Our February meeting was attended by members of the public concerned about the parking of commercial vehicles in the village. Whilst the Parish Council is limited in terms of its powers to control such inconsiderate parking, this matter has been reported to the police and other external agencies will be advised in an attempt to control the programme.

Thank you to everyone so far who has responded expressing an interest in Affordable Housing. This register will continue until the Spring so any further expressions of interest are still welcomed. Please keep an eye out on the Minutes and the Messenger for further information as and when it arises.

The A120 remains a topic of conversation at our meetings. Many agree that the speed reduction has had a positive effect in reducing collisions. It has now been determined that a roundabout WILL be built in the future as a permanent fixture to deal with the problem and the funds have been made available to do this. This will come as welcome news to many who have been pushing for a roundabout for some time. On the topic of Highways, the problem of the waste transfer lorries undertaking extremely dangerous u-turns at the Hare Green junction of the A120 remains unresolved. It is believed that the drivers have been told not to do this but continue regardless, instead of travelling up to the Frating roundabout and turning there. The Parish Council this month are doing everything possible to highlight this problem, and would ask for your help. If you see any lorry doing this perhaps you would let me know the date, rough time and registration number of the vehicle (in confidence!) and it

will be reported. We are also hoping for a permanent no u-turn sign to be fixed at the location.

March will see the start of the new village maintenance programme, starting with the placing of new screens in the recycling area at Church Meadow car park. Thanks to Cllr. Blowers and Cllr. Perry for agreeing to undertake this work, obviating the need to employ a contractor. I finally also received some news regards the "vandalism" of the signs in the village. It turns out that the red paint sprayed onto some of the signs in the village had in fact been left there by workman conducting their own maintenance on the signs - and if their work remain unfinished the paint would be sprayed so that future workman would know which signs to work upon, which would later be cleaned! This would be comical apart from the fact that police resources were wasted in establishing these facts! Despite this, this cannot account for other incidents of damage within the village (e.g. the letters "M" and "G" sprayed on the village sign) and therefore we would ask residents to remain vigilant and report anything suspicious.

Lastly, a member of the public contacted me with regards the problem of fouling in Chapel Lane. I am pleased to report that TDC will place a no fouling sign at Chapel Lane and we will also be placing dog bins at the public footpath at this location and also at the public bridle path at Harwich Road.

Rosemary Heaney and I sit on various TDC committees. Rosemary is chair of the Planning Committee, and a member of the Standards Committee and Human Resources Committee. I sit on the Planning Committee, Standards Committee, Corporate Management Committee, Council Tax Committee, Regulatory Committee, Service Development and Delivery Committee, Appeals Sub Committee and chair the Rural Projects Panel. I am also vice chairman of TDC.

We, Rosemary and I, try to attend the monthly meetings of Elmstead, Frating, Great Bromley and Thorrington Parish Councils. We support various parish council's initiatives whenever possible and support their views on planning matters. (These are reported elsewhere in your village magazines.)

As you can appreciate we are kept busy attending various meetings apart from the four Parish Councils' monthly meetings.

We both try to help with advice, and whenever possible assist residents with problems and are always available by phone or email

We have been very involved in a major project to try to ensure the A120 at the junctions with Harwich Road/Little Bromley and Little Bentley Roads are made safer. We are very pleased to report that 50mph average speed cameras have been erected, they are operational and we have noticed a significant speed reduction.

Following a meeting on 30<sup>th</sup> January with members of the Highways Agency, our M.P. Bernard Jenkin, Local County, District and Parish Councillors the Highways

Agency announced that a roundabout will be built at the Harwich Road junction with the A120. Funding is now available and a public consultation will be held in the spring. We have also requested the 50mph average speed cameras remain in operation. We do acknowledge that some may be personally inconvenienced by this decision, but we have to measure that (inconvenience) against the risk of death or serious injury for the majority.

You have probably read elsewhere the TDC Council Tax element will remain unchanged from previous years, the free residents parking will also remain. We have been asked many times why the residents parking were changed from 10am to 11am. The reasoning behind this was to try to stop commuters clogging up space for residents who wished to go shopping or attend activities within the towns.

At the full council meeting on 10<sup>th</sup> February it was agreed that a sum of £160,000 be included in 2015/16 budget for switching on the street lights, this is however dependent upon a consultation that is taking place involving Police, Fire, Ambulance and residents. Rosemary & I are against spending money on street lights that are

not required by residents. Some villages do not have Essex County Council lights

In my role as vice chairman of TDC I have been very fortunate to have been invited to represent TDC at a number of events both within Tendring and at other locations in the country. My wife usually accompanies me. We attended six carol/Christmas celebrations, St Paul's Cathedral for the inauguration of the new Bishop of Colchester, Plymouth to celebrate the start of the 400 years anniversary of the Mayflower sailing to America with the Pilgrim Fathers on board. I have also been to a meeting in Greenwich as part of the Mayflower project. We have attended a number of Civic Services in Essex, various services to commemorate the 1914-18 World War, Remembrance Day service and most recently a service to remember victims of the Holocaust where there is a special place in the sunken rose garden in Clacton.. I will, along with my wife, be

attending the Colchester Synagogue in April for a further service of remembrance for the Holocaust victims.

On Friday 6<sup>th</sup> February Jenny and I attended Tendring District Councils "Pride of Tendring" awards evening. The event was attended by almost 200 people. One of the recipients of a "Pride of Tendring" award was Mike Brown, chairman of Frating Parish Council for his involvement in the community.

Hopefully I will be able to update you on the Local Plan in the months ahead.

In setting the 2015/2016 precept, Parish Councillors reflected that they had made a significant reduction last year of 45.7% and, whilst that could not be matched this year, they are mindful of the tough economic climate facing residents. On that basis, it has been agreed to reduce the precept notionally, by approximately 4%, which Councillors hope will send a strong signal to residents that they will continue to reduce costs where possible.

We are delighted that PC Paul Teague will be joining us at the March Parish Council meeting on Thursday 19th, 7.30pm, The Haywain, to do a presentation on setting up a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, followed by a question and answer session. We are pleased that a resident has expressed an interest in co-ordinating the scheme and additional volunteers will be required. Please do come along to the meeting - if

you are not able to attend but would be interested in participating in the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme then let me know and I will pass your details on.

The Footpath Warden advises that, as far as he is aware, all paths have been reinstated and signs have been repaired in the village. If that is not the case, let me know and I will pass the information on. Alternatively problems can be reported via the Essex County Council website.

# KITCHEN CORNER

## Pumpkin Pasta

Serves 4

Butternut squash are abundant now and work very well in this quick and easy recipe although any pumpkin can be used. It goes beautifully with fresh ribbon egg pasta.

1.5kg/3lb pumpkin, peeled, deseeded and chunked  
50g/2oz butter  
1 leek, washed and thinly sliced  
1 stick celery, thinly sliced  
vegetable/chicken stock  
salt & pepper  
grating nutmeg  
150ml/1/4 pint double cream or 125g/4oz fromage frais  
70g/3 oz Parmesan cheese (fresh grated is much the best)  
500g/1 lb egg pasta

Saute leek & celery in the butter for 5

minutes or so. Add pumpkin and stir. for another 5 minutes. Add the stock to cover the vegetables and simmer covered for 20 minutes or until soft. Add stock as necessary to keep moist. Season with salt, pepper and nutmeg to taste. Process in a blender/food processor and return to the pan to keep warm.

Cook the pasta carefully (fresh takes a very short time) Stir cream through the sauce. Drain pasta and place in a heated dish. Stir in the freshly grated cheese and add the pumpkin sauce. Mix well and serve at once.

## IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE



March is a funny month- spring is here, and all the attendant hopes for the garden, but frequently, the month has a sting in it's tail. Sunny days can give way to frosts at night, and snow is certainly not rare- on average, snow falls on three days in March.

Despite all that, most of the spring blooms are flowering their socks off, birds are dashing backwards and forwards, bagging the best nesting spots and building nests. Animals start to come out of hibernation on warm days, and by the end of the month, spring is truly underway. Once we are past 21st March, the spring equinox, day length exceeds the night.

All this means, of course, that the garden is revving up, and gardening can really get underway. Many seeds can now be planted, tomatoes, peppers, aubergines and chillies in heated propagators, and many garden flowers can now be sown in the green house. Any sown last month will probably need potting on, and Dahlia tubers can be started in damp potting compost. The lawn will have undoubtedly started to grow and can be mown on a dry day on a high cut. In the vegetable garden, continue to weed winter sown vegetable beds, such as onions, shallots and garlic, and plant previously chitted potatoes around the end of the month.

Water butts need to be cleaned out, and fine netting such as an old stocking tied over the bottom of the in pipe. This will need regular checking, but it stops mice falling into the butt and polluting it, a

scenario that has occurred several times in my water butts!

The green house door can be left open on warm days to ventilate, and any insulating bubble wrap removed to increase light levels towards the end of the month. I always leave my potting compost in the greenhouse so that it is warm when I sow seeds, and leaving a can of water in there means that the initial watering of new seeds is not done with icy water straight from the butt.

March is also the last month that bare rooted fruit trees and shrubs can be planted, however pot grown ones can be planted at any time of year, but bare root are usually cheaper, and often establish better. Many plants, as they wake up from the dormant period, are in an optimal state to take cuttings. Many border perennials such as lupins and delphiniums can be propagated by basal cuttings. This involves removing the first fat basal shoots when they are 2-3 inches long with a couple of leaves.

Nets should have been removed from garden ponds by the beginning of the month so that frogs and toads don't get tied up in them. I do hope this year is more successful for frogs and toads. Last year, like in the ponds of many of my friends, the frogspawn all disappeared before developing into tadpoles.

One last plea- when you are planting or propagating this month, please grow a few extra plants. The plants sale in the Village Hall on 9th May desperately needs your contributions! An easy way to help support your village hall.

# THE DOCTORS' SURGERY NEWS

## Great Bentley Surgery

With effect from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2015, all GP Surgeries must allow patients' to view some of their medical records online. We have tested our secure service thoroughly and now want to promote this to all patients who have internet access. You will be able to view summary, medications, immunisations and allergy information. This can be done on any internet enabled device including smart phones. By 2018 this will be expanded further to provide access to even more of your record. As well as accessing your record, you can also order your repeat prescriptions online, book doctors' appointments very easily and even message us securely! It really is very simple to set up and use and will make managing your medications so much easier and more accurate as it's linked directly to our computers. Call us on 01206 250691 or send an email to [postmaster.gp-F81021@nhs.net](mailto:postmaster.gp-F81021@nhs.net) to request your registration details which can be posted to you. **Why not give it a try?**

We are aware of some recent problems at The Green Pharmacy. We have received many enquiries and comments from patients who still think the Green Pharmacy is connected to the surgery. This has not been the case for well over a year now and we're unable to help I'm afraid. I've even heard a suggestion that complaining about the service or using another pharmacy could result in being removed from the surgery! This of course is completely untrue. I'm sure that the staff and management there will be keen to hear about and resolve any problems you experience, most of which will hopefully be sorted out when they get their new computer system which I have been told will arrive soon.

*A national pharmacy company called Pharmacy2U are currently mailing thousands of people in this area. This company have no connection with any local pharmacy and absolutely no affiliation with Great Bentley Surgery, despite having the surgery name printed on their letters. We are hearing that*

*many patients, particularly elderly and vulnerable ones, are returning the forms thinking that the surgery and/or local pharmacy have requested this. We do not endorse or denounce any pharmacy including Pharmacy2U, but it does concern us that patients say they feel misled into signing up. We have come across many examples where due to medication types, this is totally inappropriate. Please let your friends, family and neighbours know about this. Thank you.*

**Are you or do you have a carer?** We are keen to hear from you if you are a carer for a friend or relative. About 1 in 10 people who consult a GP will have a role caring for others. We can offer you information about local services that offer support and we can also arrange an appointment with our Care Advisor who can give advice on what benefits and support you are eligible for. We would like to keep a register of carers at our practice so we can invite you to related events. People who have a carer are often (but not always) happy for us to share medical information with them. If they are, we would need written permission to do so and this can often improve communication and help the co-ordination of medical care. We are continually striving to improve the service we offer. ## LONGEVITY IN LITTLE BROMLEY

At a Friends of Little Bromley Church event last year, Gregory Frostick and I presented a few history snippets including a story about “Longevity at Little Bromley”, as noted in the Essex (County) Standard on 24<sup>th</sup> November 1854. The story was picked up by other newsmen and appeared elsewhere across the country:

“It is rather a remarkable fact that the united ages of five out of six of the persons named in the burial register of Little Bromley, as having died within that parish, amount to 402 years, giving an average of 80 years 4 months 4 days 19 hours and 12 minutes to the life of each of the above-named individuals.

“There are also at this time living in the same parish (the population of which at the last census was 414), eighteen persons above the age of 70, more than a third of whom are several years in advance of 80 years of age.

“The incumbency of the last two rectors of the parish extended over a period of more than 100 years.”

The Rectors referred to were Henry

Crossman (rector 1736-1792, 56 years service, died aged 82) and Thomas Newman (1792-1838, 46 years, died aged 72). The rector at the time of the article was Henry Brown Newman (no apparent relation) who went on himself to serve 40 years, and died aged 79!

There was a lady in the village at that time named Sarah Frostick who went on to reach 101. This was also reported

widely, for example the Manchester Courier of 25<sup>th</sup> May 1906:


“Surrounded by her three little ones, aged 76, 73 and 67 respectively, Mrs. Sarah Frostick of Little Bromley, on Tuesday celebrated the hundred and first anniversary of her birth.”

According to the Essex Newsman “she had 11 children – one son was a sailor who fell from the masthead into the water and was never seen again. Another son, in the artillery, was thrown from a horse and a gun went over him, killing him on the spot.”

I have done a quick trace back in Ancestry.com to find Sarah’s maiden name was Bloyce, and that she was born in Ardleigh. It also appears she was my great-great-grandmother. I need to look in the Ardleigh records to find her actual birth – it varies rather at the times of the censuses! The most common birth date mentioned is around 1908, making her “only” 98 when she died. Was the discrepancy due to a literacy or memory issue? Or was she understating her age, in earlier life, so as not to make herself slightly older than her husband James?

Well, this could be thought of as being quite topical, especially as 50 Shades of Grey has its premier this month.

Dr. Jane Pearson, attached to Essex University, was to enlighten us on "The Rise and Fall of Colchester's Good Time Girls" or "Ladies of the Night" 1855 - 1895.

Colchester was known to have a Lock Hospital where the ladies who had been unfortunate enough to contract Venereal Disease were locked away; the feminists of that age thought it was terrible that the men involved got off scot free!!

There were 340 women on the register. Of 25% there is not much known as to what happened to them, they possibly changed their name, got new jobs, or just moved away from the area. Of 50% of the girls there is a lot of information on the data base and of the remaining 25% Information has been found in the census and coroners' reports.

During 1856 the garrison arrived in Colchester which increased the number of

prostitutes in the town as a lot of men had their own following as well as the ones already in Colchester. It wasn't all bad news because the building of the barracks was good for the local economy as the local business men picked up the trade.



Soldiers were not paid very well so in order for them to survive their wives went out into the night to earn money to feed the family. Children started work at 12 years old and were also sexually active. They received very poor wages with the result prostitution

was an easy way out of poverty.

Prostitution was not illegal. There was no red light district in Colchester and at one time there was a pub for every thirty houses.

Who were the clients? Soldiers, Labourers, Artisans, Farmers. Soliciting took place in beer houses and they even worked from the parental or marital home.

Sounds as if it would make an excellent informative tour, but possibly the present residents would not be too keen especially as many of the properties still exist today. A fascinating talk and an excellent speaker.

The next meeting is on 4th March at 7.30pm in Great Bromley Village Hall. Speaker Jo Wray on "Abberton Reservoir"

## CHILDREN'S CORNER

### Easter Egg Hunt Ideas

The secret of a successful Easter Egg Hunt is to tailor it to the ages of the children involved.

### Youngest children - Easter Egg Trail

Give each child a small basket to collect eggs. Lay out a little trail of miniature eggs for each child from a starting point - pacing the eggs at just the right distance so that they can easily find the next one. At the end of the trail, put a larger egg or a small gift. We suggest no more than 10 small eggs in the trail!

### All over Easter Egg Hunt

If you have a large group of children, you may find it easiest to just hide a number of eggs and send the kids out to find them. Obviously this can end up being to the advantage of older children - and pushy children! You might want to set limits of eggs for each child, after which you assign an older child to help a younger child to find their quota.

### Easter Egg Hunt Hopalong

Vary your Easter egg hunt by turning it into a three-legged race! Tie pairs of children loosely together around two ankles and send them off to find their eggs as a couple. They will need to develop some teamwork to be successful!

### Scavenger Egg Hunt

Children will enjoy the excitement of trying to find a particular set of objects rather than just hunting for eggs. Give each child a list of things to look for and bring back. This could include a certain

number of blue Easter eggs, a miniature chick, a miniature Easter bonnet, a packet of jelly beans, and so on. Older children might have to hunt for less obvious articles such as a yellow pencil, a green article of clothing, a smile, etc.

### Action Packed Easter Egg Hunt

Instead of hiding chocolate eggs, hide plastic eggs. Inside each egg hide a clue with some action that has to be performed by the child that finds it. You could include actions like "jump 10 times", "sing a nursery rhyme", sit down on the ground and count to 10", "dance a jig", "hop like the Easter bunny" and so on. When each child has done a certain number of actions, they can be pointed in the direction of a prize!

The P.C.C. felt it was extremely important to have guidelines to ensure the future peace, tranquillity and beauty for generations to come.

The grass cutting of the two churchyards costs over £1500 per annum, depending of course on the number of cuts throughout the year. Of course maintenance is made much easier and much safer for our grounds man when certain guidelines are adhered to as laid out in the document, i.e. mounds reduced/ removed and flower kept in unbreakable containers, flowers and wreaths removed regularly thus reducing the risk of injury when using strimmers and large mowers.

Guidelines are available free in the church, please help yourself. If you have any questions please ask a member of the Parochial Church Council or Church Wardens. Sometimes members of our village who have loved ones buried in the churchyards make donations towards the upkeep and care. These are always very gratefully received helping to ensure that we keep our churchyards to a high standard.
