TWINKLE, TWINKLE LITTLE STAR

I expect someone out there knows but if there is a society to bring back the night sky then I am all for joining it. All year round I admire the night sky - the moon, the stars and the clouds (when silhouetted in front of the moon). It is beautiful with a sense of the infinite and makes me think of creation. In winter (on the rare occasions it now snows) looking up at snow flakes falling in the dark causes me to have the weird sensation of being drawn upwards and into the sky. In cities, towns and a lot of villages around the country the sky is lost behind the blaze of light from street lamps, security lights and just general illumination. Now I hear that Essex County council has 'seen the light'. Over the next few months the street lights will be turned off in residential areas between midnight and 5.00 am as a way of conserving energy and keeping the bills down. Cllr Rodney Bass is reported as saying that "this is an important step and an example to others to conserve energy" and that the council is "thinking more about how our policies across the council affect the environment". To those who say they are frightened of the dark his advice is to "carry a torch". A good torch is always comforting to carry in any event and not just for its light! Actually one can see remarkably well in the dark once the eyes have become adjusted and there are in fact very few nights when it is really too dark to see and on a good night even a torch can be more of a hindrance than a help to vision..

Essex County Council is responsible for around 120,000 street lights and argues that the 19,000 tons of carbon emissions they produce each year is too much. It also says that by turning them off there will be less light pollution.

Essex is not the first council to turn down the lighting, Devon and Cornwall have been turning down/off their lighting for some years now. Torbay twinkles from the odd light on boats and is very attractive in the darkness set against the hugeness of the sea and sky.

In the 1960s most towns turned off their street lights at midnight. My husband recalls cycling home off the last bus from Birmingham with lights going out down the road as he went along. Also do security lights that are permanently on really deter criminals who are determined to enter any given premises, or do they simply proclaim that someone thinks that there might be something there that is worth trying to protect.

FROM THE PAST ...

BLOCKED HIGHWAYS AND DITCHES

John Smith of Frating was ordered to "scowre xij rod of ditch leading from Catland Brook toward much Bentley at the Quarter Sessions of 28 June 1587.

At the same time the landholders of Whelers in Frating and the owner, Edward Odyan of Orford, Suffolk, were on court to "take up a gate standinge crosse the Queen's highway leading from much Bromley to St Towseys (St Osyth)".

The same parties were told to "crop the wood against the highway leadinge from the Crosse house (Frating) to Thorington Heath".

These were not the first appearances in court of the same defaulters. The entries show that Great Bromley parishioners must often have travelled these roads we still use today.

All monies raised by this organisation will be donated to charities and causes to be agreed upon at an annual meeting. Enquiries would be welcome ..."

In Vol 2, No 2 August/September 1986 there is a reference to a German Evening. "An event which must not be missed is a German Evening to be held in the Village Hall on Saturday, 27th September from 8.00pm until midnight. There will be dancing to the 'Die Kellerguister' German band. Tickets can be obtained from members of the Village Hall Committee. All the proceeds will be in aid of the Village Hall funds."

No mention was made of the evening in the October/November magazine so I wonder what it was like.

Great Bromley Parish Council

Report of the council meeting held on 13 July 2006 Planning

The Council considered and agreed no objections to the following planning applications:

Land between Fieldside and Eltone, Frating Road: two new bungalows and retention of temporary fencing.

Field House, Parson's Hill: outdoor manège and lighting.

Tendring District Council planning application decisions:

Arthrath, Harwich Road – removal of agricultural occupancy condition (approval)

Old Courthouse Inn, Harwich Road – use of dwelling independent of public house (refusal)

Elm Cottage, Harwich Road – demolish existing bungalow and replace with two new bungalows (approval)

Cross Inn, Ardleigh Road – change of use from public house to private dwelling (refusal)

Tendring replacement local plan

The council agreed to object to 'omission site' OM PM 24 which sought approval for future development on land adjacent to

the sewage works/Spread Eagle, Brook Street.

Dog bin

The council has installed a dog bin on Carrington Road near the junction with Briar Road.

Village appraisal

There has been a good response to the village survey with 180 completed questionnaires returned. This is 44% of those distributed. A report on the survey's findings should be available in September/October this year.

Hare Green Recreation Field

The field and its play equipment have recently been inspected by ROSPA and found to be largely satisfactory. The field will be used occasionally during the summer for soccer matches and members of the Revolution football club assisted the parish council in levelling the playing surface. Unfortunately trees recently planted by the council continue to be vandalised.

Future meetings

The next meeting of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday 11 August 2006 at the Village Hall Great Bromley. Residents are welcome to attend.

Tendring Replacement Plan – Public Inquiry

The public inquiry will be held at the district council's Weeley offices during September to December this year. Members of the public are welcome to attend. The following sessions may be of particular interest to residents:

Community Speed Watch

The parish council is continually looking for ways of reducing the amount of speeding in the village – particularly on roads with 30 and 40 mph limits. Warning signs and traffic calming road markings have been introduced and the police are asked to carry out regular speed checks. The next step is the installation of vehicle activated flashing speed signs and the first of these will be in Hall Road, near Lakewood.

As a more radical move Essex Police are trialling the concept of a 'community speed watch'. This will be a traffic monitoring scheme co-ordinated by the police but managed and run by local volunteers. Simply, volunteers will identify offending vehicles using speed detection devices. This information will then be passed to the police who will follow up with warning letters and possibly prosecution for repeat offenders. The scheme's primary objective will be to reduce the incidence of speed-related offending.

appraisal questionnaires. A total of 181 responses were received by the deadline of 10th July – which equates to approximately 44% of those which were distributed. The questionnaires are now being analysed and a draft report will be prepared during August and September for publication in October, together with an action plan. KITCHEN CORNER

Blackcurrant Meringue Pie

To serve warm or cold

Shortcrust pastry: 6oz flour

Filing: 1 lb prepared blackcurrants

1/4 teasp cinnamon

pinch salt

Meringue: 2 egg whites

pinch of salt

3oz fat

4 oz caster sugar

1 oz plain flour

1/4 pt single cream

1/4 teasp cream of tartar

2 oz caster sugar



Roll pastry to fit 7" tin, trim round overlapping edge by ½". Fold the overlap underneath to make a double thickness round the rim. Pinch up to make a high fluted edge. Put currants into the pastry case, mix the dry ingredients and gradually stir in the cream. Put this mixture over the fruit and bake in a hot oven 35 minutes.

Allow to cool while making the meringue. Whisk whites with salt and cream of tartar until stiff, add sugar and beat till stiff and shiny. Spoon over the pie, sealing the edges well. Swirl with a fork and return to the over for 8 - 10 minutes till lightly browned

We usually meet six or seven times each year, i.e. about every two months. Currently, there are 12 on the committee, who try to manage the village hall affairs within the Trust Deed and for the benefit of all users, or potential users, of the facility. We aim to work as a team, all people have their strengths and weaknesses, but we generally achieve a satisfactory result as a body trying to improve the hall and its facilities.

Activities currently available at the hall include the Playgroup (three mornings and one afternoon each week during school term time). Scallywags (Friday morning), Badminton (Monday evening), Men's Club (Tuesday evening), Carpet Bowls (Wednesday evening), Women's Institute (1st Wednesday evening). Friendship Club (3rd Thursday afternoon), Karate, Yoga and Dog Training. The facilities may be privately hired for your own event such as a party and often there are public functions like fund raising dances, quiz nights which you can attend should you wish. Many groups of people hire rooms for meetings during the day or evening. We have a Main Hall (with stage if required), a Committee room (up to 15 people), the Millennium Lounge (up to 40 people), the Billiards Room (which can be used to support the Main Hall or Lounge) and a Kitchen area.

Our appreciation and grateful thanks to Peter and June Wenden for the splendidly organised Coffee Morning at "The Pippins" on Saturday, 15th July. A wonderful sunny day greeted the many people who came along and enjoyed games, stalls, raffle, refreshments, light lunches and/or a BBQ whilst catching up with old friends or meeting new. Our aim is to assist in any way possible during recovery, rehabilitation and in the long term. Support is offered in various ways to stroke survivors, their families, carers and professionals involved in their care.

Groups are run four days of the week at the centre with a variety of activities aimed at reinforcing daily living skills, the development of effective communication skills, the promotion of self confidence and initiative, the increase of independence and the encouragement of social integration. We encourage members to use forgotten skills or in many cases to discover new skills. There is an art group run by a qualified tutor and support staff facilitate creative tasks with the members. A communication group coordinated by adult education tutors, a Speech and Language Therapist and trained volunteers offers the development of functional communication skills through alternative strategies and coping techniques. All of these activities are undertaken in an atmosphere of fun and good humour.

The maintenance of learnt skills, the development of self confidence, initiative and social integration is promoted to enhance independence and prevent social isolation.

A high dependency group is offered for those who need a higher level of care due to lack of mobility. The group is coordinated by four staff and two volunteers. The group is designed for wheel chair users. The aim of this day is to improve mobility, coordination, communication skills and provide mental stimulation. These aims are achieved in many cases by relearning/developing numeracy and literacy skills, a structured exercise period, quizzes, physical games and other activities to enhance coordination.

Cares are afforded respite when the stroke survivor attends the above groups at the centre

Education and training is offered to the wider community regarding stroke awareness and primary and secondary stroke prevention.

SIZE MATTERS WITH ROYAL MAIL'S NEW POSTAL PRICES

Major changes to the cost of sending items in the post are being introduced with prices calculated not simply on weight but the size and shape of an item. From August 21st anyone posting something should be aware of the three

new categories:

· Letter · Large Letter · Packet

The changes are being introduced to better reflect how much it costs Royal Mail to collect, sort and deliver mail. But the vast majority of items will cost the same or less to post under the new system.

There are a few simple tips and reminders to help people with commonly posted items and to help them save money:

- Standard birthday cards will still cost 32p to post in the **Letter** category but larger cards, including those with badges will fall into the **Large Letter** bracket.
- If you're sending an A4 letter by folding it in half to fit in a standard C5 envelope it will only cost the **Letter** price of 32p rather than **Large Letter** 44p.
- If you're looking for that perfect gift them compact heavy items like books will be cheaper to send than before. However light but bulky items such as a poster tube will cost more.

To help its customers with the new prices Royal Mail will be delivering a leaflet to every address in the UK throughout August. Adverts will also be run on television, radio and in newspapers. Plus information will be available at your Local Post Office® branch and online at www.royalmail.com/size or by phoning 08456 113113.

If you have friends and family abroad international mail prices are not affected. Further details of the new categories and prices are detailed in this table.
