At night owls and foxes could be heard and the blaze of light towards Bristol was spectacular. However had our intention been to observe the night

better off staying in Great Bromley such was the light pollution.

However, perhaps with a little more use of night vision, more use of our legs, less constant washing and a little more thought, our descendants may be able to enjoy our planet as much as we do.



Report of the Great Bromley Parish Council meeting held on 12 August 2004

Planning

The Council considered and agreed no objections to the following planning applications:

10 Harwich Road – detached double garage.

'Baldwins', Frating Road – replace former bungalow by two new detached houses and garages.

Former post office, Brook Street – change of use from commercial to residential.

Old Police House, Chase Road – conservatory plus changes to garage/store.

The Council considered but objected to the following planning applications:

Land adjacent to Spread Eagle, Brook Street – amendment to previous approval for two houses.

Talisman Coaches, Harwich Road – offices and toilet accommodation.

Hall Farm, Hall Road – motorcycle track. Industrial units, Parson's Hill – centre for servicing and repair of caravans, motor homes and ancillary vehicles, (amended application).

Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications:

Badley Hall, Badley Hall Road – replace barns and cow stalls with garages.

Two Hollies, Harwich Road – extensions and alterations.

2 Hill Cottages, Rectory Road – extension.

5 Colchester Road – first floor addition and new conservatory

Great Bromley Village Hall – extension to cricket pavilion.

The Planning Inspectorate has dismissed an appeal against Tendring District Council's refusal of permission for the building of a farm manager's house at 'Primrose Farm', Hall Road.

The Fund entered into its second year in April 2004, with a budget of £60,000 to distribute to groups and organisations across Essex (excluding Tendring) in grants of up to £1,000. Any group or organisation in Essex may apply to the Fund, which can give grants for up to 50% of the cost of a project - and volunteer time can count towards your total costs.

Applicants should be aware that the majority of the funding should be allocated by the end of 2004, as all money granted must be spent by the groups receiving grants, by 31 March 2005. Therefore, the sooner you apply, the better!

Essex Rural Renaissance Fund Environment and Conservation HUB SWALL GRANTS FUND 2004/05

A grant of up to £1000 is available to organisations or groups for environmental projects in rural areas in Essex. The types of projects that may be suitable include:

ESSEX RURAL RENAISSANCE FUND

The Essex Rural Renaissance Fund (ERRF) is a grant fund for Essex, launched in April 2003-Funding is provided through East of England Development Agency (EEDA) to support regeneration through addressing social. economic and environmental issues. The main fund has a total of £590,000 to distribute in the current financial year; however, approx £490,000 of this has already been allocated, leaving only £100,000 to assist new projects between now and April 2005. An assessment panel is due to meet in August to review the next round of applications to the fund. Although the budget is limited, groups and organisations in Essex should be aware of the potential opportunities of the Fund - there may still be time to apply this year, and there will certainly be further funding available in the year 2005-6. The Fund offers large grants (over £1,000) to groups and organisations and is administered by the Centre for Environment and Rural Affairs (CERA) at Writtle College, on behalf of the Essex Economic Partnership. ESSEX RURAL TRANSPORT PARTNERSHIP FAST TRACK FUND

For rural communities it is often the case that a small investment to enable a community group to trial a new transport scheme, can make a huge impact on isolated individuals' opportunity to move around more freely. Do you have an idea for a transport scheme that will benefit your local community?

Where can this money come from -well one potential source could be the Fast Track Fund, a small grant fund supported equally by the Countryside Agency and Essex County Council and administered by the Essex Rural Transport Partnership.

The Fast Track Fund is a start up fund, the project developed must aim to tackle disadvantage and social exclusion.

Priority projects would include those that directly aid or increase the number of individuals able to travel, improved vehicle safety, promotional and information costs, training, and consultations/surveys. Where appropriate the project must demonstrate an element of ongoing sustainability after the grant. Up to £1,500 can be awarded, over £1,000 25% match funding is required which must include a minimum of 10% cash.



John Reynoldes of Little Bromley by his will of 10th March 1601/02 left his son, Thomas, forty shillings and "desired his wife that he remain with her at diet, apparel, washing and lodging for twelve months after his father's death if he will give his labour to his mother".

Wife, Elizabeth, had all her husband's goods and two beasts and two horses, so that she may pay the legacies to the two sons and also two young daughters. Jane John Appleby

and Elizabeth, who were to have forty shillings when they were 18. Elizabeth was also with child who was to have forty shillings at 18 but Elizabeth was to bring up the young children as well as being executrix.

An elder daughter, Elizabeth Hills, was Son John was also left twenty shillings. left one brazen posnet. Witnesses to the will were Charles Cardinall from Great Bromley and Richard Goslyng.




