****VACANCY****

We currently have a vacancy on Great Bromley Parish Council.

Have you considered becoming a Parish Councillor?

As a councillor you can become a voice for your community and affect real change. It helps if you're a "people person" who enjoys talking to other residents but, more importantly, you need to have the concerns and best interests of the parish as a whole at heart. Councillors are community leaders and should represent the aspirations of the public that they serve.

Parish councils are the most local part of our democratic system and are closest to the public.

What do Parish Councillors do?

Councillors have three main areas of work:-

- Decision-making: through attending meetings and committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented;
- Monitoring: councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working;
- Getting involved locally: as local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their parishioners and local organisations. This often depends on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available.

How much time does it take up?

On average, less than a couple of hours a week. Obviously there are some councillors who spend more time than this –

and some less - but in the main, being a parish councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to your community and helping to make it a better place to live and work. Great Bromley Parish Council meetings are always held on the second Wednesday evening of each month.

Am I qualified?

Most people are. However, there are a few basic rules. You have to be:-

- a British citizen, or a citizen of the Commonwealth or the European Union; and
- 18 years or older on the day you become nominated for election; and
- live or work in or near the parish.

You cannot stand for election if you:-

- are the subject of a bankruptcy restriction order or interim order
- have, within five years before the day of the election or co-option, been convicted in the United Kingdom of any offence and have had a prison sentence (whether suspended or not) for a period of over three months without the option of a fine.

The Essex County Council (Harwich Road, Great Bromley) (Prohibition of Traffic) Order 2018

Notice is hereby given that the Essex County Council intends, not less than seven days from the date of this notice to make the above Order under section 14(1) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984.

Effect of the order: To temporarily close the various lengths of road in the District of Tendring as specified in the Schedule.

The works being undertaken will take place within an 18-month period from 23rd April 2018 exact dates will be specified on http://roadworks.org/. The roads will be closed to facilitate each phase and then re-opened to the public. Access will be maintained for emergency services. Diversion routes will be signed at each location and residents will be informed of the dates of each phase via letter / leaflet drop and advanced warning signs on the road.

KITCHEN CORNER

This is perfect for a light supper

Cheese Souffle

Ingredients
1oz butter
½oz plain flour
¼ pint milk
3 oz grated cheese (Lancashire preferably)
4 eggs
pepper and salt

Method:

- Melt butter in a saucepan and mix the flour with it
- Pour on the milk, stir til boiling
- · Cool slightly, stir in cheese and seasoning
- Mix in egg yolks one at a time, blending well
- Whisk the egg whites stiffly, whisk a quarter into the cooled mixture,
- Then fold in the rest
- Pour into the prepared dish. Heat oven to 400 F
- cook in the middle of the oven till well risen, firm and golden (30 mins)

Variations:

- add 6oz minced meat/flaked fish instead of cheese
- add 4 oz chopped cooked vegetables instead of cheese

For extra richness, add 2tbsp double dairy cream to mix before baking

SAY NO TO PLASTICS

I heard something on the radio the other day that made me really sit up and listen. Scientists have recently discovered that the size of the plastic waste accumulation in the Pacific Ocean is much larger than they previously thought. It was first believed to be the size of France, which is quite worrying. However, to discover that it is actually 3 times the size of France is shocking!

Globally 300 million tons of plastic is produced each year and only 10% gets recycled. Those of us who diligently put plastic items into our recycling bins will be shocked to hear that.

The Blue Planet 2 series by David Attenborough has brought the plastic problem to the attention of the public as seen in the Facebook video by '1 Million Women'. A wave of single-use-plastic bans is hitting the UK - The Queen bans plastic cutlery, plates and cups from all of the palaces; there is high demand for the return of the glass milk bottle: the BBC is completely banning all single-use-plastic in the Corporation by 2020; PG tips are switching to plastic-free tea bags; Marriott International has banned plastic straws from all of their hotels and Scotland is banning straws and Q tips. It's being termed as 'The Blue Planet Effect'. Apparently 1 truck of rubbish is being dumped into the ocean every minute. Because the plastic doesn't really break down, it just keeps growing in size. It's always so easy to start 'mudslinging' it's the government's fault, the council's fault, the supermarkets' fault, those who can't be bothered to recycle fault etc. So let's start thinking what we, individually, can do about it. It's a huge problem and we can't wait around any longer for someone else to sort it out.

I understand that very recently Tesco have replaced plastic shopping bags with biodegradable plastic shopping bags. This really doesn't help! It's still plastic and it needs replacing with something else. Instead let's use a 'bag-for-life' which lives

in the car and gets re-used each week. Try not to use plastic of any kind at all for one week. Put your food plastic bags, Clingfilm etc. away, somewhere where they are not easily accessible - the loft? Place any left-over food in a crockery/glass bowl and cover with a saucer before putting it in the fridge, for instance, After all, what did our grandmothers do before plastic was discovered? They used grease-proof paper to wrap food in, a clean tea cloth to wrap the bread in etc. So next time you reach for the plastic, think what you could use as an alternative. If we don't do something about this massive problem now, there won't be an ocean left for the fish to swim in. Ekoplaza, a supermarket in Amsterdam has re-vamped one of its supermarket aisles into a 'plastic-free' aisle. There are 700 items in glass, metal or cardboard. They've used a new, bio-degradable material that looks like plastic but it's made of trees and plants. It can break down within 12 weeks using a home composter. They are planning to expand this idea to all of their 74 stores across Netherlands, Let's hope our supermarkets will take note! If you are wondering what all of this plastic talk has to do with food and our health, then here is the answer. The dumped plastic gets broken down very, very slowly over the years and ends up as microscopic particles that are eaten by fish. We eat the fish and there you have it, it ends up in the human food chain, poisoning the ocean, the fish as well as us humans.

So, let's keep pushing for banning plastic in our lives, starting where we can really make a difference – in our own homes.

Last term ended with much excitement, the children enjoyed an Easter egg hunt around the gardens. They also had fun making Easter cards, baskets and chocolate nests and thank you to Amanda for visiting us to tell the story of Easter.

Our African Land Snails have laid lots of eggs and we are watching as they hatch into tiny snails, we were kindly donated a larger tank so that the adults are now separate from the young for safety reasons.

This term we are looking forward to growing our vegetables and plants, we have already planted potatoes, spinach and carrots and have started growing seeds in our greenhouse too. We have also sown our wildflower seeds which the children collected from the garden last autumn. A very busy time!

In addition this term we will be starting to work with St Georges Primary School to prepare for the transition of our older children that are starting school in September.

Little Dragons Pre-school – Trustees Background

Little Dragons Pre-School of Great Bromley & Frating was formed in 1977; for many years, it operated from the Village Hall before moving to purpose rented premises at the Church Meadow Bungalow in 2013. It provides Pre-school education in line with early years' national framework/ syllabus; in addition, it also provides pre and post school care in support of working families (commonly

referred to as wrap around care). Finally, it provides holiday clubs out of term time and provides educational support to children with special needs.

It does the above under the umbrella of state sponsored 15hrs/ 30hrs free provision as well as full fee paying arrangement for those not eligible. It currently has more than 30 children registered and employs 7 staff on mostly a part-time basis. We are a registered charity and not for profit organisation. We provide an open and equal opportunity community based service. We are assessed by OFSTED as OUTSTANDING. Further details can be found at: http://www.littledragonspreschool.org/

Opportunity

As a registered charity and OFSTED regulated Pre-school, the appointed Trustees play a vital role in the management and good governance of the school. The roles span chairperson, treasurer, secretary as well as members who do not hold key posts. Whilst the Board of Trustees often operate under the name of "committee", the roles and the contribution of those performing the roles are pivotal to the ongoing operation and success of the School. Regulated governance would not be compliant without the posts filled and the responsibilities discharged. In that situation, the school would have no choice but to close.

To that end, the Pre-School is always looking for new Trustees to replace those stepping down or add extra value to the team that exists today. Business skills in any of the areas such as management, finance, IT (including GDPR), marketing and sales would be extremely useful but not pivotal. The roles would particularly suit retired or semi-retired professionals who have some time but also want to be intellectually stretched and enjoy an active participation in a community based service. There is NO requirement to have previous or current relationship with the School through child attendance. Individuals

IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE



I am saying this very quietly, but spring seems to have finally sprung!
As I write, the sun is shining, the birds are rushing around building their nests, and my primulas, daffodils.

magnolias and camellias are all looking beautiful. It certainly seems to have been a long winter.

I was watching Countryfile the other day, and the presenter was explaining how birds regulate the hatching time of their broods to coincide with the food being available. Very clever. I wish I knew what the weather was going to be like in a couple of weeks, it would certainly make gardening easier! May is a very busy time of year in the garden; the grass is growing at breakneck speed, weeds are sprouting before the eyes and, if it is damp, slugs and snails are chewing the seedlings.

When the danger of frost has passed, usually towards the middle of the month. frost tender plants can be sown such as swede, beetroot, carrots, cabbage, cauliflower, calabrese, peas, chard, radish lettuce and spring onions. It is a good idea to protect these seeds against birds, especially pigeons, and I find it an excellent use for old CDs - to string them up between two canes so they twist and turn in the breeze. The other enemy is cats using your vegetable patch as a latrine, and I find that chicken wire dissuades them - so does the other suggestion of short canes planted in the garden at a distance of about 6 inches. The plants can grow through, but the cats don't have room to get between.

Spring bulbs need deadheading, and benefit from a feed to improve flowering next year. Sweet peas can be planted out by their supporting frame. Clumps of primroses and polyanthus can be divided after flowering and replanted.

In the greenhouse, ventilation is key, and shading paint will need to be applied as the sun is getting strong. Plants in the greenhouse will need more water and feed now as they start to grow strongly. If not already done, tomatoes can be planted now, and towards the end of the month, peppers, chillies and aubergine.

Seedlings will need to be pricked out and potted on, and when big enough, will need to come out of the greenhouse during the day, and returned at night to harden them off. Alternatively, they can be left in a cold frame, open during the day and shut at night.

Try and remember to put supports around plants such as peonies, lupins and hollyhocks whilst they are still small. They will only be visible for a short time, but it is almost impossible to do effectively later on. Tubs hanging baskets and pots can be potted up with bedding plants, but will need protection until the latter half of the month, there may not be frosts, but many will struggle if night time temperatures are low.

Finally, please don't forget the plant sale at the Village hall on 26th May 11-1pm. All donations of plants gratefully received, come and buy some too, and support your Village Hall.



MAYPOLE DANCING

What is a May pole dance?

A **maypole** is a tall wooden pole erected as a part of various European folk festivals, around which a **maypole** dance often takes place. The festivals may occur on May Day (May 1st) or Pentecost (Whitsun), although in some countries it is instead erected at Midsummer.

How tall is the Maypole?

In general, the more dancers, the taller the maypole. A **3 to 5 m** tall wooden maypole should be at least 40mm diameter. Strong plastic pipe is another option for the maypole. The top of the maypole needs a crown (right) to which you can attach your ribbons.

The Introductory Dance

In its most simple form, the dancers simply stand in a circle around the maypole and, in time with the music, take 4 steps towards the maypole, 4 steps back and the circle for a count of 8. As they approach the maypole they can raise their arms, and then lower them as they back away.

The First Plaiting Dance

The next level of complexity is for the dancers to attach ribbons to the top of the maypole. Most maypoles have a static (non-rotating) crown so the ribbons plait onto the maypole as the dancers circle around. This is called a closed plait. Dances where the ribbons plait away from the maypole, such as The Gypsies' Tent, are called open plaits.

To get used to using the ribbons, make sure that all the dancers are facing in the same direction and holding their ribbon in their right hands. The left hand simply gathers up the excess ribbon. Now start the music and all dance around the maypole in the same direction without overtaking. Eventually there is no length of ribbon left as it has become wrapped around the maypole, at which time the order is given to reverse your steps and unwind the maypole. If you unwind without any knots you have successfully completed your first plaiting dance.

The Grand Chain

The next dance requires you to divide into 2 groups of equal numbers. Members of **Team A** should partner Members of Team B. Make sure that As and Bs are spaced alternately around the maypole with each Team A dancer facing one from Team B and then start the music. Each of Team A should pass right shoulder with their first Team B dancer and then left with the next (do not turn back on yourself), carrying on alternately until the ribbons are again exhausted. As dancers pass each other, they should raise and lower their right arm rhythmically to guide the ribbon over the other dancer. To unwind, remember to retrace your steps accurately, passing your last dancer first and then alternate shoulders until the ribbons unwind. Make sure that everyone dances at a constant pace and that no one overtakes. You have now completed your second ribbon dance. You can vary the dance by having pairs (or more) of dancers, joined arm-in-arm, weave in each direction together.

In each case, look at the beautiful pattern that you have made on the maypole during the dance.

THE RIVER STOUR TRUST

Would you like to be skipper or crew on an electric launch on Constable's beautiful River Stour?

The River Stour Trust is looking for volunteers to join its team of skippers and crew operating its fleet of electric launches on the River Stour in Suffolk, made famous in John Constable's paintings. Full training and familiarisation with the river will be provided, but the 21ft launches are simplicity itself to drive, with smooth, quiet electric motors, and maximum speeds of 4mph. And if you don't fancy getting afloat, we also need people ashore to handle the bookings, meet the visitors, cutting the grass and general maintenance.

They run most weekends and some midweek days from April to October and raise funds vital to the work of the Trust in restoring and maintaining the navigation for all to enjoy. Over the past 50 years it has restored or rebuilt four of the 25 mile waterway's 13 locks, two slipways, and a Visitor Centre.

Visitors from all over the country and world, as well local residents, enjoy observing the wildlife and tranquillity of the river on our boats Trusty II and Kathleen who operate between Stratford St Mary, Flatford, Dedham and Brantham with Rosette, Francis J, Edwardian Lady and the John Constable Lighter operating between Sudbury, Great Cornard and Great Henny.



The river is peaceful, with just swans and occasional rowing boats to negotiate, and you will find yourself drifting back 200 years to the days when it was a busy commercial waterway, with 50ft lighters towed in pairs by horses through 13 locks from the sea at Manningtree to Sudbury.

What better way to spend a pleasant day on a beautiful waterway!

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR NEWS

By the time you have had your Messenger delivered the Car Rally will be over. It was discussed at full TDC council on 27th March. A motion against the rally was put to the council and the Leader was asked three questions by the same family regarding insurance, if the drivers and marshals have had criminal or mental health checks and how the council intends to protect residents from a malicious attack. The Safety Advisory Group (SAG) have passed the event. SAG have to examine all public events, the Cycle tour, the Air Show etc. The leader Cllr Neil Stock answered all questions and stated that once the rally was over it would be subjected to TDC Resources and Services Overview and Scrutiny Committee. This committee will be meeting at Weeley Council Offices on 30th July at 7.30pm. The committee will comprise of 11 councillors, all appointed under Widdecombe Rules. I also raised this with Cllr. Grundy, ECC Portfolio Holder for Highways at the meeting described below. He confirmed ECC cannot stop the rally, it is permitted by recent government legislation.

I have attended two meetings at County Hall. The first with Cllr. Kevin Bentley, deputy leader ECC, to do with the Garden Village and traffic around Manningtree Railway Bridge, when those attending were given an update. Including a possible fast transit route between the new garden community on the Colchester/Tendring border and Colchester Town Railway Station, previously known as St Botolph's. Nothing has been decided and it is still a matter for discussion. I have seen some letters in the local newspapers stating the station will be closing, this I am told is scaremongering, if anything the station will be enhanced.

The second meeting was with Cllr. Ian Grundy, Portfolio Holder for Essex County Council Highways on 11th April This meeting was to discuss my motion that was given full backing by TDC Councillors regarding speeding through villages and a 20 mph limit outside schools.

The meeting was very useful and I was

The meeting was very useful and I was provided with an example of a 20mph sign to use in the vicinity of our schools.

My proposed 20 mph outside schools is to be the subject of a schools competition for designing a panner to bring to the attention

of motorists of a school in the vicinity. There will be prizes for the best design and it is likely the Fire and Police Crime Commissioner will provide funding for the banners. Letters inviting schools to participate have been sent to all schools in Tendring.

The 30mph proposal through villages will require a survey of all parish councils in Tendring, which is to be undertaken very shortly. It is hoped that all villages will support this, we can then take the results back to Cllr.Grundy.

Recycling - if anybody requires, red and/or green bins or food caddy please let me know and I will order some on your behalf. I did have a small stock but these have all gone.


Recent Meetings

FROM THE RECTORY

The Shepherd Gate clock that is mounted on the wall outside the gate of the Royal Observatory in Greenwich is unusual in one key respect. Designed to display Greenwich Mean Time to the public the clock, that was constructed and installed in 1852, has a 24 hour analog dial rather than the usual 12. Originally the clock indicated astronomical time, where the counting of the hours starts each day at noon. In the 20th century this was changed to the more familiar system of the counting of the hours beginning at midnight.

Dividing the day into hours was a common system in many parts of the worlds for centuries before the arrival of Greenwich Mean Time. The ancient Egyptians began splitting the night into intervals in the 24th century BC, and a 1000 years later had devised a system of 12 hours in a day using sundials to mark the passage of time.

By the time of the Old Testament in the bible, the changing position of the shadows made by the sun as a means to tell the time was a familiar concept. In the books of both 2 Kings and Isaiah we hear how God caused the shadow cast by the sun on the 'stairway of Ahaz' - probably a sundial of sorts - to move back ten steps as a sign that he would keep a promise he makes to Hezekiah the king.

Keeping precise time is not something that seems to concern many of the characters whose lives spring from the pages of the bible. What they are more interested in is seeking out when God is going to act. This is a desire that Jesus himself is keen to see put into perspective.

'No one knows the day or the hour', says Jesus, referring to events in the future, 'only the Father'.

We can mark, record and watch time. But we will never be its master. It keeps moving without input or interference from us

As the writer of Ecclesiastes says, "God has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end."

Time is a beguiling mystery, but nevertheless a gift from God. Let's use it well.
