January meeting

It seemed very appropriate that, 100 years after women were granted the vote, we should be treated to the story of intrepid women who drove from Cape Town to Cowley without escorts, or a backup team, during the Great Depression in 1930.

The talk at Great Bromley WI for the start of 2018 centred around the book 'Cape to Cowley via Cairo in a light car' written in 1932 by Miss M.L. Belcher and Sir John Foster Fraser.

One of the original car doors, a set of glass slides, and the book were discovered at an auction in Essex, the glass slides were transferred to plastic and all brought to the meeting by Paul Gallifant, our speaker.

Trans-Africa colonial journeys during the 1920s and 1930s were often sponsored by motor manufacturers to encourage the spirit of adventure through Empire roads at a time of colonial uncertainty. This adventure was sponsored by Shell Oil and Morris. On Tuesday April 1st, 1930, two South African women, originally from Britain, Miss Margaret Belcher, and Miss Ellen Budgell (the mechanic), embarked on a six-month, 10,000 mile journey from Cape Town to the Morris factory in Cowley, via

Cairo. Accompanying them for the first part of the journey was Miss J.M.O Day (The official tin-opener).

The vehicle for this epic adventure was a 1924, second-hand 4-seat tourer with 25,000 miles on the clock, a bullnose Morris Oxford, called Bohunkus (a male tramp). Fitted with standard Dunlop tyres, and a Guides Association brass trefoil on the bonnet, the women Guiders drove from



Cape Town through Africa and France, arriving at the Morris factory in Cowley, England on Wednesday 1st October 1930. They used the Great North Road (the red route) for their journey. This colonial road was the Empire route that snaked through the eastern part of the African continent. Their journey was not simple, often traversing roads almost impassable. 30 miles out of Cape Town, they broke a spring which had to be fixed by Miss Budgell. They were the first vehicle to cross the new Victoria Falls bridge in Zambezi. Then, in Zimbabwe, the rear axle hub broke. Seeing that this would take some

time to be fixed, they asked a passing lorry driver to take the broken axle south to a town for repairs. They then camped next to the car for 12 days to await the return of the axle. Their 'tent' was a tarpaulin affixed to the side of the car and pegged to the ground. No groundsheet, or tent poles for these ladies.

Axle fixed, they then drove north through Uganda, Kenya, Sudan, where Bohunkus caught fire and had to be dowsed in sand to extinguish the flames, sand brushed off, and melted wires replaced before continuing their journey through Egypt, crossing the Nile, and arriving in Cairo. Throughout the journey, minor breakdowns and assistance across rivers and bridges was provided by locals they met along the way.

The two remaining ladies then crossed the Mediterranean to Marseilles, drove to Paris and onwards to Calais where they were met by a representative of the Morris company who accompanied them to Cowley. They stayed in England for a while before returning to South Africa by the Mail boat. This was a truly fabulous adventure, worthy of any movie, made all the more amazing by the slides taken by the ladies during their journey. A little bit of history, brought alive for our delight.

As the New Year gathers pace, the trustees are pleased

to be able to reflect on the success of the Christmas Favre held in December. Although not quite as well attended as in recent years, the Fayre made a net profit of £1573 which was divided equally between the village hall and St George's Church. Sincere thanks go to those trustees, church members and friends of the village hall who put so much effort into making the event a success. Thanks also go to Becky Keitch from St George's School who, along with an enthusiastic group of children, volunteered to provide seasonal musical entertainment on the stage. Lastly, thanks are due to the local businesses who donated some excellent prizes for the Grand Christmas Draw.

At the end of December the village hall looked magnificent for the New Years' Eve party organised by Dinah Jones, Jayne Bates and others. Great fun was had by those attending and trustees were most appreciative of the £923 raised for village hall funds. Pictures from this event and others held in recent months will feature on the new village hall website which it is planned to launch this year.

Recent visitors to the hall will have noticed that the long-awaited access path around the building has now been constructed, together with a paved area adjoining the cricket field. The parish council arranged for the Hayward memorial bench to be refurbished last year and this has been installed permanently on the paved area. This construction work largely completes the first phase of the village hall refurbishment project which has been ongoing since 2015 and to mark the occasion representatives from Essex County Council, Tendring District Council, other grant-awarding bodies, village organisations and the contractors who undertook refurbishment work at the hall were thanked during a reception at the hall on 25th November. This reception took place immediately prior to the highly

enjoyable performance of 'The Old Curiosity Shop' by the Common Ground Theatre Company, which was watched by an audience of nearly 100 people.

Two village hall trustees have stood down recently from the management committee, which is grateful for the effort put in by both Mike Corduff and Graham Taylor in recent years and looks forward to seeing them involved again in village hall activities when their time permits. There are now three vacancies on the management committee and if you would like to play a part in running our village hall, either as a trustee or less formally, then please let me know. Any additional support with managing this popular local amenity would be most helpful.

COFFEE BREAK NUTRITION with Suzanne Abbott

THE NEW YEAR BEGINS...

...and with it starts the dilemma as to what to give the kids to snack on at school or when they come home.

I follow closely the work of the 'Alliance for Natural Health International' and, whilst looking through their website, I came across some excellent ideas for snacks, not only for the kids, but adults alike.

ANH-Intl is an internationally active nongovernmental organisation promoting natural and sustainable approaches to healthcare worldwide. Its motto is: 'love nature, live naturally'.

It campaigns across a wide range of fields, including for freedom of choice in healthcare, healthy eating & lifestyles, and the use of micronutrients and herbal products in the management of our health and resilience. The organisation operates campaigns that include drawing attention to misinformed, Big Food influenced government healthy eating advice, to the uncertain science and risks of genetically modified foods, to the need for informed choice on vaccinations and the aim to end mass fluoridation of drinking water supplies. It accomplishes its mission through a unique application of 'good science' and 'good law'.

The organisation was founded in 2002 by Dr Robert Verkerk, an internationally acclaimed expert in agricultural and health sustainability. Its international office is based in Dorking, UK, while its <u>US</u> <u>base</u> operates out of Atlanta, Georgia. With all that said, here are some super easy ideas to ward off those hunger pains:

Boil 6 eggs, cool them and keep them in the fridge until needed (eat within a week) Serve with cherry tomatoes, rocket or celery sticks.

Oatcakes – spread with home-made nut butter or hummus – very easy to do, find a hummus recipe online. It takes less than 10 minutes.

Make your own nut butter from pre-soaked nuts (almonds, brazil nuts, cashews). Soaking makes the nuts more digestible: dissolve 2 tsps of sea salt in enough water to cover 2 cups of preferred raw nuts, leave them to soak between 8 - 12 hours. Strain and rinse, then dry the nuts in the oven. A bit of a tedious process, but this way you know what goes into your kids tummies! To make nut butter, whizz the nuts in a food processor several times until vou achieve the correct coarse/smooth texture your kids will like to spread onto oatcakes. Try to introduce as many vegetables with the snacks as possible. The oatcakes can be eaten with vegetable crudités – carrots, celery, peppers etc.

Apple or pear 'sarnies' – 2 slices of pear or apple sandwiched together with nut butter. Plenty of vitamins, nutrients and fibre in one.

Celery sticks filled with nut butter or hummus – sprinkle them with raisins or cranberries

A handful of activated (pre-soaked) nuts plus a piece of fruit

A small bowl of berries topped with coconut cream.

MISTER LUCKY


Hugh Frostick has written a new book which came out at Christmas. "Mister Lucky" tells the story of Ivan Potter, who is just shy of his 94th birthday.

Ivan Potter is a Suffolk farming lad who got caught up in the Second World War. He did war work in an Ipswich factory, then joined the Belstead Home Guard where he was one of six young men who volunteered for a mobile squad with special training and a secret hideout in Bentley woods. He volunteered for the RAF as a wireless operator on Lancaster bombers. Then followed a long career on the railways of East Anglia.

Ivan always enjoyed sharing stories about his war service at Air Crew Association dinners, demonstrating Secret Army equipment at Parham, and swapping railway stories with his brother and old colleagues. When he began to commit his tales to paper, he realised just how many lucky escapes and coincidences had helped him to reach old age, which gave

him the title for his book.

IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE



Although it seems a long time ago, I hope everyone had a lovely Christmas and I wish everyone a happy healthy New Year. The garden has been

challenging lately - one day with very strong winds and rain; the next freezing temperatures and snow - a fairly typical winter for England! One good result of the heavy rain is that the Village Pond seems to be slowly filling up again.

I was lucky enough to be given several gardening related gifts for Christmas, a compact apricot to be grown in a pot, which I am assured is frost hardy, a Schezuan Pepper plant, a garden voucher which I will very much enjoy spending and a special belt to keep my secateurs safe, reducing the likelihood of losing them or of impaling myself when bending over as previously they would have been in my pocket!

I have spent many enjoyable hours planning the perfect garden with the help of the many seed catalogues that have landed on the doormat. Unfortunately it is unlikely to happen, but undoubtedly a triumph of hope over experience!

Just before Christmas we re-homed another two hedgehogs who fairly promptly went into hibernation, so we now have four young ones who will hopefully breed next year. The rescue centres ensure that the "pairs" that are re-homed are not blood relations.

February seems very early to start planting seeds, but there are some that need to be started early in a heated propagator in order to have a long enough growing season to produce fruit - mainly peppers, chillies and aubergine, but other vegetables can be started in pots too. These include lettuce, leeks, onions, early brassicas, peas, broad beans. In the greenhouse borders, French beans, baby carrots,

beetroot, radish and spinach can also be sown.

Autumn fruiting raspberries can be cut down to ground level, and apple and pear trees pruned. Potatoes need to be chitted, and the vegetable beds can be warmed by the application of black plastic sheeting prior to planting of early vegetables.

It is a good time of year to clean out the greenhouse and all equipment such as seed trays and pots, and also wash the glass to ensure maximum light levels. Water butts can be emptied and scrubbed (I always seem to find dead mice in mine!).

If you are planning new beds or borders, it is a good idea to start now, as long as the ground is not too cold or waterlogged, and incorporate lots of organic matter such as leaf mould.

Although you have probably bought your seeds already, now is the time to think about ordering any plug plants that you may need for summer displays, there usually is more choice if you order early, and most companies do not deliver until late March or early April.

A plea - if you are growing plants from seed, consider the Plant Sale at the Village Hall in May, we would welcome any spare plants that you might have!

At this time of year, we review our financial forecasts and we prepare for next year's budget including the setting of the Parish Precept.

The Budget for 2017/18 was set at £28,020. To achieve this, the Parish Precept was increased to £23,000 and a decision was taken to draw down reserves should the need arise. This has not been the case, and the projected outturn budget for 2017/18 is £19.989.

Based on the actual costs for 2017/18 and known inflation, the projected budget for 2018/19 has been set at £22,000. To that end, GBPC intends to reduce the Parish Precept to £22,000 which is a reduction of 4.8%, or £2.90 based on an average Band D property.

This decrease is explained by efficiencies GBPC has managed to achieve against the 2017/18 plan i.e. we found cheaper ways to deliver some of our 'new' services than our planning/ budget assumptions afforded. We have used that experience from last year to improve our predictability in setting this year's budget. We will carry that discipline forwards; always reviewing and revising on an annual basis. Furthermore and finally, GBPC is maintaining a healthy cash reserve which negates the need for holding any financial contingency in our budget for 2018-19.

GBPC hopes that the above position and rationale gives Parishioners confidence in our commitment to provide quality services whilst always seeking to minimise the burden on the tax payer.

I would like to start by wishing all residents a very Happy New Year.

Unfortunately, the Thorrington and Frating village magazine, the Grapevine, has ceased but hopefully only on a temporary basis.

The main talking point has been the exhibition at Elmstead Market regarding the new Garden Community. I am aware that a large number of people from Thorrington, Elmstead, Frating and Great Bromley attended and made their representations known.

TDC are now taking a tough stance on untidy garden areas. It is very annoying to residents who live next to, or in the immediate vicinity of, such places. TDC have started to issue enforcement notices requiring the owner(s) to clean up the area. They will have to pay TDC £4,800 if the council cleans up. If the amount is not paid a charge is then placed on the property unless of course the owner cleans up themselves.

Essex Police have raised a reduce your speed campaign, "Speed Kills"

At the full council meeting on 23rd January I submitted a motion to council requesting they ask the Essex County Council portfolio holder for speed limits to reduce the speed outside schools to 20mph at certain times of the day and to reduce the speed in all our villages and towns to 30mph.
