Class 3 Trip

On Tuesday 1st May, Class 3 invaded West Stow Anglo-Saxon village!

First of all, we visited the Museum that was on site. In here we saw artefacts that had been excavated from the site, including skeletons found in graves, ancient weapons and fossilised poo. We were asked questions about the objects that helped us to find out its past life and more about the Anglo-Saxons. We learnt that the Anglo Saxons pinched many Roman objects and recycled them for example, Roman roof tiles that had been used for the hearth of a fire and Roman glass that had been melted to create beads. The Anglo Saxons couldn't make glass as the correct type of sand for glass came from Asia.

In the afternoon, we investigated the Anglo Saxon village that has been reconstructed on the original site. The houses smelt quite strongly of ash and smoke and everything was very dark. Everything was in one room which some of us thought was cosy but could have been very claustrophobic. We liked the roofs that were thatched as they were well crafted. The locks on the doors fascinated us because they were an ingenious design.

As we left, the curator warned us about the Anglo-Saxon elves which can make you ill. The water elves could give you chicken-pox and wood elves give you stitch by firing arrows at you.

We are looking forward to recreating our own models of the village in class.

KITCHEN CORNER

A tasty treat for the warm summer days

Fig and walnut Ice cream

Ingredients:

For the fig paste: 500g dried white figs 440 g sugar

For the ice cream: 175g caster sugar 200g walnuts, crushed, plus extra to serve 4 egg yolks 500 ml whipping cream

4 fresh figs to serve

Method:

To make the paste, put figs and sugar in saucepan with 550 ml water, medium heat and stir to dissolve sugar.

Bring to a boil, simmer 30 minutes. Process or puree to a smooth paste.

Place the caster sugar and 250 ml water in saucepan over low heat and stir to dissolve.

Add the fig paste and puree till smooth with a hand held stick blender

Cool, then fold in the walnuts.

Beat the egg yolks till thick and pale, add to

the cooled fig paste mix

Whip the cream to soft peaks. Fold the egg and fig mix into the cream

Pour into a container and freeze 2-3 hours Remove ice cream from freezer and leave to soften

Serve with fresh figs and walnuts

BRITAIN'S FAT FIGHT

No doubt many of you have watched the new programme 'Britain's Fat Fight' presented by Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall at the end of April on BBC1.

Although it's nothing new that Britain is the fattest country in Europe, it's a stark reminder that we can't just sit back and do nothing about it.

Hugh is trying hard to make people aware of the crisis, but also he is asking the Government what they are doing about this growing problem.

The programme will follow the people of Newcastle for 1 year to see if they can lose 100,000lbs within a year.

Hugh ventured out to an impoverished part of town to see for himself the very limited availability of fresh vegetables and fruit from predominantly fast food shops and small supermarkets full of sweets and processed snacks. I am sure this pattern is repeated all over the UK.

This brings me to talk about someone who has come to my attention recently.

Dr Aseem Malhotra, internationally renowned Consultant Cardiologist and best-selling author of '*The Pioppi Diet*'. Dr Malhotra has become one of the most influential and well-known health campaigners, and a pioneer of the Lifestyle.

campaigners, and a pioneer of the Lifestyle Medicine Movement in the UK. He is often seen on TV in his campaign against sugar and highlighting the harms of too much medicine.

He is a spokesperson for the Academy of the Medical Royal College's 'Obesity and Choosing Wisely' Steering Groups and in 2015 became the youngest member to be appointed to the board of trustees of the health think tank, 'The King's Fund'. In 2016 he was named by Debrett's as one of the most influential people in science in medicine in the UK.

He gave a talk to the MEPs at the European Parliament on 12th April this year to argue the case for lifestyle medicine and explain why lawmakers need to change EU health policy – this includes UK too. The title of the talk was: 'Big Food and Big Pharma: Killing for profit?'

Here is the link between Hugh's programme and Dr Malhotra's speech. Dr Malhotra talked much about improving the nation's health by educating them about the toxicity of sugar, processed food that leads to obesity, type 2 diabetes and heart disease. The UK is known as the Fat Man of Europe where 2/3 of adults and 1/3 of children are obese or overweight. Related illnesses cost the NHS £5 billion/year. Processed food is everywhere – petrol stations, supermarkets, coffee shops even hospitals! This needs to be changed.

Others who talked at the conference were: **Professor Hanno Piil** – a Dutch internistendocrinologist and professor of Diabetology who gave a brief insight into type 2 diabetes and how lifestyle intervention should be considered first. Sir Richard Thompson, the personal physician to the Queen from 1984-2005 and past president of the Royal College of Physicians talked about the resistance of food and tobacco companies to make changes to their profitable products. He has called for an independent inquiry into controversial heart drugs statins after research found existing trial data was flawed.

Also **Sarah Ann Macklin** a former model, now a nutritionist who aims to transform the fashion industry by educating agencies and models on the importance of eating well. An interesting insight into what really goes on behind our backs with regard to food, medicine and treatments and who is really making the decisions.

Dr Malhotra's book 'The Pioppi Diet' is a must for anyone who wants to find out how to get their health back through diet.

IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE



My garden is looking glorious at the moment. Not, I might add, due to anything I have done but due to the profusion of wild flowers that have seeded themselves about. I have yellow and white dead nettle, red

and white campion, cow parsley, euphorbia, and perennial forget me not. In addition, the blackthorn is flowering its socks off. These plants, with the addition of stinging nettles, are vital early sources of nectar for the bees and several butterflies need them in order to lay their eggs.

In addition to the plant life, there is masses of animal life; from the rabbits (grr) to tiny field mice and our hedgehogs, all caught on camera, and of course birds of all shapes and sizes. Once again the birds have shunned our boxes and have built their nests in much more private spots, but they still come to the bird table for a top up to their diet.

May weather has been confusing - boiling hot one minute and freezing cold the next, but the underlying day and night-time temperatures are creeping up, and hopefully there will be no frosts.

If there are prolonged dry spells plants may have to be watered and they certainly will have to be deadheaded. It is better to give them a good dousing once a week rather than a trickle every day. Tubs and pots however will need watering even if it does rain. It is worth remembering that we live in one of the driest places in UK, and Beth Chatto's garden, in Elmstead Market, showcases suitable plants for this region.

Grass will need regular cutting but, if there is a prolonged dry spell, it is worth raising the cut. It is also suggested that you do not water the grass (unless it is newly turfed or

seeded) as brown looking grass reverts to green very quickly when it does rain, and we are meant to be conserving water!

In the vegetable garden, lettuce, rocket, spring onions, radishes, maincrop carrots, peas, swede, beans, courgettes, pumpkins and squashes can all be sown. Leeks and brassicas can be transplanted, and greenhouse grown frost tender vegetables planted outside. Gooseberries should be ready to be havested, together with earlier planted vegetables. Asparagus should no longer be picked, and the bed will need a boost of seaweed based fertilizer.

It is thought to be a good idea to thin heavy crops of plums, apples and pears. I forgot to do this one year, and a mature apple tree actually fell over during a gale due to the weight of the fruit. Needless to say, it was propped back up after pruning, and still produces delicious apples!

June is also the time for roses, one my favourite flowers, especially heavily scented old fashioned roses. They will need a little attention though - spraying with soapy water if attacked by aphids, and regular deadheading.

Lots to do, but please take time to enjoy your garden.

VILLAGE HALL TRUSTEES

The village hall AGM and Annual Meeting were held on 16th

May. Kathryn Ealden, Mary Fawcett, Jenny Kave. Andy Lear and Jackie Lear were elected as trustees for the coming year and they, together with David Beech, Sue Clark, Martin Frostick, Richard Lawson and Kate Strowbridge (who have been appointed as representative trustees by village organisations) will form the management committee for 2018/19. Unfortunately no further volunteers were forthcoming to fill the three co-opted trustee vacancies but it is hoped that these can be filled at subsequent routine meetings of the management committee - so if you are interested in joining the team then please get in touch; your help with running our village hall would be much appreciated.

Martin Frostick was re-elected Chairman of trustees and will also undertake the role of secretary for a further year. Kate Strowbridge was elected Vice-Chairman. Jackie Lear was re-appointed Treasurer and Mary Fawcett was re-appointed Bookings Secretary. Jayne Bates did not seek reappointment as trustee and was thanked for her 8 years of excellent service to the hall during her time as trustee. Mike Corduff and Graham Taylor both resigned as trustees during the last year and were thanked for the contributions they made during their tenures. Mention was made of the late Mary Hart who gave several years of unstinting support to the hall as the WI representative. Pender Richardson was thanked for auditing the accounts to his normal high standard and Ivan Arthey was thanked for all of the excellent maintenance work he has undertaken for the hall over many years. Marion Britton was thanked for her continuing hard work as caretaker.

There has been greater utilisation of the village hall in the last year with hire income increasing by over 12% during 2017/18 to £21,202. Additionally, fundraising contributed £4,633 to hall funds

which has more than covered the additional costs of the ongoing refurbishment programme once grant income is taken into account. Hire charges were not increased last year and, although they are extremely competitive compared with those levied for similar facilities in the local area, it is not proposed to increase them in 2018.

Refurbishment work at the hall continues, with exterior redecoration due to be completed this summer along with a new kitchen roof, new floor coverings, improved security and completion of improved car park lighting. The last major element of the refurbishment project is resurfacing of the car parks which it is intended to complete later this year, grant funding permitting.

The village hall trustees look forward to being able to provide accommodation for you whether it is for a birthday party, reception or commercial event. Details of the facilities available are provided on the village website *greatbromley.org.uk*.

April meeting

In April, we departed from our usual format of finding a speaker for our meeting. We asked one of our local members to share her stories about her recent trip to Japan.

Eileen Brown has been a regular world traveller. She left school and sailed on oil Tankers for Shell Oil. One of these tankers transported Liquid Natural Gas (LNG) from Brunei to Yokohama. It was a regular run, always arriving in Yokohama at 7am every second Monday. She had the opportunity to visit the great Buddha of Kamakura, near Yokohama. Frequent Tsunamis have washed away the outbuildings many times since it was built in the 13th Century, and now the second largest Buddha in Japan sits serenely in the open air.

Eileen described her trip around Honshu – the largest Island in Japan, spending time in Tokyo, Osaka, Kyoto, Himeji, Hiroshima, Miyajima and Kinosaki Onsen. She also showed her return visit to the great Buddha 38 years (and 38 pounds) after the first visit

She entertained us with pictures of the food that is eaten in Japan. Fast food 'Bento' boxes, beautifully crafted with a variety of different ingredients, sold at stations to eat on the train. Japanese like to have synergy when they eat. For them a well-balanced meal contains rice, meat, fish or tofu, some beans, crispy pickled vegetables in vinegar, and a sweet pickle or red bean.

All restaurants have incredibly realistic plastic models of the foods likely to be found inside the restaurant, so travellers do not need to worry if they cannot speak the language. Most major signs are in English and Japanese, so it is easy to get around the country.

Travellers can get a two-week train pass for around £340 which gives access to the Shinkansen – the bullet train. Journeys can be booked weeks in advance – before you even leave the UK. The Japanese rail system is so organised that when your train and seat is booked, you are notified of the

platform it will leave from - before you leave for your trip. Trains have an average delay of 18 seconds and are incredibly fast reaching a top speed of almost 190mph. Communal bathing in Japan is utterly different to bathing in the UK. To bathe in a hot spring bath, or Onsen, you must submit to a ritual. You take off your shoes, enter the segregated bathing area and place all your clothes - and your bath towel in a locker. You are permitted to take a long flannel into the wet room with you. You must then sit down on a bucket to thoroughly shower (It is bad manners to spray anyone else with your shower water). Then, wipe off your water with your tiny scrap of flannel. Then you can go into the hot spa – which is very hot indeed. You are not permitted to wet your flannel in the pure spa waters. Instead, fold it up and place it on your head.

After you are heated through, nicely pink, you can go and sit on the bucket to shower off the spa water, towel yourself off with your head-flannel, then go back to the changing room when you can finally use your dry fluffy towel.

An experience indeed – especially for prudish English folks – and an insight into another culture that many of us now would like to visit. Thank you, Eileen.

MORE THAN JUST A FARM

We are now half way through the year and WOW what a difference a few weeks makes! We went from sub-zero temperatures to torrential rain to above 25 degrees! At the start of April we had a very busy Easter with many young families bringing their children to see our livestock. It is so great to be able to educate the younger ones about where meat comes from, although some of the boys were more interested in the tractors and machinery around.



By the middle of April, it was finally warm and dry enough to move the livestock outside onto luscious grass meadows. Some of our herd have never seen grass but after some persuasion were out of the trailer and really enjoying being outside. Did you see our lambs in the field next to the road?



With all the hot weather our Oil Seed Rape fields have bloomed with stunning yellow flowers. These flowers are important for honey bees to pollinate and produce delicious honey. We fertilise our fields with

Nitrogen to encourage crop growth to maximise crop yield. Other farms around Gt Bromley produce potatoes: this process takes some time. Firstly, stones are removed from the field using a de-stoner to reduce the risk of potatoes forming in odd shapes. following this the borks (ridges) are formed which is where the potato seeds are placed. Potatoes need lots of room to grow so growing them in borks is the best way allowing maximum room to grow, maximum sunshine and water for each plant to grown and produce its best yield.



On 22nd April we had the Car Rally, what a fun and exciting day for any car enthusiast and, with such a sunny day, they couldn't have asked for better weather. This weather has carried on and our first May bank holiday was sun and blue skies all round. With record temperatures reaching 25 degrees, the BBQs were out! We have an exciting time ahead in the butchery with new products becoming available and we now sell delicious Free Range Eggs, locally produced from Stanway. BBQ packs are also available throughout the summer months.

George Alfred Studd (1899 – 1918)

George Studd was born in 1899 in Little Bromley, almost certainly at his parents' house on Shop Road, which until recently had been called Manningtree Road. Both of George's parents, Charrington and Clara (whose maiden name had been Chaplin) were natives of the village, and had one other child, a boy called Edwin who was born in November 1901.

Like most of the Little Bromley's menfolk at that time, Charrington Studd worked as an Agricultural Labourer as did Clara's father, George Chaplin, who also lived with the family.

George was conscripted into the British Army shortly after his 18th birthday. Since early 1916, voluntary recruitment had ceased, and even if a man wanted to join up they were still officially a conscript.

George – still only 18 years old - was posted to France at the start of April 1918, and on the 13th of that month he joined the 18th Battalion of the Lancashire Fusiliers. For most of the War, the minimum age for a British soldier to be sent overseas was 19, however the reverses suffered by the British in March – which were, in part caused by a manpower shortage - prompted the age requirement to be lowered to 18½.

During George's time with the Battalion, they only spent a few, short periods in the line – all of which were in the vicinity of Aveluy Wood, near Albert. The Wood had been situated just behind the British front line for

most of the 1916 Somme battles, but a large part of it was captured by the Germans at the end of March 1918 during the first of their Spring Offensives.

On 1st June 1918, the 18th Lancashire Fusiliers were one of three battalions tasked to recapture that part of the Wood still in German hands. Initially they met with success, and by 5.30 a.m. had attained their final objective. At midday the Germans - who by this time had been heavily reinforced - counter attacked and, despite determined resistance the British, were gradually forced back to their starting positions.

The Battalion suffered 265 casualties in the attack, including 20 dead and 49 missing. Most of those initially listed as missing had in fact been killed, including George.

George has no known grave, and is officially commemorated on Panel 34 of The Pozieres Memorial. This Memorial commemorates over 14,000 casualties of the U.K. and 300 of the South African Forces who have no known grave, and who died on the Somme between 21st March 1918 and 7th August 1918.

Arthur Herbert Gosling (1881 – 1918)

Arthur Gosling was born at Stanway, near Colchester, on 29th January 1881. His parents Alfred and Hannah, were the Master and Matron of the Lexden and Winstree Union Workhouse which was situated on the south side of London Road. The family, including Arthur and his 3 older siblings, lived in the Master's quarters which were situated in the centre of the main building.

At the age of 15, Arthur joined the Merchant Navy. He later served for 3 years in the South African Constabulary before returning to his calling as a Seaman.

Alfred and Hannah Gosling moved to Great Bromley (where they lived at The Hollies) sometime between 1901 and 1909, most likely when Alfred retired. After Alfred's death in September 1909, Hannah continued to live in the house along with her daughter Amanda.

By the summer of 1915, Arthur was in Canada, and on 30th July he volunteered to join the Canadian Expeditionary Force (C.E.F.) at Vernon, British Columbia. His enlistment papers describe Arthur as being 5 foot 7 inches tall, with blue eyes and fair hair.

The C.E.F. was the name given to the field force created by Canada for service overseas in the War. Canada was the senior Dominion of the British Empire, and automatically went to war with Germany with the British Declaration on 4th August 1914. During the course of the war, the Canadians earned themselves a reputation as a formidable fighting

force, and as a result were often used as assault troops.

Arthur left Canada on April Fool's Day 1916 and arrived in England eight days later. He was posted to France at the end of June, and the following month joined the C.E.F.'s 29th (Vancouver) Battalion.

His service in France included involvement in the Battle of the Somme in 1916 and the Battle of Arras (where the Canadian Corps played a major role in the capture of Vimy Ridge) in 1917. In August 1917 during the Battle of Hill 70 (near Lens) Arthur was wounded in the eye and left hip. His wounds were not overly serious, and he was returned to duty the following month.

On the night of 2nd/3rd June 1918, a force of 183 men from the 29th Battalion took part in a trench raid on the German line, near the village of Boiry Becquerelle. The raid was successful, but the Battalion suffered 49 casualties, including 12 dead. One of those killed was Arthur.

Arthur - along with 7 of his comrades who were killed in the raid - now rests in the Bellacourt Military Cemetery, south-west of Arras

FROM THE RECTORY

The logo of the actors' union Equity features a pair of masks, one smiling and one frowning. This traditional symbol has long been associated with drama and represents the ancient Greek Muses of Thalia and Melpomene, the muses of comedy and tragedy.



Masks were first used to enable actors, who were originally all men, to play a variety of male and female characters and differentiate between them with a mask for each. Not a disguise as such, but a way of hiding the actor's own features, and presenting an alternative face to the world.

More recently, comedienne & ventriloquist Nina Conti has put face masks on volunteers from her audience that cover the lower half of their faces. Conti uses a hand piece to manipulate the mask and make it appear as if the volunteer is talking. The voice that the audience hears is Conti's. Although the mouth, its movement and the words that come from it are disguised, the eyes of the volunteer remain on view. and display emotions that range from detached amusement to abject horror.

Masks enable people to do and say things that they wouldn't normally say or do. There is something anonymous about them. Genuine emotions and feelings can remain hidden.

The putting on of a metaphorical mask in everyday encounters is something that many people do without ever really realising. Whether the mask they wear is the role that they inhabit as teacher or parent, or situational at a funeral or with difficult family members, masks cover what we don't want to be seen.

Despite our own habit of putting on a mask, we want to know the truth behind those that others wear. Whether it's our politicians or our religious leaders, we want to know what they really think, what actually makes them tick, their genuine opinions; not their carefully crafted media soundbites. We value authenticity highly.

God knows what we are like behind the mask. There is no need to put on a front to hide how we feel or disguise our emotions. He loves us just the same.
