IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE

I had forgotten how having a dog enables you to appreciate the countryside more. Our puppy is now almost six months old and, as he is a Springer, likes to go on fairly long walks which has enabled me to see how things are changing with the seasons. I noticed that there are blackberries ripe now, and despite the very dry weather, they look particularly juicy. I also spotted a crop of field mushrooms on another walk (why do I never have a bag handy on these occasions?) and what with the onions and peas and the corn having been harvested, it is looking, dare I say it, quite autumnal. Certainly this morning there was a definite nip in the air. I do think the school children have had a pretty good summer holiday weather wise, which seems to be pretty unusual, schools' out normally heralds torrential downpours.

The garden is looking very dry at the moment. I try not to water anything in the beds, and stick to the tubs and the greenhouse only, but this has meant that I have had the grand total of four courgettes and only a handful of runner beans. The greenhouse however is thriving with a glut of chillies, aubergines the size of cricket balls and many tomatoes and cucumbers. I have experimented growing mixed leaves for salad in seed trays, which has been very successful, probably because they get watered regularly with the rest of the greenhouse.

Like many other people's, our lawn is a sad looking place at the moment. It resembles a mat of dead straw, but the positive side is that it hasn't required a lot of mowing this year. It is, however, the time of year to start treating the lawn. Scarifying and spiking followed by autumn fertilizer is recommended, and can make all the difference to the lawn next year.

In the rest of the garden deadheading, cutting back and weeding are all useful. Hedges can be trimmed to make them look tidy for the winter. I always look forward to

our huge and ancient hedge at the front of the house being cut, as at the moment it looks very wild and woolly, but we have to wait until autumn when the birds have finished nesting and the man with the tractor visits.

Autumn is the time when many vegetables are ready to be harvested, and many overwintering vegetables can be planted or sown. Brassicas, if sown or planted, will need protection with netting against cabbage whites and hungry pigeons.

Spring bulbs can be planted now, but wait another couple of months before putting in tulips, to prevent the dreaded "tulip fire" developing.

Some varieties of apples and pears can be harvested now, but only store perfect ones or they will rot. My biggest problem with storing apples is mice, who can get in the tiniest of holes and love apples. Out with the traps again I think!

Albert Sharpe K.I.A. 15th August 1915



Albert was born in 1897 in Great Bromley and was 18 when he joined the Essex Regiment. His service record does not survive but we know that he embarked on board the Grampian at Devonport on the 23rd July 1915. They passed through Malta on

the 30th July and arrived in Alexandria on the 2nd August. From here they sailed to Lemnos and on the 9th August boarded the Hazel for the final trip to Suvla Bay in the Dardanelles arriving the next day in the afternoon.

On the night of the 14th the battalion was ordered to advance across the Anafarta Plain.

They had to cross about a mile of open ground and they were heavily shelled and machine gunned on the way across. This action cost 14 dead and 60 wounded. The next day was little better as they had to dig in and were harassed by heavy enemy sniper fire costing several more casualties. Albert is listed as died of wounds on the 15th. He has no known grave and is remembered along with 21,000 soldiers whose final resting place is unknown on the Helles Memorial.

Albert was one of six brothers who served. and he was the only casualty. More about the family on our website.

Bertie Mulley K.I.A. 26th September 1915

Bertie's family background is not certain to the British. us. One source states he was the son of Francis and Susannah Mulley, another that he was born at Great Bromley, where he was living at the time of his enlistment.

We have no record of any Mulley being born in Great Bromley, and there are no Mulleys in the 1880-1911 censuses.

There was however a Bertie Mulley, with parents Francis/Frank and Susannah, born at Westleton in Suffolk in 1881/1882. It is likely that either he, or his parents, moved to Great Bromley after the 1911 census.

Bertie volunteered to join the Essex Regiment's 11th Battalion around 9th September 1914. (This was a "Kitchener Battalion", created at the start of the war to take the influx of recruits who volunteered at that time.) Bertie was with the 11th when they sailed from Folkestone to Boulogne at the end of August 1915, to join the British Expeditionary Force (B.E.F.) as part of 18th Infantry Brigade, 6th Division. The 11th Essex then moved down south for training. On 21st September they marched to "the Front". which they reached four days later during the first day of the Battle of Loos which is remembered for the first use of poison gas by

The Battalion's introduction to hostile fire occurred the evening of their arrival at the Front, when they started to advance in stages. Late the following morning, 26th September, they were ordered to attack the German trenches just to the south of the village of Hulluch.

Despite heavy losses, the Battalion reached the German trenches, and held their position until relieved that night.

In their very first action, the 11th Essex had lost 18 officers and 350 men killed, wounded and missing, out of a strength of 29 officers and 942 men.

Bertie Mulley was one of those men. His body was never identified, and he is now officially commemorated by his name being inscribed on Panel 86 of the Loos Memorial. It commemorates over 20,000 officers and men who fell in the area, and who have no known grave.

Influenza vaccinations

It is influenza clinic time again!

The Department of Health recommends patients should have vaccination against influenza if they are aged over 65 or any patient irrespective of age if they are at particular risk if they have one of the following medical conditions; heart disease, diabetes, respiratory disease including asthma, renal disease, liver disease, neurological disease, splenic dysfunction or who are immunocompromised and pregnant women.

All children aged between two and four are also invited to be vaccinated to lower the transmission of influenza in the community from children. (Born between 2 September 2010 and 1 September 2013)

The good news is that we are able give the children an intranasal vaccine and not an injection and those children under 17 with an at risk medical condition will also be offered the intranasal vaccine. Please contact the surgery to make an appointment with a practice nurse after the 1 October if you have children that are eligible,

Flu clinics will be held on Tuesday or Friday afternoons weekly at Ardleigh Surgery starting on the 2 October and ending on the 6 November. Clinics will also be held at the Dedham Branch Surgery.

Please telephone the surgery to book into one of those clinics. We encourage patients to attend these clinics rather than use valuable normal appointment slots unless you are attending the doctor or nurse for some other reason.

Apart from one really wet week the summer was pretty good this year. Hayfever symptoms have cleared, the

nights are drawing in and our children and young people are going back to school/ college or university. Talking of young people, if your birth date is between 1st September 1996 and 31st August 1997, you will be offered a new vaccine to protect against Meningitis ACWY. This vaccine will protect against four different causes of meningitis as well as septicaemia. If you are going to university it is recommended that you have this vaccine two weeks before you start, so call us now! Younger teenagers will be offered this vaccination in their routine school programme.

We are now also heading into our annual flu vaccination season. If you think you are eligible for a free NHS seasonal flu vaccination, please call us now to check and make your

appointment in one of our special clinics arranged at the end of this month or early in October.

Finally the Patient Participation Group is meeting on Thursday 17th September 2015 at 6.30pm in the Great Bentley Village Hall. We hope to be able to discuss some subjects submitted via our new "Virtual PPG" for the first time. SUGAR - Most of us eat too much sugar. It can be hidden in foods without us realising it. Try to cut down by eating fewer sugary foods such as cakes, biscuits and fizzy drinks. Many processed foods and, surprisingly, low fat foods can have a high sugar content. Drinking lots of sugary drinks has been linked to an increased risk of type 2 diabetes. Sugary foods and drinks can also cause tooth decay especially if you eat them between meals.

The government recommends that sugars shouldn't make up more than 5% of the energy (calories) you get from food and drink each day that is a maximum of 30g which is roughly 7 sugar cubes. Children should have less - 19g for a child 4-6 years - 5 sugar cubes or 24g for a child 7-10 years - 6 sugar cubes. Just ONE can of cola can have as much as 9 cubes of added sugar!

TIPS TO CUT DOWN SUGAR

- Instead of fizzy drinks and juice go for water or unsweetened juice. Try diluting fruit juice with sparkling water.
- Cut down or stop having sugar in tea or coffee
- Swap cakes or biscuits for a currant bun or scone.
- Watch your breakfast cereals, many are very high in sugar. Try porridge,

- Weetabix or Shreddies (Other brands are available!)
- Ready sauces and soups often have added sugars. Try to make your own it is really easy and a lot cheaper. An average sized jar of pasta sauce (roughly 150g) can contain over 13g of sugar which is the equivalent of 3 teaspoons!
- Get used to reading food labels and comparing products for healthier options. High - over 22g of total sugars per 100g - Low - 5g of total sugars per 100g

KITCHEN CORNER

Chipolata & Brie Melt

Cooking time:15mins Serves:2 people

Ingredients

Chipolata sausages

1 Knob of butter

1 Onion, thinly sliced

4 Plums

30ml (2tbsp) Sweet chilli sauce

2 Baquettes

50g (2oz) Somerset Brie

Method

Melt knob butter in pan, lightly cook 1 onion, thinly sliced. Add 4 plums and 30ml (2tbsp) sweet chilli sauce. Simmer gently

(lid on) for 5-10 minutes until plums slightly softened.

Preheat grill and cook sausages for 10-12

minutes, turning

Toast baguette and spoon over chutney. Add grilled chipolata sausages.

Cut 50g (2oz) Somerset Brie into thick slices. Place on top of sausages, return to the grill to melt slightly.

ABRAM CRAWFORD STEWART 1924-2015



Crawford Stewart was born on 27th October 1924 in Edinburgh and was always proud of his Scottish roots. His parents farmed at Pyot Hall, near Broxburn. When

he was two years old, the family moved down to Essex having bought Morehams Hall at Frating, and Crawford lived there for the rest of his life. He had two older sisters, Mary and Joan, and a younger sister Anne. Crawford went to Elmstead Primary School and then to the Boys High School in Colchester, leaving aged 15 to work on the farm.

As a young man he yearned for adventure, planning at one point to emigrate to the Argentine. He was unable to enlist during World War II – he would dearly have loved to have been a pilot – because he was the single son of a farmer. Instead he joined the Home Guard and patrolled the beaches at Frinton and Clacton.

Crawford married Elizabeth Clachan in 1957 and they took over the farm from his

parents. Crawford saw a huge change in farming during his lifetime, and was very much part of that change as the farm went from horse-drawn ploughs and other implements to four-wheel drive tractors and the farm workforce shrank steadily.

Over the years he and Elizabeth had five daughters. Crawford's skill at making things was put to good use for his children's amusement. They especially remember the land-yacht that they tried to race across the concrete and the rafts they rowed on the pond. He was very proud of his expanding family, enjoying seeing all of his ten grandchildren grow up and in recent years the arrival of two great grandchildren.

In the 1980s, when microlight aircraft came in, he had a last chance to try his hand at flying. He enjoyed the lessons, until unfortunately he crashed the plane and that was the end of his flying career. He retired from farming at the end of the 1990s when he was 74.

Crawford was strong-minded with a quick wit and a ready sense of humour. He will be much missed.

CHURCH JOTTINGS

THE KNEELERS 1973-77

Whilst looking through a book, left in my safe keeping by my mother, I came across this article about the Kneelers in our church. One hundred were made in the 1970s, the project led by the then Rector's wife Lucy Ransom.

There are 48 names listed in the book of the people who helped, some are still living within our community today.

"The kneeler project was started in January 1973 when a day long school of tapestry embroidery was held at the Rectory and people of varying denominations and beliefs came, saw, and were conquered. Funds were raised at coffee evenings and whist drives, fetes and flower festivals, and the small bedroom at the Rectory was filled with rolls of canvas, cartons of pads and bags of wool. Sufficient of the first two for the target of one hundred were bought at the start, but the wool had doubled in price by the spring of 1977.

A modest start was made with five designs based on the Cross, and four colours, green, gold, purple and blue on basic red, and five stitches but people soon became more adventurous, making their own designs, experimenting with different stiches and textures, more colour crept in. There are picture kneelers of St George, the Ark, the Three Wise men, the Burning Bush, of the Church itself, symbolic ones of the Lamb, the Chalice and Paten, and geometrical designs based on Christian symbols.

The hours of work cannot be counted nor a price for them estimated, but the meetings on Monday afternoons and Thursday evenings were happy times of shared experience when new stitches were tried. Fresh designs were suggested, criticised,

altered, adopted and many topics besides tapestry discussed (not to mention the gallons of tea consumed).

Below are listed the people who helped (I have not included those in this piece - JN) There are others who worked behind the scenes as it were in such ways as fund raising. At all times Lucy Ransom was an inspiring leader and teacher, offering the hospitality of the Rectory at all times and seasons. Barbara Watts forgot her pain in her work, but was sadly taken from us. Elizabeth Watts, a resident at Seven Rivers made two kneelers despite great handicaps, and so did John Harwood, our only male embroiderer from Hamilton Lodge "

The book entitled "Great Bromley Church Records"— was kept originally by a lady called Miss Thomas – the P.C.C. secretary at the time.

If you have never seen the Kneelers please pop into the church and take a look, they are an important part of the history of our parish, the church and the people who have lived in our village.

The first 50 Kneelers were finished and completed to be on show for a visit by Princess Margaret on September 11th 1974. The Balance Sheet is also there and shows that the total cost of the Kneelers was £333.98p.
