Great Bromley Parish Council

Report of Great Bromley Parish Council meetings held in December 2006 and January 2007

Planning

The Council considered the following planning applications:

The Firs, Chase Road West – extensions and garage conversion (no objection).

Arundel, Ardleigh Road – additional detached building in garden (no objection).

Land adjacent to mast in Hilliards Road – change of use from piggery to business, industrial, storage and distribution usage (no objection).

Dolphins, Colchester Road – replacement conservatory (no objection),

Land adjacent to Spread Eagle, Brook Street – new detached house (objection).

Tendring District Council has decided the following planning applications:

Horsley Cross industrial and business park – industrial and business units, storage and distribution depots, hotel, nursery and waste recycling plant (approval).

Mousetraps, Rectory Road/Parsons Hill – new additional dwelling (approval).

2 Alma Cottages, Briar Road – conversion of detached garage /workshop into new additional dwelling (approval).

The Firs, Chase Road West – extensions and garage conversion (single storey extensions (approval)

The council has decided its budget for 2007/8 with planned expenditure of £18,145. This will be financed by £13,500 from council tax revenue, £1000 from other income and the rest from reserves and/or grants. Expenditure will include the following: community grants – £2000, grass and hedge cutting - £3000 and £5000 on other projects stemming from the village appraisal.

Poorlands Charity

The trustees of Great Bromley's Poorlands Charity met in December and agreed to distribute grants of £45 each to four individuals and £100 to a family. The Trust's income in 2006 was £219, with some cash carried forward from the previous year. The Trust's investments are presently worth about £5,800.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE



Mrs Dorothy Roberts came along to our January 2007 meeting to tell us about her work with the East Anglian Children's Hospices (EACH). There

are three Hospices for children in East Anglia which are at Milton near Cambridge, Quidenham in South Norfolk and in Ipswich. They cater for children from small babies up to 21 years old.

Every thought has gone into the patients' care. For the young the Ball Bath has recently been installed and is a great favourite, also a Sensory Room and Loud Room are some of the facilities. Activities include therapeutic play, music therapy, arts and crafts work, day trips and a memory day each year which is organised for families and helps them to move forward after a bereavement. Their key services include respite care and end of life care.

The staff are very dedicated as are the parents. There are some parent rooms available where they can stay whilst their children are receiving help. Unfortunately, staff levels have had to be reduced due to reduction in Lottery funding but they continue to help over 300 families each year.

Only a very small percentage (about 12%) of their budget is provided by the Government. They rely upon the generosity of individuals, companies, pubs, clubs, charitable trusts, with the vast majority of funding coming from people like you.

Our next meeting is on Wednesday, 7th February when Catherine Hart will speak on 'Know your face'. If you would like to join us please come along to the Village Hall for 7.30pm and you will be made most welcome.

Practice Nurse changes

Catherine Arter, our Practice Nurse, is leaving on the 2 February to take up a full time practice nursing post in Ipswich which is nearer her home. We are intending to replace her as soon as possible. Catherine

possible. Catherine joined us in August 2003 and has helped develop our asthma care and has also provided a stop smoking service.

We are pleased to report that Kate Strowbridge, our Nurse Practitioner, has successfully obtained an MSc degree from Essex University, following two years of study.

Surgery extension

The surgery extension building is proceeding on time for completion in May. We regret the inconvenience that has been caused occasionally with the closure of the surgery car park. Fortunately, we do have a free public park not too far away on the other side of the crossroads.

Patient survey

In the last edition, I provided details of the patient survey carried out by the practice in October 2006. A national survey of patients has also been commissioned by the Department of Health to take place in January 2006, which will no doubt receive media coverage when the results are published. Some of our patients may in deed receive a postal survey form to complete. The survey is likely to duplicate our own survey, but will concentrate on questions of access to primary care and patient choice of hospital care.

A number of patients in our survey requested certain improvements

particularly in connection with the need for a Saturday morning and evening surgeries beyond 7 pm. As far as extended evening surgeries are concerned this would mean that GPs and staff would have to shift work which would reduce the availability of surgery sessions during the day. It is not unusual for the evening surgery to finish near 7 pm. The Walk In Centre in Colchester has been opened to provide cover seven days a week from 7 am-10 pm Monday to Friday and 9 am-5 pm on weekends and bank holidays

A few patients commented on the length of time they sometimes wait in the waiting area for their appointment while other patients commented that they would like more than ten minutes of the doctors time. Surgeries sometimes overrun as doctors try to accommodate patients needs to discuss their problems and for referral to other services. Discussing the patient choice of hospital and using the new Choose and Book system all takes more time.

On the question of car parking, we are limited by the size of the area in front of the surgery, but do plan to provide two additional spaces following completion of the extension. We are fortunate to have a free public park a short distance away on the other side of the crossroad.

Quite a few patients expressed concern about the Out of Hours Service. This is managed by the Primary Care Trust and is based at the Walk in Centre in Colchester. On contacting the service, patients requiring the attention of doctor, are encouraged to attend the Walk In Centre but if it medically necessary, a doctor will visit. The new PCT is in the process of re-organisation so that one service covers both the Tendring and Colchester areas.

The agreement between the government and the BMA to remove the responsibility of a 24 hour/365 day service by GPs as part of the new GP contract in 1993 was very much to address a recruitment and retention problem facing general practice at that time. Young doctors, particularly the increasing number of female doctors, were unwilling to enter general practice faced with that level of commitment and responsibility to provide a 24 hour service.

Dispensing area

Members of the PCT Pharmacy Services Committee are visiting the Manningtree, Mistley and Lawford area in February to review the proposed urban boundaries before making a decision that may adversely affect the right of certain patients to obtain dispensing services from the surgeries in that area.

A new electoral roll is currently being prepared. This is a register of church members and anyone over 16, who has been baptised and attends services on a regular basis is eligible to apply. Members are entitled to vote on matters under discussion at the Annual Meeting. Forms are available in the church, from Fr. Nicolas or the secretary Marion Bromfield (tel. 230089).

Plans to install a toilet and meeting room inside the church have been approved by the diocese and it is hoped to start work on these in the near future.

Finally, there is small harmonium in the church, which is no longer used. It is quite good condition and if anyone would like it please get in touch with



Fr. Nicolas or one of the churchwardens. There is no charge but a donation towards church funds would be appreciated.

Raise a Roof in Rwanda

As you know, with one or two exceptions, we support local good causes but this year, in addition to raising funds for our regular charities, we are supporting ENGALYNX - details as follows:

In 1997, Maralyn Bambridge of Brantham, founded ENGALYNX, a charity solely for the purpose of relieving the suffering of orphans of the Rwandan genocide. The name, ENGALYNX, was given by the children at Manningtree school and its meaning is England linking with Rwanda.

The civil war left a huge proportion of Rwandan children as orphans, many of whom had been dreadfully abused by aggressors from both factions. Although. currently, the political climate is relatively stable, so many children are trying to bring up their younger siblings with no practical help whatsoever. This is where ENGALYNX - AND YOU - come in. For every £600 (approx) raised, Maralyn can arrange for a dwelling to be built and furnished to provide safety and security for a family of orphans. 'Houses' are built in clusters so that children can support and care for each other. When sufficient funds are available, a school to provide basic education is set up and maintained. A goat is routinely purchased for minimum cost and given to each family, where it is taken into the home each night for the warmth and comfort it brings to lonely children.

This year, we would like to raise the funds to build as many homes as possible, but, of course, we need your help to do it. During the year, we will be holding several functions and hope that you will support these whenever possible. As you know, we have already begun a toy exchange where your children can 'bring and buy'.

Because this charity is not linked to any religious, political or governmental agency, you can be sure that your money will not be going into a bottomless pit to be wasted on

admin costs or accommodation for relief workers. It will be given to Maralyn who ensures that every penny spent is cost-

effective. In fact, Maralyn will be giving an illustrated talk over the Easter period so you will have the opportunity to ask questions and see what can be done when there is goodwill and application. For those of you who have doubts about this project, think of your 10-year-old child/grandchild/niece/nephew/Godchild. Think what they received for Christmas or their birthday and then think of that child trying to raise and provide for siblings younger than them without the benefit of parents, carers, guides or welfare workers. That is the fate of thousands of Rwandan children. Our kids have so much - these kids just want the chance of a life. PLEASE - help us to help them. Thank vou.

As the seasons change so some of our ideas on gardening must change, one of which is in watering.

This year instead of placing rubble in the bottom of pots, tubs and trays I shall be placing cut up pieces of foil, plastic or grow-bags. The obvious idea is to retain moisture. Left for a day any water given to tubs etc. will run straight out of the

bottom, so by leaving out the rubble and using plastic it will help to keep the soil wet during the hot weather.

KITCHEN CORNER

Carrot Soup

This is my favourite carrot soup recipe and works without fail!

Ingredients:

10oz carrots (peeled weight)

6oz onion

2 crushed cloves garlic

11/2 pts chicken stock

3oz butter

½ pt single cream

1 teasp caster sugar

1 oz plain flour

Salt & fresh ground pepper.

Method:

Grate carrots and onions coarsely (or in food processor). Melt 1 oz butter in heavy based pan and cook onion till softened and transparent. Add carrot and garlic, cover and sweat 10 minutes. Pour on stock and cream, bring to boil then simmer 30 minutes. Towards the end add seasoning and sugar.

in small pan melt other 2 oz butter and blend in flour.

Gradually whisk this into soup and cook till thickened. Serve with extra cream/chopped chives etc. if liked

On 2nd January 2007 Tendring introduced a more frequent collection service with a new weekly collection of recyclables from domestic properties. The recycling will be collected on the same day as your household

refuse but by a separate vehicle. All properties in Tendring have been supplied with a 55 litre green box to store recyclables. Please leave your recycling and refuse just inside your front boundary - but make two separate piles to prevent confusion when the collections take place.

If you are elderly or disabled and cannot put your recycling on your boundary, we can arrange an assisted collection for you where your recycling will be picked up from a location that is convenient for you, please email wcrusader@tendringdc.gov.uk or telephone the contact number shown at the bottom of the page to arrange this. N.B. an assisted collection service is also available for your household waste.

Alternative collection arrangements are available for certain properties such as blocks of flats and farms. For more details or to arrange a collection, email

What can I put out for recycling?

Yes please:

Paper (including junk mail, paper bags, envelopes, old catalogues and telephone directories)

Card (including cardboard and greetings cards) Cans (including aerosol cans, lager cans and soft drinks cans)

Tins (of all varieties including pet food tins and sardine tins)

Plastic Containers (plastic milk bottles, cleaning products, shampoo bottles, plastic food packaging, plastic bags, plastic flower pots, margarine, plastic bags, plastic flower pots, margarine potentials but the context materials but

There is no need to separate materials but please ensure tins, cans and plastic containers

are rinsed out.

No thanks:

Glass - please deposit these at a bring bank in the district

Textiles - please deposit these at a bring bank in the district

Aluminium Foil - please wash, squash and place in a can bring bank

Polystyrene - please put this in your domestic refuse or reuse it to aid drainage in the bottom of pot plants.

What if my green box is not big enough to hold all my recyclables?

If you would like an additional box they are available for collection from various locations in the district, to find a collection point near you please see website for the Recycling Box Collection Points pdf. You can also leave your recycling out in cardboard boxes, carrier bags or clear plastic bags.

N.B. Black refuse sacks must not be used as these are treated as rubbish, not recycling. What if my recycling is not collected?

Check that you have only placed materials that we collect out for recycling and that they have not been put in black sacks, which will be treated as rubbish. All missed recycling collections should be reported directly to Veolia Environmental Services on 01255 431620 after 3.30pm on the day of collection. These will then be picked up the following working day. What happens to the rubbish I put out for recycling?

Veolia takes your recycling to a Materials Recovery Facility where the different materials are sorted and sent for recycling. The various plastics are sorted into types and made into a

wide range of products including bins, compost bins, patio furniture and even fleece clothing. Paper is pulped and reprocessed to make more paper. Cans are melted down to make more cans, saving energy and raw materials.

THE UNITED PARISHES OF ARDLEIGH AND THE BROMLEYS



Dear Parishioner.

In the recent Village appraisal carried out for Great Bromley 80% of the respondents said they valued S George's Church and saw it as a central part of village life. I expect a similar picture would be seen if a survey was carried out in Ardleigh. I say this because whilst it is obvious that 80% of the village's population does not regularly worship in the Churches I am privileged to minister in, at times of importance like Christmass and Remembrance Sunday, for Christenings, weddings and funerals, people do turn out to Church.

In my time here I have been generously received and welcomed in many places and homes and been able in different ways to give something in return. Call in comfort, call it tradition, call it security or peace; the church here still has a place in our communities.

My reason for writing about this is the approaching Annual Parochial Church Meetings, which are when those on the Church Electoral Rolls gather to receive the report of how the PCC has conducted itself during the past year, and elect new members to serve alongside myself as stewards of our beautiful buildings and seek to share God's love.

This year there is an element of having to face difficult truths; not about the faith but about money. At Ardleigh the situation is cushioned by the fact that the interest received from the sale of the Vicar's Room is enabling work to be carried out. The Bromleys does not have that luxury and so the truth is far starker. When various one off amounts are taken from the final accounts (none of which can really be seen as being a luxury) we will have a deficit of around £3,000; a similar deficit as the year 2005.

Fortunately we have savings which means we will not being going bankrupt. but at a similar rate that will be the case in three years time. Like all our homes the main reason is that oil, electricity and insurance prices have risen. This has nothing to do with the separate ring fenced funds for the fabric or new facilities, neither of which are particularly healthy or up to the demands of the future. The amount given by members of the congregation has not significantly dropped despite some deaths and people moving away. Basically those who worship regularly cannot keep up with what it costs to keep the place open and runnina.

Some people will find this letter embarrassing and accuse me of washing dirty laundry in public, but it seems only right that I should be open with you all about the situation the local members of the Church Of England are in. You may be able to help, by making a financial donation to our general fund, or if you do not wish to be involved on a faith level, making a donation to the fabric, facilities or grass cutting funds all of which seek to keep the Churches open, alive and at the centre of our community life. You may have a fundraising idea, or be able to give some advice on how we should use the limited resources we have. The PCCs and I would love to hear from you and if vou do feel that the Churches here are important then just telling us is a good start, on which we can build in the future.
