

The Bromley Messenger January 1996

I was pleased to learn in mid-November that the scheme to amalgamate the Parish of Ardleigh with "The Bromleys" has now been officially approved and is a legal reality. When I arrived just over $1\frac{1}{2}$ years ago it was know that this was the way that the two parishes would operate but there was naturally concern about what this would mean for the parishes in practical terms. I have tried my best to create a working together of the parishes that fosters co-operation yet preserves local identity. So we have a pattern of services that allows a core of the faithful to gather together in each of the village parish churches and to meet in one place or location for a special occasion - like rogationtide for example. Not a few people have told me that it is all working out well and the effects of each parish sharing a parish priest have been minimised. I am enjoying the experience of rural ministry, which is known to be especially challenging in the present day. It has been a great privilege, too. Despite the problems of finance and the shortage of priests I still believe the church has such a vital role to play in the fabric of village life that I hope and pray that such a ministry will continue to be maintained in most places. The beginning of a year can be a time of assessment - we look both backward to the previous year and toward the future. Last year we had hoped that it would be possible to redecorate our church porch and to put on a number of events both secular and sacred that would add to the vitality of the village. I think we have achieved those aims. This year I hope that we can continue in the vein and also redouble our efforts to raise more money for our church building repairs and for our work as part of the wider church in this diocese. Even more importantly I hope to get to know more of you in the village and support those in particular need more effectively through the shared ministry of priest and people. Fr. Trevor

LITTLE BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on Thursday, 23rd November, 1995. Little action has been taken to date by the District Council over the car breaking which is continuing in the village. The Parish Council will send a further letter of complaint. Authorisation has now been received from the Essex County Council Highways Department to position neighbourhood watch signs in the village. Mr Rowe reported that the traffic calming measures for the village have been budgeted for 1996-97 financial year. The Parish Council will forward a planning application to Tendring District Council for the use of land in Ardleigh Road as a playing field with future plans to build a village hall. The offer of this land has been made by Mr P Herring. The Parish Council have given a donation of £120 to the PCC. towards the grass cutting expenses for the churchyard.

TIPTREE BOOK COMPANY

PLANNING APPLICATION TEN/95/1166

An action group "PROTECTION" has been formed to oppose this application in Great Bromley (Protest by Residents Over Tendring's Environmentally Catastrophic Treatment In Our Neighbourhood). Frating, Little Bromley and Great Bromley are against this type of Industrial Development, being so big and so high. Balloons have been flown on the site to give T.D.C. councillors an idea of just how high it would be, and what impact it would have on the surrounds. T.D.C. will have discussed this application on 19th December but the D of B will step in if T.D.C. approve on the grounds that the acceptance of the application by T.D.C. is illegal. If you require further information contact me or the Steering Committee leader, Dale Robinson (01206 250731). It is NOT too late to write and object to the Planning Officer of T.D.C. which I urge you to do before we lose another part of our village. *Len Christodoulides*

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on 16th November, 1995. Following complaints from both the Parish and District Councils, Anglian Water have stated that they will install an odour control system at the sewage works in Brook Street. The Parish Council will review this problem again in the Spring.

Scanfreight UK have applied to change their Goods Vehicle Operators Licence to keep 8 vehicles and 2 trailers at their centre in Frating Road. A letter of objection will be sent to the Licensing Authority. The Parish Council have objected to the Broadway Malyan (Tiptree Books) planning application. A letter of support will be sent to Mr D Robinson who is leading the campaign against this application.

The Parish Council have agreed to provide carpeting for the new committee room at the village Hall.

Kathy Hayward stated that a preservation order has been obtained for one horse chestnut and two oak trees near P.C. Cottages. A licence has now been received to plants trees in Mary Lane North but unfortunately it is too dry to plant at the present time.

THERE HAS BEEN CONSIDERABLE CONCERN in the village regarding the newspaper reports that the Essex County Council intends to purchase Morants in Colchester Road, Great Bromley for use as a home for disturbed children. The Parish Council have received no correspondence whatsoever about these proposals and will therefore write to the County Councillor, Mr Chris Pearson, to voice the concerns of the parishioners and request that the Parish Council is updated on all developments. Mr Pearson will also be invited to the next parish council meeting . which will be held on Thursday, 25th January, 1996 at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. Members of the public can of course attend.

KITCHEN CORNER

The New Year, and the party season, is upon us again - A Happy New Year to all my readers! I am still waiting to have some favourite recipes to share, so do write in! Party time means drinks all round, and if the weather is cold, nothing cheers more than something to give a warm glow throughout.

<u>MULLED WINE</u> This can be prepared beforehand and warmed when required. Stud 2 oranges and 1 lemon with cloves and grill till the juices start to run. Put into a pan with 3 pints water, 11b soft brown sugar and a cinnamon stick. Boil till reduced by half. Add 3 bottles cheap red wine, add rum or brandy to taste. Serve warm with a little grated nutmeg ff liked AUSTRIAN GLUHWEIN An easier recipe

3 bottles red wine; juice and zest of an orange rind; 1 cinnamon stick;

juice of half a lemon; 15 cloves; brown sugar to taste; 3 cups water.

Warm slowly and sweeten to taste as it gets hot (do not let boil). Float orange slices on top if liked.

NON-ALCOHOLIC MULL for DRIVERS. A delicious and warming winter drink

4 pints apple juice; 4 cinnamon sticks; 1 cup brown sugar; $1\frac{1}{2}$ teasp allspice; 12 whole cloves. Bring to the boil and gently simmer a few minutes. Garnish with lemon slices. Can be varied by using equal quantities of orange juice with the apple, and sweeten with honey. *Jill Frostick*

GREAT BROMLEY & DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB Season Round-Up

Last summer again proved to be both an enjoyable and successful one for the Cricket Club. In the Lancaster Garages League Division 2 programme Gt. Bromley finished a very creditable fifth, (equalling 1994's finish) and again very narrowly missed out on promotion into Division 1. In fact out of the two promoted teams, Gt. Bromley defeated one twice and narrowly lost to the other off of the last ball in each match. I hope we can repeat this kind of form next season and go one step further and achieve promotion into the First Division.

In the friendly fixtures the Cricket Club again sampled success with many games being closely contested. The results are not as important as in the League and the friendlies give many club members the chance to cross swords with old friends. Our friendly fixture list remains as strong as ever and it was particularly encouraging to see an increasing number of our younger members playing in these matches. On the batting front last summer proved to be a prolific one for our batsmen with four managing to record individual totals of over 500 runs. Captain Fraser Eadie again led the way with a season aggregate of 919 including 11 half centuries and a highest score of 90 not out against Grasshoppers in the League. Matt Pirie was the second highest run scorer with 815 runs. His total included an impressive four centuries and one half century with a highest score of 128 recorded against a Boxted XI in a friendly. Peter Brinkley in his first season back at the club after a spell at Mistley was third highest run getter accumulating 717 runs. Peter's total included two centuries and three half centuries with a highest score of 126 compiled against Bacton in a friendly match.

This season was also a profitable one for our bowlers. The leading wicket taker was Tony Huish who claimed 44 victims and again just fell short of the magical 50 barrier. Tony's best performance was recorded against Mile End where he took 4 for 37 in a League Match. Second highest was Bill Kempster who captured 26 wickets. Earls Colne were the unfortunate victims as Bill ripped through their batting to claim a season best of 6 for 12 in a League match. Nigel Rowe and Claudius Green tied for third, each with 24 wickets. Nigel's best was 4 for 10 recorded against old rivals, Bures, in a friendly and Claudius' analysis of 5 for 17 was a career best performance for our tall paceman, League opponents Tendring Park being the victims. On 10th November the Club held its annual dinner and awards night at the Black Boy, Great Bromley. As usual it was a very successful evening, thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended. The Club President's wife, Mrs Gwen Hayward, presented the trophies to the following winners:

<u>A MEMBER OF OUR CONGREGATION</u>, and Deanery Synod Representative for Ardleigh and the Bromleys, Bill Walker of Little Bromley, has just been elected to serve on General Synod for the next five years. He is also the first man from the Harwich Deanery to sit on the Church of England's national ruling body. Bill has outlines for us where he stands on the issues of the day. 1. "I support Bishop's statement on Human Sexuality. Because of the representative role of the priest, I do not believe that persons in open or closet homosexual relationships should be ordained as priests.

2. I welcome in principle the Turnbull Report to streamline the structures of the Church of England.

3. I support the nationwide parish system of the Church of England, and shall concern myself particularly with the problems of rural ministry and Conservation Trust churches.

4. I am in favour of retaining the book of Common Prayer with as little basic change as possible to the revision of the ASB.

5. I am concerned about the issues of financial mismanagement and the need for financial probity.

6. I am happy that Clergy freehold should be retained.

7. I am in favour of Ecumenism and Evangelism as an integral part of Church life.

I am looking forward to this new challenge."

Our best wishes go to Bill for the Opening Session of the General Synod which started on 28th November with Holy Communion at Westminster Abbey in the presence of the Queen. George Kent also went up for the day, accompanied by Harold Rolfe from Lawford. Bill hopes to bring us news of what is happening in the Church of England. In this context he felt that parishioners should know that the Rt. Rev. Edward Holland spoke recently to the Deanery Synod, and talked on leadership in the Millennium in the Church of England, and said that consensus and cooperation were essential between laity and clergy in the days ahead in this present financial crisis. Bill also wished to report on the ALPHA VIDEO COURSE that has just finished at Lawford. This was most successful, with far more people attending than anticipated. Alpha is a course on Christian basics, sanctioned by the Bishop of Chelmsford, and highly recommended by such High Churchmen as Bishop Michael Marshall and the new Archbishop of York, Dr Hope, who says of Alpha that is "is a clear way into Christian faith for a wide variety of people' and that he "warmly and heartily commends the Alpha courses." Alpha has something for everyone. Roger Howell from Lawford says that he would not have missed the course, experiencing a "renewal of his Christian faith and beliefs" and recommending it for enquirers as "the answers to all the questions". At present the course is running East Bergholt, Bradfield and Colchester and will shortly begin at Frating and Holton St. Mary. NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Firstly I hope you all had a good Christmas. In the couple of months leading up to Christmas both villages and Ardleigh were hit by a spate of dwelling burglaries. This is obviously not good news especially for those of you who were burgled. It is felt a lot of burglaries were connected as the same means of entry was used on each, kicking in the front or back door. There was nothing subtle about it. In a few cases nothing was stolen. There have not been any sightings of any vehicles at the scenes of the burglaries. However we do have a couple of vehicles we are currently watching out for. As these have not been seen at the scene of a crime details of them are being withheld at this time. The 'suspicious callers' have been seen in the area and thanks to some good information from one alert villager I can tell you that a vehicle to look out for is some kind of pick up/ 4 x 4 vehicle, silvery grey in colour. If you do get any callers ask to see some ID. and remember all that you can about them. If you are not happy, call the police.

I have recently noticed a lot of garden bonfires being lit rather close to the highway, the subsequent smoke causing a danger to motorists. The Bromley Messenger February 1996

The Churchwardens have told me that people do not always understand the different terms that I use to describe forthcoming services and other aspects of church life. I have recently acquired a computer and am myself struggling through all the computer jargon which people in 'the know' expect you to understand so I can sympathise with those who like to be aware of what words they may not have come across mean. It is good that you all make me aware that the church like any other organisation has its share of special terms and ways of working. Last month, for example, I spoke of the recent scheme that has amalgamated the two parishes of Ardleigh and The Bromleys under the care of one priest. This in itself perhaps needs more explanation. While the parishes share a vicar and co-operate together this does not mean that they have simply been forged into a larger unit in the way that the villages of Great and Little Bromley were made into one ecclesiastical parish called The Bromleys. Rather the two parishes of Ardleigh and The Bromleys remain distinct with their own Parochial Church Council and Churchwardens and representatives to Deanery Synod. (It was wrongly reported that Bill Walker, Anne Fairley and George Kent represent Ardleigh at Deanery Synod - they represent only The Bromleys.) Parish Councils are the elected representatives of the Parish Church and work with the Rector to ensure that the needs of the wider parish are best met in terms of worship and pastoral care etc. and that the fabric of the church is maintained.

The work of the church, repairs and alterations, the spending of money and the planning of events and services is decided within this body. The possession of the church and churchyard is vested legally in the hands of the Rector and Churchwardens jointly. Churchwardens maintain order, allocate seats, and receive the collection in order to pass it over to the Treasurer. Churchwardens are Bishop's Officers and report to the Bishop and the Archdeacon at his visitation about the health and state of the parish. The Rectory in Great Bromley is owned by the Diocese and is maintained by them for the use of Clergymen appointed to the parishes of Ardleigh and The Bromleys. I hope this may help people understand a little more how the Church of England operates.

During Lent there will be an evening home group to learn and share thoughts about the Christian faith. I am always delighted to hear of anyone who would like to be confirmed or learn more of what the church has to say. I would be very happy to run an introductory course of the Christian faith if enough people were interested. Please contact me or the Churchwardens. *Fr. Trevor*

KITCHEN CORNER

This month, some recipes from my American cook-book "Old-fashioned Apple Recipes"

1) NUTTY APPLE-CHEDDAR LOAF

¹/₂ cup butter
2-2¹/₂ cups flour
2/3 cup brown sugar
1 ¹/₂ teasp baking powder
2 eggs



 $\frac{1}{2}$ teasp bicarbonate of soda

1½ cups shredded apples ½ teasp salt ½ cup grated cheddar cheese ½ cup nuts. Cream butter and sugar, beat in eggs, add sifted dry ingredients then stir in nuts, apples and cheese. Pour into greased loaf pan. Bake moderate oven 350F one hour. Cool 10 mins before turning out. Try this for breakfast!

2) APPLE-O-DATE PUDDING

1 cup porridge oats, 2 cups sliced apples, 2? cups cold water; 1 teasp lemon juice ¹/₄ cup honey; 1 tablesp butter; 1 teasp cinnamon; ¹/₂ cup raisins, ¹/₂ teasp salt, ¹/₂ cup dates. Cook oats in water for 5 mins, stirring constantly. Stir in honey, spice and salt. Remove from heat and cover the pan. Saute the apples with lemon juice in the butter, stir in raisins and dates. Layer the oat mixture and apple mixture in alternate layers in shallow baking dish. Cover and bake 20-25 mins at 350F. Serve warm with cream.

DR. EDWARD WILLIAMS MD

Dr. Williams was a resident in Great Bromley as well as having a surgery in West Stockwell Street, Colchester. He was Mayor of Colchester in 1849, 1854, 1859 and 1862. The Colchester & Essex Hospital in Lexden Road, Colchester has many tales to tell of Dr. Williams. He was among the small band which helped to found the Parish School, now St. George's School. So Dr. Williams was interested in education. When the Colchester Royal Grammar School moved from its ancient site in Culver Street to its present location in Lexden Road in 1853 there among the supporters is our Dr. E Williams. The Essex and West Suffolk Gazette records the opening of the School where Alderman E Williams was among the Town Councillors in the procession from the old site to the new one. The same E Williams, MD. gave a contribution of five guineas to the foundation funds. C(harrington) Nicholl Esq, (of Ardleigh) gave ten guineas. The Revd. H B Newman of Little Bromley sent a guinea. Among the Clergy in the procession with the Ven Archdeacon Burney was Henry Brown Newman, M.A., (Little Bromley), and his neighbour Henry Richard Somers Smith, B.A., J. P. (Little Bentley) who had also subscribed a guinea. Who knows perhaps there will be more to tell from the archives of the R.G.S., Colchester. *John Appleby*

The Bromley Messenger March 1996

Following on from my first article about the organisation of the church and its terminology may I begin my article this month by ensuring that there is no confusion about the roles of two groups of people that have almost the same title in our villages. The Parochial Church Council or Parish Church Council is of course concerned with the role and work of the local church in the area, while the Parish Council is purely there to deal with the everyday needs and problems of the village and its administration and is completely distinct from the church. I know that people, especially those who move here, are sometimes confused by these different groups that not infrequently share the same members. When I spoke with the Bishop of Colchester recently he wondered if a service to mark the amalgamation of the two Parishes of Ardleigh and The Bromleys would be a good idea. I'm not sure that it would for as we have now got used to the scheme it might easily be quite an anticlimax. However, this suggested to me some further words connected with a priest being appointed to a Parish, that can mystify people.

Firstly INSTITUTION. This is the admission of a new incumbent into the spiritual care of the parish. It is always done by a Bishop, since the Vicar or Rector of a Parish shares this spiritual care with the Bishop. Hence the Bishop's words in the service, "Accept this ministry which is mine and yours".

Then INDUCTION. The induction, which will normally be at the same service as the institution gives the new incumbent legal possession of the "temporalities" of the Parish (fabric, buildings, etc.) Often this includes laying the hand of the new incumbent upon the key of the church door. It is generally done by an Archdeacon.

LICENSING. In the case of a Priest-in-Charge (i.e. someone who is not the incumbent of the Parish) there will simply be the licensing of the Priest by the Bishop. In such cases a priest will be placed for a fixed time in the parish and legally speaking can be moved by the Bishop. COLLATION is the term used to describe what happens when the Bishop is the patron of a parish. The new priest who is to be an incumbent is said to be "collated" into the living. An Incumbent is a priest who has the freehold of the living and hence cannot be moved, (save for negligence) against his will. The church is not a complete democracy as such, rather it entrusts ministry and care of different parishes to the ministry of Bishops, Priests and Deacons into work with, and co-operate with, the members of the church community. This mirrors the pattern of Apostle ministry in the first centuries. *Fr. Trevor*



A meeting of the Parish Council was held on 25th January, 1996. County Councillor, Mr C Pearson, and two representatives from the Social Services, Ms S Coward and Ms C Bird, were in attendance to discuss the proposed purchase of 'Morants' for use as a residential home for children. In her address to the meeting, Ms Bird said that the Local Authority have a statutory duty to provide homes for young children when they are no longer able to live at home. The intention is to use Morants as a short term unit for assessment purposes for 18 young children aged between 11-16 years old. She said that some of the children may be disturbed, some may have criminal records, some may just be very unhappy and require lots of support. Because of local concern, it was decided that a public meeting be held within the next few weeks. Councillor Pearson and representatives from the Social Services will be in attendance to answer questions. Following the approval of the 'Tiptree Books' planning application, the 'PROTECTION' steering committee intends to hold a Private Judicial Review in an effort to stop this application. The Parish Council have agreed to donate £300 to the Private Judicial Review Fund.

Mix together, kneed and roll out thinly. Cut into oblongs 4" x 5". Using a flat roasting tin, bring salted water to the boil and cook the pasta 3 minutes. Lift carefully and dry on a tea towel. <u>Meat Filling:</u> 1 small onion, chopped, 1 tblsp oil, clove garlic, 8oz mince, 2oz mushrooms 1tblsp tomato puree, Bay leaf, nutmeg, seasoning.

Heat oil in pan, fry onion and garlic, add meat, then rest of ingredients. Cook for 5 minutes, stirring. Keep mixture dry. Use to Stuff and roll the cannelloni. <u>Tomato Sauce:</u>

1 small tin tomatoes (or fresh, skinned) Seasoning & pinch marjoram. I teasp sugar. Drain tomatoes, mix all together and pour over cannelloni in an oven proof dish <u>Cheese Sauce:</u>

1 oz marg, $\frac{1}{2}$ pt milk, seasoning, 1 oz flour, 1 oz grated cheese

Make the sauce, add cheese, pour over the cannelloni and sprinkle with parmesan. Bake moderate oven 45 minutes.

For vegetarians/lent fasters - substitute spinach/lentils/other vegetable filling.

Alternative method of cooking is to omit the sauces and cook the stuffed cannelloni just

sprinkled with oil and baked. Serve any sauces separately. This way they come crisp. *Jill Frostick*

LITTLE BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on Thursday, 25th January, 1996. A letter has been sent to the Essex County Council Highways Department itemising the work the Parish Council would like considered for inclusion in the 1996-97 financial year. The main points are –

1. Traffic calming through the village

2. Reflector posts and new chevron signs for School House corner

3. Bollards/Posts either side of the entrance to the car park to prevent cars being driven or parked on the footpath

4. Re-surfacing of footpath which runs in front of the Council Houses

5. Reinstatement of white lines through the village

The proprietors of the Fox and Hounds public house have applied for a variation in respect of the Public Entertainment Licence in relation to the extension of the premises. The variation, if approved, increases the number of persons permitted on the premises from 160 to 325. The Parish Council have raised no objection. Following a meeting with the Tendring District Council Planning Officers it has been decided to defer the planning application for the playing field and proposed village hall as it is contrary to the 10-year District Plan. The Parish Council will therefore make provision for this application in the 10-year Plan when it is reviewed in approximately 18-24 months' time.

The Bromley Messenger April 1996

I will be continuing with my articles of explanation next month. May I thank those who have written to me asking for clarification of different words and phrases. This month as I write, the first of the funerals of the little children who were killed at Dunblane has just taken place. This is a tragedy that has shaken the nation because the horror of what has happened is almost too much to take in. A number of people spoke to me about it and asked what we were doing in our Parish churches. I was able to tell them that during the daily worship the children and their families were remembered and on Sunday we kept silence after a list bearing photographs of the children was read. It was very moving to sense the congregation deeply identifying with the Scots town.

Churches are the natural places that people turn to in tragedy and sadness because they realise that ordinary human thinking and reasoning does not come up with any reasons, or any way of understanding the depth of anguish that can enter into lives through such events as happened at Dunblane. In in few weeks we will be recalling the events of Holy Week and see Jesus becoming more and more isolated from his friends and followers, eventually breathing his last on a cross between two thieves. We know that this humiliating death was to be the prelude to that first glorious Easter morning, but at the time it must have seemed dark, hopeless and desolate indeed. The great strength of the Christian faith is that it does not downplay tragedy and try and turn it into something else. It fairly and squarely asks those who follow Christ to strive and fool the bitterness and darkness of Holy week because that was the true experience of John himself who shouted out 'My God, why hast thou forsaken me. You as Christians open their hearts to this blackness and pain'. They begin to realise that because God has through Christ dwelt in such harrowing places, it means that at least He understands, and that there will be no glib answers and no easy explanations. Christians know that the cross is central to their faith because it is only here that the pain and suffering of the world can be brought to be held in the hands of a God who saw his son die at the hands of evil men in order that the power of truth and holiness could be released.

In Holy week we have the opportunity of re-experiencing the last earthly days of the Son of God, yet it fills us not with apathy and depression but with a sense of tragedy certainly, yet urged with hope even before Easter day. A 20th Century theologian has written these words which seem to sum up what I am trying to say so well "Once we are able to see and feel the desert in which we live, the desert becomes fertile, bringing forth every tree whose fruit shall be for meat and the leaf thereof for healing. Once we know that we are poor the kingdom of Heaven is ours. So when out lot is cast with someone who is finding his cross, his desert, his poverty overwhelming we are on Holy ground. For it is precisely here that God is able to heal and save us, as well as them. Our identification with the other person brings to our lives and to theirs, the power, the joy and the victory, which is already ours and all mankinds through our Lord Jesus Christ."

ARDLEIGH SURGERY

From 4th March, Drs Manders, Owens and Bettle at ARDLEIGH SURGERY have joined the new doctors on call co-operative, called NORDOC (North Essex Doctors on Call). (This is to try and ease the burden of out of hours. emergency cover, and provide a more efficient system). Virtually all the General Practitioners surgeries in the area have joined NORDOC. It means that about 80 local GPs' from the Colchester area have formed a large well managed rota.

HOW DOES THE SYSTEM WORK? If someone needs a Doctor urgently for advice or treatment out of surgery hours, they should ring the surgery number. An answerphone will give the NORDOC telephone number. The call will be answered automatically by the Essex Ambulance Service and passed through to the doctor on call. The call doctor will be based at Castle Gardens Medical Centre on East Hill in Colchester. The Doctor will be able to give advice, ask the patient to come to Castle Gardens for prompt treatment, or despatch a mobile doctor to visit. The system will be run by professionals promoting a quality service, staffed by local GP doctors. The service will mean that patients are seen by fresher doctors and it will ease the time consuming on call burden for country General Practitioners, including Ardleigh Surgery.

We are enthusiastic about NORDOC, similar co-ops are operating very successfully already all over the country. If you have any queries about NORDOC, ring the practice on 230224 for more details.

Steward has appealed to the Secretary of State for the Environment against Tendring District Council's refusal of his planning application to construct a large building at Shaftesbury House, Briar Road, for use as storage of large agricultural equipment. Essex County Council Highways Department had originally objected to this application on the grounds that the access roads to Shaftesbury House are too narrow but they have now withdrawn their objections as an agreement has been reached with Mr Steward. Councillor Rowe has now been requested by the Parish Council to obtain details of this agreement. The Parish Council have written to the Secretary of State for the Environment detailing their objections to this application. Councillor Rowe reported that the speed limit signs which were erected in the wrong position in Harwich Road will soon be moved to their correct locations.

Councillor Harris reported that the play equipment on Hare Green has recently been inspected and several problems have been highlighted. The inspection has shown that there are potential head and finger traps on the equipment which will require attention. The Parish Council will take urgent action to rectify this.

Here is a "time-saver" recipe for busy cooks who like to produce more than one cake at a time! **3 in 1 Recipe**

1) 12oz marg 12oz sugar 6 eggs 1 teasp vanilla essence 12oz SR flour sifted with 3 teasp baking powder

Cream the fat and sugar, beat in eggs and flour etc. Divide into 2.

2) Chocolate Peppermint Sandwich

Bake two-thirds of first half of mixture in two sandwich tins (as for Victoria Sandwich) Filling: 20z butter 20z icing sugar 20z chocolate

Peel the chocolate in curls with a potato peeler. Save some for decoration. Cream butter, sugar and rest of chocolate to make filling.

Icing: 4oz icing sugar I tablesp water, 1 drop peppermint essence

Spread on cake and decorate with chocolate curls.

3) Coffee Daisy Buns

1 ½ tablesp instant coffee dissolved in 2 tablesp boiling water.

Add half of this to remaining one third of mixture and fill bun cases (8-12). Bake in moderate oven.

Icing: Add 4oz icing sugar to rest of coffee mix. Ice buns and decorate with almonds and cherries to look like daisies.

4) Fruit Cake

To second half of mixture add:- 4oz peel 6oz plain flour 6oz sultanas 2 tablesp milk, grated lemon rind

Bake 7" tin 325F 1¼ hours. When cooked, brush cake with 3 tablesp honey melted with 1 tablesp lemon juice and decorate with candied peel *Jill Frostick*


The Bromley Messenger May 1996

One of the questions that I have been asked to answer is to do with the title that more traditional clergymen like myself tend to use, namely "Father". As one person pointed out, does this not cause confusion as it is a form particularly associated with Roman Catholic clergy? The term takes us back to early Christianity where we learn of the Desert Fathers or of the Fathers of the Early Church that had a particular role of ministry to the communities which they served. The title 'Apostolic Father' is by custom applied to certain writers of that period of time immediately following the disciples and apostles that we read of in the Gospels and Epistles in Scripture. These Fathers were the direct successors to the apostles and had the task of building up the faith of those who had chosen Christianity as their lifestyle and faith. It was a period in which the Church was defending and explaining its teaching and practice against misrepresentation and accusations of naivety and falsehood. The Early church had to preserve the tradition it had received, yet also to work out the implications of the faith as different situations and problems arose whilst making the essence of their faith understandable to those who were interested in hearing what this 'new faith' had to offer. By using the term 'Father', a clergyman is making a statement about his beliefs and his real sense of being a successor (centuries later, it is true) to those who held to the early faith that had been explained to them by the apostles who knew Christ in his earthly life. It shows a desire to find one's roots in the early Church and have that earnest desire to ensure that the Christian Faith is not emptied of content in an attempt to make it easy and acceptable to a cynical generation. The term 'Father' also speaks very eloquently of the relationship a priest should have with his parishioners, one of emulating and showing forth the love of God in a Fatherly manner, a concern to be likened to that properly shown to children by their Father. Here we see that the model of the family is used to describe the Christian community. The Church is not to be an organisation made up of individuals but a family that care for and respect each other and spiritually belong and are bonded together "in Christ". 'Father' therefore properly expresses a role of leadership within the Christian community and has been rightly chosen by various branches of the world-wide church Roman Catholic, Anglican and Eastern Orthodox. . LAW & ORDER

The County Police Act, 1839, permitted counties to set up a paid police force. The Essex Police Force was established in 1839 but many counties did not follow suit until later in the century. William Smith, an Ardleigh labourer, was sworn in as PC. No. 2 in 1840. William White in his 1848 Directory of Essex gives details of the villages and towns of the County together with a list of the principal inhabitants. In Great Bromley the Police Constable is noted as being James Peacock. He may not have been the first officer in the village.

Ardleigh, in 1848, was the residence of Police Inspector Hugh Ackers and he operated with his constables from a station in Ipswich Road, Colchester. He married an Ardleigh lady, Mary Ann James, in 1845 and they had several children whose baptisms are recorded in the Ardleigh Registers.

Lawford's policeman was Timothy Rawson. Manningtree with Mistley had Inspector Philip Sargeant and he lived in South Street. P.C. Thomas Smith resided at Tendring.

Superintendent John McInnes was at Thorpe-le-Soken and was in charge of the area. In 1859 Great Bromley's constable was Robert Parish. John Lamprell Guy was sergeant of police at Manningtree. At Thorpe-le-Soken, Henry Day, constable, resided at the Police Station where the petty sessions for the area were held on Mondays of each week and the records of the Sokens were kept. *John Appleby*

UPDATE ON SAINT GEORGE'S ROOF REPAIR FUND

Two years after its launch, the new Appeal has raised almost £25,000. This achievement has made it possible to repay all borrowings for the completed restoration of the Church Tower and still have more than £18,500 in hand towards the repair of the great double hammerbeam roof.

The architects are currently preparing a full specification of the new work, partly for the building contract but also as a basis for the detailed applications to relevant charities. An application for a grant from the European Union has been unsuccessful, and the Lottery Fund does not make grants for projects already supported by English Heritage. Fortunately, however, English Heritage have recently indicated that they may be able to increase their own commitment when the detailed specification has been considered.



Generous donations have been made, (many of them from

well wishers other than members of the congregation) but we still have a long way to go because we have always recognised that the eventual cost of the work is going to be more than £100,000. We want to begin as soon as possible, but we cannot do so until we know we have enough money to finish. So please continue to help. Several events are planned for future fund raising including a Silent Auction. We are asking for gifts for this event. KITCHEN CORNER

Sorbets are light and refreshing when the warmer days come. Here are two ways to use rhubarb, which is in season now.

Rhubarb Sorbet for 6

670g (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ lb) rhubarb 275g (10 oz) light brown sugar

Chop the rhubarb into 2cm lengths, mix with sugar in an ovenproof dish, cover and bake 1 hour, 175C/350F (no added water). When cooled, process or sieve to a puree and put in a shallow tray. Freeze until nearly firm, then turn into a bowl and whisk vigorously. Return to the freezer until firm.

Rhubarb and Orange Sorbet for 4

³⁄₄ pt slightly sweetened rhubarb puree, Juice of one orange 4 oz sugar 2 egg whites Cook puree and sugar over moderate heat until sugar has dissolved. Stir in orange juice and leave till cold. Whip whites stiff and fold in to the mixture. Freeze in a tray one hour, then put into a bowl and beat well. Freeze until required. Best to take this out a short while before serving. *Jill Frostick*

A meeting of the Little Bromley Parish Council was held on 28th March. .The Parish Council are to press for action by Tendring District Council for effective action to be taken to stop the nuisance caused by illegal car breaking in the village. An infestation of rats in Shop Road is causing concern and has been reported to the Pest Control Officer for action. Letters have been received by parents of children attending Manningtree School who currently benefit from the free school bus service from the war memorial bus stop. ECC Planning Department have said that they cannot guarantee seats for pupils as this stop is within the three mile statutory boundary. The Parish Council have objected strongly to this and are supporting the parents' claim that the route to the school is very dangerous and the bus stop is only marginally inside the three mile boundary. The Parish Council are currently researching the need for a low cost housing project in the village.

The Bromley Messenger June 1996

After the dark winter nights and what has been a particularly cold and hard winter light evenings and warm afternoons make a welcome contrast. Summer in a rural setting brings with it so much to enjoy. By the time you read this the Flower Festival, which is now so well established, will have brought many people into our fine parish church, which looks at its best when set off with natural texture and colour. Thanks is due to all who will have worked so hard to make it a success. The theme for the Festival was 'Artists' one which is very apt because art and artistic endeavour is able to underline and express spiritual truth and value. Colour, texture, light and beauty are able to bring us closer to the things of God.

Sometimes people ask me why we use the different colours of vestments and altar frontals for different seasons. Is it really necessary to have processional candles to add ceremony and effect to the reading of the Gospel. At Easter with the lighting of the first fire of the season and the blessing and signing of the Pascal candle and baptismal waters it can seem elaborate even overcomplicated.

I believe that such things have the very important function of creating atmosphere and heightening our awareness of spiritual things. One 20th Century theologian has written that in his view the design of a church should be completely plain and functional with white walls and a pulpit to aid the preacher. This View means that he feels the message of the Gospel and of Jesus is intensely cerebral and that the human senses of sight, hearing, touch and taste are not helpful or enlightening. Of course we need to guard against meaningless ritual and superstition. At the time of the reformation this did exist. Yet this should not prevent us from being aware of the way God can speak to us through symbols, colour, the natural world and the theatre of church worship.

These words of Jesus as he looked at the fields and flowers of Palestine show how effectively the awareness of beauty in God's world lifts us above anxiety and self pro-occupation into the spiritual realm. "Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin; yet I tell you Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, 0 men of little faith". *Fr. Trevor*

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

The Annual Parish Assembly was held in the Village Hall on Thursday, 18th April, 1996. In his report, Councillor Rowe said that we now have a speed limit through the village and flashing warning lights and signs are awaited near the school. Changes in the planning procedures will mean that we will have more control over planning applications as members of the public will be able to meet Councillors to discuss their plans and answer any questions arising from them before decisions are made. Mr Rowe reported that there is £100,000 available to Parishes to help fund worthy schemes. This money will be allocated in blocks of £10,000. Details of schemes and application for funds should be made to the District Council.

The Chairman reported that following the resignation of Chris Phillips from the Hare Green Recreation Committee, the playing held is now managed by the Parish Council. The Chairman gave thanks to Chris Phillips and his committee members for all their efforts over the last few years. Several Parishioners have offered help with the general maintenance of the ground which has been gratefully accepted by the council. Both the playing field and the cricket ground have been entered in the Best Kept Field competition. The play equipment has been inspected recently and some possible problems have been highlighted. The Parish Council are taking urgent advice and action to remedy these.

The Treasurer of the 'Bromley Messenger', Mr L Christodoulides, gave his report. Although the accounts have not been completed it is expected that the magazine will break even this year. He reported that the Editor has incorporated more flair into the magazine and introduced a children's page. It was disappointing that there were so few entries for the cover design competition. The Chairman thanked the Editor and Mr Christodoulides for all their efforts during the year.

Members of the public questioned the Council about the planning application for a proposed camping ground on land off Frating Road. They were very concerned that they had not been officially informed about this. The Chairman said that the immediate neighbours had been notified. However their concerns would be brought to the attention of the District Council and a copy of the plans would be obtained for public viewing.

LITTLE BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

The Little Bromley Parish Assembly was held on 25th April, 1996. All members of the Council were in attendance and five members of the Public. In his resume of the year's events the Chairman stated that following the advice of Tendring District Council Planning Officers, the planning application for the proposed playing field, village hall and small housing development in Ardleigh Road, will be deferred until provision has been made for this in the review of the T.D.C. 10 year plan in approximately 12 months' time. The chairman said that the village hall fund currently stands at £5,000.

Traffic calming measures through the village are expected this year. Distribution of funds from the Elizabeth Warren Trust were made by Father Trevor to 26 deserving people in the village. The Trust was originally set up in 1868 to distribute blankets and warm clothing to the needy. During the year Councillor J Pleass resigned from the Parish Council. His efforts during his years of service to the Parish have been much appreciated. Mrs Eugster has been co-opted onto the Council in his place. Councillor Rowe said that he has had a very interesting first year as District Councillor. In his report he said that the Tendring District Council Gypsy Working committee have been re-instated and they are looking for a suitable gypsy site - possibly in this area. Mr Rowe said that he was pleased to be involved in the meeting with the Planning Officers regarding the proposed playing field and will advise the Parish Council on the availability of funds from the District Council for this scheme.

KITCHEN CORNER

Traditionally, Whitsunday is the day to eat the first gooseberries of the season. These first thinnings are delicious made into a simple pie, or just stewed, perhaps with a head of elderflowers for extra flavour. Another tasty pudding is made with sponge. *GOOSEBERRY UPSIDE-DOWN PUDDING*

Topping:- enough gooseberries to cover bottom of chosen dish

3oz butter or marg 3oz soft brown sugar, a few chopped nuts

Sponge:- 4oz SR flour 4oz butter or marg, pinch salt, 4oz sugar, 2 eggs.

Top and tail gooseberries, melt butter in greased 8" square oven dish. Add sugar and stir till melted. Sprinkle on nuts and add good layer of gooseberries. Make sponge by creaming butter and sugar, beat in eggs and fold in flour. Pour over the fruit and bake 50 mins, 350F. Turn out on to a plate to serve upside-down. *Jill Frostick*

THE GREAT BROMLEY GRAND PRIX

The cars then accelerate down the Snooty Fox Straight to the Post Box Bend where the organisers have removed the slow signs so that the drivers can go faster. Some have been known the run out of road here taking all before them, spectators and safety fences. Those cars that are left running then accelerate to maximum down the Boulton Cottages Straight to the next bend and then down Little Paddock Straight to the finishing line. Some drivers think it is all over here but there is another race track crossing their path. Lack of concentration here and it is all over permanently. The same track is also used for heavy truck racing. The participants are T.M.C. versus Allcomers.

The Motor Cycle Grand Prix is run over a longer track starting at the Car Auctions. The spectators hear the bikes start half a mile away and the bikes pass in a blur. Any spectators lining the track are warned that motor racing is dangerous and watch at their own risk.

OUT AND ABOUT

Bill and I felt we would like to tell you about two very interesting talks we have both been to recently which focus on trends in the Church of England in general, and in this Diocese in

particular. Bill's talk was given by Canon Robin Greenwood, who has just come to Chelmsford, at Deanery Synod in April. The importance of the involvement of the laity in the building up of a living community of believers, was the theme of the address, with co-operation with the laity essential, and sharing at almost every level between clergy and congregation. The Laity must be encouraged to develop their individual gifts, and grow in fellowship into a strong congregation. In this Canon Greenwood followed very much the theme of the talk given by the Bishop of Colchester in November to the Harwich Deanery, in these times of crisis in the church of England when too few suitable men and women are coming forward for Ordination. I was at a most interesting two day conference in London at Holy Trinity, Brompton on 16-17 May (which was also attended by the new Bishop of Chelmsford, The Rt. Rev. John Perry) which took further this theme of the involvement of the laity in the church, and in this context the need to take seriously both in New Testament Theology and Parish Ministry the role of the Holy Spirit. The main speakers were Professor Gordon Fee from Vancouver, and The Rev. Mark Stibbe, lecturer in Theology at Sheffield University. The theme was the Theological basis for the Doctrine of the Holy Spirit, for so long sidelined in our Theological Colleges, that few Ministers know how to cope with the current wave of "renewal" in their Parishes, or which aspects were helpful, and which distinctly harmful. A direct result of the neglect of this teaching about the Holy Spirit as a living reality in the Church was the abject condition of the Church as an irrelevance in Western Europe. Instead, the gospel needed to be presented as liberating and empowering, and in such a way that the modern world could not be understood without it.

The Early Church in the first few centuries, was little more than a persecuted Jewish offshoot, with many of its earliest members itinerant missionaries. Yet their witness as martyrs, continually empowered by the Holy Spirit first promised in John 14 v25 and given at Pentecost, helped to spread Christianity throughout the Roman Empire. It was this experience of the living God, that made St. Paul change his life on the road to Damascus. This power, so long absent from our Church life, is a reality still today.

The power structures of the Western Church at Rome as we know it did not come into being until nearly the fourth century, when Christianity became the official religion of the Roman Empire under Constantine. The Church by this time had so much money it needed new outlets for its new found wealth, enormous sums of money were spent on buildings, cemeteries and works of Art. The cult of the pilgrims, saints, and martyrs, ceremony and formalism, had begun. Vestments also date from this era. Western Christianity eventually settled into the pattern that lasted for a, thousand years until the Reformation. At its best the Church still remembered its calling as the body of Christ, and at its worst, became little more than an effective force for social control, by which time unfortunately the Holy Spirit had been largely forgotten, and God eventually declared dead by the philosophers of the Enlightenment. Yet it is to the The Church, conceived as the whole body of Christ, and made up from all its members, that Jesus entrusted his message of universal reconciliation, to be passed down each generation of Christian believers who believe in being filled by the Holy Spirit. This is made quite clear in 1 Corinthians 12-14 when St. Paul writes of Spiritual Gifts, given in different measure to diverse people, but which are for the benefit of the Church Community as a whole, and for the building up of that community, and not just for the individual. For it is only in our relationships with one another in a Community that we can live out our calling as Members of the Body of Christ.

How does this work out in practice? As Canon Charles Gore, CR, DD writing in 1898 put it so well "We are sons and heirs, intelligent helpers, not submissive slaves, subject to ordnance's, for passive obedience to an authority which does not explain itself St. Paul would have dreaded as bondage". Our Lord didn't give his disciples much direction, Canon Gore goes on to point out, but if our lives are ordered by a submission to the spirit and a sense of personal responsibility, and if the Church, the body of Christ is pervaded by this sense of Christ's life and Spirit, then this spiritual dimension will be the hallmark of the congregation. The "fruits of the Spirit" of this community show itself by reaching out to everyone with whom it comes in contact. For it is in the context of our relationship with our neighbours that the fruits of the Spirit are apparent. "For God is not a God of confusion but of peace" 1 Corinthians 14 v33. *Cynthia Walker*

KITCHEN CORNER

By special request of a reader, a recipe for spiced lamb. This is equally good as a hot or cold dish. If serving cold, leave in casserole to cool and omit cornflour. 1 leg of lamb (about 4-5lbs) 1/2 level teasp ground nutmeg, pinch ground cloves, 1 crushed garlic clove

 $\frac{1}{2}$ level teasp ground cinnamon, 1 large onion peeled and sliced, 4 oz soft brown sugar $\frac{1}{4}$ pt. wine vinegar, $\frac{1}{4}$ pt. water salt and pepper, 1 tablesp corn-flour.

8 oz can apricot halves & 8 oz can prunes (or you can use dried soaked fruit instead) Parsley or watercress to garnish

Place lamb in large casserole or roasting tin. Combine spices and rub into the skin of the lamb. Arrange onion and garlic around and on the meat. Combine sugar, water, vinegar and seasonings, pour over lamb and cover tightly. Leave 24 hours turning the meat several times. Strain juices and add half to the tin, keeping the rest. Cover with foil and cook 2 hours mod. oven 275F / 190C basting twice. Drain apricots and keep juice. Drain prunes. Add these to the casserole, return to the oven uncovered and bake 30-45 minutes till browned and cooked. Strain of juices into a pan, mix with reserved marinade made up to ³/₄ pt. with apricot juice. Add flaked cornflour and boil 2 mins. Serve with the lamb, garnished with watercress. Good with jacket potatoes and green vegetable / carrots. *Jill Frostick*



A meeting of the Little Bromley Parish Council was held on 9th May. Mr Peter Ollivant was elected as Chairman for the coming year and Mr Poulter was appointed Vice-Chairman. Mr R Poulter will be the Parish Council representative at the Tendring District Association of Local Council meetings. Mr G Kent will be the Footpatr/rights of Way Officer and Mr P Ollivant will be the Transport Officer and Tree Warden. Mrs Eugster has suggested that a fund-raising fete he held to raise funds to build a bus shelter for the school children. This was given the full support of the Parish Council and a date has now been agreed.

A Parish Council notice-board is currently being made. This will be situated opposite the Post Office and Mr Ollivant will be the key holder. A planning application has been submitted by Mr Bambridge for a 2-storey dwelling on land adjacent to Green Hedges, Shop Road, Little Bromley. Although the Parish Council did not object to this application they did specify the preference for a low profile dwelling. The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on 11th July.

Three planning applications have recently been considered by the Parish Council and their comments have been passed to the District Council.

1. Erection of a pig fattening house at Lilleys Farm. The Parish Council had no objections to this application.

2. Extension to dwelling at Morants, Colchester Road, Gt. Bromley. The Parish Council had no objections to this application.

3. New bungalow on land to the rear of 1 Springhill Close, Gt Bromley. The Parish Council objected strongly to this application as this was a two storey chalet type dwelling which would be intrusive on the neighbouring properties. The Parish Council would prefer a low profile bungalow which is in keeping with the other properties on this site.

Due to complaints received by the Essex County Council Highways Department, the Parish Council have been asked to comment on the feasibility of moving the flashing School sign. A site visit will be arranged.

The fence surrounding the village pond will be painted. This is the responsibility of the Highways Department and the Chairman agreed to speak to them regarding a completion date for this work.

The dog fouling problem on the cricket ground has been brought to the attention of the Parish Council who will now investigate the legislation regarding dog byelaws. In his report, Mr Rowe said that he is now a member of the T.D.C. Gypsy Working Party Committee which will be looking for suitable sites in the district. The Planning Application for the proposed camping ground has now been amended. The rear of the site will now be woodland. The Parish Council will have the opportunity to comment in due course.

Mr Rowe said that some emergency doors at the Village Hall need replacing and the oil tank is leaking. A new tank will cost approximately $\pounds 500-\pounds 600$. A contribution from the Parish Council towards these expenses was requested.



The Bromley Messenger August 1996

Continuing my series of articles on the church and its vocabulary I thought I would explain this month the way the ordained ministry has grown up.

The Church of England rightly believes itself to be both catholic and reformed. This means that it can trace its origins back to the apostolic ministry which first brought Christianity to our land through people like Augustine and Alban. It also means that it was influenced by the reformation and was able to move away from the worst excesses medieval superstition that had crept into the churches life at that time. The Church of England shares with the great churches of the East and the West a parallel order of ministry - that of bishop, priest and deacon.

In the 1st Epistle of Peter we read these words "Let yourselves be built into a spiritual house. to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." We can see from this passage that priesthood is something shared by the whole church which comes from Jesus Christ himself "that great high priest who has passed through the heavens". As the church developed it came to see that if this priestly function was to be exercised efficiently, it needed to be ordered and structured. It was from this that what we call "the orders of ministry" grew up. Let me comment a little on these orders.

Bishop The word bishop derives from the Greek "episkopos" which means "overseer". Early in the church's history (Acts 20.28) we find particular people entrusted with overseeing the Christian church in a particular area. These areas are now called dioceses. Acts 6.6 records the original apostles commissioning new ones by laying hands upon them. It has continued to this day in the practise of ordination (or consecration). This means that the bishop's stand in a continuous line of hands being laid on which goes back to the apostles. Because it is the bishop's role to keep the church in the succession of the apostles, he is also responsible for maintaining orthodox Christian teaching in the Diocese.


Priest This word is derived from the Greek "prosbuteros" meaning "elder". In the very early church, the orders of Bishop and Priest were not sharply distinguished from one another - this came in the 2nd and 3rd Centuries because of the need to place care and charge of a particular community in the hands of men who would have specific pastoral and liturgical functions. In the earliest church, the bishop always presided at the celebration of the Eucharist of his diocese but as the faith spread smaller communities now called parishes grew up in each diocese. It was therefore important that the Bishop could delegate a number of his functions to priests including the celebration of the Eucharist. Ordained priests are called to build up and order the spiritual and pastoral life of the church. Some functions of bishops have remained their prerogative alone, such as confirming or ordaining others.

Deacon This derives from the Greek "diakonos" which means "servant" (Phillippians 1.1). These people are described in the New Testament as those who assisted the bishops and presbyters. The functions of the deacon to this day are those of serving and assisting. Thus the deacon has the role of reading the Gospel and of helping in the distribution of the sacrament. The deacon also often had the role of helping the sick and the poor. Of course all Christians are called to serve other people and here again we see that this order of ministry makes plain to the whole church an important aspect of its vocation. Some clergy remain deacons while others are ordained subsequently to the order of priests. By being ordained first to the deaconate and then to the priesthood all clergymen are reminded that servanthood is at the heart of all ministry individually and corporately. The Church exists not in order to be an exclusive religious club but to reach out into the neighbourhood and through the kindness and concern of its members meet the needs of the wider community. *Fr. Trevor*

Stones from all over the world, including South America, Scotland and as near as Bradwell are collected, cut and polished after various processes, which brings out the natural beauty and colour, the smaller stones being used in jewellery. Our next meeting will be on Thursday, 8th August when a visit to Frinton Nurseries is being arranged. *Vicky Griffiths*

1. Barnard Payne (1), son of John and Johan (Joan) Payne was baptised, 29th March, 1546. He must have died shortly after this; there appears to be no record of burial.

2. Barnard (2), (maker of the will), son of John and Johan Payne was baptised, 13th January, 1548. He died and was buried at Little Bromley, 1st August, 1570.

3. Barnard's grandfather was also called John and married Margaret Storne (alias Stone), 16th April, 1548. Margaret died, 8th October, 1570.

4. Barnard had an uncle, Richard, who married Joan Bayinge, 5th February, 1546; an aunt, Joan, who married George Stone, 16th May, 1551; and another uncle, Thomas, who married Agnes Sallow, 19th January, 1553.

5. After Barnard's father John was buried, 21st June, 1560, his widow, Joan, married "in haste" to Thomas Candler, 1st August, 1560. This explains why in the Will we see "father and mother Candler" mentioned. Joan Payne/Candler was buried at Little Bromley, 10th March, 1572.

By her previous marriage to John Payne, Joan gave birth to John, baptised 22nd July, 1539, William, baptised also on 22nd July, 1539, Barnard (1), baptised 24th March, 1546; our will maker, Barnard (2), baptised 13th January, 1548; Johan (1), baptised 6th January, 1553 - and buried 20th January, 1553; Johan (2), baptised 25th February, 1554 - married William Candler 20th October, 1589. There may have been other unrecorded births.

The Barker family were from Ardleigh. Barker baptisms, marriages and burials are recorded at Ardleigh from 1555.

Alyce Cartwright, widow, was buried at Little Bromley, 15th June, 1573. She was already recorded as "Widow" Nott when she married Mychaell Cartwright at Little Bromley in 1545. John Elly, widower, married Mary Payne, spinster, 3rd May, 1568, at Little Bromley, "My sister, Elye", and others of the Elye, Elly or Ely family are mentioned in the Will. What an interesting family and what a mix up of close relations and families as well as in-breeding.

KITCHEN CORNER

Farmed trout are readily available and quite reasonably priced. This recipe would make quite a tasty main course for a special meal.

Trout with Pinenuts and Cucumber

4 cleaned trout4 fresh bay leaves4 slices lemon5 tablesp. lemon juice2 oz pine kernels, salt and pepper6 in. pieces cucumber cut into thin sticks1 lb carrots cut into sticks 1 lb calabrese or broccoli

Wipe fish and put a bay leaf and lemon slice in each one, lay in foil-lined grill pan and sprinkle with 3 tablesp. lemon juice. Cook under moderate grill 5 minutes. Turn carefully and cook 5-10 minutes or till cooked. Transfer to serving dish and keep warm.

Put remaining lemon juice with cucumber and pinenuts in a small pan and simmer 4-5 minutes stirring frequently. Season, then spoon over the trout.

Lightly cook or steam the vegetables and add to the dish, or serve separately. Also serve new potatoes in their skins dressed with butter and parsley, or yoghurt mixed with herbs.



The theme of harvest has great appeal both in rural and urban areas. This is because it touches upon a number of basic themes that are about life and survival. For instance, in our harvest stories in church we firstly remind ourselves that the elemental forces of nature are under the control of a God who created all things. The combination of human labour - through planting, tilling and tending - with the sunlight, water and warmth encourages that mysterious process of growth. As Matthias Claudius has written in his hymn:

"We plough the fields and scatter, The good seed on the land.

But it is fed and watered by God's almighty hand.

He sends the snow in winter, the warmth to grow the grain

The breezes and the sunshine, and soft refreshing rain. "

Harvest is also the time when the efforts of the year are rewarded. There have been the anxious moments and the times of hard graft, bearing the burden of the day when toil seems dreary. Now, however, we can enter with the farmer into that deep satisfaction of a job begun and completed. The farmers perseverance and determination has brought its reward.

At Harvest time we are reminded of the richness and variety of natural things that we can easily miss or take for granted - wheat; barley; sugar beet; apples. These are indeed 'all things bright and beautiful'. Western Christianity has sometimes been guilty of over stressing that sense of the numinous and holy beyond and behind the world of natural things. Harvest can be the opportunity to celebrate with rejoicing and thankfulness in our hearts the world and the life that God has given to each one of us.

The Celtic church, which fell victim to the Synod of Whitby, seemed to have captured this sense or joyfulness in its prayer and worship. So one Celtic prayer states:

"There is no plant in the ground

But full of his virtue

There is no form in the strand

But it is full of His blessing.

There is no life in the sea,

There is no creature in the river,

There is naught in the firmament

But proclaims his goodness... "

Yet the Celtic church was not suggesting that God is simply a vague life force and nothing more. He always remains the Creator and distinct from what he has made. Moreover He calls us to try and achieve a proper relationship between ourselves, the physical world and God himself. We are to enjoy the world and use it in the right way, realising that we are enslaved if we care for and use the natural world in ways that exclude God the giver.

To quote a modem hymn writer in conclusion:

"In thy laws thyself displaying

Teach our minds thyself to know." Fr. Trevor

Impressions of a first visit to York University for General Synod. 12-16 July 1996

We had to be at York for dinner at 7.00pm on the Friday, and I went by train from London in 2 hours to York, and I was very glad I did as people going by car, and there were quite a few, took anything from 4-7 hours from London. We were put up in three of the Halls of Residence at the University. The Campus is a very attractive place with lakes made from swamps and plenty of ducks and wildlife wandering about. Friday evening started from 8.00-10.00pm with a debate on the Agenda and then answers to written questions (about 80 in all) which had been sent in on all aspects of Church life, and answered by the Chairman of the relevant Board.

The Synod meets in the Central Hall and the normal hours were 9.30am-1.00pm, 2.30-6.00pm and 8.00-10.00pm, so it is quite a long day, with masses to read and digest. We were fed extremely well with a full cooked breakfast, and waitress-served dinner which was difficult to finish before the evening session if you were having an interesting conversation.

On Saturday morning we had a further debate on the Turnbull Report. I got the impression that the Church Commissioners were prevaricating over the small points, but it is all going ahead. After that there was a debate on the use of C of E premises by other faiths. In the afternoon there was a debate on the relations with the Moravian Church, and this was followed by a debate on the report "Youth a Part', and this was followed by a Private Member's Motion on World Mission. Sunday morning was given over to a full Eucharist in York Minster, with a sermon by Dr Hope and coffee afterwards. The Minster is about three miles from the Campus, so I was lucky to get a lift in and out. After that Pat Nappin (Diocesan lay-Chairman) had arranged a private lunch for all the Chelmsford Members to meet our new Bishop, The Rt. Rev. John Perry. Everybody I spoke to said we were very lucky to have got him.

Sunday afternoon was taken up with a debate on the "Mystery of Salvation" a report for which we had earlier been split into study groups. The rest of the day was spent on Liturgical business and a motion on Rights of Presentation which was withdrawn.

Monday was taken up with financial business: the reports of the Central Board of Finance and the Church Commissioners report, and the report of the Pensions Board for clergy pensions. In the evening there was a well attended debate on the National Lottery, and a motion was passed overwhelmingly urging the Government to look into ways of improving it. The most divisive issue at this session seemed to be whether Churchwardens should be restricted to six years in office, with a two year break before being eligible again for re-election. In the end this was passed by a narrow majority.

The last debate was on the Council for the Care of Churches This was of particular interest to me as St. Marys, Little Bromley is a Conservation Trust Church, and I feel strongly that it should be used more often than it is. It was felt that Churches should be preserved as living Churches, and not just preserved in aspic for the sake of preservation.

I greatly enjoyed my long weekend in York, and if anybody would like to find out anything, or ask any questions about the Church, do let me know about three weeks before the next General Synod Meeting which is at the end of November, and I will send them in. (Questions are restricted to three per member) *Bill Walker*

KITCHEN CORNER

At this season of the year, there are normally plenty of beans around, so here are two recipes including beans.

Ham MousseServes 5-6loz caster sugarl level tablesp dry mustard½ teasp salt & pepper to taste3 beaten eggs6 tablesp vinegarPacket powdered gelatine (½ oz)3 tablesp water¼ pt. single cream½ lb cooked ham, minced or finely chopped½ lb cooked french beans (or asparagus)Mustard and cress to garnish

Mix together sugar, mustard, seasoning and eggs. Bring vinegar to the boil and whisk into egg mixture. Return to pan and cook gently till thick. DO NOT BOIL or it will curdle. Dissolve gelatine in water in a basin over hot water then add to sauce and mix well. Allow to cool then stir in cream and ham. Add half the beans roughly chopped, turn into greased mould or dish and chill till set. Turn out and serve garnished with rest of beans and the mustard and cress.

Creamy beans with carrots for 4

 $^{1\!\!/_{\!\!2}}$ lb carrots scraped and sliced; 1 lb prepared runner beans, sliced

2 tablesp oil; 1 tablesp chopped mint; 2-3 tablesp fresh or sourced cream

Put carrots in a pan with a little water to cover, salt and pepper. Bring to boil, cover and simmer for 5 minutes. Drain off a little of the water, add beans and oil. Mix well, bring back to the boil, cover and cook gently 10-12 minutes. Stir occasionally. When tender, drain off liquid, add mint and cream and turn into hot dish to serve. *Jill Frostick*

The Bromley Messenger October 1996

Towards the end of October we will be holding the annual All Souls Requiem at Ardleigh and the Evensong of Remembrance at Gt. Bromley. This is an important occasion in the life of our parishes, for we all need a time when we can pause to remember those whom we have loved but see no longer. Few Christians need encouraging to pray for our dead. The relationship that has bound them together with us is so deep and the place that they still occupy in our hearts so real and vital that we naturally want to commend them to the care of Almighty God.

While there is no example recorded in the Gospels of Jesus actually praying for the departed we can be certain that as a devout Jew he would have done so. We are told that Jesus prayed in the synagogue often, where, according to Jewish practice the faithful departed would he

remembered. Judaism has even today some especially beautiful prayers for the dead in its sources. In the Daily Prayer book we read "0 Lord and king, who art full of compassion, God of the spirits of all flesh, in whose hand are the souls of the living and the dead, receive we beseech thee, in they great loving kindness the soul of.... who hath been gathered unto his/her people. Have mercy upon him(her) transgressions. Oh shelter his(her) soul in the shadow of they wings" Moreover on the inscriptions of Christian catacombs we find simple prayers for the dead, clear evidence that the earliest Christians prayed for their departed relations and an encouragement for us to follow their example. I record two such inscriptions:

"O Father of all, take unto your being. Irene. Zoe and Marcellus whom you created to you be glory in Christ." (Catacomb of Priscilla dated c. AD75)

"Blessed Jozon gave back his soul aged nine years. May the true Christ receive your spirit in peace, and pray for us" (AD80)

Can I then encourage you to let me know of any relative that you would like to be remembered and prayed for in our services. There is a form in the magazine for you to complete and return or alternatively you can add the name to the list in church. The services that we held last year were very poignant and moving. I do hope that you will wish to use this opportunity to express your continued prayerful concern for your loved ones in this way.

KITCHEN CORNER

Homemade chutneys are an excellent way to use surplus fruits - plums, green tomatoes, . windfall apples and pears can all be ingredients for this.

One of my favourites is:-

MARROW AND RED TOMATO CHUTNEY

4 lb ripe tomatoes, peeled and chopped

1 lb prepared marrow (or pumpkin)

 $\frac{1}{2}$ lb onions, peeled

 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz salt & pinch cayenne pepper

12 oz sugar

³/₄ level teasp each: paprika, ground cinnamon, allspice and cloves, ground mace ¹/₂ pint malt vinegar

Mince marrow and onions (or chop very fine) and put in the pan with tomatoes, ground spices and salt and pepper. Cook slowly, simmering uncovered for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours. Dissolve the sugar in the vinegar and add. Simmer until thick (about 20 mins.). Pot and cover. This makes about 3 1/2 lb of chutney. Leave at least three months before eating. Jill Frostick

Proposed Wimpey Homes Development

The public meeting held on 6th September was very well supported. Approximately 150 people attended from the Parishes of Great Bromley, Frating, Little Bromley, Great Bentley, Little Bentley, Elmstead Market and Colchester Borough. The members of the meeting were

unanimous in their opinions that the proposed "Wimpey Homes" development is inappropriate for this area. The reason for objecting to the "Wimpey Homes" proposals, which were discussed at the meeting, are as follows:

1. There is no local need for this development. The population of the Tendring District is in fact declining.

2. Current road and rail networks insufficient (Essex County Council are supporting initiatives to reduce home to work travel.)

3. The development will be of no benefit to the local community.

4. There is already high unemployment in the Clacton and Harwich areas.

5. Much of the land in this area is high grade agricultural land.

These objections have been forwarded to the Chief Executive of Tendring District Council and a request has been made that the views of the local community are given consideration by the Planning Committee.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on 10th October in the Village Hall.

<u>THE FOLLOWING IS AN EXTRACT</u> from the sermon given by the new Bishop of Chelmsford, The Rt. Rev. John Perry on 15th September at his Installation in the Cathedral. Taking as his text I Cor.2 v.2, the Bishop preached the message of the Cross that is our hope in the world of the late twentieth century, in which there is little to hope for. Our country faces immense problems. Our society is increasingly fragmented by the breakdown of the family unit, violence, the alienation of the young, and the new God of upward mobility and self.

A firm supporter of the decade of Evangelism, the Bishop called for a priesthood of all believers that could use the gifts of the laity to serve our local communities and country. Our churches must be open, and oases of rest and welcome. A locked church gives the message that God, like the local corner shop, has gone out of business. God is very much in business. People are living in a moral vacuum, and are hungry for a spiritual dimension to their lives, and we must be ready to provide it. Christian communities must be beautiful places where people can receive healing and strength and the weak are cherished. Our Church must seek to evangelise or die, for Prayer and Mission go hand in hand. The Community of God's people must seek to restore vision to our country and play their part in the life of our nation. The gospel demands that every part of a nation's life be governed by righteousness, and rooted in the cross. This confidence can only be in the power of the Cross that gives life in death, strength in weakness, and through the poured out Spirit of the risen Christ.

The Bromley Messenger November 1996

This year we will be having a joint Remembrance Service at Gt. Bromley on 10th November at 10.35am. It will involve parishioners and servicemen from Alresford, Elmstead, Ardleigh as well as The Bromleys. As there become fewer and fewer that have experienced warfare and small parishes are able only to mark the occasion in a fairly intimate way it is good to be able to gather together with others so that our services can have that sense of something deeply significant happening and being remembered. The custom of marking Remembrance Day dates from the cessation of hostilities in World War I which took place at 1 1.00 am on 11th November, 1918. This came to be observed by participating countries on the same day and at the same time, and was known as Armistice Day. Commemoration was marked at War memorials with the laying of wreaths and two minutes' silence. Naturally in 1946 after the Second World War it seemed the right and proper thing to commemorate the dead in both wars. In church circles, and indeed outside, the whole subject of Remembrance Day services can be the focus of heated debate. There are those who believe that such services do not in fact promote peace but rather fuel the nationalism and jingoism that can cause war and discord in the first place.

Others will say that the time that has elapsed since the Second World War means that the moment has now come to let the service and all the memories that it brings lapse and fade in the interests of peace and reconciliation and the desire to stress the positive relationships between nations since the last war.

On the other hand the bringing to peoples' minds of the horrors of warfare and the sad taking of young life on battlefields of air and sea may shock people into an awareness of what happens when discord and disharmony grow. It ought to have the effect of making people realise how vitally important the work of all those who work for peace is.

I came across this very moving prayer recently. It was written by an unknown prisoner in Ravensbruck Concentration Camp and left by the body of a dead child. It shows how even in the midst of the worst horrors and cruelties of war, (which men and women should always strive to avert with every fibre of their being), something extraordinary spiritually positive and life enhancing can be wrought. It directs us to that inner attitude of forgiveness and love which speaks of true inner liberation and freedom. "0 Lord, remember not only the men and women of good will, but also those of ill will. But do not remember all the suffering they have inflicted on us: remember the fruits we have bought, thanks to this suffering - our comradeship, our loyalty, our courage, our generosity, the greatness of heart which has grown out of all this, and when they come to judgement let all the fruits which we have borne be their forgiveness. *The Rector, Fr. Trevor Diaper*

In Little Bromley a housing survey will shortly be carried out by the Parish Council to identify whether or not there is a need for this type of housing. If a need is identified, then a plot of land will be sought and the normal planning procedures will take place. The District Council, however, will allow building on agricultural land outside the village envelope for the purpose of affordable housing only. (Six houses have been given approval in Great Bromley and construction will commence shortly.) Public consultation will take place if a housing need is identified. The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on 21st November, 1996.

DANCING RAISINS

YOU WILL NEED:

A few raisins (Not too large)

A large jam jar. A bottle of lemonade or carbonated water. INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Three quarters fill a jam jar with lemonade.

2. Drop a few raisins into the lemonade. They will sink to the bottom of the jar.

 WAIT a while and soon they will start to rise and fall. The raisins have started to 'dance'.

HOW IT WORKS:

The carbon dioxide in the lemonade forms bubbles of gas on the surface of the raisin. This affects the raisin by reducing

its total weight. It will then rise to the surface where the bubbles burst with the result that the weight will increase again. The rising oand sinking will continue until the amount of carbon dioxide left in the lemonade is no longer enough to affect the raisins sufficiently.

KITCHEN CORNER

MEAT BALLS These are a little fiddly to make but really worth the effort!

Sophie Grigson's Tender Pork balls with tomato and goat's cheese. Serves 4-6

For the meatballs: 25g breadcrumbs, milk to soak, 340g minced pork, 1tbsp chopped oregano, 1 tbsp chopped parsley, salt & pepper, 2 teasp kecap marins or Soy sauce (optional) oil for frying

For the sauce: 1 chopped onion, 2 chopped cloves garlic, 2 tbsp olive oil, 2 tins chopped tomatoes, 1 tbsp tomato paste, 1-2 teasp sugar, 8-10 shredded basil leaves, 100g diced goat cheese, salt & pepper

Soak breadcrumbs in milk 10 mins. then squeeze dry. Mix with other ingredients and roll into little balls the size of hazelnuts. Fry in oil (enough to cover base of pan) over medium heat till browned and cooked. Drain on kitchen paper.

Make sauce -fry onion and garlic gently in the olive oil, add other ingredients except basil and cheese. Reduce to a thick sauce, then stir in basil. Put meat balls in a shallow dish, spoon over the sauce and scatter cheese over the top. Bake 200C 30 mins till bubbling. Serve hot with bread and salad.

I have also made this very successfully using beef mince and cheddar cheese. Children might prefer the meatballs minus the sauce and cheese. *Jill Frostick*


The Bromley Messenger December 1996

The message of Christmas has been heard so often that we can easily forget what an extraordinary message it contains and the significance of this message for the world. I suppose it is inevitable that when we all find ourselves rushing around present buying, party going and making sure all the cards have been sent, we find little time or energy to reflect on the deep things of God upon which many traditions of this time of year are founded. When you think of that first Christmas, then as now, many people were far too busy with their own concerns to pay much attention to the birth of a child to a couple who could not get proper accommodation and who were forced to spend the night in an outhouse or stable. It was only those who allowed themselves time to be made aware of things spiritual that realised that God was doing something remarkable. As they pondered further they found that they should respond and share the love that God had shown them. Churches of all persuasions are usually full for the main celebrations of the Christmas season. It is the one time in the year when people visit their Parish Church. As a Rector I am of course delighted that the churches in the parishes are well attended at this time, but hope above all that the music, the readings, the celebration of the sacrament and unique atmosphere will take people out of themselves so that for a moment they begin to realise a perspective they might otherwise be unaware of. For in the story of God becoming man in the life of a little baby in Bethlehem we are minded of God the Creator of the universe and of time itself who wants to identify with each one of us. A God who wants to share our joys and sorrows and who can given the deepest meaning to being human. Moreover it shows us the importance of the family as a place of spiritual nurture and development, when we consider the way in which Jesus shared in the life of his family and came to maturity within it. CAKE YOUR OWN CHRISTMAS BAKE

INGREDIENTS

1 cup sugar	1 cup butter	4 large eggs
l cup water	1 tspn baking soda	1 tspn salt
l cup brown sugar	2 cups dried fruit	juice of 1 lemon
nuts	1 bottle whisky	5

nuts METHOD

Sample the whisky to check the quality. Take a large bowl. Test the whisky again. To be sure it is of the best quality, pour one level cupful and drink it. REPEAT.

Turn on the electric mixer, beat one cup of butter in a fluffy bowl. Add one teaspoon of sugar and beat again.

Ensure whisky is still O.K. Cry another tup!

Turn of the mixerer. Break 2 leggs and add to the bowl and chuck in the dried fruit. Mix on the turner. If the dried fruit gets stuck in the beaterers, pry it loose with a drewscriver. .Sample the whisky to check for tonsisicity. Next, shift 2 cups of salt or something! Who cares? Try the whisky.

Now sift the lemon juice and strain your nuts. Add one table. Spoon of sugar or something. Whatever you can find. Grease the oven. Turn the cake tin to 350 degrees. Don't forget to beat off the turner. Throw the bowl out of the window, sample the whisky again and go to bed. When sober, go out and buy a fruit cake. It's cheaper, but not so much fun!

KITCHEN CORNER

I recently went to a W.I. demonstration of how to make good homemade sweets. Here is the way to make your own easy mint crisps. The children can have fun doing these! First find a tray that will fit in your fridge. Line it with polythene, or waxed paper from a cereal packet. Use good quality chocolate (Bournville or similar). Melt this slowly over hot water (not boiling) making sure the basin fits tightly over the pan and the bottom does not touch the water. If you have real peppermint oil use this, 4 drops only. Otherwise make do with essence but the flavour is less good. Make sure the chocolate is not hot, only warm, then stir in 2 tablesp of granulated or demerara sugar. Drop teaspoonfuls on to the tray smoothing them out into neat discs. Put the tray immediately into the fridge for 10 minutes only. This makes about 20-25 sweets. They will keep well and stay crisp!
