

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Great Bromley Parish Council

Report of the parish council meeting held on 9 October 2008

Planning

The Council considered but did not object to the following planning applications:

Green Acres, Briar Road – stable block and hard standing.

Ashfern House, Harwich Road – change of use from care home to residential dwelling.

Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications: Morants Hall, Colchester Road – erection of replacement barn.

Alvi, Mary Lane South – new roof, dormers, rear extension and demolition of garage (variation of existing approval).

War Memorial

The remedial work and repairs to the war memorial have been completed by a group of volunteers and the parish would like to thank these people together with the (anonymous) local company which donated most of the materials and Tendring council which provided a grant.

Church Meadow

The recycling bins have been moved nearer to the school and the improvement works to the car park will be undertaken shortly.



Trees

The parish council's tree planting programme will cost about £700 this year with half of this being met through a Tendring Council grant.

Hare Green recreation ground

The council is reviewing the play equipment on the recreation ground and intends to improve the provision of facilities for both toddlers and older primary school children. The council accepts that the surface of the football pitch should be improved and has sought specialist advice from Tendring's Leisure and Horticultural services on this matter.

Litter pick

The next community 'litter-pick' will be on Saturday 8 November. If you are interested in being involved please contact Brenda Perry on 01206 232082.

The next meeting of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday 13 November 2008 at the Village Hall, Great Bromley.

Little Bromley Parish Council

A member of the public expressed concern over the new build adjacent to 'The Old Post Office'. It was explained that it was in accordance with approved planning application and it was still intended as a shop.

The rural path meeting has not yet taken place but the matter is ongoing.

The organization and planning for the firework night was discussed at length, details of which are published as a separate notice (see page 11) and also the use of posters.

With money from our own funds and some generous donations we have approximately £1,000 worth of fireworks. It should all go with a big 'BANG'.

It was agreed that the Parcels for Heroes project should be pursued in the New Year so that it does not clash with collections made by schools.

Bulk rubbish collection will go ahead on the 25th October as published in the Bromley Messenger.

Date of the next meeting will be Thursday, 13th November.

PROPOSED TRAVELLERS' SITE - ARDLEIGH

A new travellers' site is being proposed at 'Esther-Lee Stable', Green Lane, Ardleigh and will include: 12 permanent residential pitches, access road, fencing, amenity buildings, mobile homes and ancillary works. The planning application (08/01317/FUL) can be seen at Tendring District Council's Weeley offices or by looking at the website http://www.tendringdc.gov.uk/TendringDC. The Ardleigh, Elmstead and Great Bromley parish councils have agreed to object to this proposal and will be monitoring developments. A public meeting of 140 people held on 10 October was largely against the proposal. MP Bernard Jenkin has also objected and may ask for the Secretary of State to intervene if Tendring District Council approves the site.

A critical issue is that although under government policy Tendring is required to have at least 15 travellers' pitches, the district council has yet to determine a policy to achieve this objective. Ardleigh parish council has retained an expert planning consultant to advise on combating the application. The Ardleigh community has also established a fund to fight the proposal supported by a group of volunteer activists. Further information on the volunteer group etc can be obtained from Ardleigh's Clerk, Janet Taylor, via telephone 01206 797020 and email ardleighpc@tiscali.co.uk.

The application will be considered by Tendring District Council's Development Control Committee, at possibly its December meeting. Further information on this will be provided in the *Messenger* in due course.



KITCHEN CORNER

Michael Barry's recipe for **Pheasant**

- 1 pheasant trimmed and jointed,
- 2 tbsp sunflower oil
- 1 onion
- 1 large carrot
- 2 sticks celery

250ml / 8fl oz chicken stock

Seasoning

1bouquet garni (celery, thyme, parsley and bayleaf)

1 dessertspoon arrowroot or cornflour 4 tbsp rowan, redcurrant or quince jelly.

Method. Heat oven to 180℃/350℉ Fry the pieces of pheasant in the oil in an oven proof pan till lightly golden.

Peel and finely chop onion carrot and celery into small dice. Add to the pheasant and cook two minutes. Add the stock to just reach the top of the pheasant, season generously add bouquet garni and bake in the oven for 1 hour to 1hour 20 minutes, till pheasant is thoroughly cooked Test with a fork to see if the meat is tender. Remove meat from pan and keep warm. Mix arrowroot with a little water and add it to the pan together with the jelly.

Bring quickly to the boil, stirring until it thickens and clears, then return the meat to the sauce. Serve with plenty of mashed potato and red cabbage.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Quite a lot for this village in The Black Boy. Though it does not perhaps smell as sweet as a rose or as the maybush or the cherry tree, it is a piece of our history and is named on Chapman and Andres map of 1784. The name is right for the inn's building period, the 18th century, when little black boys were trailed around as pages by great ladies who even had their portraits painted. Of course slavery was, and is wrong, but connecting an ancient inn sign with racialism is absurd. The sign only recently replaced the one lost in the hurricane. Long may The Black Boy's jolly face continue to adorn The Black Boy corner.

GARDENING TIPS FOR NOVEMBER

Leaves, leaves and more leaves but don't let them go to waste: they make excellent compost. Two of the best leaves are horse chestnut and oak. If you haven't got a compost bin they are so easy to make. Four posts and some chicken wire to go round the outside, place it in an odd corner of the garden and you are ready to make some of the best potting compost there is. From time to time add kitchen waste, etc. also old compost from your finished summer flowering plants.

Bulbs

Tulips can be planted this month.

Dahlias

As soon as they have finished flowering cut them down to 6" above ground level. If you are leaving them in the ground cover them with either some leaves or straw, a piece of netting will stop leaves and straw blowing away.

Fig tree report No 7

Alas two of the five figs have fallen off. I think the tree is still guite young. The other three are still on the tree but whether they will mature I have vet to wait and see.

As this will be my last "Garden Tips" for this year (back in February) I would like to wish everyone a very Happy Christmas and a better New Year.

After the Second World War, the Home Secretary was asked to look at Essex where there were no WPCs. The first was appointed in 1946.

Maureen joined the Essex Force in 1971 ending her career as an Inspector based at Halstead. It was an interesting and amusing evening.

PILOT SCHEME FOR FVFNING CABINET MEETINGS

Residents across Tendring who work during the day will get the chance to attend Council Cabinet meetings for the very first time.

Tendring District Council's (TDC) Cabinet is going back on the road following a successful initiative to go out into the community and get away from the normal venue of Clacton Town Hall. And people turning out will also have the opportunity to ask questions of Portfolio Holders for the first time. TDC broke with tradition last year and staged a Cabinet meeting in Harwich in July, followed by ones in Brightlingsea, Walton, and Manningtree. However, they were held during the day time and it has now been decided to trial five evening meetings.

"First of all, we wanted to make it clear that all areas of the District are very important to the Cabinet and therefore we agreed to leave the usual meeting place of Clacton Town Hall and get out into the community," said TDC Leader David Lines.

"Now, we want to ensure we give an equal opportunity for all to be able to attend, so have chosen five evening slots to accommodate those who work during the day time."

The first evening meeting will be staged at The Welcome Centre, Pier Avenue Baptist Church, Pier Avenue, Clacton, on October 2. On November 13 it will be off to the Community Centre – Soken Hall, The Triangle, Frinton, followed by Long Meadows Community Hall, Long Meadows, Dovercourt, on January 15.

The Community Centre, Lower Park Road, Brightlingsea, will be the venue on March 12, and finally on May 28 the Cabinet will meet at Venture Centre 2000, Bromley Road, Lawford.

All meetings will begin at 7.30pm and will start with 30 minutes for people to ask questions of the Cabinet.

To give as many members of the public as possible a chance to ask a question, these

will last no longer than two minutes and will then be answered by Portfolio Holders once the formal part of the meeting starts.

"Answers will also be limited to two minutes but Portfolio Holders will be available after the meeting to discuss those issues further or expand on any of their answers with residents," added ClIr Lines.

"Alternatively, in fairness to others, a written response will be given to more lengthy or complex questions.

"We hope that this opportunity will be taken up and that people will turn out to quiz the Cabinet about the things that affect them."

Cllr Lines added that the Cabinet was also looking for a suitable location in the rural part of the District to stage a sixth meeting to ensure accessibility for all.

Essex Environment Trust COMMUNITY ENTERPRISE CHALLENGE

The Community Enterprise Challenge is a new competition launched by the Essex Environment Trust at its 10th Year Celebrations on 11th July 2008. The competition is aimed at the provision of new facilities in rural villages.

Prizes on offer for 3 sizes of project are:

Large Projects: £100,000 Medium Project £50,000 Smaller Projects: £25,000

Project Types. Essentially the Trust wants to see *local initiatives* – new ideas that will satisfy an established *local need* – something wanted and supported by the local community and with their *involvement*.

In "TV speak" terms, the Trust is looking for projects with an obvious *Wow Factor!*As a Trustee said recently, "The local community knows better than us what the local needs are and we expect to receive projects of a wide variety of types, however, the essential need that we will be looking for is the project will *make a difference* in that local community." Rules. A full set of the Rules is available with the application forms, but the main rules are:

• The competition is open to all rural

communities and the Trust's definition is all villages having a population of up to 6,500.

- The scheme is for capital projects only. Revenue schemes are excluded.
- There must be demonstrable public support for the project.
- To be eligible, applicants will need to demonstrate that their project is capable of starting on the ground by July 2010 i.e. 12 months after the prize has been awarded.
- Because the money comes from the Landfill Communities Fund, project sites must lie within 10 miles of a licensed landfill site. In Essex that really isn't a problem as 99% of the county's villages are within this range. If in doubt, the Trust can advise.

Deadlines are as follows:

Stage one: 1st Dec 2008 ~ Return of the basic application form.

Stage two: 12th May 2009 ~ Return of a more detailed form supplied to short-listed projects. Results will be declared at the Trust's Annual Review Evening on 9th July 2009.
