STORMY TIMES

Delving as I have been each month into the Messenger of 20 years ago, the constant

references to events being upset by the bad summer weather keep leaping out at me. The weather that year culminated in the 'Great Storm' or Hurricane of 15/16 October 1987. I remember lying in bed listening to the wind howling and wondering if we were going to have a roof left by the morning. However, in our case, it was not structural damage so much as the devastation of the huge trees that had fallen during the night across the drive and around the garden. Fortunately none of them hit any buildings. The electricity was off for a week until a very nice Scotsman, especially drafted in to help in this area, restored it. With no electricity our water pump to extract water from the well did not work so my husband set to and restored to working order the hand pump that the electric pump had replaced. What hard work that was and for very little water! We took it in turns to pump enough water to cook with and a little for washing. We had a rota system but the novelty of pumping water very quickly wore off and it became just a chore. This episode in our lives made me aware and appreciate just how glad I am that we have electricity and running water, something that many communities around the globe still do not have, just how precious these resources are and that they should never be wasted, as well as the hard work involved in collecting it.

One of the new Working Groups (WG 11), as you will see elsewhere in this magazine, is organising a litter picking day in order to keep our village clean and

tidy of the rubbish that people seem to constantly leave behind. It is a simple matter to take your rubbish home with you and also ensures that the wildlife does not ingest unsuitable matter which can so easily kill them.

Again foot and mouth has reared its ugly head this month and seems to be spreading along with the new mosquito borne virus, Bluetongue. Food prices are set to rise after failed harvests - worldwide, not just here - and no doubt as a knock-on effect of FMD. The era of cheap food which we take for granted, and of which huge amounts are wasted, looks as though it is coming to an end and with it may come more respect for the producers of foodstuffs, as well as the animals themselves, who give the mainstay of life - food - such pleasure.

October sees the end of the summer harvest season and the beginning of autumn fruits. The fruit harvest in my garden is patchy this year - no plums, few apples but an abundance of pears, even the blackberries are not as large and abundant as usual despite the early rain which dried up for them probably at the crucial period. Not that I can eat it but I took possession today of my first conker of the year.

Perhaps a harsh winter is in store and we will go into the new year with the seasons back to their normal type and temperatures. A cold spell would certainly kill off all these 'hot house' viruses the higher temperatures seem to be bringing from the Continent.

Meanwhile a little late autumn sun would be lovely.

OCTOBER

Lawns: This is the ideal month for planting new lawns turfs are best because you get

an instant lawn - keep well watered after laving until it is established.

Shrubs: Keep taking hardwood cuttings from the middle of the month.

Roses: Plant roses at the end of the month. Take cuttings of climbers and ramblers.

Dahlias: After frost (do we get any these days?) cut down stems to 6" and lift tubers and store in a frost free shed or garage.

Bulbs: Complete planting by the end of the month. Tulips can be left until mid-November. Lift and store gladioli.

Lilies: Divide overgrown clumps and replant.

Report of a parish council meeting held on 13 September 2007

Planning

The Council considered the following planning applications and had no objections:

Park Farm, Hilliards Road – extension of existing building and change of use from agricultural to general industrial

Hamilton Lodge, Parsons Hill – replacement of four buildings by four residential care bungalows

5 Council Houses, Harwich Road – extension and detached outbuilding Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications, except as indicated:

Heath Dene, Ardleigh Road – widening of vehicle access (refusal)

Glenmead, Frating Road – conservatory **The Chapel, Chapel Lane** – swimming pool, conservatory, link corridor

Village volunteers and insurance cover

Volunteers undertaking work on parish council projects will normally be covered by the council's insurance with respect to public liability and personal injury. Normal common sense precautions should be taken. Cover is only for volunteers aged between 15 and 75. Insurance will apply when tools, equipment and materials provided through the parish council are used. This may include lawn mowers and strimmers (goggles to be worn) but no other power equipment or vehicles. If you have any queries on this matter please speak to a working group leader or the parish clerk.

The next meeting of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday 11 October 2007 at the Village Hall Great Bromley. David Lines, Executive Leader of Tendring District Council will be in attendance to answer questions on the council's policies and services. Residents are welcome to attend.

Great Bromley Parish Council GRANTS

Community grants

The parish council currently sets aside about £2000 annually from its income to provide small grants to organisations whose activities benefit the residents of Great Bromley. Safe as houses

Anti-theft number plate screws

More than 40,000 number plates were stolen in England and Wales last year, many of which were used to clone vehicles. Anti-theft number plate screws make number plates virtually impossible to steal. The screws are available from most major automotive retailers.

Sat nav - windscreen dusters

Crime prevention needn't be expensive. Keep a duster in your car to remove the tell-tale sucker marks left on the windscreen by your sat nav cradle.

Intelligent car alarms

Luxury car theft is a growing problem. However some car alarms can literally stop thieves in their tracks. A category five Thatcham alarm can track a vehicle, alert its owner when it's stolen and even immobilise it remotely at the flick of a switch, once the engine is switched off. For more information on alarm systems, contact your local car dealership.

Mobile phones

In 12 per cent of house burglaries, a mobile phone is stolen. Make a note of your phone's unique International Mobile Equipment Identity (IMEI) number, a serial number that can't be erased from the phone.

To find your mobile phone's IMEI no. key in *#06#. This will cause a unique, 14 to 17-digit code to appear on your mobile phone screen. This is your IMEI no. Make a note of it so that, in the event your

phone is stolen, you can contact your mobile phone operator with it and this will enable your phone to be 'disabled' and become useless to the thieves. You can also register your IMEI no. at www.immobilise.com together with any serial no. on the kit.

Decoy security systems

If a homeowner can't afford an expensive burglar alarm or CCTV system, they can buy fakes, which will still deter many thieves. Some decoy alarms and cameras on sale at DIY shops even include glowing LED lights which make them look more realistic.

Marking property

Marking valuable property with either an ultra-violet or a permanent marker is a good idea. However, there are increasingly sophisticated marker products on the market, including SmartWater and microdot systems, to name a couple. It's virtually impossible to remove them.

Storing keys

Keeping keys near the front door can be a recipe for disaster as increasing numbers of thieves are 'fishing' for them with either a hook or a magnet attached to a long cane. Keys should be stored out of sight.

Flu jab clinics, which will be in full swing by the time this hits the news stands, are booking up fast. We are trying to schedule them at times which will suit as many people as possible, so some Saturday clinics have been arranged again this year. We also have special sessions at Little Clacton village hall as usual. If you qualify for a free jab, please book your appointment soon to get maximum protection.

If you aren't sure whether or not you are entitled to a free jab, please ask our receptionists and they will check. If you aren't due a free one, the pharmacy should have plenty of stock this year, so we can always arrange a private prescription for you. Again, please ask at reception.

We now have well over a hundred people registered to use the new internet access system and, so far, it has been running pretty well. Only one person appears to have had any real difficulty with it, which means a very high percentage success rate. If you want to give the system a try, please let us know. Just to recap, using the system you can book, cancel or alter most appointments, order repeat medication and send us simple messages via the internet. It costs nothing (other than your normal internet connection charges) and can be done any time of the day or night.

It's a while since we had a featured employee of the month, and I am told that many of you like to know a bit more about the people who work here. So, this month – take a bow Nicola Lambert, who is the newest addition to our reception team.

Nic (or "Lamby" to distinguish her from all

the other Nicolas and Nicholases that we seem to have accumulated over the years) joined us back in December last year. We were delighted to get her, as she had previously been a secretary at The Oaks private hospital in Colchester so she was already well used to looking after people, especially when they are not feeling at their best. She quickly picked up all our quirky procedures and, like so many people here, grabbed a few areas of administration to specialise in and call her own. WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Mr Mark Leroy, assisted by Mrs Leroy, came along to tell us all about their Stour Valley Organic Company "Organic Lavender". They are based in Ramsey near Harwich and it is the only organic lavender farm in Essex.

Floral oils were known in Asia 4000 years ago and lavender was known here in medieval times, having been brought to England by the Romans. It was Queen Victoria's favourite perfume and the famous Faberge eggs have



lavender oil mixed into their enamel. It can be applied to the skin safely as a massage or to bind wounds, burns, blisters and soothes toothache, children's chickenpox and reduces scarring.

Mr and Mrs Leroy spent 8 or 9 years experimenting before being approved by the Soil Association. The lavender plants are grown close together for best results, they are pruned in the spring, also it is the best time to take cuttings. The plants can last for about 30 years; a large amount of flowers are needed to produce a very small amount oil.

Mr and Mrs Leroy brought along examples of their high quality products for us to sample and purchase such as skin care, lip balm, handcream, soap, shortbread biscuits, honey and preserves.

It was a very informative evening. In October, Sharon Newton of "Newleigh Crafts" is to teach us card making. If you are interested, come along to the village hall on Wednesday, 3rd October at 7.30pm, we will be pleased to see you.

Chocolate Peppermint Sandwich

2 eggs

4 oz caster sugar

4 oz SR flour

4 oz butter or margarine


Filling; 2 oz butter

Later on they returned home as I think their parents missed them too much. Another time we had a charming Indian Airforce officer staying with us. My other memory is the night when two parachute land mines landed in the field next to our property. The whole house shook violently and the next day we saw the huge craters. Our horses had a narrow escape as fortunately there was a small belt of trees between their field and the place where the mines had landed.

The October Quiz answers

- This was the eighth month of the Roman calendar and was displaced by July and August which were added to commemorate Julius and Augustus Caesar.
- 2. This is the Munich beer festival. It begins at the end of the third week in September and lasts for two weeks. The first Oktoberfest was held on October 12th 1810 in honor of the Bavarian Crown Prince Ludwig's marriage to Princess Therese von Sachsen-Hildburghausen and ended on October 17th with a horse race. The festival was moved to September to benefit from better weather conditions which enabled visitors to stroll over "die Wiesen" or the fields without feeling chilly. Historically, the last weekend of the festival was in October and this tradition continues into present times.
- 3. John Keats in 1820
- 4. The Kinks, the two brothers were Ray and Dave Davies
- 5. You can begin to pick blackberries at the start of the school holidays up until the end of September. You should not pick them after Michaelmas (29th September) as the devil will spit on them and make them bitter. Blackberries in October are known as Devil's fruit.
- 6. Eight: New years day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, May day, Spring bank holiday, Summer bank holiday, Christmas day and Boxing day.
- 7. Like St Swithen's day, bad weather on this day means a bad winter.
- 8. This may be because of the change in the calendar from the Julian to the Gregorian which happened around this time in 1752 and/or because it follows the medieval agricultural pattern of the year when in July and August ablebodied young people were needed

on the farms

9. On or near October 20th. There was a fair in Colchester on this day in 1318 called St Dennis Fair, in the 1790s there was the Corporation (Oyster) Lunch on or about this date and there was the modern Oyster Feast in 1845, all (after 1752) occurring in late October. The feast is said to commemorate Richard I granting the River Colne Oyster fishing rights to the town.

12. October 28th 1886, Ellis Island U.S.A. The people of France gave the Statue to the people of the United States in recognition of the friendship established during the American Revolution. The Statue was completed in France in July, 1884 and arrived in New York Harbour in June 1885 on board the French frigate "Isere". The Statue was reduced to 350 individual pieces for shipping and reassembled on her new pedestal four months later.
