
part of it together with the pleasure of having made lasting friendships during the planning of it.

IN REMEMBRANCE OF GRACE GOULD

2 March 1919 to 18 July 2008 Written by Robert Gould



Mum was born Grace Priscilla Bennett on 2 March 1919 in Queen Charlotte's Hospital in London. Her earliest memory was after her mother died, being taken to a neighbour with her baby brother whilst her father went to work.

The family was split up, her brother being sent to one family in Folkestone and Mum was sent to another. After a short period, and due to times being very difficult, she was sent to a foster home in Bishops Stortford unfortunately losing contact with her brother.

Around the time she was seven she went to a National Children's Home in South Wales meeting up with two girls from the school they had attended in Bishops Stortford. They became life long friends. The orphanage prepared her for her future employment 'in service', so at sixteen she travelled by train from Wales to Folkestone for her first job going there because she had family there and where she was reunited with her brother Ben. Her father had died sometime before. Moving from various households she found herself in Bentley, Surrey in December 1939. She met Dad on her first day in this new employment.

The war was imminent and she went to work at Farnham Hospital. The courtship began by letter. Dad's family moved to Chertsey, Surrey. She would travel to the family home to see him on her day off. They became engaged in 1943. Having no parents, she felt that she wanted to make a home of their own and perhaps in the future have children of their own. They married on 23 September 1944 after

an air raid, which meant the groom and the best man were late, leaving the bride to 'go round the block' with Ben who was giving her away.

By this time Dad's parents had moved to Great Wigborough in Essex. The newly weds arrived with the little possessions they had. After staying a fortnight they found a house and job of their own at White House Farm, Elmstead. Having been very much a town girl she quickly had to learn the ways of the country by chopping wood, drawing water from the well and cooking on a range.

Staying at White House Farm, Elmstead for 6 months, they then moved to Great Bromley in April 1945. Dad started work for Mr H C Hayward at Badley Hall. Mum continued her 'in service' at Major Gunters during 1946.

Her family increased in December 1947 with the arrival of Mary and followed by my arrival in November 1948. Life wasn't easy for the new mum with two small children and a home with no electricity or running water.

Mum stayed at home with the children until they were school age when she went to work on the land in the village mainly for Mr Hayward. Her brother Ben and his family emigrated to Australia in 1959, returning to visit twice in the mid seventies.

In the early sixties Mum started work at Seven Rivers as a domestic help. She continued there until she was 70. She could be often seen in the village going to and fro on her red bike.

In 1971 the family increased when I married Ann. In 1973, after Dad passed away, Mum became more active in village life. She became involved with the WI, Friendship Club. Gardening Club, and

helping with fund raising events at Seven Rivers. If assistance was needed then Mum would be there from serving tea to selling raffle tickets taking part in the entertainment to the enjoyment of those watching. She was also an active member of the choir at St Georges.

She became a Nanny in 1976 when Jenny was born and again in 1979 when Lorraine arrived.

The family continued to grow when Mary married Michael in 1981. She was then Nanny again when Paul was born in 1983. In November of that year she gained her flying wings by travelling to Australia for Paul's christening.

Mum enjoyed gardening, craft work, helping at fund raising events for various and many organisations, and who ... could not forget her marmalade? We wonder, how many jars did she make? Always a money spinner. Her poems and letter writing skills have been enjoyed by many, her letters to you, so vivid, as though you were sitting beside her. They made you feel as though you could see what she was seeing at the time. From a beautiful rose bud in the garden to the little robin hopping around taking the food she had put out for him.

Time passed and the family increased again when Jenny and Danny became partners. A while later she was one of the proud Nanny's of the bride when Lorraine married Toby.

Having reached 80 she decided to stop being a volunteer coffee lady at Seven Rivers and take life a little slower. At 81 she became Great Nanny when Jenny and Danny had Emily the next year, Lorraine and Toby had Megan. Then Lewis joined Emily and Mackenzie joined Megan. Although when all together they are quite a noisy crowd, she marvelled in their individual characters and achievements, and appeared to enjoy watching them at the various family events. How her family has grown.

During the last 12 months Mum's health

declined and although she recovered from a fractured hip, she wasn't as independent as she would have liked to have been.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your cards and letters, to all of those who attended the services at the church and at Weeley. Also thank you for your donations to the NCH Children's Charity for which we have collected nearly £700

3 Fairfield Close – two-storey rear extension replacing conservatory. Talisman Coachlines, Harwich Road continuing use of permanent floodlighting. Furze End, Furze Lane - replace commercial with domestic store. Hill House, Harwich Road - roof repairs,

Tendring District Council has refused the following planning application: Talisman Coachlines - increase the number of motor coaches allowed on site from 10 to 20.

new dormers and listed building consent.

Hare Green recreation ground The Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents has inspected the playing field and its equipment and found these to be largely satisfactory. The council will be undertaking some remedial work and a safety barrier will be erected at the entrance near the telephone box.

War Memorial

Drawing on the Custodian's recommendations the following improvements will be undertaken to the war memorial: (a) replacement of the loose stones round the base with a hard surface: (b) installation of a permanent wire round the base to which poppies and wreaths can be attached; (c) cutting back the hedge to the rear of the memorial and replacing it with a hard surface. GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL WORKING GROUP REPORTS

WG 5 - Hazardous Roads

Banish those Brambles!

Many thanks to those homeowners and landowners who have already cut back brambles and other vegetation growing out from their roadside hedges, particularly where these obstruct pedestrians using local footways and footpaths. However, there are still regular complaints from pedestrians about brambles and branches which have not

yet been trimmed in the village – so if this applies to your hedge then fellow parishioners would be grateful if you were to give your hedge the attention it deserves.

Working Group members will be inspecting roadside hedges and trees again this winter and, although there has been a huge improvement in the general condition of these throughout the village, there are still a small number of areas requiring attention. For those who missed the guidance notes regarding owners' responsibilities for roadside trees and hedges published in the Messenger last winter, the key points will be included in next month's magazine.

WG 13 - Tree Planting

Assisted by the wet weather, the trees and hedging in the village tree nursery have grown exceptionally well this year and there will be about 800 to plant out this winter. The wet weather has also helped the trees and hedging planted out around the village last winter to thrive — only 5 have died, giving a survival rate of over 99.5%.

Several sites have been proposed for tree planting this coming season but more sites are required. Further suggestions are sought from parishioners and landowners and these would be particularly welcome if

the trees would be visible from a public right of way and if assistance with watering (if necessary) could be given during summer 2009. Additional volunteers are



needed to help with planting these trees which (as existing members of the WG will testify) is a fun and satisfying way to spend the odd day or two, particularly knowing that the fruits of your labour will benefit future inhabitants of the village in the coming decades and centuries.

Report of Parish Council meeting held on Thursday 7th August at the Haywain.

The following matters were discussed.

There were 3 members of the parish present. Also present was Councillor David Lines, Executive Leader of Tendring District council.

Public Forum

Members of the public were invited to express any concerns that they may have.

Principally there were:

- a) Proposed reservoir at Great Bromley and effects on the water table.
- b) Volume of traffic should Tesco planning application be approved.
 - c) What is a rural path?

The Great Bromley Reservoir

As yet no further information. More inquiries and planning decisions are to be made.

Tesco Traffic

It was agreed that no further action would be taken by the Council at this time. The Highways Department is abreast of the situation on the traffic through Little Bromley and will ensure that weight restrictions are enforced.

The Litter Picking exercise led by Anita Spall and her team of volunteers was a huge success. 'Well done everyone'.

Rural Path

Unfortunately the meeting due to take place in July did not take place but it is hopefully forecasted to take place later this month. For the concerned parties it will not be a concrete paved walkway.

Firework Night

Some fireworks have now been purchased. The Chairman is to be congratulated on his 'wheeling and dealing'.

Catering, in its broadest sense, is now in hand. Fine detail will be discussed at the

next meeting on 2nd October.

The Chairman pointed out to Councillor David Lines one or two concerns of the council - the Lamb's scrapyard and the Old Smithy - which he promised to look into.

Parcels for Heroes

The Council agreed it would be a great idea that in conjunction with Great Bromley we presented our servicemen and women serving in Afghanistan and Iraq with comfort parcels. The Clerk agreed that once Great Bromley had agreed he would get the information out to the public of both parishes.

A 'Bulk Rubbish' Collection will be arranged in the near future. The staff concerned are on their annual holidays.

The date of the next meeting is to be on Thursday, 2nd October (preparation for the fireworks) at The Haywain.

GARDENING TIPS FOR SEPTEMBER

Trees and Shrubs

Plant or transplant evergreen shrubs and trees. Take semi-hard cuttings of evergreen conifers, holly, cherry, laurel and aucuba.

Roses

Deadhead as necessary. Tie in new shoots on climbers and keep a watch for diseases and treat accordingly.

Perennials

Deadhead perennials and cut down all dead stems.

Dahlias

Water in dry spells and make sure plants are well supported, disbud for long blooms.

Carnations and Pinks

Plant young border plants. Pinch out growing tips.

Update on Fig Tree No 5

When I planted the fig tree last September it had one fig which I left on the tree to mature. It finally dropped off. Now I have three figs with one the size of a walnut. The figs appear in the leaf axles.

If you received a brochure outlining the proposed new wood for Elmstead Market in your Bromley Messenger last month, this is to remind you to please fill it in and send it off, no stamp necessary.


If you didn't, let me outline the object of this project. The Woodland Trust has the opportunity to purchase 100 hectares (250 acres) of open farmland between Elmstead Market and Great Bromley, on the Bromley Road just after the reservoir. The sum of £2m is required to purchase this site and £1.5m is needed by September 2008 to secure the land. The area extends from the A604 to the A120 to the north, has a footpath running through it, and will link two ancient woodlands. The site might otherwise be turned into a quarry or a development site, but we can help preserve it for future generations. The aim is to create a woodland haven for wildlife, which in time will host buzzards, barn owls, and plants such as bluebells and wood anemones.



Influenza vaccinations

It is influenza clinic time again!

The Department of Health recommends patients should have vaccination against influenza if they are aged over 65 or at particular risk if they have one of the following medical conditions; heart disease, diabetes, respiratory disease including asthma, renal disease or who are immunocompromised.

'Flu clinics will be held on Thursday afternoons weekly starting on the 2 October and ending on the 6 November.

Please telephone the surgery to book into one of those clinics. We encourage patients to attend these clinics rather than use valuable normal appointment slots unless you are attending the doctor or nurse for some other reason.

This year we are considering the practicalities of screening patients aged over 65 for Arterial Fibrillation which will involve patients having their pulse taken when having their 'flu injection.

Police have issued a warning to
businesses after a series of bogus calls
from people claiming to be acting on their
behalf.

Bogus sellers have called businesses in the Tendring area, trying to sell advertisements about crime prevention and awareness.

Charges of between £195 and £395 have been quoted to publish adverts.

In one incident, the owner of a business in Holland-on-Sea was called, asking if he wanted to pay for an advertisement for a local crime awareness book.

Calvin Heal, crime reduction officer for Tendring said "The publications do not

exist but the sellers become very persistent and ask for payment".

He said in some cases, threatening phone calls have been made and letters sent warning about bailiffs if businesses do not pay for the advertising.

"They are extremely unpleasant people and it worries the average shopkeeper or business person," Mr Heal added. He said in the past week he had dealt with seven or eight calls from people believing bogus sellers had targeted them

"They should never agree to anything over the telephone".

Until they get in black and white with a proper business logo, an address that can be verified and a phone number, they should have nothing whatsoever to do with them.

If they are suspicious they can always check by phoning me" he said.
