

Beryl explained that when a production is getting ready for the end of January, measurements have to be taken way back in September - not always the best time with Christmas and New Year feasting in between!

Sometimes a show may not make very much of money, but this can often be counteracted by being able to sell on the costumes. Costumiers from other theatres come to watch the production and are very taken with the costumes and then offer to buy them; a real bonus for the society. Some of the costumes we see in productions may have been recycled and adapted quite a number of times!

The grand finale of the presentation was Beryl and Shirley dressed in fine costumes that had been used in a production at the Mercury in Colchester. It was a super evening all round.

I will start this month by confirming the news that the Planning Appeal in respect of the proposed Carringtons Reservoir has been refused, which will come as great relief to most of the village. The Parish Council would like to thank ClIr. Blowers who spearheaded the opposition, and ClIr. Perry who organised transport to the appeal which took place at County Hall in Chelmsford. The Planning Inspector dismissed the appeal on the following grounds:

1) It is in conflict with the Mineral Development Plan's Policies.

2) It will cause visual intrusion and health issues.

3) It will infringe on residential amenities because of noise.

4) It's against Highways policies.

5) It will create an unacceptable level of traffic.

Also, many thanks to those who turned out and attended the Planning Appeal showing the impact the opposition in

attendance can have!

The Parish Council were sad to note that at the time of their September meeting another two accidents has just occurred on the A120, requiring the attendance of the Air Ambulance on one occasion. The results of the traffic survey on the A120 have been finalised and the Highways Agency will be writing to villagers soon.

Despite the coming of the Autumn season, Councillors will still be busy over the next few weeks making improvements in the village. Cllr. Nicholls and his wife will be planting spring bulbs, and another litter pick has been arranged for November 9th. We are looking for volunteers again to help with the litter pick, for which there was a good turn out last time. The litter picks will start at 10.00am meeting at the car parks of each of the Village pubs - The Cross, The Old Courthouse and The Snooty Fox.

A120 / HARWICH ROAD JUNCTION

The following are emails received from Bernard Jenkin MP and Andy Jobling, Highways Agency, by the Chairman of the Parish Council

From The Rt Hon Bernard Jenkin MP dated 15 September 2013

"I have given an ultimatum to ministers. It was clear to me that the previous roads minister was on the point of approving speed restrictions enforced by continuous speed monitoring cameras pending a roundabout construction. The change of minister seemed to put the policy back in the hands of the Highways Agency. They then decided to shut the gaps: understandable, but this disregarded the effects of diverting traffic, including public transport, school buses and emergency vehicles onto unsuitable local roads, and creating much longer local journey times. Essex County Council righty regarded this as passing the buck to them, and opposed the gap closures.

After this week, when the first autumn weather has contributed to two near fatal accidents, we now have all the evidence needed that this stalemate can continue no longer. I have told the minister he must act. If not, I will take the matter to the Prime Minister. This carnage can go on no longer. I will hold another debate ASAP and you can expect some very robust exchanges unless action is taken - a dereliction of duty to provide effective safety management of the road network." *Continued on page 9*

UPDATE: A120 HARWICH ROAD, PARK ROAD AND PELLENS CORNER JUNCTIONS SAFETY

I promised to keep you informed of developments. As you are aware, the number of collisions at the Harwich Road. Park Road and Pellens Corner junctions remains a concern and, following the works completed in April 2012 to try to reduce the number and severity of collisions, the Highways Agency undertook a road safety audit to look at the reasons behind the personal injury collisions that have occurred here. This report recommended that further measures were needed to improve safety at these junctions and that the most effective way to improve safety would be to close the central reserve gaps. This would have the benefit of stopping collisions occurring, which in the majority of cases have involved vehicles turning right and failing to observe oncoming vehicles or correctly assessing their speed.

However, by closing the gaps, local residents and businesses would be adversely affected; although we hoped that we could identify reasonable mitigation measures that would enable the gaps to be closed whilst still allowing motorists and other road users to use a suitable and safe alternative route. Unfortunately this has not been possible and we are no longer pursuing the gap closure option.

In addition to the safety audits, traffic surveys were carried out in June. Analysis of the traffic survey data has now been used to develop both possible short term and longer term improvement proposals. Although the development of these proposals is not quite complete, I am now able to inform you of the proposed way forward.

Our intention is to reduce the speed limit on the A120 through the junctions to 50mph, to be enforced by speed cameras. Although the problems at this location are not due to excessive speeds, by reducing the speed of vehicles, the severity of any collisions will also be reduced. We are now working to introduce the temporary speed cameras and preparing the temporary traffic regulation order that will be needed to lower the speed limit. The programme for delivery is to be finalised - once complete I will advise when the speed reduction will be introduced. It would not be practicable to introduce a lower speed limit without camera enforcement. Without camera enforcement it is unlikely that motorists will fully comply with the new speed limit, increasing the likelihood of vehicles travelling at different speeds and increasing the risk of collisions.

In the longer term we plan to construct a roundabout that will provide better and safer access onto the A120 at Little Bentley. We are currently working on the design and I will write again to outline the proposals once more details are known.

TAILS FROM PRIMROSE FARM

Firstly thank you to everyone who came on the only rainy Saturday in August to the Cooking Celebration day. Paul the pigman informed me that he had seen a wheatear this week. The wheatear is a fairly small mainly ground-dwelling bird. It hops or runs on the ground. It is blue grey above with black wings and white below



with an orange flush to the breast. It has a black cheek. In flight it shows a white rump and a black T shape on its tail. It is a summer visitor and passage migrant. These birds breed mainly in western

and northern Britain and western Ireland, although smaller numbers do breed in southern and eastern England. It winters in central Africa. It belongs to the chats and thrushes family. In the breeding season it is found on upland habitat but may be seen at coastal migration watchpoints and inland. young assistants went out celebrating their excellent A Level results but managed to return to work the next morning. They said "We think there is a parrot in the barn. It's grev but not a pigeon because it has a hooked beak!" There on the straw bales was an African grey parrot who did not seemed injured and did fly about the barn briefly. He was caught in a fishing landing net and safely popped into a cardboard box. Many thanks to Julian and his guests for entertaining us, Mary Fawcett for inviting


Julian to perform here, the hard-working PCC for organising the concert, and all those involved in providing a wonderful range of nibbles and drinks in the interval. Hugh Frostick





IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE

Since the last issue we have been plaqued with cluster flies in this area, but thankfully. they seem to have reduced recently. What are they? Should we be concerned? Cluster, or attic, flies are found throughout the UK, but mainly in rural areas. They lay their eggs in early spring on damp soil and leaf litter. The newly hatched larvae are parasitic on earthworms and eventually pupate in the soil. After hatching, the adult flies feed on the nectar of garden and wild flowers, and towards the end of summer they tend to congregate in large numbers looking for somewhere to hibernate. The flies tend to return to the same property vear after year, and even if there are similar buildings nearby, they may not be affected. It is not known why one building is preferred, it may be that the flies are attracted to lighter coloured buildings, sunnier spots, or use pheromones to locate old roosts. This life cycle is part of nature's normal unseen jungle warfare that goes on in gardens, and the cluster fly lives in balance with the rest of the garden wildlife. From the human point of view the fly is harmless, does not breed indoors or lav eggs on food, and is not thought to carry any diseases- their presence is definitely not a sign of poor hygiene. So, in summary, they are extremely irritating rather than harmful but the good news is that they move slowly so are easy to swat!



Strangely, it is a good time of year to plan next year's garden. It is only too easy to forget what is in the garden when faced with bare soil, and I'm sure everyone has dug up plants by mistake when planting in the spring. It's a good time to look at the overall shape and structure of the garden and see where a new tree or shrub could be planted to maximum effect. Trees and shrubs planted with bare roots in the winter often do better than container grown ones, and have the added advantage of often being cheaper.

October is often a month of warm days, but an early frost at night would not be unusual, and for that reason, all tender crops such as tomatoes, chillis, aubergines and peppers need to be picked and if not ripe, put in a paper bag with a ripe banana until they ripen. Apples and pears need to be picked and stored in a cool place as do quinces, and medlars after they have been "bletted".

Pumpkins and squashes - with their stalks still attached need to be stored in a cool frost free shed to "cure". Brassicas need protection from



hungry pigeons with fleece or netting, and the last of the runner beans picked. Quite often, these beans are inedible as pods, but the seeds inside can be delicious, or they can be dried to use as next year's seed.

As I write, we are enjoying an Indian summer, though of course that could all have changed be the time this article goes to print. It has been one of the loveliest summers for a long time, but I suspect, British summers being what they are, we may have to wait a while for the next glorious one!

THE DOCTORS' SURGERY NEWS

Gt Bentley Surgery

It's the flu jab season again, so if you are due a free one – most of you who are will already know it – book your appointment, roll up your sleeve and let's get you protected. Anyone aged 65 or over on 31^{st} March 2014 is on our hit-list, as are people (including children from 6 months upwards) with a variety of chronic diseases.

Also this year, all other children born between 2nd September 2009 and 1st September 2011 are entitled to vaccination, though this will be via a nasal spray rather than a jab. This is the first step in the government's efforts to get all children aged 2 to 16 years vaccinated each year. If you think you or members of your family might be eligible, you can check on the NHS website, www.nhs.uk, or our own,

www.greatbentleysurgery.nhs.uk, or you can enquire here at the surgery.

September also saw the start of a new campaign to get all people aged 70 or over vaccinated against shingles. It isn't practical to jab everyone in a single year, so this year the target groups are people born between 2^{nd} September $1942 - 1^{st}$ September 1943, and those with dates of birth 2^{nd} September $1933 - 1^{st}$ September 1934. We will be sending out invitations, and if you get one, please take us up on it.

If anyone thought that the changes here at "The Hollies" had finished, I'm sorry to disappoint as there are still more to report. The most significant is that Dr Cavenagh retired completely at the end of August, having worked as a part-time Salaried GP since he gave up his partnership early in January. Dr Cavenagh had been with us even longer than Dr Hunt. Since arriving in 1984 Nick has been the practice's main ideas and business man, and its lead on medicines management. As such, as well as being the driving force behind many innovations and improvements here at "The Holies", he steered us through all sorts of health scares, some serious and others pretty silly – remember AIDS, Sars, Pandemic Flu, Mad Cow Disease, Edwina Currie and her rotten eggs? Well he survived the lot, and one of the least known facts about him is that in his whole working life he never took a single day off sick – not one!

Many patients, myself included, have benefited from his medical skills, sharp mind and inexhaustible patience. The stories of his being able to raise pets form the dead, however, have to remain urban myth. Nick wants to wish all his friends well and thank everyone who made his career so happy and rewarding.

I have been asked to remind everyone about a couple of things:

Firstly if you have more than one problem to discuss with a doctor or nurse, please remember to tell the receptionist when you make your appointment so that you can be allotted extra time. We find the main cause of GPs in particular running late is patients with shopping lists of issues they want to talk about. This leads to inconvenience. frustration and annovance as people following on are delayed. The doctors are perfectly happy to deal with extra problems if they are forewarned and more time has been set aside, but if you don't let us know beforehand, they might well have to cut you off in full-flow and ask you to return another day to finish your list.

Secondly, if you feel that a few words of advice from a GP or nurse might help you avoid a trip into the surgery, please ask about booking a telephone appointment. Especially over the winter, it might save you exposure to various germs lurking in the waiting room, not to mention travelling and waiting time.

KITCHEN CORNER

Lemon Oat Cakes

A recipe from WI Suffolk Federation's Gilly Denny.

1 lemon 8 oz SR flour 8 oz butter 4 oz sugar 6 oz porridge oats 6 oz icing sugar.



Melt butter then mix with sugar, flour, oats and grated lemon zest in a large bowl to make a stiff paste. Press into a greased tray 12x9", bake 160C 15-20 mins. Meanwhile mix 3tbs lemon juice with the icing sugar to make a thin icing. Spread this over the cake whilst still hot making sure it covers the edges, then cut into squares or bars.

Leave to cool, then cut again before removing from the tin.

and visiting scientists, close to the Bromley Camp where the dormitories, mess and cookhouse were. One prior resident was Sir Frederick Gill Rice, MP for Harwich 1924-29 who died in 1935. Tubby Austin remembers his father telling him that

Hamilton Lodge in Rectory Road used to be called Great Bromley Lodge. As you will know, it is now a residential care home started by Mrs Palmer to offer specialist care for people with learning disabilities. Kathleen Palmer had her family in British Guiana in the 1920s; her second son David was born prematurely in poor conditions and was brain-damaged. After her husband, Charles Hamilton Palmer, died in 1946 she returned to Britain. Despairing of the level of care available in institutions of the time. she decided she needed to set up a private care home herself. When she saw Great Bromley Lodge, driving up the long drive with the grounds and seeing the big windows "everything seemed to fit into place". She worked hard to obtain a mortgage and set up the Hamilton Lodge for David and then other patients, once the health authorities could finally be persuaded. David died in 1970; Kathleen died in 1988 aged 94.

This picture shows the hall before it was "de-Victorianised," in what year, I wonder? There were clearly some major changes carried out. John Appleby's "Where the Broom Grows" says the Lodge was an RAF Decoding Station in the war, but Julian Foynes (author of "The Pylons in Great Bromley") thinks that is unlikely. He does say it was used to house officers they had to cut a semi-circular piece out of the dining table so the Sir Frederick could be wheeled in close enough to eat his meals! There is a postcard showing some stonework, entitled "an old bit of the Houses of Commons" in the grounds, as well as a sundial that John Appleby says was removed when Lady Rice vacated the premises. There remains a Rice family vault in the churchyard.

I wondered how best to find out who owned the house between the Rice family and Mrs Palmer. It occurred to me to ask George Austin, as he worked there during the war (see last month). George said "he or his son played cricket with us. Doublebarrelled name." Out came my copy of Peter Wenden's cricket club membership book; when George heard the name he remembered it - Guy Napier-Martin. Tubby remembers he had one good shot, a golf swing; George said "when he connected it really went - I remember him putting a 6 through the pavilion window at Wivenhoe!" Unfortunately we can't look back in the actual match records as I hear that, for reasons unknown, someone cleared out the pavilion with a bonfire some years back. What a terrible shame.
