CHARITY COASTAL WALK RAISES OVER

On Sunday 27th April, a coastal walk was held from Frinton to Walton (and back) in memory of Nicole Abbott from Great Bromley, who lost her battle for cancer a year ago, aged only 34. Funds were raised for the charity **Cancer Active** and, to date, £1,400 has been collected, which, when Gift Aid is taken into account, amounts to over £1,600 for the Charity.

The day started off cool and breezy, but dry, and 49 intrepid walkers gathered on the greensward at Frinton, near the Golf Club, along with a number of dogs in a variety of outfits – prizes were offered for the best dressed – and plenty of pink balloons. After the group photos, everyone set off along the promenade towards Walton, being careful to avoid the spray from the high tide waves being blown in on the wind. The walk took them along past the beach huts to Walton Pier and then beyond to the Naze Tower. After a brief stop for refreshments, the more energetic walkers carried on to do the circuit round the Naze point before returning to the Promenade and

back to Frinton. In all, approximately 10 miles, taking about 4 hours for most of the walkers. As the day progressed, the clouds dispersed and the sun shone, making the whole event an enjoyable, albeit tiring, experience.

Thanks must go to the organisers, Suzanne Abbott, Linda Pinhey and Clare Thompson for publicity, posters, balloons and collection of the donations. Thanks also to **Cancer Active** for providing the large banner and T-Shirts.

Cancer Active (www.canceractive.com) is a charity which help people affected by cancer build a programme of complementary and alternative therapies around orthodox treatment – the best of the best – and to help increase their personal odds of survival. This is achieved by providing cancer information through a magazine ICON, distributed to hospitals, and centres on Cancer Watch which records research studies from around the world.

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

The Village Hall AGM was held recently and for those who were

unable to attend I thought that I would share the Secretary's report on the last year.

Secretary's Report for the Year End 31st March 2014

This year I have been less involved than in the past due to work and family commitments. It has been the first year with Mike as Chairman who stepped in after only being on the Committee for a year. We have continued with much the same Committee as last year, many of whom were newbies too. We have experienced a steep learning curve and as the office holders have full time jobs too, time is at a premium.

Martin has been a power house this year in getting things done, he has organised, cajoled, encouraged and just grafted. Martin and Mike sorted out a problem that was hitherto unknown to all the Committee. In short we had been providing free electricity to the Cricket Club and sorting something as financially delicate with a fellow Village Club was not an easy thing to do. The toilets have been finished and they look great. With less income, and grants being harder to get, we have pulled in our horns as far as spending is concerned. We did, however, receive money from the Parish Council for the curtains and also a £500 grant towards heating costs.

We were blessed with a much milder winter this year so the heating bill has been lower. Jackie has done splendid work with the bank account, giving some flexibility so we can get better deals on our utility bills. Mike is working with Jackie to get a proper computer accounts programme installed to get things like the invoicing, bookings, billings and payments together. This will make things easier for all concerned.

This year is the first full year without the playgroup. We have slowly increased the number of bookings and have several future wedding bookings too. This is thanks to all the hard work of the dynamic pair, Jackie and Mary.

This year has seen much more fund raising. We have to run events every three months but there were more late last year and early this year. The Christmas Favre was a great success, again run by Filipe. Again we made some good money but we still lacked young children attending. As usual Jane and Dinah came up trumps with the New Year's Eve Event which sold old early and also made a large amount of money. A new event run by Jackie and Mary, the Mind, Body and Spirit Day, was well run but lacked numbers however. We had a night of Mirth and Mysteries, The Dickens Night which was a great night and again this was a money maker. Mary was the instigator but Martin and Kate helped with the finish. The Quiz Night was run this year by Kate and Jayne and again was packed, well run and great fun and made money. The future looks much brighter with more things being thought of and planned. The most important thing we do with our fund raising events is give all who attend a really great night's entertainment all in their own Village. No need to travel far- its all happening here.

After the usual introductions and business she handed over to Sheila Gunson, our W I advisor, Sheila carried out the technical part of the meeting and Jenny was re -elected our president for the next vear. Refreshments then were the order of the day to be followed by "Bromley has Talent" - three of our members had agreed to give a short talk about one of their particular interests.

Joy started the proceedings with an illustrated talk about her love of decorating cakes especially celebration cakes. She explained about the need to improve her skills and this was whilst she was working full time as a nursing sister. Joy explained how she had completed a City & Guilds Sugarcraft course over 2

years successfully, and then still wanting more had gone on to do a two year course on Patisserie in one year, still working full time. WOW!

Irene was next up with her talk about the very intricate craft of crochet, Irene is very talented and showed us all very old techniques as well as more modern . She

went on to explain that over the years the method of Broomstick crochet, lattice Loop, Afghan were all types of crochet stitch. She has a term U.F.O. (unfinished object) and she was trying to sort these into some sort of order to turn them into items that could be used.

Joan brought up the rear with her talk about

Dorset Buttons. A gentleman, Abraham Case, was the first person to make these very small buttons and Joan had some originals to pass



around. Over the years this increased to a cottage industry making at least 30 different types of button. In 1805 skilled workers could earn one shilling a week. Mothers would make the buttons and the children would be expected to stitch them on cards. The Industrial Revolution changed the face of button making and the cottage industry slowly disappeared. Some of the old names were High Tops, Honeycombs, Baskets, and Dorset Nobs.

What a variety of talent we have at Great Bromley.

The evening was finished off with a beautiful birthday cake made by one of our members Sue.

IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE



Great excitement in the garden, our Blue Tit in the camera box laid about 10

eggs and they have hatched. We saw them minutes afterwards, and truly only a mother could love them - they really are ugly!! The mother Blue Tit is very attentive and is constantly moving around, "tidying" the nest, and nipping out for a quick feed and a juicy morsel for the babies. Father Blue Tit has also put in an appearance, but presumably whilst the babies are so young, they don't need constant feeding, he spends most of his time elsewhere (has he got another family?) but I have no doubt that will change.

We had an enjoyable day at the plant sale at Ilex farm on Saturday, and seemed to sell almost all the plants. People were going away with wheelbarrow loads, apparently very happy. Unfortunately, I think it will be the last sale at Ilex farm, as James and Anne put an enormous amount of effort into the sale (Anne grows most of the plants herself), and they are finding it too much now. I have plans for next year, so watch this space. My garden looks as though someone has sprayed it with Miracle Gro. Everything, especially weeds, is growing at a tremendous rate, and my husband seems to have to cut the grass every five days or so. The mild temperatures have certainly got things off to a good start. Personally I will be delighted when the bedding plants can go out - my greenhouse is bursting! Probably it will be done by the time this article goes to print. Last year I was predicting a glut of ladybirds this summer, but I haven't vet seen a single one - has anyone else?

To gardening; greenhouses need shading from the hot summer sun if you are growing plants such as tomatoes, cucumber, chillies and aubergine. Paint or netting can be applied. In June, the sun is at its highest as we reach the equinox, and tender plants can be badly scorched. In the vegetable

garden, weeding and watering is a daily activity. However, now is also the time to start harvesting! We have been eating the most delicious asparagus for several weeks now. It amazes me the speed at which it grows - literally over the course of a day. Some baby carrots, beetroot, broad beans, lettuces and peas can also be harvested. Micro greens are very popular, and it is a good way of thinning crops. All remaining hardy plants such as cabbages, cauliflowers, celery and leeks should be planted by the middle of the month. Salad seeds should continue to be sown. Greedy plants such as those in the cabbage family, beetroot, celery, celeriac and leeks will benefit from supplementary feeding. Pest watch has started with pesky black fly. caterpillars and greenfly all doing their best to ruin your crops, not to mention slugs and snails

The most important thing though is to make time to stand back and enjoy your garden.

THE DOCTORS' SURGERY NEWS

Great Bentley Surgery

I want to focus on appointment avaliability in this month's newsletter. I've been hearing comments from receptionists, doctors and patients about the waiting time to see a doctor for routine appointments. I want to tell vou about the changes we've made and what we are doing to do to improve the situation. We have roughly the same number of patients' as 10 years ago with the same mix of ages and medical conditions. We have the same number of doctors and appointments avaliable too, so not much has changed in that respect. The only thing that has changed is that demand for appointments has increased and we find ourselves having a more difficult job of matching that demand with decreasing resources. We are in a period of severe financial cuts across the NHS so all surgeries are having to do much more work, for much less funding. This puts many, including us, in an increasingly tough position. We're luckier than some, in that we were able to attract new GPs to replace outgoing ones. In one local surgery, patients have to wait nearly two months to pre-book a routine appointment and is at risk of closing, so we feel lucky compared to some. For patients who need to be seen urgently on the same day, we will always see them. We introduced a triage system which ensures that these appointments are always medically appropriate. This helps to free routine appointments for everyone else. This is working very well and patients have provided positive feedback on this new process. Dr Chumbley has finished her training to be a GP trainer so by the time vou read this we will have Dr Vine with us on a part time basis finishing her GP training. Having an extra registrar with us each year in the future as a result will help to reduce waiting times further and you can rest assured that we will always be looking for new and innovative ways to help further. If you have any ideas we are always keen to listen to any suggestions patients' may have

and the best way to bring these into discussion is to attend the Patient Participation Group meetings. This month's will be at 6.30pm on Thursday 19th June at the village hall so please do come along and get involved.

By the end of June all patients 75 years and over will soon be allocated a named GP as part of a new government scheme to improve continuity of care.

Presently everyone is registered with the practice as a whole and

is able to see a nurse practitioner or the call doctor for urgent problems and can choose to make routine appointments with a doctor of their choice for ongoing health conditions. By the end of June everyone in this age group should receive a letter informing them of their named GP. We will be trying to ensure that this is a doctor you have seen before and if possible that this is the doctor you have been seeing regularly. Each letter will offer an option of applying to change the allocated doctor if you prefer although we do need to ensure that each doctor has a fair allocation of patients' numbers. This system does not mean that the named doctor will always be able to see you for each appointment. We will continue to offer an on call service for urgent appointments and any home visits will need to be shared equally among the medical team to allow an efficient service. However it does offer a named doctor to discuss ongoing medical conditions in routine appointments should you wish. All our patients will be free to book appointments with other doctors or the nursing team if they prefer. We hope this scheme offers continuity of care to those who wish for it whilst continuing to allow the access to urgent appointments that has received such positive feedback in past patient surveys.

KITCHEN CORNER

Strawberry Cake

This is the month for the strawberry bonanza so here is one way to use them in a cake.

Grease and bottom line 2 sandwich tins. Make a sponge mixture in the usual way with 4oz SR flour, 2 eggs, 4oz caster sugar, 4 oz butter or margarine.

Cream the butter and sugar, beat in the eggs and fold in flour. Either crush or chop 4 oz strawberries and fold these into the mixture together with another tbs flour and

a teaspoon of baking powder

Divide the mix between the tins and bake 20-25 minutes at 180°C. When firm to the touch run a knife round the edges and turn onto a rack to cool.

When cold, sandwich together with either a butter cream mixed with mashed strawberries. Or whipped cream and halved fruits.

First World War commemoration

As part of the planned commemorations for WW1 Great Bromley Parish Council would like to encourage the residents to take part in a national activity "Lights Out", where between 10pm and 11pm on August 4th every building turns out their lights and displays a single bright light from a prominent position to mark the outbreak of the war.

The nationwide event is designed to echo the words attributed to Sir Edward Grey, Foreign Secretary, on the eve of the conflict: "The lamps are going out all over Europe; we shall not see them lit again in our lifetime."

The Parish Council have also secured the necessary planning permission to allow the construction of the Poppy Memorial, which will commemorate the first world war and stand at the war memorial from 4th August 2014 through to 11th November 2018. The necessary pieces are now being organised ready for erection nearer to August.

At the May meeting of the Parish Council we held our AGM, Parish Assembly and regular Parish Council Meeting. A number of appointments were made to the various committees of the Parish Council but a vacancy or two remains - please see elsewhere in the Messenger for how you can get involved in your village and shape the community you live in.

The Chairman's annual report on the activities of the Parish Council 2013/14 was unanimously approved and will be made available to the public shortly.

The Parish Council were pleased to receive the news that the speed cameras were due to be installed on the A120 in approximately a month to six weeks' time. It was confirmed that the equipment had been purchased and the contractors were in place to install it. In addition, the Parish Council were told that funds were in place for a roundabout, the building of which was expected to commence next year. The Parish Council have lobbied for this for some time and therefore hope that the changes will reduce the number of casualties that have arisen so close to our village.

A member of the public attended the meeting to provide further information regards the Solar Farm application at Burnt Heath at Ardleigh. It was noted that whilst the Parish Council had seen the plans, it had not been formally consulted as such because the application did not relate to Great Bromley and therefore it would not be appropriate for any comment to be raised at this stage. This however did not prevent any individual from commenting, if they so wish.

The Parish Council 2013/14 accounts had been finalised, the meeting were informed. The accounts had been approved by Cllr. Blowers, the Council's accounts monitor, and were now with the internal auditor before being sent to the external auditors. A number of other planning applications were considered with no objections. A number of planning decisions were noted and in particular it was noted that a planning appeal had been refused by TDC.

The Parish Council again received some very generous contributions from local businesses and individuals towards the village flower tubs and would like to thank people for donating so generously.

ARDLEIGH SOLAR FARM

Dear residents of Bromley
You may recall in the last edition of this
publication an article about the proposed
Solar Farm just over the border in Ardleigh.
I would like to address some of the content
in the article that the author had twisted
and warped to their own ends in an effort to
cause distress and outrage amongst
residents. Please accept my sincere
apologies if you have suffered any stress or
anxiety.

The first inaccuracy regards the quoted size of the site, it is 41-acres not almost 50 as stated in the article, 9-acres is a big bit of land to me.

The second inaccuracy states that the site is surrounded by properties please check on a map. Note to the author on the definition of surrounded "be or go all around on every side ".

The next statement is not so much an inaccuracy as a truth warped to induce anger at the perceived greed of the farmer (technically I am a grower but I will let that one slide). Here I quote the original article " This land was used for apple production until the farmer took advantage of an E.U. subsidy in the mid 90's to grub the apple trees out, being paid not to grow any there for the next 15 years." The grant was a one off payment to cover grubbing costs, the bank had that just as they had taken our home the previous year, there was also an agreement not to replant for fifteen years, it was a traumatic time for the whole family. we managed to cling on to the farm but it has cost 20 years of hard labour. To insinuate that it was to our advantage is repugnant; the bank benefited and indeed so did the author with a large garden extension.

The article goes on to point out the panel height as 3 meters a statement clearly designed to cause alarm, the highest part of the structure will be 1.7 meters from the ground. Grass grows well in the shade and it is clear on the plans there are plenty of

open spaces for wild flowers along with over 500 fruit trees.



As for Brownfield and factory roofs, there is no comparison between building houses and commercial units over solar power, the money is in property and it's foolish to think otherwise, take a look around Colchester and find a 40-acre Brownfield site and while you are there a 40-acre factory roof that can take the weight of a solar array, and car parks? They are full of cars for a start and make far more money than a solar farm, and the ruination of "our" countryside? Chancery Farm is private property.

This project is about farm diversification using what we have at our disposal, I am not a farmer and lack the machinery to farm, we need capital to plant new orchards, restructure old orchards, machinery and investment in our storage facilities. Without this the farm will disappear, we will be forced to pull out the remaining orchards and change the face of Burnt Heath forever. Please believe us when we say we are not out to destroy anybody's way of life, we strongly believe that this site can sit discreetly and quietly, and despite the common misconception we are by no means making millions of pounds, the rent per acre will be equivalent to a crop of apples. Please look at the plans and reach your own conclusions.

'90 to help his country teach the semi-finals. Along with Geoff Hurst, Lineker is also one of just two England

also one of just two England players to score a hat-trick at the finals, grabbing all three of his team's goals in a 3-0 win against Poland in 1986.

- Three players have captained England at a record 10 World Cup matches: Billy Weight (1950-58), Bobby Moore (1966-70) and David Beckham (2002-06).
- Just three England players have been sent off at the World Cup: Ray Wilkins (for throwing the ball at the referee against Morocco in 1986), David Beckham 9for retaliating after being fouled against Argentina in 1998), and Wayne Rooney (for stamping on an opponent against Portugal in 2006).
- David Beckham is also the only England player to have scored at three World Cups

LITTLE BROMLEY TUG O' WAR

In the early 1970s Little Bromley had a very successful tug-of-war team. Below is a picture of the victorious team unbeaten at West Bergholt Fête in 1970 where entries included an Army team (and they won again there in 1971 beating HMS Ganges).

Ray Parker was involved from the start and recalls the successful 1970 West Bergholt event. "We pulled the army all over the place, and they suggested afterwards we should enter the AAA East of England Championships at Felixstowe. This we did and the judge, Mr Robson from Ipswich (not Bobbie!) eyed us up and said, quite rightly, "This will be a learning curve for you!" At that time we just wore boiler suits, unlike all the other entrants, and also when we first started out we just picked up the rope and pulled. We soon learned that the top teams put "treacle" on their hands - resin boiled up in petrol - to help hold tight on the rope.

"We didn't win a thing that day, but Robson asked if we wanted to do this thing properly, which we did, so he invited us to Ipswich to give us hints about weight classes, techniques and so on. Soon after that we got proper kit with some sponsorship and started using "treacle"; after the tug you had to take some care peeling it away from the rope to not lose any skin. Ronnie and Alan used to make up the mix, but one time they set light to it and burned their hands!

"The next big event for us was at Christchurch Park in Ipswich where we came up against a top team in the country, the Reedham Vikings. We were so chuffed that we got an end off them! Although I suspect they went easy on us for that one to gain favour. Anyway, we came away with a cup for the best disciplined team, marching out in our smart new gear!"

Margaret Herrington, wife of the late Lionel, has a scrapbook with cuttings. During the 1971 season, where they had won four cups and two shields, an article in the Standard said the nine regular members of the team used to train three nights a week in a local meadow at the start of the season, but with seven farm labourers in the side "harvesting naturally curtailed their activities". Lionel said "We need a surplus of men so we can adjust our total weight to as near the limit as possible and give ourselves a better chance. There is a lot more to it than many people think, and practise and use of the rope are very important. We are learning all the time and the support we are getting from the village - they recently took a coachload of supporters to one event - is very encouraging."


Around the Clock Relay

Good News!" There may be a "light at the end of the tunnel!"

On Thursday 8th May the P.C.C. of The Bromley's was invited by Archdeacon Annette to a meeting with Elmstead P.C.C. and Ardleigh P.C.C.

The necessary finances have been made available to enable a priest to be appointed for our three parishes and the contract will be for three years. So, the process of appointment has begun and Annette is hopeful that we shall have a new priest installed perhaps by the autumn.

For us it is excellent news and the Church Wardens and P.C.C. will do all that we can to speed the process along. It is not decided yet where the priest will live as there are two rectories vacant, one here in The Bromleys and one at Elmstead. We were very encouraged and hopeful to hear the "Good News" and we ask that you keep us all in your thoughts and prayers during this time of change.

On Saturday May 10th Ann Fairley officially retired as senior church warden of the Parish of the Bromley's. Ann has worked tirelessly in her role for the good of our parishes. We thank her and welcome that she wishes to remain one of our team at St. George's and St Mary's. (Church wardens are elected annually at the Vestry Meeting which precedes the Annual Meeting. Gregory Frostick and I were duly elected as Bishop's Representatives in March 2014).

The incoming Church Wardens have to attend an Episcopal Visitation. It is a legal requirement of Office and is overseen by the Diocesan Registrar. The ceremony usually takes place at a church in our Deanery and is overseen by the Archdeacon, However this year because the Diocese of Chelmsford is celebrating its Centenary the ceremony was held at Chelmsford Cathedral and it was Bishop Stephen Cottrell who led the service.

Ann, Gregory and myself were invited to attend along with Church Wardens and Priests from the Deaneries of Harwich. Witham, St. Osyth, Colchester, Hinckford, Dunmow . Stansted. Saffron Walden and Braintree. Refreshments were served from 10am and the service began promptly at 11am. Bishop Stephen processed into the Cathedral behind the Arch Deacon of Colchester Annette, the Arch Deacon of Stansted Robin. The rural Deans and the Lay Chairs of each Deanery, watched by roughly 500 in the congregation. An amazing sight so many Church Wardens gathered together in the Cathedral, men and women from all professions and walks of life

The Church Wardens are officers of the Bishop and have to sign a legal Declaration of office – they have responsibilities to not only the Bishop, but the Arch Deacon, Rural Dean and the P.C.C. and the Parish. The role of Church Warden could be described as Management, Maintenance and Ministry.

Management refers to the Church Wardens relationship with the clergy, the P.C.C. and the members of the congregation; Maintenance refers to their responsibilities to look after the church building; and Ministry refers to their pastoral role with regard to their priest, the priests family and to the congregation.

So, being a Church Warden can be a very challenging role, the daily demands and responsibilities set a very busy life style. But however big the challenges the rewards and satisfaction in looking after our wonderful Parish Churches and community make it all worth while.
