

## Women's Institute

What an interesting and fascinating subject Rowley Collier, ably assisted by his wife Peggy, gave to the assembled company "Let's Talk Gemstones". He talked about the Dagenham Agates that initially were formed in the paint shop and how they were to become a semi-precious stone. He then went on to describe how it was felt that very few, if any, jewellers in the early 1900s had very much understanding of semi-precious and precious stones. From this early beginning the first courses for jewellers were set up by the goldsmiths of London, and the first certificate was issued in 1909.

Rowley talked about the crown jewels, and



especially the Timor Ruby. He enthused about diamonds, explaining about the cut, the clarity also inclusions, the colour and the carat of the

stone. We learnt about opals and the different colourations, also that the black opal is rare and valuable. Rowley went on to explain about the rules concerning ivory and how it can be distinguished from fakes. Ivory has lines on the surface, fake ivory does not. The palm nut comes in here because it looks like ivory, but is very hard and can also be carved. Rowley really knew his subject and he had also brought along many examples of semi-precious stones.

We then heard from two other visitors who had come from Felstead Aid. This is a charity helping deprived children in the Ukraine for whom the ladies of our Women's Institute have been knitting blankets. 24 blankets were presented to Pauline to take with her when she visits the Ukraine in the autumn. She told us about the effects of Chernobyl and how the

Compost heaps and bonfires are also favourite sleeping places for hedgehogs and should be checked for "residents" thus saving them from injury or death.

#### IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE

I was thinking about weeds the other day. I do think about weeds. A lot. I know it's sad, but they seem, at this time of year, to take up a vast proportion of my gardening time. I was thinking about how, when the cultivated plants appear to be struggling with not enough water/ too much water/not enough sun/too much sun, the weeds thrive. It made me think that perhaps we should take a leaf out of nature's book, and cultivate our weeds. After all, a weed is only a plant in the wrong place (for us, not the plant!). I don't know about your gardens, but I admit I love cow parsley in the spring and campions in the summer.

and my foxgloves, which are

completely self seeded are

magnificent.

The dandelions and daisies are lovely, and anyone who has a wild flower area is, after all, cultivating weeds. Even deadly nightshade is pretty, and wild arums. which positively abound in my garden, have the most beautiful berries. This brings me to another point - wildlife. We bemoan the apparent demise of butterflies, but if we kill off all the plants that their caterpillars feed on, we will have no adults. Red Admiral caterpillars live on nettles. Painted Ladies eat thistles. Small and Large Blue eat wild thyme, and Orange Tips eat honesty and Ladies smock. However I do agree that Cabbage Whites decimate the brassicas! Slugs and snails are a nightmare for the tender vegetables, but the hedgehogs (whose numbers are in decline) adore them as do several species of bird. I love

watching thrushes breaking the shells of snails on the patio in order to eat them.

Everyone knows about the huge reduction in numbers of the honey bee, and I must admit that I haven't seen a single one this year, but I have seen huge numbers of bumble bees who seem to pollinate the flowers just as efficiently. Many varieties nest in the ground or under a pile of stones or wood, and seem to like shady weedy areas. Even midges and mosquitoes are food for swifts and swallows and also bats.

However, does anyone know what is the purpose of wasps or common house flies?

So in summary, perhaps we should all be more relaxed about the whole thing and rejoice in the wildlife and plants that have

decided to call our gardens home.

I must just share a sighting by my compost heap of a 3 foot grass snake, which gave me quite a start- and yes it really was 3 feet long. Hopefully we have a family of them somewhere.

I hope your gardens are all blooming and you have time, in this glorious weather to sit back and enjoy them. After all, if you don't, what's the point?

P.S. Has anyone seen any ladybirds this year?

## A DAY TRIP TO THE FARNE ISLANDS

Recently I had the pleasure of visiting a large sea bird nesting colony on the Farne



Islands which are situated just off the Northumberland coast.

My quest was to see a rare adult **Bridled Tern** which is a scarce vagrant to the UK. This bird's breeding areas

include the Caribbean, Mauritania, Red Sea and the Persian Gulf.

The Bridled Tern is a handsome bird; it has a distinct head pattern with a white forehead and dark laurel stripes. The upper parts are grey brown with a darker rump with the under parts being white. The legs and bill are black.

So it was on a bright sunny morning in July I departed from the coastal town of Seahouses. I then boarded a fishing boat

called Glad Tidings for a 30 minute trip to the Islands.

Shortly after landing I made a quick walk along the jetty to scan the islands with my telescope. To my surprise I immediately saw the Bridled Tern. The bird was perched openly on seaweed strewn rocks in front of several Kittiwakes and a few Common and Arctic Terns. However, shortly after it was sighted it flew off with the melee of sea birds out to sea and was lost from my view but 20 minutes later I relocated it as it preened itself on nearby rocks close to the jetty.

I departed the Farne Islands mid-morning after an eventful day.



#### A GREAT SHOW ON OUR DOORSTEP

The Tendring Hundred Show on the 13<sup>th</sup> July thankfully enjoyed gorgeous weather! The organisers, the TH Farmers' Club, were not so lucky last year when an overnight deluge onto already sodden ground meant lots of vehicles got stuck in the mud! That did add to the community spirit, having strong cheerful people and tractors work together to help extricate them, but let's hope that doesn't happen again.

We are very fortunate to have such a show right on our doorstep. For those of us in Great Bromley the show used to be even more local, when it was rather smaller. After the war it was held on the fields behind the cricket pitch and rectory. Elizabeth Stewart, née Clachan, well remembers as a girl the excitement of showing sheep in the ring there. The programme from 1951 shows us a map:



Before the Second World War I believe the show used to move to the farm or proximity of that year's Club President. The 1911 show was at Mistley, where the first ever sheep dog trial in the East of England was held.

I am told that one year in the 1950s it was moved to the fields east of Parsons Hill before going to its new, permanent location in Lawford. My mother says it was held for a year or two in fields the other side of the road, before moving into the park in 1958; she was friendly with the owner, Mrs Minney and her famous husband, Rubeigh (who was usually abroad with the film industry).

There is little about the history of the show to be easily found online. The first was held in 1899 yet this year's was billed as only the 98<sup>th</sup> Annual Show. Reports say that postwar, only 2001 had to be cancelled owing to Foot and Mouth. My mother's diary reveals that the 1960 show was the Golden Jubilee... it rained very hard indeed, making the tea tent incredibly popular! (Ironically, there was no rain falling in Great Bromley that day.)

So if 1960 was No. 50, and only one was cancelled since, No. 100 should have been last year, by my maths? Either there were other cancellations post war - for example there was a bad Foot & Mouth outbreak in 1952, and Foul Pest outbreaks in the 60s - or someone may have lost count!

Perhaps I should explain the term "Tendring Hundred" as newcomers may not be familiar with it. Hundreds date from Saxon times and were used as administrative areas within counties, thought to approximate to a land area able to support 100 families, and named after the main meeting place, in our case the village of Tendring.

My children and I love going to the Tendring Hundred Show; so much to see and do, yet it's smaller and more friendly than the Essex or Suffolk shows. If you have never been then you are missing a great day out. Put the second Saturday in July 2014 in your diary now!

As I write this we are several days into the warm, sunny weather, and long may it continue! At the July Parish meeting we discussed the recent unfortunate spate of criminal damage offences upon cars at Church Meadow. The police were invited to attend the meeting (as they always are) however were absent. The Parish Council were lead to believe that the incidents had now ceased but nevertheless, we would ask residents who use the car park to remain vigilant at all times, particularly as these damages were apparently caused in the davtime. It was also drawn to the Parish Council's attention that a number of trees within the village have been mysteriously cut down. There could of course be a perfectly valid reason for this however you are urged to report to the police anything you perceive to be suspicious.

On a more positive note, Councillors are continuing to monitor the footpaths in the village and take action to deal with overgrowth where appropriate. This may include making reports to Highways, or at times undertaking the cutting back themselves. Councillors are also volunteering to ensure that the village remains clean and tidy. Over the next few weeks you will see Councillors painting the

benches and the village sign. A litter pick has also been arranged for later in the year. The Councillors do of course undertake these things free of charge, which ultimately saves the village money which would otherwise be expended on employing external contractors.

The Carringtons Reservoir planning application remains a hot topic. The appeal is due to take place at County Hall. Chelmsford in August. The Parish Council have it on good authority that the more people who attend the appeal from the Village the better, a good turnout potentially making all the difference. To that end arrangements are being made for group transport to the appeal hearing - see elsewhere in the messenger. Lastly - you may have seen in the local press recently that residents in the Tendring area are reportedly poor in terms of recycling. The Parish Council will be pleased at the next meeting to welcome Councillor Turner from TDC, who will come and discuss recycling matters with us. All members of the public are welcome to attend, as always.

#### KEN BROMFIELD 1942-2013

#### Educationalist, Parish Clerk and CAB Volunteer

Ken Bromfield, who has died peacefully at home after a well-borne illness, will probably be best remembered in the local community for his outstanding service as parish clerk for the period 2002 – 2012. However, many also greatly appreciated his role as guitar and mandolin player in the village folk group based at the Cross Inn and a much larger group of people in Tendring benefitted from the sound advice given over many years by Ken as a volunteer at the Citizens Advice Bureau in Manningtree.

Although his family came from London, Ken was born in Oswestry where his father's regiment was stationed during the war. He arrived somewhat unexpectedly and legend has it that, no cot or crib being available, Ken spent his first weeks in a suitcase! He eventually returned to London and studied physics at Queen Mary College after which he volunteered for the government-sponsored programme Graduate Service Overseas. His first assignment in 1965 was to teach maths and science in Lesotho, a tiny country in the middle of South Africa. He flew each term by light aircraft to a remote mountain village school, living in isolation from his graduate peers within the native community. He had travelled out to Lesotho with a small group of graduates amongst whom was Marion, his future wife. However, courtship was not that easy in those early days and he only managed to socialise with her during the school holidays!

Ken spent the rest of his working life in academic management, including the British Council, his last job being with the Open University in London. By this time he was well settled in Great Bromley and, looking for other challenges after retirement, he offered to become Clerk to Great Bromley Parish Council when the vacancy arose.

He joined Great Bromley Parish Council as clerk in 2002 and worked tirelessly in support of the council and community for 10 years. Ken was very well suited to the job and this was welcome news to James Heaney and Martin Frostick who were parish council chairmen during his tenure.

Ken was a competent and hardworking member of the parish council who was generous with his time, always doing far more than his job description. He brought a huge

amount of knowledge and
expertise to the council, both from his previous
career and also from his deep involvement
with the Tendring CAB. Indeed, he not only
used this knowledge to advise the council but
also offered excellent informal advice to
individual councillors on a wide range of topics
when asked! His knowledge of the law and

finance was comprehensive and having him

there as responsible financial officer was most

Ken was well versed in technology and by the end of his term in office he had designed, launched and managed a website for the parish council. He had a good memory, paid real attention to detail and took great pride in all that he did. He managed all of this work from an ad-hoc parish office located in a spare bedroom.

One highlight of his time with the parish council which many will remember was his involvement with the village Fundays. Ken was invaluable as a member of the Funday Committee and in particular advising on technical and legal aspects of the events as well as playing a key role in their implementation.

He volunteered to be secretary to the Poorlands Trust in the village and held this appointment for 10 years. He was also actively involved in many other facets of village life and regularly supported functions and activities as well as providing a huge amount of support, expertise and encouragement to Marion in her role as PCC treasurer. He also loved the local countryside and often could be seen walking the lanes with Marion.

Ken contributed a lot to parish life and will be greatly missed as colleague and friend by parish councillors and fellow musicians past and present, as well as by his family.

As most of you will be aware, I have a tough job to do this month, which is to bid farewell to Dr Mathew Hunt, "MH" to his colleagues, who will be leaving the practice and moving on to a more peaceful, relaxed existence from 2<sup>nd</sup> September. Dr Hunt also led us to "Training Practice" status, so for the last 14 years we have trained a succession of aspiring GPs before releasing them on the outside world. They have a lot to thank him for.

The energy of the then three "young" partners (NS, NC and MH that is) kept us at the forefront of innovation for a generation

and led in 1997 to the establishment of The Green Pharmacy, which serves the whole area, not just our patients, regularly processing 17,000 prescription items a month – many of them delivered direct to people's homes – as well as being an excellent source of quality pharmacy goods and services.

I have been lucky enough to work with the doctors for 21 years now and one thing that has been notably constant over that time is their determination to foster good customer care, fairness and cheerful teamwork throughout the staff. As a result, we have a terrific and stable team who actually seem to enjoy coming to work each day, and who always have the good of the practice - that means you, the patients - at heart. With Dr Hunt going and Dr Cavenagh gradually withdrawing from the scene, the new generation of "young" partners have the unenviable task of matching their achievements by taking the practice forward even further. You can be sure that those who head the team from September, Drs Bhatti, O'Reilly and Nambi - shortly to be joined by Drs Karen Chumbley and Bhavini Muir – will make a great job of it. I don't think there's anything more to add this month other than to say, "Cheers Dr Hunt. Thanks for looking after us so brilliantly and being such an asset to the area over the years, and we all wish you every happiness, wherever your new life takes vou."
