Man is not a peaceful creature but all everybody really wants is peace.

Let us wish and work for that and remember those who died endeavouring to bring it.

# IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE IN NOVEMBER

I have found my lost ladybirds. Several people have told me that they have seen very few ladybirds again this summer. Yesterday I was cutting down the artichokes, and noticed lots of ladybirds sitting on the stems. There were more on the currants when I pruned them, so obviously, they must have found plenty of food in the vegetable garden, which does not really surprise me as I do not use insecticides.

The flowers in the garden are still looking lovely, late roses mixing with asters, cleomes, penstemon and cyclamen, but I was a bit surprised to see primroses and cowslips flowering. I wonder if they were fooled by the chilly August into thinking that it must be spring now!

This time of year seems to revolve around clearing and protecting before the winterclearing fallen leaves and dead vegetation (though leaving some in situ seems to be beneficial to some overwintering insects and birds) and protecting plant and structures before the gales and cold hit again. Non hardy plants should be moved to shelter if possible, or if not some form of protection used. Personally, when I cut down the Gunnera. I invert the leaves. stuffing the gap with dried leaves, and put the "hat" over the crown, weighing it down with conifer clippings. Conifer clippings are very useful- I remember in Germany, they used to use them on their own to protect plants- the needles kept the snow off the plants, but allowed the rain to get through and the air to circulate. Climbing plants also need to be well secured, and fences and shed roofs checked.

Leaves should be swept off lawns and paths and collected to make leaf mould. I store them in a wire bin which, when topped with old carpet, stops them blowing back around the garden.

November is the time to plant tulip bulbs, protecting them by whatever means you have found to be successful to protect them

from mice and squirrels. Some swear by chicken wire covers, and Crocus sell an excellent wire protector for pots, which according to my parents-in-law, who live in

London, is the only thing that slows the squirrels down. I put my planted up pots in a cold greenhouse until the first shoots are showing, and so far, this



appears to have foiled the squirrels, though this could be that they are so fat after eating all my hazel and walnuts, they can't summon any enthusiasm!

Another job I tend to do towards the end of the month is cut holly for its berries and put it in a bucket in the greenhouse. If we have a cold spell in December, there is nothing more frustrating than losing all the holly berries just before Christmas!

Once it really is autumn, bare root tree, shrubs and hedging can be planted, and also fruit trees and raspberry canes.

One final word, regularly check all stored fruit and vegetables for rot, but also for mice. They can get in a hole the size of a pencil, and believe me they can decimate your stored fruit. Mousetraps at the ready!!

Have Your Say on the future of Maternity Services

The NHS in North East Essex is seeking views from the public about the future of maternity services in a public consultation that runs from 15 October to 10 December.

The 'Right Start' consultation, run jointly by North East Essex Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) and Colchester Hospital University NHS Foundation Trust (the Trust), relates to maternity services across North East Essex provided in the community as well as at Colchester General Hospital, the Fryatt Hospital in Harwich and Clacton Hospital.

#### The main changes being considered are:

- Increasing the locations where women can receive ante-natal and post-natal care to include the home and children's centres as well as GP surgeries and the hospitals
- How the midwife-led units at Clacton and Harwich should operate. There are two options:
   Option 1 - Clacton and Harwich to remain as "on -demand". Midwife-Led Units. Antenatal and Postnatal Care to continue

**Option 2 -** Clacton and Harwich to return to the status of Midwife-Led Units-open 24/7. Antenatal and Postnatal Care to continue

September's Parish Council meeting had a packed agenda and was highly interactive with lots of very constructive public participation. One resident raised the issue of broadband speeds - or rather lack of them - which is having a negative impact on both businesses and individuals. TDC Rural District Panel has advised that the prospect of having reasonable broadband speed in the near future is not looking good, mostly due to the lack of funding. TDC has submitted an expression of interest for £164.000 to ECC for broadband upgrading and they are currently awaiting a response. If you have any comments or feedback, please do let us know.

Unfortunately the results of the vehicle activation sign are disappointing in that we were 1 mph under the requirement for a 35 mph speed average for a speed activation sign. Parish Councillors will be pursuing the matter - in particular due to the fact that the VAS coincided with the Tendring Show and one of the sensors was inoperable during one week of the survey.

Essex Police will no longer attend individual Parish Council meetings and they have set up Local Community Meetings which allow residents to liaise directly with neighbourhood policing teams on a face to face basis. The meetings for this Parish will be held at Manningtree High School from 6-

7pm on the following dates :- 2nd December 2014; 27th January 2015; 24th March 2015; 26th May 2015 and 21st July 2015. Residents are encouraged to forward any questions prior to the meeting to Judith.currie@essex.pnn.uk. Further information is on Essex Police website.

TDC will be attending the next Parish Council meeting on 18th December to do a presentation on "Feel Good About Recycling" and they are hoping to continue to work with residents to update and discuss any recycling matters including how to promote and encourage this within our Parish. Please do come along to the meeting and share your views. We hope residents regard the village planters as an asset and we are looking for sponsors for next year - Sponsors' names will be displayed on the planters. Last but not least - a big thank you to Adrian Ludlow and Ann Clark for donating money for purchase of the poppy wreath for Remembrance Sunday.

The next meeting of the Lt Bromley parish council will be held on 18th December at the Haywain at 7.30pm

# **GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL**

At the time of writing the area has been subject to heavy rain lasting for several days. I am keeping an eye on the roads in the village for signs of flooding and any problem areas will be reported. Last year readers may recall heavy flooding outside Hall Cottages, which has now been resolved, showing that the Parish Council will take action where necessary.

The October meeting was attended extremely well by 20 members of the public, in the main regards two planning applications which the Parish Council have objected to. Please see elsewhere in the Messenger. At the meeting some concern was raised in respect of the timing of these particular planning applications. I received notification of these planning applications after the last agenda had been prepared. The law dictates that the agenda must be issued within 3 clear days of the meeting taking place, not including the day of the meeting itself. Once it is issued by law it cannot be amended. As the Parish Council only had three weeks to object to these planning matters, which fell before the meeting, I approached TDC to request an extension of time to object which would always be granted in this circumstance. I hope this explanation alleviates concerns as to why these planning matters were not raised at our September meeting.

The Parish Council received fantastic news at the meeting in that a grant has been awarded in the sum of £10,000 towards the replacement of the play equipment at Hare Green. Special thanks to Cllr. Hardy whose persuasive application paid off. He will

continue to apply for additional grants and the Parish Council are also hoping to utilise some of the s.106 funds to assist the project. The Parish Council decided that for now, the main focus should be on refurbishing Hare Green before considering any project at Church Meadow. The main reason being that the equipment at Hare Green is more in need of attention at this time.

There are signs of progress on the A120 with the installation of the speed camera signs. This month I was able to report that I have also submitted an application to the Local Highways Panel for the installation of a footpath from Hare Green to the Court House. The Parish Council are also submitting an application for a bus shelter in the centre of the village, as a sum of money has been bequeathed by a village resident for this purpose. The Parish Council have also determined that two dog bins ought to be sourced for areas frequented by dog walkers, and the initial enquiries have shown that the purchase and maintenance of these are extremely reasonable.

I am interested to hear any feedback from anybody who has attended the police beat surgery at Elmstead Market. The Parish Council have written to the Police regards a perceived decline in rural policing and the response, whilst detailed, has not alleviated any of the Parish Council's concerns. Space permitting the response will be printed in this edition of the Messenger. (see page 17)

The next meeting of the parish council will be held on 10<sup>th</sup> December in the Village Hall at 7.30pm.

### The following is a letter written by the Clerk on 25th September 2014 to the Police and Crime Commissioner for FSSEY

Dear Sir.

## Rural Policing in North Essex

Great Bromley is a rural Parish situated North-Fast approximately 8 miles Colchester, towards the direction Harwich, The Parish Council has requested I write to you direct regards their concern as to what they believe to be an erosion in rural policing locally and throughout North Essex.

Various examples over the last few months are as follows. The first sign of a decline was the withdrawal of the local PCSO from his attendance at Parish meetings. The Parish Council understand the operational austin.laura@rocketmail.com difficulties currently facing the police and take no issue with this change, not least PCSO Barnes because was communicating monthly to advise on the monthly crime figures in the locality. We have since been told by him that he is no longer permitted to do this, which the Parish Council find unfortunate. Not only were these figures discussed at our monthly meeting but they were published in our village magazine. From experience we know that our residents like to be kept informed of any crimes committed locally in order to stay vigilant particularly if there are specific types of crime that are on the increase. The recent spate of thefts of catalytic converters being an example of this.

The Parish Council also recently contacted the local PCSO and his superior regards a sudden graffiti issue within the village. They were also requested to attend our village to conduct a speed watch review. On both occasions two emails were sent and were not responded to.

Whilst the Parish Council accept that local police surgeries have been arranged locally, the closest to this village is in Elmstead Market, several miles away. This is hardly accessible to residents of our village, whom are predominately elderly and whom rely on public transport.

The Parish Council would respectfully ask that you intervene as appropriate to ensure the reinstatement of the service whereby we are informed of monthly crime figures which is a task that we know does not take very long to undertake - and also request that an officer attends our village for the purposes of undertaking a speed watch review.

# KITCHEN CORNER

### Chicken Provencal

1 Chicken drumstick and rasher of streaky bacon per person.

Small tin tomatoes and 1 Tblsp tomato puree.

1 large onion

1 clove garlic

1oz butter

1oz flour

1/2pt chicken stock/wine mixed

Seasoning

Parsley or thyme.

Lay a sprig of herb on each drumstick and tie bacon round with string. Sauté joints till golden in butter or oil. Remove joints and soften the chopped onion. Add tomatoes, stir in flour and other ingredients, replace joints and simmer 30-40 minutes. Remove string and dish up, pouring the sauce over the joints and sprinkle with chopped parsley.

# **Great Bentley Surgery**

Flu season is well under way and at the time of writing (13<sup>th</sup> October) we have already vaccinated just under 1,350 patients in only two weeks! This is 38% of all those eligible and half way towards the Department of Health's target of 75%. I'm hoping that we'll have met this target by the time you read this, but just in case we haven't and you are eligible but not had your jab yet, please call and book your appointment!

The new Electronic Prescription service is working well. All the local pharmacies are also now promoting this service as they've seen how efficient it is. Remember, you don't need to have or know anything about computers to benefit from this. Just tell a member of staff either here or at your pharmacy that you want to use EPS and they will do this for you straight away. The best thing about this (apart from making everything quicker!) is that we can see exactly where your prescription is and at what stage of the process it's at. No more hunting around for bits of paper!

As some of you may know, Di Woodward who has been with us as Reception Manager for 11 years has recently moved on to pastures new. We gave her a fantastic send off and will all miss her. I think she was on first name terms with most patients! We have been extremely lucky however, to gain Sue Mitson to replace her. Sue comes from another local surgery where she was Practice Manager, so has a wealth of knowledge and experience. I'm sure you'll all get to know her just as well over the years.

# New service for people with life limiting illness

Across this area a new service has been designed to help co-ordinate the care of



people with serious health problems. This service is designed for those with either a terminal illness or an illness that can be life threatening or even for those in advanced age with frailty and deteriorating health. For those facing

such challenges it is vital that care is coordinated, both within and out of working hours, tailored to the person's preferences.

To help achieve this, a service called Single Point has been developed for North East Essex. People can register on this system via their GP if they agree it is appropriate. Information is collected from the person such as preferences about care, decisions about whether hospital care is acceptable to them and contact details of next of kin. If health care is required at any time of day or night the Single Point service can be contacted directly and the senior nurse who receives the call can manage the problem appropriately to the need.

The register is called 'My care choices' and it is designed to protect choices for those in the most vulnerable health. We hope to see that it improves the quality of care offered across North East Essex, as it has been shown to do when used in other parts of the country. If you think that you or your relative may benefit from this service please contact you GP to discuss it further.

# **FINANCIAL MATTERS**

Ensuring their family's financial security in the

event of death is of paramount importance to most people. Indeed, when I visit new clients, most have some kind of life protection in place. However, there is one issue with these insurances that I come across time and time again and make no apology for devoting this article to it.

When life cover is taken out, it is assumed by many that in the event of a claim, the proceeds would go to their spouse or next of kin. In other words, they do not believe they need to do anything else. I get comments like 'I have put it in my Will' or 'it will go to my wife/husband, won't it?' It may be the case if the policy was set up as a life of another, or as a joint policy, that that is exactly what would happen, but, what if it is set up as a single life policy? If it is a single life policy, the claim would normally be paid straight into the deceased's estate. Once in the estate, it can take weeks, even months for it to be settled; even longer if there isn't a Will in place.

Once in the estate, the funds could end up going to any creditor or organisation that may have a claim against the deceased's estate; for example, the Inland Revenue. This happens before any remaining funds are distributed to the beneficiaries named in the Will.

It is surprisingly simple to ensure that this does not happen by securing the life policy in a Trust. By placing the policy in a Flexible Discretionary Trust the proceeds of any claim would remain outside the deceased's estate. It is not subject to any form of taxation, including inheritance tax. This ensures that the monies go to the nominated beneficiaries via the appointed Trustees and is very important if the monies are for a specific purpose - such as to pay off the mortgage.

Putting new policies or existing policies into trust can be complicated because of the wording in the Trust forms provided by the insurance providers. Knowing which trust is right for you can be an issue, for instance if the policy includes terminal or critical illness.

# HERE IS THE LATE NEWS ...

The Essex (County) Standard and other local papers are available for searching and viewing on line (free from within the library). I have recently been searching the period 1750-1850. Ours being a farming community most news, other than family announcements, is to do with agricultural and hunting matters, reports of fires and accidents, and crimes. Here are a few tales!

"A lad in the employ of Mr Walker, of Great Bromley, was sent to fetch a colt from a field; and was leading the animal, which had not been broken in, by a halter, the end of which he fastened to his arm with a slip noose. On a sudden the horse took fright, and commenced kicking violently, and the noose having drawn tight upon the arm of the boy, the limb was almost instantly fractured, and being dragged down, he received kicks from the horse, which completely dislodged the scalp of the skull, scattering the brains of the unfortunate lad to a great distance; at the same time he received such other injuries as left scarcely a bone unfractured. The whole of the above heartrending catastrophe was witnessed by /

the father of the deceased, who was some distance from the spot, and unable to render any assistance until all human aid was unavailing." Ipswich Journal, 20th April 1839

"A young man named James Harris and a young woman named Grace Boyce, being out at a late hour made themselves a bed under a straw-stack at Great Bromley. In the morning the farmer and his man began cleaning straw out of the barn and stacking it over the spot where they lay; after they had been at work some hours they thought they heard cries from the bottom of the stack, and after taking away the straw they discovered the pair, who were liberated and sent their ways, the man looking very harassed and the lady very graceless." Chelmsford Chronicle, December 1841.

"A few days since a Farmer at Little Bromley, having quarrelled with one of his under-tenants, threatened to have him sent on a man of war, and accordingly offered a guinea and a crown to two soldiers quartered in the neighbourhood, to assist him in accomplishing his purpose. They proceeded about 11 in the evening to the poor man's house, who was in bed with his wife; but hearing an noise at the door and suspecting their design, he escaped and hid himself in a cockloft. The assailants soon after broke into the house, when the farmer finding the man was fled, left one of the soldiers sentry, and went with the other to search the out-

offices. During his absence the fellow behaved with the grossest indecency to the woman. whom he repeatedly attempted to force, and then plundered a chest of some wearing apparel. The next morning the affair being laid before a worthy magistrate at Mistley, the farmer was taken into custody, and the different offences, viz. the burglary, robbery and attempt to ravish, being sworn to by the injured parties, he was committed to Chelmsford Gaol. His two accessories were pursued to Harwich, where the officers delivered them, with the utmost readiness, into the hands of the civil power, and after a long examination before Cox Esg. the mayor, they were on Sunday morning last also committed to the above prison." Reading Mercury - July 1782

Now this was clearly on a *very* slow news day: "On Thursday evening, about 7 o'clock, three brace and a half of partridges flew with such violence against the back part of the house of Mr Serjeant, of Great Bromley, as to cause instant death to all but one, which flew away apparently not much hurt" *Essex Mercury, September 1834* 

And to close, I rather think this death notice is a case of TMI (too much information): "Oct 12 at Great Bromley, of diarrhoea, aged 81, Mr William Jacobs, for many years an inhabitant of this parish."

#### Why Rats are a Problem

Horror stories about giant rats found in homes and riverbeds have plaqued the media in recent months. However, rats have been a problem for generations anywhere that has water and a constant food source will attract rodents which can spread disease and nibble through the fabric of buildings.

- Salmonella This bacterium can be found in uncooked meat and poultry and it

- Hantavirus This is spread from the dust of dried urine from rats and other animals. as well as through saliva and faeces in infected animals. It is often difficult to diagnose as the symptoms are very similar to flu, and include fever and muscle aches. Some strains of the disease can prove fatal.
- Weil's Disease This is a bacterial infection from rat urine, and the urine from other animals, and is most commonly spread via infected water. The disease has two stages and symptoms in the second stage can be similar to meningitis; in extreme cases it can cause organ failure.

Pork and Apple Sausages with parsnip and potato mash Cooking time: 20 minutes

Ingredients
454g (1lb) Pork and apple sausages
900g (2lb) Potatoes
225g (8oz) Parsnips
300ml (1/2pt) Light beer
10g (2tsp) Sugar
15g (1tbsp) Gravy granules
1 Knob of butter
Method

Peel 900g (2lb) potatoes, cut into chunks, and 225g (8oz) parsnips, peeled and cut into chunks.

Place into a pan, cover with water and boil for 10-15 minutes until soft.

Meanwhile, in a large pan, dry-fry 454g (1lb) pork and apple sausages for 12-15 minutes until cooked through.

# From The Rev'd Richard Allen

The Parishes of Ardleigh and The Bromlevs have been without a parish priest since Fr Robert Farrell retired in 2013: a number of local retired clergy have been most generous of their time and talents helping to take services. The neighbouring Parish of Elmstead has also been in vacancy since early 2014. The Diocese of Chelmsford has decided to bring these three parishes together under the care of a new incumbent, and the post has been advertised. An announcement will be made once the post has been filled. In the meantime the Bishop of Chelmsford (Rt Rev'd Stephen Cottrell) and the Archdeacon of Colchester (Ven. Annette Cooper) have invited me to help within the three parishes.

So let me introduce myself. I am a selfsupporting (the old term was nonstipendiary) priest. Following a three-year training I was ordained in 2007 and served my curacy at St Leonard's, Lexden, I have also served in the Colchester Town Centre Parishes of St Peter's & St Botolph's during their vacancy. In 2009-10 I served as Chaplain to the Mayor of Colchester (Cllr Sonia Lewis) and in 2013-14 as Chaplain to the Master of The Worshipful Company of Spectaclemakers. I am excited about the new opportunities for the three parishes of Ardleigh, The Bromleys and Elmstead, and have already been hugely encouraged by the number that attended a joint welcome service on Sunday 28th September at St George's Gt Bromley. My hope is that I will be able to find out more about village life and serve the parishes over the coming months and years.

I took my first degree in Ophthalmic Optics at The City University, London, and on graduating in 1976 I moved to Colchester and joined Owen Aves, where I am now the senior partner. I currently work there 3-4 days per week, which allows me most Wednesdays and Sundays for my formal ministry activities – although there is always

a bit of seepage of ministry time into life in general. I married Wendy (now a community midwife in Colchester) in 1980, and we have two sons, now both married with sons of their own. In my
