RECTORY WAR REMINISCENCES

At least at the distance of time, our life at the rectory (now Copley Dene) in the 1930s seems no less than idyllic; we enjoyed a large house with 7 bedrooms (we took turns for those which were more favoured), a large garden which, as well as a tennis court, offered all sorts of adventures to children, and we specially enjoyed a large family - the Reverend A G H Gurney, Mrs B A Gurney, Christine, Richmond (who died in 2004), Anne (who died in 2002), Tony, Dick, Celia and Gerald (I was the only one born in the rectory).

Many people - at least in the country - say that the war was often exciting rather than frightening, and I well recall standing alone on the edge of the cricket field and watching a "dog-fight" over Frating. But sometimes, when the sirens sounded at night, we took refuge in the cellar, where deck-chairs were permanently set up. Tony passed the time drawing cartoon figures (notably Hitler) on one of the walls: I believe these still survive. Celia reminded me of the decoy fires, or "starfish" mentioned by Winston Churchill in his epic history of the war. Some of these were set up in the open fields between Hall Road and Elmstead and were designed to persuade enemy bombers to drop their bombs harmlessly rather than on Colchester. No traces remain. In case the rectory should suffer a direct hit, we were provided with an escape route directly from the cellar into the garden.

In the early years of the war, Christine, Richmond, Anne and Tony all went off to active service, and the rectory itself played its part in the war effort, first (briefly)
providing a
home for
refugees from
London and
then
accommodation
for army officers
(each with a



batman), who were, no doubt, pleased to be billeted in a fine Queen Anne rectory. Mother encouraged visits by wives. We also had Land Army girls - living in the extensive attics - who were employed, along with the remaining children, on local farms.

For part of the war, we had a light aid detachment in the garden, an overflow from the requisitioned Essex and Suffolk buildings next door. Father seized the opportunity to persuade the soldiers to place a large net over his beloved fig tree to protect it from birds. In lighter moments - when it was not occupied by armoured cars, we played impromptu "vard" cricket in the front drive, under the fine avenue of lime trees now sadly lost to the 1987 hurricane. There was only one batsman and everyone joined in - family, friends, soldiers, even the visiting baker on his round - and, believe it or not, a certain Captain Douglas Jardine who had led the England team in the notorious "bodyline" tour of Australia in 1933.

Christine, Richmond, Anne and Tony all returned safely from the war.

Report of a parish council meeting held on 11 October 2007

Tendring District Council

District Councillor David Lines, Executive Leader of Tendring District Council, attended the meeting and answered questions on the council's policies, plans and services. The Planning Inspector's report on the Tendring District Replacement Local Plan was scheduled to be published in October and details will be given in December's Messenger. Otherwise please see the district and parish councils' websites at: www.tendringdc.gov.uk and www.essexinfo.net/gbpc/. The inspector's decision on the 'Oasis' site will be of particular interest to residents.

Planning

The Council considered the following planning applications with no objections, except as indicated:
Southview, Ardleigh Road – carport.
Denique, Mary Lane South – detached garage.

Hazel's Garage, Harwich Road – temporary staff and storage facilities (portacabins) (objections)

Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications, except as indicated:

Bush Farm, Hall Road – erection of new house, demolition of existing house and alteration to vehicular access (refusal).

Elm Bungalow, Harwich Road – demolition of existing bungalow and erection of two new chalet bungalows.

Harwin, Frating Road – revisions to approved plans for extensions and alterations – to provide covered way.

Land adjacent to Selectacars, Harwich Road – agricultural barn.

Snooty Fox, Frating Road – wooden

decking and covered smoking area (refusal).

Proposed reservoir

The council discussed with residents a reservoir planned for farmland north of Carrington's Farm. The council had only just heard of this proposal and a formal planning application has yet to be submitted. At first sight this appears to be a substantial enterprise: the reservoir's area will be about four times that of the Hare Green playing field; up to one million cubic metres of material will need be excavated from the site and carted away by lorries over a period of time; approximately 13 million gallons of additional water will be extracted annually to fill the reservoir.

The parish council will be monitoring closely this proposal and will ensure that the local community is adequately consulted and represented when the planning application is being considered by the authorities.

The next meeting of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday 8 November 2007 at the Village Hall Great Bromley.

KITCHEN CORNER



Pumpkin soup

This is the season for pumpkins and they have many uses as well as being fun for the children at Hallow'een

The flesh will keep several days in the fridge or can be frozen to use later on. This soup can also be frozen.

Ingredients

2lb/ 900g pumpkin.

1½ oz 40g butter

1 onion peeled and thinly sliced

1 clove garlic crushed

1 ½ pts 900ml chicken or vegetable stock

Salt and pepper

½ level teasp ground ginger

1 tbsp lemon juice

Grated rind of 1 small orange

1fresh bay leaf

½ pt/300ml milk.

To garnish, 4-6 tbsp cream, plain yogurt or fromage frais, and snipped chives.

Method

Peel pumpkin and discard seeds and cut flesh into cubes about 1in/2.5 cms Melt butter in a pan and fry onion and garlic gently till soft but not coloured. Add the pumpkin and toss in the fat for a few minutes, add the stock and bring to the boil .Add the seasonings ginger lemon iuice and orange rind and bay leaf. Cover and simmer 20 minutes or till tender. Discard bay leaf, cool a little then sieve, liquidise or puree in a food processor. Return to a clean pan with the milk and bring slowly back to the boil and adjust seasonings. Serve each portion with a swirl of cream or yoghurt or fromage frais and sprinkle with chives. Serves 4 to 6 people.

KITCHEN CORNER 20 years ago **Christmas Pudding**

A pudding made now will have time to mature to a fuller flavour. This recipe is our family favourite, is rich and moist but not sticky. The quantities will make one large or two medium sized puddings.

8oz each of the following:

fresh breadcrumbs

suet (chopped or grated)

Currants

Sultanas

Raisins

4oz of:

Candied peel

Glace cherries Soft brown sugar

1 teasp cinnamon

1 teasp mixed spice

½ teasp salt

2oz large raisins

Chopped almonds

3oz ground almonds

2 grated apples

2 grated carrots

Rind & juice of 1 large lemon

3 eggs (beaten)

1 heaped tbsp Golden Syrup

1 heaped tbsp treacle

3 fl oz sherry or brandy

5 fl oz brown ale or milk

Mix & stir well, not forgetting to wish! Put in a greased basin, cover with greased greaseproof paper and foil, tie down well, steam for at least six hours. Remember to top up the water from the kettle to keep it boiling.

When cold, remove covers and replace with fresh greaseproof; store in the cupboard until Christmas Day when it will need another two hours steaming. Flame it with brandy and serve with cream and brandy butter!





FROM THE ARDLEIGH DOCTORS' SURGERY

Requesting your repeat medication before Christmas

The surgery will be closed for three working days only during the Christmas period on the normal Bank Holidays.

We would request that you do not order early for your repeat medication unless you are going away on holiday at Christmas.

Every year the Dispensary gets



overwhelmed with patients ordering early and the staff end up having to do two weeks work in one. This causes unnecessary stress with dispensary staff having to work

late into the evenings to keep up with the demand

If patients ask for their medications early they will be requested to telephone back later at the time in the month they would normally telephone. The only exceptions will be for patients whom would need to collect repeat medication on the Bank Holidays.

If your medication would normally need to be ordered for collection on the 24th, 25th or 26th December then please order on Tuesday 18th December and collect on the Friday 21st December.

If required for the Tuesday 1st January, then please order on Friday 21st December and collect on Friday 28th December.

If you obtain your medicines from the chemist, please bear in mind that pharmacy staff have the same problem.

FROM THE GT BENTLEY DOCTORS' SURGERY

Since last month, there has been a change in the provision of emergency treatment needed outside normal surgery hours. An organisation called Harmoni (that's really what they call themselves, my spelling isn't that bad!) has taken over responsibility for treating people when the surgery is shut. The changeover appears to have been fairly seamless as patients requiring attention still only need to ring the surgery number to speak to the doctors on duty. This is all done by the magic of an automatic BT transfer and costs the same as a local call. However, it is worth refreshing everyone's memories on how the out of hours service works anyway.

The surgery is manned – or should I say "personned"? – by the practice's own staff from 8.00am until 6.30pm each weekday. During those hours, for routine things like booking appointments, or if you are unfortunate enough to need urgent treatment, simply ring the surgery telephone number, 01206 250695, and we will look after you.

Outside these hours, including at weekends, if you need straightforward medical advice, you can get it by ringing NHS Direct on 0845 46 47. NHS Direct is a nurse-led service which will advise on most medical issues that crop up when the surgery is closed.

If you feel you need urgent medical

attention when we are shut. Harmoni will step in to look after you. They might be able to advise you over the 'phone, but if not can arrange to see you at one of the local walk-in treatment centres that they run. If you really are too ill to go to them, they will either visit you at home, suggest a trip to your local A&E Department, or in an extreme emergency, send an ambulance out to you. Please note, however, that they won't visit you or send an ambulance just because you have transport problems. Getting vourself to where medical care is available is your responsibility unless you are genuinely too sick to do so.

Harmoni is manned by fully trained and qualified GPs who, for urgent matters, will look after you just as well as our own GPs would. So, there is no need to worry about the standard of care that you or your family will receive. They will send the practice a report of anything they do for you so that your records here are up to date.

Having said all that, please only use Harmoni if your problem genuinely can't wait until the surgery is open again. Their service really is intended for urgent matters. Think of it this way: if they are dealing with something minor and non-urgent for you, they might just be too late getting to a heart attack or stroke victim.


On a seasonal note, and with no apology if I'm repeating myself, the flu jab clinics are in full swing at the moment. By the end of September, just under a thousand people had bared an arm to a nurse or doctor, thus protecting themselves against the worst ravages of a dose of winter flu.

Anyone aged 65 or over by 31st March 2008, or who suffers from diabetes, chronic heart, lung or kidney disease, or whose immune system is suppressed is entitled to a free flu jab. Book yours now to avoid disappointment, because if there is an epidemic this winter all our stocks may well be gone, and they can be hard

to get hold of later in the season. Incidentally, if you don't qualify for a free jab, I understand that local pharmacies can supply them fairly easily and at a reasonable price to people with private prescriptions this year. Our nurses will administer privately purchased jabs to our patients at no cost if you bring one in, and I expect the situation will be the same at other surgeries. Please ask at reception if you want a private prescription.

Talking of prescriptions, I know that a few people have asked recently if they may have more than 28 days' supply of their medication at a time on their repeat prescription. I'm afraid that the short answer is "no". The Department of Health has told us to restrict supplies to 28 days and we have to follow their directive. It is much safer to dispense smaller amounts, but the main aim of this strategy is to cut wastage. Apparently, the evidence is that if people get a larger supply there is more of a tendency to hoard medicines and, of course, more is thrown away if medication

Crime prevention advice - Protect your vehicle

KEEP your car keys safe and out of sight. That is the message from Essex Police after a spate of vehicle thefts from driveways across the county.

Thieves have been breaking into homes in order to steal car keys. They then drive the vehicle away. Essex Police is

appealing for the public's help in curbing the high number of this offence by making it more difficult for thieves. Crime reduction Sgt Nathalie Carr said: "We would advise people to

keep their car keys safe and out of view of opportunist burglars. If a burglar sees an expensive car on your driveway they will look through your home window to see if they can see your keys. If they are left on show or in an obvious place thieves will be tempted to break in and take them. Many people put their keys on hooks by their front doors, in their handbags or in the kitchen drawer. We are asking for them to think about where they put their keys and to consider putting them somewhere less obvious."

Summer drink and drug drive figures fall

Drink driving offences across Essex have fallen following a crack down by Essex Police.

Although drink driving rates were falling, almost 35 per cent of those tested for drink driving were less than 25 years of age.

Adam Pipe, senior traffic management officer, said "Many of the accidents on the

roads across Essex, however, are preventable. Making alternative travel arrangements after people have been out or simply not drinking at all before driving could easily lower the number of incidents we see."

With the festive season approaching Essex Police will be working hard to stop repeat offenders, warning that all driving offences will be taken extremely seriously, no matter how petty they may seem. Essex Police has now warned that the consequences of drink driving are far more than a prison sentence, 12 month driving ban and a fine of up to £5000, offenders run the risk of losing their job, home and future with a criminal record.

- Read the instructions carefully, using a torch or hand lamp NEVER use a naked flame
- Light fireworks at arms length using a

- Stand well back and NEVER return to a firework after it has been lit, it could explode in your face
- Ensure that all children with fireworks are well supervised
- NEVER throw fireworks
- Keep all pets and animals indoors
- Take care of sparklers, wear gloves to hold them and dispose of sparklers in a bucket of water as soon as they are finished

Arlesford Man Remembers Poor

John Rand was from Alresford but had Great Bromley connections and by his will of 15 April, 1570 left "To the poor men's boxes of Alresford and Great Bromley, 12d."

To Toby, his son, he left a colt, 2 sheep, a tumbrel lepe [meaning?], his plough, 2 chains with a foot shackle, a coulter, a share, his bow, a bow case, his quiver with twenty shafts, his bed at Bromley, a chest with a hollow lid, a brass pot, a kettle, a trammel, a little kettle, a pair of pothooks, a scummer, 6 pieces of pewter, his raiment, "his posted bed with a joined ceiling",

another feather bed after his wife Rose dies.

To his daughter, Priscilla, £3 6s 8d when she marries or 20 sheep, a flock bed, a brass pot, a cauldron, a posset, a scummer, a pair of pothooks and six pieces of silver.

To his godchildren a boy Messin, and a girl, Judith Hall. 12d each.

To John Church (of Great Bromley?) "my harrows and wheels which he already hath".

The residue went to Rose, his wife. John Appleby

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HEED THE 'TIME-BOMB' WARNING URGES WILL WRITER

A Senior Partner representing Anglian Will Writing, a Will Writing company covering Essex and Suffolk, has urged people to heed the 'time-bomb' warning issued this week by the National Consumer Council.

Steve Wilkes says the findings of a report released this week by the National Consumer Council that 27 million people in England and Wales do not have a Will are shocking to many, but not to those in the profession.

The report concludes that urgent action is needed to defuse what it calls a looming wills time-bomb. It says unmarried couples are most at risk of losing property, personal possessions and cash if their partner dies without leaving a will, as current inheritance laws do little to protect new family structures.

"I know people don't like to talk about their demise but the simple fact is that none of us are immortal and very few of us know when our time will be up. If we haven't made a will when that happens, it can create all sorts of problems for those that we leave behind, especially for unmarried couples. One of our own consultants lost his partner before they had got round to writing a Will. He lost out on over £100,000 immediately, almost lost his home and also found out that he did not have parental responsibility for his own children. He got into the profession because he passionately believes in trying to prevent this from happening to other people.

"The reluctance to put pen to paper and draw up a legally-binding document leaves grieving relatives with added heartache – and a possible huge bill from the Revenue and Customs. Getting that message across to the public is like banging our heads against a brick wall. We work on the 80-20 principal, using 80% of our effort getting people to act and 20% actually writing the Wills. It is time the Government gave more publicity to the importance of a Will."
