

## LITTLE BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

- 1. In an effort to encourage as much interest as possible in our community an Amenities Committee has been formed. They have laid down their objectives for the coming year and will need our support if it is to be successful.
- 2. Objectives for the year 2002
- a) It was agreed that Little Bromley is a delightful village, and that the committee's objective was, in essence to leave the core as it stands. However, there are many areas in need of improvement and that we should take a fresh look at both Little Bromley and its neighbouring villages to get some ideas for cosmetic improvements such as the "In Bloom" which neighbouring parishes have undertaken successfully. Areas such as the War Memorial were identified as key examples. b) Building on community spirit within the village was identified as a key objective, especially with issues such as the opening of a new Village Store and Post Office. The varying skills and time of Little Bromley residents could be utilised in any fund raising efforts, with the key being reinvestment into the village. In short, the objectives for 2002 are to find out what Little Bromley residents want, how much support they are willing to give and to use any money raised in a tangible way to show immediate enhancements for residents and visitors to our village.
- 3. Fund raising ideas. The ideas discussed included:
  - Golden Jubilee celebrations a street party followed by evening entertainment with a traditional community theme,
  - Monthly Little Bromley raffle/lottery, possibly something based around the village shop when it opens.
  - Quiz Night at the Fox & Hounds.
  - Bi-annual themed family events in addition to the family events for occasions such as Christmas. Easter, Halloween etc.

The main problem at this time is a use of premises/land for any events. With this in mind, it is planned to produce a community questionnaire, asking for Opinions, ideas and support. This could be delivered in December, for return in January 2002 and should prove invaluable in establishing our objectives for the future.

## LITTLE BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

Little Bromley Parish Council met on 24th November.

**Government Sponsored Training in the Rural Communities** The meeting was addressed by guest speaker, Jenny Hinton who represented the Government Sponsored Training in the Rural Communities. This represents an excellent opportunity for the over 25s to enhance their education, gain experience and skill certificates at the same time. The Council will find a venue for this training so that registration could start as soon as possible.

**St Marys Churchyard** The organising of work parties to assist with maintenance and general upkeep of the churchyard is being addressed and is one of the projects for the Amenities Committee.

**Amenities Committee** An amenities committee has been constituted and met recently. This is a big step forward for the village and maximum support for their efforts will be required. It was agreed that the present contribution for the upkeep of St Marys Churchyard be increased from £130 to £230. The current bill for this task, currently heavily subsidised by the PCC of The Bromleys, is about £800.

**Dangerous Parking** Mention was made of the dangerous parking at the Lawford Adventure Centre. It was suggested that the local council should be approached to see if any improvements could be made.

**CORRESPONDENCE** between Major Heaney, Chairman of Gt Bromley Parish Council and Tendring District Council

# Planning Application No. 01/01892I/AGRIC - 2 Agricultural Buildings Field Adjacent 2 Hall Cottages, Great Bromley

From Major Heaney to Mr J Hawkins of Tendring District Council, 3 December 2001 Our council was dismayed during our meeting with your Mr Lifford when he informed us that the 28 day expiry date had elapsed for the above application thereby making it impossible for those who will be affected by the proposal to be informed in sufficient time for them to lodge their objections. That a Mr Moss, a resident of Brightlingsea, should be legally entitled under current rules pertaining to agriculture to build two large buildings on a 31.5 acre field, which he recently bought in our village, would suggest if common sense were to prevail, that the rules needed to be changed. The field, adjacent to 2 Hall Cottages on Hall Road, lies alongside the B1029, the main road through our village and is very close to the heart of Great Bromley with its Cheshire Home, beautiful church and of course, many residential properties. That apart, the buildings will be an eyesore and spoil a visual amenity enjoyed by everyone who lives in and passes through our village. Great Bromley Parish Council understands that Mr Moss intends to keep free-range pigs on the 31.5 acre field and to install corrugated iron huts as shelter for the pigs. It seems he will not require planning permission for these eyesores nor indeed to keep pigs so close to the centre of the village. Pigs cause obnoxious smells and generate flies. These will be a nuisance and a discomfort for everyone living nearby. For these reasons our council strongly objects to the planning application.

From Mr Bill Newman of Tendring District Council to Major Heaney, 6 December 2001 Under the terms of the Town and Country Planning (General Permitted Development) Order 1995 the operators of agricultural holdings have certain permitted development rights which enable them to carry out agricultural developments on agricultural land without the need to obtain full planning permission. I believe these may be the "rules" to which you refer in which case they were ratified by Parliament. In this case the farmer may erect buildings in certain locations and of a certain size and he is only required to notify the local planning authority of his intention. The local planning authority then has 28 days to determine whether or not prior approval is necessary. If the Council resolves that a full application is necessary it is in effect a refusal which means that it may be the subject of an appeal. As you say the 28 day period does not allow adequate time to notify interested parties and indeed there is no requirement to do so. We place such applications on the Parish List so that at least you are aware of them. The restricted time also means that there is little time for any negotiation. Turning to the other points you raise, agricultural buildings erected under such a procedure may not be used to accommodate livestock as part of an intensive rearing enterprise. You refer to "free range" pigs and "pig arks". Generally speaking these are not regarded as buildings that require any planning permission. If however the operation causes nuisance in terms of smell or flies then the Councils Environmental services may be able to take action

## DO YOU KNOW OF ELSIE MILDRED WILLMORE (nee STEADY)

I would be very grateful to hear of any information regarding the whereabouts of Elsie Mildred Willmore (nee Steady) who was known to have resided in the vicinity around the 1940/50s. She had lived in other areas of the Tendring area and was born in 1912. She is thought to have lived in Orchard Cottage near the Fox & Hounds, Little Bromley and her parents, James and Edith Steady, with some of her brothers and sisters were known to have lived in temporary Post-war housing in Great Bromley. It is known that Elsie Mildred also had certain connections with Ardleigh. If anyone has any information or photographs of the above I would be very pleased to hear from them. #### KITCHEN CORNER

Two recipes from North America to start the new Year! A warming drink, ideal after a walk or instead of morning coffee on a cold day.

#### HOT SPICED CIDER

4 pints cider (or use apple juice if non-alcoholic is preferred)

1 cup brown sugar 12 whole cloves 4 cinnamon sticks  $1\,\!\!\!/\!\!\!\!/\,$  teasp allspice

Put all in a large pan, boil several minutes. Garnish with lemon slices.

#### **CANADIAN APPLE SLICE**

For the dough: 8 oz SR flour; 6 oz butter; 2 oz caster sugar; 1 large egg.

Filling: 1 lb cooking apples; 3 or 4 oz caster sugar; 1/2 teasp ground cinnamon.

Rub butter into flour, add sugar and beaten egg to bind, using a fork. Turn onto floured board and knead lightly till smooth. Rest Dough 20 minutes then roll half to fit a square or oblong tin (7" x 11"). Grate prepared apples on top, sprinkle with mixed sugar and cinnamon, add a few raisins if liked. Roll remaining dough to fit top and seal edges. Bake 1 hour 325F. Mark in squares when cold and sprinkle thickly with icing sugar. *Jill Frostick*

Due to falling numbers it is no longer viable to run the pack with the result that the decision has been taken to suspend the unit with the hope that it will be reopened in the not too distant future. Therefore the remaining six girls in the pack are looking to join existing packs in the area. Also Groovy Chick is now in the last year of her Art degree and wants to devote more time to this, but hopes to come back into guiding at a later date. I will continue to run the Manningtree District as District Commissioner. *Brown Owl*



# THE UNITED PARISHES OF ARDLEIGH AND THE BROMLEYS



Dear Parishioner. A happy and blessed 2002 to you and yours! January is the time for preparing the Annual Reports and accounts and meetings, for looking at the past year and preparing for the New one. The Church is no different to any other organisation. indeed as a Charity we have to follow certain procedures and produce an Annual Report. The Church of England is a strange institution-in many ways! The one I'm particularly thinking about is that it is one of the few institutions that exists primarily for those who aren't members. The whole of the country is divided up into parishes, no where is left out. Sometimes the boundaries are pretty obscure and occasionally can be changed. Everyone has a legal right to be baptised, or have a funeral, and if there is a graveyard be buried, at the Parish Church. You can be married in Church too (unless you are divorced and your previous partner is still alive, when it is more complicated). The Church is open during the day for you to explore, for you to use as a place of peace, a place that has been set apart in the village for hundreds of years for meetings with God. It is your Church. On an institutional level the Church of England does have members. people who have made a commitment to a place of worship. Every six years a new membership list - the Electoral Roll- is created and this happens in 2002. To join the Roll. you have to be baptised, and be at least sixteen; you must live in the parish or have attended regularly for at least six months. In turn that qualities you to attend and vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM). If you think you'd like to be a member please collect a form from Church. To be a member of the Parochial Church Council you have to be on the Roll, Confirmed, and a regular Communicant. During the next few weeks the Church Secretary - will be writing to all existing Roll members inviting them to be on the new Roll. The Church does give guidelines as to what it expects of her members. Weekly worship is central to our life and all should try to attend one of the Sunday celebrations. Members should receive Holy Communion at least once a year, one of which should be Easter. The Church relies upon her members for the day to day running of Churches and to pay for the ministry of the Parish Priest. Members are encouraged to give financially regularly and efficiently (i.e. taxpayers using Gilt Aid). Belonging to a Housechurch, the MAGI or Sunday Church Club, subscribing to the Benefice News, and opportunities For daily public worship, are local initiatives designed to strengthen Christian fellowship and understanding. The APCM this year will be at 7pm February 20th. Copies of the Annual Report for 2001 will be available before the meeting. Amidst all of this paper and regulations I have to keep sight of the main reason that I am here! The bishop placed me here four years ago to offer daily worship to God; to care for the souls of this parish: "to minister to the sick, prepare the dying for their death; to teach and admonish, to feed and to provide for the Lord's family, to search for his children in the wilderness of this world's temptations and to guide them through its confusions, so that they may be saved through Christ for ever." Though a somewhat daunting charge, I know from past experience, here and in other places, that having "the cure of souls" can also be a source of great blessings for me and others. May these blessings continue to be experience for all in our church and parish throughout 2002. *Fr Nicolas*.

## ST GEORGE'S REPAIR FUND - A PROGRESS REPORT

As regards English Heritage, 2001 brought us a serious disappointment. They recognise the great architectural and historical importance of the church and the enormous financial problems faced by a parish such as ours in seeking to maintain such a building. This is shown by their past financial support, which has been crucial in enabling us to complete not only the recent repair of the two western bays of the double-hammerbeam roof but also our previous repair of the tower. As regards each project they contributed 40% but unfortunately our new application for grant in respect of the next phase of work, comprising principally the remaining bays of the roof structure and the repair of the parapets of the north aisle, has been rejected. It had to be made under the new Joint Grant Scheme for Churches and Other Places of Worship, administered by English Heritage and the heritage Lottery Fund in partnership. As the church is listed as Gracie I it seemed reasonable to suppose that the information gained during the completed part of the work (which showed that because of decay the hammerbeams of the two western bays were no longer adequately supported by the walls of the nave) would be a sufficient measure of the urgency of the high level works in Phase II. Regrettably, however, English Heritage reluctantly found it necessary to give even greater priority to other applications. They received some 350 similar applications from across the country, with a potential cost of more than £30 million, whereas their available budget for such applications was at most £9 million. The best they have been able to do for us is to keep available the so far unclaimed balance of their original grant offer, but then only on condition that it is fully taken up by 28th February 2004. If we are to meet this condition we will need to begin the Phase II work in April 2003 and the earlier months of 2003 have to be used for the procurement of the necessary consents and tenders. It follows that we will need to collect the rest of the necessary money, being no less than £70,000, by the end of 2002. In the absence of further financial support from the Joint Grant Scheme, and in the light of all the other financial burdens on the Parish of the Bromleys, the raising of £70,000 before the end of this year will obviously be a tall order. We hope that it will not be beyond us, but it is clear that even our best local efforts will not enable us to achieve our target without substantial assistance from external charities. GCG Environment Trust (Bucbricks) has agreed to make a further grant of £10,000 in addition to the grant of £5,000 which they kindly made towards Phase 1. Anyone who has potential access to other sources of funds should please let a member of the Repair Committee know about it. We need all the help we can get! John Clapham

## KITCHEN CORNER

## **BROCCOLI AND CHEDDAR SOUP** (one of Michael Barry's recipes)

1 medium onion, peeled; 170g/6 oz peeled potato; l tbsp. sunflower oil; 454g /1lb broccoli; 852ml /  $1\frac{1}{2}$  pts chicken stock or water;  $\frac{1}{2}$  teasp sugar; 170g /6oz mature cheddar, grated; Salt and pepper;

Chop onion and potato roughly and cook gently in the oil in a roomy pan. Trim the broccoli and cut the stems into 1 cm / ½" slices. Add these to the pan and season generously. Fry for 5 minutes. Reserve half the broccoli florets and add remainder to pan, add water or stock and simmer for 20 minutes. Add remaining florets and the sugar. Cook one minute only, then liquidise or process. Pour into a soup tureen, sprinkle on the cheese and stir gently till melted. Serve with rolls or crusty bread. *Jill Frostick* 

#### GARDENER'S CORNER for FEBRUARY

Welcome to a new year of gardening in the hope we do not get too waterlogged! if you were given the pot plant Solanum (Winter Cherry) for Christmas you can propagate your own seedlings by taking one of the ripe berries, open it and lay the seeds on a piece of kitchen roll to dry. When dry plant in pots - 6 or 8 seeds to a pot. Once they have their first true leaves, grow on until they are approximately 2" high then pinch out the growing tip which will give you a nice bushy plant. When they start to flower stand the pots outdoors so that they can be pollinated, leave outside all summer but bring them in before the frost arrives. LILIES: Can be planted this month in tubs and containers. ROSES: At the end of the month lightly prune to stop the wind rocking the plants, this causes a hole to appear at the base of the roses - firm this in to stop water collecting in the hole. Give all borders a general fertilizer such as Growmore. *Frank Griffiths*

#### Dear Parishioner

Lent is a time of growth, like spring, only spiritual growth. Christian people use the season to get closer to God, to deepen their self-knowledge, and to reach out to their brothers and sisters. It is a time for the opening of Bibles and discovering more about what is revealed there; a time for making space in busy lives to be with God in prayer; a time for sharing fellowship with other Christians to give and receive encouragement in this earthly life.

#### WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Our February speaker, Mrs Barbara Faulkner, came along suitably attired to tell us about Hat Pins and called her talk "Ornament or Armament". Hat pins became popular in Victorian times around 1850, when the fashion was for women to wear their hair arranged on top of their heads. This meant hats, which everybody wore at the time, were just sitting on the top and needed something to hold them in place. In Edwardian times hats were much larger and needed two hat pins, which were called "companions".

Early in the 1900s, a problem arose because hat pins could be used as a weapon or protection. People started to keep a hat pin underneath their lapels or a spare one in their umbrella, for protection. In Germany, they were banned unless they had a protective little cap to cover the sharp end. A law was brought in and the poor used mostly a piece of cork or potato. Hats were smaller and hat pins became shorter in the 1930s and 40s. Mrs Faulkner showed us her collection of hat pins and the containers they used to be kept in on dressing tables, with suitable holes, looking similar to a candlestick. They were very decorative, large and small as the fashion changed through the years. There was also a factory, Morrells of Redditch, which made as well as hat pins, pins, needles, fish hooks and surgeons needles, which is still there today and is open to visitors. Another manufacturer was Homer, who made silver items. Mrs Faulkner had certainly researched her subject thoroughly.

#### KITCHEN CORNER

This recipe for a spicy fish dish can be prepared in advance so would be good for a dinner party. The ingredients given are for 2 servings, so multiply according to numbers required.

Thai Salmon Filo Parcels Mix together: 1 teasp grated fresh ginger; grated zest of one lime; 1 crushed garlic clove; 1 tablsp chopped coriander leaves; 1 small spring onion finely sliced. Stir in juice of one lime. Preheat oven gas 5/375F/190C

2 salmon fillets (4-5 oz each) 4 sheets Filo pastry (12" X 7" approx)

Brush a filo sheet with melted butter. Place another on top and brush lightly; Place salmon near one end. Season and Sprinkle with half the mixture. Fold short end of pastry over salmon, fold long sides inwards, fold over twice and trim

off any surplus to make neat parcel. Brush with melted butter. Repeat with second salmon fillet. Bake the parcels 20-25 minutes till brown

#### GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council has given consideration to the following planning applications and their comments have been forwarded to the District Council.

**Guildhall Orchard, Mary Lane North** Erection of a conservatory. No objections to this application.

**Pond Farm, Hall Road** Change of use from riding school to trade showroom for the sale of garden furniture etc. Great Bromley Parish Council strongly objected to this application as the proposed retail and trade outlet is unrelated to agriculture. The Parish Council was also concerned about the number of large vehicle movements to and from the site as the entrance to Pond Farm is on a bend in the road.

**South Bank Recovery. Rectory Road** Continued use of site for vehicle breakdown recovery. The Parish Council objected to the continued use of this site for the following reasons:

- 1. The occupants of nearby dwellings have complained strongly about noise emanating from the site at all hours of the day and in the early hours of the morning.
- 2. The noises are inconsistent with what purports to be a business for the recovery of light vehicles.
- 3. Maintenance of vehicles takes place during weekends i.e after 1.00pm on Saturday and on Sundays i.e. outside the permitted hours.
- 4. Engines are left running and revved for long periods during the hours of darkness making sleep difficult for nearby residents.
- 5. Frequently large articulated vehicles are allowed to use the site for parking.
- 6. Work is being carried out on vehicles other than within the buildings.
- 7. Council has been informed that the site is used for the tuning of vehicles other than the firm's recovery vehicles.

It is clear that South Bank Recovery have not adhered to the conditions imposed on them on 18 July 2000.

The next meeting will be held on 28th March in the Village Hall at 7.30pm.

<u>LITTLE BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL</u> The next meeting will be held on 21st March in the Methodist Chapel, Chequers Road, Lt Bromley at 7.30pm

The Trustees of Church Lands Charity have done much to keep the Parish church in good repair. They have left behind a memo dated 13 December 1866. It reads:

"The South Aisle having been thoroughly repaired and new leaded at an expense of £285." The West window has lost several diamonds in recent gales, etc. Again the Trustees footed a bill in 1858. The account book says -

"Mr Edward Norman and Mr Carrington Nunn advanced on account of the new West Window, being in bad repair .£116 - 17s- 4d."

Carrington Nunn lived at Little Bromley Hall. He was a banker, trading as Nunn & Co, at High Street, Manningtree. The bank was open from 10 to 4 daily and 10 to 1 on Saturdays. Cheques were drawn on Barnett, Hoares & Co., London.

The Misses Eliza and Maria Nunn lived in Mistley Thorn. Thomas Nunn, junior, also a banker, lived in the handsome Lawford House. Part of Lawford Parish belonged to Carrington Nunn. Carrington then Thomas became Lord of the Manor of Little Bromley. Thomas was a J.P. and owned Great Bromley Lodge in the 1870s-1880s. The Lodge was described as "a handsome building, pleasantly situate and commanding fine views". Thomas died in 1888. A memorial window in the south aisle of Great Bromley church was erected to T.W. Nunn's wife and depicts *Faith, Hope and Charity*. Carrington Nunn was a celebrated fox hunter and had one of the best packs of hounds in Essex in the early nineteenth century. He built the National School, Little Bromley in 1839 and it was donated to the parish by Thomas William Nunn of Lawford House for some 80 children and was in Church Road.

Edward Norman was a maltster, corn, seed, oil cake and coal merchant and ship owner at Mistley and lived at Mistley Place. The Norman family owned many acres of land in Little Bromley. *John Appleby*

#### FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Parishioner, Lent began early this year which meant our post Christmass diets had hardly chance to kick in before it was time to it give something up! For the Christian this six week season is a time of spring clean if you like, that has three disciplines, prayer, fasting and almsgiving, to give guidance and structure.

- **1 Prayer for the good of your soul.** Sunday, being the day Jesus rose from the dead. is a special day of prayer for Christians. Gathering together to give time and praise to God on the first day of the week, it is a reaction to how we see God being part of our lives and to give thanks for that. Christianity is not simply a one day a week affair. Day by day, through reading from the Bible and trying to spend a little time in prayer Christians seek to deepen their relationship with God. We do it to gain a sense of earthly peace but also because we believe it will bring us one day face to face with God.
- **2 Fasting for the good of your body.** For Christians the body is created by God and so is something good. What we do to and with our bodies isn't always the same. Fasting seeks to redress the balance by abstaining from food, tobacco or drink. If I'm feeling less sluggish or my mind is sharper then I'm more likely to become aware of God, more aware of my neighbour. Going without a meal once a week to identify with those who don't have enough to eat, by feeling for just a while what it is to be hungry, can move the experience as well. On a different level 1 might fast from the television, or from gossiping, or from being negative. I can seek to fast from whatever I understand to be polluting my good body, made in the image of God.
- **3 Almsgiving for the good of your neighbour.** The money I save from fasting I give away. That takes the fasting experience on from mere self to involve another. This year our savings are going to help the African hospital of Katate with whom Ardleigh has had a connection for forty years. Just as my prayer has a communal aspect to it on a Sunday, so my being able to make a little sacrifice to help others in a big way is very much part of the Lenten journey. So, come Easter Day, my relationship with God will be a little deeper, I may be a little leaner or healthier to respond more readily, and I may have helped someone less fortunate than myself to have a better dignity of life. Sounds a good Lent to me and so worthy of seven weeks of celebrating the joys of Jesus Risen from the dead. May your March be one of fasting and feasting, and may God bless you in that. *Fr Nicolas*.

## GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the parish council was held on 21 February.

**Noise Pollution from A133 Road** In response to the Parish Councils request for more tree planting along the A133 to help reduce traffic noise, Essex County Council will carry out a noise survey when the weather improves.

**Land to Front of St Georges Close** The Parish Council has taken over the responsibility of grass cutting from the County Council. The first cut will take place in mid March. The feasibility of planting some trees on this plot of land is being investigated.

**Recycling Bins on Church Meadow** The recycling bins continue to be well used. A tin can recycling bin has been requested from the District Council but it is unknown when this will be delivered.

**Street Signs** There are several damaged street/road signs in the village. These have all been reported to the County Council for repair.

**Fly Tipping** Refuse dumped in Mary Lane North and Stone Road has been reported to the District Council for removal.

**Village Seat, Brook Street** Mr Taggart of Brook Farmhouse, Brook Street stated that the village seat and litter bin, which have been in situ for many years, are on his property and he requested their immediate removal. The Parish council has removed the items for safe keeping whilst the County Council checks the boundary line situation.

## PLANNING APPLICATIONS

The following planning applications have been considered by the Parish Council and their comments forwarded to the District Council.

**4 Park Cottages, Mary Lane North** Two storey side extension and alterations No objections to this application

**The Old Courthouse Inn, Harwich Road** Erection of five chalets for bed and breakfast Great Bromley Parish Council objected to the above planning application as it is over development of the site and not in keeping with the environment.

**Seven Rivers, Hall Road** Non-compliance with Condition 3 imposed upon planning permission TEN/670/74 Great Bromley Parish council agrees with the removal of the restriction imposed 5 upon planning permission TEN/670/74 restricting occupation of the bungalow to employed staff, providing the bungalow remains the property of Cheshire Home and not sold by them.

Land north west of Manheim Auctions, Colchester Road, Frating Change of use of existing redundant agricultural land to provide car parking area. Great Bromley Parish Council objected to the above planning application for the following reasons:- \* This is designated agricultural land and should not be used for other purposes. \* It would set a precedent by allowing it to be used as a car park. \* It would not be in keeping with the surrounding area. \* It would lead to light and noise pollution. \* It would be an eyesore. \* Covering approximately 11 acres of land to provide a hardstanding would cause surface water drainage problems and possible flooding.\* The land is not redundant. The fact that the owner, a farmer, has sold it does not mean that it is redundant agricultural land.

This application is contrary to the District Council's planning policy regarding the preservation of agricultural land and green field sites. The next meeting of Great Bromley Parish Council will be held in the Village Hall on 25th April at 7.30pm

#### KITCHEN CORNER

**APPLE MERINGUE** This is my version of this popular pudding. Very quick and easy to make. For 4 people you will need 4-6 cooking apples, peeled cored and sliced. Cook them in a pan with a knob of butter and very little water, till soft enough to beat to a pulp. Off the heat, beat in 2 egg yolks. Whip the egg whites with 2 tablesp of sugar till very stiff. Put the apple mix in an ovenproof dish and spread the meringue on top. Bake in the oven 7-10 minutes till browned, or under the grill if preferred. Serve with custard or cream and hand shortbread biscuits to eat with it. - *Jill Frostick*

#### GARDENERS CORNER for APRIL

Spring is well on the way now - time to think of bedding plants. The PLUG PLANTS are now on sale at the Nurseries which are a good buy and reasonably priced. These can be transferred into pots and placed in the cold frame until the end of April when they can be planted out. HANGING BASKETS: This month is an ideal time to prepare them. Once you have planted them up leave in the greenhouse for a week to get going then they can be left out once all danger of frost is over. - BEGONIA TUBERS: These are now in the Garden Centres and can be set in trays of moist compost about 2" (50mm) apart with the hollow tops level with the surface of the compost. Soon you will see the pink buds starting to appear - once they are about ½ inch (12.5mm) high they can be repotted into 5imch (126mm) pots. When all danger of frost is past they can either be planted out in the garden or left in the pots to bloom. *Frank Griffiths*

#### THE UNITED PARISHES OF ARDLEIGH AND THE BROMLEYS

Dear Parishioner, Holy Week and Easter are the climax of the Christian year. Following on from Lent, the "Great Fifty" days mark out what it is to be a Christian - that the person whom Christians believe to be God, having been prepared to die on the cross, is brought back to life. The first followers of Jesus were so convinced of this that they were themselves prepared to die rather than deny their new faith. Many of them were put to death for their belief in what is called the Resurrection, and so the body of believers actually grows in numbers as many more are convinced. This demonstrates that for a Christian it is important to have a personal relationship with God, one that will give courage and strength in times of need and more than that a sense of peace from doing what one believes to be right. Down the ages countless men and women, most of them unknown, have "kept the faith", often in difficult circumstances sustained by a personal relationship with their God. We tend to call these people the Saints, but by giving them a capital S, we lose sight of the original meaning that all the followers of Jesus are called to be saints, called to be holy. Called to witness in the world to the love and mercy of God through faithfulness, acts of mercy, a thirst for justice and the truth. There is an ancient painting that of Jesus risen from the dead, standing on the open tomb holding out his hands; in each of his hands he is holding a wrist of a person. The picture depicts Jesus calling the dead by name and literally dragging them from death to new life. This is an image that has strengthened and encouraged countless men and women through the centuries; that because of their faithfulness one day God will call them by their name and drag them into a new life with him; a life that will know no pain or grief or sadness, only peace and joy. For some it is a hope that comforts them in grief especially if a loved one has been taken away at a young age or at an untimely stage. For others it creates a greater picture. making some sense of the things of this world.

All of this may seem simply an individual way of life, but it has been demonstrated from the earliest of days that this is to be a group experience, a group of saints joining in a church. Not every day will I be feeling confident and strong in my faith, be able to sing the hymns with gusto, say loud Amens, and receive Holy Communion with a glad heart. So I join with others knowing that on my low days others will be able to carry me on, in the knowledge that it may be my turn to carry or see others through in the future. The Church is the local community of Christians, individuals trying to live their lives in the light of Jesus risen from the dead. On my own I shall get discouraged and fail, as part of the Church, I can be weak or grow strong, but will not fail. So even when the celebratory chocolates are eaten the Church will still be singing Alleluias, be celebrating Jesus' promise that all who believe in Him will live forever. All services, offerings of worship, are open to visitors, who desire to be known by God and called to new life in him. May the Churches here be blessed in responding to him and so bring some peace to our world. *Fr Nicolas*.

## The Bromley Messenger May 2002

After my paternal grandparents married they moved in about 1893 from Bowness on the Solway to London where my father was born the following year. My grandfather, who was a teacher used to return to Bowness most summers and my father, being the eldest, usually kept him company. The journey was made by bicycle up the Great North Road, which passed the end of the road where they lived, camping where they could on the way. In later years the journey was made by motorcycle, with or without a wicker side car, and rarely without incident. As a result my father had a love for Cumberland which remained with him throughout his life. For my part I still have a vivid pre-school memory of nights in a caravan parked in a quarry beside the road at the summit of Dunmail Raise. The quarry was on the opposite side of the road and to the north of King Dunmail's cairn placing it just in Cumberland. The cairn remains as Dunmail's last resting place but the quarry has disappeared with road improvements. (The AA Man who patrolled that part used to stop for a chat and a cup of tea made with water from a spring off the fell beside the road which turns into Dunmail Beck).

We have recently visited Cumbria again to stay in an apartment forming part of the house where my wife's great uncle used to live. More Westmorland than Cumberland but the fells were as ever enhanced by exceptionally good weather which highlighted their beauty, to which we are not so accustomed, to the extent that one can be seduced into forgetting the totally different beauties of East Anglia. The Solway has its similarities with the Essex estuaries with cattle grazing the salt marshes and I am told that neither the haaf netter for salmon nor the Essex farm boys went out without "a nail, a knife and a piece of string". In Essex I gather that Sixpence for the phone eventually replaced the nail.

We returned to Great Bromley in time for the dedication of the statue of St George in the church. The strong sense of community which we experienced both then and at the funeral of Robert Harding two days later forcefully reminded us as to how easy it is to overlook both the blessings we enjoy within our own community and the beauty that surrounds us when confronted with the unaccustomed. - *GRMH*

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## ROBERT LIONEL HARDING 11 July 1918 - 6 April 2002

Robert was born in 1918 in Harpenden, the son of a noted local surveyor. At Bedford School he was a rower and even in the last years of Parkinson's his grip was as strong as ever. He joined the Territorial Army in the 1930s and went to Singapore in 1942 where he was captured at the time of its fall. As a prisoner he worked on the Burma-Siam Railway (later known as the Railway of Death). He suffered greatly there but came through with his spirit unaffected and ready to forgive the Japanese for their cruelties because, he said, they treated their own men no better than they treated us prisoners. His was a generous spirit.

After the war he qualified as a surveyor and came to work for Fenn Wright in Colchester. He had a passionate commitment to the training and development of surveyors throughout the Eastern Counties and pioneered regional training events that were copied throughout England. Known first as Harding's Circuses and then the Want To Know organisation, these events continue. He chose the title "Want to Know?" and it was very appropriate. He always wanted to know about everything. Not only that but he always had ideas on how to develop and bring together people and organisations. Sometimes he left us far behind but there always was a clear point and a wise argument, often an awkward truth.

He was always in the thick of the action. Bromley Cheshire Home, which he helped to found, the church, the Village Hall committee - all these benefited from his unstinting expenditure of time and effort. Nor were his enthusiasms and commitments purely local. He was involved with many regional organisations and his work on behalf of the surveying profession was recognised by his election as President of the Land and Rural Practice division of the RICS.

Robert enjoyed life and he had a great love for the East Anglian countryside. He also loved dancing and often he and Jean would dance all Friday night before returning with the dawn to Colchester and the market. Just weeks ago at a Jazz Night in the local Village Hall he was to be found in his wheelchair on the dance floor in the thick of the action. Nothing daunted him - or Jean who was a vital source of his strength. They met on a blind date in June 1946 at a dance for returning heroes and were married by December - beginning a partnership that was to develop and deepen for 55 years.

He was an inspiration to many and will be much missed but I would like to end not with loss and sorrow but with three immensely practical tools that for me symbolise Robert. The first is a surveyor's tape - the symbol of his profession. Each year with the help of his children he transformed vast fields in Bromley or Lawford into inch-perfect Showgrounds for the Tendring Hundred Farmers Club.

The second is a Dictaphone - I picture him in the car charging back to the office after a farm visit, dictating as he went: he never stopped. Just recently he bought three new Dictaphones to overcome the problem that no-one could now read his once clear and bold handwriting - a significant hindrance to communicating his plans and ideas.

The third has to be a corkscrew. He loved to entertain and good food and wine were always a part of the pleasure at the vast range of Harding Spectaculars.

It was a good life to the end. God bless.

The Walsingham Organ helps St George's Hammerbeams
The mystery surrounding the destruction of the Walsingham organ with gunpowder on bonfire night in 1866 provided Alistair Cording with the inspiration for this splendid play, so well presented by Eastern Angles. Although set around that event in Victorian times, the production made excellent use of a whole range of conflicts which occur in every age. Not only social and economic but also the pressure for change, without regard to the

feelings of others no matter how well intended, and the reaction to such change. The cast of four

played the seven characters with lively enthusiasm, skilfully making the transition from pipe smoking shepherd in a smock who played some discordant instrument in the church band to the cultured governess in the "big house", or from squire to simpleton as the plot required. Harsh economic circumstances and social difference lead to neither the local farmer and builder nor the squire's brother, the incumbent, achieving their ambitions their collaboration turning sour after a promising start. If you missed the performance in the Village Hall you missed a treat. If you did see the Eastern Angles I am sure that you will be hoping that it will not be too long before they return to Great Bromley. *GRMH*

# GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

**NEIGHBOURHOOD COMPLAINTS** A case has recently arisen within the village concerning a company which had temporary permission to carry on a business before they then applied for permanent consent. On this occasion, although no written complaints had been made within the previous year, the Planning Officers at Tendring were made aware that there had been problems with disturbances to neighbouring residents involving noise and light pollution and working outside the permitted hours with the result that only 3 years consent was granted. In these situations the District Council will take into account any complaints made by residents, between the time consent was first granted and the time a renewed application is made. It is most important, therefore, that residents register any complaints in writing with the District Council giving as much information as possible: dates, times. occurrences etc. and to copy correspondence to the Parish Council and the District Councillor. If this is not practicable, residents should keep diary notes of all disturbances, breaches of trading conditions, obnoxious smells etc.

**PLANNING APPLICATIONS** The following planning applications have been considered by the Parish Council and their comments forwarded to the District Council.

**The Caravan Carrington Road**. Sewage treatment plant, shed for toilet, washing machine etc. Retention of wall and additional curtilage. No objections to this application subject to the removal of development rights on additional curtilage.

**Schiehallion. Hall Road.** Two storey extension. No objections to this application.

**Little Paddocks Frating Road.** Change of use of display area to tea room. The Parish Council objected to this application on the grounds of highway safety as access is dangerous. It is also over development of the site.

**Pond Farm Hall Road.** Construction of new vehicular access from Hall Road (31029) The Parish Council objected to this application on the grounds of highway safety. The current existing vehicular access is sufficient for current permitted use of the buildings. The new access will over develop the site.

**Field adjacent to 2 Hall Cottages. Hall Rd**. The Council repeats it dismay of the intention to develop this site as a pig farm.

Land to the rear of Atlantis, Brumbella. and Old Police House, Chase Road. Change of use from agricultural use to garden curtilage. No objection subject to the removal of development rights on the additional curtilage.

The next meeting of Gt Bromley Parish Council is the Annual Parish Assembly and will be held on 16th May in the Main Hall of the Village Hall at 7.00pm.

# GARDENER'S CORNER FOR APRIL

ROSES: Spray roses to guard against aphid attack - don't wait until you are infested. CHRYSANTHEMUMS: Plant outdoor flowering plants early in the month - stop plants about the middle of the month.

DAHLIAS: Plant out young dahlias from cuttings. keep some protection ready in case of frost. ANNUALS: Plant out half hardy annuals after risk of frost has passed. Sow biennials such as Canterbury bells, foxgloves, sweet william and wallflowers.

HOUSE PLANTS: water more freely - give a weekly liquid feed.

1 tblsp olive oil; 550g (l  $\frac{1}{4}$  lb) diced shoulder of pork; 2 teaSp cumin seeds; 1 chopped onion; 450g (llb) red cabbage shredded; l cooking apple, peeled cored and sliced; 1 tblsp brown sugar; 1 tblsp wine vinegar; 25g (1 oz) raisins;  $\frac{3}{4}$ pt stock

Heat Oil in pan and brown meat lightly. Add cumin and onion and cook a few minutes. Stir in rest of ingredients, bring to the boil. Cover and cook moderate oven 350F 180C for 1 hour or until meat is tender. Serve with jacket potatoes. *Jill Frostick* 

# WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

At our April meeting, Mrs Linda Elliot came along to tell us about her job as a Family Support Supervisor for the National Stroke Association. It is the only charity solely for Stroke, which 100,000 people suffer each year. She is based in Clacton and visits patients who have just returned home after suffering a stroke. She finds out what the persons needs are, as no two strokes are the same. The patient's carer is also looked after and are encouraged to talk about their needs. The Association is also working towards prevention, as some of the causes of strokes are due to family history, high blood pressure, diabetes, smoking, obesity (this is on the increase), age, heart disease, inactivity (10 minutes moderate activity per day is beneficial), alcohol (over indulging), high cholesterol and salt. Some people suffer from several tiny strokes. Mrs Elliot gave her talk in a very pleasant way; she also brought along many information leaflets for members to take home.

# The Bromley Messenger June 2002

This month we celebrate the ascension to the throne of Queen Elizabeth II with her Golden Jubilee. I was three when she came to the throne and as she said in her address in Westminster Hall many changes have taken place since then in our society, in technology, in the family. Fashionwise I remember that in the 50s once my elder sister had left school and went to work, she made using her hard earned money stunning, colourful dresses out of yards and yards of material with flounces of net beneath to ensure that the skirt stuck out in direct contrast to the austerity of the war years. I was a teenager in the mini and maxi years of the 60s making the transition from stockings to tights as the hemline went up. I too made my clothes in all the colours of the rainbow wearing earrings with bells that tinkled as I moved. My brother, slightly younger, wore his hair long, a music student he went about in winter in an old fur coat - very un-pc today! However we dressed there were still dress codes and everyone adhered to them how much easier than today when "smart casual" is suggested on an invitation - what exactly does that mean? I learned to type on a typewriter. My daughter learned on a computer. My sons practically cut their teeth on Sinclair computer games connected to the TV and both they and my husband are proficient at typing. We have all learned to use the new technology for work for designs in engineering, for creating computer programmes, accounting, for art, and even producing this magazine. We seem to be totally dependent on this particular type of technology noticeably so when it is "down" as well as the ubiquitous mobile phone in a way unimagined 50 years ago. A woman's role has also changed. In 1967 when I went to work in London the man running the training course for the new secretaries said that he didn't know why be bothered as we would all be married within two years. That kind of remark did not go down well with us then with our changing attitudes to our role in society. Just imagine how it would be received today! The changes in farming over these years are mirrored in the poignant account written by Mr Golding on page 4. It looks as though the face and role of the community in Great Bromley is about to change again and I wonder if, despite all the technological progress of the past 50 years, whether it is all entirely for the better. *LMH*

#### A FARMER'S TALE

It is with much reluctance, sadness and regret that we have had to come to the decision to sell our family of cows. Grandad Grey bought Wright King's Farm from Walter Seabourn's family in 1942 for my parents when they were married. The dairy herd was started with three cows which Dad brought with him from his parents' home farm in Peldon together with two heifers bought at the Seabourn's farm sale. During the war Dad was in the Home Guard. One of his favourite stories was of being arrested at the end of Park Road when going on shift because he didn't know the password. He was released when the commanding officer arrived and asked "What have you arrested him for, he's the one who supplies our milk".

In the early years when cows needed a service Dad would walk them three miles up to see the bull belonging to Mr Wagner who lived and farmed where Dean's Nursery now is. All the resulting heifer calves were kept to build up the herd. The introduction by the Milk Marketing Board of a daily visiting AI service provided a selection of bulls only a phone call away. For the young first time cows he would choose a smaller Aberdeen Angus all black polled bull for easier calving whilst the other cows had the choice of some of the best British Friesian bulls in the country. In those early days an AI service cost around £1 for the first service and if the cow needed a repeat service three weeks later it was free of charge up to three free repeats. In the 40s/50s corn and sugar beet were grown with kale for winter feed and grass for grazing. George Lock was employed as a farm worker until he retired followed by Roly Bantick. 200 chickens laid lovely brown eggs in two nissen type sheds. Pigs too were kept but only three sows at any one time. Miss Leek from Thorrington used to bring her boar to service the sows. She parked her car and pig trailer at the end of the drive and the old boar would slowly waddle up to the pig court to do his job, not always successfully. Sugar beet was cut out of the rotation in the early fifties to allow more corn to be grown. The corn was sown by Dad using a little old Massey Harris drill with Derick Richardson from Ardleigh coming to combine it with his little Massey combine. Corn was grown until 1974. By then more grass needed to feed the dairy herd of about 30 cows.

I started working on the farm in July 1965 when I was 15. One of the first cows I looked after was 8 months old "Snowdrop". She calved regularly, within a few days every year, for 12 years producing 11 heifer calves (most of which went on to continue the herd) and just one bull calf. Around the same time we had "Stock" who produced 12 calves in 8 years having four sets of twins and four singles. Sadly one set of twins was born dead. There was "Marvel" in the 80s who produced triplets with her first calving, the only set of triplets we ever had. More recently we have had "Lupin", a dear hard-working honest cow, one of Snowdrop's grand-daughters who produced four of her 11 calves on the 5th October in different years, 6 of her other calves were born within 14 days either side of the 5th. Sadly 11 was one too many for Lupin. The last calf died days before birth and despite veterinary attention Lupin became ill and died. In the 70s big changes were made. The milking parlour was modernised in 1971 so as to cut out the need to carry 3-4 gallon buckets of milk front parlour to dairy. A 12 tonne bulk feed bin was put in place next to the parlour - no more need to carry bags of feed about. A refrigerated bulk milk tank was installed in the dairy eliminating the need to lift 16 x 10 gallon milk churns about each day. A tractor with a fore end loader was purchased, a new cow cubicle house was built with each cow having their own bed and new feed racks/bins were bought. Cow numbers peeked at 57 during this time before the A120 sliced 10 acres of land off the corner of the farm and demolishing our home at the corner of Hare Green. We had to reduce cow numbers to around 35 with less pasture, Mum and Dad were nearing the end of their working lives, my wife Joy was rushed to hospital and milk quotas were introduced, ours based on the years when we had to reduce cow numbers. Milk production was therefore less. Big bale silage, although more expensive, was made instead of hay which provided far more feed from a first cut in May with a second cut of silage or hay 6-8 weeks later in a good year.

Despite fears the price of milk improved peeking at 26p a litre in the late 80s. They were the good days as everything has gone steadily downhill since with each year bringing the worry as to whether we would be over our milk quota which resulted in a fine of up to 32p per litre for all over quota milk produced. A decision to lease extra quota to avoid the fine had to be worked out before the end of December for the quota year which finished at the end of March. For the last 20 years we have had about 35 cows and all we have ever wanted to do was to make a reasonable living for an honest day's work but with the milk price dropping as low as 15p a litre, calf and cattle prices depressed, increased expenses, new rules and regulations introduced. paper work to keep up to date, there is no time to do the work which matters i.e. milking, feeding, mucking out every day, plus the seasonal work, silage/hay making, straw baling and

carting, calving cows and muck spreading. The latest restriction involves muck/slurry spreading which we are not to be allowed to do if it is raining, snowing or the ground is wet or frozen. When is the land dry enough in October. November or December, the traditional time for spreading muck on grassland. It has become too much physically, mentally and financially to carry on.

So as I stated at the beginning reluctantly, sadly and with regret most of our family of cows will leave us on 7th May and be sold at Uttoxeter Market on the 8th and we will become just another of the growing number of ex-dairy farmers. We will be left with seven so called unsaleable cows which I intend to milk for a few months to provide milk for 15 beautiful, boisterous young. mostly bull, calves we have at the moment and when the cows milk dries up, they will have to be slaughtered. It will be very lonely without them, but after working virtually every day for close on 37 years, apart from the odd illness and 10 days' honeymoon holiday in 1973 with one Christmas off through illness in 1969, maybe I've earned the chance to take it easier *P.W. Golding*

# The Rector and this Wife and Family

You will already have read about the Revd Ralph King, Rector of Little Bromley from 1579 to 1611. He was very diligent in obeying the instructions of Queen Elizabeth I'Os ministers to copy out the paper registers on parchment from at least 1558, when the Queen ascended the throne. or from 1538; when Thomas Cromwell ordered that church registers were to be kept. Ralph's wife was named Jane and he sorrowfully recorded -

"Jane Kinge wyf of Raph King (buried) xx March 1584"

The same registers notes -

"Relf Kinge, p(ar)son of Little Bromley, (buried) 8 June 1611".

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#### KITCHEN CORNER

# **STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE** (serves 6-8)

8oz (225g) SR flour, 1 level teasp (5ml) baking powder, pinch salt, 1 egg, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> pt (125 ml) double cream 3 oz (75g) butter, 3 oz (75g) granulated sugar, 11b (500g) strawberries 2oz (50g) caster sugar

Sift the flour, baking powder and salt into a bowl. Rub butter into mixture until resembles fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the granulated sugar. Beat egg and add sufficient to the bowl to bind mixture together. Turn on to a lightly floured surface and knead until smooth. Press mixture evenly into 7" (18 cm) greased sandwich tin. Bake for 25 mins until golden brown at 375F, 190C or Gas Mk 5. Cool on wire rack. Wash strawberries and reserve 6 - 8 for decoration. Hull and slice the remainder. Sprinkle them with caster sugar. Whisk the cream until stiff. When the cake is cold, slice in half and sandwich together with half the cream and half the strawberries. Pipe two circles of cream on top of cake. Place remaining strawberry slices in the centre and decorate with the whole strawberries.

# **CHILDREN'S CORNER**

#### LOOPY GLIDER

How to make a simple loopy glider to fly on the summer breeze. Half a sheet of A4 paper (10cm x 30cm)

Sellotape

2 paper clips

A plastic straw

- \* Fold the paper in half lengthways and cut along the fold
- Cut one of the strips in half (widthways) and discard one piece. You will be left with one short strip and one long strip.
- Make each strip into a separate loop and secure with sticky tape.
- Use the paperclips to attach the loops to each side of the straw. The short side of each strip goes inside the straw.
- To launch the glider, project it forwards with the smaller loop first. With a bit of practice, the glider can fly quite a long way.

## BUMBLE-BEE ICE

75g caster sugar 3 tbsp water water biscuits chocolate drops 100g plain chocolate 2 scoops vanilla ice-cream sliced peaches

- ⇒ Break the chocolate into small pieces. Put them in a bowl and add 3 tablespoons of water.
- ⇒ Heat some water in a saucepan until it gently bubbles. Place the bowl over the saucepan. The heat will make the chocolate melt.
- ⇒ Turn off the heat and remove the bowl. Stir the chocolate until it is smooth.
- ⇒ Put two spoons of ice-cream one behind the other, in a separate bowl. These are the head and body.
- ⇒ Carefully pour the chocolate sauce over the body and top of the head. Put 3 peach slices firmly on the body to look like stripes.
- ⇒ Add the water biscuits to make wings.
- ⇒ Finish off your bumble-bee by adding two chocolate drops to form the eyes.

P.S. Your sundaes will have to be made quite quickly, so that they don't melt. As you finish them, put them in the fridge or eat them straight away.

# RANNY'S TANNER

At about 19 or so I lived on my own in London. Sometimes it was a frightening time when I hadn't enough money to pay the bills or buy food. Fortunately I survived. but being in debt is a scary time for anyone. Like many of us who were present at St Georges APCC meeting in February; I have been alarmed and disturbed by the fact that for one reason or another the finances at St Georges are in a pretty poor state. Our costs exceed our income; we're just not paying our way. Whichever way you look at it we don't seem to be making ends meet. However careful the Rector and his finance team are with the housekeeping: however much support our fund raising activities bring in, the books still don't balance. For some years we have been dipping into the Accumulated Fund to meet our costs; so much so that if we continue to do this. in a couple of years - or less - we shall be bankrupt. An emotive way of putting it perhaps, but a very unpalatable reality.

Now let me tell you a cautionary tale. Last week I went by train to visit my grandchildren. It was a while since lunch so when the trolley came round I bought a chicken tikka sandwich. Big Mistake. It tasted of nothing and it cost me £2.60 (besides leaving horrible sticky goo all over my fingers). On the second stage of my journey I bought a magazine. Another Big Mistake. In spite of interesting-sounding articles it was mainly advertisements and I'd read all I wanted in five minutes. It cost £2.85. Then a sudden thought struck me. I'd wasted £5.45 on rubbish - food I couldn't eat, literature not worth reading .. and these thoughtless, utterly casual purchases each came to more than I put in the bag in church each week.

I remembered with some chagrin a story that the Rev. Ransom told my parents years ago about an old lady parishioner - not hard up - who stopped him at the end of the service one Sunday. "I missed the collection bag" she said. Taking out her purse she gave him Sixpence. A tanner. I can still remember the wry look on Ranny's face as he told us. We get in a mind-set don't we? 6d in 1946 was about the same as a pound or two is now - you'd certainly have got change from a sandwich! And yet the spiritual nourishment the church gives us is so much more than a sandwich or a mag full of ads. It surprised me to learn that the largest part of St George's income over the year is "Collection in Church" This vital Contribution is desperately needed for us to pay our way and the plain fact is that we are just not giving enough. Next time I am tempted to put in only a couple of pounds I shall remember Ranny's tanner! *Caroline McShane* 

# THE UNITED PARISHES OF ARDLEIGH AND THE BROMLEYS

Dear Parishioner, This year the theme is Choose life! And all the money you donate will be passed on to Christian aid for their projects. Ama Kale lives in Ghana, married to Samuel she has six children and a baby called Enonam. Ten years ago Ama used to grow food for her family from her small piece of land. Then trouble came. A large company that grows pineapples took the land from her. Tractors arrived and destroyed her crops. She was left with her family and had to beg by the side of the road. Christian Aid works with an organisation in Ghana called the development action association. In Ama's village they have taught people better ways of farming, cooking and using machinery. They also lend people money to start their own business. Through Christian Aid the DAA helped Ama to start a business. She buys maize and cooks it to make kenkey (a kind of porridge I first experienced in Willesden Green!) Ama sells the kenkey to people for their lunch. She still has to work very hard, but now she earns money and can buy food for her family, and pay for her children to go to school. Many of you will have experienced hardship maybe through redundancy or the plight in agriculture so will know what it's like to have people who care and can help in practical ways. Last month we celebrated the Rogation Blessings at Badley Hall Farm, our opportunity to get out and ask God for his blessing on our land and lives. Whatever you decide to do with your Christian Aid (you can return it to church or the Post Office which ever is more convenient) I hope it will be a reminder of blessings received and offered. # The Bromley Messenger July 2002

<u>A VISIT TO ITALY</u> A few days after my husband, Robert, died, a long loved friend of mine of a Huntington's Disease family, with whom death is sadly an all too familiar friend and visitor telephoned me. She invited me to join her (Catholic) parish group for a week, who were shortly going on a holiday to a monastery not far from Rome. And I thought, with some trepidation. "Why not?"

So I left behind all those daunting documents and duties which pile up after a death, to join 25 people, mainly from the Cheltenham area together with their parish priest and was warmly welcomed. The coach from Fiumicino airport climbed up over the Albano lake. leaving us at Palazzola, an ancient Cistercian monastery of chequered career. Comparatively recently it was the HQ for the Germans of the area in World War II. Some very beautiful paintings still remain, from the hand of the German Medical Officer. on the walls of the Dining Hall. Needless to say, the swastika outside on the building had been removed.

Later it passed into the hands of the English College in Rome, which I understand is the "Eton" of training for R.C. priests. The young aspirants would come there in the heat of the summer, when travel back home to the UK. or anywhere was not so possible. Now it is a place of quiet and beauty welcoming travellers of all denominations, still run by three nuns of daunting authority, but hardly cell like in its facilities. Hospitality was bountiful with good food, an abundance of local wine flowing and comfortable bedrooms. There were always interesting evenings in the bar or lounge, often with visiting young priests-to-be, bringing lively debate and at times hilarious entertainment.

The lake formed from an extinct volcano, lies serenely below, and across from my window I gazed upon Castel Gandolfo, the summer home of the present Pope. Adorations, masses and evening prayer followed their quiet routine in the chapel attended by the nuns but totally optional to us. I joined in happily, welcomed by all, with my particular circumstances remembered graciously. Afterwards we decided where we would go and what we would do. Indeed a great programme was devised - a trip to the beautiful Ninfa Gardens, a rambling beauty of a 20th century garden sprawling over medieval buildings, resonant of the Heligan gardens: a pause at the remarkable Benedictine Abbey of San Sebacio where Benedict lived in his cave thereafter founding his great Order with the Abbey above (the paintings adorning the walls are magnificent); a springtime walk amongst the asphodels, orchids and cyclamen through the woods high above the lake; market day in the local town of Albano; or to the awesome catacombs. It was all there to tempt one. Then there was the great Rome outing where we wandered and wondered at the Coliseum and the Pantheon, and of course on to the vast and memorable St. Peters and St John Lateran, the Cathedral of Rome and St Paul Outside the Walls, and to be amazed as we walked at the magical fountains. And what of the ancient Port of Rome, Ostia Antica, surpassing even Colchester Museum!, a town where Roman life seemed still to be present, the domestic daily life of shopping at the fish market still clearly evident with the mosaics alive with fish decorations, or the butcher's slab where one could almost smell the fresh meat being chopped.

And so, refreshed and renewed with sunshine and prayer, peace and companionship. we returned to a life now different for me. And here I would like to say how moved and grateful we were as a family at the love and generosity we received at the Saint Georges celebration weekend, culminating in Robert's funeral. So much friendship and support: the singers, the flowers, the food and the many many people, all representatives of the life we lived as a family for over 50 happy years in Great Bromley.

P.S. I didn't comeback a convert! But perhaps I feel more at ease hailing Mary at little more often, and praying for closer unity between our churches! *Jean Harding*

LITTLE BROMLEY AMENITIES COMMITTEE - RESULTS OF SURVEY MARCH 2002.

The Little Bromley amenities survey was commissioned by the committee to assess the needs of the village and its residents. We had planned to use some of the funds already held to host a fundraising Golden Jubilee party. Around one hundred questionnaires were compiled and delivered throughout Little Bromley, but unfortunately we only received eighteen in return. Of those questionnaires we did receive, the results almost unanimously supported the starting up of an amenities committee and the desire for changes and improvements within Little Bromley. *OF THOSE QUESTIONED:* -

94% supported a Jubilee event and/or Barbecue

67% would attend a regular Quiz Night

55% would support a village lottery scheme

The majority wholly supported the idea of improving certain areas such as the memorial site, the car park and the installation of a village sign. What was evident was the urgent need for a recreational area within Little Bromley, and the committee will continue to look at ways of achieving this.

# WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

For our June gathering, President Mrs Jill Frostick held a short business meeting and then handed over to Mrs Rene Roberts who convened the Annual Members' evening with a committee consisting of Mrs June Willgress (Secretary), Mrs Barbara Hall (Treasurer) and Mrs June Malcolm. Mrs Roberts welcomed everyone present and asked the Secretary to read the minutes of the meeting in 2001, which were agreed and signed. Mr Oxley from the Walton & Frinton-on-Sea Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) was introduced by Mrs Roberts, he was accompanied by Mrs Oxley who looked after their souvenir table. Mr Oxley gave a very informative talk about both the history and present day role of the RNLI. In the 19th Century, there were lots of small villages around our coast who manned boats to rescue sailors or fishermen in distress independently, regardless of their own safety. In 1864, a Mr Hillary from

the Isle of Man, gathered everyone together and started the national organisation we know today as the RNLI. Walton & Frinton-on-Sea held their first meeting in 1884, their first call was on Christmas Day, returning on Boxing Day. Coastguards inform Lifeboat crews of each incident, using sophisticated equipment these days. In the past, men would have only been able to see to the horizon, whilst today with radar and radio links they are able to communicate much further. Also, crew members are provided with bicycles to enable them to reach the lifeboat at the end of Walton pier within 13 minutes day or night. Oxleys have been members of this lifeboat crew since the 19205. Mr Oxley is currently secretary, as was his father and uncle before him. The RNLI is a charity and relies solely on donations which brings in £1m per annum, one of the top four in the country. At the end of his talk, Mr Oxley invited a volunteer to come up and help him demonstrate the clothing that is worn. Mrs Ann Jones agreed - she looked very fetching in the trousers and jacket even though they were a trifle large! Mrs Roberts gave. a vote of thanks to Mr and Mrs Oxley, saying she has always wanted to know more about the RNLI. This month on 3rd July, we are holding our Golden Jubilee Party and are looking forward to seeing all members of the Friendship Club and Senior residents of Great Bromley who would like to join us at 7.00pm in the Village Hall. SHRUBS: Take semi-hard cuttings of Camelia, cistus, ceanothus, escallonia, hydrangea and pyracantha. HEDGES: Do not let hedges get out of hand, trim little and often. CHRYSANTHEMUMS: For large blooms reduce stems to six and begin disbudding. DAHLIAS: Tie in young shoots - if long stems are required for cutting disbud some of the side Shoots, leave only the strong terminal bud. # CHOCOLATE COURGETTE CAKE

7 oz plain flour ,1 teasp baking powder,  $\frac{1}{2}$  teasp bicarbonate of soda  $\frac{1}{2}$  teasp salt. 4 oz caster sugar - Sift these into a bowl

2 eggs, 6 fl.oz vegetable oil - Beat together and add to bowl

6 oz good quality plain chocolate, melted, 8 oz firm courgettes, peeled weight, grated,

2 oz finely chopped nuts - Add these to misture

Divide mix between 2 x 8inch sandwich tins that are well greased and floured. Bake 25-30 minutes, 180C till well risen. Cool 5 minutes before turning out on to wire rack. When cold, sandwich together with your choice of filling. Cream cheese is good, or a choc butter cream etc. *Jill Frostick*

# ARDLEIGH SURGERY NEWS

Ardleigh Surgery has been approved as a GP training practice with Dr Owens as the approved Trainer. GP training practices train doctors, normally those working in hospitals, to gain experience and learn the skills of being a general practitioner. There are five other training practices in the Colchester area. Becoming a general practitioner is seen by many hospital doctors as an interesting career path rather than training as a consultant in a particular specialist area of medicine. GP Registrars are assigned to training practices for a year. However, owing to the shortage of doctors, training practices might not have a GP Registrar assigned every year. The practice will therefore, have a GP Registrar starting in August, Dr Sayomi Gunawardena. Dr Gunawardena, born and educated in Colchester, works currently as a doctor in Colchester General Hospital. She is looking forward to joining the practice for a year. The examination room has been converted into a fourth consulting for her use. However, at times Dr Gunawardena will also be using the other consulting rooms. Ardleigh Surgery is also to become a Practice Nurse training practice. Sister Kate Strowbridge has trained to become a Practice Nurse Trainer and will start teaching other nurses wishing to pursue a career in general practice later this year. We are sad to inform patients that our other practice nurse, Sister Kirsten Horsler has had to give up permanent employment at Ardleigh Surgery, to care for her child who is not well. Insurance Companies and others sometimes require an inventory of goods. The Incumbent and Church Wardens are also responsible for keeping an inventory of church items. Little Bromley's Rector, Mr H Crossman, left his list in the Parish Register. It reads:

"An account of the Goods, Utensils & Co., belonging to the Church of Little Bromley in the year 1741. H. Crossman, Rector.

A new Wainscot communion Table; A Fine Crimson cloth; A new Linnen (sic) cloth. A Napkin; A Silver Plate escallop'd for a Paten; A Silver Cup and flagon; A Pewter Flagon;

A Crimson cushion and Vallant for the Pulpit and a vallant for the Desk, the same as the Communion Table cloth; An old Green cloth cushion; A Surplice and Hood; A Common Prayer Book; A Bible (deleted!); An old Book of Homilies; A new cover to the Font; Three Bells A Bier & He(a)rse Cloth

You will note that the "vallant" is in today's language a "valance" which is a short curtain round a frame or canopy of a bedstead, over a window, etc (OED). Today's list should read:

A silver Cup, weight 9oz 6dwt, date 1803. Marked under the foot "Little Bromley".

A silver Paten, weight 3½ oz, undated, No marks.

A silver Flagon, weight 27oz 7dwt, date 1807. Marked PB over WB for Peter and William Bateman.

A silver Almsdish, weight 8oz 16dwt, undated. No marks but inscribed "Little Bromley Church, 1741, given by H. Crossman, Rector"

In 1607 Robert Baker, Church warden, told the Archdeacon that there was no "stope" for the wine. In 1683 communion vessels are given as "A Chalice of Silver and Cover with a Rose on it" but there was a need for "a flaggon and Patten of pewter". In 1707 the silver "Cupp and Cover" feature in the return. There was still no flagon. The Almsdish was no doubt from Mr Crossman\*s household goods. *John Appleby*

# KITCHEN CORNER

This month is runner bean time! Here is a slightly different way to serve them.

# **CREAMY BEANS WITH CARROTS** for 4 people

½lb young carrots, scraped and sliced, salt and pepper.

- 1 lb runner beans, prepared and sliced, 2 tablsp oil
- 1 tablsp fresh chopped mint
- 3 tablsp fresh or soured cream.

Put the carrots with a little salt and pepper in a pan and barely cover with water. Bring to boil, simmer 5 minutes. Drain off a little of the water, add beans and oil. Mix well then bring back to the boil. Cover and cook gently 10-12 minutes stirring occasionally until just tender. Drain off the liquor. add mint and cream mixing lightly. Turn into a hot dish and serve at once. Jill Frostick

# ST GEORGES CHURCH REPAIR FUND

When writing to charity trustees to ask for funds I have been sending them copies of this magazine. I feel sure that they are likely to be better disposed towards us if they know that the church serves a lively community, and there can surely be no better evidence of this than the monthly contents of "The Messenger". Another thing which influences the decisions of trustees must be the extent of local fund raising. Here again I do not think that the Bromleys can be faulted, and in particular we must acknowledge the very generous personal contributions made to the Fund in memory of Robert Harding. who served it for so long and so devotedly. As regards grant-making bodies, the first half of 2002 has been encouraging, GCG Environment Trust (related to Bucbricks) have agreed to increase from £10,000 to £12,000 their offered contribution towards Phase II of the works - especially generous, when one remembers that they also made a contribution of £5,000 towards the cost of Phase 1. Another magnanimous contribution of £5,000 has come from the Garfield Weston Foundation, "with the best wishes of the Weston Famil". Many people may not know that Mr Curry Weston, who died earlier this year. was a noted philanthropist. He was frugal and discreet, on the ground that "money only attracts envy and weird people". We have also gratefully received a contribution of £200 from Allchurches Trust, a charity which owns the v

Ecclesiastical Insurance Group and which aims to further the Christian religion. More recently we were delighted to receive a grant offer £12,500 from the Friends of Essex Churches. This is a much larger grant than they usually make, and I feel they were influenced not only by the importance of the building but also by the stalwart efforts of those members of our congregation who, year upon year, have undertaken sponsored bicycle rides for the benefit of the Friends. It would be a good mark of our appreciation if more people were to subscribe to individual membership of the Friends, and should you like to do so please get in touch with me (230790). Other applications have been and are being submitted. but in the meantime it is crucial that our local fund raising efforts should continue apace. Pauline Rook, who must be mad, intends to seek sponsorship for living a hermit's life on the tower roof for no less than seven days from 7th September. Please support her eremitical endeavour, and also note in your diaries that there is to be another Grand Concert in the Village Hall on the evening of Saturday. 23rd November. We

# **ANCIENT VIEWS**

In 1991 we rented, for a week's holiday, Laundry Cottage which looked up at Dunvegan Castle rising above us on the Isle of Skye. Laundry Cottage was next to the jetty for the trips out to see the seals but we very quickly realised that we seemed to be part of the tourist route when foreign tourists peered through the windows and wandered into our temporary home. We learnt from all these people teaming past that they were "doing" the Scottish castles. By the end of the week we had counted over 20 different nationalities from all over Europe and beyond with one intrepid car number plate coming from Egypt. We were amazed that everyone should have come so far to see castles. However we have just returned from a trip through Yorkshire, up into Northumberland and over into the Border country round Carlisle and Hawick. In Northumberland we saw various castles and abbeys - Alnwick, Bamburgh, Lindisfarne and at the last, right on our campsite doorstep, we trekked across to the isolated Dunstanburgh Castle our travails finally walking the legs off our dalmation who collapsed into her bed each night too tired to bark, not even waking us early in the morning to go out! A feat in itself. Across into Border country abbeys featured again at Jedburgh and Hermitage where too there was a lonely, beautiful and strategically placed castle. If ever near Hermitage go see. It is set in the most beautiful countryside. All these buildings had "wow" factor built into them and although we didn't go into all of them they radiated "Here I am, look at me" in their power and supremacy even when, as most of them are, completely ruined. So many are there around in these areas we got to the point of saying "Castle/abbey on your left/right/wherever" and as we began to learn about the Reivers it became "Peel over there" or "Must be a Bastle". It has been a delight spotting these ancient relics of a bygone age. In our midst we have our own ancient relic, the church, and whatever your feelings about the interests and systems which these magnificent buildings represent they are part of the heritage of the area in which they are set and stimulate us to think about the circumstances and the reasons for their being built. Although there are various features and buildings in our villages which form part of its heritage very few would dispute that the most outstanding of these is our glorious medieval church, the repair and restoration of its roof being something for which the much loved John Clapham gave so much of his time and energy. **DID YOU KNOW?** that wasps fly about all spring and summer without your noticing them. Then around August they become a nuisance. The reason for this is that adult wasps are hunters. They return to the nest with raw flesh which is chewed up and fed to the larvae. Wasp larvae produce a sweet liquid which they offer to the adults so between them they produce a balanced diet. However as summer progresses in the colony new queens and some drones are produced while the old queen's egg-laying drastically reduces. # **JOHN CLAPHAM** 18 April 1935 - 1 August 2002

"Weep no more woeful shepherds, weep no more For Lycidas your sorrow is not dead. Sunk though he be beneath the watery floor; So sinks the day star in the ocean bed. And yet anon repairs his drooping head, And tricks his beams, and with new-spangled ore Flames in the forehead of the morning sky"

John was fond of quoting from Lycidas and it was at school that he began to cultivate his prodigious memory. On the stage he was a stylish performer. On the rugby field at full back on amazingly spindly legs he was a safe pair of hands. In the boxing ring, due, he said, to his long arms, he was a surprisingly effective pugilist.

Later he went to Oxford and it was somehow appropriate that he should go to the dark blue, the more exuberant, rich, idiosyncratic, romantic. He would not have sat so well in the ascetic. Rational, astringent, pale rinse of the light blue of Cambridge. Nor would he have been likely to meet Anne.

That was clearly the best thing that could have happened to him. and how happy it was that hearts and heads were in unison. It was also fitting that he should marry a Celt because he loved words, ideas, pictures and theatre. He was a brilliant raconteur, turning what was probably a pretty dull lecture by a Frenchman on how to appreciate good wine into a hilarious and many times repeatable delight. Perhaps it was those years in the Marches, the soft Welsh air, the sensual rolling mountains, and the music of Welsh voices which touched him and endowed him with wit, sensitivity and imagination, gentleness - and a sometimes impatient temperament.

But his Yorkshire origins showed through: loyalty, resilience, good sense, good humour. So, while gifted with a powerful memory, a good brain and the sharp mind of a lawyer, he was at the same time extraordinarily imaginative and sensitive, but was always ready to see the funny side. At dinner lawyers and non-lawyers alike were enthralled as John summarised the development of personal freedom out of Medieval feudalism and demonstrated the historical significance of a leading case in the law of negligence. The snail in the ginger beer bottle was revealed in totally new light. As soon as that was over he was back to limericks and no doubt the fat lady from Bude.

When it came to travel. it was Italy and especially Venice which he loved most. Part of the appeal of Venice was undoubtedly the absence of cars for John's relationship with motoring never really developed. But Venice, besides its theatricality, contains the other passions of his life, restaurants, pictures, architecture, history. When a visit to Berlin was suggested he was hesitant, for Prussia was not his style, but the art galleries, the absurdities of Sans Souci and the historical contract with France appealed in the end. Prague combined the romance of Mozart with the excitement of a place emerging from tyranny and at that time rediscovering the joys of childhood at Christmastime. But it was home he loved most, family, the books and pictures, the garden, East Anglia and the Welsh hills. He thought and read deeply and although like most of

his generation he spoke little about God, he was a loyal member of this church and supporter of its roof. His inclinations were traditional and corporate and he believed that by remaining consistent a stable collective relationship could be made between men and God to the benefit of each individual and society. He was instinctively a kind, generous and charitable man though that did not protect all from his wrath. Among his dislikes were the European Union, Health and Safety and the Metropolitan Police.

When he retired from the law some wondered what he would find to do. No-one need have worried as he set about learning how to regale his friends with interesting food. This proved a good and wise choice. It provided an excuse for the sociability which he loved, and it was something he could master on his own, for he was at his best and happiest doing his own work, at his desk or over the stove, not organising other people's.

But beyond and above all these human characteristics, it was the warmth of his friendship. and his ability to amuse and enthral, to deal in both the trivial and the profound, to entertain and to provoke, that he was such an outstandingly engaging and loveable person.

Is it too much to hope that rather than feeling pity for ourselves and one another at having lost a dear friend or companion, we can rejoice in having known such a wonderful chap, thrive on our memories of him, and say "Thank God for John Clapham".

# KITCHEN CORNER

Some 'Fishy' ideas for this month

# **TUNA FISH CREAMS** serves 4-6 as a starter

5 fl oz carton soured cream or natural yoghurt

6 tablesp salad cream; Seasoning & dash of Worcester sauce

2 tablesp Chopped onion or chives

½ oz gelatine (one packet) dissolved in 3 tablsp water

2 hard boiled eggs; 2" piece cucumber diced small

1 tablesp capers chopped; 7 oz can tuna, flaked; Parsley Sprigs to garnish

Combine soured cream or yoghurt with salad cream or seasoning and onion. Dissolve gelatine over hot water, mix in evenly. Chop one of the eggs and add, plus cucumber, capers and tuna. Spoon into 4-6 ramekins (or one large dish) and chill till set. Serve garnished with sliced remaining egg and parsley sprigs, and hot toast and butter or garlic bread, salads etc.

# **SMOKED HADDOCK QUICHE** To fill a large 12" pastry case

12oz smoked haddock; 8 oz cottage cheese; 2 medium onions, chopped

4 oz mushrooms (Optional) sliced; 3 or 4 eggs; 7-10 fl. Oz. milk; Seasoning

Cook fish in milk, soften onion in butler and mushrooms if used. Mix with cottage cheese. Put all into flan, use stained milk to mix with beaten eggs or pour over. Bake hot oven 35-50 minutes until cooked. *Jill Frostick*

### FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Parishioner, TIMES ARE CHANGING! So the Church of England has a new Archbishop of Canterbury in Dr Rowan Williams. Only time, and any more "leaks" will tell if the Church has got her first choice. The selection process whereby a supposedly representative group of people put forward two names to the Prime Minister to recommend one to the Oueen, is shrouded in secret. At least one past incumbent of No 10 has been known to choose the second choice and even thought to have rejected both names on one occasion! No prizes for guessing who she might have been! Certainly the media seem to believe Mr Blair accepted the favoured candidate and general assent has murmured through the Church. In fact Mr Blair and the politicians could find themselves early on clashing with the new Archbishop. On August 6th (the day Christians remember the Transfiguration, when God gave the disciples a clear message that Jesus was his son and would one day be glorified in heaven and notably the anniversary of the Hiroshima bombings) a group of church leaders presented a petition to Downing Street, expressing reserve at possible military action against Iraq without the backing of the UN. Dr Williams was a signatory to that, which is in line with his writings after September 11th 2001, questioning the scale and appropriateness of the bombing of Afghanistan. This is a man who had to run for his life on that morning as he was in a meeting next to the Twin Towers when they collapsed. He has condemned those attacks as having little to do with God and a Christian understanding of martyrdom. A Christian Martyr dies because he or she loves someone, not because he or she wants to destroy someone. Archbishop Rowan seeks to promote dialogue on this from the question of what is "just". Where is natural justice and what brings about justice for the greater number of people. That is at the root of this man, justice in the eyes of God and man. He has criticised the CofE (remember at the moment he is a Welsh bishop!) for saying that if Christians find themselves in same-sex relationships, though that is not commendable, they are to be supported and welcomed by their brothers and sisters, but that this is not an option for Clergy. You can't have it both ways he says; if its right for ordinary people it's right for the clergy, if it's not right for the clergy, then it's not right for anyone. It needs to be just. From that he seeks Unity. Unity of thought, of peoples both Christian and non, of unity between human and the divine as experienced in Jesus. He is a poet and more of a prophet than a management. The Church committee have taken a risk, Mr Blair has taken one too! Times are changing! May God bless the new Archbishop, may he bless us all. Fr Nicolas

At each stage the parent has to let go the strings a little more. Having given children security throughout childhood and built up their self-confidence parents then have to trust them to be able to cope on their own and learn by their mistakes. On into adulthood the strings become more elastic which is possibly the hardest time of all: to stand back. to not interfere or judge but to be there whenever necessary to offer support or whatever else is needed. My mother used to say that it gets harder as they get older and I used to think she was talking tosh. I now know better! Leonie Henderson

### THE STONE MEMORIAL WINDOW IN AMERICA

In April 1951, I received a cutting from an American Church magazine and it read: "In memory of their father and mother. Fowler Penfield Stone and Margaret Stewart Stone, the stained glass windows in the left transept were presented to the Church by the sons and daughters, Benjamin D., Norman S., Helen S. Thom, Fowler Penfield, Jr., Margaret S Werle, Marion S. Gamble and W. Richard on December 2, 1950, at a dedication service on that date. The main window is a replica of one which was presented to Great Bromley Church in the parish of Tendering Hundred (sic), Essex. England, by the American Stone Family Foundation in April. 1904.

"The three principal panels contain the figures representing St Gregory the Great. St Mary the Virgin with the infant Jesus and St Simon the Apostle. The smaller panels under each, illustrate a notable incident in the life of each, namely. St Gregory accosting the captive children in the market place in Rome. the annunciation of the Virgin and the call of St Simon by Christ. Over all, in the topmost tracery, is a dove. representing the holy Spirit. The lettering across the bottom reads, "To the Glory of God and the memory of Fowler Penfield Stone and Margaret Stewart Stone"

"Fowler Penfield Stone was born in Camden, New York, August, 21, 1851 and died in Wausau, June 28, 1933. He became a member of this church in 1882, served on various boards of the church and was a member of the Session at the time of his death.

Margaret Stewart Stone was born in Philadelphia, Pa, September 4. 1864 and came to Wausau in 1882, at the time her father the Reverend William R. Stewart, was called as a pastor of this church. Always active in many phases of the church, she served as President of the Missionary Society for many years. Margaret Stewart Stone died in Wausau. September 1, 1934. May the beauty and inspiration of this memorial bring those who worship in its light closer to the Holy Spirit and the love of God. Willet Stained Glass Company of Philadelphia,

Pennsylvania. were the artisans." John Appleby

### WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Miss Chuah. due to unforeseen circumstances. was unable to come along to our September meeting. We were very grateful to Mr Dick Hayward who kindly agreed to come along at short notice. He gave us a fascinating account of his family and farming. starting with his Grandfather in 1898 at Badley Hall Farm and how things changed between then and his own retirement in 1982. At the start of this period, agricultural workers worked from 6.00am - 6.00pm Monday to Friday and until 5.00pm on Saturdays with breakfast and lunch breaks each day. At that time. lots of jobs were done by hand with the help of heavy horses. For instance, they were expected to plough 1 acre of land per day. Wages were also low. 7 shillings rising to 17 Shillings per week in the 1920's but in 1931 the Government started to improve matters.

From 1945 onwards, tractors and mechanisation started to take over from men and horses. However in 1952, Foot and Mouth disease struck and all the sheep on the farm had to go. From then onwards only cereals, roots, vegetables, peas etc were grown. Farm buildings built in 1920 are still there. Land in the early 1900s could be. purchased for £5 per acre. today it would cost about £2,000 per acre. We are hoping Miss Chuah will be at our October meeting. which is on Wednesday. 2nd October starting at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. 

### KITCHEN CORNER

Leeks are available most of the year now. but I think of them as an autumn/winter vegetable. Here is a recipe to warm you up on a cooler autumn day!

# GAMMON & LEEKS (serves 4 people)

4 thin gammon rashers; 4 leeks (white parts only); 1 tableSp tomato puree 1 teasp Worcester sauce; pinch cayenne pepper;1 teasp salt; 1½ oz butter,. 1½ oz flour. Wash leeks thoroughly ensuring no grits are left in. Bring 2 pints water to the boil and teasp salt and boil leeks 5-6 minutes. Lift out carefully and drain in a colander (save the water). Melt butter, blend in flour and tomato puree. add one pint of the liquid leeks were boiled in to make sauce. Simmer 3 minutes, add Worcester sauce and pepper. Roll leeks in gammon rashers and lay side by side in oven-proof dish. Spoon 3/4 of the sauce over them and bake 25 minutes moderate oven (375F). Meanwhile, boil 1 lb of potatoes in the remaining water the leeks were cooked in, till very soft, drain and mash, then fork or pipe round the border of the dish. Reheat the remaining sauce and spoon over the gammon. Jill Frostick

#### FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Parishioner

On August 6", the anniversary of the Hiroshima bombings, a petition was handed into 10 Downing Street by this country's Christian leaders. Bishop John of Chelmsford was one of the main signatories, in an exercise in informing the Government of their views on the international situation concerning Iraq. The fifth commandment "You shall not kill" (Exodus 20:13) is recalled by Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5) where he adds the prescription of anger, hatred and vengeance for Christians. Jesus' words can be summed up in the word 'love'; love of God, of neighbour and self. Love towards oneself means it is legitimate to use self-defence. It is not only a right but a grave duty to defend appropriately one's family or state. It is also incumbent upon all people to work for the avoidance of war. However there are occasions when the Church teaches that it is legitimate to use military force, it's called a "just war". At one and the same time: "the damage by the aggressor on the nation or the community of nations must be lasting grave and certain; all other means of putting an end to it must have been shown to be impractical or ineffective; there must be serious prospects of success; the use of arms must not produce evils and disorders greater than the evil to be eliminated." Forgive my using the legal lingo here, but as you can imagine even given the above endless arguments and discussions follow on! It was on this basis that the Christina leaders wrote to the Prime Minister, challenging him to look again at the basis on which he is having discussions with the Americans and on which he might be about to commit us to a war. You can decide for yourself if the proposed action fits all of the above criteria. We are fortunate that our Member of Parliament, Bernard Jenkin, is at the moment Shadow Defence Secretary, and so has a major part to lay in influencing, not just his own party's stance on this but the government's too. If you haven't already I urge you to write to him c/o The House of Commons, Westminster, London SW1. Send a copy to 10 Downing Street too if you want! Tell them what you think: they are making decisions on our behalf, and they often say "the public is behind us on this". Are you? May God grant us and all peoples peace and security in daily life. ### THE WHEEL TURNS

Over 30 years ago 1 was sent abroad to work in Israel. My parents were worried. Israel, Syria and Egypt had only recently been at war but were still sniping at each other across their borders and the Palestinian problem was already well entrenched though not quite as nasty as it is today. The dangers that bothered my parents did not worry me. I was young and excited at the prospect of living, working and travelling abroad. All these years later the same anxieties my parents faced now face me. My children are all adventurous; the greater the adventure the greater the anxiety on my part, the latest being a lone backpacking tour of the Far East and Australasia with visits planned to Indonesia and Bali in particular. However thankfully he was not in Bali at the time of the bombs and the anxiety of not knowing where he was at that particular time having passed, later and calmer reflection makes one think that in reality there is probably just as much likelihood of being involved in a road traffic accident in this country as being in the wrong place at the wrong time whilst travelling the world. Today e-mail and text messages can provide up-to-date reassurance. I cannot but try to imagine how the parents of earlier generations felt as their sons and daughters left to serve in far flung parts of the former empire or in the forces during two world wars. No wonder letter writing was so important to them even if they probably arrived, like buses, all at once. As we remember those killed in wars let us also spare a thought for the families of those caught up in the recent events in Bali. Leonie Henderson

# JOHN APPLEBY

Well, I can't really believe that we wont be seeing Old Joss in the pulpit again! - (that is his email name if you didn't know!). As a mere newcomer (only 51 years in Great Brantley), I don't know ALL about John Appleby. They used to call him the Bishop of Elmstead. so he must have made his mark there! That was where he lived with his beloved wife, Audrey, for many years, and where no doubt, his three sons grew up. He had been Head Teacher at both Thorrington and later Little Bromley schools until in turn, they both closed down, so he has known generations of local children in his day.

There are so many Facets of Johns life and interests, that I hardly know where to start or stop. Many of us know his passion for the Navy where he served in WWII and occasionally have heard murmurs of his role as Secretary and Chaplain to the V & W Destroyer and Burma Star Associations. You will have seen his medals on Remembrance Sunday but did you know he also had the same role in the Russian Convoy Club of the region? He is a Fellow of both the Historical and Meteorological Societies, and writer of various books of a historical content, including a recent one on the St Helena Hospice where he is Chaplain as well as one on Essex dialect.

Few of us will forget an amazing performance he gave at the great Stone reunion in 2000 with his brilliant dissertation in pure Essex. He was diligent in his research of the Stone family and descendants and is a fund of knowledge. There cannot be-much that John does NOT know about Great or Little Bromley and their history. So what has changed? Apparently very little. The Head is still referred to as the "Dragon Lady" (apol's to Pat), the challenge is still survival only till 3.00pm especially without the milk. The dinner ladies are still all sweet and what's this, sheer bliss, all these lovely T.As to look after you, heated toilets to boot, no compulsory 11 plus, the only hot spot is a red dot not the seat of your pants and dinners are once more cooked in house to make you drift away on the aroma of fish and chips. I almost wish I could turn the clock back but I think I'll make do with a quick tour with the great and the good as St George's continues with the ultimate goal that whoever passes through the door will be given every opportunity to be ready for the big bad world of secondary school.

### GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting of 14 November 2002

**Planning** There were no planning applications for consideration during October. In spite of the Council's objections the District Council has approved the application for Pond Farm to be used as a trade display area subject to certain conditions. Following an appeal the Planning inspectorate has granted permission for a display area at Little Paddocks to be converted into a tea room.

**Highways** In the interests of safety the County Council proposes extending the present Harwich Road 40 mph speed limit to 110- 140 metres either side of the Frating Road cross roads. Parents bringing or collecting children to or from the school are encouraged to park their cars in Church Meadow rather than illegally and dangerously in the road adjacent to the school. The Highway contractors have been asked to make good defects in lane surfaces and clear gullies etc where there has been recent road Hooding. The Council has now received the revised definitive map of public rights of way in the parish.

**Environment** Essex County Council has approved the Parish Councils proposal to plant trees on the roadside verge adjacent to St Georges Close.

The Great Bromley Parish Council will next meet in the Village Hall at 7.30 pm on Thursday 5 December. Agenda are posted on the village notice boards and residents are welcome to attend.

### GREAT BROMLEY VILLAGE HALL CHARITY TRUSTEES

The Village Hall Management Committee met on Tuesday, 12th November in the village hall when a wide range of agenda items were discussed.

The Secretary reported on correspondence and renewal of the Hall Insurance. together with the Rural Community Council of Essex Training and Conference programme for 2002-2003 and Village Halls Update newsletter. Also, some correspondence from Tendring District Council about the fire-fighters' proposed strike and an invitation to the Lottery Monitor Conference at Cambridge.

The Treasurer brought us up to date with the current financial position and other matters relating to hiring of the various rooms at the Hall. Hall repairs and maintenance are an ongoing subject with discussion on the electrical system and emergency lighting facility, upgrading the south car park and repairs to external brickwork. Also, a report was made on the broken window of the committee room and storm damage incurred on Sunday; 26th October last. Fund raising is an important activity with the Christmas Fayre on 30th November, together with a Film evening and a Coronation event proposed in the first half of 2003. *Bevan Willgress* 

# YOUR HOUSE - MAYBE

From time to time I receive an enquiry about a house in Great Bromley. There are several ways of finding out about your house but there may not be much or any history attached to it. The deeds of the place may be useful although sometimes the older documents have been destroyed and only a short resume exists.

I use the Census Returns from 1801 to 1901. The Electoral Register and Poll books also help. Estate maps, Land Tax returns, Wills and Auction and Sale Catalogues may be available and Essex Record Office either at Chelmsford or Colchester may have one concerning your property. Essex Record Office also has an internet site called SEAX.

Ordnance Survey maps. 1844-1895, should clearly record every property in the parish. Farm buildings were returned in The National Farm Survey, 1941-1943, and are at The Public Record Office. Crops and livestock are all listed.

Local newspapers can have a wealth of information and are on microfiche and take hours of searching. Maybe there will be a nil result!

If you want a text book I recommend "Tracing the history of your house - a guide to sources" published 1901 by the Public Record Office. author Nick Barrett. There are many others. *John Appleby*

### **CHRISTMAS FRUIT COMPOT**

900g (2 lb) mixed dried fruits - prunes, apricots, figs, peaches, pears; 1 bottle red wine; 110g (4 oz) demerara sugar; 8 cloves; 2 sticks of cinnamon; Finely pared zest of 1 tangerine; 110g (4 oz) blanched almonds.

Soak Fruits in wine overnight. Next day add spices and peel and simmer till fruit is tender. Discard spices and peel. Put fruit into serving bowl and add nuts. Reduce the wine syrup to about 450 ml (¾ pint) and strain it over the fruit and nuts. Chill well before serving. *Jill Frostick*

### BUILDING FUTURES IN MALAWI

My name is Dominic Grant and my friend Tom Bowden and l are gap year students fund raising for a project with charity Building Futures in Malawi. Malawi is a poor, small, but beautiful country in central-southern Africa. recently in the news for the famines that are especially afflicting rural areas. Early in January 2003 we will be travelling to the Malawian capital Lilongwe to stay for two months and teach at a school called Falls Secondary. The school was set up by BFM in 1999 and it promises to provide education for the people of Malawi in the light of the teachings of Jesus Christ.

Secondary education in Malawi is not state-funded and is rare, and there are many children who are desperate to improve their prospects through learning. In particular I hope to introduce basic IT skills into the classroom, while Tom is planning to pass on his experience as a qualified football coach at Colchester United Youth Development - some pupils from St Georges may recognise the name! We are organising with a Chelmsford charity to send out a container full of supplies and equipment for the school. We have already received strips from Colchester, Liverpool and Wimbledon FCs as well as boxes of books and several computers. Shops and businesses in the surrounding area and as far as Ipswich are helping with donations. So I am appealing to you. If you have any items such books, stationery, posters, calculators, sports kits and computerware that you could give, or anything else you think may be useful, please contact me at any time on the numbers below.
