The beauty of a small garden is the ease of care! I can sit on my new swing chair ('cocoon' it is called) guilt free that I don't have to jump up and do tons of weeding or cutting back. I am learning to grow vegetable in pots with greater and lesser success and using old pallets to slot the pots in. A brand new garden also produces surprises. The soil here is completely different to that in the garden of Badley Hall and different wild flower seeds dormant in the earth have popped up. Along with the silybum thistle, the teasel and, my favourite, the statuesque verbascum which came with me in pots, wild poppies and a tall wildflower have appeared. The tall wildflower, thanks to a friend, has now been identified as weld or Dyers Rocket which, in olden days, was used to make a yellow dye. Mixed with the blue dye made from woad you get a green dye! Once upon a time I would have experimented making the dyes but my 'experiments' used to end up either a disaster, creating a dreadful mess or evil smelling although I did make from comfrey a poultice which worked on Eleanor's bad leg (though she didn't appreciate it - it was green, slimy and smelt a bit!)) as well as comfrey liquid manure (very smelly) which is excellent; I have some in the process of maturing in a watering can as I write. However the comfrey and marigold antiseptic ointment I brewed and kept till maturity at three years was truly dire and

went straight into the bin with no one even trying to see if it worked!

place and how beautiful the church looked. There are pictures of the flower arrangements scattered throughout the magazine for you to see.

KIDS IN THE KITCHEN

Summer holidays are here! Some simple ideas for fun, tasty cooking with the kids

Individual Quick Pizzas

225g SR flour
½ teasp salt
2 level Tablespoons baking powder
30g butter
60g finely grated hard cheese
120ml milk (about 10 tablespoons)

Rub butter into flour, salt, and baking powder in a bowl. Add grated cheese, stir in the milk and using a fork, mix to a rough dough. Turn onto a floured surface and knead lightly til smooth. (Alternatively, just combine all the ingredients and whizz up in a food processor til it comes together). Roll into a sausage and cut into 3 - 6 equal portions, depending on how big you want your pizzas. Make into a ball, and roll out or squash down into a round. Spread with pizza sauce, and each can add toppings of their choice, such as mushroom, ham, peppers, sweetcorn. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake in a hot oven (220*/gas 7) 10 or 15 minutes til risen and browned.

For super quick pizzas, use English muffins cut in half as the base.



Rock Buns

225g SR flour 80g butter 80g sugar 100g mixed fruit 1 egg A little milk.

Rub the butter into the flour until it makes little crumbs. (or use the processor for this step). Add sugar and mixed fruit. Beat the egg and add. Add 1-2 Tablespoons of milk and stir with a fork until it clumps together. (If you use too much milk you will have flat pebbles instead of rocks!) Pile a good tablespoonful onto a greased baking tray in rocks 2 inches apart. Bake at 200*/gas 6 15 minutes til lightly browned. Cool on a rack.

All-Summer-Long American Brownie Mix

Mix up a batch of this and store in a jar/tub for a shortcut to delicious brownies;

- 4 cups plain flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 4 teaspoons salt
- 8 cups sugar
- 2 1/2 cups cocoa powder

To make the brownies,

- 2 cups brownie mix
- 2 Tablespoons oil
- 2 beaten eggs
- 1 teasp vanilla

(2/3 cup chopped nuts if you like) Stir it up into a lumpy mix. Spread in a greased or lined 8" square pan, cook at 350* 20-25 minutes. It will still look moist so don't overcook! Cool in the pan, then slice into small squares. If you line the pan with greaseproof paper you can lift out the brownies more easily.

GREAT BROMLEY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

What a treat to have Adam Whiteman as our speaker this month. Adam is an archaeologist and worked on the dig as Fenwicks, Colchester was being renovated. Fenwicks is

on Colchester High Street – the same high



street as the Romans walked down 2000 years ago. The shop is in the centre of the original Roman fortress in AD 43 – when the Roman 20th legion invaded

and marched into town.

Colchester has had a long and rich Roman history – the Romans did not leave until about AD 410, and the centre of the town shows a rich history through layers of soil and mud.

Underneath the rear of Fenwicks there were some fascinating finds; a piece of brick wall which had not been plundered for use in another building project, a cross section of a Roman Road – the High Street – and a thick layer of ash and burnt debris which can be dated exactly to AD 61.

It was during this year that Boudicca, Queen of the Iceni marched into Colchester. She had amassed an army who were not happy with the way that the Romans were administering England. She marched south from Norfolk to destroy the Roman administrative capital. However, the Roman army was away in Anglesey, and Lincoln. By AD 61 the town of Colchester was thriving with a large temple of Claudius, Roman Baths, and a theatre that would seat 2000 people. Boudicca had no resistance. She burned all of the buildings within the original fortress to the ground, flattening any buildings that remained standing. She attempted to erase all evidence of Roman inhabitancy in the town.

The Romans marched back to London to protect the fledgling town. Boudicca marched₅ south and destroyed London as the Romans retreated to St. Albans, followed by the queen. There she was defeated and killed herself.

Colchester burned depositing a thick layer of ash and charcoal around the town – marking this event precisely as the volcanic eruption of Pompeii preserved the town as it was in AD 79.

The archaeological team discovered a house under the proposed Fenwicks building. This house, had burned to the ground in AD61 yet the team found amazing finds. Along the side of the house wall they found carbonised remains of a wooden table with charred remains of dates, and date twigs sitting on top of a wooden platter on the table. They discovered carbonised remains of lentils. chickpeas, wheat, figs, grapes, white mustard seed, fennel, fenugreek, spelt, millet, beans and peas. This house belonged to a wealthy family. A dark patch showed a shallow indentation in the ground. There they found treasure - hurriedly buried under a wooden chest. Gold and silver jewellery was stuffed into a leather bag and hidden.

This house belonged to a high status retired Roman official – his copper alloy Bulla – evidence of a boy born to a Roman family was stored with his medallion of Jupiter, and armbands that were awarded for valour and bravery. His wife had gold bracelets, five gold rings, and a keepsake – dating from 80 BC passed down through the family. All of these items are on display at Colchester museum, but don't show the devastation and loss that everyone must have faced during this terrifying time.

So next time you are in Fenwicks, buying a trinket for the family, think of the people in Boudicca's time who lost all that they had as she burned the town to the ground. Consider yourself lucky that we live in such a historical area – in more peaceful times.




GREAT BROMLEY WI DARTS TEAM

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IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE



The mantra of feed, water and deadhead continues into August. The pots and tubs that have been flowering their socks off all summer will need TLC now if their displays are to continue into the

Autumn. Regular watering is essential, even if it rains, as most tubs and pots, especially the smaller ones, will simply not get enough moisture. Deadheading regularly will prevent a plant setting seed, which effectively puts the brakes on future flowers. Feeding on a regular basis helps too; as any purchased enriched compost will have exhausted their supply of fertiliser by now.

Late summer is an excellent time to start planning for next year. Hardwood cuttings can be taken from woody herbs, shrubs and roses; softwood cuttings from pelargonium, fuchsias and other frost tender plants. Clematis and rhododendrons can be propagated by layering. Collect seeds from rock plants, trees and shrubs and hardy annuals. These need to be completely dry before storage and then put in a labelled paper bag in an airtight tin. Bearded irises can also be divided now.

When the flowers are over, lavender can be clipped and the heads dried for lavender bags (good moth deterrent) and heads of everlasting flowers will also need to be cut and dried.

In the greenhouse, continue to ventilate well, and damp down regularly in hot weather. Tomato plants need to have their bottom leaves cut off to aid ripening, and tomatoes, peppers, aubergines, cucumbers and melons harvested when ripe.

Gooseberries, red and blackcurrant bushes and summer fruiting raspberries need to be pruned now, when all the fruit has been picked, as do fan and cordon trained fruit trees.

In the vegetable garden, French and runner 7 beans, lettuce, beetroot, turnips, courgettes, onions, marrows, calabrese, summer squash,

second early potatoes, outdoor tomatoes and globe artichokes should be ready to harvest. In the new gaps, carrots, peas, turnips, lettuce, baby spinach, spring cabbage and oriental leaves can be sown. It is a good time of year to cut fresh herbs and freeze them ready for winter soups and stews.

By now the lawn may look rather worn and sad, but try not to water it. It will recover after a good soaking from the rain, and watering just encourages shallow roots. However, regular mowing is still necessary. Some climbers such as wisteria and some clematis will need to be trimmed back otherwise they soon get out of control.

I hate to spoil the summer by mentioning the "C" word, but if you intend on planting some containers with forced hyancinths for Christmas, it is worth keeping an eye open at your local garden centre as the bulbs may well start appearing by the end of the month. Other spring flowering bulbs (unforced) can be potted for an earlier indoor display (but not necessarily Christmas).

Have a wonderful time if you are going on holiday, but if not, enjoy your garden!

CUTTING CONNECTION TO USA

I had an email some time ago from the USA, which I have never followed up on but will share now, from a chap who had spotted the Stone Connection pages on the GreatBromley.org.uk website:

"The Cutting family also left Great Bromley, in 1634. Susan's husband apparently died and left her with their son Richard, named after his father, and daughter Susan, named after her mother. (Using the same names for your children was not unheard of in those times).

Susan remarried soon after the death of her first husband, but without waiting the "prescribed" mourning time. Apparently, she and her children left Great Bromley for Ipswich due to church persecution, and from there sailed on the ship *Elizabeth* landing in Boston. Susan's new husband was a wheelwright in the town of Watertown, Massachusetts." *Stephen Cutting, California USA*

A little search on the internet turns up:

The Great Migration: Passengers of the *Elizabeth* sailing from Ipswich on April 10, 1634.

Amongst the passengers were: Kemball Henry 44, from Rattlesden, Suffolk bound for Watertown. Kemball Susan 35, wife of Henry Kemball Elizabeth (9) child of Henry

We understand the first Broadband connections are being made in July with BT by some residents. This is great news. A reminder that the County Broadband scheme has been extended to the end of August if anyone wants to sign up to this deal.

The road closure at Pelhams Corner has finally happened and although it's more inconvenient not being able to turn right, it has made a difference to the amount of traffic using Shop Road/Bentley Road as a cut through - the roads are definitely less busy.

The Council met with Highways and our County Councillor to discuss the 30 mph limit along Bentley Road and this was met with support from both parties. A scheme has again been submitted to the Highways Panel so we remain optimistic that this will happen.

The Council has been approached for grants towards the Composting Toilet at the Church and towards two new Village Planters. Both schemes are under review if anyone has any objections to these grants please email the Council with your reasons before the end of August.

We have been informed that the Car Rally will be held again next year - using the

same route. The organiser has offered to come along to a future Parish Council meeting to answer any questions - the date to be confirmed.

New technology to record end of life choices

If you have an incurable illness or care for someone who has an incurable illness or is suffering from fragility or dementia, then this article will be of interest to you.

Have you heard of the My Care Choices Register, or MCCR for short? Developed and introduced by St Helena, the charity which helps local people face incurable illness and bereavement, the MCCR was first launched in September 2013.

Research had showed that people don't want to spend their last year or their last days in hospital but this was often the case due to poor co-ordination of care or crisis driven care. The introduction of the MCCR has alleviated some of these issues. The patient is empowered to record their end of life choices. Questions such as: Who do you want to care for you when you are too poorly to manage it all yourself? Where would you like to be? What



information do you want those caring for you to know? These are often subjects that are never discussed – they are the elephant in the room.

Did you know that if you want to die at home, then you must have a DNACPR (do not attempt cardiopulmonary resuscitation) form in place? This information can be listed on the My Care Choices Register and all local health care professionals can view it. To find out more, visit

www.mycarechoices.online or chat to your healthcare professional. The My Care Choices Register is specific to north east Essex but anyone can download the booklet and start the conversation.

MAKING YOUR OWN BATHROOM CLEANER

Some of you will have seen the recent BBC Programmes "Blue Planet" and "War on Waste" and may have decided that it's time to do something about it. We can all help in small or big ways. For the last year or so I have been making my own bathroom cleaning spray which is based on acid so it shouldn't be used on granite or lime tiles. It means I save on lots of plastic and there are no chemicals involved so it's like a double whammy. Some people in the Cross Coffee shop the other day asked me what the recipe is, so I thought I'd share it with everyone as it is so easy.

- Get a large glass jar a Kilner type jar is really good for this (see pic). Fill it halfway up with white non-distilled vinegar.
- 2. Every time you have a piece of citrus fruit, put the skins or peel in the jar.
- 3. Top up the vinegar from time to time to make sure the fruit is covered. Then leave it for about 2 weeks, preferably on a warm windowsill.
- 4.When you want to use it, get a couple of plastic bottles with triggers and using a sieve pour it halfway up the bottle. Then

simply add water to dilute it. Give it a good shake and it's ready to use.

The bits left after brewing can be put on the compost heap.

COFFEE BREAK NUTRITION with Suzanne Abbott

The trouble with sugar and the • immune system

I hope you are having a lovely summer, taking advantage of nature's bounty in the form of lots of fruit and vegetables.

It is a common fact that sugar has found its way into almost every 'food' we eat these days. Sugar is being used by food manufacturers as one of the main ingredients in food, the other is salt; both to enhance flavour in processed food. Sugar in its natural form from fruit and vegetables isn't bad for you. It is the processed sugar which causes the damage. In some countries sugar cane - sugar in its most natural form - is chewed by children and they don't get any cavities. On the other hand children who eat lots of sweets and sugar laden drinks end up with many cavities. As far as sugar cane is concerned, when chewed, one is exposed to the whole plant, which contains vitamins, minerals, antioxidants as well as sucrose (the extract of table sugar). Snacking on refined sugar, which has been highly processed, results in not only decayed teeth but many other health problems. Sugar is one of the most inflammatory foods even in small quantities. And of course inflammation is the start of many a disease.

Sugar will not only suppress your immune system but also your digestion. Your body won't be able to fight off a cold in a hurry if you are snacking on sugar laden foods. It will slow down your recovery.

Here are just some pointers to indicate how excess sugar can negatively impact your immune system:

- Excess sugar causes mineral and vitamin deficiencies
- Sugar feeds cancer cells
- It can cause indigestion, reflux and problems in the intestines

- It can cause diabetes
- It can cause cardiovascular disease

Sugar will impact the function of enzymes

- It can be the cause of headaches and migraines
- It can increase the risk of gout
- Sugar causes high blood pressure in obese people
- It causes tooth decay and gum disease.

The problem with eating too much sugar is that it will give you a sudden energy boost that will make you feel great and full of energy, but not for long. Unfortunately too much sugar in the blood cannot be absorbed into the cells quickly enough, if at all, and, after the blood sugar peaks, it then plummets, making you feel lethargic. Turning to zero calorie sweeteners like aspartame, saccharin or sucralose is not the answer. In the long run they cause just as many problems as processed sugar. They all raise blood sugar levels even more than refined sugar.² – which is quite a revelation!

My advice is - let's get back to the fruit and vegetables, good quality meat/fish, plenty of filtered water and some sunshine as well as fresh air in this lovely hot summer we are having. And not forgetting the occasional glass of wine. That should do it!.

Summer is now in full swing and hopefully any

hay fever symptoms are starting to subside now. I've been asked to draw your attention to a couple of points this month as follows:

Call-backs – We need to request that patients always have their preferred call back telephone number to hand when calling the surgery. Our team frequently have to wait for patients to find and read out this number – particularly mobiles - which at busy times can cause longer waits for patients on the phone.

IMPORTANT!! - Dogs – Due to a very nasty incident in June where one dog attacked another resulting in a serious injury, we now have to insist that patients do not bring their dogs to the surgery and leave them tied up outside. We will be putting up signs to this effect soon and will be enforcing this rule without exception. In addition to the risk of dog attacks, we often get complaints from patients who get anxious around dogs, even if tied up. Please respect other patients and leave your dogs at home when attending the surgery.

"10 insider tips I bet you don't know about your GP"

I came across a great online blog by a Dr Jon Griffiths recently which really struck a chord with our GPs. As a result I am serialising this blog with Dr Griffith's permission and share its contents with our patients and numbers two and three are below. Your Doctor has entrusted their reception staff with an important job

• And that job is not just to make things as difficult as possible to make an appointment! The receptionist's main job is to deal with enquiries, book appointments and generally ensure all is running smoothly. They are not 20 medically trained, but they will have a really good understanding of the services on offer. My advice would be to entrust them with a rough idea of the problem that you have. This way they are able to direct you to the most appropriate course of action. Don't forget that everyone who works in the surgery is covered by the same confidentiality clauses. You can trust that the receptionist is NOT going to be talking about you to others. Increasingly doctor's surgeries include clinics run by nurses, physios, pharmacists and more. If you ring and insist on an appointment with a doctor, without explaining that it's because you have a bad back, you might have missed out on seeing the physio probably a better option for you.

 If you are polite and friendly to reception, they will be polite and friendly to you. They are not trying to be obstructive, they are just doing their job – you might be anxious and stressed, but try to keep calm. The receptionist can be key in getting the right help as quickly as possible – just remember, that help might not be the GP.

So, how many of these top 10 insider knowledge facts did you know? As with all things, the more we know about how things work, the better able we are to work with the system and get what we need done. I hope these facts and tips have been interesting and helpful to you. If they have, why don't you share them with a friend?!

Henry Ford's vision of the future was one in which no-one earning a good salary would be unable to afford one of his Model T cars. Most famously, his description of the choice he would make available to customers is one of his best known quotes.

'Any customer can have a car painted any colour that he wants so long as it's black'

Ford's belief was that it was only 5% of customers who wanted something different. The ninety-five percent would purchase a car without making a fuss or requesting an alternative colour. This, says Ford, is why you should concentrate on the 95% rather than the five.

Visit any car showroom from any model from any manufacturer, even his own, and you'll see how much Ford's legacy, when it comes to customer choice, still exists.

It doesn't.

It's not just the colour of the vehicle that it's now possible to choose, but engine size, interior trim, diesel or petrol, sunroof or not, wheel diameter, sat-nav, dog guard, tow bar and more. The potential combination of variations is endless.

The primary reason for buying a car is usually that it can successfully take you from A to B. The speed, comfort and cost may change, but if the vehicle looks and feels great and just sits on a driveway, then choosing to invest in a bus pass might be a better decision.

When it comes to making the choice of how to spend our money, what is our primary motivation? Is it practicality or beauty? Function or design? Or is just about the price?

Although in the commercial world there is often a distinction made
