

Verbal Abuse of Surgery Staff

I am very sorry to report that there is a significant increase in the number of patients being verbally abusive and rude to both our clinical and administrative staff. All our staff work extremely hard to provide a safe and efficient service for our patients. I would ask that in future, patients treat all members of our Surgery team with respect and do not take out their frustrations on us.

Blood Tests

From May 2024 we will not be offering routine blood test appointments for the majority of our patients. We will be providing patients with the blood test request forms and asking them to book an appointment at either Clacton Hospital, Colchester Hospital or the Primary Care Centre in Colchester. Please remember these are not 'dropin' clinics and you will need to book an appointment for your blood test. Appointments can be made for these clinics by going on-line to https:// www.swiftqueue.co.uk and clicking on book an appointment, search Clacton Hospital Bloods and selecting adult blood tests. If you are not able to go on -line to do this, then you can phone 0300 303 5299 between 8.00 am and 6.00 pm to book an appointment.

For housebound patients needing a home visit, these requests should be made on the day before 12.30 pm.

NHS App

We are trying to encourage as many patients as possible to download and use the NHS App, as this is the easiest way to order repeat medication and view medical information such as test results and immunisation records. If patients need help with using the NHS app then they can visit nhs.uk/helpmeapp for further information.

Stanford composed a substantial number of concert works, including seven symphonies, but is best remembered for his choral works for the Anglican church. ESSEX COUNTY FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE

ECFRS has issued a crucial reminder to homeowners to replace their smoke alarms every 10 years, regardless of their power source.

It is a common misconception that mains-wired smoke alarms don't need to be replaced every 10 years. However, the fire service emphasises that all smoke alarms, whether mainswired or battery operated, must be replaced every 10 years.

Claire Monk, Live Safe Manager said: "Smoke alarms are the best protection you can have in your home to keep you safe from fire, but it's important to understand that they have a finite lifespan."

All smoke alarms, no matter how they are powered, have sensors that

deteriorate over time, rendering them less effective in detecting fires. Essex residents are urged to proactively check the expiration date of their smoke alarms to mitigate potential risks.

A NEW HOBBY?

I started flying a drone as a hobby over a year ago.

I wanted to get out, explore new places and learn about the history of our country, as well as seeing them from a new perspective.

I've always loved looking out of the airplane windows so this was a fantastic opportunity to fly like a bird and see from their eyes.

The evolution of drones are so much more advanced now including cameras, obstacle avoidance sensors, they use GPS signals for automatic return to take off position (so reduces losing the drone).

I do not specialise in any one subject, I have travelled to film football stadiums, film sets, churches and National Trust properties. Last year I took it on holiday to Orlando, Florida.

The drone I use is a DJI Mini 4 Pro 249g, which you can fly with minimal restrictions.

To further my interest in the subject, I have studied and sat an exam to qualify for a A2CofC certificate of competency, which is CAA (Civil Aviation Authority) approved; this allows a person to fly heavier drones up to the weight of 2kg.

As the law stands drones under 249g, do have more freedom; they can fly in any air space, which is CAA clear, with exceptions of MOD land, prisons and airports.

By law, all camera drones must be registered with the CAA and have an operator's ID displayed on the drone.

Drones are restricted to a height of

400ft (120 metres) and must always be kept in visual line of sight.

Prior to drone flights, pilots must view an app called "Drone Assist", which is governed by the CAA, to check if there are any flight restrictions and that it is safe to fly.

I publish my drone flights on social media where I have followers from all over the world including USA, Australia and Asia.

Dear Parishioners.

I write what will be my last Chairman's Notes as I will not be standing for the post of Chairman at our next Annual Meeting in May. During my time as Chairman I have tried my best to help improve our village. I am finding it more difficult to deal with Essex Highways, it seems everything is a struggle, I am aware of the monetary restraints but they do not seem to listen to local councillors who know the area far better than officials from County Hall.

I was one of the main voices in securing the Harwich Road/A120 roundabout, following several serious and fatal collisions at the junction a battle commenced for Highways England and Essex County Council to made the junction safer by building a roundabout. Our MP, Sir Bernard Jenkin, supported the campaign and eventually common sense prevailed and the roundabout was built. Since the roundabout was built there have been very few incidents. certainly none fatal, also Pelhams Corner junction, which was also part of the same scheme has seen a vast improvement in terms of collisions and road safety. Although it took eight years I have managed to persuade Essex County Highways to reduce the speed limit along Harwich Road. I also assisted Great Bromley Cricket Club in

securing a large donation to enable the completion of their Cricket Clubhouse. I am grateful to our County Councillor, Carlo Guglielmi, for all of his support in helping me to achieve the above and securing funding for our school to build a new classroom. Also, I managed to have yellow lines outside the school where parking was very dangerous.

In the previous Messenger I mentioned rainwater coming off the surrounding fields and causing flooding within the development at Robinson Close, The problem, I am informed, is also caused by Essex Highways' failure in maintaining the surface water drainage system.

The new play equipment in Church Meadow has been well received and popular, in fact an outstanding success, welcomed by children and parents alike. The equipment was supported by National Lottery funding and some residual S106 funding. This equipment had been mooted by Councillors prior to me joining the Council.

Finally I would like to thank everybody that has supported me, I know that I have not pleased everybody, but I have done my best. I wish the new chairman well and I will give them my full support.

Did you know? Great Bromley has two Automated External Defibrillators. You can access these at:

- The Cross Inn, Ardleigh Road, CO7 7TL

Also at the Cross Inn is a Bleed Kit. The kit, provided by Great Bromley Parish Council, contains specialist equipment to help stem extreme blood loss before ambulance crews arrive.

Bleed control kits, also known as emergency trauma packs, are similar to first aid kits but include trauma dressings, gauze, chest seals and tourniquets to help stop serious bleeding. They can help victims of violent crime, those involved in road traffic accidents or workplace accidents, and could be particularly useful in rural areas where ambulance response times may be slower.

Highways

Essex Highways carry out regular inspections of roads and pavements, but issues may come up between these inspections. These could be potholes or other road surface issues, damaged street lights, street signs, overgrown trees, or issues with public rights of way.

Summer is nearly here so why not visit Constable Country and take a trip on the river at Flatford on a boat operated by members of the RST. A registered charity, run by volunteers, the Trust came into being over forty years ago when the then Anglian Water Authority attempted to remove public navigation rights.

Bring your family, your visitors, and yes, we do take well-behaved dogs, all are equally welcome. Groups can also charter the boat for family and friends' outings or part of a birthday or other celebration. Funds raised help to maintain the river and its surroundings for the benefit of all; the current major project for RST is the renovation of Dedham lock to bring it back into a working condition. This is a significant project requiring erosion protection as well as replacement of the lock gates.

We welcome new members and volunteers either as skippers, bankside

FORD RIDELONDON CLASSIQUE 2024

At its last meeting on 29th February, the Village Hall Management Committee was briefed about the potential impact of the Hamilton Lodge site development on the village hall and grounds. It was noted that detailed permission for the roadside works (which include the access road entrance for the housing estate, a new pavement and bus stops) had yet to be submitted and the chairman was now liaising directly with the developers regarding the final designs for the infrastructure on the village hall side of the road. It was unlikely that the woks would be undertaken until spring/ summer 2025 so there was time for consultation and planning to minimise inconvenience to village hall and cricket club users whilst the works were taking place. It was still not clear what voluntary assistance with car park improvements the developer may be able to give the village hall whilst the roadside works were being undertaken, but discussions were continuing.

The overall number of private and commercial bookings of rooms at the hall had dropped slightly in January and February and the Management Committee was keen for all residents of Great and Little Bromley to be aware that the hall was available for private parties and other events at reduced rates for those who live locally. The current hire rates are competitive compared with other local venues and

offer good value for money. Further details on hiring all or part of the village hall are displayed within the hall or can be viewed on the village hall website.

The attention of the Management Committee is now turning towards the Village Hall AGM which this year will be held on Thursday 23rd May commencing at 7.30pm in the Millennium Lounge. All parishioners are welcome to attend the AGM which reports on the past year and looks forward to the next. This is your opportunity to provide feedback in person on the facilities in our village hall and the way it is organised and managed.

The AGM is also your opportunity to volunteer to assist with the management of the village hall. There are currently 3 vacancies on the Management Committee and my colleagues and I would really welcome 'new blood' onto the committee to help with the running of the hall. No particular skills are required, however a desire to help our fine community facility to flourish and willingness to get stuck in and take on a non-onerous responsibility would make the role more meaningful and much more enjoyable. Their older brother Frederick Orman had a son called Mick who was heavily involved in Elmstead Cricket, and he married Carol Morgan whose father ran Morgan's, the grocer at Elmstead, who travelled around the villages with his mobile grocery van. More about that another time.
