PREDATION

There has been much in the news recently on hunting, foxes, cats and sparrowhawks.

Hunting as a sport, by the time you read this, will be officially banned and we shall have to see how things pan out with this new law. Anyone who has ever kept animals know that foxes kill and not always for food. They sometimes kill needlessly leaving their dead victims distressingly strewn around. I read recently that urban foxes no longer able to a strong small bird population and whilst find enough food due to the advent of the wheelie bin, have taken to catching and eating cats instead. The cat owners are calling for the foxes to be culled.

Cats too are not always regarded as adorable when they follow their natural instinct and hunt and therefore kill. They also kill more than they can eat. Whilst I find that, despite these hunting capabilities, the mouse population never seems to diminish I do try to prevent the cats catching the birds at their most vulnerable time at dawn by keeping them indoors overnight.

Sparrowhawks also get a bad press. I have one who regularly visits my garden; it is very fierce looking and very beautiful. It keeps the 60-odd strong flock of

the old, slow and weak. It is fascinating to watch it home and sweep in soundlessly and gracefully for the kill. The bird world, however, is not a

walk over and is constantly on watch; more often than not the alarm sounds and the sparrowhawk swoops through empty air. Some say the sparrowhawk should be culled to protect the smaller birds but their very presence is a good indicator of the correct balance remains all the different species will survive.

Balance in nature is the crucial thing and insects, wild flowers, seed heads with hedges and trees (along with a bit of general untidiness and cover for them to make their homes in) should be nurtured to give food for the smaller creatures which feed the larger and so on up the food chain to ourselves.

There is a fine line between hunting for fun, hunting for food and also hunting to cull a given threat and may be more thought should be given about the natural order of things than about man's constant need to control a situation from whichever side of the fence it is being looked at it.

Dear Parishioner,

For Christians the climax of the spiritual year comes in Holy week. Palm Sunday (20th 10.30am) see us singing "Hosanna" to the one we recognise as King, then on Maundy Thursday (24th 7pm) we wash each others feet remembering this King came as a servant. On Good Friday (25th 3pm) we hear the cry " Crucify Him!" as we recall His innocent Passion and death at the hands of men and women like us. Then on Easter Day (27th 5am) we sing "Alleluia!" in recognition that God in His love has conquered evil and given new life in Jesus Christ.

More Bankrupt Possessions

As if the sale of his livelihood and shop and personal items was not enough for the creditors William Hughes' home, etc., went under the hammer.

The Chelmsford Chronicle, 7th July, 1815 had the notice -

"Very desirable Estate - To Carpenters and Builders - Gt Bromley, Essex TO BE SOLD BY PRIVATE CONTRACT A GOOD FREEHOLD MESSUAGE SITUATE ON Balls Green, consisting of a front shop, keeping room, parlour, kitchen, dairy. Three good bedrooms, carpenter's workshop and stable with a capital piece of garden ground now in the occupation of Mr William Hughes, Carpenter and

General Shopkeeper". Also a good cottage and an inclosed sawpit, with a piece of garden ground attached in the same occupation.

These premises are in very good state of repair, are well supplied with water and have a Right of Pasturage over Bromley Thicks."

Further particulars may be had of Mr W S Chapman,

Solicitor, Manningtree, and of Mr Jackson, auctioneer, Colchester". The sale took place, without reserve, at 12 o'clock on Friday 24th November, 1815.







At our February meeting we had a talk "New seeds for the garden" by Andrew Tokley, Horticultural Manager for Messrs Thompson & Morgan of Ipswich. The company has a Seeds Division and a Young Plants Division, which is run from Guernsey.

William Thompson started collecting plants as a hobby, which then became a business carried on in Tavern Street, Ipswich in 1855. After a few years he teamed up with John Morgan, an accountant. There are no family descendant members of Thompson or Morgan alive today and their present

business site is in Poplar Lane. Seeds are sent to countries all over the world, their catalogue contains 70 different varieties of potatoes.



Important issues are "good flavour for vegetables" and "good flowering performance for flowers". Some seeds from countries such as South Africa, need a bush fire to enable them to germinate, so Thompson and Morgan have to put the seeds through a fake bush fire to get them started.

Mr Tokley grows all his own vegetables and flowers for his garden, after working hours.

Report of the Great Bromley Parish Council meeting held on 10 February 2004

Planning

The Council considered and agreed no objections to the following planning applications:

Atlantis, Chase Road West - front & rear extensions and widened access. 2 Holly Dene Cottages, Briar Road -

single storey extension

Entre-Nous, Chapel Lane - single storey extension

Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications:

Old Courthouse Inn, Harwich Road increase width of vehicular access.

6 Back Lane East - formation of new access.

Field House, Parson's Hill - porch and extension.

Thatched Cottage, Brook Street amended application for garage/store.

Arcan. Colchester Rd – amended proposal for detached garage.

Tendring District Council has refused the following planning applications:

Oak House Farm, Harwich Road change of use from kindergarten school to casino club.

Land between Fieldside and Ettone, Frating Road - two new bungalows. 4 Meadow Close - two-storey extension.

Hare Green Recreation Ground

The play equipment has been repaired and modified and a 'springy motorcycle' installed. A picnic table with benches has been ordered.

Community grants

The council has agreed grants totalling

£1230 to the following local organisations: the Bromley Messenger, the Royal British Legion, Bromleys PCC (for St George's church grass cutting), Citizens' Advice Bureau (Tendring) and Hamilton Lodge. Highways and footpaths

The county arranges for vegetation on certain footpaths and bridleways to be cut back once annually. Also Onyx, under contract to the district council, sweeps highways and cleans verges on either a monthly basis, or quarterly for rural roads and lanes. Please let the Clerk know if your local road or footpath is not being maintained properly.

The county is promoting its new local transport plan through exhibitions at Clacton's Town Hall on 1 March and at the Moot Hall Colchester on 2 March. These exhibitions are open from 11 am to 8 pm.

The county proposes introducing a 40 mph speed limit on the Frating Road between Balls Green and Selectacars. and a 30 mph limit along Brundells Road.

During the next 12 months the Highways Authority will be installing a roundabout on the A120 so as to provide safer access to and from the old Harwich Road. At the same time traffic will be prohibited from turning right into and out of Park Road, although the council is making representations against this particular proposal.

The **next meeting** of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday 10 March 2005 at the Village Hall Great Bromley.



The future development of Great

Bromley may be influenced by a number of local and regional plans and strategies. The District Council's draft new plan for instance supports large-scale housing and industrial development for the village. The County Council is against these proposals, which are contrary to its own structure plan. There is also now a plan for the eastern region of England. This has some positive features although its proposals for additional housing are considered excessive and unsustainable in terms of both the lack of employment opportunities and inadequate infrastructure. The environmental impact would also be adverse.

Notwithstanding Tendring's plans for Great Bromley the Planning Inspectorate or Secretary of State will decide ultimately, after a public enquiry, whether or not more than 2000 houses and a large industrial estate will be imposed on the village. It is for this reason that Great Bromley, together with other affected parish councils, will be vigorously fighting these proposals and paying for expert representation at the public enquiry.

The various plans will be discussed at the parish council's next meeting at 7.30 pm on 10 March at the village hall. Residents are welcome to attend and contribute to the Council's response to the East of England Plan.
