IDENTITY FRAUD

Identity fraud, or 'ID theft', involves the use of a person's stolen details to commit crime. Many victims never find out exactly how someone got hold of their details, and clearing things up afterwards can be costly and stressful.

Protect your address:

- If you start getting post for someone you don't know, try to find out why.
- Lenders use the electoral roll to check who's registered as living at a particular address.
- When registering to vote, tick the box to opt out of the 'edited' register. This will help prevent unsolicited marketing mail or junk mail. This doesn't affect credit checks.

You can also:

 sign up to the Mail Preference Service to prevent marketing letters protect mail left in communal areas of residential properties redirect your mail when moving home

Protect your bank accounts

- Be extremely wary of unsolicited phone calls, letters or emails from your bank or other financial institution asking you to confirm your: personal details, passwords and security numbers
- Regularly check your bank accounts and chase up any statements that you don't get when you expect them.
- Dispose of anything containing your personal or banking details by using a cross-cut shredder or tearing into small pieces.

HAVE YOUR SAY ON THE REPLACEMENT ESSEX MINERALS LOCAL PLAN

Residents are invited to have their say on the future of minerals development in Essex. Like other Planning Authorities across the country, Essex County Council is required to publish a Minerals Local Plan. This provides planning policies for minerals development in Essex and identifies future sites for mineral extraction or quarrying.

Essex County Council has launched a consultation on the Replacement Essex Minerals Local Plan, which would run to 2040. During the consultation, residents and other stakeholders can



have their say on the sites submitted for inclusion, as well as the revised plan itself.

Easter Opening Hours

The normal Surgery opening times are from 8.00 am to 6.30 pm Monday to Friday. Over the Easter bank holiday, the Surgery will be closed on Friday, 29 March 2024 and Monday, 1 April 2024.

If you are on regular medication, please remember to order this in good time so you don't run out over the Easter weekend. We do require three working days (excluding Saturday and Sunday) to process all prescriptions.

The new Pharmacy First service is now up and running and allows participating community pharmacies to receive referrals from NHS 111, GP practices and other referring centres. As well as the Surgery referring patients to this new service, patients can also self-refer themselves.

Pharmacy First referrals are requests for a pharmacist to support patients that require:

- A consultation with a pharmacist to manage a minor illness
- A consultation for one of 7 common conditions listed below:

If needed, the pharmacist is also able to prescribe appropriate medication for these conditions.

Along with all other surgeries in the area we will be shut from 12 noon on Wednesday, 27 March 2024 for staff training.

After the heavy and at times prolonged rain I hope everybody is safe well and dry, please phone me if you need any help or support with the extreme weather.

There is an application for construction of bungalows alongside Harwich Road, by Privo Land Ltd, this application includes a pavement. A representative of the company attended the Parish Council meeting on 14th February and outlined its proposal, they intend to hold a public consultation in our Village Hall in the near future. This pavement would be a huge asset to the village as it would link Hare Green to the School, the new shop and Church and keep our community safe. For many years your Parish Council have been trying to get permission for a pavement and it is now looking imminent should planning permission be granted.

I have received several complaints regarding mud on the highway at Parsons Hill caused by developers at Hamilton Lodge. I am aware that our Clerk has been in touch with the company and requested they ensure the road surface is maintained in a safe manner. Elemento have allowed the Parish Council to recycle some wooden benches from the grounds of Hamilton Lodge that were not required by them.

There is concern regarding water flooding onto Parsons Hill at its junction with Mary Lane from the Orwell Housing development. The Council is also aware of water flowing from adjoining fields onto some gardens and garages in the Orwell Housing development. When Orwell Housing

applied to TDC Planning department to build more properties in Mary Lane, the Parish Council and some residents objected. Cllr Gary Scott, one of our District Councillors and myself spoke at the Planning Committee pointing out to Officers and the Committee the problems at Robinson Close with water flowing off surrounding fields onto gardens and garages in Robinson Close; unfortunately Officers and the Committee chose to ignore our concerns. Now there are serious problems with water flowing into some gardens and garages in Robinson Close. The council awaits with interest any action the Developers will take, perhaps TDC Enforcement will have to become involved. The Clerk has been requested to write to Orwell Housing and to copy in TDC Planning and Enforcement Department and ask they take remedial action for both the home owners and the flood water flowing onto Parsons Hill.

There is still a problem with flood water in Frating Road, we have been in contact with ECC Highways yet again, hopefully they will react and attend and deal with the problem before a serious collision occurs.

Low level play equipment is being installed at Church Meadow, to discourage playing on gravestones and trees and potential injury or damage.

Essex Highways carry out regular inspections of roads and pavements, but issues may come up between these inspections. These could be potholes or other road surface issues, damaged street lights, street signs, overgrown trees, or issues with public rights of way.

Report maintenance issues online by using the highways reporting tool. If you think there's a risk to public safety please call 0345 603 7631 or if you have hearing problems you can use the text phone service on 0345 758 5592.



Did you know? Great Bromley has two Automated External Defibrillators. You can access these at:

- The Courthouse, Harwich Road, CO7 7JG or
- The Cross Inn, Ardleigh Road, CO7 7TL

Also at the Cross Inn is a Bleed Kit. The kit, provided by Great Bromley Parish Council, contains specialist equipment to help stem extreme blood loss before ambulance crews arrive.

Bleed control kits, also known as emergency trauma packs, are similar to first aid kits but include trauma dressings, gauze, chest seals and tourniquets to help stop serious bleeding. They can help victims of violent crime, those involved in road traffic accidents or workplace accidents, and could be particularly useful in rural areas where ambulance response times may be slower.

ESSEX TRADING STANDARDS ON POSTAL SCAMS

Postal scams can be challenging to identify, making it crucial to be aware of common tactics used by scammers. Examples include lottery and prize draw scams, pyramid schemes, psychic and clairvoyant fraud, bogus job offers, and inheritance scams. It is important to note that legitimate lotteries do not require fees for collecting winnings, pyramid schemes should be avoided altogether, psychics sending generic letters are likely scams, authentic job offers do not ask for upfront registration fees, and suspicious inheritance claims should be verified with the Law Society. Taking preventative measures such as registering with the Mailing Preference Service and reporting any postal scams to Action Fraud can help protect against fraudulent activities.

If you suspect that you or someone you know has fallen victim to a postal scam. it is crucial to take immediate action. Contact Action Fraud promptly at



0300 123 2040 to report the scam and seek assistance.

If you require guidance regarding the legality of a particular scheme, reach out to the Citizens Advice Consumer **Helpline at 0808 223 1133** for expert advice and support. By staying informed and proactive, you can protect yourself from falling prey to postal scams and mitigate the potential consequences.

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends,

It's strange to think that at the end of this month we will have already finished the first quarter of this year. For us, the year began quite eventfully with the birth of our fourth child (and first daughter) on 2 January. We are grateful for the many cards, presents and expressions of kindness Louise and I have received from the communities we serve since her birth.

How is your year going so far? How do you measure success or progress? A diminishing to do list? A positive or growing bank balance? A (relatively) quiet home?

Holy Week this year falls rather early: the last week of March. It begins with Palm Sunday, when Christians recall the great promise with which Jesus entered Jerusalem - the hopes of so many for better days than life under an oppressive Roman regime. But as we move to the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday and the sobering reality of Jesus' death on Good Friday so much of what we consider to be success or progress is called into question. In Luke's account of the Last Supper we find Jesus instituting a meal by which His followers were to recall His sacrificial death on their behalf: of the bread, as He "gave thanks and broke it" He said "This is My body given for you" (Luke 22:19) and of the wine He said, "This cup is the new covenant in My blood, which is poured out for you" (v20). Jesus' death, from one perspective, seems like failure, because at the moment He seemed to have the greatest following. He is abandoned by everyone (including His closest followers) and killed. From another perspective, it seems like a

tragedy: a young life full of promise senselessly cut short.


But the reality is very different. The Apostle Paul writes "at just the right time ...God's King [Jesus] died for the ungodly" (Romans 5:6). It was the perfect time because we were powerless to do anything about the things in our lives that rob us of the fullness of life God intends for us powerless to deal with our destructive addictions, with the dysfunction in our relationships, with our apathy towards God. But in that moment, at that time, God began to do something that we could never do: He began to heal the source of all this darkness, our broken relationship between Him and us. And His resurrection is the sign that His sacrifice for our failings was effective. The death and resurrection of Jesus. far from being a failure or a tragedy. was a triumph – a triumph over our failures and over what cuts off every life: death. It was a sign that there was - and is - something more to this life than just the here and now, than just what we taste, touch and see. It was a window in to something bigger, something eternal.

So why not journey with us this Holy Week? Come to one of our services and consider "[His] body given for you" and "[His] blood poured out for you" and the difference it can make to us all.
