

THE GARDEN IN JANUARY.

This is the month to examine trees and shrubs for untidy and diseased branches that have been broken down with wind and the snow of December. Hard prune hawthorne and privet hedges in mild weather. Start sowing in a propagater some early seeds, geranium, lobelia, pansy etc., also

some early vegetables such as broad beans, early pea and lettuce. Give them frame protection until the spring.

Watch houseplants on window sills for frost and also greenfly, water very sparingly. Continue the pruning of apples and pears, greaseband if possible to stop codling moth grubs climbing up the trunk ready to strike at blossom time. Cotton also against bullfinches who will strip a tree of fruit buds in a day. Keep the spade going and as your back begins to ache I wish you all a happy New Year. *Fred Wickham*.

KITCHEN CORNER.

This month a light lunch or supper dish which would make a good contrast to rich Christmas fare

Smoked Haddock and Cheese Cocottes.

½ lb smoked haddock fillet, fresh or frozen.

8 oz carton cottage cheese

1 onion peeled and finely chopped

4 oz mushrooms chopped

2 eggs beaten

Juice of I small lemon and salt and pepper

Cook haddock in water for 3-8 minutes until soft and drain well. Flake the Fish and mix with other ingredients. Divide mixture between four well-greased individual oven-proof dishes. Stand in a baking tin of warm water and cook at 350F for about forty mins until cooked and firm to the touch. Garnish with parsley sprigs and slices of lemon. This serves four. *Jill Frostick*

The Bromley Messenger February 1991.

A certain feeling of fear and foreboding fills my mind as 1 write this editorial, a feeling similar to one felt by many people in September 1939. The thought of an imminent war in the Gulf is a very serious matter, made all the worse when we contemplate the sophisticated modern weaponry now available to all sides. It is uncertain at the moment how this conflict will develop, One thing is certain, that it will have a profound effect on all in this country and the world. Those serving in the Forces will have to hear the brunt of suffering, but no one will be spared being involved in the effects of such a catastrophe. No one, particularly people brought up with Christian teaching, can glorify war; no one can claim it is anything but going against the will of God for man to take up arms against another. Even in the darkest hours of conflict there must always be an urgent and insistent seeking after peace and justice. There may be little we can do ourselves in these two villages, none of us are statesmen, politicians or military leaders, but there is one thing that we can do, whoever we may be and that is to pray for peace and understanding. Each Sunday, and every weekday when Evensong is said, prayers for peace will be offered in S. George's Church, and I invite you all to join, if not in church, then in the privacy of your own homes. There are many suitable prayers but the one I append below will be used at all services and can be used privately:

O almighty God, who art a strong tower to all them that put their trust in Thee, be now and evermore our defence; grant peace to this said world; look in pity upon the wounded and the prisoners; cheer the anxious; comfort the bereaved; succour the dying; have mercy on the fallen; and hasten the time when war shall be no more, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

THE GARDEN IN FEBRUARY.

If worm casts in the lawn are a nuisance on dry days brush with a birch broom to scatter them. Rooted suckers of various shrubs can be severed and planted out, shrubs for terraces may be planted in containers. Cut back badly overgrown or leggy hedges to near ground level to encourage new bushy growth. Annual pruning of roses can be carried out in mild or sheltered gardens. Fork over the perennial borders and remove all the dead stems, also new plants may still be planted and older ones divided.

Finish potting up and planting lilies, also sprinkle slug pellets amend the rock plants, destroy slugs each morning as they can recover during wet spells. Complete routine pruning of established fruit trees and burn all prunings. Get seed potatoes and stand in trays in a frost-free greenhouse or shed to give nice shoots when planting. *Fred Wickham*.

KITCHEN CORNER.

Warming soups are always welcome in wintry weather.

Here is one from Jane Grigson, the well-known cookery writer who died recently.

Curried Parsnip Soup

- 1 heaped tbsp coriander seeds
- 1 level tsp cumin seed
- 1 dried red chilli or ½ tsp chilli flakes
- 1 rounded tsp ground turmeric

1/4 tsp ground fengreek

1 medium onion, chopped

- 1 large parsnip, peeled and cut up
- 2 heaped tbsp butter
- 1 tbsp flour
- 2 pints beef stock
- 1/4 pint cream

Chopped chives or parsley.

Grind together first five ingredients in a coffee mill, or pound in a mortar. Keep mixture in a small jar. You will not need it all for this recipe but can use it up for lentils or apinach. Cook onion, garlic and parsnip in the butter with lid on the pan and low heat for ten minutes. Stir in the flour and 1 tbsp of spice mixture. Cook two minutes stirring occasionally. Gradually add stock and cook until. parsnip is really tender. Puree in blender, dilute with water to taste. Correct seasoning, re- heat, add cream and serve scattered with chives or parsley. (You can of course, cheat and use bought curry powder!) *Jill Frostick*.

OCCASIONAL PAPER NUMBER 1 - FEBRUARY 1991

This paper, to be produced several times a year, and to be included with the Messenger, is intended to give the news from the parish church, together with comment on current Christian concerns. The Decade of Evangelism on which we have now embarked challenges Christians to bear witness to their faith and to present the Christian message to those among whom they live. My hope is that not only members of the church, but also all who read the Messenger, will read this bulletin and be encouraged by it to develop Christian lives.

THE CHURCH AND YOU.

All of us belong to a family, most of us belong to some or other of the many organisations, societies and groups which claim our membership. Groups and societies have one thing in common, they exist for the sake of their members. A Tiddleywink Club exists to enable its members to play tiddlewinks, a cookery club exists to enable its members to perfect their culinary skills. They require that people who wish to join have an interest in the activities of the club. It would be unthinkable for a Communist to join a Conservative society! There are doors and barriers to prevent the wrong people from joining.

Although the church is a family, and although we talk of members of the church, and although it exists in order to join together in the worship of God, it is a completely open society. It exists strangely, not for the benefit of its members, but for the benefit of those who do not belong to it. There are no doors or barriers, all are welcome, no questions are asked about motives and interests. Its whole ethos is based on the Love of God as shown to mankind in Holy scripture. Jesus said 'Go into the world, preach the gospel to every person'. He did not tell his followers to set up a narrow, closed society for the specially pious.

This means that God is for YOU, this means that there is always a welcome at the church for YOU, this means that every person who goes to church is just as important as everybody else.

At its last meeting the Parochial Church Council decided to go ahead with the planning of A MISSION to be held in the parish from Wednesday, 6th May, 1993 until Sunday, 15th May. The mission will start with a service in S. George's Church on Wednesday evening 6th May, when we hope that the Bishop of Colchester will be present to commission the missioners, and will reach its climax at the Annual Rogation Service on Sunday, 15th May, which will be held at one of the farms in the parish.

The Mission will be led by Father Aidan Mayoss, of the Community of the Resurrection, assisted by a team of six to eight assistant missioners. Many of the congregation, and members of the PCC, will remember that Father Mayoss came to visit the parish in January of last year. At its next meeting the PCC will appoint a Mission Planning Committee and they, advised by the missioners, will present the plans for the mission in the Autumn of this year. Although the mission is two years away, the time is necessary for the careful preparation which is so important. During this two-year period I hope that every member of the congregation will become involved in some way or other in working for a successful outcome of this plan. The most important work any of us can do is to pray for God's blessing on this endeavour. Its principal aim will be to carry out Our Lord's command to His disciples 'to preach the gospel to all people. In the next issue of this Newsletter I hope to have a message from Fr. Mayoss, outlining his hopes for the mission.

THE COMMUNITY OF THE RESURRECTION.

Some might wonder what this organisation is of which Father Mayoss is a member. It is a community of monks, priests and laymen, all members of the Church of England, who, living by a monastic rule, serve God in a very special way. They all live in one of the Community Houses, they are all celibate (unmarried) and they work wherever the Superior of the Community asks them. Most of the members live and work at the main house of the Community at Mirfield in Yorkshire where the Community was founded in the 19th century by Bishop Halter Frere, one time Bishop of Truro. The community also runs a Retreat House at Hemingford Grey in Huntingdonshire, and has Houses and a great deal of work in South Africa where it takes very seriously the responsibility to see that all people of whatever colour or race, are treated equally as the children of God. Fr. Mayoss, a member of the Community since 1964, worked in South Africa from 1973 to 1975 and is now the Director of the Fraternity, laypeople who live all over

the country who actively support the work of the Community. The Community is only one of a number of Communities of monks and nuns in the Church of England.

CONFIRMATION.

In Confirmation, people who wish to take the practise of their faith seriously can CONFIRM the promises made for them at their Baptism by Godparents, to make Christ the centre of their lives, to repent for sinfulness, to renounce wrong living and to believe and trust in God the Father who made the world, in Jesus Christ His Son who gave His life for the world, and God the Holy Spirit who gives us all the power and strength to live in the world. It is customary for those wishing to be confirmed to undergo a course of instruction in the basic beliefs of the Christian faith. Some years ago most confirmation candidates were young people in their teens, now it is much more common for adults to offer themselves, and for young people who are active in their church membership to be confirmed at about the age of eleven or twelve. The Bishop of Colchester will be holding a Confirmation Service for parishes in the Deanery of Harwich on WEDNESDAY, 17th JULY in MISTLEY PARISH CHURCH. I already know of some people, young and adult, who wish to be confirmed and I will be commencing a course of instruction in March. I will be very pleased to hear of any persons who would like to take part in this, or who would just like to discuss the possibility without any definite commitment. Please let me know as soon as possible if you are interested.

LENT.

Lent commences this year on ASH WEDNESDAY, 13th FEBRUARY. There will be a service of Holy Communion with the imposition of Ashes at 7.30pm in S. George's church. At this service ashes from last year's Palm Crosses are placed on the foreheads of the congregation in the shape of a cross, just as water is at Baptism, as a visible reminder of our mortality and allegiance to Christ. A good custom which we have not hitherto used is for members of the congregation to bring back to church on the Sunday before Lent, Quinquagesima Sunday, the Palm Cross they received [last?] year. Perhaps we could revive this practise this year. On Sunday, 10th February, Palm Crosses will be collected together with the Offertory.

The day before Ash Wednesday is Shrove Tuesday when we eat pancakes. This is to use up all the rich foods we have in our larders and is a reminder that Lent is a time of fasting. It would be good for our souls if we all tried to keep a fast this year during Lent, perhaps by observing the ancient custom of abstaining from meat on Fridays. On the Sundays in Lent there will be courses of addresses at both morning and evening services and also a weekly Lenten service. Details of these will be published in a special Lenten Leaflet which will be available in the church on the first Sunday in February.

THE MANORS, HALLS AND LORDS OF GREAT BROMLEY.

How we became connected with Colchester.

There were two halls and manors, Great Bromley Hall (now the Cheshire Home) and Cold Hall (now a farmstead). Before 1066 they were held by Brictmar, a Saxon theign. By 1085 it had passed to the ownership of King William I. In the reign of Henry II (1154-1189) the Hall was held by William de Langvalei who was warden of the great forests of Essex during the reign of Richard the Lion Heart, (1189-1199). On the accession of King John, William was made also Constable of Colchester Castle. How did he gain this honour? In 1165 King Henry was shot at by an enemy when his army was besieging Bridgenorth, but was saved by Hubert St Clare, then Constable of Colchester Castle, throwing himself in the path of the fatal arrow. On his death Henry II made Hubert's daughter a ward of court and gave her in marriage to William de Langvalei, together with her father's inheritance. In this way Great Bromley and the rest of Tendring became attached to the Office of Constable of Colchester Castle. William de Langvalei also held the manors of Lexden, Stanway and Hallingbury. He died in 1210. To be continued ... John Appleby

THE GARDEN IN APRIL.

Sow and protect lawns which have just been sown with cotton, mow established ones with the blade at medium height, apply a fertiliser a fortnight later. Plant and transplant evergreen trees and shrubs, prune lavender. Apply a mulch to roses, a weedkiller can be applied to keep down weeds.

Support tall growing perennials with pea sticks and canes, be careful of canes because they can do a lot of damage to the face when leaning over them, try to cap them with something. Complete the sowing of hardy and half-hardy annuals, prepare beds for planting. Feed Fruit trees with nitro chalk or sulphate of ammonia and protect from late frost. Sow vegetables, i.e. runner beans, dwarf etc., and hope for an early crop. *Fred Wickham*

AND SO WE WILL ALL BE COUNTED.

On 21st April the 1991 Census will begin. A Census is nothing new, you will remember a Census was being taken when Christ was born in Bethlehem. In England the first Census was held in 1801 and every ten years after that. Who was responsible for the Census? It was the brainchild of Charles Abbot, son of John Abbot, Rector of All Saints, Colchester.

Charles became an MP, was Speaker of the House of Commons and later created Lord Colchester. All Saints Rectory, Colchester, is now the High Street Post Office. From 1801 to 1831 only the number of persons, dwellings and occupations was taken. There is no listing of the names of people.

Great Bromley Parish Overseers Accounts have this information about the 1821 Census: '1821 Dec 8 Wm Cooper & Co for time and expenses . takeing (sic) the population £2 12s. 6d. 'Mr. Cooper was the Overseer of the Poor, a post nobody really wanted to hold because of the numerous duties involved. He and his helpers worked for the equivalent of £2.62 in today's money.

From 1841 everyone's Christian name, surname and birth-place was entered on the Census Return. In 1851 blind, deaf and dumb persons were recorded, also church congregations and accommodation. These are some of the results of a Colchester Rector's son's ideas, so stand up and be counted!

S. GEORGE'S CHURCH - ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING.

As was mentioned last month the Annual Parochial Church Meeting is to take place in S. George's School on Tuesday, 16th April, at 7.30pm. All those whose names are on the parish Electoral Roll are invited to attend. As well as receiving the annual accounts twelve persons are to be elected to serve on the Parochial Church Council. At this meeting there is an opportunity for those present to comment upon, ask questions about and make suggestions, for the way in which the parish functions.

CHURCHWARDENS.

The office of Churchwarden is a very ancient one which had been recognised by law by the 13th century. The Churchwarden was not only a Church Officer, but also had considerable duties in the community which he served. He in fact, undertook all the business now in the hands of the Chairman and members of the Parish Council, as well as acting as the Parish Constable. He was entrusted not only with the responsibilities of the parish church, but he was also the guardian of law, morals and parish affairs. Although nowadays the Churchwarden's duties are confined to church matters, it is still a civil election and takes place at a meeting separate from the Parish Annual Meeting, those being entitled to vote being any adult who lives in the parish and whose name is on the roll of local government elections. The qualifications now to serve as a Churchwarden are that the person chosen must be an actual communicant of the parish, who lives in the parish or is a member of the Electoral Roll and is at least twenty-one years of age. Each parish is required to elect two wardens annually.

As is our custom the meeting to elect the Churchwardens 'The Vestry Meeting' will take place immediately before the Annual Meeting on 16th April. The Churchwardens who have been elected have a wide range of duties. Principally they represent the laity to the Bishop and must co-operate with the Rector in the smooth running of the parish. They have responsibilities for the fabric of the church and its property and still have the duty of maintaining law and order in church during the times of divine service.

MR. ROBERT HARDING.

At the Vestry Meeting this year Mr. Robert Harding is not to seek re-election. He and his wife Jean, came to live in the village as long ago as 1948 and throughout that time they have been tireless workers not only for the church, but also for the good of the village in general. Robert was elected Churchwarden in 1979 and has served in that capacity continuously. During two interregna the burden of responsibility of running the parish fell on the two Churchwardens, and on both occasions, Robert carried out this task together with his fellow Churchwarden with great efficiency, sincerity and understanding. Since my own arrival in the parish in 1985 he has been a most helpful and understanding Churchwarden without whose kindly and wise advice and support I would have found life extremely difficult. In 1984 a Repair Fund was set up to raise funds for the repairs to the tower. Robert became the Chairman of this Committee and in the intervening seven years he has worked assiduously to organise all the necessary fundraising and to help in overseeing the work.

Apart from the church he is probably best known for his work over many years with the Tendring Show, of which he had the pleasure of being elected President two years ago. I am most grateful to him for all his support and work and I know that all members of the church join me in thanking him for all he has done.

Carrot Cake.

- 8 oz (about 3 oz when scraped) carrots
- 3 large eggs
- 5 oz sugar
- 2 teaspoons fine grated lemon rind
- 2 oz plain flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 5 oz fine chopped walnuts

Grease and line a square 7" tin, or an oblong loaf tin. Whisk yolks and sugar until thick. Stir in grated carrots, nuts and Lemon rind. Fold in flour sieved with baking powder. Fold in stiffly whisked egg whites and bake for forty-five minutes in a moderate oven.

When cold ice with a thin layer of glace icing and decorate with hazelnuts. Jill Frostick

Sorry for the hiccup in the March issue but I will fill in a few of the details missed and add some more suggestions. 'Devices and Desires' was by P. D. James, published by Pan at £4.99; 'A Year in Provence' by Peter Mayle is in Pan at £4.99. Another title by a local doctor turned author was 'Jade Woman' by Mysterious Press £3.50. Jonathan Gash lives near Colchester and writes engagingly in this Lovejoy series featuring the dodgy antique dealer. This series is currently on TV I believe. Although the one I mention is set in Hong Kong and the China Seas, they are usually set in very recognisable bits of Essex and Colchester.

I wonder if you came upon another local writer, Elizabeth Jeffries? 'Strangers Hall' Arrow books at £3.50 is a really good read based in the Dutch quarter of Colchester as the Flemish weavers came over and set up the thriving cloth trade. It is a romance and none the worse for that and is very well researched historically.

Graham Greene's death reminds us of his prolific output. The one I found the most gripping and moving was 'The Heart of the Matter' set in West Africa, but any books by this powerful and melancholy writer, especially his earlier ones, are worth reading. 'The Power and the Glory' and 'The End of the Affair' etc are all in Penguin paper hack.

Briefly to children's books and in particular the good ones recommended for the reading of up to 7's for the National Curriculum tests. Try any book by Jill Murphy: 'Whatever Next?' published Macmillan £3.25 or 'All in one Piece' £2.99. Walker books are well illustrated and always enjoyed. I find the Ahlberg books eagerly sought after and to read again and again. The 'Happy Families' series is good; Mrs. Wobble the waitress and Mr. Plug the plumber: about £2.50 and all published in Puffin. *Jean Harding*.

THE GARDEN IN MAY.

Keep the lawns cut at least once a week, apply a high nitrogen fertiliser at any time this month to encourage new growth, use a moss killer if moss has taken over after last year's dry weather. There is still time to sow some very attractive annuals AND HAVE THEM IN FLOWER BY August, try clarkia, candytuft, Virginia stock and alysum. If sown thinly in trays you can plant them out in clumps, it is easy and you will get a rich full effect.

It is tempting to fill the borders with summer bedding plants which are in Garden Centres now, but remember the chance of Jack Frost. Keep weeding regularly with the hoe to stop flowering and seeds. Containers can be planted up now but beware of vine weevils, they cause havoc to foliage and roots, it is best to treat the containers with ICI Sybol. Plant runner beans etc in the kitchen garden. *Fred Wickham*.

S. MARY'S CHURCH, LITTLE BROMLEY - IMPORTANT NOTICE

The contractors employed by the Redundant Churches Fund have now completed the exterior repairs and renovations. They have not yet been able to commence the work of repair inside the church on account of the problem of dampness in the walls. This I understand, must be allowed to dry out further before any of the proposed work can commence. Sadly I have to announce that the service of thanksgiving for the restoration of the church planned for Sunday, 2nd June, can not now take place and has been postponed until the church is in a completely repaired state. The Bishop of Chelmsford, who has been informed, has promised that he will be pleased to come on a date in the future yet to be decided. This is a disappointment for us but it is obvious that we must delay this service and our use of the church for further services until it is in a good condition.

SUNDAY SCHOOL.

On SUNDAY, 12th MAY a new venture is to be initiated at S. George's Church. Instead of the customary Sunday School there is to be a regular Children's Service to commence at 9.45am and which will last for thirty minutes. It will be suitable for children of all ages, and for parents who may wish to accompany them. In planning this it is hoped that the children themselves will be able to take a large part in the conduct of the service. We feel that this is a more adult approach to the training of children in the Christian faith, and that parents will see it as one of the ways they can fulfil the promises they make when their children are baptised, to see that their children are brought up in, and taught, the Christian faith. I do sincerely hope that this will be well supported and that it will prove to be the right way forward for us. On the first Sunday of each month there will be no Children's Service, but we expect that the children and their parents will attend the Parish Family Service at which we plan for the children present to take a large part.

The Rector, or Mrs. Olive Sparling, Greenacre, Briar Road will be able to provide further information.

SPECIAL SERVICES IN MAY.

Ascension Day this year falls on Thursday, 9th Mav. This is the day when we remember the Ascension of Our Lord into Heaven and the completion of his work on earth. On the Continent, and many years ago in this country, Ascension Day is a public holiday. There will be a service of Parish Communion at 7.30pm in S. Georges church.

Ten days later is Whitsunday, also known as the Feast of the Pentecost. We read in Chapter 2 of the Acts of the Apostles how that, on this day, the Holy Spirit came on the Disciples and they were given the power to, go into the world as Apostles, preaching the Gospel.

A great change came over them; instead of being afraid and confused about their role, they all became bold in the work Jesus laid upon them and all eventually, gave up their lives for the faith in which they believed. Now that Whitsunday weekend is no longer a holiday weekend, it is easy to lose sight of the importance of this festival. The usual Sunday services will be held with one difference; Evensong at 6.30pm will be held in the Chapel of Seven Rivers Cheshire Home. This is a very special occasion as it is exactly five years since the Bishop of Colchester and representatives came to dedicate the Chapel, which is officially known as the Chapel of the Holy Spirit. The Chairman and members of the Management Committee of the Home, as well as staff and residents, have promised to attend. I hope that this will be well supported by the parish.

As a follow up of the Lent Course, and at the request of the residents, Evensong will be held in the Chapel of Seven Rivers Home on the third Sunday of each month. The Whit Sunday service will be the first.

Another important occasion will be on Wednesday, 29th May. On that day the Bishop of Colchester will be making an official visitation to the parish. It will start with a service of Holy Communion at 9.00am at which I hope that as many as possible will be able to attend. After the service the Bishop would like as many of the congregation as possible to join him for coffee in the Rectory.

Although we can provide an organist for most Sunday, and I thank Gregory Frostick and Ann Clapham for helping us in this way, we do urgently need to have an official organist. THE GARDEN IN JUNE.

Take leaf bud cuttings of clematis and softwood cuttings of fuchsia, cotoneaster. Trim privet and lonicera nitida hedges. Remove suckers of roses and spray against greenfly and diseases. The frosts have damaged the buds of rhododendrons and azalias, hope that the bushes have not been damaged too much, trim back to new growth. Pinch out the tips of dahlia shoots, water and spray against pests. In the fruit gardens again the frost has damaged the plum blossom, also the strawberry plants are sporting lots of black eyes so it is goodbye to the first pluck of fruit at the moment. Raspberry and current bushes are good. Rabbits are a big problem; if anyone has an idea to stop them getting in other than a 3' 1" wire netting fence I already have, I would like to know. *Fred Wickham*.

FLOWER ARRANGERS TIPS.

Pick flowers and foliage early morning or late evening.

Conditioning: hard stems - peel off about 1-2" of bark, slit stem, all foliage other than grey furry foliage, totally immerse in bath of water, all night if possible.

Flowers: place in deep cold water and give a long drink immediately after picking.

Individual treatment: roses - remove all thorns and most of the leaves. Delphinium - fill hollow stems gently with water and plug with cotton wool. Poppies and Euphorbia (beware liquid substance) - burn stem ends. Tulips - wrap in sheet of newspaper and place in water. Hydrangeas and violets - immerse head down in water. Always make sure when arranging your

Hydrangeas and violets - immerse head down in water. Always make sure when arranging your stems they are in water and keep 'topped up' and spray well. Lastly when buying flowers never buy anything that looks tired or it will go to sleep on you! *Betty Rowe*.

ROYAL ARMS IN GREAT AND LITTLE BROMLEY CHURCHES.

The Royal Arms have been placed in our churches since 1534, partly to show the parishioners loyalty to the Crown and partly to underline the supremacy of the Monarch as Head of the Church in England.

Little Bromley's Royal Arms date from 1816 and were made by Wallis and Coleman who had the first Colchester Iron Foundry in a yard on the north side of the west end of Colchester High Street not far from where Cullingfords have their shop. The shield has three lions guardant in the first and fourth quarters, the lion rampant of Scotland in the second quarter and Irelands harp in the third. The electoral bonnet of Hanover shows Queen Anne's connection with that state

At Great Bromley we have no sign of the Royal Arms until the Churchwardens Accounts for 1661 when Charles II became king and the monarchy was restored in England, and I find the following:

1661 pd to Sol(omon) Mason for setting up ye King's Arms £3 0s 0d.

These few details confirm that the Rector of Great Bromley, Richard Bowes, BA, son of Sir Thomas Bowes Kt., born at the Hall, Great Bromley, was truly anxious not to offend his Monarch nor his father, a local Justice of the Peace and then Patron of the Living.

Little Bromley still has its Royal Arms, what happened to those of Great Bromley? John Appleby.

KITCHEN CORNER.

This month some useful hints; when a recipe uses either egg yolks or whites only, here are some ideas for using the left overs. Yolks: use for mayonnaise, egg custard, enriching pastry or scone mix, scrambled eggs. Poach and use as a sandwich filling or garnish. Use for sponge cakes (add a tablespoon of water for each yolk and extra raising powder). Meringues: these will store for several days in the fridge in an airtight container. Use for meringues, souffles, mousse or icing and can also be whipped into double cream to make it go further, or use for ice sorbets. When using lemons if juice only is required, grate off the zest first and freeze for future use. Freeze spare lemon juice in ice-cube trays. For a shining glaze on pastry etc., add a pinch of salt to beaten egg. If a cake won't turn out of the tin, try standing on a cold wet cloth for a few seconds. White sauce goes lumpy ~ whisk like mad! Egg custard curdles ~ strain into a cold bowl and whisk. Jill Frostick

KITCHEN CORNER.

A recipe this month from our WI president, June Wilgress. She says she learnt to make these when she was at school.

8 oz rolled oats 4 oz margarine 2 tablespoons SR flour

Pinch of salt 2 tablespoons sugar 2 tablespoons golden syrup

Shallow baking tin (greased)

Melt sugar, syrup and margarine together in a saucepan. Mix flour, rolled oats and salt together. When mixture in saucepan is melted add dry ingredients and mix well together. Tip mixture into baking tin. Spread evenly to a depth of about ½ inch and bake for about thirty minutes at 350°. Cut into shapes required when nearly cold.

GARDEN IN JULY.

Water lawns in dry spells and treat badly growing areas. Mow at least once a week. Think ahead for autumn and plant some colchicums, autumn flowering crocus and some cyclamen hederifolium, they should be available in Garden Centres now. Regular dead-heading of perennials, biennials and summer bedding is a must if you want to enjoy the maximum possible number of flowers in your borders, continue to food plants which are in flower or in bud. Use a high potash feed such as Chempak No.4. The battle against fast seeding weeds is still on, regular hoeing will not only stop them seeding but will make things tidier. Smarten up plants in window boxes and tubs by regular dead-heading, also regular feeding. When runner beans reach the top of the canes pinch out the growing shoots, give the cabbage butterfly a spray of Tumblebug. Fred Wickham.

DO YOU REMEMBER THE MOLE-CATCHER?

Henry VIII is remembered because he had six wives and was given the title of Defender of the Faith now shown on our coinage as F.D. Actually Henry, his Ministers and Parliament gave us more than these two items in history, such as Parish Registers for Births, Marriages and Burials (from 1538) and numerous Acts to ensure the poor were looked after, the health of people was protected. The Churchwardens and other parish officers carried out duties enforcing the Acts. In 1533 every parish had to provide a net to ensnare the countless rooks, crows and choughs which endangered health and crops. The Act was renewed and enlarged in 1566 and the Churchwardens and six other parishioners had to assess landowners for a tax for a fund for paying a penny for three heads of old 'crowes, chowes, pyes or rockes' and a penny for every six young owls or every six unbroken eggs. Little wildlife was sacred and even sparrows and hedgehogs and foxes were killed. The Act was more strongly enforced in 1572 and then 1598.

In Great Bromley there are only accounts of money paid for foxes killed.

THE GARDEN IN AUGUST.

Keep lawns regularly trimmed and tidy, do not mow too short in case the dry spell could burn off the grass. Sow some herbaceous seeds of perennials, i.e. delphinium, columbine and poppy for flowering next year, sow them in seed beds towards the end of the month, also get some seeds for free, wait until seed heads have formed and ripened naturally, then collect the seeds as they start to open, label them and store in a cool place. Sow winter flowering pansies to cheer up the gloomy days of winter. This is the month to prune plums, damsons, cherries and any tree susceptible to silver leaf, take out dead, dying or over crowded branches. Shallots and onions can be harvested this month but be careful not to injure them when lifting, pick runner . beans regularly to get better crops, also water. Keep the hoe going. Fred Wickham.

KITCHEN CORNER.

Spinach is plentiful now and you might like to try these tartlets.

½ lb spinach cooked and finely chopped.

Salt and pepper.

1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg.

- 1 large beaten egg.
- 3 tablespoons cream or top of the milk.
- 3-4 oz mature cheddar cheese, grated.
- 6-8 oz shortcrust pastry.

Combine spinach, seasonings, nutmeg, egg, cream and most of the cheese and mix thoroughly. Roll out pastry and use to line 4 individual Yorkshire pudding tins, or 8 patty tins, crimping the edges. Spoon mixture into the pastry cases until almost full. Sprinkle with remaining cheese and cook 400° F for about 30 minutes until firm and pastry is cooked. You can serve these either hot, warm or cold. *Jill Frostick*.

SO YOU ARE A READER?

On Saturday, 22nd June, I was present with some 8,000 Readers of the Church of England and their families at the Birmingham National Exhibition Centre to take part in the events staged there to recall that it is one hundred and twenty five years since the Office of Reader was revived. The Office is an ancient one and up to late Tudor times the Reader was in great demand since there was a dearth of clergy. The Elizabethan clergy however, felt that Readers became too much like ordained men and the number admitted was drastically cut. Holders of the Office continued to take services at parish churches but it was not until there was again a shortage of clergy in 1866 that the Reader ministry was actively, but begrudgingly, revived by the Archbishops and Convocation.

It was most interesting therefore, to find in a document at Essex Record Office that Great Bromley was involved with a Reader from 1583 until at least 1587. The document says: '1587 - schoolmaster - (Christian name omitted) Scofield of Great Bromley was presented (to the Archdeacon) for saying service ... but he exhibited his licence from the Bishop of Norwich dated four years earlier (1583)'.

The Rector of Great Bromley from 1581 to 1600 was Peter Wentworth who was also Rector of Abberton (1578- 1591), Gestingthorpe (1582-1599) and chaplain to Lord D'Arcy who resided at S. Osyth. A busy incumbent who no doubt needed help! As Archbishop Carey said 'this ministry is possibly more crucial now as the church moves further into the Decade of Evangelism'. *John Appleby*.

S. GEORGE'S CHURCH NEWS.

Flower Festival: this was a great success, the arrangements in church were quite outstanding, the concert of Indian Music was memorable and the stalls and refreshments were most welcome and all helped to achieve a really good result. A profit of £917.26 has been paid into the church funds. Thank you all who so willingly arranged and supported this venture. There will be a meeting during September to discuss the details of a fund raising event for 1992. PCC Treasurer: as Mr. Bill Walker reluctantly concluded that he would not be able to take on the office of PCC treasurer, Mr. Gordon Brown, Wayside, Hall Road, Great Bromley, has been elected to fill the position. We are very grateful to him for undertaking this most necessary office. Church Repairs: at long last all the necessary procedures have now been completed and work on the interior of the tower and belfry is to commence this month. The very good news is that English Heritage have offered a grant of just over £8,000 to help pay for this, the total cost of which will be about £20,000. The balance we have in the Repair Fund will cover the rest of the costs. This means that by the Autumn we will be able to hear the bells of S. George's once again, silent for over three years. We hope to announce a date next month when practise ringing and the instruction of new ringers will commence.

As a result of the electric storm on 19th June further repairs to the masonry of the tower, the repositioning of the lightning conductor and some electrical rewiring in the church has to be undertaken. This is all to be covered by an insurance claim and will be put in hand as soon as the insurers give authority.

ALL THE FUN OF THE FAIR.

Nearby Elmstead used to have an annual fair on 15th May. Parishioners could buy toys and general pedlery. It later became associated with sheep sales.

Great Bromley had a small fair for pedlery on 28th April recalls William White in his 1848 Directory of Essex, and earlier references to a market in the parish are found in records of 1575, 1594, and 1690. The last reference to a market is 1863. There does not appear to be a charter for the fair and market like that granted to Elmstead in 1265. In 1285 it became an offence to hold fairs or markets in churchyards but many were in spite of the consequences. In Henry VI's reign (1422-1461) it was illegal to hold fairs on Good Friday, Ascension Day, Corpus Christi, Whit Sunday, Trinity Sunday, the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, All Saints' Day or on any Sunday except the four Sundays at Harvest time. *John Appleby*

THE GARDEN IN SEPTEMBER.

Sow that lawn this month and keep it well watered, otherwise get a good quality turf towards the end of the month and with a moss rake remove all the old thatch and dead moss, get a moss killer where the lawn has become waterlogged, follow the label on applications or you could make things a lot worse, moss readily invades any stressed lawn.

Lift and divide any overcrowded clumps of herbaceous plants keep only the best ones for replanting, sow sweet peas straight into the garden, in October sow into pots. Plant some bulbs into the grass, add with your daffodils some crocuses and cyclamen for a spring display. In the greenhouse build up numbers of your fuchsias and geraniums by taking cuttings to provide for your window boxes and hanging baskets.

Buy some autumn fruiting raspberry which will supply you with raspberries until the first frost, also start picking apples for store. Good harvesting. *Fred Wickham*.

THE GARDEN IN OCTOBER.

Use a spring tined rake to clear the thatch and moss which has accumulated through the summer on lawns and as leaves begin to fall, sweep them up as they could cause disease, put all leaves in the compost heap. Keep dead-heading bedding plants in window boxes and containers, they may soon be finished off by frosts, they will look neater and less likely to be attacked by grey mould, warning: take a close look at the compost in the baskets as they often harbour vine weevil larvae, do not be tempted to put it on the compost heap. Many herbaceous perennials are past their best now so cut away old flowering stems and damaged foliage, lift tuberous begonias, save the tubers for next year in a frost free shed. Put apples into store in ventilated boxes, watch for mice, start digging unused areas of vegetable plot adding plenty of manure and lime if needed. Fred Wickham

QUAKERS IN GREAT BROMLEY.

Research shows that the Society of Friends, the Quakers, were found in many parishes in North East Essex in the 17th and 18th century. Great Bromley had its Meeting. For information on this we turn to the Quarter Sessions records.

In 1706 private houses were licensed at the Sessions held in Chelmsford and among those listed is Nicholas Bundocks house at Much Bromley. In 1711 the Monthly Meeting (equivalent to a Deanery Synod today) was held in various places in the Tendring Hundred and that once held every quarter at Thorpe-le-Soken is now held at Nicholas Bundock's house at Great Bromley. The Register of the Colchester Quakers records that Nicholas Bundock married Jane Woodford in 1688 and had at least four children. His son Nicholas was born in 1689 but died, aged 1½ years, in 1690. Another son, Jonathan was born in 1696, Pressley in 1698 and a second Nicholas in 1701. The mother died in 1742.

While farmers of the 18th century generally tried to pay as little tithe as possible the Quakers were most resolute and declined to pay any at all as George Fox, their founder, had said 'they that take tythes and they that pay tythes according to the old covenant deny Jesus Christ, the everlasting Priest to be come in the flesh and here these Priests show themselves to be AntiChrist ...' All who read or heard Fox's words were told 'never come more at the steeple-house (church) nor pay your Priest more tythes ... if ye do, ye uphold them in their sins and must partake in their plagues. '

The central repository for Quaker records is at the Society of Friends, Friends House, Euston Road, London. Registers were handed over in 1837 to the Registrar General and are now in the care of the Public Record Office. *John Appleby*

KITCHEN CORNER.

If you are like me and sometimes have more courgettes than you expected, you might like to try this recipe from my American cookbook. It is delicious and makes a good accompaniment to cold meats or for snacks or picnics.

Zucchini Squares.

3 cups of zucchini (courgettes) thinly sliced

½ cup self raising flour

½ cup grated cheese

½ cup of oil

4 eggs and seasoning.

Beat eggs in a large bowl, mix in other ingredients and season with salt, pepper, garlic powder to taste and/or herbs. Pour into a square tin or pyrex dish and bake 40-45 minutes at 350° F (moderate oven). Cut into squares when cooled. (American cups are approximately 6 fluid ounces). *Jill Frostick*

1 lb golden syrup 2 rounded teaspoons ginger

6 oz margarine 1 teaspoon baking powder

½lb soft brown Sugar 1 lb medium oatmeal

½ lb self-raising flour 1 teacup milk

Melt syrup, margarine and sugar in large pan. Add milk and stir in dry ingredients. Pour into greased meat tin. Bake $1-1\frac{1}{2}$ hours in slow oven 300° F. *Jill Frostick*.

IN THE SADDLE AT BROMLEY.

A tax was levied on the possession of horses from 1784 to 1874 and Great Bromley had a Riding Horse Register compiled in 1784. Horses, mares or geldings for riding or drawing a Coach, Berlin, Landau, Chariot, Calash or Chaise were taxable. Here are some of the entries:



20 Oct 1784	Revd Erasmus Warren	Four	Two

All the other twenty-five tax payers had a riding horse each. S. Smythies of Colchester, a lawyer, was the Collector of taxes. The Jacobs family are remembered in the Jacobs charity. The Mannocks were Lords of the Manor of Church, alias Great Bromley Hall, now Seven Rivers, and also were at Giffords Hall, Stoke-by-Nayland, 1428-1889, and bought Martells Hall, Ardleigh, in Henry VIII's reign. Revd. Erasmus Warren, MA, was Rector here from 1767 to 1801; he died on 30th November, 1806. *John Appleby*.

BROWNIES.



This magazine I believe, goes to every home in the Bromleys. From these homes nine hundred and thirty-six people appear as names on the Parliamentary Register of Electors and have the right to vote on how the four tiers of government, parish, district, county and parliamentary, support, control and safeguard their physical and mental well-being, (regrettably not all Bromley residents exercise that right). From those Bromley homes from which nearly a thousand names appear on the Parliamentary Electoral Register, only a hundred and five appear on the Church Electoral Roll. The Church undertakes for the spiritual dimension that which the State undertakes for the physical and mental, health and well being. In the Bromleys that leaves approximately nine hundred people, the majority of whom at some time or other, whilst not on the Church Electoral Roll, attend S. George's Church for weddings, baptisms and decreasingly perhaps, for burial.

S. George's Church, supported and maintained by parishioners has stood four square to the ravages of time for some eight hundred years. Regrettably it is in danger of being no longer so supported. Our generation is possibly beginning to negate the support of past generations, and could see S. George's closed down and put into the care of the Redundant Churches Fund as is S. Mary's, Little Bromley, and many other of East Anglia's historic churches.

This month, December, will see many who never attend Church with any degree of regularity coming to church sincerely and happily joining in the joyous Christmass Festival.

Yet if we wish to pass on to future generations what has been passed on to us, then we, like our foregathers, must support and financially maintain our church.

The church cannot, and indeed will not, remain financially viable on the offerings of an average weekly attendance of some fifty worshippers, and an average weekly income of £85. The State TAKES what it thinks is required for our wellbeing, the Church cannot TAKE but we can GIVE. Let us do so before it is too late, and show that WE DO CARE.

THE GHOST OF CHRISTMASS PAST.


When John Hanson was resident at Great Bromley Hall, 1792-1806, there was much social life and activity. The Hall was at one time, the Headquarters for the Eastern Command of the Army. The diary or Journal kept by John gives some details of happenings at Christmass time. '20th December, 1800. We gave a Ball and Supper at Bromley Hall to the Military and neighbourhood which was numerously attended and a few days after another to the Tendring Troop (a volunteer force raised by Hanson), with the principal respectable Yeomanry of the neighbourhood and their families.'

'1805. At Christmass this year my fourteen children were all assembled in perfect health.' Look at the memorials in the south aisle and Patron's chapel in the Parish Church and you will see what befell some of those fourteen children.

But Christmass is the time for children, parties, family get-togethers, so like those of old we shall remember the true meaning of this festive season. *John Appleby*.
