

At our meeting, a resident kindly informed us that the Chelmsford Motor Club have been distributing a new route and associated paperwork. This has been passed to us, and we have sent a copy to Tendring District Council. We will update when we have further information.

Can we remind all residents that weed kill spraying on public land is prohibited. A substantial area in Mill Lane and the nearby bridle path has unfortunately been subjected, and the loss of wildlife is quite apparent.

The Autumn Litter Pick will take place on Saturday 11 November, starting at 11am with a minute's silence.

Now that the Post Office is open at The Bromley Cross Pub, we have asked Essex Library Service if their visits can recommence – we will let you know if we are successful.

The Chairs of Great Bromley, Ardleigh and Frating attended a meeting with County Councillor Grundy at ECC, arranged by Cllr Guglielmi. Concerns about the speeding lorries were raised, principally lack of signage and enforcement. It appears that the signage issue was being addressed.

Affinity Water has launched their 'Keep Track of the Tap' campaign to ensure customers have the advice and practical help they need to save water. The 'Keep Track of the Tap' leaflet has been delivered to approximately 1.7 million households across Central and Southeast regions during July. This led to a substantial increase in water saving device orders and visits to their save water web page.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR NEWS

A120/Harwich Road roundabout, work appears to have started, certainly some heavy machinery has been working away on Monkey Street. There will be traffic disruption during the build and part road closures but it will make for a safer junction when completed.

You may recall in last month's Messenger mention was made of a complaint lodged

with the Traffic Commissioners following a meeting with Ardleigh, Frating and Great Bromley councillors regarding the Heavy Goods Vehicles in breach of weight restrictions on our roads. It may be coincidental but there appears to be a decrease in the number of these vehicles.

They used to live at "Cirrus" on Pot Corner (as mentioned in a previous article with a picture of the pot) and they hosted the Little Bromley Methodist Chapel Fete in their garden. The side shows for the fete were borrowed from a man named Mr Gibling from Bradfield.

The snap, top right, shows Joyce with Mr Fred Skilling who is awarding a prize to Percy Catling. On the far right is Joyce's mother, Lizzie Warner (nee French). Does anyone know about Fred Skilling, as I have never heard the name? And who is the little airl?

Percy Catling was the brother of Eric Catling, the barber at Ardleigh. They both lived at Bradfield and were both Methodist Lay Preachers.

The cutting, bottom right, from the Colchester Express, June 1970, shows a Teddy Bear display. The two on the left are Robin & Martin's teddies. Does anyone know who the young men are in the photo? Or recognise their own teddy!

KITCHEN CORNER

SPICED SPROUT SOUP

Not everyone likes sprouts as a vegetable but soup is another story!

8 oz Brussel sprouts, sliced

- 1 small onion chopped
- 1 small potato diced
- 1 oz butter
- 1 pint chicken stock
- 1 egg yolk
- 4 tbsp cream

Method:

 Melt butter in a pan and gently fry the onion and potato 5 minutes.

- Add the sprouts with ½ teasp of Hot curry paste and cook 2 more minutes.
- Add the chicken stock and simmer 15 mins.
- Cool and then puree.
 Return to the pan.
- Stir together the egg yolk and cream, beat in a little of the soup then add to the pan

Reheat without boiling and serve with croutons.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The WI met on Wednesday 6th September. Nothing out of the ordinary there. Following a brief business session, Sue Orriss introduced our guest speaker, Lisa Mitson



from Essex Fire Brigade, whose talk was covering 'Safety in the Home'. We all thought it would be pretty straight forward. We'd allowed 40 minutes, with time for

questions. Standard practice.

Were we disabused. Lisa commenced talking to us. in fact, teaching us. Within minutes, everyone was captivated. Asked how many of us have either/and or a fire blanket/fire extinguisher in our kitchens, a few hands were raised. "Which would you use if there was a fire on the hob of the oven?" Various answers were called out. Shaking her head, she told us "Neither. You would leave the kitchen, closing the door and get outside as guickly as possible, then dial 999." Hmm. all those well intentioned wedding gifts aren't needed. And so it continued, one example after another. Most of us admitted to leaving the kettle plugged into the socket with the socket switch on, more or less permanently. Bad idea. Lisa produced an electric kettle that had been left in that manner and had burned. It belonged to her parents. They had finally started to listen to her advice. Similarly, she produced a mobile phone that had been left plugged into the charger.... Yes, mangled. Many of us didn't know that mobile phones should not lie on soft furnishings (carpets, sofas, bedding etc) whilst being charged, but hard surfaces. Also, they should not be left on over-night - which we have been known to do. Multi-sockets with multi plugs in them - potential fire hazards. Micro-wave ovens - treat with caution. Candles - very dangerous. We all thought we knew that, but even if we've taken all precautions to standing them on protective surfaces and in candle holders of whatever style: never

leave the room if they are alight. Tea-lights are notoriously dangerous. Laptops etc: if able to switch off and unplug the power when not in use, do so. Her talk continued apace. We were not complacent in the least. Advice, examples, antidotes followed one after the other. After about 1½ hours, she came to a close. She then answered many questions. During refreshments, Lisa continued to speak to individual members. A number of us are having visits to check our fire alarms and change them if necessary. We were buzzing...

Following refreshments, Kay Lodge, our County Chairman, was introduced. She had come along to talk with us about what we can and can't do regarding fund-raising. This had stemmed from a letter sent to all Wi's in the county some time ago, regarding supporting a charity of which George Mills was our known contact. Kay had been accompanied by Sheila Gunson, our County Treasurer and our W.I. Advisor. She also imparted advice.

THE BROMLEY CROSS

Bromley Cross Gets Stamp of Approval

Residents of Great Bromley and nearby villages celebrated the opening of a new Post Office and Coffee Shop on 30 August in the community-owned Great Bromley Cross Pub. The Post Office, which was opened by long-time Bromley resident Beryl Hurst, will now continue to open every Wednesday between 10am and 12 noon. It will provide a much needed set of services from mobile phone top-ups, foreign currency ordering, banking to the usual Royal Mail postal services at home and abroad.



Commenting on the new service, Lesley Broadbent a committee member of the local community group, said: It's great to be able to offer local people a Post Office again after an absence of some two years. And with the opening of the new Wednesday morning Coffee Shop selling tea, coffee and cake, there's every reason to come and meet people and have a chat. And it gives us an opportunity to offer new services such as a pop up Nail Bar, which will be in the Coffee Shop Post Office every other week."

The Post Office is a Hosted Outreach service which operates from The Cross after the Post Office held a public consultation over the past couple of months.

The Coffee Shop will be run by local Kate Brotzman in a brand new venture. "I have been involved with The Cross as a volunteer since it reopened as a Community Pub/Hub last year," said Kate. "I enjoy baking and wanted to take it to the next stage and am looking forward to welcoming people every Wednesday."

The Bromley Cross was taken into Community Ownership in December 2016 after forming a Community Benefit Society. Local people raised £210,000 to purchase it. This year has seen the former pub transform into a community hub with an extensive event programme and significant investment in new facilities. The Cross has hosted everything from a Dog Walkers' BBQ to CPR training. It also hosts art exhibitions from nearby Mother Studios based in Ardleigh. July saw the opening of a new £28.000 commercial kitchen following a successful grant application from CGC Environment Trust. Other grant applications are in the pipeline which could see further improvements. 



IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE

The little furry devils are back - the squirrels. I saw one bounding across the lawn with one of MY walnuts in its mouth - I have managed to collect about eight this year. walnuts that is, not squirrels, which for a tree the size it is, is pretty awful. About one each at Christmas. As if nicking them is not enough, they then dig holes in the lawn, presumably to bury them, and together with the moles (who seem to have reappeared) it's enough to make a gardener weep! I must say though, compared to my son's garden in Leeds, it is nothing. They have to contend with armies of munching slugs devastating all in their path, and anything that survives that is dug up by the baby foxes who appear to have taken up residence in their garden.

On the positive side we seem to have had a bumper harvest this year of apples, pears, and I'm told, plums. I am hoping that I might actually get to eat some apples this year - in previous years most of the stored apples have been eaten by mice, but this year my husband has done clever things with fine wire mesh, so hopefully that will foil them!

I can't believe it's September already, and will be October by the time you read this. I haven't noticed any Christmas stuff yet, but that may be because I'm unobservant. I have noticed the evenings are drawing in, and it gets light a great deal later. Shortening day length signals the approach of autumn/winter to many plants, and they will start battening down the hatches, which means that leaves will be starting to fall. Personally, I leave any leaves that land on the flowerbeds, but it is a good idea to rake them off the lawn, and if you have time, run them over with the mower. This shreds the leaves and speeds composting.

Another autumn job which is fast approaching is hedge trimming. This is much easier once the leaves have fallen and immediately, like cutting the grass, makes the garden look much tidier. It is also important to clip your hedges onto pavements or at the side of the road, as you are legally obliged to do this.

The flower borders need to be tidied with dead flower stems cut down, and weeds



removed. Tubs and containers with summer bedding will probably look very tired by now, and will need replacing with winter bedding plants.

Bulbs (except tulips) can be planted either in containers or the soil. If you are lucky enough to have a pond, the marginal foliage will need cutting back and clearing away - it always amazes me how large our pond actually is! If any vegetation is removed from the pond itself, leave it beside the pond for a few days to enable any pond creatures to crawl back to the pond. Finally, net the pond to stop the leaves falling in.

Booking Appointments

With the usual busy winter season heading fast in our direction, here's a reminder about how our GP appointment system works:

We only have a fixed number of appointments to offer and have to ensure that our patients get the appointments they need rather than want. Our receptionists have been carefully trained by the doctors here to ask questions about what you need. Please help them to help you by answering their questions as more often than not, they will be able to find you the soonest appointment. You can politely decline however if it is highly personal.



Non Urgent GP Appointments:

Most non-urgent matters can wait until the next available non-urgent appointment which can weeks ahead, **but** if you feel it cannot wait until the first available non-urgent appointment then you can ask to be put onto the triage list to speak to the on call doctor that day. He/she will decide upon the most appropriate appointment for your issue. The on call doctor's decision is final however and is based on medical need, not convenience.

Urgent GP Appointments:

Please be aware that we do not offer a walk in service. Urgent on the day requests must be made by phone. If you walk in, you will be asked to return home and await a call from the on call doctor.

If you feel that your issue is urgent enough

to need to be seen on the same day, you can again ask to go onto the daily triage list and the on call doctor will call you back, usually within an hour. If the doctor agrees it is urgent, you will usually get an appointment a few hours later. If it can wait an appropriate appointment will be found for you on another day, but within a timescale suitable for your medical need.

Home Visit Requests:


If you're unable to get to the surgery because you are housebound, you can call to arrange a home visit. But remember, such visits are for medical, not social or personal reasons. Lack of transport is **not** an acceptable reason for a visit request and children can always be brought to the surgery. Home visit requests **must** be made before 12.00 midday but preferably as early as possible. Requests after midday are unlikely to be possible due to existing doctors' clinics.

IT IS ALWAYS BETTER TO BE SEEN IN A FULLY EQUIPED GP SURGERY WITH PROPER LIGHTING, EXAMINATION EQUIPMENT AND ACCESS TO TESTS.

VACCINATIONS – food for thought!

As the flu season fast approaches, we are encouraged to keep our vaccinations up to date. This is now done 'en masse' via text messaging, an easy way to reach as many people as possible. Having recently returned from Italy, I scoured the UK newspapers to see if there was much coverage about the recent protests against compulsory vaccinations throughout Europe that took place in several European cities since May. I found only 2 short articles. The protests were not so much about whether we should vaccinate our children or not, but whether we should retain the right to make that decision ourselves. The European Forum for Vaccine Vigilance (efvv.eu), which has organised the Europewide protests, describes mandatory vaccination as a breach of fundamental human rights.

Asset (www.asset-scienceinsociety.eu) – a pro-vaccine group, also doesn't believe that a compulsory programme is valid. Strict, draconian laws are being introduced in Italy, France, Austria, Germany, Poland, the Czech Republic, amongst others, where parents are being threatened with high fines, non-admission of their children to nursery and sometimes threats of the children being taken away by social services! The Italian government approved making 12 vaccines, including measles, rubella and chickenpox, mandatory starting this September, for children entering school. Children will not be accepted into nursery or pre-schools without proof of vaccinations, while parents of school-age children will face hefty fines for noncompliance.1

If you were unaware of this going on in Europe, the British Medical Association (BMA) are being asked to consider introducing mandatory vaccinations in the UK too, as we speak.²

Shouldn't there be a public debate on this matter? This is dictatorship at its worst where people won't be allowed to make their own mind up. It is unbelievable that this is going on in 2017 in a democratic

country where we have freedom of speech as well as freedom of choice. It's incredible that this idea is even being considered, let alone instigated!

Of course, it all boils down to what we know about vaccinations. If you don't know very much, then start reading literature that will give you all the facts you need to know. Yes, there is much misinformation out there and one needs to know where to start. The informed parent website www.informedparent.co.uk/info - is an excellent starting point. There is much science based information on the site explaining the facts about vaccinations. The European Forum for Vaccine Vigilance www.efvv.eu – you can find pro-choice organisations here and a list of vaccinations in all the European countries, including the UK.

www.arnica.org.uk – Arnica is a parent support group that helps parents to make their own informed decisions on various health issues, including vaccinations. A book covering the history of vaccines is also an important addition to the vast amount of information available: 'Dissolving Illusions – Disease, vaccines and the forgotten history' by Dr Suzanne Humphries and Roman Bystrianyk (Amazon).

This is an extremely controversial and complicated subject, which needs a thorough independent examination, without accusation and intimidating measures which could impact our freedom of choice.

As well as being an expert on the history and culture of Italian Cuisine, Mario Batali is an accomplished chef, restauranteur and media personality in his native America. Like most chefs he is passionate about the quality of produce that he cooks with, and he's especially keen to see that the fruit and vegetables that are often discarded are put to good use. And it's not just because of the waste. As Batali says

"We need to figure out a 'harvest system' to collect the produce that stores don't put out for customers to buy because it's not perfect looking. Frankly, the stuff left to rot in the storeroom is more beautiful to me than the perfect carrot. I'm a gnarly carrot kind of guy."

The ordering demands of many of our UK supermarkets mean that the fruit and vegetables supplied have to be a certain shape or size. And they won't accept deviations. Anyone who eats foodstuffs grown in their own allotment or garden will tell you that if they only consumed what looked 'perfect', they'd soon go hungry.

Where have we got this idea that only the unblemished is acceptable?

The 500 year old Japanese art of Kintsugi turns this idea upside down by taking smashed pottery and repairing it by using beautiful seams of gold. Rather than seeing the end when there is imperfection there is an opportunity to celebrate it, love it, treasure it, value it.

There is beauty in brokenness.

When we first meet David in the bible, he is described as 'glowing with health and had a fine appearance and handsome features.' David is a greatly celebrated King, but he is also deeply flawed. After a particularly shameful set of events which saw David plot the death of a man who was married to a woman he desired, a repentant

sorrowful David prays to God in words recorded in Psalm 51

'You do not delight in sacrifice, or I would bring it; you do not take pleasure in burnt offerings. My sacrifice, O God, is a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart you, God, will not despise'
