Musak/hi-fi, mechanical diggers, alarms, mobile phone ring tones, jet planes and other intrusive modern sounds are unfortunately a part and parcel of our way of life that no-one would want to change. I am sure that in the days of horse and carts, rutted roads and sailing ships that took weeks/years to reach their destination, people were just as dissatisfied with their lot and the noises which were different, but equally annoying, were probably as stressful as the present days ones.

However, in the 'old days' the sense of community was stronger. Everyone knew what everyone else was up to and shared, helped or looked on at each other's proceedings.

Nowadays everyone feels they have a 'right' to do whatever they wish, with no concern or thought at all for their neighbours or neighbourhood which possibly leads to the breakdown of tolerance towards others and the general lack of neighbourliness. I am not sure that I would have wanted to have lived next door to my husband's family in the early 1900s: his grandparents had eight children, six of whom were boys who each, along with grandfather, had their own motorbike which had to be maintained as their daily transport!

Until very recently Sundays were a 'day of rest' and therefore much more peaceful and quiet since there were no shops or other attractions open. Our battered eardrums were therefore given a day to recover before the onslaught of the new working week.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Angela Brakeway came to our April meeting to tell us about Marilyn Monroe. She had a rather sad life in spite of her beauty and becoming famous throughout the world. Even today she is often featured in the Press. She was christened Norma Jean Baker and her greatest sorrow was not to have known her father.

When Norma was three years old, her mother went out to work so she was fostered with a religious couple. Later, her mother had to spend time in hospital but she looked after Norma for a while. However she had to return to hospital where she eventually died. Several foster homes later, when Norma was about 12 years old, Grace, an old friend of her mother, cared for her until she was 16 and encouraged her to make herself lovely. At 16 she married the boy next door, Jack Dougherty, and was very happy. In 1944 Jack joined the Marines and Norma took a job in a factory. One day a photographer taking pictures of women working in the war effort asked whether he could photograph Norma as a model for his agency and in 1945 thirteen magazines published her pictures.

She eventually had an audition with a film studio, needed to dye her hair blonde and changed her name to Marilyn Monroe. She divorced Jack in 1946. In 1952 she married Robert Slatzer which



caused fury in the film studio, however the marriage was annulled after the weekend!

Three was Joe Dimaggio, the famous basket ball player, who she married in 1954. Later, Marilyn went out to Korea to entertain the American troops. Joe and Marilyn divorced but remained friends all their lives.

Marilyn met Arthur Miller, the famous playwright, and married him in 1956. They spent their honeymoon in England where she met Lawrence Olivier. Later she starred in "The Prince and the Show Girl" with him. Sadly, Marilyn died in August 1962, aged 32, in mysterious circumstances which were never solved.

Following the fantastic spell of warm weather that we have been enjoying lately, everything seems to be really advanced early. We've had bluebells out in the wood behind where I live for well over a month. (I can't smell them, but Zoë assures me that their scent is marvellous.) Most hedgerows seem to be green (even those which are being ripped out) and the bees and butterflies don't seem to have had any rest at all this winter.

So, ever the spoilsport – here's an early sunburn warning. Even spring sunshine can be intense enough to burn you badly if you aren't careful. So, if you are going to be out in the sun for long periods, even at this time of year, please slap on the sunscreen. Children will be especially vulnerable of course.

We are coming up to peak time for holiday jabs now, so even those of you with needle-phobia might be pondering what you will need for that exotic trip you have planned. Whilst we can do the jabs – we provide a full travel vaccination service including Yellow Fever - we don't have the expertise, the time or the facilities to keep up to date with what vaccinations and anti-malarial drugs are necessary in different parts of the world.

For this reason, our nurses will only give travel vaccinations or organise anti-malarial drugs for you if you have a proper, written report from an expert source telling you what is required for the country and area that you intend to visit. You need to do your research in good time, by the way, as some jabs take a few weeks to become effective. Possible sources of this information (in no order other than alphabetical) are:-

Foreign Office Travel Advice Unit, tel. 020 700 80232/3, website www.fco.gov.uk/travel
MASTA, tel. 0870 6062 782, website www.masta.org

You might have to pay a charge for reports and services provided by some of these organizations. Please check before using them.

Also, please note that there will be a charge for some travel vaccinations and for any anti-malarial drugs prescribed, as they are not part of NHS services. Information is available from our nurses.

On a completely different tack, we seem to have had a big increase in the number of people not turning up for appointments over the last few weeks. In the first three months of the year, we lost well over 200 slots because people had booked appointments then missed them without bothering to let us know that they weren't coming. Putting this into perspective, it was the equivalent of having a doctor sitting twiddling his thumbs and doing nothing for almost two weeks.

Whilst accepting that everyone forgets things now and then, some of these were "urgent" slots, booked on the day, so it's difficult to believe that the non-attenders simply didn't remember to come. Some were double or even treble appointments meaning that two or three people who really needed to be seen had to be squeezed in at the end of surgery.

Please, please, if you find you can't keep an appointment, let us know as soon as you can. If we don't know you aren't coming, we can't recycle your slot. Persistent offenders are likely to get a stern letter.

Finally, I haven't forgotten that I said I would give you more details this month about what is happening with the new national computer system. However, I'm going to have to put that on hold for the moment, as I don't yet have enough information to do the subject justice. More will follow.

KITCHEN CORNER

May is the month when I look forward to warmer weather, the first roses and, later on, the elderflowers. I can't wait to make more elderflower cordial; it is so much better than any you can buy! (for recipe see the June 2006 issue)

I have a cake recipe for you this month, sufficient to make 15 'squares'.

TANGY CITRUS CAKE 'ST CLEMENTS'

Grease and base line a tin 28 x 18cm (11" x 7")

170g (6oz) margarine
115g (4oz) golden granulated sugar
3 medium eggs
200g (7oz) SR flour
170g (6oz) orange marmalade
Grated zest and the juice of 1 lemon

Cream the margarine and sugar, beat in the eggs, adding some flour if it looks like curdling. Fold in the rest of the flour and add the marmalade, zest and juice. Mix well, spoon into the tin and spread evenly. Bake at 180 °C (355 °F) for 35-45 minutes till golden brown and springy. Cool in the tin before cutting into squares.

GARDENING TIPS for May

LAWNS: We don't have to be told to mow at least once a week - the grass length tells us!

ROSES: Spray against aphids and disbud hybrid tea roses if large blooms are required. Remove suckers that grow from the base of the plant.

CHRYSANTHEMUMS: Plant outdoor plants early in the month, stop the plants about the middle of the month.

DAHLIAS: Plant out young dahlias from cuttings after danger of frost is over.

ANNUALS: Plant out half-hardy annuals, sow biennials: Canterbury bells, foxglove, Sweet William, wallflowers.

Sow seeds of *Denticularia* (primulas), irises, rock plants, heather. Remove faded flowers from irises and spring flowered heathers.

HOUSE PLANTS: Increase watering and start to feed every two weeks..

LETTERS

I lived the first 26 years in Thorpe-le-Soken and the next 50 in Gt. Bromley I always believed that the Gt. Bromley pylons were erected in the 1930's for early radar on the highest point in north east Essex. They consisted of 2 smaller wooden pylons, 4 larger wooden pylons and 3 large steel masts of over 500 feet high.



After the war (WWII) they were dismantled over a period of time, starting with the smallest; leaving only one steel mast about half as high, which survives today, Marconi of

Chelmsford used them for wireless telegraphy communications.

When Mr. Webb owned Park Farm; sadly his son was electrocuted in one of the old bunkers.

When the wooden masts were dismantled, a metal pipe ran up the centre of the pylon which was to be cut with a hacksaw, sparks from a live electrical cable were produced which stopped further cutting and the masts were dismantled using explosives.

I have been told that there are water pipes and electrical cables under the ground about the pylon area for which no plans of their whereabouts exists!

Little Bromley Sale 1908

C M Stanford, Auctioneers/Estate Agents of Colchester held a sale at the Board Room, Corn exchange, Colchester on Saturday 13th June, 1908 at 4.00pm.

Lot 3 was two Brick, Timber-and-Slated Freehold Cottages, adjoining the "Wheatsheaf" and had a Sitting Room, Kitchen, and one Bedroom (*extra bedroom in Bunch's house*). The tenant claimed a Boarded and Corrugated Iron Pigsty, not included in the sale. Land Tax as 9s 7d. They were held copyhold of the Manor of Little Bromley which charged a fine of 1s 0d per acre and 2s 0d for each.

Mr J F Wainwright was the lessee at £8 per annum but the landlord paid the outgoings.

Lot 4 was a Double Cottage Tenement, (Brick, Timber and Thatched) with frontage to the main road from Little Bromley to Ardleigh and had a Living Room, Kitchen, Two Bedrooms, a good garden and a well of water. The tenants were due to quit at Michaelmas. The pigsty claimed by Ellis was included in the sale. Land Tax was 9s 7d. Tenants were Arthur Ellis and Robert Wade and paid £8 per annum.

Dear Parishioner,

Sometimes the problems of the world seem too big and we start to think that anything we do won't make a difference. Actually it can be the very opposite! Fundraising makes a massive difference, both to those who give and those who receive.

It might not feel like it, but you're rich. If you've got money in your pocket, even just loose change, you're among the richest eight per cent of the world's population. And if you've got running water in your house, you're one of the most privileged people on the planet. We are lucky in the UK and Ireland because most of us don't have to worry about where the next meal is coming from or whether the water we're drinking will kill us but for some people in the world, these worries are a daily reality. Dirty water and inadequate toilet and washing facilities are the cause of 6,000 children dying every day. Fundraising empowers us by showing that together we can help people improve their lives. So, Christian Aid this year are asking for your help to buy thousands of toilets all over the world. Tropical storms, hurricanes, earthquakes and volcanic eruptions are common in El Salvador. One of the organisations Christian Aid supports there is called Arodehni. It helps people cope with natural disasters as well as building roads and drainage systems.

Jesus Antonio Echevarria (known as Chus) is 15 and lives in his own house with his chickens and ducks. His family all live nearby. After school, Chus works with his family catching crabs to eat and sell. They get just over 50p/74 euro cent for 12 crabs. Chus' house was badly flooded during Hurricane Stan in 2005. Now he and his family work with Arodehni to help prevent flooding caused

by hurricanes. Chus fills sandbags to strengthen the riverbank and gets food in exchange. Arodehni have installed a tap outside his house - before that he had to walk to a well to get water. Water is only available from the tap for two hours each morning, but Chus is pleased he does not to have to walk to the well anymore. He believes that all people in the world are equal and that people shouldn't look down on others. The money you put in the enclosed envelope can make a massive difference. Please be generous and return it to the Post Office, Church or Chapel.
