BAT WATCH in LITTLE BROMLEY

The Friends of Little Bromley Church held a very successful bat watching evening on 17th August in and around the Church. Thankfully the weather was kind to us! Thanks to everyone who attended and especially to Roger and Sylvia Jiggins from the Essex Bat group who gave a very interesting talk. There was a display showing the different species of bats and pictures of our Church showing where the bats are roosting. After refreshments, everyone went out into the Churchyard where Bat detectors were handed out and the bats put on a display for everyone!

We identified 3 species of bat - the Brown Long Eared bat, the Soprano Pipistrelle and the Common Pipistrelle.

Bat numbers are drastically down in the country due to many factors including destruction of their habitat, the cutting down of hedges and a drastic decline in insects but bats seem to be thriving in and around Little Bromley which is good news. KITCHEN CORNER

Salmon with tarragon cream sauce

This recipe serves 2 people:

- 450g salmon fillets about 2.5 cm thick 3 tbs each chopped tarragon and parsley 50g butter
- 1 clove garlic squashed flat
- 4 tbsp creme fraiche lemon juice.

Cut the salmon fillets into pieces across their width about 4cm wide. Scatter chopped herbs on a plate and roll the salmon pieces in them, pressing down on them to adhere to the fish. Melt butter in a

shallow pan over medium heat and add garlic. when foaming add the fish cook 3-4 minutes till opaque. The butter should be browning and fizzing, stir in the cream and leave to melt. Season with salt and black pepper if wished, and just before you scoop out the fish squeeze a little lemon juice into the sauce.

The Speedwatch sessions, which are coordinated by Neil Skinner, are in need of more volunteers – full training is provided so if you are keen to help out with this scheme please do let me or Neil know via clerk@gbpc.gov.uk.

On the subject of speeding, we have submitted to Essex Highways a request to extend the 40mph speed limit to the Parish boundary on Colchester Road. We know this could take some time but are hopeful for this action to be implemented.

We have been made aware that the Council could fund its own volunteer police officers as part of Essex Police's Community Specials scheme. Under the scheme, the council could fund the expenses of volunteer police officers who will be designated to the Great Bromley area. Leigh-on-Sea has taken up the scheme already.

Roger Hirst, Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner for Essex, said: "We know that safe and secure communities are the bedrock on which we build wellbeing and prosperity for all. This initiative is a great example of how by working together with local parish and town councils we can help communities keep safe.

"These fully warranted roles will also provide local people with the opportunity to make a huge contribution to the communities in which they live. It's really positive that Leigh Town Council has taken up this opportunity and I'm looking forward to seeing it work in action. The public wants more local, visible and accessible policing and this will make a big difference to the people of Leigh."

Community Specials are committed to policing the area that pays for them. However where a critical incident occurs, for example a terrorist attack, the Community Special may be called on to help in another area of the county.

Progress on the Harwich Road roundabout is slow and we will be writing to Cllr Kevin Bentley to highlight the ineffectiveness of the traffic management plan, as well as the impact to residents and local businesses.

Broadband remains a constant issue and one that we feel is worthy of a public meeting. We'll be inviting officers from Essex County Council, Superfast Essex Broadband and County Broadband - (date to be advised – watch this space).



MORE THAN JUST A FARM

With harvest now over many farmers have been cultivating, ploughing, drilling and rolling their fields in preparation for a new seed bed. In order to create the perfect seed bed, the soil needs to have proper drainage (can be achieved with tilling), contain nutrients and organic matter, be free of weed seeds and needs to be the right consistency for the seed to germinate and the crop to grow.



Potato farmers were affected by the lack of rain this year. We were able to help out a neighbouring farm who were short of water by pumping a few million gallons of water from our reservoir to theirs.

We have already started feeding our livestock winter feed due to the lack of rainfall earlier this year. The knock on effect of no rain meant the grass didn't grow or contain all the needed nutrients to produce our livestock. We have been feeding barley and rape straw along with silage and milled feed.

With the weather cooling down and the



days becoming shorter, it can only mean Autumn is now here. This time of year is perfect to pick some delicious berries including blackthorn sloes and blackberries. What will you be making sloe gin or a blackberry crumble?

The butchery has been very busy over the summer with all the perfect BBQ weather. With the weather cooling winter warmers are a favourite and with game now back in season why not pop in for a brace of pheasants or some sausages?

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR NEWS

Air Show

The Annual Clacton Airshow has been hailed as yet another success story with over an estimated 250,000 people attending. Some local B&B's have benefited with spectators staying over to see both days as well as public houses benefiting from passing trade.

Broadband

As you know lack of good quality Broadband is affecting most people in Great Bromley and Thorrington. It is seen by what seems to be the majority of residents, the most important issue. You will have seen in last month's Messenger that I was due to meet with Kevin Bentley in August which I did and handed him the letter in which I described all the problems we are experiencing here.

I have received a response from Councillor Bentley in which he states that County Broadband claimed to ECC it was able to provide a super fast broadband service to the majority of properties within Great Bromley Parish under an Open Market Review and this claim was accepted by ECC. Where any alleged existing coverage claims applies Superfast Essex is legally not allowed to invest in funding broadband infrastructure. Therefore any deployment in Great Bromley Parish was focused on only the remaining properties which were not claimed as served by any other network operator during the Open Market Review. There are a number of other aspects in the reply but it appears as County Broadband stated they can supply the majority of premises in the parish it is going to be a battle to get a decent super fast broadband coverage in our parish.

However I have not given up and I am seeking further advice from people far better qualified than myself. I will continue trying to get a super fast broadband coverage for ALL residents in Great Bromley and my ward.

As a result of communications with Kevin Bentley, Superfast Essex are willing to attend a meeting to discuss the matter further. Great Bromley Parish Council are writing to Kevin requesting Superfast Essex attend a meeting at Great Bromley. Once details are known I will try to inform residents

as I am aware there are a large number of people that are very disappointed with County Broadband who have been unable to provide anywhere near the service they informed ECC and TDC they would be able to.

Elmstead, I am informed, has excellent super fast broadband.

Car Rally 2019

There are numerous factors to consider, the most important being safety and impact on businesses.

It is anticipated the car rally will take place again next year. There are a small group of people who are very opposed to a further rally, there are also several people who support the rally returning. Therefore there are mixed opinions as to whether the car rally should take place again. I have to say that neither TDC councillors nor TDC can stop the rally

The Road Traffic Act 1988 (Motor Racing) (England) has authorised the Motor Sport governing body (Motor Sport Association) to issue permits for closed road rallying. The Highways authority ECC Highways has to consider the likely impact of the event on businesses on the route. There are numerous factors to consider including safety (there has to be a safety audit which is carried out by the emergency services and the local local authority).

Local plan

I have been asked by residents to provide an update on the proposed new Village Communities. Despite much speculation the Planning Inspector has NOT rejected the plan. He has requested more work to be done mainly regarding Education and Transport. TDC officers are working very hard to ensure this work is carried out. I understand that Colchester Borough Council have approved their part of the plan hopefully we can now all work together and get the plan approved.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Jill Pert reminisced about her days with the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company at the WI meeting in Great Bromley this month.

Richard D'Oyly Carte was an English talent agent who established a hotel empire and an opera company in the late 19th century. Loving comic opera he wrote to WS Gilbert to ask if he could work with Arthur Sullivan to create the one-act comic opera Trial by Jury.

In all Gilbert and Sullivan wrote 13 operas and contralto Jill has had the honour to perform in all of them – in notable locations such as the Covent Garden festival, Bow Street magistrates court, and the Royal Courts of Justice.

Only the third of Gilbert and Sullivan's plays, HMS Pinafore, started to turn a profit for Richard D'Oyly Carte, who bought a property on the Strand in London building the Savoy Theatre in 1881. Its accompanying Theatre was lit by electric lights and could seat almost 1300 people.

The Pirates of Penzance was successful in the US, and Patience was the longest running opera in the series. After Patience, the company produced lolanthe, followed by Princess Ida in 1884, The Mikado in 1885 followed by Ruddigore in 1887. The Gondoliers opened in 1889 and was one of their great successes.

Their final operas in collaboration were Utopia, Limited and The Grand Duke – a financial failure. The two never worked together again.

Jill started her singing career early. When she was 15, the family moved to Canada, she gained her Bachelor of Music degree at Toronto university and working at the Canadian Opera Company, initially in the chorus and soon playing small roles in the company.

She eventually returned to the UK for the next 30 years of her career. She worked at Sadler's Wells, sharing stories of performing eight performances for six days per week, then using the seventh day to move to the next venue. She remained with the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company until its last night in February 1982.

She recounted stories of the touring company family, finding digs in different towns, sharing a flat with other members of the company during long runs. The company went to Australia and New Zealand for five months, touring the antipodes with her theatre 'family'. Learning a new opera whilst performing another must have been a challenge.

We were lucky to hear her stories from a life spent on the road touring and performing. Her repertoire across all Gilbert and Sullivan operas, Rogers and Hammerstein, Rogers and Hart, and Learner and Loewe has meant that she has performed in Oklahoma, Carousel, South Pacific, the King and I, and has performed the mother Abbess in the Sound of Music. She has appeared on the History of Gilbert and Sullivan and also in the film Quartet – produced by Dustin Hoffman.

Her engaging stories kept us well entertained – even the racy reminiscences – and we were all inspired to search out more Gilbert and Sullivan Operas to delight us further. Thank you, Jill.

St Helena, previously called St Helena Hospice, has carried out a great deal of research and discussion to bring them to the place they are today. With uncertainty regarding government funding (currently one third of the cost of running St Helena comes from the NHS, the other two thirds from the generous local community), together with a growing population and a tougher fundraising environment, the charity knows that standing still is not an option.

A new visual identity with a fresh and vibrant feel will help the charity stand out in a crowded marketplace. The refreshed logo is based on a remembrance tree and the idea of growth, change and life's natural cycle.

The removal of the word hospice was a bold move, but St Helena found the word itself was such a barrier. People hear the word hospice and tend to think of a building where you go to die, but St Helena, and organisations like it, provide so much more, helping local people face incurable illness and bereavement.

VILLAGE HALL TRUSTEES



At their meeting on 17th July the village hall trustees were

delighted to note that hirers continue to make good use of the hall and that several new regular activities for the community are due to commence this autumn including Baby College, blues dancing and youth martial arts. The hall income stream remains steady, boosted by the excellent £470 profit made at the plant sale in May and £120 raised from the table top sale in June.

Improvements continue to be made to the fabric of the hall and the facilities available to the community. Recent work undertaken includes security enhancements throughout the hall, a replacement carpet in the Millennium Lounge, a replacement carpet and blinds in the Committee Room, new windows in the main storeroom and further internal and external re-decoration. The leaking kitchen roof, made good temporarily through emergency repairs last winter, has now been fully inspected and requires complete renewal. Trustees intend to apply to the Community Initiatives Fund for a grant towards the cost of the work, which will be the first phase of a planned kitchen upgrade project.

The Village Hall launched its own website in September which gives the hall a sound internet presence as well as complementing our growing use of social media and external websites to promote the hall and its events. The website address is www.greatbromleyvillagehall.org.uk and allows easy on-line viewing of the village hall facilities, hire terms and conditions, booking forms, the new village hall users guide and forthcoming events. There is also an on-line enquiry form on the website which can be used to ascertain hall availability or to obtain answers to any queries you may have.

During the last year, utilisation of the excellent WiFi service available at the village hall has seen a dramatic decline due

to almost all hirers now having internet access as part of their personal mobile phone call package. After careful consideration, trustees decided to terminate the WiFi service with effect from September 2018, which will reduce annual hall expenditure by £250. Only one hirer requested use of the WiFi service in 2018.

It has been decided not to hold a village Christmas Fayre this year, but the village hall management committee is holding its popular Christmas Market on 10th November which will feature a wide variety of good-quality stalls – and an opportunity to buy your tickets for the annual Grand Christmas Draw, which this year will be drawn at the hall on 2nd December following the performance of 'A Christmas Carol'.

Forthcoming events at the village hall are advertised elsewhere in the magazine and the community is fortunate that the village hall has managed to attract several high-quality shows to the village in the coming months. Please come along for some great entertainment – the performers have all been here before and come highly recommended.

The village hall trustees look forward to welcoming you at an event at the hall and to provide accommodation for you whether it is for a birthday party, reception or reunion. They would also be delighted to receive any comments that you have on the hall either as a visitor or hirer; these and any ideas for further improvements to the hall are always much appreciated.



IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE

I can't believe it's October already. This year seems to have whizzed past - it seems as if it was June only a week or so ago!

I am told that feeling that way is a sign of advancing age, and to children time seems to last forever.

The garden took a real battering during the wonderful hot summer, but seems to have bounced back very well on the whole. There will undoubtedly be permanent casualties, but plants do only have a finite life unfortunately - nothing is immortal.

October is a month when lots of clearing up needs to be done in the garden- pruning, cutting back, dividing and cleaning. The greenhouse is a prime example, and will need a thorough clean inside and out - I always use Jeyes Fluid - before tender plants that require protection are put inside. Whilst temperatures remain above freezing the door should be left open to ventilate, even with tender plants inside, as this will reduce the chances of mould, infection and insect infestation. Apples and pears need to be harvested when ready, and if perfect stored in a cool, dry, frost - free and rodent proof area.

All flower borders will need a light tidy, and dead flowers cut off, leaving those with seed heads for the birds and insects. Those with decorative seed heads will need to be cut for drying prior to flower arranging - dried heads of alliums and teasel make wonderful Christmas arrangements if lightly sprayed with silver or gold paint.

Empty areas of soil, especially in the vegetable garden need either forking over (and all weeds removed) or covering with a thick layer of garden compost (after the weeds are removed). I must admit I prefer the latter, and let the worms do all the hard work!

Bird feeders and nesting boxes need to be cleaned out and bird baths scrubbed. Failure to do this may cause transmission of various nasty bird diseases.

October is also the time for compost heaps! If not already done, existing heaps should be turned and covered, and a new heap started ready to accept the mass of clippings and weeds that will be generated during the clean up. I recently turned mine and found, once again, a mass of grass snake eggs. Unfortunately, this year they had not hatched. perhaps the high temperatures were just too hot.

October is one of the best times to lay a new lawn using turf, or indeed sowing one. The only proviso is that the weather is damp. The rule is the same for both though - try not to walk on either. Even turf take a few weeks to root.

Vegetables that are harvested in October include sprouts, leeks, cauliflowers, carrots and main crop potatoes. Pumpkins and squashes need to be cut (leaving 1" stem) and left in the sun for their skins to harden prior to being stored in a frost free area.

Finally, the pond will need a good clean with marginal plants reduced in size and removal of some of the bottom sludge. However, this should be left beside the pond for a few days to enable any of the creepy crawlies inadvertently removed to crawl back into the pond.

A busy month, but enjoy your garden!

JOYCE ELIZABETH OSBORNE 1928-2018

Joyce was born and raised in Mile End, Colchester. Her father died at age 34 when she was less than a year old, and she and her older brother Jim were raised by their fiercely independent mother, Lizzie. She attended the elementary school in Mile End and then the Colchester County High School. She chose scientific subjects, including Biology; her school notebooks were meticulously written and illustrated. She retained a lifelong interest in the natural world.

After passing the School Certificate she took a job as a lab assistant at Lawford Place, the research division of BX Plastics, where she made several lifelong friends in the laboratories. She introduced one of them to her brother Jim, and Pam Cobb became her sister-in-law in due course.

She also met John Osborne, newly returned from the RAF. They were married in September 1951, going off on honeymoon to Yorkshire on John's motorcycle. After I was born, in 1954, Mum gave up her job and became a full-time home-maker in the new bungalow, "Cirrus", that they had built at Little Bromley. My brother Robin was born in 1957.

Although Mum's initial interests were scientific, in her adult life she had an interest in art and a great talent for it. She painted, sketched, embroidered, knitted, and sewed. She made sweaters, scarves, tea cosies, gloves, and hats. In later life she quilled, producing a steady stream of wonderfully inventive cards. She continued to produce



these cards in her later years, despite suffering arthritis in her hands that caused her to utter "Oh, fiddlesticks!" when her fingers wouldn't cooperate, but rarely to complain.

Her creativity was often on show

when she played with her young grandchildren, as she devised games for them involving imaginary friends and animals. She was fond of giving inanimate objects like her saucepans personalities, speaking to them



and commenting on their behaviour. And if a puppet was needed for part of the action she would get out her sewing basket and put one together in no time at all!

Another outlet for her artistic energy was her gardens, which were quite magnificent at both "Cirrus" and later "Owlswood" on Trinity Close in Mistley; they were always full of colourful flowers of all shapes and sizes, artfully placed, with not a weed in sight. Mum was very knowledgeable about flora and continued to tend her garden into her 80s.

Yet another outlet for her artistry was cooking and baking. Dinners at home always came with dessert, and Mum always had tins full of rock buns, chocolate cake, shortbread, ginger biscuits and other goodies which she enjoyed as much as anyone! As she was always looking for new ideas she became a keen consumer of TV cooking shows, with Fanny Cradock and Zena Skinner being two of her favourites.

Mum was a prolific letter writer. For years she wrote regularly to me and Robin, as well as her four granddaughters and various friends, even including my wife's aunt, whom she never met! Her replies were prompt and always ended by saying that she had to sign off now to do the ironing or bake a cake or scrub the kitchen floor.

The Methodist Church at Little Bromley played an important part in Mum's life. She taught Sunday School for many years, was an organizer of a regular women's meeting in the village, was an organizer of the Women's World Day of Prayer and hosted the annual

Methodist Church Fete in our garden in Little Bromlev.

With the help of some wonderful friends and neighbours. Mum carried on running the home in Trinity Close after John died. When ill health made doing so impossible she moved to a Care Home in Cambridge. Her last outing was for a lunch to celebrate her 90th birthday in May, when three of her grandchildren gathered from across the

world. Afterwards she enjoyed some time outdoors beside the River Cam.

Joyce was a loving wife to John, mother to Robin and me, grandmother to Elizabeth, Annie, Helen, and Vivian, and very recently great-grandmother to Christopher and Michael. She was dearly loved and will be sorely missed.

John Henry Biddis (1899 – 1918)

John Biddis was born in Great Bromlev in the spring of 1899, most likely at his parents' house St Mark's Cottage, at Balls Green.

John's father, John Thomas Biddis, was from Hampton in Middlesex and at the time of his son's birth was a Police Pensioner, having retired from the Metropolitan Police in 1898. at the age of 42, possibly on the grounds of ill health as he had been injured the year before. John Thomas Biddis' first marriage had ended with his wife's death in 1893, but 3 years later he had married Bertha Shirley, who was originally from Deptford.


John and Bertha left London when he retired and moved to St. Mark's Cottage. Their marriage produced 5 girls and 2 boys, although one child died in infancy. John Henry was the couple's second child. John Thomas Biddis died in 1913, at the age of 55.

We are not sure what young John did immediately after leaving school, but by early 1917 he was working as a Chauffeur. John volunteered for service in the British Army on 29th March 1917, just before his 18th birthday, though he was not called up until mid-May. His surviving Service Papers show that at that time he was 5 foot 6 1/4 inches tall.

John was sent to France on 11th September 1918 and he joined the 6th Battalion of the Northamptonshire Regiment 12 days later. Since July, the Allies had been launching a series of offensives which had forced the Germans to retreat. These offensives would culminate with the Germans suing for peace and signing the Armistice on 11th November.

After coming out of the line, the Battalion spent the first 3 weeks of October in billets, initially cleaning and resting before they then starting a period of training. The Battalion

were back at the front by the evening of 23rd October, where they were due on the next day to take part in an attack to capture the village of Robersart, northeast of Le Cateau. It is possible that this was John's



The attack was launched early the next morning, and by midday the 6th Northamptons had captured their objectives. In the course of the day, they repulsed a German counter-attack, inflicted heavy losses on the enemy, and captured 250 prisoners.

In the course of the fighting, the Battalion suffered 73 casualties, including 4 dead. John was one of those who was killed, aged 19. He was buried in Robersart Churchyard, where he rests to this day.

John was the last of the Great Bromley men to be killed in action, though he was not the last to die during the War. MΑ

I had an email a few years ago from Frédéric Hautecoeur and his wife who are English teachers in the little French village of Robertsart. They were curious as to why John Biddis was the only British soldier in their churchyard, when there were further casualties at the time that he was killed. That question has yet to be resolved. They kindly sent me a picture of his grave that the locals honour. HF



FRIENDS OF ST GEORGE'S CHURCH

Home-made refreshments were enjoyed by the 21 people who attended a meeting on September 13th to discuss setting up a Friends of St G's group. St George's Church, Great Bromley, is a magnificent building at the heart of the village, but like all ancient buildings it needs fairly constant repair and restoration. It is admired and visited by many including the village school pupils across the road, and it is a focus for weddings, funerals, the flower festival and concerts. But these days the Sunday congregation is small and so we are looking for ways of allowing others in the community to help in any way they can to ensure the church is maintained and enhanced for generations to come.

The Vicar, Canon Simon Heron, introduced the evening and we then heard presentations from Norma Barrow, Chair of the Friends of St Lawrence Bradfield, John Barrow, churchwarden at Bradfield, and Gregory Frostick who is the Fabric Officer of St George's. Norma talked about the benefits to the village of having a Friends group, allowing people to meet and work together, using their varied skills and talents for village events to benefit the upkeep of the historic church building. She made it all sound feasible. John emphasised the message that "this is your village church" and that it deserves community support to maintain it

Gregory described the repair and improvement projects at St George's over the last ten years. They include the south clerestory, the lychaate, the south aisle, the south doors, the porch, and the west gable. We had generous grants from a whole range of charities including the Friends of Essex Churches and Garfield Weston, GCG. Allchurches, and the Heritage Lottery Fund. But these bodies do not give grants unless the church and community provide starter funds 'to prime the pump'. Of the £260,000 spent on repairs to the building over the last seven years, £213,000 has come from grants and we provided 12% of the total from our local fund raising events and donations. So it really isn't too daunting to think of raising a similar percentage to fund the repair of the north clerestory over the next two or three years. He suggested a target figure of £1,650 per year could be raised by Friends' events.

This is an exciting challenge which could unleash creativity and a range of talents, with people from across the community working together. The Vicar and the Parochial Church Council will be discussing how to invite people in and around Great Bromley to help conserve and improve St George's. DO YOU KNOW TO WHOM YOU ARE ANSWERING THE PHONE?

Telephone Fraudsters want access to your computer and your money (Computer Software Service frauds) – What is this and what can you do.

Telephone fraudsters are now cold calling/ making unsolicited phone calls pretending to be from your internet service provider, telling you there is a problem with your device or router, it could lead to fraudsters asking for credit card information to 'validate your software', or access to your computer to fix the problem. These are all scams, so what do you need to look out for.

Common scams that use the brand names include:

- Receiving a phone call from 'Microsoft If you think you have downloaded a virus, Tech Support' to fix your computer.
 If you think you have downloaded a virus, consider having your computer looked at
- Receiving a phone call from your internet service provider i.e. BT, Sky, EE, Virgin etc.
- Receiving unsolicited emails with attached security updates.
- Being asked for your credit card information to 'validate your copy of Windows'.
- Being told you have won the 'Microsoft Lottery'.

They might say that they can fix the problem for a fee, or alternatively they can compensate you for the problem you are experiencing.

What these fraudsters really want is for you to unwittingly grant them remote access to your computer by installing software or visiting a particular website, and for you to give them your payment details. This is a scam.

These are all fraud scams - No reputable computer firm will send unsolicited emails or make unsolicited phone calls to request personal or financial information, or ask for access to your computer to fix it.

How to protect yourself www.getsafeonline.org If you receive such communication www.cyberaware.gov.uk

delete the email or hang up the phone do not engage in a conversation. If you require further assurance contact the firm directly using the method and phone numbers obtained from their contract or other trusted sources, never use the numbers or email address supplied by the fraudsters.

- Legitimate companies like your Internet Service Provider (ISP), will never cold call you asking for remote access to your computer or for your financial details.
- Always be wary of unsolicited calls. If you're unsure of a caller's identity, hang up.
- Even if the caller is able to provide you with details such as your full name, don't give out any personal or financial information during a cold call however convincing they sound.

Never grant the caller remote access to your computer,

Never go to a website they give you, and **Never** Install software as a result of the call.

 If you think you have downloaded a virus, consider having your computer looked at by a trusted technician in order to determine if malicious software was installed on your machine during the call.

Did you know that?

Fraudsters will keep your details so they can contact you again pretending to be a 'Recovery Company.' They usually advise victims that they can recover the lost amount for a small upfront fee.

- There are free services like the Telephone Preference Service (TPS) to block unsolicited calls.
- You can protect your friends and family (especially if you think they may be vulnerable) by telling them about the signs to watch out for.

Between 2009 and 2013 the number of albums in the UK that were sold on CD near enough halved from 112 million to just over 60 million. In the same time frame digital sales, on iTunes and other online retailers more than doubled. For music retailers on the High Street it was a difficult time. HMV, the ninety year old company with outlets all over the UK faced disaster. and at the beginning of 2013 it was rescued from administration but saw significant store closures and job losses.

Somewhat surprisingly only two years later HMV is once again making profits, and has just announced it is to to open new shops across the Middle East. It is also in talks to expand into Australia. China and India. They have seen year-on-year CD. DVD and Blu-Ray sales increase by small amounts, but the real star is vinyl albums where the number sold has increased by 170%.

Why is a technology that is more than a hundred years old and was thought to be completely obsolete seeing such a revival in fortune?

At the very least it seems to be tapping into a reich vein of nostalgia.

We so often look back at the past and remember bigger baked bean tins, cheaper petrol, children who respected their elders, and all sorts of other things that were 'better' back then.

For the church, there is also the temptation to see the past as a golden age of Christianity. A time when pews were full and there was a vicar riding his bike through every parish calling on all and sundry for a cup of tea and a natter. And maybe a time when God had more impact as well.

I'm fairly certain that's not the case. People aren't less interested in God or spiritual things now, probably the reverse. It's just they have discovered how many different places there are that they can look. As

Christians we need to be prepared to continue to make Christ known without dwelling on the past. That doesn't mean we can't look back and learn. It just like driving. It's important to check in the rear view mirror to remind vourself what's behind vou. It's absolutely vital that you look forward to see what might be coming up ahead.
