Stones on the "INCREASE"



One nice spring day in 1960 I was attending a wedding in Glastonbury, Connecticut, and met a gentleman named Stone. I told him that my maiden name was Stone and he fixed me with his bright blue eyes and said, "Simon or Gregory?"

I had just come back from visiting Great Bromley, where I had clutched a photograph of my great -grandfather standing in the doorway of St. George's in 1893. Filled now with Stone lore I could answer with confidence, "Simon".

It is a commonly asked question of Stones in America. Which of the brothers, who were baptized in St. George's in the late 16th century, whose direct ancestors had lived in Great Bromley for three centuries before that, and who, with their families, bravely sailed on two different ships to Massachusetts in the year 1635, were we descended from?

Simon and Gregory Stone and their families were farmers. In Massachusetts they settled into lovely pieces of land on the Charles River and continued farming. Simon Stone's farm, Mt. Auburn, is now replaced by the bucolic cemeteries, Mt. Auburn and the adjacent Cambridge Cemetery. Many of the rest of the farms the brothers owned are now downtown Cambridge, home of Harvard University.

In 1897 the Stone Family Association was founded in Boston and held regular meetings. By 1914, they appointed a committee for compiling and publishing the genealogies of the descendants of Deacon Gregory Stone and Deacon Simon Stone. They raised money to engage Mr. J. Gardner Bartlett to research the Stone family and he produced two eight hundred-page volumes listing not only names but personal information on Stones from 1320 to 1926. Consequently many members of the family were well aware of their ancestors and their ties to Great Bromley. In April, 1904, the Stone Family Association donated a stained glass window dedicated "To the Glory of God and to the Memory of Simon and Gregory Stone, Brothers, who were born in this Parish, baptized in this church, and emigrated to Massachusetts in New England in 1635, this

Window is erected by American Descendants". The three panelled window is above the north aisle nearest the chancel.

In the spring of 2000 Fr. Nicolas Spicer, Jean Harding and the community of St. George's and Great Bromley invited as many Stones as they could track down to come for a weekend of celebration and a medieval feast. Several dozen Stones who had never met and from across America, from California, Alaska, Massachusetts. Kentucky. New Mexico. Texas.

New England, and Washington, D.C. arrived for three days of feasting, clambering over the church, making rubbings ,photographing and being treated lovingly and warmly as returning family.



During a visit to Washington, D.C. in 2001, Fr. Nicolas met with fellow Englishman James Warren, Esq. and set up a non-for-profit organization, The Society for the Preservation of Ancient Churches, so that Americans could contribute to a fund which could help St. George's repair it's double hammerbeam ceiling or be useful in other ways, if wanted. The fund has raised over \$35,000 (almost 18,000 pounds sterling) for the church.

Fr. Nicolas and Jean Harding have returned to the States every other fall since then, this last year bringing along the Hills as well. Stones again travelled from across the states to meet with them and learn news of Great Bromley. We found an inn on Cape Cod owned by the Stone family since the 1930's and we stayed there, looking eastward "across the pond" sharing family information, pictures and stories about what the Stones have been up to. One cold October, Jean Harding was the only one of us brave enough to have a swim in the freezing Atlantic.

During last autumn's visit there were excited dreams about the possibility of another visit to Great Bromley.

By now, many of us Stones feel we have a second home in Great Bromley.

VISITING STONES

I am presuming that Susanne Stone Page will have beaten me to it in writing about her forebears, how they left Great Bromley in 1634, and how indeed we are so closely linked with many of them again. Oddly enough, to coincide with the anniversary of the early settlers in America. I have recently been there staving with Susanne and Jake in their lovely Colorado home, where by the way, mountain lions and bears are known to challenge them and their stock, which includes 6 dogs, 5 chickens and two guinea pigs. These two very special people are authorities on the Hopia small Indian tribe who live in Arizona in the Indian reservation.

I was extremely privileged to be taken there by Susanne and to visit the Hopia. be welcomed in their homes and to witness a sacred dance which is performed by Kachina dancers in the plaza of the first mesa, which is an earthen square around which are built typical houses of stone and earth. This is one of 3 mesas inhabited on high cliffs for protection, above the desert. These dancers were unrecognisable as people, masked and at times quite frighteningly dressed in ritualistic garments, when they execute their celebratory or prayerful ceremonies for two days; at this time of the vear for rain.

On this occasion some 50 or so dancers were arrayed with antelope horns, obscuring their heads, indicating that they were of a particular, possibly deer clan, ornamented with eagles or turkey feathers, and jangling shells or beads around their waists. To drumbeats they distribute gifts, food and Kachina dolls representing the spirits of their ancestors to women and children. The dolls are made secretly by the elders of the clan or village, of cottonwood and decorated with symbolic forms. I felt very humbled by

the presentation of two of these dolls to me, the smaller one indicating that I was accepted into their tribe. The wife of the artist told me in detail of her marriage and the long ritual preparations, and showed me the garments made by the groom and his family. This is a matrilineal society where the man follows the wife's clan, and children also. There are schools there now, with education high on their list of priorities, they being an intelligent people

The desert below is sparse, and corn needs to be planted very deeply, the roots sometimes lengthening to 6 metres to reach moisture, planted in clumps to withstand the desert sandstorms and winds (which we experienced on our journey). They are a very industrious people, handgrinding the corn baking very special "biki" breads from blue corn, raising melons and peaches, and hunting for rabbits and small animals for food. We left them as the rain began to fall, turning into sleet as we tried in our small car to cross the Rocky mountains. Blocked by snow, we had to turn back to the last village, some 50 miles back, and found another route next day to take us up though Arizona, Utah, New Mexico and Colorado, marking the spot where the 4 sacred mountains meet. Finally into Colorado through cowboy

mountains we finished our 1700 mile journey.
A memorable journey, contrasting so greatly with my first week in USA which I had spent in sophisticated New York

country, and beautiful

FROM THE DOCTORS' SURGERIES

Great Bentley Surgery

Just for a change I'm going to start on a good, positive note this month, and it proves again that we do actually take notice of people when they make suggestions.

There have recently been patient satisfaction surveys carried out at both the surgery and the pharmacy. (Thanks again to those who took part.) One common theme in responses was that you obviously want The Green Pharmacy to start opening on Saturday mornings again. The doctors and Sarah, our pharmacist, have talked this through and it has been agreed that we will do this, on a trial basis, from the beginning of July.

We will be providing the full range of services there from 9.00am until 1.00pm each Saturday. This includes dispensing acute prescriptions and handing out repeat prescriptions previously ordered. There will be a qualified pharmacist available to give expert advice on medication and minor ailments. And of course the shop will be open, with its excellent range of "over the counter" medicines, cosmetics, toiletries, baby goods, gifts etc.

I have to stress that Saturday opening is on trial. It will only become a permanent feature if the pharmacy is actually used on Saturday mornings. It costs quite a lot to have it open and it needs to pay for itself. We have done our bit by listening and acting. Now it is up to everyone out there to "use it or lose it."

A little bit more now about the new NHS national computer system. We still don't know a lot about it, but some details are gradually becoming clearer.

The idea is that everyone's medical

records are to be held on the so-called "spine" - a huge (and very expensive) new national computer system. It will enable any medical professional who happens to be looking after you, wherever you are in the country, to check on your history and see if you have any illnesses, allergies etc that they need to take into account when treating you.

So far, so good. The principle of utilising all available technology to improve patient care seems eminently sensible. However, some people are concerned about possible insecurities in the system, the worry being that hackers could gain access to personal information which could be useful to unscrupulous insurance companies or employers.

Certainly, it seems that all names and addresses will be traceable by any NHS staff member who holds a "smart" card giving access to the spine, which is a little concerning.

I'm reserving judgement on the whole scheme at present. I want to know a lot more about what is involved and the safeguards built in. The Department of Health has promised to write to everyone living in areas where the spine is about to be activated, giving a lot more information before their details are added.

It seems that it will be some while before we in the Tendring area are affected, but anyone whose immediate reaction is that they don't want their personal details to go onto the spine can now lodge their objections in writing via the surgery. We understand that this stops the medical records that are held on our computer system here becoming accessible via the spine. However, and anyone who has already lodged their objection needs to note this, we are told that it does **not** stop names and addresses going onto the spine, nor does it seem to bar hospital records being accessible. I imagine that

you need to contact any hospitals which have looked after you if you want their records to be blocked.

Things will no doubt become clearer as the new system develops. I expect and hope that objections and concerns now being voiced will change the whole way that it works so that everyone eventually has the privacy that they are entitled to. As and when further information becomes available, I shall pass it on.

Finally, some of you are missing out. Anyone who is already aged 65 or over, or who will be by 31st March 2008, is entitled to a free pneumonia jab courtesy of the good old NHS. We still have well over 400 people who haven't yet taken us up on this really good piece of healthy protection. If you are one of them, why not give us a ring and arrange an appointment with one of our nurses. The jab only takes a minute and could save you from a really nasty illness which can be fatal – even in summer.

GOING SMOKEFREE – ARE YOU READY?

Are you ready to go smokefree? From 1 July 2007, all enclosed public places and workplaces in England must become smokefree.

The new law will cover:

- all offices, factories and shops
- pubs, bars, restaurants and membership clubs
- the public areas of hotels, B&Bs and residential care homes
- taxis and public transport
- work vehicles that are used by more than one person

The law will mean that indoor smoking rooms, still common in workplaces, will no longer be allowed, so anyone wishing to smoke will have to go outside instead.

All smokefree premises and vehicles will be required to display no-smoking signs.

Help is at hand

If you are unsure of how this new law will affect you, or what you will need to do to comply, help is at hand.


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TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURES

A friend sent us a copy of the June Bromley Messenger. Looking through it, I came across a picture of the radar pylons at Great Bromley, which brought back many memories of my childhood.

During the war, I lived at Hiskey's Farm, Little Bromley, from the age of eight years. I remember, one morning, (I was about ten years old at the time), walking across the field near Hillyard Farm, when I heard a noise and looked up and saw a German aeroplane, all black, going very slow, at about the height of the pylons (350-400 feet), coming straight over me. The nose of the 'plane was like a big greenhouse and I could see a man in it. The guns at the pylons didn't fire and it went out towards Manningtree, and followed the River Stour out to Harwich



where it got a hot reception from the guns there. I could see this, as the land is very flat. We, at various times, used to get airmen coming to the door, asking if we could give them a few

eggs as they were going home on leave. We always did, although we should not have done, really.

I thought that there were four steel pylons and early on they dismantled one of them, which went up to Scotland. After the war, the site became empty and a caretaker lived on the steel pylon site.

One day, myself and a friend, Guy Sams, decided to climb the wooden pylon that stood on its own, near park Farm. We got about halfway up when we saw the caretaker coming down the road on his bike, so we scuttled down, jumped on our bikes, and raced up the road. We never did try it again; we would have got a good view from up there.

My wife, Marion, lived at Burnt Heath, and we still have several friends in the area and come back, on occasions. Our children attended the village school at Gt Bromley; the Headmaster, at that time, was Mr Hammond. Mr Deere ran the Post Office and the Rev. Mr Ransom was the Rector.

GREAT BROMLEY VILLAGE HALL CHARITYTRUSTEES

The Village Hall committee met on 5th June with our new chairman, Frederick Nicholls, and nine members present. We were pleased to welcome Neil Skinner who was introduced by the chairman and with the agreement of those present was co-opted on to the committee.

There have been several new pieces of government legislation passed in the last few years which could affect the running of our village hall. For example, the Licensing Act 2003, the Gambling Act 2005, the Charities Act 2006, are under the jurisdiction of Tendring District Council as the administrative authority.

From 1st July 2007 the Village Hall will



become a No Smoking Building as the Smoke Free Regulations take effect in England. Your co-operation is sought to refrain from smoking in any part of the village hall (including the toilets).

Failure to comply could result in you and us being liable for a fine.

You will see when you visit the village hall that a white picket fence has been erected at the edge of the south car park and the grassed area. The reasons are twofold: one, the Playgroup must have a fenced area so they can play outside when the weather is suitable, and two, to keep vehicles off the grassed area when conditions are poor.

The committee has agreed to hold the hire charges at current levels for the next year to 31st August 2008. Charges were last raised from 1st September 2006 (September to April are winter rates, May to August are summer rates).

The Village Hall committee are organising a coffee morning at the Hall on Saturday 7th July from 10.30am until 2.00pm. Come along to see us on the day -various stalls, raffle, tea, coffee and light lunches will be available. Cakes and other raffle prizes will be gratefully received if anybody could help.



KITCHEN CORNER

ROLLED PAVOLOVA

A different way to serve this classic dish for a party - Serves 8

4 egg whites

2 teasp vinegar

1 small tin sliced peaches, drained

8 tbsp castor sugar

1 teasp cornflour

Coconut or split almonds ½pt whipping cream

Beat egg whites stiff. Add cornflour while continuing to beat, then vinegar and 6 tbsp sugar. Beat till stiff and glossy. Fold in remaining 2 tbsp sugar. Spread the mix evenly on to a Swiss roll tin which has been lined, greased, sprinkled with water, then sprinkled with almonds or coconut. Bake 15 mins at 350°F / 180°C. Turn out onto greaseproof paper sprinkled with sugar.

Gently peel off the paper and cool for 10-15 mins. Then spread with the whipped cream and peach slices, roll up lengthwise like a Swiss roll.

Wrap it in a tea towel and chill in refrigerator for at least two hours before serving.
