one brave soldier, Private Albert Ford who wrote to his wife, Edith, on a scrap piece of paper before going 'over the top, to tell a story that I couldn't.

"My darling if this should ever reach

you it will be a sure sign that I am gone under and what will become of you and the chicks I do not know but there is one above that will see to you and not let you starve."

"You have been the best of wives and I loved you deeply, how much you will never know.

"Dear heart, do think sometimes of me in the future when your grief has worn a bit, and the older children, I know won't forget me, and speak sometimes of me to the younger ones..."

"Dearest, if the chance should come your way for you are young and good looking and should a good man give you an offer it would please me to think you would take it, not to grieve too much for me...

"I should not have left you thus bringing suffering and poverty on a loving wife and children for which in time I hope you will forgive me.

"So dear heart I will bid you all farewell hoping to meet you in the time to come if there is a hereafter. Know that my last thoughts were of you in the dugout or on the fire step my thoughts went out to you, the only one I ever loved, the one that made a man of me."

Now close your eyes and imagine yourself in his place, a man with everything to live for, minutes before the sound of the whistle echoing in his

ears to go over the wall to face death square in the face, and all he could think of was his loved ones, a true hero.

Albert was killed in action on 26 October 1917. His last letter was treasured by Edith until her death. She never remarried and as she lay dying in February 1956, she said she could see Albert in the corner of her bedroom.

I can only hope that Albert and Edith are together once again, God bless them all.



News From Acorn VILLAGE

After much thought we have decided to rename our onsite Coffee Shop. We felt its beautiful setting left it deserving a name more fitting and so we are proud to unveil The Walled Garden Café! Visitors are always amazed to see the lovely outside space at the rear of the building and we encourage people to take a look even if they sit inside. We now have a team volunteers that support Becky, Rachel and Jacqui during opening hours of 10am to 4pm Monday to Friday. There is a breakfast menu available 10am-11.30am, a kids menu, a main menu and lots of tasty specials. Friendly dogs on leads are welcome and can have a complimentary dog biscuit! We hope to see you soon.

Next to the Café we have our onsite Charity Shop and we also have one in Manningtree High Street, why not pop in to grab a bargain. Both the Café and the Charity shops income goes to supporting adults with learning disabilities.

Acorn Village is a charity that was set up more than 50 years ago by a group of dedicated parents that wanted a better way of life for their children with learning disabilities as they become adults. They fundraised to raise the money to buy the

14-acre site in Clacton Road, Mistley and continued to do so over the years to ensure the model of care and support they wanted was able to carry on. There are currently 53 adults with learning disabilities that live at Acorn Village and every one lives their life to their full potential. Care is provided on a daily basis by a team of Care Support Workers, many of whom have worked here for many years and are passionate about the work they do. Our residents and tenants enjoy a wide range of activities and workshops that cater for all their interests and that help their learning development. Did you know? Great Bromley has two Automated External Defibrillators. You can access these at:

- The Courthouse, Harwich Road, CO7 7JG or
- The Cross Inn, Ardleigh Road, CO7 7TL

Also at the Cross Inn is a Bleed Kit. The kit, provided by Great Bromley Parish Council, contains specialist equipment to help stem extreme blood loss before ambulance crews arrive.

Bleed control kits, also known as emergency trauma packs, are similar to first aid kits but include trauma dressings, gauze, chest seals and tourniquets to help stop serious bleeding. They can help victims of violent crime, those involved in road traffic accidents or workplace accidents, and could be particularly useful in rural areas where ambulance response times may be slower.

Don't ignore it - Report it at www.essexhighways.org Essex

Essex Highways carry out regular inspections of roads and pavements, but issues may come up between these inspections. These could be potholes or other road surface issues, damaged street lights, street signs, overgrown trees, or issues with public rights of way.

We produce a weekly audio recording of local news and other items of interest. We are looking for new listeners who are visually impaired or who have some temporary or permanent disability which makes reading a strain.

If you know someone who fits into one of the above categories yet does not have a subscription with ourselves, then please see the contact details below and get in touch, provided you have that person's agreement.

This recording comes out each week via the Royal Mail and should arrive on

a Saturday morning. This comes in the form of a memory stick that can either be played on a computer, laptop or even a tablet. However, the listener does not need to own one of these devices as we will lend the listener a playback device, free of charge, and demonstrate how the listener can use it.

The memory sticks are then returned in the wallet that it arrives in, at no cost to the listener under the Royal Mail's concession for "Articles for the Blind". The wallet is then reused on another occasion.

On Sunday 12th November a Service of Remembrance was held at Little Bromley war memorial. The Service was lead by Gregory Frostick with 17 residents attending including Little Bromley Parish Councillors and Clerk. Wreaths were laid, one from the Parish Council and one from the Bromley Parochial Church Council. A wreath was also laid from the local Conservative Association.

We are continuing to explore installing a 'traditional' telephone box in the car park on Shop Road to be used as a book exchange. Councillor Barrett has applied for a community grant from Tendring District Council to help with the purchase and installation. Our application has been acknowledged and we await the outcome of the process.

We have been advised that the Corbeau Seats Rally has been cancelled for 2024 due to budget cuts and there are no current plans for future events in the Parish.

We have had no further updates from National Grid. Five Estuaries or North Falls on their infrastructure development plans for the Parish. Another potential developer is Tarchon who plan to build a subsea electric link between the UK and Germany. Tarchon have been offered a connection by National Grid to their substation proposed for the western side of the Parish. Tarchon will require a substation and a converter station and say that they will make landfall in Essex. They now have a website tarchonenergy.net and state that their detailed environmental and technical studies will commence in 2024 with planning applications

submitted in 2026. The lobbying for an offshore solution continues which would negate the requirement for these developments in Little Bromley.

I am sure that you have noticed the large amount of rainfall we have had recently. According to my rain gauge in October we had 153.5mm (over 6 inches) and as of writing this article in November so far we have had 78.5mm (over 3 inches). This follows a wet summer. Please let the Parish Council know of any roads or areas in the village which are especially prone to localised flooding and we will contact Tendring District Council and Essex Highways to see if they can assist.

We held our last Parish Council meeting of 2023 on November 16th at the Haywain. Our next Parish Council meeting is on Thursday January 18th 2024. We look forward to seeing you there.

Season's greetings to all our patients, friends and advocates of Ardleigh Surgery.

News from the surgery We have a clinical pharmacist; his name is Joseph Davies. Joseph will have patient consultations on Tuesdays both face to face (F2F) and telephone and admin on Wednesdays. Joseph will be dealing with the following:

- Medication reconciliation i.e., making sure that your discharge medication, outpatient medication changes are reconciled with your repeat prescription list on your GP system.
- Prescription gueries Complicated, Patients on multiple medications
- F2F & Telephone Consultations for minor health conditions like flu, constipation
- Care homes medication queries
- Medication reviews
- New patient for their first medication issue

Dr Babalola our GP trainee has now finished his training and will be leaving us to take up a substantive GP post in London. We wish him good luck.

Lisa Sotheron our health care assistant and phlebotomist is now a qualified nurse and she will be working as a practice nurse and will not be doing routine phlebotomy clinics.

We have recruited a new GP assistant. Joshua Scoote who replaced Sam Taylor.

We now have extended access GP clinics at our sister surgery Riverside health centre in Manningtree. This will be on the third Saturday of every month dependent on staffing.

You should now be able to see your notes GP notes if you register with the NHS app.

Information for all our patients Please book yourselves and your children to have

your flu vaccinations if you have not already done so. There is a high prevalence of viral respiratory illness this winter as we are all mingling without face masks.

The bank holiday hours for Ardleigh surgery are as follows:

We are open at 0800hrs and close at 1830hrs every weekday over the holidays except the 25th, 26th of December 2023 and the 1st of January 2024.

As the dispensary and pharmacist will be busier than usual, please request your medications early but no more than a week earlier than usual.

The next compulsory Northeast Essex Surgery training afternoon will be on Tuesday the 30th of January 2023. The Surgery will close from 12.30hrs and dispensary from 12.00hrs.

Dear Friends,
