

KITCHEN CORNER.

As a change from the rich fare of Christmass, you might like to try some simple old recipes, first a 'POSSET' (or 'ducks' if you live in the Midlands).

2 medium slices of stale bread

Pinch of salt, pinch of grated nutmeg

1 dessertspoon caster sugar

1 pint milk Tablespoon of brandy or sweet sherry

Cut bread into small cubes discarding the crusts. Put in a bowl and sprinkle with salt, nutmeg and sugar. Bring milk nearly to boiling point and pour over the bread.

Stand ten minutes then stir in brandy or sherry and serve.

Poor Knights of Windsor.

Soak six thick slices of crustless white bread in ½ pint of milk, sweetened with a little sugar. Lift the slices carefully, dip into beaten egg and fry till golden in hot butter. Sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon and serve at once.

THE GARDEN IN JANUARY. The vegetable garden can be got ready for broad beans and sowing of cabbage and cauliflower. Why not try some early potatoes in 8" pots, use a single sprouted tuber and pot in JI No.2. Clean houseplant foliage with tepid water as they get very dusty over the winter, feed only that are flowering, best results are from Fisons Flowerite. Have a general clean up in the garden, firm rose bushes that have been rocked by the wind, give a general fertiliser to fruit trees after pruning which should have been finished.

Several strands of coloured cotton will protect primulas and crocus from the birds, yellow are the main target. Keep your eyes open for seed catalogues and get containers ready for spring sowing, use new compost. Finish the spade or rotavator work in the vegetable plot for some good summer vegetables. I wish you all a happy New Gardening Year. *Fred Wickham*.

<u>GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL.</u> At its meeting on 21st November, the following matters were discussed. The Garden Club is to be asked to tidy up the land around the Village Sign (this work is now in progress). A presentation, objecting to the proposed Police Station has been submitted to the Tendring District Council.

Following the donation of £199 from the Carnival Committee a seat is to be installed near the 'Black Boy'. New concrete bollards are to be placed around the Village War Memorial.

A £600 grant is to be applied for from Tendring District Council to replace the three Parish Council Notice Boards. Further consultations are to be taken on the matter of providing low cost housing, in which the Council was in favour.

The Council is to write to the County Highways Authority to request a 40 mph speed limit through the village.

A report of Council Meetings is to be regularly included in 'The Messenger'.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Thursday, 16th January, 1992.

RURAL POWER STATION ACTION GROUP.

The Committee of the RPSAG would like to update the villages on the progress being made, and also to thank everyone for their support. A great many of you took the time to write to the various government officers and departments involved and the number of people that attended the meeting at Tendring District Council Chambers was much appreciated and undoubtedly showed both the council and Eastern Generation how strong the feeling is against this proposal. The feeling of the committee is that although it will not be made easy for us, we stand an excellent chance of winning. We have a good strong case with Essex County, Tendring, Suffolk and Colchester Councils all actively involved with the action group, against the proposal. If everyone in the villages and on the council pull together and continue to support one another, we can win. If you have not joined the action group yet, your support is still much needed and will be much appreciated: membership is free. To join, contact a member of the committee who will be pleased to send you a membership form.

Although it may seem quiet at the moment, there is a lot of activity going on 'behind the scenes' gathering facts and information to form our case. There have recently been a number of key meetings involving some committee members, council representatives and the Department of Energy. A date for the public enquiry will be announced shortly, it is thought it will be May or June and will probably last some six to eight weeks. We shall keep the villages updated monthly, via their parish magazines.

It will come as no great surprise to learn a very large sum of money will be needed, in order to employ the very best legal representation and advice. To date a number of functions have been held and approximately £2,800 raised, which is really marvellous and for that you are once again to be congratulated. The figure required is currently estimated at £15,000. A very great deal of money, especially in the current economic climate, but the money will be well spent securing the environment our villages enjoy today. If anyone has a fund raising idea, the Committee will be only too pleased to hear it, or if you can hold a function and donate the proceeds, it would be much appreciated.

Similarly if you can donate 'your services' for a function be it a raffle prize, your time to help out at a function, catering, bar, disco, band, or even a venue for a function, please let the committee know. All of you can help in some way to win this fight and save our villages from the horrors of Eastern Generations proposal.

Lastly, there has been a great deal of rumour, misinformation and sadly, animosity brought about because of this application. The committee would like to encourage villagers to contact them if they are unsure of something and wish to verify it, or wish simply to obtain accurate facts. SAO YEWS A' GOOIN' TER COLCHESTER!

Even today people think that in the past villagers rarely, if ever, left the village where they were born and bred. If we look in the Oath Book of Colchester we find that Brumleians were out and about.

Admitted a burgess of Colchester in 1384 was John Glaunvyle of Great Brumleigh; Thomas Leyham of Little Bromley, in 1390; Geoffrey Munte, born in Great Bromley, in 1413; William Gasewey, in 1415; in 1427 Robert Frost of Great Bromlegh; John Munte of Bromley, in 1431 and John Stone of Little Bromley that same year.

In Tudor times Thomas Cook, born at Great Bromley, was admitted a burgess in 1512. John Wright, born at Great Bromley, a mariner, (of all occupations), was admitted in 1558, the year Queen Elizabeth I became Queen.

All were born before 1538 when Thomas Cromwell ordered Parish Registers to be kept. Perhaps there will be more evidence in the Great Bromley Court Rolls. *John Appleby*.

LITTLE BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING NOVEMBER 1991.

Four principal matters were discussed. First the entertainment licence at the Fox and Hounds had been renewed by Tendring District Council although the premises will be inspected regularly by the Council's licensing officer. The lesson to be learnt was that residents who are affected. must keep a diary of dates and times on which Specific incidents have occurred, because these can be used as evidence in future applications. Generalised objections are, for legal purposes, insufficient. Secondly, the Council resolved a number of financial matters, including agreeing a contribution to the Bromley Messenger for 1990/1 and 1991/2. Steps are being taken to ascertain the cost of insuring the war memorial. Thirdly, the draft District Plan was discussed and arrangements made for a meeting with an official from Tendring District Council to discuss its application to Little Bromley. Fourthly, the parish noted the strong objection made by the District and County Councils in relation to the power station. The level of concern felt by parishioners had been clearly indicated at a recent public meeting. It was clear that a public enquiry would have to be called and developments were awaited.

GREAT BROMLEY VILLAGE HALL.

I would like to take this opportunity, through the Bromley Messenger, to explain why an increase in the hire charges: has been found necessary with effect from 1st January, 1992, to May, 1992, when again they are due to be reviewed. Having discussed the accounts with the auditor it was pointed out that the previous year's accounts show that receipts for the hire of the hall were paying only for the running expenses, leaving nothing for the hire of the hall; put another way, letting a furnished hall free.

With an increase of 20% on the insurance renewal, plus rate and fuel increases, the committee was left with no alternative but to raise the hire rates immediately. Since being elected Chairman last May, the committee and I have set a target of raising £5,000 during our year in office. This money could go towards improving the heating system which was installed in 1925; modernising this could halve the heating bill. We have recently spent £1,500 on electrical work to meet Safety Regulations. £500 is being put aside for chair repairs and a further £2,000 could be required to bring the kitchen up to the standards required by the new Food Hygiene Regulation and the Children's Act. I feel therefore, we cannot be expected to subsidise those who hire the hall. This is your Village Hall. Take advantage of its facilities. Your ideas are welcome.

The Bromley Messenger February 1992.

This month the 'Messenger' is sponsored by the Great Bromley Parish Council. It was due to the Parish Council that, in July 1986, the production of this magazine commenced as a free publication delivered to all the homes in Great and Little Bromley, and it is due to their concern that we are now approaching this year, our sixth birthday. We are grateful to them for the support they give, and of course, to all of you who send in material for publication, without whom the 'Messenger' would not be able to be produced. Please can you send in your articles for the March edition no later than Friday, 14th February.

THE PARISHES OF THE BROMLEYS AND ARDLEIGH.

I consider that it is now important to explain the situation concerning this parish and the parish of Ardleigh, which has been a matter of concern to the PCC for some time. In September last, the Reverend Reg Doncaster was forced by his illness to resign the parish of Ardleigh, and he has subsequently moved from the Vicarage to Colchester. Since September the parish of Ardleigh has been in an interregnum.

The filling of this vacancy has forced the Diocese to take into consideration certain important factors. One is that Ardleigh Vicarage a listed Georgian House, is in such a state of disrepair that it is not thought that any one would be prepared to live in it in its present condition, and the Diocese does not have sufficient funds to put any repairs in hand. This means that the house is to be put for sale, thus depriving the parish, temporarily, of a parsonage house.

Another consideration is that funding of parishes by the Diocese and Church Commissioners has to be decreased to the extent that small parishes of under 3,000 inhabitants can no longer expect to have a resident incumbent of their own. As Ardleigh falls into this category, it has to be united with another neighbouring parish. As this parish is also small, as it is near Ardleigh (the two parish churches are three miles apart) and as the churchmanship in the parishes is so similar, it is proposed that, at the next vacancy in this parish an incumbent will be appointed who will be both Rector of the Bromleys and Vicar of Ardleigh.

As Ardleigh is the larger village the present proposal is that when this vacancy occurs, this Rectory will be sold and a new Vicarage will be built on land to be purchased in the parish of Ardleigh. This is a long-term solution to the problem which the PCC accepts as necessary though having considerable reservations about the selling off of Great Bromley Rectory, which they consider would be a suitable site for the Parsonage House as it is in the centre of an L-shaped area consisting of the villages of Little Bromley, Great Bromley and Ardleigh. It must be stressed that no final decision has been made on this proposal which will obviously be the subject of much discussion and negotiation in the future.

The short-term solution to the difficulty with Ardleigh is for these two parishes to commence to work together as much as they can in the immediate future. The Bishop of Colchester wished to appoint myself as Priest-in-Charge of Ardleigh immediately which would make me, in effect, Vicar of Ardleigh in addition to my present appointment. At a meeting with the Archdeacon of Colchester, the PCC had serious reservations about this proposal, which the Archdeacon agreed must be looked at again before it can be implemented.

Consideration is also being given to the possibility of the two choirs combining to prepare a service of music for the evening of Good Friday, to be held in one or other of the two churches. There will be other opportunities, yet to be planned, for the two parishes to work together. I sincerely hope that all members of the congregation will support all these ways in which the two parishes are endeavouring to find a way of coming together.

THE GARDEN IN FEBRUARY.

Prepare the soil in the borders by digging and manuring, plant anemone corms, De Caen and S. Brigid, they take some beating, you will have lovely splashes of colour later, pay a visit to your favourite nursery for some instant effect, hellebores, polyanthus, pulmonciria or some winter flowering pansies. Bulbs that are naturalised will benefit from a feed of bonemeal but do not over-feed, about 2oz a sq. yd. Cover a few strawberries with cloches, to get a little earlier crop, start chitting your early potatoes in a frost free spare room, shed or garage. Make a start on sowing some half-hardy annuals such as antirrhinum, lobelia and sweet peas, also grow peas, . lettuces and cauliflowers, provide them all with temperature of around 55F (13C). Finish off the fruit pruning and plenty of digging, and do not forget to get your shallots and onion sets, I grow mine in plastic cups then replant in the garden. All the best, *Fred Wickham*.

FEBRUARY FILL DITCH!

Originally in Great Bromley the maintenance of highways was made the responsibility and obligation of landholders and the Lord of the Manor enforced this through the Court Baron and the Constables of the Parish. The First Road Act was The Statute of Winchester. 1285. The great Highway Act of 1555 remained in force for nearly three hundred years but Essex Quarter Sessions Court Records tell of defaulters:

Tuesday. 6th October. 1683. Petty Constables Presentments The Inhabitants of Great Bromley for a very dangerous whelm on the road leading from Little Bentley to Colchester.

A Whelm - pronounced well-um - was a culvert or channel under a road to take water to the draining ditch.

Epiphany Sessions 1686. Samuel Horseman of Great Bromley for 60 rod of ditch not cleaned in the way from Bromley Heath to the 4 relete towards Colchester (Bromley Cross).

A rod, pole or perch was a measure of $5\frac{1}{2}$ yards so 60 rod was 330 yards. or about a fifth of a mile. A 4 relete or four (pronounced fower) elite was a crossroads where four roads meet. Easter Sessions 1686. David Siday of Bromley for not scouring his ditch in the highway from Little Bentley Heath to Colchester (Harwich Road) being deficient for seventy rod.

With the old-time roadman long since gone, do keep your ditches clear. John Appleby.

KITCHEN CORNER.

A warming dish for a cold day: pork chops with apples.

4 x ½ " thick rib or loin chops

1 medium onion chopped

5-6 pippin apples peeled and sliced

2 sticks celery chopped

1 tablespoon plain flour

225ml apple juice or dry cider

1 teaspoon thyme 1 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper

5 tablespoons sour cream or Greek yoghurt.

Heat a large casserole and quickly sear the pork chops Remove on to a plate. Put onions and celery into the casserole and saute until soft. Stir in flour and remove from heat. Add apple juice, thyme, seasoning and apples, then add chops, cover and cook in the oven until pork is tender, about $1\frac{1}{2}$ -2 hours at 170° C or 325° F. Stir in cream or yoghurt before serving. *Jill Frostick*.

S. GEORGE'S CHURCH TOWER REPAIRS.

It is over seven years since the Repair Fund was set up to provide funds for the repair of the church tower, and during this time much effort has been put in to make the repairs possible. At the moment of writing, the contractors are finally completing this work which has included, not only the restoration of the outer stonework, but also of the unseen woodwork inside the tower. Although we do not have the final accounts, the total cost will have been in the region of £130,000. I am most grateful to all in the village who have worked so hard in the past to help us raise this sum, and also to the bodies who have given us grants towards this work. The main grant awarding body has been English Heritage who have provided 40% of the cost, but other bodies have also been very generous. Recently I heard from the Essex Association of Change Ringers that they have decided to make us a further grant of .£2,000 in addition to a grant made two years ago of £1,000. We are most grateful to them. Through their help we expect to be able to recommence the ringing of our bells which have been silent for almost four years. Sadly the work of fund raising has to continue. we still have considerable loans which we must pay off, and we now have to look at other areas of the church which need repair. The next stage will be to inspect the double hammer beams in the roof of the nave to prepare for an extensive repair to put right the ravages of death watch beetle which we know is active there. Rector.

KITCHEN CORNER.

Winter root vegetables are plentiful at this time. Beetroots are a favourite in our family and we like them served hot, cut in chunks with a white sauce. Beets need to be well scrubbed and boiled for 1-2 hours according to size. But they are good raw as well. Instead of the normal cooked sliced beets for salads, try grated raw ones. Scrub well and peel thickly to prevent any 'earthiness'. Another way is to make a pretty combination of raw salads. Line a platter with lettuce leaves and make three separate heaps of grated raw beetroot, carrot and turnip. A centre of cress or celery sticks completes a delicious and attractive dish full of vitamins and goodness! Serve dressing separately so the colours do not run together.

Another dish to please both eye and palate is cooked sliced beetroot interleaved with orange slices and sprinkled with French dressing, or mix together equal quantities of grated raw beets and cooking apples. Dress this with oil and vinegar dressing to which is added a tablespoon of horse- radish sauce and mix in 2oz sultanas. *Jill Frostick*.

THE CALL TO ARMS.

The parish officers of days gone by had a very considerable mass of duties imposed on them. Among the Parish Constable's duties was that of seeing that the Militia had its quota of 'National Service' men from each parish. From 1757 every parish was compelled to choose, by lot, a man or men to join the armed forces and serve for three years. A substitute volunteer from the parish or elsewhere, could be accepted but the parish had to pay £10 for him. Great Bromley Parish provided a man in 1798 and his enrolment paper is at Essex Record Office. It reads: "South Battalion of Essex Militia whereof Joseph Holden Strutt, Esq., is Colonel. These are to certify that James Harvey of the parish of Great Bromley, in the County of Essex, was sworn and enrolled at Manningtree on the 14 Day of August, 1798, (in loco is deleted) in PERSON in the above Battalion, a Balloted Man for the Parish of Great Bromley in the County of Essex, and the said James Harvey is now serving in the above Regiment. Given under my hand, at Maldon, this 14 Day of January, 1799. Samuel Charles Carne, Major".

James Harvey's wife and family were looked after by the Parish and it can be presumed that he did his service and returned to Great Bromley. *John Appleby*.

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL NEWS.

Health Promotion, Essex County Hospital, Colchester. North East Essex Walks week is Monday 15th to Sunday, 21st June, 1992.

Last Year we ran a Walks week as part of a district-wide campaign to promote the uptake of exercise. We invited all parishes to take part in the North East Essex inter-parish walking league and thirty-four took part. Over fifty walks were organised. The week was so successful it has been decided to make it an annual event. As footpath representative I have entered our parish to take part. I shall be attending a meeting in March to obtain all details and as soon as these are available they will be published in the Messenger and notices displayed around the village and on the Police House board. THE GARDEN IN MARCH.

Plant out wallflowers and polyanthus, there are some good . plants around, sow seed of perennials now, pansies, delphs, polyanthus, lupins, aquilegia and dianthus. A cold frame will do to sow them in. Fight the slug and snail problem as they are very active at this time with young growth coming through. Think ahead of what you plan for planting up your baskets, window boxes and tubs. Geraniums, fuschia are two of the most popular plants, you can cut your costs by propagating them from cuttings, I get a good success from Jiffy 7's. Pay a visit to your Garden Centre and pick up a few packets of bedding plant seeds, you can never have too many plants, and it is fun to have a go yourself. As soon as the apple buds break spray with Nimrod T, also do any grafting, feed all fruit trees with a general fertiliser. Sow leeks, peas and quick maturing cabbage in a cold greenhouse or frame, plant shallots and pop a few tubers of

potatoes in pots under cover. There will be plenty of backaches this month as we fight weeds and maybe some heavy soil; keep at it. *Fred Wickham*.

From its earliest beginning the Christian Church wished to celebrate the Resurrection of Christ on the Sunday nearest to the actual anniversary of this event according. to the Jewish Calendar, and so it is that this year we celebrate Easter on 19th April, but next year it will be 11th April. However, the date of the Feast in unimportant. What is important is the realisation that Easter marks the Christian Faith off as unique, celebrating God's care and love for the world which He created. I saw a striking advertisement which stated that Easter is not about chocolate, but about Jesus and His glorious resurrection.

'He is risen, as He said'. These words from the Gospel challenge us, year by year, to rejoice that by the death and resurrection of the Son of God, mankind is brought very close to the God who made us and all of creation. A Happy and Joyful Easter to you all.

MARGERY NICHOL.

Margery Nichol who died recently aged ninety-seven, was one of eleven children of the late Percy Henry Nichol whose father, Percy Charrington Nichol, started the Brewery and Mineral Water Company in Colchester in 1839, and which later became part of Ind Coope.

The Nichols' domains spread further than Great Bromley. Margery lived for a time at Bovills Hall, Ardleigh, which was owned and lived in by her grandfather, and whose brother built the larger Elm Park directly opposite in fierce competition, Margery would tell me! In the 1880's at the time of their marriage, Margery's father and mother set up house at Morants where most of us knew her. The font at S. George's Church was donated by the family in memory of Laurie who died in World War I and a sister Vera, who also died young. The Nichols Coal Charity founded by their grandfather continues to this day.

As one of two unmarried sisters, the other being Ruth, they continued to live with their single brother Dudley at Morants for very many years after their parents died. Margery and Ruth were regular worshippers at S. Georges and were responsible for the flowers on the pulpit on high days and feast days.

The sisters never strayed far from home though in World War I Margery drove an ambulance and was in the National Fire Service in World War II.

The two sisters and their brother were very hospitable in a quiet way, Margery being cook of the family. When we first came to The Hollies, all was very primitive and we were kindly invited to take our towel and spongebag over every Tuesday for a bath with running water instead of our tin bath in front of the kitchen range with the water ladled out of the copper! And at the coronation of the Queen, I trundled over with a pram full of children to view it on what must have been one of the few TV sets in the district at the time. They were very long suffering as our three little boys and their friends would swarm over their land and woods most of their childhood.

After Dudley's death they sold Morants, the farming of which had long been acquired by Andrew Lyon, and moved to a new house built for them at the opposite end of the village. There again a wonderful garden developed under their care, but Margery never really recovered after the death of her beloved sister and friend Ruth. But she was a strong independent spirit remaining alone at Blue Cedars until a few years ago when her great-nephew and his wife took her home to Wales to live with them. Only one sister of that large family remains, Dimple, who lives in Norwich, and there are very few descendants. Many of the old families of the village will regret the breaking of this link with the past.

A Memorial Service will be held at S. George's Church on Saturday, 28th March at 11.30am, when her ashes-will be committed and placed on the family grave. *Jean Harding*.

GREAT BROMLEY GARDEN CLUB.

A meeting was held on 5th March at Seven Rivers when we had a most interesting talk given by Mr. Canham, also many colourful slides. Our flowering shrubs should give us an excellent display this year if we can remember to follow all his suggestions! If only we could absorb the botanical names as well as Mr. Canham; what a memory! Our speaker on the 2nd April at Seven Rivers will be Mr. Rose on his Kashmir experience in search of alpine flowers. He will have slides which will also show beautiful scenery. THE GARDEN IN APRIL.

Deadhead all spring flowering bulbs as they finish. flowering to stop them making seed heads and sprinkle a general fertiliser such as Gromore around the bulbs. Plant gladioli bulbs now at fortnightly intervals to give a display throughout the summer. Plant at a depth of 4.5" in a sunny position, plant anemone corms also. Kill moss on the lawn with a good mosskiller such as May and Baker Lawn Weed Feed and Mosskiller. Leave the moss to dry then rake it out with a spring tine rake.

Start feeding houseplants after their winter rest. Choose a high nitrogen feed such as Baby Bio. Plant onion sets into the garden; the best way is to make a shallow trench. Sow french beans directly into the soil and protect with cloches until the danger of frost has passed. There is still time to plant seed potatoes but protect them from frost. Carrots and radish can be sown direct

into the soil. Tidy up beds and borders by lightly hoeing the surface, try not to damage any newly emerging shoots.

Sow tomatoes, aubergines and peppers in pots or trays in gentle heat, plant up hanging baskets with young plants, take cuttings of geraniums and fuchsia, they will still flower this year. Keep at it! *Fred Wickham*.

KITCHEN CORNER.

Leeks are another useful and tasty winter vegetable. The gardeners among you will know how easy and hardy they are. Wash them well splitting the tops so as to get out any grits among the leaves. They can be boiled whole and served with a white sauce, or wrap each in a slice of ham or bacon and cover with cheese sauce and bake in the oven. Another way is to slice them very finely across and cook gently in butter. Keep a lid on the pan and they will cook in their own juices. Shake pan or stir occasionally to make sure they do not stick. Cooked this way leeks make a good pie or flan filling, or a base for other dishes.

East leek soup:

2 large or 4 small leeks white part only

4 potatoes 2 onions 2oz butter 2 pints stock (white)

1/4 pint single cream or milk

Prepare and chop vegetables, soften onions in butter, add leeks and potatoes and cook and toss round a few minutes. Add stock and simmer till tender. Liquidise or sieve the soup, then reheat and stir in cream or milk and seasonings. Nice served with chopped chives on top.

Alternative recipe: chop up all the vegetables very finely and serve without liquidising. Only add cream or milk if you want as it is good without, chunky and nourishing! *Jill Frostick*.

IT IS YOUR DUTY.

At the Easter Quarter Sessions Court, 1647, Richard Goddeth of Great Bentley, husbandman, and Richard Forde. and Ann, his wife, of Great Bromley were presented for 'absenting themselves from their parish church'. They must have missed church more than once and had been presented to the Archdeacon's Church Court, and not appeared to answer the summons. The fine they had to pay or sentence in gaol at Chelmsford, if any, is not given.

In 1607 Robert Baker, Churchwarden of Little Bromley, had to appear before the Archdeacon as it was said 'that there was no money given to him to provide any after he was sworne Churchwarden ... that he did not receive the holy Commnsithence Easter 1606; but he sayth that he offered himself at Christmas last (1606) but Mr. King (Rector) refused him for that he (King) sayd that there wanteth a large byble, ie books of homilyes'. He (Baker) sayth he cannot tell whether they have them or not'.

The Court also heard that the parish needed a stope (vessel) for the wine; 'the steeple is in decay, but we want no bell ropes. There is no disorder in the church..'

At another Court Mr. Baker appeared as the church was defective (in disrepair) and wants lead (for roofing) and 'it rayneth down upon the bordes in the belfrye'. It was to the Churchwarden's credit that 'he hath provided a byble and the homilies' (short sermons). No mention is made that he was receiving Holy Communion. We look forward to seeing you all at the Eastertide Mass. *John Appleby*.

THE GARDEN IN MAY.

The lawns are going crazy now, they need cutting at least once a week, kill any weeds with a selective weed killer, keep children and pets off until the chemicals have completely dried. In the greenhouse begin to feed hanging baskets, pinch out the shoot tips of petunias and fuchsias, start hardening off plants in a cold frame before planting out. Sow seeds of narrow, courgette, melon and cucumber in small pots of seed and potting compost. Take softwood cuttings of fuchsias and geraniums, also carnations. Plant out summer bedding plants if the danger of frost has passed, do not forget the slug pellets as juicy young foliage is their supper, it is surprising what one nights feast can do to borders of plants. Sow some pansy seeds for a winter show. Continue to sow short rows of salad and root crops throughout the summer, finish planting maincrop potatoes, earth up early potatoes, sow runner beans and french directly into the soil. Remove the largest berries on gooseberries, they are good for cooking, it is a good way to thin them. Keep the hoe going and your back in condition. *Fred Wickham*.

Lemon Potatoes.

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ lbs old potatoes, peeled and cubed.

3 tablespoons oil or melted butter.

3 tablespoons lemon juice. Salt, pepper and herbs to taste.

Cover potato cubes with cold water and bring to the boil. Cook 4 minutes. Drain and put in a pie dish. Sprinkle then with the oil and juice and seasoning and bake 45-55 minutes in a hot oven. *Jill Frostick*.

There was one vacancy as Deanery Synod Representative and this was filled by Mr. Bill Walker. The other two Representatives not due to be elected this year are Mrs. Olive Sparling and Mr. George Kent. The cheering news given at the meeting was that the whole of the tower restoration is now complete! After so many years of planning, fund raising and negotiation the task is now done. The first Sunday this month, 7th June is of course, Whitsunday, a Festival now somewhat neglected since we no longer have a Bank Holiday on Whitmonday. Whitsun, or The Feast of the Pentecost, marks the remarkable events in Jerusalem, ten days after Jesus had Ascended into Heaven when the Apostles suddenly became filled with the power of the Holy Spirit and began their ministry of spreading the Gospel throughout the world. Because of this Whitsun is often called 'The Birthday of the Church'. Before the first Pentecost the Apostles were frightened and cowed, fearing that the Jews and the Roman authorities of Jerusalem would hound then down and put then to death as they did to Jesus. The coming of the power of the Holy Spirit completely changed them. Immediately after the events described by S. Luke in The Acts, Peter went into the streets and started to preach about Jesus; in the years that followed, the Apostles all went to far countries with the message of the Gospel, and in the end they all met with cruel deaths at the hands of their persecutors. Such was the change that the Holy Spirit worked in them. The Christian faith asserts that this very self-same power of the Holy Spirit has led to the growth of the Christian Church; from a handful of men and women 2,000 years ago into the largest religion in the world, claiming today something in the region of 800,000,000 believers in every nation and country of the world. On Whitsunday the whole Church celebrates this event and thanks God for the power of the Holy Spirit which is still found among us.

THE GARDEN IN JUNE.

June sees the real start of the summer bedding displays when all your hard work begins to pay off. To keep your bedding at its best spend a few minutes each day checking it over, feeding and watering. Wake sure annuals have enough space to grow. Shade the greenhouse to prevent scorching, water regularly greenhouse plants, take cuttings of African violet, cape primrose and foliage begonia, pinch out sideshoots of tomatoes, and pot up fuschia and geranium cuttings taken in the spring. Cut the lawns regularly, lower the blades to cut it shorter. Sow seeds of perennials and biennials during June, divide polyanthus and primrose plants, dig them up and store carefully. Pull apart the separate plants, replant and water. Plant out summer bedding plants and plant up patio pots and hanging baskets with colourful annuals. Plant marrow and courgette seeds straight into the soil, plant runner bean seeds, carrot and beetroot can be sown now for autumn. Keep the hoe going and the mower oiled. *Fred Wickham*.

KITCHEN CORNER.

Many thanks to all those who contributed recipes for the cook book we are publishing for the Heritage week-end. It will be full of interesting old recipes, so make sure you buy a copy! Thanks

too, for those who have offered cakes for the stall, but lots more are needed. Also needed, some freezer space to store cakes and bread made beforehand by those who have offered to make large quantities.

June is a good time to think about herbs for the winter. Dry or freeze leaves of parsley, mint, basil etc while they are at their freshest and best. It is useful to have some packets of chopped herbs in a carton in the freezer to quickly add flavour to your cooking. Here is another good recipe from Denham College:

Mars Bar Ice Pudding.

3 Mars bars (61.5g) 1 tablespoon milk ½ pint double cream 2 egg whites Slice bars and melt with milk over hot water. Cool and stir for 10 minutes. Fold in whipped cream and egg whites. Put into a bowl and freeze for 3 hours. *Jill Frostick*.

WHEN I WAS BOUND APPRENTICE

The Overseers of the Poor were responsible for seeing that all who were poor and able to work did so. Poor families were sometimes glad about this. William Death was an orphan of Great Bromley and on 19th December, 1818, the Overseers paid £6.0.0 in fees for binding him apprentice to John Underwood of Brightlingsea to be taught the trade of an Oyster Dredger. A further 6s. 8d. was paid for Entering him in the Register Book and Expenses. Travelling and food etc., cost a further 7s. 6d.

The surnames of both Death and Underwood are well known in Brightlingsea even today and until recently both families were still connected with the Oyster Fishery. *John Appleby*.

The Chancellor of the Diocese has issued new regulations concerning the burial of cremated remains in the Churchyard. We are now required to have an area set aside for this purpose which must be clearly narked. We are setting aside an area to the East of the porch of the church which is marked by oak posts. The Chancellor will no longer allow individual memorial stones to be erected over the burial plots, instead it is required that we have in the church a Book of Remembrance into which the names of those whose remains are buried in the plot will be entered. We are therefore, to apply for a Faculty to have a Book of Remembrance in a glass-topped cabinet in the Lady Chapel in the church. I will be pleased to answer any enquiries or questions which this new regulation may suggest to you.

It is a real pleasure to be able once again to hear the sound of S. George's bells. At the moment we are able to ring on practise nights, but we do not have a sufficient number of ringers to ring for Sunday services. This we hope to be able to do very soon, but we do need more ringers. If you are an experienced ringer, or would like to learn and be able to ring on Sundays, please come to any practise night ring on Fridays at 7.30pm, or contact the Tower Captain, David Wenden.

What is an "average" local council?

The "typical" or average council has nine councillors representing a single parish of 1,700 people with a part-time paid female clerk and revenue expenditure of £15,000.

This average picture masks the great diversity of local councils. Some councils are run entirely on a voluntary basis with no paid staff and little expenditure. Others represent communities of over 30,000 people, may have a budget of over £1m and expenditure and staffing levels per head of population similar to the smaller district councils.

An overall picture emerges of extensive and increasing levels of local council activity. There is a broad positive relationship between size and the extent and nature of activities, but councils of all sizes may be very active or may choose to fulfil a limited range of functions.

The proceeds from the weekend are to be split three ways, to the Village Hall for the funds they need for upgrading the facilities, to the S. George's Church Repair Fund to help pay off the indebtedness caused by the extensive tower repairs and to S. George's Church to help with the maintenance of the church and churchyards which cost in total, in the region of £15,000 per year.

Please support all the events and encourage friends and everyone you know to come and see the exhibitions and discover some of the fascinating history of the village and the church.

HATS AND BELLS.

To anyone who does not know S. George's Church, there will be no connection whatsoever between Hats and Bells. For us here in the Parish there is a very special connection. Under the tower, as you face East in S. George's Church, as you look up, you will notice a collection of hats, bowlers and billycocks. They all look very elderly, and some have a date painted on then. The earliest, the one on its own nearest the ceiling, was put up in 1716 and others are dated 1825, 1913, 1919, 1935 and 1972. The connection with bells is that all the hats belonged to, and were worn by, Tower Masters, persons responsible for the ringing of the church bells and they were all put up in the church on the death of their owners. This recalls an old Essex custom of a young man courting, he would only put his hat on the hat-stand when he had been accepted as a member of the family and suitable to wed the daughter of the house. Hanging these hats indicated that the Tower Masters were now given an official place in the church in the nearer presence of the Master who they had loyally served by ringing the bells to bring the faithful in to worship.

On Sunday, 2nd August, another hat is to be placed with the others, indicating loyal service over many years, by Felix Erith who died last year and who had served the church so well, not only in his interest in bell ringing, but also in his work as archaeologist and historian.

On the Sunday afternoon a service of Thanksgiving for Felix' life, and the dedication of his hat prior to its being put up with the others, will be held at 3.00pm in S. George's Church. From 2.00pm there will be open ringing and after the service members of the Essex Association of Change Ringers will ring a quarter peal in honour of Felix.

This will be a very special occasion and we invite all to join us. Many friends of Felix will be present and so too will many representatives of the world of ringing. He will be joined at this service by members of the congregation of S. Mary's, Ardleigh, and their choir. Felix of course, lived in Ardleigh and served S. Mary's faithfully throughout his life, as well as loyally supporting us in the Bromleys.

THOU SHALT NOT STEAL

In times of great want persons are driven to stealing. In the seventeenth century times were hard and so it is not uncommon to find entries in the Quarter Sessions Records such as this: Easter Sessions Court 1650 "Wm. Pepper, of Great Bromley, labourer, on 25th March, stole there 2lb of butter worth 2d; a piece of pork worth 3d; a piece of beef worth 2d; a pitcher worth ½d and milk worth ½d off Thomas Toddy". He confessed and was whipped! All for 8p!!!

Sir Thomas Bowes, JP, ordered the punishment after listening to the case. He was the Lord of the Manor of Great Bromley. He dealt as harshly with other criminals. He was also a witch hunter and much was told of him being involved in catching a criminal and then sitting in justice on the bench to try the case. In 1654 he was an MP for Essex but was excluded at first from the House by Cromwells Council. *John Appleby*

ST GEORGES YOUTH CLUB NEEDS YOUR HELP!

VILLAGE HALL NOTES - JUNE

Following on from elections in May, there was a meeting of the Village Hall Committee on 2nd June with Mr P Wenden in the chair when, with the exception of the arrangements for the Heritage Weekend, various administrative matters were dealt with. An application had been made to the Tendring D C for a grant towards improvements to the kitchen to which Mr Nigel Rowe was able to report it had been successful to the extent of £1,000 being made available by the Council subject to various conditions.

There was an enquiry, by letter, before the Committee asking about hiring charges payable by Village based societies. It is worth noting that the present scale of charges makes a distinction in favour of village societies compared to those made to Clubs and persons outside the Village.

THE TENDRING HUNDRED SHOW 11TH JULY 1992.

The Show will be held at Lawford on Saturday 11th July. The subject arose the other day taking minds back 40 years or more when the Show was held at Great Bromley. The newly dug in picket posts along the line of trees at the Cricket ground began the recollection because in digging the holes much hardcore was found. This was the foundation to the hardened roadway which ran along the roadside boundary, beside the Copley Dene hedge to the field beyond the Cricket ground, which was the site of the show, all 14 acres of it, now it takes up 60 acres. This year there will be a departure from the usual content, as a look is being taken towards Europe, as the single market starts in 1993. There will be a considerable display of things European and the relevance of Europe to the Tendring Hundred Show. So come and look for yourselves. The Post Offices at Great and Little Bromley can sell you tickets at concession rates if bought before the Show Day. *R L Harding*

THE GARDEN IN JULY

Now is the month to start harvesting fruit that is ripe, some varieties of raspberry, strawberry and gooseberry will start ripening in July and August. Stat the pruning of summer fruiting can fruit including raspberry and loganberry. Sow some wall flower seeds outside in a prepared site, transplant when large enough to handle, plant about 6 inches apart and pinch out the growing tips, to encourage a bushy plant. Summer prune Wistiria by cutting back each side shoot to about six leaves this will reduce the number of buds for the plant to put its reserves into next year's flowers. Keep the greenhouse well ventilated, damp down floors and staging to increase humidity, watch for pests and diseases and deal with them promptly, continue to feed and water. Sow turnip, lettuce and endive for a continuous supply also sow spring cabbage in a seed bed. Indoor and outdoor tomatoes should be kept constantly moist, remove all side shoots and feed with a tomato fertiliser. Runner beans should be pinched out when they reach the top of the canes, and feed with a high potash feed. Mow the lawn at least once a week, and hope for rain. *F Wickham*

KITCHEN CORNER

The soft fruit season is here again, and there are many delicious ways of using them; fools, pies ice, sorbets, souffles etc. For freezing it is best to choose only firm smaller fruits. Large strawberries are apt to collapse when defrosted. Freeze all fruits in open trays to harden before putting into bags. Damaged or overripe fruits are best mashed or sieved to a puree and frozen in small tubs to use as a sauce or for fools etc. Summer pudding is a great favourite in our family, but be sure not to use sliced bread for making this. You need a stale loaf cut thickly for good results. Another popular sweet is Scandinavian fruit fool.

RODGROD MED FLODE

1 $\frac{1}{4}$ lbs soft fruit - I use $\frac{1}{2}$ lb redcurrants $\frac{1}{2}$ lb blackcurrants $\frac{1}{4}$ lb raspberries or loganberries 1 pt water 6oz sugar $\frac{1}{4}$ oz cornflour

Stew fruit gently in the water until soft. Strain through a sieve (without pressing) to yield about 1 pint of juice. Add sugar and return to the pan. Use a little juice to slake the cornflour, add more juice then put in the pan and bring to the boil stirring constantly. It will thicken and clear, remove from heat and leave to cool stirring to prevent a skin forming. Pour into serving bowl when cold. *Jill Frostick*



THE GARDEN IN AUGUST.

Prune trees and shrubs during August, hydrangeas cut back dead flowers to just above the next fat bud, remove any weak or straggly stems.

Harvest soft fruit for jams and freezing, keep picking runner beans to prevent seeding. Lift and store early potatoes.

Take cuttings of fuchsia and geraniums to overwinter for a great display next year, it is easy and it saves money.

On the lawn August is the last opportunity to apply a weedkiller. Use a selective weedkiller such as PBI BIO lawn weedkiller, now any lawn that needs it, mowing to low can weaken and destroy it.

Feed outdoor tomatoes, pinch out the growing tips when they have formed four trusses.

Harvest all vegetables as they mature, bend over onions to assist ripening.

Keep hoeing and hoping for rain as the ground is very dry.

Pork and apple pie.

8oz shortcrust pastry. Use half to line a pie plate.

Filling: 1 lb minced pork

2oz diced bacon 1 onion chopped

1 sharp flavoured apple peeled and chopped ½ teaspoon dried rosemary

1 or 2 tablespoons stock or water, Salt and pepper

Mix all well together and spoon into pastry case.

Cover with rest of pastry and bake for 20 minutes at 400F, then 45 minutes at reduced heat 375F.

You can add sliced hard-boiled eggs if liked.

ALL MY WORLDLY GOODS?

At 2.00pm on Wednesday, 3rd November, 1954, at The Bonnington Hotel, Southampton Row, London, the auction of the Beaumont Collection of Lordships of the Manor began. Lot 3 was The Manor of Great Bromley.

Among the documents handed over to the purchaser of the Lordship was a modern Quit Rent Book. In pencil among the entries is the following:

5th October, 1895, David Barber, Quit Rent 9/11; Dead - heriot - 1 mark horse - the best'.

'1906 - Walter Grimston - 1/2 (about six pence) - marked a roan mare and set price - £9'

So until early this century the age old custom of 'marking heriots' was still in practice in Great Bromley. What is a heriot? From Anglo-Saxon times when a person died the heir had to return to the Lord of the Manor the weapons and military apparel of the deceased originally supplied by the Lord. This gear could include a horse, harness, weapons etc. This 'Death Return' applied to freemen and villagers. In William I's reign the custom ceased and the Lord demanded instead the best beast or goods the deceased possessed. Later this became a money fee so that the heir could take over the estate. KITCHEN CORNER.

Marrows are plentiful and cheap at this time of year. I store mine in string nets and find, if hung in an airy dry place, will keep several months. We like then stuffed and baked in the oven. I use meat stuffing, or sometimes rice and vegetables or cheese. Here is an unusual idea you night like to try.

Vegetable Marrow Duck.

- 1 vegetable marrow about the size of a duck
- 2 large Spanish onions
- 6 sage leaves chopped fine
- 4 oz fresh breadcrumbs
- 2 oz melted butter
- 1 egg well beaten

Salt and pepper

Peel Marrow, cut a slice off end and scoop out seeds without piercing the flesh. Parboil onions, chop them up, add sage, breadcrumbs, egg and seasoning and half melted butter. Mix well and stuff into marrow. Replace end slice and tape or tie with string. Place in baking tin, pour over rest of butter and bake in a Moderate oven (350°F 180°C) till tender, about 40-50 minutes. Serve with white sauce or cheese or tomato sauce. *Jill Frostick*.

THE GARDEN IN SEPTEMBER.

In the vegetable garden dig the maincrop potatoes for storage. Allow them to dry first. Carrots, beetroot, parsnips and swede can be stored in boxes of sand, a layer of vegetables and a layer of sand. If you like spinach sow a row or two of winter spinach such as Sigmaleaf, the plants need a sunny spot and given cloche protection from October. Continue to pick beans, tomatoes and marrows as they mature. Sow Godetia and cornflowers. Choose where you want the plants to flower next summer, choose a sunny spot and sow thinly. Other hardy annuals can be sown, ie nigella, pot marigold, delphiniums and scabious. . Continue to pick apples and pears, collect any windfalls and use them while still edible. Start feeding lawns, sow any bad patches with lawn seed, the lawn will continue to grow so increase the cutting height. Dig over any vacant plots for the winter and manure, watch the backache. *Fred Wickham*.

THE GARDEN IN OCTOBER.

Put greasebands on lower parts of apple tree trunks to stop the female winter moths climbing the trees to lay eggs, tie the greasebands tightly so they cannot get underneath it, inspect it regularly and renew if necessary. Finish the harvesting of pears and apples during October, if left they could be damaged by frost. Take hardwood cuttings of currants and gooseberries. Start feeding the birds with scraps of fat and nuts. Bring indoors any houseplants that have been standing outside for the summer, reduce the water to let them rest. Remove leaves from lawns as they fall, scarify with a spring type rake to remove thatch. Do any repairs, reseed where needed, raise the mower blades to keep the .lawn neat and tidy. Overwinter tender cuttings of geraniums and fuchsia in a frost free room or greenhouse. Plant out some spring bedding plants such as pansies, polyanthus and spring flowering bulbs. Dig all waste ground up to get the frost and to break up any heavy soil. *Fred Wickham*.

SO YOUR HOUSE INSURANCE HAS GONE UP!

Insurance premiums have risen and you may have noted that we are in a bad area for ground disturbances and even earthquakes. The Essex Earthquake of 1884 is our subject this month. Parish Registers have been used not only for entries of births, baptisms, marriages and funerals, but also for various random notes. Little Bromley's Register of Baptisms (1842-1902) has the following among the entries:

'A strong shock of earthquake was felt on Tuesday, 22nd April, 1884 at 9.20am. No damage was caused in this parish.'

Colchester was shaken by this earthquake and so were many villages around the town but in the report compiled by Messrs. Raphael Mandela and William White for The Essex Field Club there is only mention of Great Bromley feeling the shock. In Wivenhoe and Elmstead two-hundred-and-fifty-nine buildings were repaired and Wivenhoe Church and the Independent Chapel in West Street, Wivenhoe, also. At Ardleigh the shock was recorded at 9.17am, at Mistley and Manningtree it occurred at 9.18am when clocks stopped and at Frating farm workers did not feel a shock but were unable to get their hoes into the

clocks stopped and at Frating farm workers did not feel a shock but were unable to get their hoes into the ground because of some influence they did not understand and a rumbling noise was heard. At Ardleigh bells in the church tower rang and chimneys were reported to have been thrown down at Crockleford Mills.

Mr. Thomas Robinson of Phoenix Flour Mills reported that in his house his clock stopped and servants bells rang; sacks of wheat on the upper floor of the mill fell from East to West. I believe that this is the only place where the Little Bromley shock has been noted. Messrs. Mendola and White do report that at Great Bromley chimneys at the Rectory, now Copley Dene, were dislodged. *John Appleby*.

Seventy-four years ago on 11th November, 1918, the 'War to end all Wars' was ended and the custom of keeping a special day each November as Remembrance Day commenced. This year Remembrance Day is on Sunday, 8th November when there will be a service of remembrance and two minutes silence at S. George's Church, followed by the laying of wreaths on the Village War Memorials, to which all parishioners are invited to attend.

KITCHEN CORNER.

This month some ideas for Hallowe'en or Guy Fawkes night. Apples are plentiful so why not try making these:

Toffee Apples.

8-10 apples ½ pint water 11b brown sugar 1 tbs golden syrup

2oz butter Toffee apple sticks (or dowelling cut into 6" lengths)

2 teaspoons vinegar

Remove stalks from apples and impale each firmly on a stick. Put all ingredients, except apples, in a large heavy pan. Heat slowly until sugar is dissolved, stirring frequently. Bring to the boil then boil fast for five minutes without stirring. Test a few drops in cold water to see if it forms a hard ball. If not continue to boil for a few minutes until this hard ball stage is reached, testing again in cold water.

Quickly swirl each apple once or twice in the hot toffee and stand on a well-greased tin or non-stick paper. When cold and set, wrap each apple in cellophane paper.

After a few days the toffee becomes very sticky so use quickly!

Novelty Hot Dogs.

Cooked chipolatas or frankfurters French or German mustard, Streaky bacon rashers Sliced cheddar cheese Fruit chutney.

- 1) Split sausages lengthwise, spread lightly with mustard and sliced cheese, press together and wrap in bacon rashers. Grill till crisp.
- 2) Spread with fruit chutney, lay cheese on top and grill till bubbling.

Serve in hot dog rolls.

Can be made in advance and wrapped in foil ready to reheat in a moderate oven.

The Rector of Little Bromley (1878-1880), Mr. Richard Abbay, M.A., Fellow of Wadham College, Oxford, appears to have been interested in the weather.

In the Baptism Register he made this observation:

The year 1879 has been the wettest and most sunless ever remembered. No fruits of any kind ripened properly and all edible roots and plants reduced deficient in nutritious properties. A five weeks period of intense cold, a very high barometer (30") began in November and Ended on 28th December. There is here 8° F, in York 6° F on grass. Trees planted in churchyard and near Rectory. (R(ichard) A(bbay).' This note assists in the age of certain trees in both the churchyard and what was the former rectory at Little Bromley. *John Appleby*.

THE GARDEN IN NOVEMBER.

In the vegetable garden sow broad beans and peas, outside from October Aquadulce Claudia is a good broad bean and Feltham First is a very early pea; Clear and tidy the vegetable patch as much as possible if you have a bonfire check for the odd hedgehog hibernating, check before lighting it. Dig over heavy soils for the frost to penetrate, also dig in plenty of compost, parsnips and carrots leave in the ground until required. On the lawn, depending on the weather, give it a final cut, trim and tidy the edges, then clean and oil the mower ready for next year. Start planning your garden for next year by ordering your seed catalogues, also go to a garden centre for any herbaceous plants to fill any gaps.

Leaves will be a trouble this month, best to put them in the compost heap to rot down with mowings and manure, keep the fork and spade going, watch your back! *Fred Wickham*.

The proposal involves removing the two back pews and the glass screen, reversing the screens which are to be increased in height and to position them where the front of the two rear pews now stand. The whole of this area is to be covered with a wooden floor at the same height as the present wooden floor in the pews. In order to go ahead with this proposal, the PCC has to apply to the Chancellor of the Diocese for a Faculty, which proposal will be applied for at the December meeting of the PCC. A plan with drawings will be posted on the noticeboard inside the church which it is hoped that parishioners will consult. It would be helpful if any comment or query about this proposal could be put in writing and given to the Rector by the end of this month. There will be no need for any appeal for funds to complete this project.

As this is only a minor alteration in the church, and as it will provide space which we really do need, I hope that the reasoning for this will be understood and the project given full support.

WEDNESDAY, 11th NOVEMBER.



THE GARDEN IN DECEMBER.

Protect any containers by wrapping with bubble polythene and mulching over the roots with compost bark or straw. It is your last chance to plant hyacinths and tulips, make sure they are all neatly planted by the beginning of December otherwise you risk a poor display in the spring. Keep off lawns as much as possible when wet or frozen, continue to rake up leaves to give the grass and roots room to breathe. Do any repairs to fences to save them from further damage in winter, store garden furniture in a dry place. Check on stores vegetables and remove any which show signs of disease or damage, there is still time to plant early peas and broad beans. I plant mine in pots and plant out later because of mice. Replant the suckers of established raspberry canes by separating from parent plants, plant bare root fruit trees now. Do not forget to order your seeds for 1993 and have a very happy Christmass. *Fred Wickham*.

If you have an elderly relative who would appreciate a small Christmas cake try this idea.

Make your cake in a 12" tin. When cold and matured cut out a round from the centre about 4-5 inches across to make a small gift cake. Ice and decorate the ring you have left to make a 'garland cake' and stand a tall, fat candle in the centre. This looks very festive and is easier to slice. Any left-over marzipan or royal icing can be made into sweets. Add colours and flavours etc.

Home-made fudge is another favourite, easy to make too!

Recipe: 1/2 K sugar, 1/2 tin evaporated milk and 2oz margarine.

Use a large heavy based pan. Melt ingredients together over moderate heat until dissolved, then boil gently for about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent burning. Test for soft-ball stage (240° F) Remove from heat, when bubbles subside add 1 teaspoon vanilla essence. Beat with a wooden spoon until almost setting, pour into a 7" square oiled tin. Cut into squares when nearly set. *Jill Frostick*.

This sett downe by Geo: Warren, then Churchward."

The Revd. Richard Bowes was the son of Sir Thomas Bowes, Kt., of Great Bromley. He was born at Great Bromley Hall. Gained his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Caius College, Cambridge, 1661. Ordained priest, Lincoln, 22 Dec 1661, Rector of Great Bromley 1661-1700, Rector of Stowlangtoft Suffolk 1668, Lecturer of S. James Church, Bury S. 

MR. ROY TRICKER.



<u>CHRISTMASS CHILDREN'S GIFT SERVICE</u> - <u>SUNDAY 13th DECEMBER AT S. GEORGE'S CHURCH, GREAT BROMLEY AT 3.00pm</u>

Christmass is a time for giving, giving to those whom we love, giving to our families, and giving to our friends. Can we this year, extend our giving slightly to include people, unknown to us personally, whose Christmas festivities, because their country is in the grips of a terrible civil war, will be very different from ours? Jesus, whose birth we celebrate at Christmass was born to a family of refugees in the most primitive of accommodation, a stable in Bethlehem. Our giving to refugees in a similar plight will be a most worthy Christian and Christmass act of compassion. We are associating ourselves with the Manningtree Refugee Concern, whose aim is to help alleviate the plight of some of the thousands of refugees and displaced persons in Bosnia and Croatia, whose terrible conditions of living are well known to us through television and newspaper reports. The support we are hoping to give is organised by relief agencies founded by Christian Churches in Croatia. All the gifts will be transported by lorry to a network of Franciscan Monasteries in the area of Medjugorje, a very well-known village in Croatia, whose Brothers will ensure that the goods are distributed to those whose need is most apparent and who are living in desperate conditions. Gifts which are most needed are simple medical supplies, baby food and equipment, high protein biscuits and other foods, and warm clothing. Simple gifts suitable for young children, such as

small soft toys, balls and playthings would be most welcome, as well as any goods, such as nappies, to help young mothers in the care of babies.

At the Children's Christmass Gift Service on Sunday, 13th December at 3.00pm we hope to be able to welcome you and to receive your gifts. The service which will include Christmass carols and readings, will be short and informal and during the service we will ask you and your children to place the gifts you bring around the Christmass tree in Church.

As soon as possible afterwards, they will all be parcelled up and sent on their way to Bosnia. Please do come and help us to share with others some of the Christmass joy and happiness which we enjoy year after year.

After the service we are pleased to invite all who attend to have tea and cakes with us in S. George's School Hall where a warm welcome will await you.

The Rector and Churchwardens wish all parishioners a very Happy and Blessed Christmass.
