GARDENER'S CORNER February

SWEET PEAS: If you planted sweet pea seeds as I suggested last October, your plants should be well advanced by now - keep the greenhouse or cold-frame well ventilated. More information next month.

ORIENTAL POPPIES: Take root cuttings this month and put in pots of sandy soil - place in a cold-frame or cold greenhouse. If you have suckers from shrubs such as lilacs, etc. cut them off below ground level with a root and replant.

ROSES: In mild weather roses can now start to be pruned.

LILIES: can be planted in pots or open ground this month.




FROM THE PAST ...

THE CREDITORS ARE IN!

William Hughes, carpenter and shopkeeper, of Great Bromley, deposited a deed of bankruptcy with Mr Chapman, solicitor of Manningtree, in April, 1815. Mr Jackson, auctioneer, of Colchester, sold everything Hughes possessed on 7th July, 1815.

In the sale were the following: “A quantity of oak and elm boards and planks, oak slabs and scantling (*beams under 5 inches square*), ten oak and elm trees, 20 small oak timbers, 4 six-bar gates, 4 long ladders, 30 bundles of lathes, 100 alder poles, a large assortment of locks, a quantity of nails, a grindstone, a sawpit, etc.”.

In Mr Hughes’ shop were “a various assortment of handkerchiefs, shawls, printed cottons, tablecloths, a few lots of groceries, in tea, sugar, soap, candles, cheeses, etc., tea canisters, pewter measures, etc.”



The household furniture comprised “4 post- and tent-bedsteads, with cotton hangings, good feather beds,

bolsters and pillows, quilts and blankets, 6 neat cherry tree chairs and 2 elbow ditto, to match, a mahogany dining table and other tables, pier and dressing glasses and mirror, a Scotch carpet, wainscot bureau, mahogany chests of drawers, neat chamber chairs, deal dresser, a good 8-day clock, Bath stoves, fenders and fire irons, good linen in sheets, tablecloths and napkins,

etc, 2 silver table spoons, one dozen tea ditto, pair of sugar tongs, good brewing and washing coppers, a quantity of pickled hams and pork, 2 fat hogs, 2 horses, a taxed cart, and a variety of other articles as will be expressed in catalogues to be had at the Black Boy, Bromley, and of the Auctioneers, Colchester”.

NEWS FROM THE DOCTORS' SURGERY

GREAT BENTLEY SURGERY

Having suggested last month that just after Christmas perhaps wasn't the best time to start giving things up or losing weight, this month we can offer anyone who wants to stop smoking some real support.

On 10th February, Tendring PCT's Smoking Cessation expert is starting a series of special sessions to help people who genuinely and seriously want to give up the dreaded weed. The sessions will be here at the surgery on Thursday afternoons and patients will get individual support and counselling, which will give them an excellent chance of succeeding.

You would also get all the encouragement and help that both the surgery and the pharmacy can provide.

This really is a brilliant opportunity to quit smoking once and for all, BUT, will-power is still the essential key to success, so you have to be absolutely determined to kick the habit for good to be included in the scheme. It will be a complete waste of time for anyone who is half-hearted about it.

If you feel that the time is right for you, make an appointment to see one of the doctors or nurses here and they will refer you for the initial session.

The aftermath of the Asian earthquake and tsunami has certainly shaken everyone and the response to appeals for aid donations has been fantastic. Here at the surgery, proceeds from our book stall are going to the official appeal fund for the next few weeks at least.

Additionally, we are holding a grand raffle to raise some extra money. Lots of really good prizes have been donated

already, including a grocery hamper, boxes of biscuits and sweets, perfume, a teddy bear and the inevitable (and very welcome) bottles of booze. Tickets, which are on sale here at reception, cost 25 pence each or five for £1.00. All prizes are being donated, so every single penny raised will go to the appeal.

Please have a go at the raffle. The prizes are excellent and the cause couldn't be more worthwhile. The draw will be made here at the surgery on 28th February and provided you give us a phone number, we'll let you know if you are a winner.

On a sad note, we'll be saying "farewell" to Dr Dewa shortly as he finishes his spell with us at the end of January. We are very grateful for all the work he has put in during his six months here. The time has gone very quickly. Unfortunately, there are not enough GP Registrars in training at present and now it's our turn to manage without one for a while. I think that Dr Hunt is looking forward to a break from all the necessary teaching sessions for a few months though. He has been doing them continuously for seven years, so maybe he deserves a rest.

We had a visit from the PCT's Qualities and Outcomes Framework team in December. They came along to check that we are doing all we can to look after people properly and that we are complying with various rules and regulations. They are a bit like the Ofsted inspectors who go into schools, so Bonnie one of our practice nurses reckons they should be called "Offsick".

Anyway, we got what we thought was a pretty good report, so we must be doing something right. If you have a different view though, or want to suggest a way in which we can improve things, please let me know.

GIVE THEM SPACE

Share the road - it won't kill you



Sometimes, using the road can be a total nightmare. Some people seem to think they have more right to use the roads than others - but all of us are just trying to get somewhere. If we were a bit more courteous and patient, using the road would be a much better experience.

When was the last time someone thanked you on the road? When was the last time you thanked someone? If we are all more courteous to each other, using the road will not only be a much less stressful experience but a safer one as well.

Horse riding is a popular pastime enjoyed by all ages. Every year over 5000 riders take a road safety test to equip them for using the road. Riders and drivers have equal rights to the road. A bit of mutual courtesy and consideration will make road usage a happier and safer experience.

Road Users:

- Give horse riders plenty of space and be ready to stop at all times
- Be aware that horses are unpredictable and sensitive to noise. They may panic if scared by loud music, car horns or revving engines
- Pass wide and slow when overtaking a horse
- Take note that horse riders often travel side by side in pairs for safety
- Look out for horses being led or ridden on the road
- Respect riders asking you to slow down

- or stop
- Look out for horse riders on roundabouts:
 - Signalling right means they will continue round the roundabout
 - Signalling left indicates they will turn off at that exit
- Beware of horse riders turning right. Riders keep to the left hand side because it is safer than positioning a horse between lines of traffic
- Horse riders are often youngsters, so take extra care.


Drivers remember - Treat all horses as a potential hazard and expect the unexpected!

How horseriders can help motorists

- Always be courteous and thank other road users when they slow down or stop for you
- Ride in single file wherever you can, especially where the road narrows or before a bend in the road
- Show awareness and observation of other road users and consideration when passing others, especially pedestrians.

Remember - Some people are frightened of horses.

Share the road is an Essex County council campaign targeting all road users. It aims to reduce accidents by encouraging all groups to be more thoughtful and considerate whilst on the road.



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

Report of the Great Bromley Parish Council meetings held on 16/12/2004 and 13/1/05

Planning

The Council considered and agreed no objections to the following planning applications:

- **Badley Hall Farm, Badley Hall Road** – porch.
- **Veranda Cottage, Harwich Road** – demolish and rebuild house.
- **Thatched Cottage, Brook Street** – amended application for garage/store.
- **Arcan, Colchester Road** – amended proposal for detached garage.
- *The Council considered but objected to the following planning applications:*
- **Coppice View caravan site, Carrington Road** – extension to existing building and approval for a second touring caravan.
- **Marks Farm, Frating Road** – extension of garden into agricultural land and conversion of existing stable block to domestic/residential use.
- **'Primrose Farm', Hall Road** – additional farm building incorporating office, rest and wash rooms.
- *Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications:*
- **The Hollies, Colchester Road** – kitchen extension.
- **Fieldview, Mary Lane South** – extension.

Council finances

The council has approved its budget for 2005/6 and will be seeking a precept of £13,500 through residents' council tax. This is the first increase for four years. Expenditure of £16,000 is planned with the shortfall being met from other

revenues, grants and the council's reserves. About a third of this amount will cover the council's administration costs. The rest will be spent on the following: maintenance of the Hare Green playing field and other council sites, litter and dog bins, playing field and other equipment, flower tubs and community grants. This year the council will also be making provision for the cost of joint representations, with other parish councils, against potential large-scale housing and industrial development in the village. The notice boards will also be renovated.

Speeding

The council continues to press for measures that will deter motorists from exceeding the speed limits in the village. The police will carry out speed surveys on Hall and Harwich Roads and the county highways department will install speed-warning markings on Hall Road and Brook Street in the 30 mph limit. A 40 mph speed limit will be introduced on the Frating Road between Balls Green and the Harwich Road.



Crime

The village has recently experienced a number of car and other thefts, break-ins and burglaries. Residents are reminded that *all* incidents should be reported to the police.

Public telephone box, Brook Street

BT will be removing the Brook Street telephone box, which has been little used in recent years.



Freedom of Information

The Freedom of Information Act came into force on 1/1/05 and the parish council has a publication scheme in place for those seeking information about its

As you are aware we are currently opposing the Tendring District Council Local Draft Plan part of which aims to include a vast development of housing and industry on prime agricultural land covering approximately 27 hectares. The site is located in the Frating Hare Green area behind The Book Store. TDC has already received over 6,000 objections for the first stage but we must continue with our objections. There will be a public enquiry later in the year and it is vital that your views are considered. In order to be adequately represented CARD may need the services of a barrister, therefore FUNDS ARE URGENTLY NEEDED. Our local MP, Mr Bernard Jenkin, is supporting our objections and has already, on our instigation, raised the

issue in the House of Commons saying "the people of Great Bromley Elmstead and Frating do not want a new town imposed on rural Essex. Rural North Essex is not for sale".

CARD successfully opposed a similar proposal by Wimpey Homes in 1996 and in order that we can achieve another victory we urgently need your support. 
Funny Feet



KITCHEN CORNER

Cheesy Potato Bake

Serves 4
900g/2lbs potatoes, peeled and sliced thinly
450ml/¾pt milk
salt and pepper
large pinch grated nutmeg
1 clove garlic, halved
100g/4oz Emmenthal or Cheddar cheese, grated
15g/½oz butter

Lightly grease a shallow baking dish, pre-heat oven 220°C/425°F. Put potatoes and milk into saucepan, sprinkle over the nutmeg and seasoning. Bring to the boil and simmer 10-15 minutes till tender. Rub the cut garlic firmly over the inside of the baking dish. Transfer potato slices into the dish and add ¼pt milk. Sprinkle over the grated cheese, dot with butter and bake 20 minutes till cheese melts and crust is crisp and golden brown.
