

KITCHEN CORNER

Apples and carrots; both can be used in cake making, and give a moist but light texture. Sharp flavoured apples are usually the best sort to use.

Dorset Apple Cake

8oz SR flour, $\frac{3}{4}$ lb prepared chopped apples, 4oz butter/marg, 5 or 6 tablesps milk, 4oz sugar, 2oz currants.

Rub butter into flour, add other ingredients and mix to a stiff dough with the milk, using a fork. Spread into a prepared 8" cake tin and bake in a moderate oven 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

Carrot and Hazelnut Cake

$\frac{1}{2}$ lb carrots (about 5oz when scraped and grated), 3 eggs, 5oz sugar, 5oz chopped hazelnuts, 2oz plain flour, 2 teasp grated lemon rind, $\frac{1}{2}$ teasp baking powder.

Grease and line a 7" square, or oblong, loaf tin. Whisk yolks with sugar till thick, stir in carrot, nuts and lemon rind. Fold in flour sifted with baking powder and then fold in stiffly beaten whites of egg. Cook in a moderate oven for 45 minutes. When cool, ice the cake with a thin layer of glaze icing and decorate with hazelnuts.

How to Cook a Husband

"A good many husbands are utterly spoiled by mismanagement. Some women keep them constantly in hot water; others let them freeze by their carelessness and indifference. Some keep them in a stew by irritating ways and words. Others roast them, some keep them in a pickle all their lives. It cannot be supposed that any husband will be tender and good managed in this way, but they are really delicious when properly treated. In selecting your husband you should not be guided by the silvery appearance, as in buying mackerel, nor by the golden tint, as if you wanted salmon. Be sure and select him yourself, as tastes differ. Don't go to the market for him, as the best are always brought to your door. It is far better to have none unless you know how to cook him. A preserving kettle of the finest porcelain is best, but if you have nothing but an earthenware pipkin, it will do, with care. See that the linen in which you wrap him is nicely washed and mended, with the required number of buttons and strings nicely sewn on. Tie him in the kettle by a strong silk cord called comfort, as the one called duty is apt to be weak and they are apt to fly out of the kettle and be burned and crusty on the edges, since like crabs and lobsters, you have to cook them alive. Make a clear, steady fire out of love, neatness and cheerfulness. Set him as near this as seems to agree with him. If he splutters and fizzes, do not be anxious, some husbands do this till they are quite done. Add a little sugar in the form of what confectioners call kisses, but no vinegar or pepper on any account; a little spice improves them, but it must be used with judgment. Do not stick any sharp instruments into him to see if he is becoming tender. Stir him gently; watch the while, lest he lie too flat and too close to the kettle, and so become useless. You cannot fail to know when he is done. If thus treated you will find him very digestible, agreeing nicely with you and the children, and he will keep as long as you want, unless you become careless and set him in too cold a place."

GREAT BROMLEY AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Recently I have been reviewing "Mobility & Migration; East Anglian Founders of New England, 1629-1640 by Roger Thompson, (ISBN 0- 87023-893-0). Published by the University of Massachusetts Press (1994).

Of course Great Bromley is noted together with Little Bromley, Ardleigh, Great Bentley, Elmstead and Lawford. There are references to our own Gregory and Simon Stone and Joan Stone and John Stone, Junior. It was especially interesting to find that among the clerical emigrants was the Revd Edmund Brown, aged 32, born 1606 at Lavenham, Suffolk. Brown graduated at Emmanuel College, Cambridge in 1628 and went to the U.S.A. in 1638. In England he was Domestic Chaplain to the Bowes family at The Hall, Great Bromley, and helped as Assistant Curate at St Georges. Later he was Assistant Curate at Sudbury, Suffolk from whence he went to the States. There are many interesting persons among those who have served as Rector's assistants over the years as well as those who served as Domestic Chaplains to the Catholic family of Mannock who bought The Hall from the Bowes about 1700. Thomas Mannock was a Recusant in 1715 as was his wife. More about the Catholic Chaplains at The Hall in a later issue. (To be continued) *John Appleby*

The Bromley Messenger February 1995

Last month's date for copy was before Christmas so there was no opportunity to say how pleased we all were at St George's to see so many different people at the various Christmas services. It's good to see the Parish Church fulfilling its task at the main Christian Festivals so well. This year was our first experience of the Gt Bromley pantomime. We had been told that it was something not to be missed so it was with that sense of expectation that my family and I made our way into the Village Hall. We were not disappointed - especially our youngsters who roared with laughter at the slapstick and the jokes and the pantomime dames. However there was an uneasy moment or two in the Second Act when our four year old caught her first sight of the ogre. We now see some of the familiar faces of the village in a new light!

Sometimes Christianity is seen as being rather suspicious of humour and laughter and people enjoying themselves. This is surely a distortion of what God wishes us to be like. Moreover the message that Christ brings is one of joy and thankfulness. Jesus speaks in some of his parables as the kingdom of God being like a grand banquet. While an overdeveloped sense of humour can be tiresome and frivolous, humour, that ability to laugh and see the absurdity of things, is an important quality. It shows that we are able to see beyond ourselves in a wider, deeper perspective and that we realise that we live in a world in which the unpredictable happens which doesn't always make sense to the human mind. When faced with difficulty and problems it is easy to become absorbed in them in a way that saps our inner strength. The ability to set light to them and laugh or see the funny side of our lives can be for the Christian an expression of trust for it helps us take ourselves less seriously and realise that ultimately God has us in his care. As Jesus said, "Be not anxious for anything for your heavenly Father knows well what you need before you ask him". *Fr Trevor*

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GT & LT BROMLEY and THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Among "Selected Women Emigrants" to the United States mentioned in the book entitled "Mobility and Migration - East Anglian Founders of New England, 1629-1640", are the following:- Sarah Fosdick, nee Wetherall, wife of Stephen Fosdick, Carpenter, was born in 1589 and when 46 in 1635 went to America. Her birthplace is given as Little Bromley but I cannot find her baptism although others of her family were baptised there; her marital home was in Wenham, Suffolk. Susan Stone, wife of Henry Kimball, Wheelwright, was born in 1599 at Great Bromley and emigrated with her husband in 1634 when she was 35. Their marital home was Mistley.

KITCHEN CORNER

Souffles

Many folks are frightened to make souffles - but they really are not difficult! Just remember that you must use a straight-sided dish, well-buttered and deep enough to contain the mixture comfortably. Some books tell you to tie paper round so the souffle stands clear of the dish when cooked. This looks fancy, I suppose, but is really not necessary. I like to make things as simple as possible!

Smoked Haddock Souffle

½ lb smoked haddock fillet

1oz butter, 1oz flour

Milk, Slice of lemon, Few parsley stalks, 4 Egg yolks, 5 egg whites

Cut up the fish and poach in milk to cover, with lemon and parsley stalks, for about 10 minutes. Remove fish, save ¼ pt of the milk for the sauce. Flake fish, removing skin and any bones. Make a smooth white sauce with the butter, flour and milk. Season well, add fish and beat well. Leave till tepid, then beat in egg yolks one at a time. Carefully fold in the stiffly beaten whites of egg. Pour into the buttered souffle dish and spread level. Bake 40-45 minutes, 350F (moderate oven). Serve at once, using a warm spoon to do so. PS. If you cannot use the other egg yolk, just use 4 egg whites for the recipe.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

As most people are now aware the Church of England faces increasing financial strain because the parishes are having to be asked to contribute more realistically to the cost of ministry. As in past years Gt Bromley fell short in the contribution it was asked to make to the Diocese. Asking people to try and contribute more to the work of the church is a task that most priests, including myself, find very difficult, but I have to do so in order to try and ensure that the ministry here will be maintained in the future.

One way to increase your giving without actually giving more may be by signing a simple covenant form which states the amount you can afford to give in a year. We then claim the tax back from the Inland Revenue. This only applies if you pay tax. It can be cancelled and revised quickly and simply if your circumstances change.

Another popular way of giving is through numbered envelopes in which you decide to give a certain amount per week or per month. This helps you make a prayerful and considered decision as to the amount you give to the work of the church of God and help us plan the finances. I know times are hard but do please consider if you are able to further help and maintain the life of St. George's. NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Dear Parishioners

The The Neighbourhood Watch Newsletters will now start appearing in the 'Bromley Messenger' on a regular basis. I aim to write a small piece every month.

During 1994 reported crimes in the Mistley Police Section, which includes the villages of Gt and Lt Bromley, fell by 16.5%. This is obviously a good sign and we all hope the level of crime continues to fall. The villages still seem to be a target for stolen cars to be dumped and then burnt. Admittedly a lot .of this occurs under the cover of darkness, but some stolen cars have been sighted in the back lanes during daylight hours. Any sightings of suspicious vehicles please continue to give us a call.

Dwelling burglaries are down, none having occurred so far this year in the Bromleys. A lot of this must be down to people taking greater precautions over locking up and the fitting of good locks. Some parents when picking up children from school still continue to park within 10 metres of the junction, both outside the school and at St George's Close. I must remind you that this is both illegal and dangerous. There are now a lot more HGV's using the main road through Bromley. If one of those was to go out of control approaching the school from Ardleigh it would collide with any illegally parked cars. Thank you for your assistance in this matter.

A SIXTEENTH CENTURY LIBRARY IN GREAT BROMLEY

Peter Wentworth, Rector of Great Bromley (1581-1599) left a will dated 1 September, 1592; it was proved 14 September, 1599. In his will Peter left "all my books" at Long Melford and Great Bromley, (although there is no other detail), to be divided between his sons. Newcourt presumed that Wentworth was the author in 1598 of "An Exhortation to Queen Elizabeth and A Discourse of the true and lawful Successor". He was chaplain to Lord D'Arcy (of St Osyth) and in 1587 published a sermon on certain Psalms.

William Cardinal, J.P., of Great Bromley Hall, was patron of the living where Wentworth was instituted in 1581. He came from Gosfield, Essex. The Wentworth family owned the lay parsonage of Gestingthorpe, Essex, and Long Melford, Suffolk; Wentworth was Vicar of Gestingthorpe (1588-1599) and asked to be buried in the chancel of that church. He was also Rector of Abberton, Essex, (1578-1591). He owned land in Coggeshall and Shotley, Suffolk. The livings of Gestingthorpe and Long Melford passed to his wife.

BEST KEPT VILLAGE COMPETITION

The Parish Council have entered Great Bromley for the Best Kept Village Competition and below are some hints on what it is that the judges are looking for.

WHAT MAKES A WINNING VILLAGE - HINTS FOR ENTRANTS

Overview:

Best Kept Village Competitions have received some adverse publicity in the national press recently, fuelled by stories of floral displays in meticulously vacuumed telephone boxes! It is, therefore, important to stress that in Essex B.K.V. judges in keeping with the aims of the RCC's wider work will look at villages as living communities and not as artificially manicured museum pieces ! The purpose of the competition is quite simply to reward evidence of community pride and encourage proper care for the focal points of village life.

Judging Categories

Please note that categories 10,11 and 14 excepted all judging is based on external rather than internal inspections. The judges will be briefed to pay attention to the following when assessing each judging category:

A) VILLAGE FACILITIES

1. Noticeboards. Is the board being used to provide up-to-date information. Are there contact names for the parish council, and relevant village organisations. Is a list of parish councillors provided.

2. **Playing Field & Children's Playground.** Maintenance of field (grass cutting). associated buildings and playground equipment/surrounds. Is there effective control of litter and dog fouling.
3. **Village Hall.** The maintenance of the exterior and surrounds, also is there a notice of how to book the hall.
4. **Church/chapels and Cemeteries.** Sometimes certain areas of a churchyard are left to grow wild as part of a conservation policy. Is this clearly notified.
5. **War Memorial.** Is it tidy with the memorial inscriptions clearly legible.
6. **Village Greens and Commons.** Are they being maintained and kept tidy.
7. **Shops.** Many village shops carry posters for village events and meetings. This is fine, but the judges will check that the displays are up-to-date.
8. **Public Houses.** Common faults are abandoned beer crates and broken garden furniture.
9. **School.** Judges do not go into school premises - their main concern is the upkeep of perimeter fencing/hedges etc.
10. **Telephone Kiosks.** If a kiosk is out of order has a notice to this effect been placed in the window.
11. **Bus Shelters.** Are they clean and tidy and in good repair.
12. **Village Seats and Benches.** Are they serviceable.
13. **Public Car Parks.** Are they satisfactorily maintained; with any parking, entrance/exit restrictions clearly notified. Please note this category applies only to public car parks - car parks for pubs, village halls, schools etc. are not applicable.
14. **Public Conveniences.** Are they clean and serviceable. Do the taps work if there are basins.

B) GENERAL APPEARANCE

15. **Litter Control & provision of Litter Bins.** Is there an evident litter problem. Is the provision of litter bins adequate and are they emptied regularly.
16. **Streams and Ponds.** Has the pond or stream been cleaned recently, or is it serving as an unofficial rubbish dump !
17. **Footpaths and Verges.** Overall impression rather than detailed inspection.
18. **Commercial Premises.** Are they tidy - but particularly in the case of garages, workshops etc. the judges will remember they are looking at a working environment.

KITCHEN CORNER: SIMNEL CAKE.

Traditionally this was made for Mothering Sunday, but now it is often eaten for Easter instead. It is always beautifully moist, and keeps well too.

For the almond pastes	For the cake:
7oz ground almonds 6	6oz margarine
10 oz caster sugar	6oz caster sugar
1 egg	3 eggs
¼ teasp almond essence	8oz flour, pinch of salt
lemon juice to mix	1 level teasp mixed spice
	12oz currants
	2oz sultanas
	2oz raisins
	4oz mixed peel
	1 tablesp milk

Rub ground almonds and sugar together, add essence to beaten egg, stir into mixture with enough lemon juice to make a soft consistency. Knead smooth and roll out 1/3 of mixture to a round to fit 7" tin. Put aside. Line the tin with 2 layers of greaseproof paper. Cream fat and sugar, beat in eggs, add dry ingredients and milk to make a dropping consistency. Smooth half mixture into the tin, cover with the round of almond paste, add rest of cake mixture and hollow slightly. Bake 2½ hours very moderate oven - 325F. When cold, brush with warm jam and cover with rest of paste, decorating with ale balls of the paste (12 for the disciples is traditional). If preferred, the paste can be cooked. In this case, remove cake from the oven after 2 hours. Cool slightly, then brush round the rim with warmed jam. Make remaining paste into a roll and place round the top rim of the cake to make a border. Cut a piece of brown paper to fit inside the almond ring, and put it in place. Return cake to oven for half an hour till paste is slightly browned. When cake is almost cold, remove brown paper, brush with warm jam and fill centre with glacé icing. Remove from tin when quite cold and set. *Jill Frostick*

I am always fascinated to know about the past. At the Film Archive evening (so popular and well supported) we were able to see before us a world that had vanished as we were shown horses pulling farm machinery and labourers carrying sacks of corn upon their backs. The sight of such things brings strong impressions to the mind and helps us enter that previous age with its different pace of life and its different expectations.

Easter and Holy week, which occupy the most important place in the church's year, are about events that took place 2,000 years ago. Yet that story has been deeply thought about ever since by each succeeding generation of Christians. It has puzzled and challenged the greatest minds, who have wondered why Jesus should have been put through such a horrifying ordeal; and what this shows us about the nature of God and the world he has created. They came to realise that it was because Jesus as so totally pure and holy that he was treated in that way. Moreover, it was God's way of drawing people to himself, people who are flawed and sinful. Christians have found that, when they thought and meditated upon the events that led up to Jesus' crucifixion and then his resurrection, they experienced a death and resurrection in their spiritual lives and were filled with what is described as the power of Christ.

At the Last Supper Jesus told his disciples to "do this in remembrance of me". Holy week is, therefore, a remembering of what happened to Jesus yet also far more. It offers to us a way of entering and reliving the origins of the Christian faith, a way of bringing ourselves to God that we may experience at first hand the joy and renewal and peace of Christ. A Happy Easter to you all. *Fr. Trevor*

Speed reduction and road markings outside the school were discussed in detail along with the feasibility of a footpath between the 'Black Boy' public house and 'Elm Cottage', Harwich Road. Mr Goodwin stated that speed reducing measures will be taken at Hare Green. Mrs Elvin reported that Tendring District Council are endeavouring to find a suitable site in the Tendring District to locate a gypsy site. All Essex County Council owned land is being looked at. Mr Rowe reported that there has been some vandalism at the Village Hall. Guttering and downpipes have been broken.

A site visit between the Parish Council and the Colchester Development Company is to be arranged shortly with the aim of resolving the boundary line dispute. The next meeting of the Parish Council is on 6th April.

THE HALL'S FURNITURE AND FITTINGS, 1763 (1)

The Catholic family of Mannock were at Giffords Hall, Stoke-by-Nayland, from 1428 until 1889. In Henry VIII's reign the Mannocks bought Martell's Hall, Ardleigh. The manor of Great Bromley Hall was bought by a Sir Thomas Mannock in the eighteenth century. There exists a paper booklet which is "An Inventory of the China and The House Hold furniture that was Removed from Bromly Hall to Giffords hall In The Year 1763". This list was made as directed by Sir William Mannock, Bt., in his will dated 1 January, 1762. Sir William directed that "the housekeeping shall be carried on and the servants continued as usual at Bromley Hall aforesaid at the expense of my estate for six calendar months after my decease, and in the meantime an inventory be taken of all household goods, furniture, plate and printed books. Such to be enjoyed as heirlooms. My widow to have their use for her life-time along with Bromley Hall". What was in that list? *To be continued... John Appleby*

KITCHEN CORNER

I came across a recipe in Jane Grigson's collection which I think would be a splendid dish for Easter Sunday with the family and would certainly amuse the younger members.

The Hen on her Nest - Serves 6

3-4lb roasting chicken, pinch of mace, 1 teasp. ground ginger, 6 sprigs parsley, pinch thyme, 1oz butter, ¾ pint chicken or giblet stock, 6-12 eggs

Sauce: 2oz butter, 2 tablesp flour, cooking liquor from chicken, ¼ pint double cream, seasoning.

Nest: 3 lb boiled potatoes **or** 1 lb. cooked rice, 12 sprigs parsley

Put bird in deep ovenproof pot with herbs and spices. Cover with buttered paper. Add stock, bring to boil. then bake in oven for 50 mins, 180 - 190C (350 -375 F). When nearly cooked,

remove lid, butter breast and legs and return to oven to brown. raising heat slightly for 10 mins. Meanwhile hard-boil and carefully shell the eggs. Prepare nest making a ring on serving dish of either buttered rice or mashed and creamed potato. Keep warm.

For sauce, strain liquor into measuring jug. There should be about $\frac{3}{4}$ pint. Make a roux with butter and flour, add stock, stir till smooth and simmer 5-10 mins. Add cream and seasoning. Pour into sauce boat.

To serve, place the chicken in the centre of its nest, and arrange the eggs round it. Decorate with sprigs of parsley and spoon a little of the sauce over the eggs.

The Bromley Messenger May 1995

This month sees an important celebration namely that of V.E. Day which will be followed by V.J. Day later in the year. These anniversaries of the cessation of hostilities 50 years ago are to be marked throughout the county in many different ways. The church service we shall use will be modelled on the one used at St Paul's Cathedral in London. When the subject of VE-VJ Day has come up people have voiced a variety of feelings. Some have spoken of the need to put the past to rest and believe that it is no longer appropriate to remember and recall what happened 50 years ago. Others feel strongly that we ought to express our thanks to those of our forebears who gave up so much that we can now enjoy relative peace. The emancipation of Europe was a very significant moment in history and we need to remind ourselves of that fact. Still others are not happy in case there is to be too much triumphalism about the celebrations or the wrong sort of national pride.

The national organisers and distributors of publicity have been careful and sensitive to present this event in the most positive way. The posters which you may now have seen show a serviceman returning home and being met by his family to make plain that foremost in our minds is to be that sense of relief that warfare had ceased and freedom and peace had begun. Toch H have called upon people on V.E. Day to observe a vigil of peace and have put together a series of readings from prominent statesmen and other well known figures that can be used. Peace in biblical and theological terms is a sense of wellbeing, wholeness, health and safety. St. Thomas Aquinas describes peace as an "order of community life based on justice." This order is not pre-ordained it has to be brought about anew. Such a definition reminds us that peace and reconciliation does not just happen. It needs to be strived for and worked for among those who realize its importance - none I daresay more so than those who were exposed to the horrors of war and were prepared to fight because they believed they were fighting to protect freedom. V.E. Day is therefore not just for a few enthusiasts and old soldiers but for everyone. As a senior statesman has written - "Our commemorations to mark the 50th Anniversary of the end of the war will give the nation an opportunity to remember the actions and the sacrifices of those who won the war. Young people are the principal beneficiaries; it was for their future that people fought, it is their future that is being built now." *Fr Trevor*

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on Thursday 16 March followed by the annual parish assembly. The village hall committee have written to the Parish Council requesting financial assistance with their planned renovation work. The Parish Council have agreed in principle to assist although they requested more time to discuss the plan in detail.

"Stanfords" have been employed to act as agents for the Parish Council to resolve the boundary dispute at "Innisfree". Mrs Elvin reported that in 1989 approval was given for 4 bungalows on the "Innisfree" site, the developer however is now trying to upgrade the properties. The latest application for a 4 bedroomed detached house and garage has been refused.

Public attendance at the annual parish assembly was very disappointing. Mrs Elvin gave her report and gave a resume of the achievements during her term of office as a District Councillor. The mass of blatant property development is now more carefully monitored although the parish councils should remain watchful. There are committees in Tendring District Council to provide funds for the elderly and she urged the Parish Council to make use of them. The Tendring Carers organisation are used extensively in the towns but their services are not well used or advertised in the villages. Mrs Elvin stated that the Rural Development Commissio may be able to assist with the village hall improvements.

Mr Rowe said that the village hall continues to be well used, Rising costs have unfortunately forced the committee to pass on minor increases to the users. Security is an ongoing problem. The Village Hall Committee have recently been quoted £7,500 for the installation of an infrared burglar alarm system. The Parish Council thanked the Village Hall Committee for their efforts during the last year.

Mr Christodoulides reported that the financial position of the 'Bromley Messenger' is encouraging. The accounts will be published next month. The quality of the magazine is very good thanks to Leonie Henderson and he extended thanks also to Mrs Fairley and her team for the distribution of the magazine. The next Council Meeting will be held on 11th May.

A VERY BIG THANK YOU to all who supported the coffee morning at Ilex Farm. We are most grateful to all those who donated plants, cakes and sundries and to all that helped. We hope everyone enjoyed the morning as much as we did. We made a grand total of £267.50.

LITTLE BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on 28th March, 1995. The Chairman welcomed Mr B Goodwin from the Essex County Council Highways Department who was invited to attend to discuss problems within the village. Traffic calming through the village is of particular concern. Mr Goodwin said that it will be difficult to reduce speed as the village is so spread out but if the Parish Council could identify the "village envelope" then he would endeavour to set a limit within that area. The larger the area, however, the less impact traffic calming measures have. The Parish Council agreed to report back to Mr Goodwin.

The request for a footpath along Shop Road was discussed. Mr Goodwin agreed to look into the feasibility of this if supported by the Parishioners. Mr Goodwin agreed to have the white lines and "Slow" markings reinstated in Shop Road and the chevron sign and reflector posts on the school house corner will be replaced. Flooding problems in Barlon Road, Paynes Lane and Spratts Lane were brought to his attention.

The Parish Council asked if a rail or bollards could be erected near the telephone box to prevent cars being parked on the path opposite the shop. Mr Goodwin agreed to look into the feasibility of this request. The Chairman reported that there has been little progress in obtaining a plot of land for use as a playing field.

The Parish Council have objected strongly to Tendring District Council regarding the 10 year plan which does not allow for any development in the village until the year 2002. The unsafe tree leaning over the road near "Hiskeys Farm" has been reported to Tendring District Council. The Chairman reported that Mr J Osborne will not be standing for re- election on the Parish Council and he thanked him for his efforts and dedication for his 30 years' service to the community.

KITCHEN CORNER

Warmer weather makes us turn to lighter ideas in the pudding line. My family like rhubarb, especially when it is young and tender. I make fools and ice creams as well as crumbles and tarts. Lemons are refreshing too. Here is a recipe for Lemon Snow.

LEMON SNOW

½ pt cold water, 4 oz caster sugar, ½ oz gelatine, 2 lemons (rind and juice), 3 egg whites.
Put the water in a pan, sprinkle on the gelatine. Leave to soak 5 minutes then add grated rinds and sugar and stir over low heat till dissolved. Strain into mixing bowl and leave till cold. Add lemon juice and unbeaten egg whites. and whisk until thick and white. This may take 10 minutes. It will get thick as it sets. The more whisking the better the final result. When really thick, white and stiff. pour into serving dish and chill till set firm. Serve with cream.

TODAY is TOMORROWS HISTORY

In April I asked for memories and thoughts from old and new Bromleians about living in Great or Little Bromley. Here is the first and I do thank Jean Harding for starting the ball rolling with such interesting memories of her life in the village in the not so distant past. Please everybody do put pen to paper and send in more memories & thoughts. It is going to be a fascinating series. *Editor.*

"47 years ago I came to this village determined to live in the country, though born in urban surroundings. I suspect I was a bit brash. My husband had come to work in what was then a rural practice of auctioneers and agricultural valuers, of which in due course he became senior partner. What we wanted was country life, space and freedom for growth for our as yet unborn children.

Great Bromley is not like many a village which has a street and a shop or two clustered round the church and the manor house, where one might walk and meet one's neighbours. I was quite contented with the isolation. I was perfectly happy with my "country life". I went down to my nearest neighbour in a cottage nearby to ask how to light the copper to wash the clothes and heat the bathwater. Of course we only had a hand pump to our well and the bath was a tin one in front of a cheerful old kitchen range. Another more endowed neighbour invited us to a weekly bath in more civilized surroundings, for which we were very grateful, but we were quite happy with our primitive lot. The loo was a short bicycle ride down the garden as it was described by an American writer friend of mine who came to stay, following it up with a witty article on "Life in rural Essex". John the fish, the butcher, the baker, and yes even the candlestick maker called regularly, the latter with the tin cans clattering on the side of the van, and with the vital supply of paraffin to keep us warm; no central heating in those days! I remember trundling a pram load of children over the road to Morants where they actually had a T.V. set, to watch the coronation of our queen. But it wasn't until my children started at the

Village School under Miss Merchant that I began to realize that the wonderful advantages we . enjoyed deserved a reciprocation. And so quietly, almost insidiously, I began to be "involved" and to realize how very special and precious is this country village life where at least one knows the neighbours, if any, and where one begins to realize the responsibility as well as the privilege, where "good breeding" matters little, but where continuity, now less strong but nevertheless very important, in the history of a family or village, be it cottage, farm or manor, does matter."

KITCHEN CORNER

When the hot weather starts, we all look for cooling drinks. So here are a few ideas to try.

Elderflower Cordial:- Quantity to fill 2 large bottles

3lbs sugar, 3 pts boiling water, 4 oranges & lemons (any mixture) roughly cut up, 24 elderflower heads (shake off any insects), 1 oz tartaric or citric acid (from chemist or wine making suppliers). Put all into a large bowl, stir gently till sugar is dissolved then cover and leave 24 hours. Strain off into bottles, and dilute to taste. Keeps well in refridgerator 3-4 weeks.

Verandah Punch

2 oranges, ½ pt freshly made hot tea, 3 lemons, 1 pt soda water, ½pt sugar syrup, 1 pt ginger ale, Ice cubes

Mix the squeezed fruit juices with the syrup. Add the tea and let cool. Strain into a jug. Just before serving add soda water, ginger ale and some ice cubes.

Grapefruit Fizz

2pts ginger ale, 1 pt grapefruit juice, Add grushed ice before serving.

Milk Shakes for the Children

1pt chilled milk, add:

- 1) 1 good tablesp jam & 1 scoop icecream
OR
- 2) 2 sliced bananas
OR
- 3) 2 tablesp instant whip

Mix in blender and serve in tall glasses with a straw.

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on 20th April, 1995.

The Inquiry for the proposed Gypsy site at Elmstead Market was discussed in some detail. Mrs Elvin stated that there is an urgent need for a permanent site in the District and she added that uncontrolled sites in villages are very problematic. She said that there is a desperate need for a controlled site. Major Heaney (Gypsy Action Committee) stated that if the proposed site is not approved then there will be no permanent site in the Tendring Area which will force gypsies onto public ownership land. Mrs Elvin represented the Parish Council at the Inquiry hearing where a written and verbal representation was made on behalf of the Parish Council.

Detailed proposals submitted by Essex County Council Highways Department for speed reduction at Hare Green, road markings outside the school and improved visibility in Frating Road were all agreed by the Parish Council. A letter of approval will be sent to the Highways Department.

The first meeting of the newly elected Parish Council was held on 11th, May, 1995.

Thanks were extended to Mr Henry Fairley, retiring Chairman, for his dedication and hard work carried out during his term of office. At the meeting Mr George Kempster was elected as Chairman and Mr Len Christodoulides was appointed Vice-Chairman. Mrs Susan Rampling will be the Parish Council representative at the Tendring District Association of Local Councils.

Mrs Angela Prior will continue as the Footpath/Rights of Way Officer. Mr Nigel Rowe, the newly elected District Councillor, was welcomed to the meeting. Mr Rowe said that he officially 'takes office' on 16th May, 1995. He added that he would endeavour to attend as many Parish Council meetings as possible. One issue which he said he would like to address will be the re-alignment of the footpath system whereby footpaths could be re-routed to follow field boundaries. Mr Rowe said that he would continue to report to the Parish Council as the Village Hall Representative.



VE DAY on Sunday, 7th May at 3.00pm

It was a sunny afternoon and over 100 villagers turned up at St George's Church to commemorate the Peace of 50 years. The bells rang as prayers were said at the War Memorial. During the service in the Church various representatives from village organisations read passages for the Litany of "Thanks", and "Reconciliation and Hope" culminating in a rousing rendering of Jerusalem lead by the Choir. The service was followed by a sing-a-long of old 40's favourites including Vera Lynn's "We'll Meet Again". On display at the side of the church were various articles of memorabilia, supplied by villagers which included ration books and an apron worn by a Lyons Corner House waitress. Tea and home made cakes were then provided to the strains of Glen Miller. The Parish Council thanks everybody for making this an unforgettable afternoon especially the Bell Ringers, the Choir, the cake makers and Father Trevor and James Wild for organising it. *Len Christodoulides*

RADAR IN WORLD WAR II

The single tower beside Hilliards Road is a reminder of the vital role that RADAR played in World War II. The RAF Great Bromley Radar Station was one of 21 Chain Home (CH) which ran the length of Britain from Sussex to the Orkneys. Following the "Daventry Experiment" in 1935 which showed that detection of aircraft by reflecting radio signals was practical, secret research was carried out at Bawdsey in Suffolk, resulting in the construction of the 'chain' which covered the entire East coast. Together with Canewdon in SE Essex, Dunkirk & Dover in Kent, early equipment tracked Chamberlain's flights to Munich in 1938, which resulted in the 'appeasement' of Hitler, and delayed the start of the war to September 1939.

Originally these were 4 steel transmitting towers 360ft high and 4 wooden ones for the receivers 240ft high, inside a compound of angle iron fencing, some of which still exists. as does the gate house. The equipment was housed in massive block-houses with thick concrete roofs, each surrounded by earth barriers to deflect bomb-blast. Again some of these can still be seen from the road.

The crucial lead which was never matched by the Germans was the direct land-lines from the Radar stations to 'Fitter Rooms'. Here the information on range, bearing, altitude and rough number of approaching aircraft measured by teams of Women's Auxiliary Airforce (WAAF) at each Radar Station were analysed and compared. Check readings could be called for before Fighter Control was advised of the enemy - all within minutes of the first detection.

The meagre resources of Spitfires and Hurricanes could then be husbanded, with scrambling left until interception was assured, leaving as much fuel for combat as possible, rather than wasting it 'stoozing around'. Without Radar, it is doubtful if the Battle of Britain could have been won. Radar is just one of many facets of World War II in a new book 'Under the Flight Path' based on diaries written throughout the conflict in SE Essex by Miss Zillah Harris. She lived near Southend and logged the air-raid warnings, bomb damage, and aircraft crashes in the area. She herself took part in Air Raid Precaution (ARP) work, was a billeting officer, and took two evacuees herself, she worked for the Women's Voluntary Services (WVS), Citizen's Advice Bureau (CAB) and at the local hospital. She was also Salvage Officer for her village, going round collecting almost anything to recycle. Apart from the background of diary extracts, there are details of aircraft crashes, parachute bombs and a famous parachutist, evacuation of the school children of Rochford to the Forest of Dean, the WVS, the WLA and the Home Guard, V1's and V2's. While SE Essex was 'Under the Flight Path' of German bombers (V1's) travelling up the Thames to London, in NE Essex many remember the opposite stream of our bombers passing overhead from air bases further north on their way to Germany.

ST. MARY'S CHURCH, LITTLE BROMLEY

On the afternoon of Wednesday, 7th June, the full board of Trustees, and certain members of staff (about 15 in all and including The Rt. Hon. Peter Brooke M.P., The Bishop of Beverley and the Dean of Carlisle) visited Little Bromley on a tour of churches in North East Essex and Suffolk on behalf of the Churches Conservation Trust. The architect gave a short talk on the condition of the church. It was generally considered to be in good condition, with only minor repointing needed. Just before the visit, the Archbishop Laud window had been repaired, and grilles refitted on all the stained glass windows.

Points raised were:

1. That the windows should be put back in the old porch.
2. The cost of renewing the outside light was probably too expensive as all the cable had been broken in the restoration.
3. The coat of arms should be hung and displayed in the church. The Trustees generally said what a delightful small church it was, & that they hoped it would continue to be used; we thanked them for their help. *Bill Walker*

The Rector comments

Sometimes people get confused about the status and function of St Mary's, Little Bromley. Some years ago it passed into the hands of the Churches Conservation Trust, a body that deals with churches that are redundant and have ceased to be centres of Parochial worship because there is no viable congregation to make this a sensible proposition. (St George's is now the Parish church of the Bromleys) However this does not mean that the church is not being used or does not have a role in the sentiments of the village. It is hoped that the people of Little Bromley will continue to visit the church from time to time and feel that they want to express their affection for it by caring for it and its surrounding churchyard. At the the moment there is a clear need for the churchyard to be cared for by the locals. Bill Walker and George Kent will be happy to receive donations to "Little Bromley Churchyard Fund" that will be used to cut the grass and keep the churchyard tidy or, alternatively, to know of those who are able to help with its upkeep. A clear expression that the people of Little Bromley wish to care for and continue to use and value their church as a sacred site.

LITTLE BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on Thursday, 20th July. A map of the village annotated with the Parish Council's preferred location for speed limit signs and footpath through the village has been forwarded to the Essex County Council Highways Department for approval. On a separate map the Parish Council's preferred locations for the siting of the Neighbourhood Watch signs has also been forwarded for approval. The Chairman reported that the Parish Council's objection to the Tendring District Council's 10-Year Plan, which prohibits infill development in the village, has been overruled. Grass cutting at the churchyard was discussed. The Parish Council will continue to give a donation towards the cost of the grass cutting but feels that more than three cuts per year is required.

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

Besides the china there was also glass and stone ware in the Mannock household at Great Bromley Hall in 1763. The Inventory reads:- "GLASS 3 glass salvers, 3 middel desert glass's (and) one with a lead (lid) to it, 19 handle sullibub ditto, 42 handle ditto, 12 jelly glass's, 1 Scottiss shell sweet meat glass, 5 small scollip ditto. 5 other sweat meat ditto, 4 odd jelly glass's, 6 tart patty pans, 2 wass (?glass) lamps. STONE 6 white cheesecake patty pans. 2 brown poting pots, 1 sullibub cow, 5 ston(e) fruit dishes."

KITCHEN CORNER

PICKLED PEARS are a delicious accompaniment to cold meats or boiled ham etc. If you use small pears they can be left whole after peeling. Otherwise core and quarter them.
4 lbs pears, 1 lb demerara sugar, 1 pint malt vinegar, some pared lemon rind, 2 teasp whole cloves, 2 teasp whole allspice, 3 x 1 inch pieces stick cinnamon, 1 piece root ginger, bruised. Lightly crush spices and tie in a muslin bag. Put this, and the rind, with sugar and vinegar in a pan and bring to the boil. Add prepared fruit, and simmer till soft but not broken. (They should appear translucent). Have warm dry jars ready, and lift the pear pieces with a perforated spoon and pack into the jars. Meanwhile, remove spice bag and boil syrup hard to reduce by half and to a thin honey consistency. Fill the jars with the hot syrup and screw on lids. (or cover with waxed cloths when cold). This quantity fills about 3 x 4oz coffee jars. *Jill Frostick*

The Bromley Messenger October 1995

HARVEST TIME has a tremendous appeal these days especially in rural areas. The in-gathering of the crops and produce worked for all year is a time of supreme satisfaction and pleasure. At the deepest level it speaks to us of the urgent need to provide the means of life as sustenance for the family and the wider community. We can easily sense the relief of seeing those crops finally and safely brought in, safe at last from the caprice of weather or pestilence. Although the Old Testament prescribes a feast to celebrate the first fruits of the harvest which it called Pentecost and another to celebrate the use of the threshing floor and winepress, the Christian church does not seem to have celebrated Harvest Thanksgiving until recent times. This was because the church was nervous that there was so much folk lore and primitive superstitions associated with it. The Kern Doll was one such example. This was a small model made from the last sheaf of corn. Folk were nervous about cutting this last standing corn because by so doing they believed they were killing the spirit of the fields. Therefore they all threw their sickles in and made it a joint effort. The Kern Doll was carried aloft into the largest barn to preside over a supper given by the farmer to thank all his workers. Under the guardianship of the Kern Doll or Kern Baby or Harvest Queen all social distinctions disappeared. While the feast of Lammas "loaf mass" (1st August) was observed in England from Saxon times it had fallen into disuse. In 1843 Rev. R.S. Hawker revived the Lammas custom and pulled together the Harvest supper, the decoration of the home with produce and the clear theme of thanksgiving into what we now recognise as Harvest Thanksgiving. Apart from the odd collect added to the Book of Common Prayer the theme of Harvest Thanksgiving is entirely missing. Today, however, in the church calendar we are well provided with readings and services dating especially from the Victorian period. Harvest is a joyous time especially apt in this era of computers and electronics when we need to be reminded of the miracle of growth and life in the world around us that we may find time to thank our creator. *Fr. Trevor*

YOU CAN BE FOOLED BY A SIGN

The sign of the Black Boy seems to have been used in Great Bromley from about 1786 as the Chelmsford Chronicle newspaper for 3rd March, 1786, advertises that a sale of property and goods is to take place there. The Black Boy seems to have been a tobacconist's sign at first and Ben Johnson (1573-1637). in "Bartholomew Fair" writes:- "I thought he would have run mad o' the Black Boy in Bucklersbury, that takes the scurby rogyu tobacco there" (Act 1, Scene 1). Variants of the sign in other parts of the country were - The Black Girl, Two Black Boys. The Black Boy and Comb (at a perfumier's shop in London), and The Black Boy and Camel (in Leadenhall Street, London). Mr John Bateman, J.P., of The Lodge, Great Bromley did have black servants in his employ there in the 1870's but that is a century after the Sale. *John Appleby*

KITCHEN CORNER

A tasty way to use ripe bananas! **CARAMEL BANANA TORTE**

Cake:- 6oz SR flour; ¼ teasp baking powder; 2oz butter/marg; ¼ teasp bicarbonate of soda
5oz castor sugar; 6oz ripe bananas; ½ teasp fresh ground nutmeg; 3 tablesp milk; 1 egg (beaten).
Sift flour, baking powder and bicarbonate of soda, rub in butter, add sugar. Mash bananas, beat in egg, milk and nutmeg. Stir this into dry ingredients

Grease 8" round tin and line the bottom. Put in mixture, bake 180C for 40 minutes. Cool in tin for 5 minutes then turn onto wire rack.

Filling:- 6oz full fat soft cheese . 1 tablesp lemon juice; 2 tablesp icing sugar

Beat well together. Add more sugar if needed. Halve the mixture. To one half add chopped banana. Slice cake in half and use to fill and sandwich together Use other half of filling to coat the sides of the cake and press on toasted almonds. (You can keep a little for decorating the top if liked)

Caramel Topping:- 3oz sugar

Put in a small pan over moderate heat. Shake but do not stir, allow to liquify then colour to golden brown. WATCH IT! Pour at once on to cake and spread quickly. Mark before it sets too hard as this makes serving easier.

Four workshops were arranged to further help family members, after which we repaired to Seven Rivers for tea, and groups were shown round the Home and met HD residents. A short Evensong led by Father Trevor was well attended and a tranquil ending to an exceptional day. Very many thanks to all who helped and to the Guides and kind friends who provided a play day for the young children of our families.



A meeting of the Parish Council was held on 14th September, 1995. The Hare Green Recreation Ground was discussed in some detail and a sub-committee of the Parish Council was created to appoint a new management committee. The Parish Council's complaints to the Tendring District Council regarding the sewage odours in Brook Street have had little effect. A second letter of complaint will be sent to the Environmental Health Department. Councillor Rowe reported that Tendring District Council have commenced legal proceedings against Anglian Water to resolve the problem. The Parish Council feel that the open space land at Spring Hill Close should be tidied and properly managed. Enquiries are being made to find out who owns the land. Two members of the public attended the meeting to object to the planning application for changes at the Crossways Garage in Frating Road. The Parish Council were made aware of the problems caused to the local residents by noise and disturbance during the day, night and at weekends and also of the smell of paint spraying. The Parish Council agreed to send a letter of objection.

One of the most difficult and uncomfortable subjects to raise is that of money. Yet looking back at past magazines it has surfaced from time to time in The Bromleys from necessity. In 1982 for example was the rather grim notice which read "St. George's in debt by the end of 1982 that debt is expected to be £2,500, the reason is that your donations have not kept pace with rising costs in recent years".

I am pleased to say that the Parish of The Bromleys is not actually in debt, although it is not able to meet the current payments to the diocese which enable the Diocese to maintain a live spiritual presence in the villages. Some people it must be said are generous in their giving while those unable to give financially may give generously of their time. In order to try and meet our payments we have had a number of successful events that have raised money for the church and as an important consequence have, we hope, enriched the life of the village. I am grateful to all the different people who have been involved and to the small committees that plan and organise. As I look at the current assessment for the parish of the Bromleys (some £10,000 per year) it would seem that fund-raising will continue to be an important aspect of the work of the parish if it is to remain a live concern. I also hope that what is done will continue to enrich the life of the villages and bring people together. At a recent coffee morning at Little Bromley I was delighted to speak to some parishioners that I had not met before.

May I take this opportunity, in an age based increasingly on finance and on "supply and demand", to bring to your attention the financial needs of the parish church and ask you to consider whether you personally might be able to support it financially. (If you already do perhaps you would be able to increase your donation). By so doing you will be contributing to that pastoral pattern of priest and village in English rural life that has been in place for centuries and of which our line church buildings are so powerful a symbol. I conclude with words written by Hugh Picton, Rector in 1982 "It is vital that we all review what we contribute to our church for its mission and maintenance. Money is given us by God not only for our use but also for his".

KITCHEN CORNER

Variations on a theme:- here are some different ways to treat an old favourite.

BASIC SHORTBREAD

10oz/325g plain flour + pinch salt

2oz/50g ground rice

4oz/125g caster sugar

8oz/250g butter

Cream butter and sugar, work in flours to smooth dough. Either press into greased tins or roll out into rounds and put on a greased tray. Prick well with a fork. Bake moderate oven 350F 20-30 minutes according to size. Mark with back of knife while still warm in portions or squares. This makes it easier to cut when cold.

COCONUT SHORTBREAD BISCUITS

4oz flour 2oz coconut 4oz butter 2oz ground rice 2oz caster sugar 9'5

Roll very thin and bake on greased trays.

WHOLEMEAL SHORTBREAD

6oz wholemeal flour 3oz butter 3oz caster sugar Yolk of one egg

GINGER SHORTBREAD

5oz flour 1oz ground rice 2 teasp ground ginger 2oz caster sugar 4oz butter 1oz crystallised ginger

Add $\frac{3}{4}$ of chopped ginger to the mixture, use remainder to decorate top. *Jill Frostick*

LITTLE BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on Thursday, 28th September. Mr Kent reported that grass cutting of the Little Bromley Churchyard was discussed at a recent meeting of the Parochial Church Council. The grass will continue to be cut three times per year only. The Parish Council have now requested assistance from the Essex County Council Public Rights of Way Officer to get the local landowners to improve the condition of the footpaths in the village. It was reported that the War Memorial is cracked. The Parish Council will investigate the problem and consult a Stonemason if necessary. Because of the difficulty in cutting the grass surrounding the memorial, the feasibility of replacing this with paving was discussed. Quotations for this work will be requested. The Parish Council books have now been audited.

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on 12th October. The Parish Council have been requested to investigate the problem of the annual winter flooding of land near Carrington Road and Briar Road. Following a site visit by members of the Council it was felt that the cause is the poor condition of the culvert opposite Hazells Farm. This is preventing water flow through the ditches in Carrington Road. The landowner will therefore be requested to take remedial action. The Clerk confirmed that Guardian Royal owns the open space land at Spring Hill Close. The Company will now be contacted to see if they would consider allowing the Parish Council to take control of this area and manage it as a conservation area. The Tree Warden has requested 80 trees from Tendring District Council for planting in Mary Lane North. Councillor Rowe gave his report. The Gypsy Committee in Tendring District Council have been reformed. They are currently looking for small sites in the district to locate a maximum of 5 caravans at each location. A site visit is to be held by the District Council to the Crossways Garage prior to consideration by the Planning Committee of the recent planning application. The Parish Council have already forwarded a letter of objection to this application.



FOR SALE FOR THE GOOD OF THE PARISH

Among national documents is one which gives details of goods owned and sold by 1548 by churchwardens in Essex. Here is the detail for Great Bromley. The spelling has not been modernised. Explanations are given in brackets in italics. "Myche Bromley. The churchwardens there doo presente and saye That John muntc and John Littleburye parryshenours there dyd sell a Crosse of sylver, a senser (*incense burning vessel*) and a Chalyce of sylver for the somme of xxli (£20) whereof there ys speente and ayede oute for the amendige (*repair*) of highwayes viijli, (£8). Amd the resydue remayneth in the churche boxe for the relief of the poore people of the same parrryshe. And of the parrryshe hath gyven to poore people of the same parrryshe xxxti yardes of lynnyn cloothe which hanged before the Tabernacles (*canopied niche for storing items*) of the same churche".

Other parishes in the present Harwich Deanery which are also included in the returns are - Dovercourt, Elmstead, Harwich, Lawford, Manningtree, Mistley, Great Oakley, Ramsey and Wix. There is not a return for Little Bromley. Ardleigh has a return. *John Appleby*
