Computers and the internet are both a blessing and a curse. So is the telephone. The combination of these technical items can turn lives upside down with people losing much money. I frequently have phone calls about boiler replacements, PPI, accident claims, solar panels and computers et al; I usually put the phone down on them.

Settling down to do The Bromley Messenger this month I had a phone call purportedly from the Technical Department in Microsoft (telephone number displayed 01000000000) and they worried me. They wanted to sort out a hacking Microsoft had discovered in my computer. They wanted various details which I didn't give them. They wanted access to my computer which I denied. They then threatened to cut off my computer ID licence (I don't even know what that is) if I wasn't sensible and do as I was told. I told them to go away and I put the phone down. However they continued to ring me telling me how foolish I was not to listen to them. I rang my son as they worried me lest I should be listening! I was told by my son I was doing the right thing and that they were scammers trying to get into my machine. They continue to ring me at periodic intervals and I now just don't answer the phone. But they have unnerved and worried me and I hate the fact that they 'got to me' and under my skin.

On page 5 you will find information about Superfast Essex, the latest government initiative regarding rural broadband as well as a piece by Graeme of Little Bromley on the same subject. Some of you have County Broadband which has good speeds but many of us (including me) get no reception from it. I now have a wi-fi receiver completely separate from the telephone and BT, sourced by my son, which means my speed goes up from 0.4 with BT to an average of 7+ which is considerably faster. He also tells me that alternative solutions are available such as purchasing a '4g router' from Amazon (prices range from £100 to £150), and a mobile data only sim card and data contract (EE's 4g sim

costs £20 per month for 15Gb). In 2014 the average UK 4g speed was 15Mbps, and the average 3g speed was 6Mbps. Each mobile operator has a 'coverage checker', according to which it would appear EE offers the best coverage and speeds in Great Bromley although it is best to check your specific postcode for each network provider. The sim cards are cheap to buy and the 4g routers allow you to use any networks sim card, so you can also try each network to see which works best for your home. Food for thought.

After many conversations about why we won't get "superfast" or even good broadband, I finally have some good news... But I need everyone's help! Please go to <http://www.superfastessex.org/en-us/getinvolved.aspx> and, even if you have done it before, go to 'make the connection' and click on 'complete survey'. By completing the survey you will help improve Little Bromley's case to get superfast (24mbps+) broadband. If you need assistance getting online to complete the survey then please get in touch.

As a stop gap, if your connection is currently less than 2mbps then the Superfast Essex Programme is offering to cover the costs of installing satellite broadband.

Satellite broadband to help those with slowest speeds get online

The Superfast Essex programme, while continuing its fibre broadband rollout, has launched a scheme to help those residents and businesses with no or low broadband connectivity in Essex.

The Satellite Broadband Scheme offers access to a basic satellite broadband service at a capped cost for the first year. The scheme forms part of the national Broadband Delivery UK (BDUK) programme, being led by UK Government, and delivers on the commitment to ensure those not currently due to benefit from a fibre upgrade can access download speeds of at least 2Mbps.

So far the Superfast Essex fibre rollout has reached 60,000 homes and businesses - the halfway milestone in the overall

programme rollout and just 5,000 away from the total set to be reached by the end of the first phase of work, this summer.

The scheme is available to Essex homes or businesses, provided that their property

- currently receives broadband speeds of less than 2Mbps,
 - is unable to access broadband speeds of 2Mbps or above from any other broadband supplier in the area, is not in the plan to be upgraded by the Superfast Essex fibre rollout within six months of the date of application.
- Residents and businesses can find out more and submit an application by completing the short online form available at: www.superfastessex.org/satellite.

Essex County Councillor Kevin Bentley, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Economic Growth and Waste and Recycling, said: "We're doing as much as we can to increase access to superfast

broadband in Essex but we also recognise that we need to ensure basic online access is available to all residents. This satellite scheme is not a replacement for fibre but will hopefully help to improve internet access for those with no or low connectivity in the meantime.”

Digital Economy Minister, Ed Vaizey, said: “The national rollout of superfast broadband has already reached an additional 3.5million homes and businesses who would otherwise have missed out. We are making tremendous progress, but it’s a massive engineering project and won’t happen overnight. This scheme offers immediate assistance to those homes and businesses in Essex with the slowest speeds and is all part of our transformation of the UK’s digital landscape.”

All applications will be subject to an eligibility check before a subsidy code is issued centrally by BDUK. The code can then be used to purchase a basic satellite broadband service at a capped price from one of four suppliers participating in the scheme – Avonline Broadband, Digiweb, Corsat, or Prime Tech.

The scheme will ensure a resident or business pays no more than £400 for the first year for a basic satellite broadband service (including upfront costs for equipment and installation, and monthly service charges). Customers signing up under the scheme can also choose service

packages with higher speeds or greater monthly data caps if they are happy to spend more.

The scheme aims to provide an interim solution to help significantly improve the online experience for residents and businesses currently receiving the slowest speeds. All these properties will still be considered for future fibre deployment, whether or not residents or businesses choose to take up the satellite broadband option under the UK Government scheme.

To find out if you are covered by the Superfast Essex programme’s fibre rollout visit www.superfastessex.org/maps. Properties in areas labelled on the rollout map as ‘Non-fibre upgrade (minimum 2Mbps) by 2016’ are expected to be eligible for the UK Government Satellite Broadband Scheme. Some remote or isolated properties in areas where fibre has been deployed by commercial operators or the Superfast Essex programme may also qualify if they meet the slow speed criteria. Residents should note that the fibre rollout map is not an eligibility indicator for the UK Government Satellite Broadband Scheme, each application for the scheme made at www.superfastessex.org/satellite will be checked individually.

The UK Government Satellite Broadband Scheme is currently planned to operate until December 2017.

BROOK HOUSE DONKEYS AT LNYDP 2016

LNYDP – London’s New Year’s Day Parade is now one of the world’s great street spectacles with up to 10,000 performers from across continents, hundreds of thousands of spectators, and a ‘live’ TV audience of several hundred million. Many people in the UK don’t know of its existence, but this year was the 30th annual parade and the theme was ‘magic’.

The first New Year’s Day Parade on January 1st 1987 was called ‘The Lord Mayor of Westminster’s Big Parade’. By 1994 the Parade had become so big and popular that the City of Westminster gave up sole ownership of the event, and it became truly ‘London’s New Year’s Day Parade and Festival’ with all of London’s Boroughs taking an active role in the event. The participants include, amongst others, large numbers of American bands and cheerleaders, stilt walkers, kite flyers, miniature steam engines, vintage cycling groups, historic vehicle groups, costume characters, caribbean steel bands and the Donkey Breed Society, which is how we came to be involved.

The DBS has been taking part in the LNYDP since 1993 and this is the third year that we have joined them. The first was in 2013. We borrowed a friend’s donkey, Patrick, who spent the entire parade dragging us along, trying to overtake the other donkeys to reach the front of our procession, where his donkey buddy was pulling a cart. Not easily put off, in 2015 we took our own Daisy after managing to persuade her to load. The intention was to take Daisy and Dolly (her daughter) but Dolly had other ideas. This year, we took our two miniature donkeys, Candy and Rusty, with Daisy again as a calming influence. The minis were nervous at first but soon settled down. The streets are busy and the noise can be deafening with cheering crowds, bands and the commentary. It takes over an hour to walk the route with frequent stops as

groups ahead pause to perform in front of the grandstands. We take the opportunity for the donkeys to meet the smiling crowds, who love to stroke them. Then it’s off again until we reach the finish at Parliament Square. After collecting our participant medals, we amble back towards the trailers along Birdcage Walk, stopping for a photo opportunity outside Buckingham Palace.

It is a great atmosphere but we are always glad to reach home, feed and tend the animals and put our feet up with a well-earned cuppa.

COFFEE BREAK NUTRITION

Where does the time go? With Christmas come and gone and New Year well on its way, Valentine's Day is almost upon us!

With spring fast approaching and the days getting longer I am sure we are all looking forward to those long summer days, full of sunshine. Why should we be talking about sunshine at this gloomy time of the year? Well, it's about that vitamin D you keep hearing about in the news.

So why is sunshine so important to us humans? It is because we get vitamin D from sunshine. The body will make all it needs with enough sunlight. That's why it is known as the 'sunshine vitamin'. It is one of the most important vitamins our body needs to function.

It helps with the absorption of calcium and phosphorus from food. Both of these nutrients are vital for strong teeth and bones, joints and muscles. It strengthens the immune system, supports intestinal health, helps to maintain healthy blood pressure and cardiovascular health, protects the brain and reproductive organs and prevents osteoporosis. Without sufficient vitamin D, the body cannot absorb calcium from food or supplements, no matter how much calcium you consume.

Its importance cannot be underestimated.

Where exactly do we get it from? Sunshine! - but how does it work?

First of all, we need to be outside in the sun! But not just any time of the year, it has to be in the hottest months of summer to get any benefit at all. Unfortunately, we in the northern hemisphere only get the 'right' kind of sunshine for a couple of months of the year. The sun rays are not at the correct angle to the earth to be of much benefit for much of the year, which means that it is likely that the majority of the population is in fact vitamin D deficient. This can include all age groups from young children to the elderly. So what should we do to correct this dilemma?

We are forever told to plaster ourselves with

sun block whenever we go outside in the summer, the higher the better to avoid being sunburnt or getting skin cancer. The messages we get are confusing, so people will avoid any exposure to the sun. This isn't very helpful because we can't harness the benefits of real sunshine if our skin is blocked with sun screen creams. There is always another way!

Of course you shouldn't leave your kids on the beach at midday in full sun with no protection whatsoever for any length of time, but 20 minutes in the sun sometime during mid to late morning or mid-afternoon with a hat and a t-shirt on, with arms and legs exposed is absolutely ideal to soak up those beneficial rays, without burning the skin. It is the sun's ultraviolet rays that convert cholesterol under your skin into vitamin D3. It is then absorbed straight into the bloodstream and then it's stored in the liver. Little bit at a time, 2 to 3 times a week and you can store up a good amount of vitamin D3 to last you for the rest of the year.

For those who don't get out in the sun, which includes office workers, elderly in nursing homes or children who are at school or nurseries most days, would benefit from eating sardines, herring, salmon, tuna or fish liver oil, liver, egg yolks or supplementing with a good quality vitamin D3 supplement.

And here comes another confusion.

Which vitamin D should we supplement with? Vitamin D2 is a synthetic version of vitamin D, added to most cereals and milk, and doesn't have the same beneficial effects of vitamin D3. If you don't get out in the sun then you should supplement with the natural vitamin D3.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR NEWS

TDC is supporting the Citizens Advice Bureau again this year with its winter warmers scheme which has successfully helped hundreds of vulnerable people in Tendring. If you have any donations of clothing, blankets, sleeping bags, shoes etc., they would be greatly appreciated and can be made at the shop in Old Road or at the CAB office in Carnarvon Road or Clacton Town Hall.

Part night street lighting, as you have probably read in the local newspapers, continues to roll on. It was agreed at the last full council meeting for TDC to ask Essex County Council again for the street lights to be turned on in mainly urban areas but kept off in the rural areas.

Cabinet have decided to stop supplying black bin bags due to the cost. Also under consideration is the free parking facility for our residents. Details of the budget should be finalised soon and could see up to 2% increase in council tax. However a funded initiative will see all households provided with free food caddy bags at no cost to TDC.

The Local Plan continues to be debated and it is hoped that an agreement can be reached very soon regarding the number of houses, which should stop the wild card applications being submitted by developers. A number of planning applications continue to be made across our ward. We support our Parish Councils in speaking for or against these applications whenever possible.

You may be aware that my fellow councillor, Rosemary Heaney, has been out of action due to a knee operation. She is making good progress and we hope to see her back to full fitness very shortly. I am sure you join me in wishing her a speedy recovery.

My Civic Duties have continued to be busy. 19th & 20th November I attended the Mayflower 400 meeting in Dartmouth. 22nd Jenny & I attended Ipswich Mayors Multi Faith Civic Service. 25th we attended Ipswich Mayors Charity Supper, 27th attended Colchester Moot

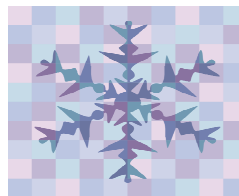

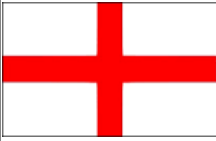

IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE



Happy New Year to everyone, though it does seem an odd and unseasonably warm sort of new year. I have in my kitchen a vase of daffodils that were flowering in the

garden - they were actually in bloom over Christmas, but I left them in the garden as they did not seem to be very seasonal. Everything seems to be cracking on at great speed but I see from the forecast that temperatures are due to dip by the end of the week, which will certainly confuse matters. As I write it remains warm, but no doubt you will be reading this in a snow drift. Friends have told me that they have seen birds building their nests, and the mice and frogs are still active in the garden. The grass is still growing, albeit slowly, but whilst it is so wet, there is no chance of getting the mower out. The wet weather has made for some interesting and rather soggy walks with the puppy, now getting on for a year old, returning as an all brown rather than a brown and white dog!

Looking at the news, I count my blessings that we live in the driest place in England, those poor people in Northern England and Scotland - gardening is certainly not on their minds at present.

Although, in theory, it is a quiet time of year in the garden, it is a good time to take a long hard look and see how you want your garden to be in the summer, and plan any structural changes now. Despite the mild weather, it is a good time to plant bare rooted shrubs (as long as the ground is not frosted), but do incorporate plenty of grit in the planting holes as

waterlogged soil kills more plants than frost.

Apart from perusing the many plant and seed catalogues that appear in the post at the moment, there are a few gardening jobs that can be undertaken. In the vegetable garden, ground can be covered with black plastic sheeting to warm the soil prior to sowing early vegetables. Extra early vegetables can be started in polythene polytunnels, but personally I start them off either in an unheated greenhouse or in the cold frame. Autumn raspberries can be pruned now, as can apple and pear trees. The greenhouse should be opened on mild days, especially if it is sunny, but plants inside should be only minimally watered.

Sweet peas can be planted up in root training tubes in the greenhouse, and many think they germinate better if the seeds are nicked before planting. Dahlias too can be potted in the greenhouse and vegetables such as French beans, baby carrots, beetroot radish and celery can be started under glass, and lettuce, leeks, onions, peas and broad beans started in pots. Very early potatoes can be planted under cover too.

Chillies can be started in a heated propagator. It is also a good time of year to wash all pots and seed trays and purchase potting compost, which can be kept in a garage or greenhouse, so that is slightly warmer when used to plant seeds.

We were surprised just how much is still relevant today as self-care again becomes important as our NHS resources are being squeezed more and more. You will find the first article below which is copied from the beginning of the book and sets the scene. I will work through the medical conditions in alphabetical order as they appear in the book itself throughout the year. Enjoy!

HINTS TO MOTHERS ON THE TREATMENT OF THEIR CHILDREN 1914

Preface

In compiling this little work, the writer had

endeavoured to give, in the most simple form

possible, a few hints as to the best course to be pursued in those cases of illness and accident to which children are most liable. Whenever serious symptoms occur, a medical man should at once be called in. Children's ailments develop so quickly that no time should be lost. A few simple instructions are here given as to the proper course of action pending the doctor's arrival.

The Nursery and general instructions of the care of children

The greatest of all gifts that the Almighty can bestow upon you is your baby. It is your duty to sacrifice yourself – to give your whole thought to the well being of the charge that is entrusted to you. First and foremost – it should always be borne in mind that cleanliness of the body and of the house. Remember also that fresh air and exercise are absolutely essential to the health of your child. Make your child obedient in all things. A disobedient child can never be trusted, and so necessitates extra supervision. Always be careful that your children are properly clothed. Flannel is, in most cases, preferable to any other material for underclothing. Strict attention should be paid to the ventilation of all rooms used by the children; a high fire-guard should be placed before the fireplace. The nursery should be covered with oilcloth which can be easily cleaned. This is far preferable to carpets and rugs, which harbour dirt. Always have the name and address of your doctor fixed on the nursery wall; in case of illness, send for him at once.

I hope it goes without saying, but these days home visits are only for housebound adults as children can always be brought in to the surgery!

VILLAGE HALL TRUSTEES



Happy New Year from the Village Hall Trustees! As 2016

gathers pace, feedback from hirers is that they like the facilities offered at the village hall and it is pleasing to note that the good level of hall utilisation seen last year is being maintained.

Helped by a generous £10,000 grant from the Essex County Council Community Initiatives Fund, the trustees have decided to invest in a major refurbishment project at the hall this year to improve the experience for all and prevent any degradation of the fabric of the building. The overall project, which will cost just under £20,000, comprises: sanding and re-sealing of the main hall and small hall floors; completion of the external repairs and redecoration started last year; partial internal redecoration; refurbishment of the stage and lighting/sound system including replacement of all curtaining; and the purchase of some new tables and upholstered chairs for use by hirers. The balance of the cost will be funded from village hall reserves. Separately, Great Bromley Parish Council has offered to donate some furniture. Other than refurbishment of the floors, which will necessitate the hall being closed for the week 25-31 July, the remaining works will not affect planned bookings at the hall. The stage works are planned to commence on 25th April and external works on 6th June.

The trustees are delighted to be able to reflect on two excellent social and fundraising events which took place at the end of last year. The Christmas Fayre on 12th December was highly successful, with a good attendance and plenty of activities to occupy people of all ages. The star attraction, as in 2014, was the music and singing by children from St George's School who gave two excellent musical performances during the morning. Many of the children wore Christmas-themed fancy dress which added to the festive feel of the occasion. Our thanks go to Mel Bridle for

organising the entertainment and to those children, mums and dads who gave up their time to come and have some fun. The children's games competition was as popular as usual whilst the Grand Christmas Draw boasted a huge selection of quality prizes to be won. ARTHUR HOWE - DIED 2ND JANUARY 1916

Arthur Howe was born in the spring of 1891, in Little Bromley, where his parents lived on Ardleigh Road. Arthur's father, Joshua, was an agricultural labourer, and had married Annie from Colchester in 1876. Joshua and Annie already had three other children Abraham (aged 14, who was working as an agricultural labourer), Nellie (aged 12) and Charles (aged 3).

The April 1911 Census shows Arthur was a farm labourer. However, at some point after that he was able to gain employment at the British Xylonite factory in Brantham. Xylonite was a trade name for celluloid, and the Brantham site was the first purpose built plastics factory in the U.K. Arthur worked in the Acid Shop, arguably the most dangerous part of the hazardous manufacturing process, where explosions and fatalities were not uncommon.

At some point prior to August 1914, Arthur had joined the Territorial Army, as a Private. It is quite possible that Arthur was already with his Battalion – the 1/5th Essex – upon the outbreak of war, as they had started their fortnight of annual training on 27 July.

Once war was declared, the 1/5th Essex immediately moved to its designated war station, the port of Harwich, remaining there until 20 August when they moved to North Norfolk. They remained there until the spring of 1915, when they moved South - initially to West Bergholt, and then to St. Albans in Hertfordshire.

The 1/ 5th Essex left Hertfordshire on 21 July, bound for Plymouth. Two days later, the 31 officers and 655 Other Ranks of the Battalion, sailed for Gallipoli. Their ship, the S.S. Grampian, called in at Malta and Alexandria, before arriving at Mudros Harbour on the island of Lemnos, on 2 August. Lemnos, in the northern Aegean Sea, had become the main Allied advanced base for the Gallipoli campaign.

Since the initial Allied landings on the Gallipoli peninsular in April, little progress had been made, and the campaign had deteriorated into a costly stalemate. In an attempt to regain the initiative, the British planned another landing – using fresh forces – at Suvla Bay, which lay behind the Turkish lines, at Suvla Bay.

The British landings at Suvla started on 6 August, and met little opposition. Unfortunately, the British commander failed to push his advantage, and by the time the 1/ 5th Essex landed on 10 August 1915, the Turks had moved in sufficient forces to effectively block further advances. After the August fighting, the forces at Suvla were also reduced to the same static, trench warfare as their comrades elsewhere on the peninsular.

Arthur's Battalion was in action within a few days of their landing. It is a sad fact of the Gallipoli campaign, that more British casualties were caused by sickness, than by enemy action. Many became ill due to the insanitary conditions, with typhoid, dysentery and diarrhoea. Between September and November the Brigade of which the 1/ 5 Essex was a part, suffered 146 casualties due to enemy action. During the same period, 1,704 men were transferred to hospital due to sickness and disease.

The Gallipoli campaign was seen by many as a costly failure, and in November 1915, the Cabinet took the decision to evacuate the Allied forces there. Ironically, the evacuation itself was a success, and not one man was lost during the actual evacuation, which was completed in January 1916.

Arthur's Battalion – which by this time had been reduced to just 13 officers and 141 Other Ranks - left the peninsular on 3 December and were shipped to Mudros. Whether Arthur was still with them we do not know, as he would already have been

very sick, and may have been transferred to hospital on Lemnos. UK.

We do not know the exact date, but at some point between 31 December 1915 and 2 January 1916, Arthur was transferred to H.M.H.S. (His Majesty's Hospital Ship) Britannic. The Britannic was a passenger liner (and sister ship of the ill-fated Titanic), which had been requisitioned by the Admiralty. She had arrived at Mudros harbour on New Year's Eve 1915, to take on board approximately 3,300 casualties in order to transfer them to hospitals in the

On 2 January 1916, Arthur Howe died of tubercular disease on board H.M.H.S. Britannic, whilst she was still in Mudros harbour. He was 24 years old.

Arthur's body was landed on Lemnos, and he lies in Plot III, Row F, Grave 166 of the East Mudros Military Cemetery.

THE BROMLEY MESSENGER, REV'D DAVIS & MRS HENDERSON

The Rev Paul Davis sadly died a few weeks before Christmas. I am trying to prepare a tribute for him and would be grateful if anyone could contribute memories and stories.

Mrs Fairley tells me he was the last proper village rector, someone who would come around to visit local people on a regular basis, stop for a cup of tea if it was offered, and chat to find out news of parishioners. She remembers one particular time when he had been thinking about starting a bigger magazine, more than the foolscap sheet of purely Church matters they had then. Andrew Fairley used to come in on a cold day at coffee time and sit on the big Aga to warm himself up. He was perched there when the rector mentioned to Ann and Henry that he wanted to start a bigger magazine but was concerned about the cost of funding it. Andrew suggested sponsorship – get local businesses to advertise, and that was one factor that helped the impetus to get it started. The first magazine in June 1986 had a

sponsor's page from the Cheshire Home.

Paul, with the help of his wife Muriel, put the magazine together until 1993 when Leonie Henderson took over. Now, almost 23 years later, Leonie is still our editor and has been given a Pride of Tendring Award, as thanks to her thousands of hours preparing a much appreciated magazine every month. The first magazine was 12 pages; it is now usually about three times the size with many useful local adverts.

As a nice concluding touch, putting Leonie forward for the POT Award was first suggested at the Rogation Lunch, on a lovely sunny day last year ... in the Fairley's garden!

Congratulations to Leonie and thanks again for all your efforts which certainly are greatly appreciated.
