IN THE GARDEN IN DECEMBER AND JANUARY



With last winter in mind don't forget to empty all your plastic watering cans otherwise if they freeze you will have a split can on your hands. Another must is to have a supply of salt in stock for de-icing paths etc.

Wrap up well and finish off any rose pruning that needs completing. Also choose a mild day for planting new rose bushes.

Keep inspecting stored potatoes, fruit, etc, and remove any that show signs of rotting.

KITCHEN CORNER

Beef and Cheese Roll

Serves 4

3 thick slices white bread, crusts removed.
4 tbsp milk
1 ½ lb minced beef
2 eggs lightly beaten.
2 tsp dry mustard
1tsp salt pinch pepper
½ tsp dried basil
1 onion finely chopped
2 tbsp chopped parsley
1 tbsp flour
2 tbsp melted butter
8 oz mozzarella cheese

Method:

Put bread in large bowl with milk. Squeeze lightly and pour off excess milk. Add meat and eggs, seasoning and herbs. Knead till well blended.

Dust with the flour a piece of foil or waxed paper, put meat on and with floured hands

press into a rectangle. Cover lightly with foil and refrigerate for at least an hour.

When meat is cold, cover with thinly sliced cheese and roll up like a Swiss roll. Place on a baking sheet, join underneath, brush with melted butter and bake moderate oven 50 minutes.


Serve hot with tomato sauce

Sauce:

1lb ripe tomatoes
3 tbsp butter
2 onions fine chopped
1 clove garlic crushed
1 tsp thyme,salt and pepper
2 fl oz red wine

Sauté onions in butter till soft, add peeled and quartered tomatoes and seasoning. Cook 45 minutes stirring occasionally.

CORRECTION

With Christmas coming we bring the outside inside. Evergreens such as holly, with its red berries (female plants only), along with ivy and fir cones, are used in wreaths, table decorations and to deck the house. Prince Albert, during Victoria's reign, introduced the Christmas tree to our houses. These days we usually purchase Norway Spruce although many other varieties are now available. Mistletoe, too, is hung around the house mainly as an excuse to kiss someone. Mistletoe grows in fruit trees, such as apple, is a semi-parasitic plant and although it feeds off its host tree it does also possess chlorophyll and is therefore able to create its own food through photosynthesis. The plant is associated with the mistle thrush which is supposed to love the sticky white berries thus spreading the plant from tree to tree by wiping the excess seeds and berries from its beak onto a twig of another tree. Holly berries, too, form an important food source for many birds and small mammals and ivy, as well as providing food, is a haven for overwintering insects and small birds who eat the berries or the insects depending upon their preferred diet.



Teasels, too, are beautiful. Used for decorations, especially when gilded, with their seeds being a favourite food source for 'charms' of goldfinches. Only birds with slim, pointed beaks can reach the seeds within the teasel head. Robins, the favourite of Christmas cards, are one of the few birds to be heard singing during winter, as both males and females maintain territories for feeding which may, in turn, become their breeding territories come spring. They pair up during January when the females stop singing.

Don't forget to leave fresh water out for all creatures to drink and/or bathe in.

Tutor: Roger Beckett - 10 week course

The course takes an overview of the coastal trade or Essex ports during the 19th and early 20th centuries. The course could provide a useful starting point for anyone undertaking in depth studies of particular aspects of Essex shipping. It could also be useful for anyone pursuing family history with Essex maritime connections.

THE DOCTORS' SURGERY NEWS

Gt Bentley Surgery

You might remember that I've had a bee in my bonnet for a couple of years now about the NHS starting to upload individual patient Summary Care Records (SCRs) to the national computer system – the spine. I promised I would let everyone know when it was imminent so that anyone who doesn't want their SCR to be available to NHS staff throughout the country can say so.

Basic data, such as name, address, date of birth and NHS numbers were uploaded quite a while ago. Nobody was given a choice about that. Well, it now seems that our patients will have the first part of their medical data uploaded around mid-March 2012. This batch will include details of medication, adverse reactions and allergies. Further data about medical history will be added, but only with each individual patient's specific consent, from a later date still to be decided.

If you don't want this data available on the spine, please ask for an opt-out form next time you contact the surgery. The Department of Health, in its wisdom, has decided that anyone who doesn't express a wish either way will be assumed to want their SCR on the system. I think that used to be called "inertia selling".

If you do want your SCR uploaded, you don't need to do anything. It will happen automatically.

I'm afraid that nobody here can advise you on the pros and cons of having your data uploaded. Everyone has to make up their own mind about that.

Last month, I mentioned that we are trying to put together a Patient Participation Group (PPG) to help with planning and mapping out the surgery's future. I'm afraid the response hasn't been great to date and plenty more volunteers are needed if we are to make the idea work. As I indicated, everything will be done by e-mail as far as possible, and the commitment will amount literally to a few minutes perhaps half a dozen times a year. If you feel that it's a good idea, please don't leave it to other people – we need your help. E-mail a few details about yourself to me at "postmaster.gp-f81021@nhs.net" and I'll put you on the provisional list.

We are still dishing out flu jabs at a furious rate, but there are a surprising number of people who don't seem to be taking the threat seriously this

winter. Just because the government isn't running an advertising campaign this year, it doesn't mean that there won't be an epidemic. Don't forget that if you catch flu, even if it doesn't kill you, it can make you very, very ill for several weeks. Also, if you catch it, you'll probably pass it on to your nearest and dearest – husband, wife, kids, grandchildren, neighbours – you owe it to them to make sure that you are protected to ensure that you don't cause them to suffer. We expect to have plenty of vaccine available this year, so book yours now. If you are in the government's target groups, the jab is free and you would be mad to ignore the protection that it will bring.

Whilst on the subject, if you are unfortunate enough to catch flu, or even just a bad cold, please don't bring it into the surgery. Stay at home so that you don't spread your germs. Drink plenty of fluids and use over the counter remedies from your pharmacy to help ease the symptoms. Both flu and colds are caused by viruses and we still can't do anything at all to cure them. Antibiotics won't help one little bit and the more you use them unnecessarily now, the less effective they will be when you genuinely need them. Please don't try to talk the doctor into prescribing them if he/she says that they aren't appropriate.

The surgery will be closed from the evening of Friday, 23rd December until 8.00am on Wednesday, 28th, then again from Friday 30th until 8.00am on Tuesday, 3rd January. During those times, **urgent** medical care can be accessed from Harmoni by ringing the normal surgery number. As ever, **minor injuries** can be dealt with at the special units at Clacton and Harwich hospitals. The Walk-in Centre at the Primary Care Centre building on Turner Road, Colchester will be open to deal with people who are **ill but well enough to travel**. Finally, for genuine, **life-threatening emergencies**, A&E will be open at Colchester General. Please don't put yourself through using it if one of the other options will do the job though. Staff there will be far too busy coping with really serious cases to attend to tummy-aches, hangovers, bumps and abrasions – you won't be welcome and it'll be a long wait.

Lights on!

As the autumn nights draw in it's time to think about the burglar out there and not leaving them "tell tale" signs that your home is empty and vulnerable. The art of illusion is to try and make it look as though your home is occupied even though you are not there. Provide that first impression to the "would be" burglar that this house is occupied, it looks too difficult to get into and that if they do try there is a good chance they will get their collar felt!

Lighting

If your house is overlooked and there is the chance of burglars being seen they will prefer to go elsewhere, so get some decent lighting on your house. Dusk till dawn activated lighting on the front and rear with energy saving bulbs, not only deters the burglar but you can see who is at your door or around your home, and also when you return home you have a welcoming light.

Is there clear unobstructed access to the rear?

Burglars will prefer to gain access out of sight at the rear. Where possible fence and gate access to rear gardens, top this with some trellis or spiky toppings (the spiky topping requires a warning notice). How about some defensive planting, what's this you ask.....something like Berberus, Pyracantha or Hawthorn around perimeter fencing or anything else you wish to protect i.e. domestic fuel tank (some garden centres sell more established plants).

The illusion

Try to make it look similar to when you are there - table lamps inside on timers (don't use energy saving bulbs with digital timers it shortens the life of the bulb) or use a "dusk till dawn" sensor (bulbs are now available with a built in sensor), a radio on a talking programme, it all helps. You can even buy a device now called "Fake TV" that mimics the light from a television. **DO NOT** leave Christmas tree lights on though as they can be a fire risk.

Out and about?

For a little extra confidence consider carrying a personal attack alarm, many come with a torch and are quite cheap from DIY stores, internet etc. Most of all be aware of your surroundings, avoid concentrating on mobile phones and music devices whilst out and about.

We have received reports regarding cold calling in Essex.

The first one is where a male cold calls offering to fit cheap alarms to windows and doors. Secondly we have had reports of traders offering to fix roof and guttering. In both cases the consumers has ended up being overcharged and have been left with a shoddy job.

We urge you not to take up these offers and only use an approved trader i.e. :

EARLY NOTICE OF ARRANGEMENTS FOR CHRISTMAS AND NEW YEAR WASTE AND RECYCLING COLLECTONS

Tending residents are being given plenty of early notice of arrangements for their waste and recycling collections over the festive period. Collections will be managed in the normal way so as to reduce the impact on homes.

Tending District Council (TDC), working with its contractor Veolia Environmental Services, considered all options and will keep disruption to an absolute minimum over the period from December 26 through to January 8.

The majority of people will get their collections the day after it would normally take place; therefore those visited on a Tuesday will be collected on Wednesday and so on, and those on Friday collected on Saturday. However, those who usually have a collection on a Monday will not receive one on Christmas week (December 26) as this is a Bank Holiday but will get a double collection on Tuesday January 2.

Nick Turner, TDC's Cabinet Member for the Environment, said that every possible combination had been considered.

"We have made sure that as many residents as possible get their one collection each week, albeit on the following day to normal. However, we have had to also take into account waste and recycling tipping arrangements with Essex County Council as we cannot make a collection if there are no sites open to take the materials."

Clr Turner apologised to those minority of homes which will not get a collection for two weeks and one day due to their normal collection being on a Monday but said there was no way round the situation. "I would ask residents to bear with us and only put bags and recycling out on the morning they will be collected. Together we can help to keep the District's streets as clean and tidy as possible over the festive period."

All the Council's 80 recycling bank sites will be open over the festive season which allows residents to recycle their glass bottles, cans, textiles and paper. Free disposal and recycling of all household waste is available at Essex County Council's Recycling Centres.

THE RECTORY, GREAT BROMLEY

Dear Friends,

1976 was a difficult year. On the night of January 2nd the Vicar called to see my mother and I went to my bedroom to do some reading for next term's work. The vicar left and then I heard my mother call. We had an Aga cooker and each morning and evening it had to be topped up with anthracite. I had been doing this since I had been home because my mother was too weak, but she must have thought she would try to do it whilst I was studying. She had collapsed in the kitchen. I called the doctor and he examined her and said it was something to do with her heart and that she should see a specialist. This was not our usual doctor. He came the next morning at 11 a.m. and said there was nothing wrong with her. His last words to me on the doorstep were, "She will live a normal lifespan".

My mother's sister called to see her over the lunch period and after my mother had eaten scrambled egg on toast her sister left and went home. My mother then went to the toilet and I called up but there was no reply. She had managed to return to bed before she died. I called a neighbour who was a nurse to try to resuscitate her and then I called the doctor but it was obvious she had suffered a massive heart attack.

My mother was buried on January 7th 1976. It was a beautiful day, the sun shone. We had a Requiem Mass for the family early in the morning followed by a very large public funeral later that morning.

I spent most of my time seeing to the arrangements and comforting my father. I cried alone. I never really questioned her death. I seemed to have been prepared. Before the burial I felt my mother's presence very strongly as I looked everywhere for a white tablecloth for the reception afterwards which I eventually found. I can only think she guided me to a most unlikely place to

find it. Death I believe can never separate the bonds of love.

After my mother's death I returned to Oxford and the following year I graduated in Theology. During the summer of that year I visited the Holy Land for one month. I was based at St. George's College in Jerusalem and we studied "The Bible in its setting". This was a wonderful experience.

One of the many things we did was to visit the 'Field of the Shepherds' outside Bethlehem and then the Church of the Holy Nativity. I mention this now because when you read this we shall be drawing ever closer to Christmas. I pray that the joy of the shepherds and the message of the angels will fill your hearts and the hearts of those you love during this Christmas season and wish you all a very Happy New Year when the time comes.
